He recommended, therefore, that no action be taken on the Report of the Special Education Committee until the possibility of using space at Bedford Park Public School has been reviewed by the Special Education Committee.

In submitting the application the Scarborough Board suggested the date of occupancy as September 1964 since it was doubtful that the project could be completed by September 1963. The following communications were read:

1. From Messrs. B. G. Lowes, R. L. Martin, J. V. Mills, R. D. G. Stanbury, T. L. Wells and E. H. G. Worden, regretting their inability to be present.

Received.

2. From the Metropolitan Clerk forwarding for information of the School Board a Report of the Metropolitan Toronto Advisory Committee on training and retraining of unemployed workers. (A copy of the Committee's Report is filed in the official files of the School Board).

At the request of the Chair, Mr. J. R. H. Morgan, Superintendent of Secondary Schools, Toronto Board of Education, the representative of the Metropolitan School Board on the Advisory Committee, briefly outlined the training program being undertaken in Metropolitan Toronto. Mr. Morgan referred in particular to a number of problems

which have arisen as a result of instituting the training programme as follows:

- (a) The act passed by the Federal Parliament provides for Federal Government and Provincial Government financial support on the ratio of 75% and 25% respectively of the costs of retraining unemployed persons to September 1966. No indication has been given to date as to an extension of financial support beyond 1966.
- (b) At the present time the programme for retraining of workers is being conducted at the Earl Grey Public School on Jones Avenue. The Toronto Board of Education has indicated its willingness to extend the use of these facilities until September 1964. However, as of September 1964 alternative accommodation must be secured if the training programme is to be continued.
- (c) The various responsibilities of the Metropolitan Council, The Metropolitan School Board, area boards of education in Metropolitan Toronto and the Department of Education are not clearly established. Mr. Morgan suggested that in the interests of continuing a successful programme the respective responsibilities of these various bodies should be carefully delineated.

Following a general discussion, Mrs. Grossberg seconded by Mr. Adamson, moved that the various recommendations contained in the Report to the Metropolitan Advisory Committee be referred to the Finance Committee of the School Board for study and report.

The motion was carried.

3. From the Etobicoke Board of Education indicating that it has no objection to the following proposed amendment to the Official Plan of the Etobicoke Planning Area:

Amendment No. 159:

Amendment No. 159 applies to an area of approximately 6.2 acres comprising Block A, Part of Block B, Plan 4392, and a parcel of land measuring approximately 100 feet x 150 feet at the north west corner of Billingham Road and Dundas Street West.

The purpose of the amendment will provide that the lands may be developed for a car park, a food supermarket and other commercial uses.

Mr. Parker, seconded by Mr. Beach, moved that the Department of Municipal Affairs and the Metropolitan Toronto Planning Board be advised that neither the School Board nor the Etobicoke Board of Education have any objection to the proposed amendment.

The motion was carried.

4. From the North York Board of Education submitting the following comments in connection with the subdivision plan noted below:

Public School Accommodation—The North York Board of Education approves of an exchange of lands but requires an additional 0.88 of an acre to enlarge the Brian Drive School site to 6 acres. Block C, 4.42 acres is geographically acceptable as part of the proposed Isabell Road Public School site but the North York Board of Education will require an additional 1.2 acres to enlarge the site to 6 acres. Public school pupils living in the easterly part of the subdivision will attend Brian Drive Public School. Public school pupils living in the westerly part of the subdivision will temporarily attend Brian Drive Public School, eventually the proposed Isabell Road Public School.

Junior High School Accommodation—Junior high school students will eventually attend the proposed Pleasantview Junior High School.

Secondary School Accommodation — Secondary school students will attend Agincourt High School temporarily. Upon completion of the Sir John A. MacDonald Secondary School the students will attend this school.

Mrs. McBrien seconded by Mrs. Grossberg, moved that the School Board concur in the comments of the North York Board of Education and that the Department of Municipal

Affairs and the Metropolitan Toronto Planning Board be so advised.

The motion was carried.

5. From the Chairman, Metropolitan Council, forwarding a copy of the following resolution adopted by the Executive Committee on April 2:

Based upon tenders received, the lowest tender having been accepted, the Etobicoke Board of Education indicated that the cost of the project will be \$1,400,000.00 and requested approval of an advance against a future addition consisting of 235 pupil spaces in the amount of \$174,840.00. The Etobicoke Board further indicated that if the advance is approved it proposes to finance the additional amount required from current funds.

The Executive Secretary reported that the data supporting the need for a future addition as based upon a ratio of 6.8 per cent, of total population in the area to be served. He noted that the ratio submitted as the basis of a future addition is one of the highest to date. However, the ratio for Etobicoke Township as a whole is 6.8 per cent, at present and that in view of the socio-economic nature of this particular community high ratios will likely maintain for many years. With respect to the calculation of the advance against a future addition the Executive Secretary noted that the Etobicoke Board had calculated the amount on the basis of the 1964 ceiling formula. In the past the School Board has only approved advances against a future addition on the basis of the existing formula and that if this policy is maintained the maximum advance for this project would be \$158,860.00 as against the requested amount of \$174,840.00.  The above calculation of the ceiling cost formula represents a departure from that used in similar projects which contain vocational facilities eligible for special vocational grant. In most cases, Federal-Provincial authorities have provided a grant equal to 75% of the cost of instructional facilities and the auxiliary areas related thereto. For these projects the Metropolitan School Board has financed the remaining 25% from debentures. In this instance, the Federal-Provincial grant is not sufficient to provide for the auxiliary areas in the same ratio to the instructional areas as is provided under the ceiling cost formula.

In the opinion of the Executive Secretary it would appear advantageous to develop a plan where maximum advantage can be taken of Federal-Provincial assistance. Strict application of our present procedures would virtually force the North York Board of Education to consider foregoing the Federal-Provincial assistance in order to qualify for the higher ceiling formula. In these circumstances, the Executive Secretary recommended that the Metropolitan School Board approve debentures to the full amount of the difference between the ceiling cost and that approved under the Federal-Provincial grant, and that revised approval be given the application as follows:

 - (3) The school board may make maintenance assistance payments on behalf of children in hospitals or under the care of a recognized charitable institution when the school board has concurred in the provision of an educational service by an area board of education."

At the request of the Finance Commitee the proposed amendments were referred to the Solicitor for comment. The Board's Solicitor has given his opinion that the proposed amendments do not extend the circumstances under which a child is entitled to a free education as of right but they will give the Metropolitan School Board and area boards of education the remedial power they require.

I would also like to recall some of the most significant words of the late President which he delivered at his Inauguration. 'Ask not what your country can do for you but what you can do for your country.' True to his own words he gave his life for his country."

Mr. Young, seconded by Mr. Martin, moved that recommendation No. 1 of the Chairmen's Committee concerning assumption of school debt by the Metropolitan School Board be laid on the table, which was lost,

The motion was carried.

INAUGURAL ADDRESS OF 1963 CHAIRMAN DONALD W. BROWN

In many respects the year 1962 was one of the most significant in the history of the Metropolitan School Board. In the first place it was the tenth year of operation. The first Metropolitan School Board had its inaugural meeting in April 1953. After nine months of activities related to organization it assumed the functions assigned to it, and by December 31, 1962, had completed nine years of full business operation.

The year was specially significant because of a number of important happenings related to education. At the beginning of the year Mr. Frederick G. Gardiner retired as Chairman of the Metropolitan Council and this Board lost from the Council ranks a leader with obvious interest and concern for educational problems. In his successor, Mr. William Allen, the Board has found a person similarly interested in maintaining a strong educational system in this area. We look forward with optimism to the continuation of the excellent relationships which have marked the regular contacts between the Metropolitan Council and the Metropolitan School Board.

During the year the Robarts' Plan became an important feature of secondary school education in the Province. Under the Federal Provincial agreement, plans were facilitated for the expansion of facilities in the business and commerce and in the science and technology fields. In total, the area boards of Metropolitan Toronto secured approval for \$38 million of accommodation within this agreement.

During 1962 the studies undertaken by the Metropolitan School Board over a two-year period reached a climax with the presentation to the School Board of the report entitled "The Case for Equalization of Educational Opportunity in Metropolitan Toronto". Through these discussions the concern and growing interest of the members of the Metropolitan School Board in the future of school administration in Metropolitan Toronto were brought into focus. Later on I propose to speak at greater length about this

particular aspect of the Board's work and its relation to the Board's plans for 1963.

Nineteen sixty-two was also significant because, towards the close of the year, the appointment was announced of the Honourable William G. Davis as Minister of Education for the Province of Ontario. Some members of this Board have already had a number of opportunities to meet Mr. Davis and work with him on mutual problems. We wish him well in his new responsibilities and pledge our support as we pursue the tasks we have in common.

The obvious significance of 1962 in the history of the Board emphasizes the serious nature of the task we now undertake as we enter upon the second decade of this Board's work. Over the years the incoming Chairmen of the Metropolitan School Board have, in conjunction with the staff, taken pains to make the inaugural address a meaningful statement of achievements and goals. In total these addresses comprise a very comprehensive and enlightening commentary upon the first ten years. It is my privilege this evening to deliver the opening message of this second decade. In so doing I hope that I can do justice to our accomplishments and challenge you with the responsibilities and promise of our future.

CAPITAL

Ten years ago the Metropolitan School Board in association with the local boards moved forward somewhat tentatively but with considerable courage in the matter of acquiring sites and erecting new school buildings. At that time we were aware of the likelihood of rapid increases in elementary school enrolments, and by 1960 we expected to find these increases reflected in the enrolment growth of the secondary school as well. A ceiling cost formula was developed which attempted to strike a consensus of building standards among boards at the time, many of which were required to build below a desirable standard because of lack of funds. Within this set of circumstances the trustees of ten years ago envisaged capital programs of the order of fifteen million dollars a year. The first long-term estimates were compiled on the basis of this level of expenditure.

This forecast has proved, in the light of our most recent experience, to be far below our needs. No allowance was made, for instance, for renewal and rehabilitation of down-town schools. Many of the schools in the City of Toronto proper, and in some of the inner ring of suburbs as well, were built fifty or more years ago. Despite vigorous efforts to maintain these old buildings, the annual expenditure required was not justified by the results. The schools were obsolescent and were inadequate in terms of a modern program of education. Consistently, in addition to the original forecast, an amount of ten million dollars a year is set aside by the Toronto Board of Education alone, as well as smaller amounts

by other boards for the replacement of existing accommodation. This program has proved to be one of the most satisfying aspects of the School Board's capital program. These new schools have given a lift to a wide range of down-town areas. In areas of redevelopment, notably Regent Park, the new schools have complemented the whole program of renewal in the area. Similarly older districts have been up-graded as potential residential areas by the erection of new schools.

The past ten years has been a period in which the availability of funds has led to changing concepts of school design. As teaching methods have changed and the range of services available to teachers in their schools has increased, the traditional buildings of the past have lagged farther and farther behind the actual practice of the classroom. Without the benefit of Metropolitan aid some municipalities would have been required to continue building standard-type schools. With funds available, local boards individually and collectively have worked toward the improvement of school design. For the benefit of all, the ceiling cost formula has been increased over the period by about thirty per cent. Some boards, with even stronger feelings about the necessity for buildings of higher quality, have built schools at costs which exceed the ceiling formula, the difference being financed from current funds.

No single event altered the course of school design more than the Federal-Provincial agreement. The inevitable comparisons which were made between existing provincial standards and the standards proposed under the new agreement indicated that, particularly in the size of shop areas, the Province of Ontario had lagged behind the practice of some of the other provinces. It is true that in a few respects the Federal-Provincial approvals failed to come up to the Metro standard as found in the ceiling cost formula but, in the main, the increased availability of large sums of money for vocational school purposes has paved the way for buildings of much higher quality and a broader range of facilities.

When the Metropolitan School Board undertakes the preparation of a ceiling cost formula for 1963, it will have to take into account the major changes in school design reflected in the building program of 1962. There is growing evidence that more and more boards feel that the present standard is unsatisfactory when one considers that these schools must meet the school needs of future generations. Reconciliation of these trends with the capital funds that may be available to us is a major problem facing the Board in 1963. However, let us not get carried away with this thinking to the extent that we forget that the modern building alone does not necessarily advance our educational plans. Unless we are prepared to put the qualified and competent teacher in the classroom, bricks and stones are in themselves inadequate.

The provision of better school accommodation is complicated by the apparent volume of school construction which is forecast for

the coming years. The increase in secondary school enrolments over the past two or three years has been most startling. Not only are enrolments increasing in the outer suburbs where new schools are required, but a surge of increased enrolment in the City of Toronto proper has filled all of the spaces which existed in 1953 and given rise to the need for new schools within the city proper. Coupled with the need for an unprecedented volume of secondary school accommodation is the fact that elementary school buildings have been so finely tailored to our long-term need that their provision is beginning to lag too far behind our present need. Our preliminary forecast to the Board in December was for a capital program program of \$38 million. Already the need has arisen for additional projects at a cost of four million dollars, which, if approved, will bring the total estimated program to forty-two million dollars. The highest program which any previous board has taken to Metro Council was thirty-nine million dollars. The Board was able on that occasion to meet the need for an amount of about thirty-five million dollars.

Looking back over ten years of school construction, we can observe that 177 new schools and 294 additions have been approved. This will provide accommodation for 155,000 students. To accomplish this, \$185,000,000 have been appropriated for buildings. \$39,000,000 for sites. In addition \$38,000,000 has been secured under the Federal-Provincial agreement making a total expenditure over the ten year period of \$262,000,000. The 1963 Board, therefore, is faced with the difficult task of presenting to the Executive Committee of Metropolitan Council a much increased capital budget and demonstrating the need for the same. The situation is further complicated by the fact that as a result of recent elections the personnel of the Executive Committee has changed considerably. It behooves us therefore to apply ourselves diligently to the program now before us in order that our case may be both effective and successful. It is the duty of every board to re-study its capital budget for 1963 and to assist the Metropolitan School Board to present a budget to the Metropolitan Council that is sound and justified and which is within the capacity of the boards collectively to finance having regard for present tax resources.

SPECIAL EDUCATION

The Chairman of the 1962 Board announced in his inaugural address the withdrawal of special Metropolitan School Board support for opportunity classes, academic vocational classes, and speech correction classes. As he pointed out, this move was taken because local boards had demonstrated their ability to provide this service on their own. In addition it was difficult to arrange a subsidy which afforded sufficient freedom to the area boards to meet the problems of these classes in the variety of ways which the various situations seemed to suggest. This withdrawal, how-

ever, should not be construed in any respect as a lessening of interest on the part of the Metropolitan School Board in the development of special education. Indeed, the transfer to the area boards of these special classes has opened the door for the School Board's interest in new services which seem to require the collective support of all boards, particularly during experimental years.

Despite the fact that there are seven special classes for aphasic children at Orde Street Public School, the waiting list continues to be long. During the past year the Special Education Committee of the Advisory Council has considered the possibility of dispersing this service in order that the children from outlying areas involved in the program may not have so far to be transported. Because of the long waiting list it is possible that the present classes should be maintained downtown and that new classes should be opened elsewhere.

In two municipalities children with the extreme reading difficulties characteristic of the dyslexiac are being given special help with Metropolitan financial support. In Etobicoke a rehabilitation class for children with serious behaviour problems is now in its second year and close observers are optimistic that this special school program will be a significant factor in the rehabilitation of this type of child.

It was my privilege during the past year to participate in two very important ceremonies. On June 15th I assisted in the laying of the cornerstone of the Metropolitan School for the Deaf, and on November 12th, in conjunction with the Chairman of the Toronto Board of Education, officially opened this fine new school.

In five different locations in Metropolitan Toronto new junior vocational schools are contemplated. Three schools in the City of Toronto, each of which has a long tradition, are being replaced and are nearing completion. Two new schools, the Kingsmill Vocational School in Etobicoke and the Yorkdale Vocational School in North York are in advanced stages of planning.

Because of the co-operative nature of our efforts in the special education I should like to draw attention to the special place in this process of the Special Education Committee of the Advisory Council. In all other matters the Advisory Council at the present time consider only those matters referred to it by the School Board or one of its Committees. The Special Education Committee on the other hand has the continuing responsibility of evaluating the effectiveness of all special education classes for which the Metropolitan School Board pays the entire cost. To perform this function it meets fortnightly and its recommendations are directed to the Board through the Executive Secretary's Committee. In this manner the degree of interest of the School Board in special education is manifest. No year has yet passed that some new and

significant development has not taken place and I would commend to you the task of keeping yourselves informed in this area in order that we may be ready to continue in the coming year the satisfactory progress that has marked the last decade.

CURRENT OPERATIONS

Nowhere in the School Board's operation is the magnitude of expansion more accurately reflected than in the current budget. In 1954 the boards collectively in Metropolitan Toronto spent fifty million dollars. By 1961 this had increased to one hundred and thirty million dollars. From 1954 to 1962 there was about a fifty per cent increase in the school rate to provide the additional funds required. In other words our school spending was increasing at a substantially higher rate than our assessment.

Against this background of steadily rising costs, the Metropolitan School Board must annually fix the level of its support to local school boards. Each year the Board has been provided with very complete statistical information on which to make this judgment. In addition to the material normally placed before the Board, we shall this year have the advantage of the two very exhaustive studies which were done in connection with the equalization study undertaken by the Board's Special Committee.

Apart from the obligation of the Metropolitan School Board to equalize the burden of cost among the component school districts, about which I will have more to say in a moment, there is a continuing obligation to keep the public at large informed regarding the reasons for higher costs. I would suggest that, in our budget operations this year, we use every means at our command to interpret to the ratepaying public the reasons for all the decisions which we shall be called upon to make. In the past I have recommended that additional educational tax burdens be taken from sources other than the Real Estate Tax. I am referring to the Sales Tax revenue that the Provincial Government has found to exceed their expectations. A special fund from the Sales Tax revenue could be set up for educational purposes and distributed through an increase in the School Tax Assistance Grant. The Metropolitan School Board could provide the leadership in making this recommendation to Queen's Park. This would mean increasing the Sales Tax to possibly 4% if this "Special Fund" were to receive 50% of the total revenue. I would recommend a 2% Sales Tax for educational purposes.

STUDIES

Finally, I would like to make some comment about the studies which absorbed so much of our time over the last two years. Certainly it was evident during the long debates which took place throughout three meetings of the Board that there was a wide divergence of opinion as to how education should be organized in

the Metropolitan area. Despite this divergence there were certain aspects of the problem about which there was substantial agreement. There was unanimous recognition, for instance, that some boards needed more help than they are now getting. Most trustees also agreed that an acceptable degree of equalization could not be achieved by a system of uniform maintenance assistance payments. Indeed, the needs of the various boards for subsidy from the common tax imposed across the area as a whole varies so much that a plan, to be satisfactory at all, must provide that some boards receive help on a more generous basis than others. It is only fair to suggest that boards requiring this additional help be asked to substantiate the reasons for these needs to the Metropolitan School Board. Despite the reluctance of many trustees to consider drastic change in organization, there was little enthusiasm for continuing our present arrangements without some important alterations in the present financial relationship.

The Metropolitan School Board is a creation of the legislature of the Province of Ontario. Although there may be some difference of opinion with respect to the soundness of the self-appraisal that we have done over the past two years, the Metropolitan School Board is not the master of its own destiny. The present arrangements must stand until they are altered by action of the Provincial Government. This Board decided to share its cumulative studies of Metropolitan school administration with the Province, but the debates which preceded this decision point up the necessity of the School Board continuing its own studies of this important problem.

Such areas as securing funds for educational expenditures other than through real estate tax and the more equitable sharing of the industrial and commercial taxes over the whole of the Metropolitan area could be the initial topics for study in 1963. If and when this committee is established by the Board, I would suggest that it is the responsibility of every member of the Board to present any recommendation or opinion he might have to the committee chairman, whether he or she is a member of the committee or not.

It seems highly likely that the Province of Ontario in due course will set in motion a thorough and comprehensive study of the government of Metropolitan Toronto. It is five years since Mr. Cumming and his Committee made their first interim examination of the schools in Metro to that date. It seems fitting that a second and very complete study should be undertaken at the conclusion of the first decade. In order that the Metropolitan School Board may be ready to assist with confidence in this activity I urge that the studies which have been carried on for over two years now be continued and that appropriate committee organization be established to make this possible.

In the meantime, however, we are confronted by our day-to-day responsibilities as Metropolitan trustees. Until changes are forth-coming we have an obligation to the over 300,000 students now enrolled in our schools to make public education as effective as possible. It is important that, through the activities of this Board, area boards provide new schools as required, continue the program of renewal of existing schools, and work toward the development of a strong and effective program of education. Let nothing that we do this year deter us from this fundamental and important objective.

REMARKS OF W. J. McCORDIC, Executive Secretary.

In recent years the inaugural meeting of the Metropolitan School Board has been marked by the presence of some public figure whose work has brought him into close contact with the Board. This year it was impossible to arrange for the presence of such a guest, although a number of invitations were extended. Consequently, as the chairman has indicated, it was decided that a brief statement by the person who has served as Secretary to the Board since its inception might be appropriate and might serve a useful purpose. There are a number of reasons why remarks from the Secretary at this time might have special significance. In two or three months the Board will complete its first ten years of operation. Because this was an election year in Metropolitan Toronto, there has been a greater change in personnel than last year. Moreover, the School Board enters upon its second decade of operation against a background of increasing appraisal and study of the role of the Metropolitan School Board by the Board itself and other bodies.

In undertaking this responsibility it seems to me that my remarks should be, not "forward-looking" to probable changes, but "backward-looking" to significant achievements of the past ten years. I feel obliged this evening to emphasize some of the "strengths" that have been manifest in the operation of the Board to date. Perhaps a useful purpose will be served if my brief testimony bears upon some of the factors which may have contributed significantly toward these "strengths."

In the first place, the Metropolitan School Board is a co-operative venture. Ten years ago the trustees of the Metropolitan School Board met to embark upon a new era, to join in a new project—a project which had been thrust upon them. From the beginning there was a climate within which dissention might have grown. But it did not!

For many reasons including the happy choice of Dr. John Long of Forest Hill as the first chairman, the early meetings set the pattern for continuing co-operation. I recollect, for instance, the evening when the Board in committee of the whole, with Mr. Orliffe as chairman, met to consider the first draft of the Board's by-laws. At one stage in the debate a matter of controversy as between the city and suburbs came under discussion. One of the city trustees embarked on a flood of oratory in which he made it clear that Toronto must protect its interests at all costs. A suburban trustee seated near the chairman rose to reply. When he gave indication in his first sentence that he was going to be equally vituperative, the chairman, a city man, in a whispered aside said, to the suburbanite, "Sit down. It's bad enough having one damn fool on the board." Then the incredible thing happened. The trustee smiled and sat down. This little drama proved to be symbolic of a relationship about which it can now be said that, in ten years, there has not been a single vote in the Metropolitan School Board in which the suburban trustees or the city trustees have voted as a block.

As Trustee E. M. Davidson so aptly remarked last year, "The Metropolitan School Board is one of the few public bodies that on nearly every issue talks itself into consensus." Undoubtedly this method of doing things has had much to do with its impressive record of accomplishment in terms of buildings, attendance areas, special education and, in a measure, equalization of cost. Co-operation has been the key to this success.

In the second place it is important to recognize that the Metropolitan School Board is a service agency. It operates no schools and hires no teachers. It carries out its duties with a very small staff. The main thrust of education is the responsibility of the eleven local boards of education. The success of the Board to date is clearly related to the degree to which both trustees and staff have recognized this service role.

By and large decisions are made on the basis of what is good for children. This basic motivation is assured, firstly, because the trustees that compose this board are at the same time members of local boards. Secondly, their main source of advice is the Advisory Council which is again a group of persons concerned with education at the local level.

The Metropolitan School Board staff has endeavoured in its approach to metropolitan problems to emphasize this service role. I believe that it is accurate to state that we feel that we are not only employees of the Metropolitan School Board but are at the same time the servants of all eleven local boards, individually and collectively. Our contribution to the present success of the Board is to be measured by the degree to which we have achieved this role.

Finally, the Metropolitan School Board is an agency for joint action. In addition to its specific functions, the school board has shared in a number of important accomplishments undertaken at the request of the local boards. It is an agency peculiarly suited

to such tasks because it is the only statutory organization with which the local boards have regular and continuing contact. Under its sponsorship a number of important studies have been completed. These include the studies relating to education in the intermediate grades, two studies dealing with vocational education in Metro Toronto, and more recently the studies bearing upon school finance and possible re-organization of education in Metropolitan Toronto.

This week the Metro salary co-ordinating committee will meet to organize for 1963. This is an excellent illustration of the availability of the facilities of the Metropolitan School Board to local boards in matters about which a majority of the area boards feel that joint action should be taken. Because our boards are not unanimous about joint salary action and because one or more of the provincial teachers' organizations have withheld their support from the project, this has been a most difficult task. Despite the difficulty however, I believe that the school board must be free to service the collective needs of the local boards when a majority requests such service. To that end the staff pledges itself.

In closing, I should like for the benefit of the new members, many of whom we shall become associated with for the first time. to express my concept of our responsibility as a staff. It seems to me that we are obligated to provide authoritative, accurate and relevant data on any matter before the board. It is our further obligation to convey in clear, concise fashion, the views of the Advisory Council on those matters about which the advice of this body has been sought. Moreover, I believe that we have the duty to express on all problems the views of your staff, in terms which leave no room for misunderstanding or doubt. In some instances these views may take the form of a specific recommendation. Having done this, it is our duty to stand by during the debate to perform such additional tasks as a particular problem may require. But at the moment of decision it is our duty to stand aside and, when the decision is made, to make that decision our decision and implement it with all the strength and vigor at our command.

In the past ten years there have been times when your secretary has become discouraged about the effectiveness of the School Board under its present arrangement. One such period was during the chairmanship of Mr. Gouge of Etobicoke. I am personally grateful for his guidance and encouragement during what seemed to me a low moment in our operation. At the time it was my personal view that significant changes were required if the School Board was to serve education as it should. By him I was led to realize that at any given moment we can only work within the existing framework and with the tools available at the time. Our main purpose, irrespective of any change, is to perform our

present responsibilities as well as possible. To this end, as your secretary, I pledge the talents and abilities of our staff.

May I add a personal note?

One of the new trustees has already come to the Board office and together we have spent a couple of hours in the discussion of Board matters, a discussion which I have found profitable to myself and which I hope was profitable to him. If any other member feels so inclined and his time-table permits, I would be happy to welcome the opportunity of a similar discussion.

At a meeting of the above-named Committee held this day, the following members being present, viz. Mrs. Grossberg (Chairman); Messrs. Adamson, Brown, Martin, Morrison, Power and Worden, it was decided to report and recommend as follows:

- 1. On December 18, the Metropolitan School Board referred to the School Accommodation Committee for consideration the attached reports of Committees of the Advisory Council, having reference to:
- (a) Weston Collegiate and Vocational School attendance area. (See pages 14 to 18.)
- (b) Queensborough Junior High School. (See pages 18 and 20.) It is recommended:
 - (i) that the report of the Secondary School Committee dated November 28, 1962, concerning the Weston Collegiate and Vocational School attendance area be approved;
- (ii) that as requested by the parents of the Humber Heights attendance area further study be given to the Weston Collegiate and Vocational School attendance area in October 1963 to evaluate the effectiveness of the recommendations of the Secondary School Committee, particularly insofar as the enrolment at the Weston Collegiate and Vocational School is concerned;
- (iii) that the report of the Public School Committee of the Advisory Council dated November 30, having reference to the Queensborough Junior High School attendance area be approved.

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REPORT OF THE SECONDARY SCHOOL COMMITTEE NOVEMBER 28, 1962.

To the Chairman and Members of the School Accommodation Committee:

Re: Attendance Area Weston Collegiate
and Vocational School

History

On March 21st, 1961, the Metropolitan School Board adopted a report of the Advisory Council in which a schedule was set forth for the gradual withdrawal of pupils outside the permanent attendance area of the Weston Collegiate and Vocational School (See Map 1 page 21, North York area marked B and part of area marked C east of Highway 400). In that report the permanent attendance area was assumed to include academic, commercial and technical school pupils from:

- (a) The Town of Weston.
- (b) The following public school areas in the Township of North York: Humberview, Pelmo, Brookhaven and Hardington. (See area marked A on Map 1 page 21.)
- (c) The Humber Heights public school area in the Township of Etobicoke.
- (d) The technical school pupils only from the Township of North York in the area lying west of Highway 400.

The estimated number of pupils from the above permanent attendance area was given in the report as follows:

As the rated capacity of Weston Collegiate and Vocational School was shown in this report to be 1,330 pupils, this forecast seemed to provide an acceptable solution including an allowance for future peak enrolment periods.

Present Situation

For a number of reasons the enrolment at the Weston Collegiate and Vocational School has continued higher than was anticipated despite the fact that the withdrawal of pupils outside the permanent attendance area is proceeding on schedule. The withdrawal is being carried out on the basis of one grade per year, thus eliminating the necessity for pupils changing schools in mid-course. But a higher rate of retention, increasing use of the school by graduates of the separate schools, and a general increase in the number of students electing to attend secondary school have served to keep the enrolment high. As a consequence, at the present time there are 1,643 pupils enrolled as shown in the following table:

Concern about this high enrolment is one of the reasons advanced by a group of parents from the Township of Etobicoke who request transfer of Etobicoke pupils to the new Scarlett Heights Secondary School.

A careful analysis of the present enrolment of the school has been made. As a consequence the following revised estimate of potential enrolment by course from the permanent attendance area is submitted. It may be compared with Table 1.

In addition, the Population Research Department of the North York Board of Education estimates that, as the section of North York west of Highway 400 is developed, the potential technical school population will increase from the present 100 students to 275 students. These additional 175 students would bring the potential enrolment from the permanent attendance area to a total of 1,555 (1,380 plus 175). Of that total 465 would be technical pupils, namely, the existing enrolment of 290 and the estimated increase of 175 from the area west of Highway 400 over a period of ten years.

In comparing Tables 1 and 3 it is to be noted that the forecast for academic pupils is approximately the same and that the increase from 1,105 to 1,555 is accounted for in part by the increase in the commercial course but mainly in the technical course. The Committee wishes to observe that this is desirable since an obvious deficiency of the plan proposed in 1961 was that the enrolments forecast failed to make optimum use of the technical school facilities in the school. It is estimated that under ideal conditions 450 technical school pupils could be accommodated at Weston.

Some Possible Solutions

It is evident that if the long-term enrolment of the school is to be reduced to a figure close to the rated capacity of the school, other arrangements will have to be made for pupils from areas now included in the permanent attendance area. If the technical school facilities are to be used to capacity provision for further withdrawal should be mainly for academic and commercial pupils. Two alternatives have been proposed arising from consideration of both the Etobicoke and North York requests.

(a) Etobicoke

Provision might be made in the Scarlett Heights Secondary School for academic and commercial pupils residing south of Lawrence Avenue and west of Scarlett Road. Technical school pupils from the area would continue to attend Weston. The division of pupils in these two portions of the permanent attendance area is estimated to be:

(b) North York

A second alternative would be to withdraw the academic and commercial grade 9 pupils from the Brookhaven and Hardington areas and to permit them to complete the three-year program at Queensborough Junior High School. Technical school pupils throughout the Township of North York make the change from junior high school to senior high school at the end of grade 8. Technical school pupils would therefore move as at present to

Weston Collegiate and Vocational School at the end of grade 8. The attached map (No. 2, page 22) shows in table form the enrolment by grades of the four North York Elementary schools whose pupils graduate to Weston Collegiate and Vocational School. Pelmo pupils enter the Weston Senior School at grade 7. Serious consideration is being given to the pupils from the Humberview area being absorbed into the Weston school system from kindergarten.

If the enrolments for Brookhaven and Hardington are combined it is noted that there are about 75 pupils in each grade. It is estimated that, of these 75 pupils, 25 will enter the technical course at Weston Collegiate and Vocational School each year and 50 will remain in the academic and commercial courses in grade 9 at the Queensborough Junior High School.

Implementation of both of these alternatives would seem to be required in order to reduce the enrolment to a point within the capacity of the school to serve over a long term. Table 4 shows a revised forecast of enrolments assuming both of the foregoing changes being made.

While the foregoing solution seems to offer an adequate answer on a long term basis, it is also important that the solution give some assurance that the enrolments for the Weston School are immediately reduced from their present high of 1,643.

The present schedule of withdrawal provides for the graduation of approximately 70 Etobicoke and North York students with no corresponding entry in grade 9. Provision that grade 9 Etobicoke pupils, academic and commercial, residing south of Lawrence Avenue and west of Scarlett Road attend Scarlett Heights Collegiate would remove another forty. It is recommended as well that pupils from this same area now enrolled in grade 9 at Weston

Collegiate and Vocational School be given the option of transferring to grade 10 at Scarlett Heights Collegiate. It is estimated that there might be 30 such pupils. These changes, in total, would provide for a decrease in enrolment of 140 pupils.

Although the addition which is contemplated for Queensborough Junior High School will not be completed until September 1964 the Committee regards the reduction of the Weston enrolment as a matter of such urgency that serious consideration should be given to the graduates of Hardington and Brookhaven public schools attending grade 9 classes at Queensborough. If this were done as at September 1963 there would be a further reduction in enrolment at Weston of 50 pupils.

The scheduled withdrawal of additional pupils over the next three or four years should result in a gradually shrinking enrolment which would bring the enrolment of the school to a figure somewhere close to its capacity in about five years. The foregoing recommendations would likely result in enrolments of 1,400 to 1,500 for the two school years following September 1963 and thereafter enrolments between 1,300 and 1,400. As most of the secondary schools in the area are under pressure of high enrolments, and in many cases have an overload of pupils, this would mean that the Weston situation would not be significantly different.

REPORT OF PUBLIC SCHOOL COMMITTEE

NOVEMBER 30, 1962

To the Chairman and Members of the School Accommodation Committee:

Re: Queensborough Junior High School — North York (Hardington and Brookhaven Drive Public Schools)

On Tuesday, November 6, the following request of the North York Board of Education was referred to the Advisory Council for study in connection with the attendance area of Weston Collegiate and Vocational School:

"that application be made to the Metropolitan School Board requesting that it reconsider the Queensborough Junior High School attendance area and examine the possibility of including grades 7, 8 and 9 pupils from Hardington and Brookhaven Drive Public Schools in that Junior High School. The proposal might, in future, involve closing Hardington Public School and accom-

modating all kindergarten to grade 6 pupils in Brookhaven Drive Public School to eliminate vacant classrooms."

Locations of Brookhaven Drive and Hardington Public Schools are shown in the lower Section A on the attached map (page 22). A table giving the enrolment on October 31, 1962, of the two schools in question is superimposed upon the map. At the present time the pupils in attendance at Hardington and Brookhaven Drive Public Schools receive instruction to the end of Grade 8 and then enrol in the Weston Collegiate and Vocational School.

The North York request stems from the fact that Section A is the one remaining area for which it has been impossible to provide a junior high school program. Parents in the area have indicated that they wish their children to have the advantages of a junior high school program.

The request of the North York Board of Education involves the Metropolitan School Board in two decisions.

- (1) Adoption of the proposal would result in Hardington and Brookhaven Drive schools becoming K-6 public schools and the transfer of the pupils of grades 7 and 8 to the Queensborough Junior High School. At the end of grade 8 pupils electing the technical course would transfer to the Weston Collegiate and Vocational School. Pupils electing the academic and commercial courses would remain at Queensborough Junior High School for grade 9 and on graduation enter Weston Collegiate and Vocational School. It is understood that the Secondary School Committee in a separate report has advanced the proposal that the academic and commercial grade 9 students resident in the Hardington and Brookhaven areas be retained at Queensborough Junior High School.
- (2) To accommodate the additional pupils from Section A, estimated at about 200, would require a six-room addition at the Queensborough Junior High School. If the transfer of pupils is seriously contemplated, the North York Board would appreciate the opportunity of including the additional six rooms with the addition which is now in the planning stages for Queensborough Junor High School. Such an addition would require the approval of the Metropolitan School Board.


Removal of grade 7 and 8 pupils from the two schools in question would leave a number of vacant classrooms. It has been suggested that the area might be served by the Brookhaven Drive Public School alone. The few pupils resident in the extreme northern section of the area might prefer, if the opportunity were offered, to cross Jane Street and attend Memorial Public School in Weston.


The Hardington Public School, the first unit of which was erected in 1931, might be sold or might be used for some other educational purpose. With this in mind it is suggested that this report be drawn to the attention of the Special Education Committee, in order that a canvass of uses might be made in the event that Hardington Public School ceases to be used as a school.

The Public School Committee recommends in favour of the transfer of grade 7 and 8 pupils to junior high school on the grounds that it does not seem reasonable to deprive this small area of North York of the educational advantages enjoyed elsewhere. Since there is overcrowding at the Weston Collegiate and Vocational School the proposal to have grade 9 pupils from these two public school attendance areas attend the Queensborough Junior High School for academic and commercial courses will provide a measure of relief for the Weston Collegiate. Pupils electing the technical course from the two public school attendance areas will continue to enter Weston Collegiate and Vocational School at the grade 9 level. It is recommended that the transfer to Queensborough Junior High School be made effective September 1963.

REPORT No. 1 OF BUILDINGS AND SITES COMMITTEE

PART I

TUESDAY, JANUARY 15, 1963

To the Metropolitan School Board:

At a meeting of the above-named Committee held this day, the following members being present, viz., Messrs. Parker (Chairman); Beach, Boland, Brown, J. R. Davidson, Jones, Lowes, Stanbury and Young, it was decided to report and recommend as follows:

1. That the School Board concur in the following comments of area boards of education in connection with the subdivision plans noted below and that the Department of Municipal Affairs and the Metropolitan Toronto Planning Board be so advised:

Etobicoke Board of Education:

T-14932 Revised: 73 lots

Public school pupils will attend a school to be erected on the Bond site. Secondary school students will attend Richview Collegiate Institute.

North York Board of Education:

T-15493; 85 lots

Public school pupils will attend Whitfield Avenue Public School. Junior high school students will eventually attend Emery Junior High School. Secondary school students will attend Emery Collegiate for academic and commercial courses and Weston Collegiate and Vocational School for technical courses.

Scarborough Board of Education:

T-15471; 18 lots

Public school pupils will attend Poplar Road Public School. Secondary school students will attend West Hill C.I.

T-15507; 10 lots

Public school pupils will attend Cornell Public School. Secondary school students will attend Cedarbrae Secondary School.

2. In 1962 the Metropolitan School Board approved a purchase by the Forest Hill Board of Education of a portable classroom from Havergal College in the amount of \$3,000.

The School Board reimbursed the Forest Hill Board the cost of acquiring a portable from current funds. The Metropolitan Auditor has now advised that the expenditure by the Metropolitan School

Board should be a charge against the School Board's 1962 current outlays for capital purposes.

It is recommended that the schedule of capital expenditures from current funds for secondary school purposes approved by the School Board on December 18, 1962, be amended to include the \$3,000.00 expenditure for acquisition of the portable classroom for use at Forest Hill C.I. and further that the current fund allocation on behalf of the Midland Collegiate Institute in Scarborough be reduced from \$210,253.88 to \$207,253.88.

The Committee had before it for consideration the following application for capital funds for a secondary school site extension:

Scarborough Board of Education:

Estimated Cost

\$21,800.00 O'Sullivan Secondary School—3.144 acres

The site extension will result in a total acreage of 18.144 acres. On November 13, 1962, the School Board approved in principle the purchase of lands in excess of the 15 acres normally purchased for a secondary school site, following review of data submitted by the Scarborough Board which indicated a long term enrolment of at least 2,000 pupils.

Assessment: This land is assessed at \$1,500.00 per acre or a total for 3.144 acres of \$4,716.00.

Since the total site size will be 18.144 acres and since the Metropolitan School Board permits debenture financing for a maximum of 18 acres for schools having enrolments of 1,500 pupils or more, it is recommended that the application be approved in the amount of \$20,802.00.

4. At its meeting held on December 19th, 1961, the Metropolitan School Board gave approval to the following application for new secondary school accommodation on the understanding that it would be eligible for Federal-Provincial Special Vocational Grant.

North York Board of Education:

Estimated Cost

North York Vocational High School (Yorkdale Vocational School)\$1,495,200.00

Accommodation of 10 standard classrooms, 14 shops, gymnasium and cafeteria.

Under date of December 17th, 1962, the Department of Education gave final approval for Special Vocational Grant purposes and for General Legislative Grant purposes. They advised us that the total cost of the project, less Ontario Sales Tax, would be \$1,722,842.00. Of this amount, \$1,647,733.00 would be eligible for Federal-Provincial Special Vocational Grant, and \$12,500.00 of the balance would be eligible for General Legislative Grant. The approval for Special Vocational Grant covered all of the facilities requested with the exception of 1,930 square feet of the cafeteria and its related auxiliary areas.

In accordance with the practice of the Metropolitan School Board to pay for the full cost of operation and construction of special vocational schools as defined in Part III of the Secondary School and Boards of Education Act, it is recommended that the amount of \$75,109.00 be debentured as a Metropolitan responsibility.

The plan of financing for this project will be:

5. Your Committee had before it for consideration a communication from the Etobicoke Board of Education reporting that the proposed widening of Dundas Street West will result in the former administration building of the Etobicoke Board located at 4969 Dundas Street West encroaching 8.97 feet on the road, as widened. At the present time the Etobicoke Board uses the facilities as a teaching aid centre. The building was purchased from the Etobicoke Hydro Commission in 1953 at a cost of \$65,000.00. Renovations to the building brought the total cost to \$80,000.00. The debenture debt for this project was assumed in its entirety by the Metropolitan School Board.

In its communication the Etobicoke Board enquired as to the opinion of the Metropolitan School Board in respect of disposal of the building since the Etobicoke Board proposes to provide an addition to its existing administration building which will incorporate the teaching aid centre now located at 4969 Dundas Street West.

Your Committee recommends that the Etobicoke Board of Education be advised that in the opinion of the School Board the relocation of the teaching aid centre should be undertaken at the time the Metropolitan Corporation takes possession of part of the site for the purpose of demolishing the front section of the building or at an earlier date if the Etobicoke Board is able to secure a satisfactory offer for purchase of the lands.

It is further recommended that since all proceeds of any sale will accrue to the Metropolitan School Board, the Solicitor for the School Board be instructed to represent the interests of the School Board in any negotiations or arbitration proceedings relating to the property, and that if it is the wish of the Etobicoke Board that he act for Etobicoke as well.

- 6. Your Committee had before it for consideration a number of applications for additions to existing secondary schools in the Township of Etobicoke, most of which include provision of shop accommodation. The Buildings and Sites Committee has referred the applications to the Secondary School Committee of the Advisory Council for consideration and report. The Committee also referred to the Secondary School Committee an application of the Etobicoke Board of Education for purchase of a secondary school site to be located in the central section of the Township.
- 7. The Committee had before it for consideration an application of the Forest Hill Board of Education for renovation of the Forest Hill Junior High School at an estimated cost of \$300,000.00.

Consistent with previous practice the application has been referred to the Finance and School Buildings Committee of the Advisory Council for consideration and report.

- 8. The Buildings and Sites Committee has decided to commence review of the 1963 capital programme at its next meeting. As in previous years the Committee recommends that area boards of education be invited to send representatives to the next meeting of the Committee, i.e., Tuesday, February 5th for the purpose of substantiating their 1963 capital requests. In view of the probable length of the meeting it is recommended that the meeting commence at 7 p.m.
- 9. Since it appears convenient for the members of the Buildings and Sites Committee to meet at an earlier hour than 8 p.m. as specified in the By-laws of the School Board, the Committee gives notice that at its next meeting it will recommend that the By-laws of the School Board be amended to provide that meetings of the Committee be held on the first and third Tuesdays of each month. (The proposed revision would permit the meetings to be held at other times during the day).

(The existing school site is 4.5 acres. Based upon development proposed for the school area it is anticipated that the school will ultimately consist of 23 grade classrooms and 2 kindergartens.)

Your Committee had before it for consideration a request of the Toronto Board of Education that the School Board examine a proposal of the Toronto Board for the construction of a senior public school in North Toronto in order that the application could be included in the Toronto Board's 1963 capital programme.

It is recommended that the Public School Committee of the Advisory Council be requested to review the proposal of the Toronto Board and to report thereon at a later date.

- 4. "That, in accordance with section 131 of The Municipality of Metropolitan Toronto Act, the School Board approve the sale by the North York Board of Education to the Corporation of the Township of North York for roadway purposes part of the Lillian Street Public School site containing approximately .25 acres, at a price of \$8,500.00 per acre. The parcel of land required by the Township comprises a strip 33 feet wide running easterly from Lillian Street for a distance of 635 feet.

"Sale of the portion of the Lillian Street School will enable the Township to provide a roadway and make possible the development of unsubdivided lands lying south of the school property."

Under date of January 11, 1963 the North York Board of Education indicated that because of a redesign of the subdivision lying to the south of the school site it will no longer be necessary for the Corporation of the Township of North York to acquire part

of the school site. Accordingly, it is recommended that the resolution of the School Board dated November 22, 1960 as shown above, be rescinded.

6. Your Committee had before it for consideration a number of applications from the Etobicoke Board of Education for additions to existing public schools. Since these applications will form part of the 1963 capital programme and in some cases represents the total accommodation required for the respective public school attendance areas the Committee directed the Executive Secretary to review the applications in consultation with officials of the Etobicoke Board and to report thereon to the next meeting of the Committee.

At a meeting of the above-named Committee held this day, the following members being present, viz., Mrs. Grossberg (Chairman); Mrs. Barker, Messrs. Adamson, Brown, Coutts, Martin, Morrison, and Worden, it was decided to report and recommend as follows:

1. Under the provisions of the Metropolitan Act, the Metropolitan School Board has assumed the total cost of operation of special vocational schools throughout Metropolitan Toronto established under Part III of the Secondary Schools and Boards of Education Act. In 1962 the Metropolitan School Board approved applications of the Etobicoke and North York Boards of Education for the provision of special vocational school accommodation in the respective townships. At the present time the Kingsmill Vocational School in Etobicoke and the Yorkdale Vocational School in North York are under construction. It has been customary for area boards to appoint principals of a new secondary school in advance of the opening of the school. In this way, principals may accept the major responsibility for staff recruitments, purchase of equipment and other planning activities.

Since the Metropolitan School Board underwrites the total cost of operation of the special vocational schools, it is recommended that the Etobicoke Board of Education be reimbursed the salary of the principal of the Kingsmill Vocational School for the period September 1, 1962, the effective date of his appointment to December 31, 1962, and further that the School Board reimburse the Etobicoke Board the salary of the secretary to the principal for the period October 8, 1962 to December 31, 1962. The amount of reimbursement for the principal will be \$4,266.68 and the secretary \$751.00 for a total of \$5.017.68.

Your Committee was advised that the North York Board of Education had followed much the same procedure in connection with the appointment of a principal for the Yorkdale Vocational

School. It is recommended that arrangements similar to the foregoing be approved for the North York Board of Education.

To the Metropolitan School Board:

At a meeting of the above-named Committee held this day the following members being present, viz., Messrs. Parker (Chairman), Beach, Boland, Brown, J. R. Davidson, Jones, Lowes, Stanbury and Young, it was decided to report and recommend as follows:

1. Your Committee had before it for consideration the preliminary composite capital estimates for the year 1963 totalling \$44,844,523.00. Representatives of area boards of education were present to review in detail the various items included in the 1963 estimates.

Prior to the presentation it was pointed out that the second draft of the programme exceeded substantially the estimate for 1963 of approximately \$28,000,000.00 submitted a year ago. It was indicated that the Metropolitan Council would expect impressive evidence to warrant an increase of this magnitude. It was therefore decided that the programme should be referred back to the area boards of education for further study. In this connection it is noted that the Metropolitan Council has tended to approve for debenture purposes an amount not exceeding \$30,000,000.00 for any one year. To this can be added the resources available in the current levy for capital purposes of one mill of approximately \$4,000,000.00. Since the School Board may be expected in connection with the presentation of this programme to demonstrate that the final draft represents the irreducible minimum programme it is suggested that the review at the local level might work towards that end by the examination of each programme on the following basis:

- (a) projects which might be deferred for inclusion in the 1964 capital programme;
- (b) sites or site extensions included in the 1963 programme which are not specifically required for use (i) during the year 1963 or (ii) during the year 1964, for erection of a school thereon;

(c) projects included in the estimates, the anticipated cost of which in all probability will be less than the total amount available under the ceiling formula. In such cases the area boards have been requested to furnish a realistic estimate of costs for inclusion in the capital programme rather than indicating the amount which is available under the provision of the ceiling cost formula.

Pendng further review of the capital programme, the Committee decided to take no action on specific applications of area boards of education now before the Committee.

2. The tentative 1963 capital estimates include an amount of approximately \$7,500,000.00 for purchase of school sites or site extensions. In order that site applications may be processed expeditiously following approval of the 1963 capital programme, your Committee recommends that the Executive Secretary be authorized to make application to the Metropolitan Council and to the Ontario Municipal Board for an initial site purchase fund in the amount of \$3.000.000.00.

- (a) that adjustments in the per pupil cost be made only in instances where there is a variation of \$5.00 or more per annum in the cost previously approved by the School Board;
- (b) that pursuant to (a) above the revised schedule of non-resident fees per pupil day for the year 1962 as set forth in the attached schedule be approved. For details of schedule see page 39.
- 4. The Metropolitan Auditor has reported that he has completed his examination of the 1961 cost per pupil day for auxiliary classes. As a result of the audit it is recommended that the following schedule of 1961 per pupil costs be approved and that the Executive Secretary be authorized to make such adjustments in payments to area boards as may be necessary.

REPORT ON SPECIAL EDUCATION COMMITTEE

JANUARY 22, 1963

To The Chairman and Members of the School Accommodation Committee:

At its regular meeting on January 22 the Special Education Committee pursued its study of the possible re-distribution of the aphasic classes at Orde Street School by transferring two classes to North York.

Special training for aphasic children began in September, 1954 with the opening of one class, administered by the Toronto Board of Education and financed by the Metropolitan School Board. Classes have continued to be concentrated at Orde Street School. At present there are seven classes, two of which are nursery classes with the children in attendance for half days. The total enrolment is 46 pupils. They come from seven municipalities of Metropolitan Toronto.

Aphasia is exceedingly difficult to diagnose. In some cases months may be required to determine whether a child belongs to this

particular group of handicapped children. Other complications may force the conclusion that the child is uneducable. But in other cases with special help pupils make quite remarkable progress and may be enrolled in a regular class and ultimately on graduation become self-supporting. Aphasia is not necessarily attended by interference with or a slowing down of the mental processes.

Grading of pupils in a class is practically impossible. Each child is a special problem and therefore only a very small group can be cared for by a teacher, who must be specially trained for this work. Maximum pupil load per teacher is considered to be 7.

Since special accommodation is required in the care of aphasic children, the natural tendency has been to expand the facilities in the Orde Street School. Transportation has become a vexing problem not only because the school is situated in the down-town section of Toronto but more particularly because the distribution of children is an ever-changing pattern throughout the Metropolitan area—and with the never-ending expansion in the suburbs the distance to be covered increases year by year. For example, two children from east Scarborough spend two hours daily travelling to and from class.

One interesting point that was raised was the contribution that the specially trained teachers of aphasic children might make as resource people in the public school system, giving practical help in dealing with severe academic learning problems.

Miss Joan Kershaw, Consultant in Special Education with the Toronto Board, made a helpful contribution to the discussion of the afternoon.

The Committee recommends that two classes now in attendance at Orde Street School be established at a school to be selected in the Township of North York, and also that, in view of the waiting list, a new class be opened at Orde Street Public School. The number of aphasia classes would then be six in Toronto and two in North York.

It was also recommended that arrangements be made for the loan of one of the teachers from the Orde Street classes for at least one year to ensure a greater measure of continuity in the work of the classes to be located in North York.

It was also agreed that close liaison between the two groups through monthly conferences would be of very great value.

1. That the School Board concur in the following comments of the area boards of education in connection with the subdivision plans noted below and that the Department of Municipal Affairs and the Metropolitan Toronto Planning Board be so advised:

Public school pupils will attend Highfield Public School. Secondary students will attend North Albion C.I. for arts and science until West Humber C.I. is built. Secondary students will attend Thistletown C.I. for science and technology.

Public school pupils will attend Millwood Public School. Secondary students will attend Vincent Massey C.I. for arts and science until the Silverthorne C.I. is built. Secondary students will attend Burnhamthorpe C.I. for Business and Commerce, science and technology.

North York Board of Education:

T-15555: 20 lots

Public school pupils will temporarily attend Cummer Avenue Public School eventually Blairhampton Public School. Junior high school students will attend Northmount Junior High School. Secondary students will attend Earl Haig Secondary School.

Scarborough Board of Education:

T-15518: 302 lots

Public school pupils will attend North Bendale Public School. Secondary students will attend Woburn C.I.

2. That the Department of Municipal Affairs and the Metropolitan Toronto Planning Board be advised that the School Board and the Scarborough Board of Education have no objection to the following proposed amendment to the Official Plan of the Township of Scarborough:

Amendment No. 60

The amendment will increase the gross density of the secondary plan in respect of the Community of Scarborough Village from 24 to 26 persons per acre.

3. Your Committee has had under review for the past three meetings the composite capital estimates for the year 1963. It is recommended that the estimates for the year 1963 totalling \$39,114,501.00 be approved. (Referred back)

The programme as submitted includes a number of secondary school applications which will qualify in part under the Federal-Provincial Vocational Scheme. It is anticipated that from \$3,500,000.00 to \$4,000,000.00 will be financed in this manner. If the School Board approves the imposition of a one mill levy for capital purposes an amount of approximately \$4,000,000.00 of the programme will be financed from current revenues. This will result in a capital programme of \$31,614,501.00 which will require financing by means of issuance of debentures.

It is to be noted that in reducing the capital programme the Buildings and Sites Committee gave consideration to the necessity of including in the 1963 programme the total cost of the Wexford Secondary School (Scarborough) which is required for occupancy in September, 1965. The Committee has included an amount of \$100,000.00 in the programme for this project to permit the Scarborough Board of Education to proceed with necessary work up to and including the calling of tenders by the end of 1963. In order to ensure that the school plant will be ready for occupancy, it will be necessary to let the contract in January, 1964.

Your Committee recommends that the various approving bodies be requested to give assurances that the balance of funds required for the Wexford Secondary School, i.e. \$1,860,400.00 will be approved in January, 1964 as a charge against the 1964 capital programme. The Committee further recommends that, in the event any further reductions are required in the total programme, similar arrangements to those proposed for the Wexford application be undertaken insofar as applications postulated for completion by September, 1965.

4. That the following applications for capital funds for new secondary school accommodation be approved:

Burnhamthorpe C.I.—Addition of two shops (welding and metallurgy and machine shop); conversion of two industrial arts shops to provide drafting room and electricity shop.

PART I

FEBRUARY 22, 1963.

To the Metropolitan School Board:

At a meeting of the above named Committee held this day, the following members being present, viz., Mr. Wells (Chairman),

Mesdames Grossberg and McBrien, Messrs. E. M. Davidson, Lowes, Parker and Stainsby, it was decided to report and recommend as follows:

- 1. In favour of the financial sections of Report No. 3 of Buildings and Sites Committee, Part I.
- 2. In 1962 the Metropolitan Council appointed an Advisory Committee on the Training and Re-training of unemployed Workers in connection with matters relating to training carried out in the Metropolitan area under the provisions of Schedule 5 of the Federal-Provincial Training Agreement.

The Committee, as established, consisted of some fifty-three members representing various organizations throughout the area. There was also established a smaller Executive Committee which consisted of representatives from the following:

Board of Trade of Metropolitan Toronto, Canadian Manufacturers' Association, Metropolitan Council, Metropolitan School Board, Social Planning Council of Metropolitan Toronto, Toronto and District Labour Council, Unemployment Insurance Commission.

All of the work during 1962 was carried out by the Executive Committee and as a result the Metropolitan Council has recommended that a re-constituted Advisory Committee on Training and Re-training of Unemployed Workers be appointed for the year 1963 consisting of representatives of the organizations noted above. The Metropolitan Council has again requested this Board to name a representative. Mr. J. R. H. Morgan, Superintendent of Secondary Schools, Toronto Board of Education, acted as the representative of the Metropolitan School Board during 1962.

It is recommended that Mr. Morgan be again invited to act as the School Board's representative, subject to concurrence of the Toronto Board of Education.

- 3. That the resignation of Mrs. Viola Konars, Secretary, Assessment Revision Department, be accepted to take effect February 22, 1963.
- 4. That Miss Helena Joannidou be appointed Secretary, Assessment Revision Department, effective February 18, 1963 on a three months trial basis, at a starting salary of \$3,800.00 per annum. (Referred back)

5. The Metropolitan School Board at its meeting held on February 12th referred back to the Finance Committee the following recommendation:

"That, in accordance with Section 135(1) of the Municipality of Metropolitan Toronto Act the schedule of maintenance assistance payments for the year 1963 be as follows:

Public elementary pupils — \$230.00 Academic secondary pupils — \$365.00 Commercial secondary pupils — \$400.00 Technical secondary pupils — \$560.00."

As a result of further study the Committee now recommends that the schedule of maintenance assistance payments for the year 1963 be as follows: (Amended)

Public elementary pupils — \$220.00
Academic secondary pupils — \$350.00
Commercial secondary pupils — \$395.00
Technical secondary pupils — \$550.00.

- 6. Your Committee recommends that as in previous years and in accordance with section 136 of the Municipality of Metropolitan Toronto Act, an amount equivalent to one-half mill in the dollar upon the total assessment in the Metropolitan area for secondary school purposes and one-half mill in the dollar upon the total assessment in the Metropolitan area for public school purposes, be included in the current estimates to provide for capital outlays from current funds.
- 7. Included in the 1962 schedule of capital expenditures from current funds for secondary school purposes, which was approved by The Metropolitan School Board on December 18, 1962, was an amount of \$1,870.05 for an extension to the Malvern Collegiate Institute site.

This site extension was registered in the Land Titles office on April 20, 1960. The Department of Education gave approval for grant purposes on January 9, 1962 and grant was paid to The Metropolitan School Board during 1962. It has now come to our attention that this site extension was approved by The Metropolitan School Board in 1956 and was fully debentured under By-law 632.

The Metropolitan solicitor advises us that the School Board has no statutory authority to assume as a Metropolitan responsibility any part of a capital project which has already been permanently financed by the issuance of debentures as local responsibility.

It is recommended that the schedule of capital expenditures from current funds for the year 1962, approved by the School Board on December 18, 1962 and January 22, 1963, be revised by deleting the amount of \$1,870.05 for the Malvern Collegiate site extension and by increasing the expenditures upon the Midland Collegiate Institute building application from \$207,253.88 to \$209.123.93.

8. In 1962 the School Board acquired lands at the corner of Overlea Boulevard and Don Mills Road for future use as a junior-senior high school site to serve areas of the Town of Leaside and the Township of North York. The Metropolitan School Board assumed the total cost of acquiring the lands. At such time as the school population warrants it, a school will be constructed on the site by the North York Board of Education and at that time the North York Board will reimburse this Board for its expenditures in connection with the site acquisition.

Prior to the School Board assuming responsibility for acquiring the site the North York Board undertook preliminary work relative to acquisition of the lands. A number of expenditures were made for surveys and legal costs as follows:

REPORT No. 3 OF SCHOOL ACCOMMODATION COMMITTEE PART I

TUESDAY, MARCH 5, 1963

To the Metropolitan School Board:

At a meeting of the above-named Committee held this day, the following members being present, namely Mrs. Grossberg (Chairman); Mrs. Barker, Messrs. Adamson, Brown, Coutts, Martin, Morrison and Power, it was decided to report and recommend as follows:

1. On January 22 the School Board approved a revised attendance area for the Weston Collegiate and Vocational School affecting pupils from both the Townships of North York and Etobicoke. At the same meeting the School Board also approved reports of the Advisory Council recommending that the Brookhaven and Hardington Public Schools (North York) become junior public schools and that grade 7 and 8 pupils be attached to the Queensborough Junior High School (North York) for junior high school purposes.

Your Committee begs to report for record purposes that the North York Board of Education has indicated its agreement with the decisions of the Metropolitan School Board.

2. In 1962 the Metropolitan School Board at the request of the area boards concerned, directed the Advisory Council to undertake study of school accommodation requirements for secondary pupils residing in the Townships of North York and Scarborough, adjacent to Victoria Park Avenue between Highway 401 and the Eglinton Avenue East extension. A copy of the Report of the Secondary School Committee of the Advisory Council is attached. See pages 65 and 66.

In its first study of the Advisory Council's recommendation, concern was expressed about the distance which some children would have to travel to the secondary school. The Executive Secretary was instructed to prepare a detailed map with appropriate commentary for the further study of the Committee. A copy of this report is attached. See pages 62 to 64.

As a result of study of all factors affecting the matter, the Committee recommends:—

- (a) That pupils from the area of North York Township bounded by the C.P.R. mainline, the Don River, Eglinton Avenue East extension and Victoria Park Avenue be attached to the proposed Wexford Secondary School in Scarborough for academic and commercial courses and to Victoria Park Secondary School (North York) for technical courses;
- (b) That Scarborough pupils residing in the area bounded by Ellesmere Road, Victoria Park and the C.P.R. tracks, remain in attendance at the Victoria Park Secondary School.

The Committee further recommends that the foregoing recommendations be referred to the area boards concerned for comment.

Re: Attendance Areas—Victoria Park Secondary School in North York—Proposed Wexford Collegiate Institute, Scarborough, (in previous reports referred to as McGuire Site).

At the last regular meeting, February 5th, the Accommodation Committee had for study a report of the Advisory Council in which the following attendance area changes were proposed for the general area of Victoria Park, between Eglinton Avenue East and Highway 401. The report in which these recommendations were made is attached.

- 1. The location of an academic commercial secondary school in the Township of Scarborough at a property known as the McGuire Site, the School to be referred to for the present as Wexford Collegiate Institute. ("C" on map)
- 2. The transfer of pupils residing in the triangle formed by Victoria Park Avenue and Ellesmere Road and the C.P.R. tracks from Victoria Park Secondary School to Wexford Collegiate Institute upon completion of the latter school.

Throughout the study of this problem by various Committees of the Advisory Council and by the Accommodation Committee, some concern was expressed as to whether or not the accommodation of pupils in the Sloane Avenue and Victoria Village Public School areas (in area bounded by C.P.R., Victoria Park Avenue, Eglinton Avenue East Extension and the Don River) in Victoria Secondary School was a wise decision in the light of the decision to erect the Wexford Collegiate Institute.

This study was undertaken by the Committee at its previous meeting with only the table maps of the Metropolitan area. The Secretary was instructed to have prepared a more detailed map of the area from which the significant distances in this problem might be more accurately studied. This map is attached and, for convenience, the following significant locations have been marked by letter. As public transportation may also figure prominently in this decision, the bus stops available to students travelling east along Eglinton Avenue and north on Victoria Park Avenue have been shown as black dots. It may be assumed that there would be a similarily large number of stops on the opposite side of Victoria Park Avenue for the return trip.

- A Victoria Park Secondary School.
- B Dalecliff Crescent: Homes furthest from Victoria Park, in area proposed for transfer to Wexford Collegiate Institute.
- C Wexford Collegiate Institute.
- D Intersection Victoria Park Avenue and C.P.R.
- E Victoria Village Public School.
- F Sloane Avenue Public School.
- G Eccleston Drive: Apartments furthest from Victoria Park Avenue in Sloane Public School area.
- H Intersection Victoria Park Avenue and Eglinton Avenue East.

This report assumes that the assignment of pupils to the two secondary schools in question is satisfactory in all respects except in the case of the pupils in the area in Scarborough bounded by Ellesmere Road, Victoria Park and the C.P.R. tracks and in the area of North York bounded by the C.P.R., the Don River, Eglinton Avenue East and Victoria Park. The recommendation of the Committee proposes that pupils in the area of North York noted above attend Victoria Park Secondary School (as they do now) and that pupils in the area of Scarborough noted above be transferred from Victoria Park Secondary School to Wexford Collegiate Institute. It is proposed, by the use of this map to compare this proposal with an alternate plan whereby the Maryvale area would remain with Victoria Park Secondary School and the Sloane and Victoria Village areas would be transferred to Wexford Collegiate Institute. These two alternatives should be examined in terms of distances and available transportation arrangements and the safety factors involved.

Maryvale Area

Although there would be some pupils in the Maryvale area closer to the Wexford Collegiate Institute, the majority are closer to Victoria Park Secondary School. The crossing of Victoria Park Avenue is negotiated quite easily with traffic lights at Ellesmere Road and there is a walkway access to the school from Combermere Drive. Students residing close to the point marked "B" would

be farthest from the two schools—.9 miles from Victoria Park School and 1.3 miles from Wexford Collegiate Institute. Access to the Wexford Collegiate Institute would be by Pharmacy Avenue.

There is a level crossing across the C.P.R. tracks but traffic is controlled by gates. It is expected that in due course a grade separation will be achieved at this crossing.


Victoria Village

Pupils in the Victoria Village and Sloane Avenue school areas are some distance from Victoria Park Secondary School. It is about two miles from the Victoria Village School (E) to Victoria Park, two and a half miles from Sloane Public School (F) and slightly more than three miles from the apartment area at the western extremity at Eccleston Drive (G). There is public transportation on Eglinton Avenue but since it is a main traffic artery, bus stops are infrequent. The only stop of use to children in the south part of this area would be at Sloane Avenue. There are lights at this corner. Students who travel by public transportation would have to change buses at Eglinton Avenue and Victoria Park Avenue. These students, travelling by this route every day could be accommodated as easily at Victoria Park as at Wexford Collegiate.

There is a good chance, however, that a significant number of pupils would walk to Wexford Collegiate Institute. It is less than a mile from Victoria Village Public School to Wexford, about one and a half miles from Sloane Avenue Public School and two miles from the point marked "G".

It would seem that the over-riding consideration in the proposal submitted by the Committee has been the advantage of allocating pupils in schools in their own municipality rather than have them cross a municipal boundary line. This creates special problems as between North York and Scarborough because North York operates on an 8-3-4 plan with junior high schools and Scarborough on an 85 plan. While it is true the Victoria Village and Sloane Avenue Schools have continued as eight grade elementary schools pending justification for a junior high school on a site which has been acquired for this purpose, the North York Board would likely be unwilling to defer indefinitely the provision of junior high school facilities for this area. This is a difficult decision in which a choice must be made between the obvious geographical advantage of having pupils cross municipal boundary lines on the one hand and the difference in school program and the advantage of retaining pupils in the home municipality on the other.

REPORT OF SECONDARY SCHOOL COMMITTEE

PART I

NOVEMBER 27, 1962

To the Metropolitan School Board:

On September 11 the Metropolitan School Board requested the Secondary School Committee to consider accommodation requirements for secondary school pupils of North York and Scarborough residing in areas adjacent to Victoria Park Avenue. The areas involved are the portions of the two townships between Highway 401 and Eglinton Avenue East and bounded on the west by the Don River and on the east by Birchmount Road.

At the present time Victoria Park Secondary School and Winston Churchill Collegiate Institute serve the area. In addition to pupils from North York Township, the Victoria Park Secondary School accommodates Scarborough pupils residing in that part of the Township of Scarborough bounded by Highway 401, Victoria Park Avenue and the C.P.R. right-of-way. Winston Churchill Collegiate Institute serves Scarborough pupils only. The optimum capacity of the Victoria Park Secondary School is 1600 pupils while that of Winston Churchill Collegiate Institute is 1840.

A total of 2,231 pupils in North York and 3,513 pupils in Scarborough is projected, based upon ultimate secondary school population. The term "ultimate population" refers to the population anticipated for the areas when completely built-up and it is based upon existing zoning regulations laid down in the official plans of the respective townships. The estimated secondary school enrolment is also based upon a factor of 6 per cent. of total population. Although 5 per cent. has been widely accepted for planning purposes in the past, there is evidence that a factor of not less than 6 per cent, is required for the areas under study.

Since the combined optimum capacity of Victoria Park Secondary School and Winston Churchill C.I. is 3,440 pupils and the anticipated ultimate enrolment for the area is 5,774, the Committee considered it entirely unrealistic to offer as a solution the expansion of the two existing school buildings. Accordingly, the Committee proposes the erection of two additional schools, one in Scarborough to be erected by 1965 and one in North York to be erected by 1966.

Of five proposals examined by the officials of the two boards one was unanimously recommended. It involves:

(a) provision of accommodation on a site in Scarborough known as the McGuire site, located on Pharmacy Avenue, south of Ellesmere Road, to accommodate pupils from the area bounded on the north by Ellesmere Road, on the west by Victoria Park

Avenue, on the south by Eglinton Avenue East, and on the east by Warden Avenue (approximately). Scarborough pupils in that section of Scarborough bounded by Victoria Park Avenue, Highway 401, the C.P.R. right-of-way and Ellesmere Road, will continue to attend Victoria Park Secondary School;

(b) provision of accommodation on a site in North York known as the Woodbine secondary school site, located south of Highway 401 and west of the Don Valley Parkway, to serve the public school attendance areas in North York of Karen Road and Fenside, as well as the proposed Henry Farm Development. If at a future date accommodation problems were to arise at Don Mills Collegiate Institute, pupils from the Three Valleys Public School area, who now attend the Don Mills C.I., could be transferred to the proposed Woodbine Secondary School.

The following tables gives the estimated ultimate enrolment of the four schools:

The Secondary School Committee unanimously recommends adoption of the above plan.

REPORT No. 4 OF BUILDINGS AND SITES COMMITTEE

PART I

TUESDAY, MARCH 5, 1963

To the Metropolitan School Board:

At a meeting of the above-named Committee held this day, the following members being present, viz., Messrs. Parker (Chairman); Boland, Brown, J. R. Davidson, Jones, Lowes and Stanbury, it was decided to report and recommend as follows:

1. That the School Board concur in the following comments of the Scarborough Board of Education in connection with the subdivision plan shown below and that the Department of Municipal Affairs and the Metropolitan Toronto Planning Board be so advised:

T-15535: 47 lots

Public school pupils will attend North Bendale Public School. Secondary students will attend Woburn C.I.

2. Your Committee had for study a report indicating the use of lands forming school sites for various uses including that of parking.

As a result of study the Committee recommends that the Finance Committee of the School Board explore among the area boards of education in Metropolitan Toronto the feasibility of imposing a charge for parking on school property.

3. That the following application for a secondary school site extension be approved:

Toronto Board of Education:

Estimated Cost

Parkdale Collegiate \$125,000.00 .316 of an acre.

Frontage on Jameson Avenue.

Date site extension required—September, 1964.

Purpose for which land is required—to compensate for land taken up by new construction.

Estimated Cost—All estimated costs of the various properties are arrived at from an examination of the assessments, recent sales of similar properties in the area, and whatever information as to condition of the building may be obtained from an external examination. This is done by the Board's architectural staff, in conjunction with a real estate consultant employed by the Board.

Assessment—4 properties.

Total assessment—\$22,766.00.

- 4. Your Committee had before it for consideration an application of the Toronto Board of Education for an addition to and rehabilitation of Parkdale Collegiate Institute at a cost of \$1,127,990.00. Since the application involves rehabilitation the application has been referred to the Advisory Council for report.
- 5. The Buildings and Sites Committee had for study and approval the latest draft of the Board's capital estimates for 1963, designated as "Preliminary VI". The estimated capital requirements (including funds of approximately \$3,500,000.00 to \$4,000,000.00 which may

be appropriated under the Federal Provincial Agreement) total \$39,369,101.00. (For details of programme see pages 80 to 84.)

The Committee also had for study a report of the Advisory Council dealing with the annual review of the Ceiling Cost Formula for School Construction. This report is also attached. It indicates that two types of change in formula were considered, viz., changes occasioned by program needs or building standards, and changes occasioned by fluctuation in construction costs. The Advisory Council recommends that changes in the first category be deferred for consideration not later than June 1963 and for implementation in the 1964 program but that adjustments occasioned by rise in construction costs be made and applied to the 1963 program. The changes in ceiling formula necessary to give effect to this recommendation appear in the report and are set forth below:

The Committee also had for study the draft estimates for 1963 adjusted to the new ceiling formula and including a few items not previously included but which it may be necessary to carry forward into the 1963 program. The summary page from the adjusted estimates, page 79, is also attached and including the amounts eligible for Federal-Provincial assistance shows a program total-ling \$40,759,003.00.

The Committee considered most carefully the two alternatives before the Board. It is observed that if no action is taken on the recommendation to increase the ceiling formula, the program contained in Preliminary VI can be submitted to the Metropolitan Council with the confident expectation that it will be approved. The Council may be less ready to approve the higher program occasioned by the ceiling cost adjustments. Accordingly, the Committee recommends that the Ceiling Cost Formula be continued at the present level and that the capital estimates as shown in Preliminary VI together with any adjustments which may yet be made i.e., reduction or items which must be advanced to 1963, be approved for presentation to the Metropolitan Council.

The Executive Secretary reported further that an appointment had been arranged with the Chairman of the Ontario Municipal Board to determine whether or not the plan proposed for Wexford Collegiate Institute in Scarborough can be carried out. This plan would involve the approval of the project in principle in 1963, approval of funds to a maximum of \$100,000.00 for planning purposes but on the further understanding that the balance would be approved up to and including the tentative approval of the Ontario Municipal Board late in 1963. This would permit tenders to be called and final approval given early in the new year as a 1964 project.

The Executive Secretary reported further that revision of the five-year capital program was under way and that most of the adjustments occasioned by reduction in the 1963 program had been agreed upon and provided for in the estimated 1964 program. The present estimate for the 1964 program is \$33,496,625.00. It is understood that every effort will be made to complete the adjustments to the five-year program so that copies will be available for the trustees at the regular Board meeting, Tuesday, March 12th.

To the Chairman and Members of the Building and Sites Committee:

The Finance and School Buildings Committee of the Advisory Council is currently conducting the annual review of the Ceiling Cost Formula for school construction. This is a complicated task which involves all committees of the Advisory Council. Changes proposed in the Ceiling Formula are generally of two types:

- (a) Changes arising from alterations in the design of the typical school on which the formula is based and which are occasioned by changes in program needs and/or changes in building standards.
- (b) Changes in the unit cost occasioned by fluctuation in construction costs.

The various committees have reviewed the areas included in the standard formula school. Changes have been proposed arising from new program requirements and on the basis of an extensive analysis of buildings erected over the past three years. The 1963 program is in an advanced stage, having been approved for presentation to the School Board on the basis of the present ceiling formula. Since the changes in question would result in a substantial increase in the formula and consequently in the total cost of the program itself, it is believed that these changes might be deferred and applied to the 1964 program.

Indeed the Committee believes that this part of the formula analysis has for the past ten years been done at the wrong time of the year. To adopt changes at the same time as the ceiling formula is being implemented, i.e. at the beginning of the calendar year, precludes inclusion of these changes unless Boards are prepared to redesign buildings which by this time are in an advanced stage of planning. Adoption of these changes, however by June 1963, together with approval of such adoption by the Metropolitan Council, would make possible the inclusion of these changes in the schools which are planned for 1964.

With respect to the second basis for change, increase or decrease in the cost of construction, the Committee submits the following information taken from the Macleans Building Index:

From the foregoing table, it is noted that the index has increased by 15.1 points since January 1, 1961, the last time at which the formula was adjusted with respect to increased construction costs. This is a 4.6 per cent. increase. Applying this increase against the present unit cost would result in formula changes as shown in the following table:

The last draft of the School Board's Capital Program has been analyzed with the new formula applied to the individual projects. It is estimated that these changes would bring about an increase of approximately \$1,200.000.00. There is evidence that Boards would be unwilling to reduce their respective programs any further. Despite this fact the Committee recommends that the increase be made for 1963 even though this action may make the negotiation of the program with the Metropolitan Council more difficult.

REPORT No. 4 OF FINANCE COMMITTEE

PART I

MARCH 8, 1963

To the Metropolitan School Board:

At a meeting of the above-named Committee held this day the following members being present, viz., Mr. Wells (Chairman); Mrs. McBrien, Messrs. Brown, E. M. Davidson, Lowes, Mills, Parker and Stainsby, it was decided to report and recommend as follows:

1. Your Committee submits without recommendation section 2 of Report No. 3 of School Accommodation Committee, Part I, concerning the provision of secondary school accommodation for pupils residing in the Townships of North York and Scarborough adjacent to Victoria Park Avenue.

The Committee recommends in favour of the financial sections of Report No. 4 of Buildings and Sites Committee, Part I.

- 2. The Committee had before it for consideration a communication from the Scarborough Board of Education requesting the School Board to study the feasibility of undertaking educational research on a Metropolitan wide basis. The Committee referred the communication to the Advisory Council for consideration and report.
- 3. That the resignation of Mr. Alan Rodgers, Accountant, be accepted to take effect on March 14, 1963, and that an expression of the School Board's appreciation be conveyed to Mr. Rodgers for his services together with best wishes for the future.
- 4. That Mr. Sam MacKinlay be appointed to the staff of the Metropolitan School Board as Accountant, effective March 14, 1963, on a three months trial basis, with an initial salary of \$5,300.00 per annum. The range for the position is \$5,000.00 to \$7,000.00 with an annual increment of \$300.00.
- 5. Your Committee has been advised that a ratepayer in the Township of Scarborough recently appealed his assessment on the grounds that his child was required to attend a secondary school which was not the nearest such school to his home. The Court of Revision did not grant the appeal. However, the ratepayer carried the appeal to the County Court where it was allowed and the assessment was decreased by approximately \$200.00.

Your Committee has been advised that the Assessment Department and the Scarborough Board of Education are both appealing the decision. It is recommended that the School Board be represented at the hearing of the Appeal before the Ontario Municipal Board.

- 6. The Finance Committee gave consideration to a request of the Buildings and Sites Committee that the School Board explore among the area boards of education in Metropolitan Toronto the feasibility of imposing a charge for parking on school property. The Committee was advised that the Toronto Board has commenced a survey among area boards regarding this matter and therefore deferred further consideration of the matter for one month.
- 7. That the next meeting of the Finance Committee be held on Friday, March 22 at 12.00 o'clock noon.
- 8. That the Chairman of the School Board, Vice-Chairman of the School Board, the Chairman of the Toronto Board of Education, the Chairman of the Finance Committee and the Chairman of the Buildings and Sites Committee be appointed to present the School Board's capital estimates for the year 1963 to the Metropolitan Executive Committee on March 15 at 10.00 a.m.

REPORT No. 3 OF SCHOOL ACCOMMODATION COMMITTEE PART II

MARCH 5, 1963

1. On December 18, 1962, the Metropolitan School Board approved a report of the Advisory Council concerning joint planning in regard to provision of future public school accommodation in the attendance areas of the St. Clair Avenue Public School (Toronto) and adjacent schools in York Township. The report suggested that the long range planning for the area should be one involving the abandonment of St. Clair Public School and the creation of a new school district to include the present St. Clair district and the part of York Township now served by George Syme Public School.

The York Township Board of Education has reported that the recommendations of the School Board will be taken into consideration in the over-all planning respecting accommodation needs for the district concerned. The Toronto Board of Education has reported that it favours the long range plan involving the abandoning of the St. Clair Public School and the creation of a new school district to include sections of Toronto and York Township. The Toronto Board suggested however that the St. Clair Avenue Public School be retained as long as is feasible to serve the junior pupils from the immediate district. The foregoing is submitted for information.

2. During 1962 the School Board, upon request of the North York Board, considered the possibility of closing the Humberview Public School (North York) and the dispersal of pupils from the area to adjacent schools in the Town of Weston. Secondary school students from the Humberview area are attached to the Weston Collegiate and Vocational School for all courses. Discontinuance of Humberview would result in junior pupils attending King Street School in Weston and senior pupils attending the Weston Senior Public School.

The Weston Board of Education has indicated that it is in agreement with the proposed closing of Humberview and that arrangements will be made to house the North York pupils in Weston schools. The North York Board has also approved the proposal and has requested approval of the Metropolitan School Board to discontinue operation of the Humberview Public School, effective June 30, 1963.

Your Committee recommends that the North York Board's request to discontinue operation of the Humberview Public School be approved and that the Board involved be advised.

Based upon tenders received, the lowest tender having been accepted, the Etobicoke Board of Education has indicated that the cost of the project will be \$320,000.00. Accordingly, the Etobicoke Board has requested permission to borrow an amount of \$11,550.00 against a future two-room addition to the school.

The school is to serve the area of the Westway to Richview Road between Kipling and Martingrove. The ultimate yield of junior pupils will be 393 (grades 1-6) which will require 13 classrooms.

It is recommended that revised approval be given to the application as follows:

3. On December 18, 1962, the School Board approved a Report of the Finance and School Buildings Committee, which recommended

that the York Township Board of Education give consideration to replacing the Humbercrest Public School rather than undertaking rehabilitation and conversion to a junior-senior public school.

In its Report the Finance and School Buildings Committee further recommended that in the event the York Township Board does not deem it advisable to replace the existing structure, that the application of the York Township Board of Education for rehabilitation and an addition to the school be approved.

Under date of February 28, the York Township Board of Education reported that it has given consideration to replacing the existing school rather than rehabilitating and providing an addition. However, the York Township Board of Education has decided to proceed with rehabilitation of the existing building and provision of additional classroom space. Accordingly, the York Township Board of Education has requested approval of the following application for capital funds:

4. Early in January the Etobicoke Board of Education submitted a number of applications for new public school accommodation. The applications were deferred until the last meeting of the Committee pending consideration of the 1963 composite capital estimates. At the last meeting of the Committee approval was given to the Etobicoke Board applications and the School Board in turn approved the applications on February 26th.

- 1. In favour of the financial sections of Report No. 4 of Buildings and Sites Committee, Part II.
- 2. The Committee had before it for information a Report of the Director of Assessment Revision, outlining the work of that Department for the year 1962. It is recommended that the Report be received.

The Committee was again made aware of difficulties experienced in correctly placing ratepayers on the assessment roll by virtue of the following section of the Assessment Act:

26. The assessor, where the entry in the index book mentioned in section 25 does not show a ratepayer to be a supporter of separate schools, shall accept the statement of the ratepayer or a statement made on his behalf and by his authority, and not otherwise, that he is a Roman Catholic, as sufficient prima facie evidence for placing such person in the proper column of the assessment roll for separate school supporters, or if the assessor knows personally any ratepayer to be a Roman Catholic this shall also be sufficient for placing him in such last-mentioned column.

In the study of this section the members of the Finance Committee expressed concern because the present procedure does not require the assessor to determine from the ratepayer himself his preference with respect to school support. The view is held that this is a matter of individual right and that the assessor should not be empowered to assume that a ratepayer desires to be a separate school supporter merely because he is of the Roman Catholic faith.

Accordingly, the Committee recommends that the representations be made to the Province of Ontario to amend Sections 25 and 26 to read as follows:

- 25. The assessor shall be guided by the index book required by section 54 of The Separate Schools Act in ascertaining who have given the notice which are by law necessary in order to entitle supporters of Roman Catholic separate schools to exemption from the public school tax.
- 26. Where the entry in the index book mentioned in Section 25 does not show a ratepayer to be a supporter of separate schools, the assessor shall place the name of such person in the proper column of the assessment roll for public school purposes.

2. The International Congress on the Education of the Deaf will be held June 22nd to 28th, 1963 at Gallaudet College, Washington, D.C. The Congress is sponsored by the Council on the Education of the Deaf, the Alexander Graham Bell Association for the Deaf, the American Instructors of the Deaf, and the Conference of Executives of America Schools for the Deaf. Because of the distance which the delegates must travel, this conference is held only at five-year intervals. It brings together world experts in this highly specialized field. This year's program will include consideration of modern methods and scientific techniques on the teaching and rehabilitation of the deaf.

The opening of the new Metropolitan Toronto School for the Deaf is a clear indication of the involvement of this area in this special work. It is important that the teachers of this school take advantage of every opportunity to keep abreast of modern trends and developments.

The Special Education and Executive Secretary's Committees of the Advisory Council recommended that the Metropolitan School Board bring to the attention of the local boards concerned the importance of this particular Congress and indicate that the School Board is prepared to underwrite the cost of attendance of six teachers at the Congress.

It is recommended that the School Board concur in the foregoing recommendation.

3. Capital Outlays from Current Funds

The estimates include provision for expenditures during 1963 of the equivalent of one-half mill in the public school account and one-half mill in the secondary school account towards the Metropolitan share of capital school buildings and sites. On the basis of available assessment figures the following amounts have been

Of this \$4,131,669.00 it is estimated that \$1,838,000.00 will be realized in the form of general legislative grant on capital expenditures from current funds made during 1962. The balance of the amount required will be raised by a current levy which is estimated to require .55 mills.

4. General Legislative Grants

The General Legislative Grants accrue to the Metropolitan School Board. Although major changes have been announced in the Grant Formula for 1964, the 1963 Grant Regulations differ only slightly from those of previous years. Because it has been necessary to estimate that the rate of grant will fall in one or two of the large municipalities, the estimated grant on behalf of the public school pupils will increase only slightly and not in proportion to the increase in enrolment. Similarly the estimated grant increase on behalf of secondary school pupils is somewhat less than an increase proportionate to rising enrolment. The actual estimated increase is about \$100,000.00 for public schools and \$800,000.00 for secondary schools.

Grants to school boards however will be increased substantially in 1963 by a significant increase in the residential farm school tax assistance grant. Public school grants in this category have been increased from \$15 to \$20 per pupil, for secondary school pupils from \$5 to \$30 per pupil for the non-vocational courses and to \$40 per pupil in the vocational courses. These grants however accrue directly to the area boards and will make possible lower school rates in the various areas than would otherwise be possible.

5. Foreign Exchange Stabilization Reserve

An amendment to sub-section 1 of section 232 of the Municipality of Metropolitan Toronto Act adopted in 1961 authorizes the Metropolitan School Board, with the approval of the Metropolitan Council to establish a reserve fund for any purpose for which it is authorized to spend funds. During 1961 an amount of \$225,000,00 for public schools and \$75,000.00 for secondary schools was set up as a foreign exchange stabilization reserve. These amounts together with interest thereon stand to the Board's credit in a separate bank account.

Provision was made in the 1962 budget to meet any foreign exchange in excess of 4 per cent. from current operations. Subsequently, the Board on the recommendation of the Treasurer directed that the entire premium be met from current funds. An amount of \$235,000.00 has been budgeted for 1963. This will likely permit the premium to be met in full as in 1962 thus keeping the stabilization reserve intact for future use.

6. Metropolitan Tax Levy

While it is recognized that the demand made by the Metropolitan Authority on the Area Municipalities is for a stated sum of money rather than a rate, and while it is known that slight variations in local assessment policy may result in slight variations in rates, it is estimated that the approximate rate shown below will be required to provide the amounts required for Metropolitan school purposes. These rates are based on the most recent estimates of the 1963 assessment and are tabled with the approximate rates of the previous years.

REPORT No. 4 OF SCHOOL ACCOMMODATION COMMITTEE

PART I

APRIL 2, 1963

To the Metropolitan School Board:

At a meeting of the above-named Committee held this day, the following members being present, viz., Mrs. Grossberg (Chairman); Mrs. Barker, Messrs. Adamson, Brown, Coutts, Martin, Morrison and Worden, it was decided to report and recommend as follows:

1. Your Committee had before it for consideration a communication from the North York Board of Education requesting that the Metropolitan attendance area definition whereby North York pupils attend York Memorial C.I. and George Harvey Vocational School be altered to permit pupils residing on the south side of Lawrence Avenue West, between proposed Highway 400 extension and the C.N.R. tracks to attend the aforementioned schools. The present definition of the area reads as follows:

"From Lawrence Avenue West south along C.N.R. tracks to North York boundary, west along North York boundary to proposed extension of Highway 400 to Lawrence Avenue West, east along south side of Lawrence Avenue to point of origin, excluding all pupils on Lawrence Avenue."

The reasons for requesting the change are as follows:

- 1. The children living along the south side of Lawrence Avenue in this area attend George Anderson Drive Public School and should have the privilege of attending the same secondary school with their classmates after grade VIII.
- 2. Lawrence Avenue has been widened and is developing into a very dangerous traffic artery.
- The number of children involved in changing the boundary line to the centre of Lawrence Avenue is negligible, probably a maximum of four.

The Committee also had before it a communication from the York Township Board of Education dated March 25th concurring in the suggested alteration of the attendance area. Accordingly, your Committee recommends that pupils residing within the attend-

ance area noted below shall attend York Memorial C.I. or George Harvey Vocational School:

"From Lawrence Avenue West south along the C.N.R. tracks to the North York boundary; west along the North York boundary to the intersection of the proposed extension of Highway 400; north along the proposed extension to Lawrence Avenue West; east along the centre line of Lawrence Avenue West to point of origin."

2. The Secondary School Committee of the Advisory Council, as requested by the School Accommodation Committee, has reviewed a communication from the East York Board of Education requesting that arrangements be made for East York pupils selecting the science, technology and trades programme to be admitted to Danforth Technical School (Toronto) at the beginning of grade 9, rather than at grade 10 as has been the practice in previous years. It is noted that the Department of Education regulations require that a school have three or more technical shops to meet the course requirements for pupils electing the four or five year science, technology and trades programme and that the East York C.I. does not have the necessary facilities. The Secondary School Committee has recommended that arrangements be made for the attendance of grade 9 pupils from East York at the Danforth Technical School.

Accordingly, your Committee recommends that East York pupils, excepting those residing in the Bennington Heights district, electing the science, technology and trades course attend Danforth Technical School at the beginning of grade 9, effective from September, 1963 and that the Toronto Board of Education be requested to concur in this change. (Officials of the Toronto Board of Education have indicated that the proposed change in the attendance area provision will not materially affect the school's operation.)

On January 2, 1962, the Department of Education gave tentative approval for special vocational grant purposes to the application of the Toronto Board of Education for construction of the Monarch Park Secondary School (East End Secondary School). The areas approved for special grant were 4 commercial rooms, 5 standard classrooms, 1 laboratory, one-half of a single gymnasium and 1,000 square feet of the cafeteria.

The facilities not approved for special vocational grant consisted of 20 standard classrooms, 1 health classroom, 1 art room, 2 music rooms, 1 library, 5 laboratories, one and one-half gymnasia and the cafeteria area in excess of 1,000 square feet. The Metropolitan School Board, at its meeting held on April 24, 1962 approved a ceiling formula for the project for debenture purposes in the amount of \$1,546,350.00 (915 pupil spaces x \$1,690.00 = \$1,546,350.00).

Based upon tenders received, the lowest tender having been accepted, the Toronto Board of Education has indicated that the cost of the Monarch Park Secondary School, including the athletic field and stadium, will be \$3,952,730.00. Between the time of the School Board's initial approval and the completion of final plans alterations were made in the accommodation to be provided at the school. Accordingly, the following ceiling formula has been calculated for the project:

2. The Superintendent of Public Schools, Toronto Board of Education has reported the urgent need for additional qualified teachers for the Metropolitan School for the Deaf. To assist in recruitment of the teachers the Superintendent suggested that the attached memorandum be forwarded to all area boards of education for information of the respective staffs. In 1959 when a similar shortage of trained teachers occurred, the Metropolitan School Board assumed the cost of training five teachers from the Metropolitan area since the School Board bears the total cost of operation of the school.

As part of its continuing study the Special Education Committee of the Advisory Council has had this matter under study and the Executive Secretary submitted the attached report to your Committee for consideration. (See page 123.)

It is recommended:

- (a) that arrangements be made to circulate the bulletin attached (see page 123) to all area boards of education to assist in the recruitment of additional teachers for the Metropolitan School for the Deaf and.
- (b) that the School Board again underwrite the cost of training five teachers for the Metropolitan School for the Deaf during the forthcoming school year. (As a result of discussions with officials of the Department of Education, arrangements have been made to reserve two places at the Ontario School for the Deaf, Belleville, for teachers selected for training. Other staff chosen will be required to undertake training either in the United States or the United Kingdom.)
- 3. The Committee had before it for consideration the attached reports of the Special Education Committee having reference to the decentralization of aphasic class operations. (For details of reports see pages 124 to 127.)

It is recommended that the School Board approve the Report of the Special Education Committee dated March 19, 1963.

MARCH 8, 1963

To the Chairman and Members of the School Accommodation Committee:

As part of its continuing responsibility for keeping under review various programs of Special Education financed in full by the Metropolitan School Board, the Special Education Committee recently visited the Metropolitan School for the Deaf.

It is evident that the erection of this fine new school has had the effect of attracting to the Toronto area, families within which there are one or more deaf children. The present entry into the preschool section exceeds numerically the transfer from the senior grades to classes in Northern Secondary School. For these two reasons, enrolment has grown and now stands at 139. The growing enrolment has increased staff requirements. At present there are nine qualified teachers and eight unqualified teachers.

Before the School opened special training was provided at the expense of the Metropolitan School Board for five teachers. It is evident that more teachers require special training if the desired number of qualified teachers is to be maintained. It is therefore recommended that the Metropolitan School Board endorse in principle the payment of all costs involved in the special preparation of up to five teachers. As was the case previously it is recommended that teachers be given special training in a number of different institutions most of which are in the United States. The methods and program of our school however has drawn so heavily upon the experience of Dr. A. W. G. Ewing of the Manchester School for the Deaf, it is recommended that of the teachers selected, two be afforded the opportunity of training in Manchester, England.

For this purpose a bulletin which is attached, has been prepared for circulation among the teachers of Metropolitan Toronto. It is recommended that this bulletin be approved and that Mr. R. E. Jones be authorized to make the arrangements for special training for up to five teachers and that when these arrangements are made that he report thereon to be Metropolitan School Board.

TORONTO BOARD OF EDUCATION

To All Public School Teachers in Metropolitan Toronto:

The Toronto Board of Education requires a number of teachers for the Metropolitan School for the Deaf, 43 Millwood Road. It will be necessary for such teachers to train as oral teachers of the deaf for one year on leave of absence with pay.

Qualifications:

- 1. A minimum of two years' experience in grade classes in the Metropolitan Toronto area, preferably in the range from Junior Kindergarten to Grade 7.
- 2. A good academic background. Some training schools such as the Ontario School for the Deaf, Belleville, and the University of Manchester, England, will admit a qualified, experienced teacher; others such as Clarke School, Northampton and Lexington School, New York, require a B.A. or equivalent degree for admission.
- 3. Training or experience in fields such as industrial arts, home economics, swimming, arts and crafts is valuable.
- 4. Good health and abundant energy.

Conditions of Employment:

- 1. Candidates must be accepted for positions with the Toronto Board of Education.
- One year of training must be taken at a training school outside of Toronto.
- 3. Each accepted candidate must contract to teach deaf children for five years upon return from training.

REPORT OF THE SPECIAL EDUCATION COMMITTEE

MARCH 19, 1963

To the Chairman and Members of The School Accommodation Committee:

On February 12th the Metropolitan School Board deferred consideration of the attached report of the Advisory Council which recommended that two classes now located at Orde Street School be transferred to a North York School (tentatively, Cameron Avenue Public School). The purpose of this decentralization was to reduce the travelling time of a number of the pupils who reside in the north central area. Deferral was approved in order to give the Special Education Committee an opportunity to consider an alternate plan which had emerged in connection with proposals of the Toronto Board of Education for reorganization of the elementary school program in the north end of the City. This new proposal envisaged the establishment of a senior public school for the one remaining area in the City of Toronto not so serviced. The construction of a senior public school would leave a sufficient

surplus of empty classrooms at Bedford Park Public School to occupy part or all of the space required for aphasic pupils. Such a central location would have the general effect of reducing travelling time for most of the pupils involved. Its strategic location in relation to Highway 401 was considered to be an important factor in the problem of travelling time.

The Special Education Committee has given careful consideration to this problem. There is substantial agreement that the present classes serve rather adequately the needs of the most seriously handicapped aphasic children. It is not expected that as long as this remains the main purpose of the program that many additional classes will be required. There are many pupils however, in opportunity classes or in regular grade classes whose learning progress falls well below the average because of what is suspected to be a condition of mild aphasia. Any further expansion of the program would be designed to meet the needs of such pupils. Indeed a good case can be made for such a program since the probability of success is so much greater than is the case with children now enrolled. The Special Education Committee however feels that classes for the more mildly affected should be dispersed throughout the area and should be located in schools where the children involved may be integrated according to their own particular level of ability in the work of regular classes. If the program moves in this direction, consideration would then be given to a similar dispersion of the classes for the more seriously affected pupils. Although such dispersion is unlikely, the Committee is reluctant, in this early stage in the evolution of the aphasic program, to recommend the centralization of all aphasic classes in one location.

When some decentralization of the aphasic classes was first considered by the Committee, the suitability of the location of both Bedford Park School and Cameron Avenue School in North York came under review. Bedford Park School is in a more central location and is almost as accessible to Highway 401 as Cameron Avenue School. In the opinion of the Committee the location of two units in Bedford Park School would achieve the same results as if they were located in the Cameron Avenue School.

It is therefore recommended that the Toronto Board of Education be requested to consider establishing two aphasic classes in the Bedford Park School. The Committee further recommends that the program be kept under careful study along the general lines outlined in this report and that no decision be made at the present time with respect to the permanent location of the classes now provided in Orde Street School.

REPORT OF SPECIAL EDUCATION COMMITTEE

JANUARY 22, 1963

To the Chairman and Members of the School Accommodation Committee:

At its regular meeting on January 22 the Special Education Committee pursued its study of the possible re-distribution of the aphasic classes at Orde Street School by transferring two classes to North York.

Special training for aphasic children began in September 1954 with the opening of one class, administered by the Toronto Board of Education and financed by the Metropolitan School Board. Classes have continued to be concentrated at Orde Street School. At present there are seven classes, two of which are nursery classes with the children in attendance for half days. The total enrolment is 46 pupils. They come from seven municipalities of Metropolitan Toronto.

Aphasia is exceedingly difficult to diagnose. In some cases months may be required to determine whether a child belongs to this particular group of handicapped children. Other complications may force the conclusion that the child is uneducable. But in other cases with special help pupils make quite remarkable progress and may be enrolled in a regular class and ultimately on graduation become self-supporting. Aphasia is not necessarily attended by interference with or a slowing down of the mental processes.

Grading of pupils in a class is practically impossible. Each child is a special problem and therefore only a very small group can be cared for by a teacher, who must be specially trained for this work. Maximum pupil load per teacher is considered to be 7.

Since special accommodation is required in the care of aphasic children, the natural tendency has been to expand the facilities in the Orde Street School. Transportation has become a vexing problem not only because the school is situated in the down-town section of Toronto but more particularly because the distribution of children is an ever-changing pattern throughout the Metropolitan area—and with the never-ending expansion in the suburbs the distance to be covered increases year by year. For example, two children from east Scarborough spend two hours daily travelling to and from class.

One interesting point that was raised was the contribution that the specially trained teachers of aphasic children might make as resource people in the public school system, giving practical help in dealing with severe academic learning problems.

Miss Joan Kershaw, Consultant in Special Education with the Toronto Board, made a helpful contribution to the discussion of the afternoon.

The Committee recommends that two classes now in attendance at Orde Street School be established at a school to be selected in the Township of North York, and also that, in view of the waiting list, a new class be opened at Orde Street Public School. The number of aphasia classes would then be six in Toronto and two in North York.

It was also recommended that arrangements be made for the loan of one of the teachers from the Orde Street classes for at least one year to ensure a greater measure of continuity in the work of the classes to be located in North York.

It was also agreed that close liaison between the two groups through monthly conferences would be of very great value.

REPORT OF SECONDARY SCHOOL COMMITTEE

PART I

APRIL 17, 1963

To the Chairman and Members of the Metropolitan School Board:

Re: Attendance Areas—Victoria Park Secondary School (North York) and the proposed Wexford Collegiate — (Scarborough)

Under date of November 27, 1962, the Secondary School Committee of the Advisory Council reported the need for two secondary schools to relieve anticipated overload at Victoria Park Secondary School in North York and Winston Churchill Collegiate Institute in Scarborough. One of these schools is contemplated in the Woodbine Avenue area in North York; the second, on a site which has been acquired by the Scarborough Board of Education, east of Victoria Park Avenue and north of Lawrence Avenue.

As requested by the Metropolitan School Board, the Secondary School Committee studied and ultimately recommended modifications to the existing attendance areas for the two schools adjacent to Victoria Park Avenue boundary line between North York and Scarborough. Specifically, these recommendations provided that the triangular area bounded by Victoria Park Avenue on the west, Ellesmere Avenue on the north and the C.P.R. tracks on the south and east be transferred from Victoria Park Secondary School to the new Wexford Collegiate.

The Committee has now been advised that the Metropolitan School Board has approved a different arrangement on the recommendation of the Accommodation Committee. This arrangement would involve the Scarborough pupils residing in the triangular area described above remaining at Victoria Park Secondary School and the transfer instead of the secondary school pupils from the Victoria Village and Sloane Avenue Public School Areas to the new Wexford Collegiate. The Scarborough Board has advised its willingness to accept this plan; the North York Board, on the other hand, has requested that it be reviewed again.

The Secondary School Committee recognizes that each of the alternatives now under discussion has advantages and disadvantages. After re-study of the problem the Committee recommends in favour of its original recommendation, i.e. transfer of Scarborough pupils from a North York school to a Scarborough school

as opposed to transfer of North York pupils to the new Scarborough school. In summary, the reasons for confirming these original recommendations are as follows:

- It is expected that there would be less resistance encountered in transferring Scarborough pupils back to a Scarborough school than there would be in transferring North York pupils across the municipal boundary line to a new Scarborough school.
- 2. All other things being equal, the Committee regards it as an advantage to provide, for as many pupils as possible, a complete educational program from Kindergarten to Grade 13 within the same school jurisdiction.
- 3. The important place of the Junior High School program in the North York school system represents a complicating feature in the attendance of North York pupils in Scarborough secondary schools. Until the Junior High School is erected in the Victoria Village area, presumably students would go to secondary school at the beginning of Grade 9. The North York Board, however, feels committed to provide as soon as practicable, a three level system of education throughout the Township. This would mean that under the plan proposed by the Accommodation Committee, students from the Victoria Village Junior High School would enter the Wexford Collegiate at a different grade level than the pupils from Scarborough, namely at the end of Grade 9 rather than at the end of Grade 8.
- 4. Each municipal school board develops practices and services which differ from those of a neighbouring board. These include the provision of school board bursaries, guidance services, etc. It is always easier to administer the special features when a majority of the pupils involved attend the school of the home municipality.

The Committee recognizes that the boundaries of attendance areas should be drawn to ensure the effective use of existing schools and that prime consideration in arriving at a decision may be both economic and geographic. In the present instance economic considerations do not play a significant part but from a geographic standpoint it may be argued that the accommodation of North York pupils from the Victoria Village and Sloane Avenue Public School areas in the new Wexford Collegiate Institute would be the most logical arrangement. However the Committee does not believe that the geographic advantage of such a settlement outweigh the advantages which the pupils derive from continuing in the North York school system to which they are accustomed.

REPORT OF PUBLIC SCHOOL COMMITTEE

PART II

APRIL 18, 1963

To the Chairman and Members of the Metropolitan School Board:

The Metropolitan School Board at its meeting held on April 9th, referred to the Public School Committee for consideration, an application of the North York Board of Education for an addition to the Wilmington Public School consisting of four grade classrooms and one special education classroom. The referral was made since the pupil-home ratio exceeded the normal ratio used to determine accommodation needs.

At the present time the Wilmington Public School has twentyfour grade classrooms and three kindergartens. In addition, eight portables are being used, seven for regular grade classes and one for kindergarten. The Committee submits for information the following table of enrolments for the period 1959 to 1965:

It is noted that even if the proposed addition to the school is approved portable accommodation will be required as follows:

September 1963 — 3 portables September 1964 — 4 portables September 1965 — 5 portables.

The Supervisor of Population Research, North York Board of Education indicated that it is anticipated that after September, 1964, the kindergarten enrolment will commence a gradual decline.

As a result, portable accommodation requirements will decline at the rate of about one class per year so that by September 1971 only the permanent accommodation will be required, i.e. the facilities now existing and the proposed addition of five classrooms. In the opinion of the Supervisor of Population Research there will be no surplus permanent space until at least September 1972.

In its review of the application the Public School Committee also had regard for the adjacent public school attendance area of Cedar Grove Public School, situated north of Wilmington Public School. The attendance area of the Cedar Grove Public School is not entirely built up at the present time and it is anticipated that additional accommodation will be required at this school in the future. The Committee also noted that the north boundary of the Wilmington Public School is one-half block north of the school at the present time.

The Public School Committee acknowledges the high pupil-home ratio for the school attendance area and is of the opinion that it would be unwise to continue the use of several portables at this school for a further period of close to ten years. (Portables have been in use at the school since 1956). It is noted that unless additional permanent accommodation is approved, portables will be in use at the school for the foreseeable future. Indeed, based upon the pupil-home ratio for the area at least five portables would be required as late as September 1971.

Having regard for the unusually high and sustained pupil-home ratio in the attendance area of the Wilmington Public School and for the fact that an adjustment can be made between the attendance areas of Wilmington and Cedar Grove Public Schools, in the event of a rapid decline in the pupil-home ratio in the Wilmington Public School area, the Committee recommends approval of the application for an addition of five standard classrooms.

To the Metropolitan School Board:

At a meeting of the above-named Committee held this day, the following members being present, viz., Messrs. Parker, Beach, Boland, Brown, J. R. Davidson, Jones, Lowes, Stanbury and Young, it was decided to report and recommend as follows:

Re Scarborough Request for Change in Attendance Area Blantyre Public School (Scarborough), Adam Beck (Toronto)

In its early studies of potential attendance areas, the Metropolitan School Board in consultation with the area boards concerned established a small attendance area in Scarborough which was attached to the Adam Beck Public School in Toronto. This arrangement provided accommodation for surplus pupils in the Blantyre Public School area of Scarborough during the period when the enrolment at this school was at a peak. There has been, over the period, an average of seventy pupils involved. There was a saving, therefore, of about two rooms.

With the erection of Fairmount Park Senior Public School in Toronto, Adam Beck will become a Junior School. The Grade 7 and 8 pupils from Scarborough now in attendance at Adam Beck could attend Williamson Road School in Toronto or return to Blantyre Public School.

As the figures on the attached enrolment tables show, the peak at Blantyre Public School has passed and the enrolment is declining. Indeed it appears now to be almost stable with a Kindergarten entry of 48 pupils and a Grade 8 class of 46. Although the return of all pupils from the area to Blantyre Public School would tax the school to capacity, it seems preferable to sending the junior pupils across the municipal boundary line while pupils of Grade 7 and 8 remain in the home school.

It is therefore recommended that the request of the Scarborough Board of Education be approved, effective September 1964.

At a meeting of the above-named Committee held this day, the following members being present, viz., Mr. Stainsby (Chairman), Mrs. Barker, Mrs. Grossberg, Messrs. Brown and E. M. Davidson, consideration was given to the Report of the Metropolitan Advisory Committee on the training and re-training of unemployed workers and, in particular, to the first recommendation of the Committee which reads as follows:

"That the Department of Education be asked to provided a directive which will clearly state the authority and responsibities of (a) the boards of education in the Metropolitan area (b) the Metropolitan School Board and (c) Metropolitan Council for the Municipality of Metropolitan Toronto (d) the Department of Education."

In the opinion of the Committee the problem of adult training is one of concern for the entire Metropolitan area. The Committee feels that the Metropolitan School Board should indicate its willingness to assume responsibility for the operation of a training program under Schedules 4 and 5.* Since a meeting will shortly be held with officials of the Department of Education regarding the adult training program to which the School Board's representative on the Metropolitan Advisory Committee, Mr. J. R. H. Morgan, has been invited, the Committee directed the Executive Secretary to prepare for information of the Department of Education and for guidance of Mr. Morgan during the discussions the attached communication outlining the viewpoint of the Special Committee.

Dear Sir:

The Metropolitan School Board recently received for study a report of the Metropolitan Toronto Advisory Committee on Training and Retraining of Unemployed Workers. Among other things this report requested clarification from the Department of Education as to the authority and responsibilities of various civic bodies, including the Metropolitan School Board, in the matter of retraining unemployed persons. It also recommended that such responsible authority as may be named by the Department of Education should provide suitable facilities for a training program within Metropolitan Toronto such as that envisaged under Schedules 4 and 5.

There was general agreement among the members of the Metropolitan School Board that the need which this program seeks to meet is common to the entire Metropolitan area. It would therefore be expected that any school erected for this purpose would serve all eleven school districts. If the Federal and Provincial Governments continue their policy of relying on local authorities to administer and operate the Training and Retraining program, the view is held that this responsibility might best be assumed in Metropolitan Toronto by the Metropolitan School Board. By such an arrangement the administration of the program would become the responsibility of a group representative of the entire area. Moreover, in its day-to-day operation the Metropolitan School Board is in the position through its Advisory Council of being able to marshall in an advisory capacity the senior school officials of the eleven school areas.

The members of the School Board have some reservations about adding any substantial portion of the program's cost to the present burden of local educational finance. The record of support for this work by the two senior levels of Government has been such, however, that it seems likely that an equitable financial arrangement could be worked out.

As your Department seeks to find the most effective method of providing programs under Schedules 4 and 5, in this area, I am instructed to offer the facilities of the Metropolitan School Board. It is recognized that action along these lines would probably require amendment to the Municipality of Metropolitan Toronto

Act. The School Board is willing to co-operate in any way toward the achievement of this end.

REPORT No. 8 OF FINANCE COMMITTEE

PART I

FRIDAY, MAY 24, 1963

To the Metropolitan School Board:

At a meeting of the above-named Committee held this day, the following members being present, viz., Messrs. Wells (Chairman), Brown, Lowes, Mills, Parker and Stainsby, it was decided to report and recommend as follows:

- 1. In favour of Report Report No. 1 of the Special Committee appointed to study recommendations of the Metropolitan Advisory Committee regarding training and re-training of unemployed workers.
- 2. On November 21, 1962, the Provincial Government established the Ontario Committee on Taxation to review the taxes and revenues available to the Province of Ontario and its local governments and to make such recommendations as it sees fit to the Prime Minister and the Executive Council. In general terms the Committee will be looking at the ways in which the provincial and local governments of Ontario raise the funds to finance the services which the public expects to be provided. Provision has been made for individuals and organizations to submit written briefs to the Committee not later than October 15, 1963.

The Finance Committee has appointed a sub-committee consisting of the Chairman of the Board, the Vice-Chairman of the Board and the Chairman of the Finance Committee to prepare a brief for submission to the Ontario Committee on Taxation following its approval by the Finance Committee and the School Board.

3. The Committee had before it for consideration a Report of the Secondary School Committee, dated April 24, concerning the expansion of grade 13 technology and business courses (similar to the first year Ryerson Institute courses) in the Metropolitan Area. For details of report see pages 158 to 160.

The Committee also had before it for consideration a recommendation of the Executive Secretary's Committee of the Advisory Council suggesting that the School Board continue to press for full financial support for the operation of the grade 13 tech-

nology and business courses and that failing assumption of a more reasonable proportion of the costs of the courses by the Provincial Government that the School Board recommend to area boards of education that serious consideration be given to withdrawing the courses.

As a result of review of the reports and of one year's experience in operating the classes the Committee feels it necessary to again make representations to the Department of Education for a review and revision of the present grant payable on behalf of pupils enrolled in the grade 13 technology and business courses in area board schools. Accordingly, the Committee recommends that the Department of Education be requested to pay a grant of \$650.00 per pupil on behalf of pupils enrolled in the grade 13 technology and business courses effective from January 1, 1964. Further, that a delegation from the Metropolitan School Board present the request to the Department at as early a date as possible and that the Department be requested to advise the School Board of its reaction to the request not later than December 1, 1963. (Amended)

In the event that the request of the School Board is not favourably received, the Committee recommends that the question of continuance of the classes be reviewed. (Amended)

4. The Committee had before it for consideration a communication from the Weston Board of Education dated May 17 enquiring as to whether or not the Metropolitan School Board will assume the costs of transportation of pupils to special vocational schools such as the Frank Oke School in York Township and the Kingsmill Vocational School in Etobicoke Township.

Because of the downtown location of the three special vocational schools in the City of Toronto (Eastdale, Heydon Park and Parkway Schools) they have been accessible to most students by public transportation. Indeed, it is preferable, particularly for students of these schools, that they use public transportation. Confidence in their ability to move about the City is an important part of the pupil's training. The new schools in North York (Yorkdale Vocational School) and Etobicoke (Kingsmill Vocational School) are not so readily served by public transportation. It may be, therefore, that some students will require some form of transportation to be provided for them. It is not a problem that can be so easily anticipated that firm rules can be made at this time.

Accordingly, the Committee recommends:

(a) that area boards of education be advised that, wherever possible, students at the special vocational schools should be expected to use public transportation.

- (b) that where deemed necessary area boards of education arrange special transportation for students and that the cost of same be assumed by the Metropolitan School Board. (Area boards are expected to use the same discretion in approving special transportation as if the cost were to be a local expense.)
- (c) that the foregoing policy be in effect for the ensuing year and that an analysis be made in March 1964 of transportation services provided during the preceding months with a view to adapting this policy to the problems that have developed during the year.
- 5. That the salary of the Executive Secretary be \$20,000.00 per annum, effective as of January 1, 1963.
- 6. That the next meeting of the Finance Committee be held on Friday, June 21st, at 12.00 noon.
- 7. Your Committee begs to report that the Chairmen's Committee met with the Metropolitan Executive Committee on Friday, May 24th to discuss matters of mutual concern. As a result of this meeting it was decided to appoint a joint sub-committee consisting of two members of the Executive Committee and two members of the Chairmen's Committee to prepare for consideration of the Executive and Chairmen's Committees a report regarding ways and means of relieving the financial problems of several area boards of education. Among the matters to be reviewed will be maintenance assistance payments, capital costs of school construction including debt and teachers' salaries. The Vice-Chairman of the School Board and the Chairman of the Finance Committee have been named to the joint sub-committee.

"The Committee further recommends that, in the event that the Department of Education sees fit to increase the per pupil grant to \$650.00 for grade 13 pupils enrolled in the technology and business courses in area board schools the difference between the per pupil grant and the cost of education, up to an amount of \$300.00 per pupil be assumed by the Metropolitan School Board for the year 1964."

By deleting the last paragraph and substituting the following therefor:

"In the event that the request of the School Board is not favourably received, the Metropolitan School Board recommend to area boards of education that the classes be discontinued."

Adopted by the School Board, as amended, May 28, 1963.

REPORT OF SECONDARY SCHOOL COMMITTEE

APRIL 24, 1963

To the Chairman and Members of the Finance Committee:

Re: Grade 13 Technology and Business Courses (Similar to First Year Ryerson Courses)

A year ago the Toronto Board of Education decided to establish Grade 13 courses in Technology and Business. These courses were so planned that the authorities in the Ryerson Institute of Technology agreed that students who satisfactorily completed the one year program could enter the second year of the course at Ryerson. The establishment of these courses therefore served the useful purpose of providing an opportunity for students denied admission to Ryerson because of lack of space to continue their education without the loss of a year. Moreover, the plan afforded a means of articulation between secondary school and Ryerson for some pupils who would profit from another year in familiar surroundings.

In connection with this course, it was ultimately established that these new classes were vocational courses within the meaning of the Metropolitan Act. The Metropolitan School Board was therefore obligated to make Maintenance Assistance Payments on behalf of students enrolled in the courses. It was clear from debate about the courses at the Metropolitan School Board that trustees were satisfied as to their worth but had reservations about boards undertaking the extra costs involved since boards providing such service (at London and Sault Ste. Marie as well as Toronto), were in effect offering courses parallel to courses for which the Province accepted full financial responsibility. The view was taken that the Province should contribute a significantly higher amount than the normal vocational school grant. It was estimated that the average cost per pupil would be \$950.00 per year, of which only \$200.00 would be recovered in grant from the Province. The balance of the cost would be shared equally between the Metropolitan School Board and the local School Board. The request for a higher Provincial contribution towards the operation of these courses was presented by a delegation to senior officials of the Department. The request was denied, but the Minister of Education, by letter January 10, 1963, said, "We shall continue to study the alternatives open to students as they proceed in this field and will keep in close touch with officials of the boards concerned."

The Metropolitan School Board received this letter and directed that the whole matter of the provision of these courses be reviewed annually, preferably during the month of April. The Secondary School Committee recently canvassed the area boards to ascertain the number of pupils who may wish to enroll in Technology and Business courses either at Ryerson or in courses provided by local boards. The results of this survey are as follows:

It should be pointed out that in addition to Technology and Business courses, the Ryerson Institute of Technology offers sundry other vocational training programs. There is no intention that these courses be duplicated. The survey was therefore restricted to students bound for training in Technology or Business.

In consultation with Mr. Kerr, Principal of Ryerson Institute, it has been established that about two hundred Metro students might be accommodated in these courses on campus. To accommodate

the balance in local Technology and Commercial schools would require about four hundred spaces. During the past year the Toronto Board of Education has operated five classes in Technology and two in Business. The capacity of these courses is about thirty per class or two hundred and ten in total.

It seems clear therefore that, if the need has to be met, additional classes will be required. Local boards following the example of Toronto have made plans to fill this need. North York School Board, for instance, proposes to offer one course in Technology and one in Business. The Etobicoke Board of Education has made plans for one course in Technology and, if there is need, might consider a course in Business. A Technology course has been planned for Cedarbrae Secondary School in Scarborough. York Township has indicated a willingness to offer a course in Technology.

Continuation of the present Toronto program together with the foregoing extensions in service would come close to meeting the Metropolitan need.

It is therefore recommended that the Metropolitan School Board continue to endorse these classes and that approval be given for their extension into the suburban districts.

Discussion of this problem has indicated the need for co-ordination of this service if the needs of students throughout the Metropolitan area are to be uniformly met. The exact role that the Metropolitan School Board might play in co-ordinating this program is yet to be defined. It is recommended that the Secondary School Committee continue its study of the problem with a view to ensuring adequate co-ordination of the program particularly in the matter of admission policies. There is evidence from the discussions with the Principal of Ryerson Institute that such action would be welcomed and the Institute would be prepared to co-operate toward this end.

At a meeting of the above-named Committee held this day, the following members being members being present, viz., Mrs. Grossberg (Chairman), Mrs. Barker, Messrs. Adamson, Brown, Coutts, Martin and Morrison, it was decided to report and recommend as follows:

1. The School Board, at its meeting held on May 28th referred to the School Accommodation Committee for further consideration the question of the attendance areas for students residing adjacent to Victoria Park Avenue in the Townships of North York and Scarborough, bounded on the north by Highway 401 and on the south by Eglinton Avenue East.

The Committee, at its meeting on June 18 received representations from the Victoria Village Community Association opposing the decision of the School Board of March 12. The Committee also received a communication from a North York ratepayer in the area affected concurring in the action previously taken by the School Board.

As a result of reconsideration of the matter the Committee could not see its way clear to alter its previous recommendation. Accordingly the Committee recommends that the School Board re-affirm its decision concerning the attendance areas for the Victoria Park Secondary School (North York) and the Wexford C.I. (Scarborough) adopted on March 12th. The resolution of the School Board reads as follows:

"(a) That pupils from the area of North York Township bounded by the C.P.R. mainline, the Don River, Eglinton Avenue East extension and Victoria Park Avenue be attached to the proposed Wexford secondary school in Scarborough for academic and commercial courses and to Victoria Park Secondary School (North York) for technical courses;

"(b) That Scarborough pupils residing in the area bounded by Ellesmere Road, Victoria Park and the C.P.R. tracks, remain in attendance at the Victoria Park Secondary School."

At a meeting of the above-named Committee held this day, the following members being present, viz., Messrs. Parker (Chairman); Boland, Brown, J. R. Davidson, Jones, Lowes, Stanbury and Young, it was decided to report and recommend as follows:

1. That the School Board concur in the following comments of area boards of education in connection with the subdivision plans noted below and that the Department of Municipal Affairs and the Metropolitan Toronto Planning Board be so advised:

North York Board of Education:

T-6892 5th Revision: 266 lots

Public School Accommodation—Because of increased density in the proposed subdivision the Board of Education will require a minimum of 6 acres for a public school site completely within the bounds of the proposed subdivision as it is estimated that the ultimate size of the school will be 2 kindergartens and 18 grade classrooms.

Block G, 5.004 acres, is geographically acceptable as part of the proposed Bayview-Steeles Public School site but the Board of Education will require an additional 1 acre to enlarge the site to 6.004 acres.

Public School pupils will temporarily attend Brian Drive Public School, eventually the proposed Bayview-Steeles Public School on Block G.

Junior high school accommodation—Junior high school students will eventually attend the proposed Leslie Junior High School.

The Committee has decided to hold a special meeting on Tuesday, June 25 at 6.00 p.m. to further consider the Report of the Advisory Council.

In its preliminary review of the Report of the Advisory Council the Committee noted that part of the suggested increase in formula was accounted for by a rise in the cost of construction. Since the Federal Government recently announced that certain building materials will be subject to an 11 per cent. sales tax, the Committee recommends that application be made to the Federal Government to exempt from sales tax materials used for school construction.

6. In the course of its general deliberations the Finance and School Buildings Committee of the Advisory Council has con-

sidered from time to time the design of portable classrooms. Since these are financed entirely by the Metropolitan School Board there is general agreement that new portables should be constructed to the same design. Accordingly, the engineering staff of the Scarborough Board of Education was requested to prepare a portable design for use by all area boards. This design has now been given careful study and is considered acceptable by members of the Committee.

It is recommended, therefore, that the principle of a uniform design for portable classrooms be approved and that in the construction of these buildings, area boards be requested to call for tenders on the basis of the uniform design.

REPORT OF ADVISORY COUNCIL

JUNE 4, 1963

To the Chairman and Members of the Buildings and Sites Committee:

In a report dated February 26, 1963, the Advisory Council placed before the School Board its recommendations with respect to the Ceiling Cost Formula for 1963. This report pointed out that past increases have been due to two factors: changes arising from alterations in the design of the typical school building and changes in the unit cost occasioned by fluctuation in construction costs.

The report observed that, as in previous years, studies of school design had been undertaken cooperatively by the various Committees of the Advisory Council. It noted that the recommended changes were substantial in nature and would involve increases in the formula from 8 per cent. in elementary schools to 13 per cent. in academic secondary schools.

It was also reported that there had been an increase of 4.6 per cent. in the Maclean's Building Index and that a corresponding increase in the Formula would be required to keep it abreast of rising costs.

A significant recommendation in the report, however, was related to the timing of changes in the Ceiling Cost Formula. It pointed out that changes in the Formula should be made in May or June of each year in order that these changes might be reflected in the planning activities of local Boards for the next ensuing year. It was proposed, accordingly that the 1963 Formula be increased by 4.6 per cent. but that the changes in design be part of a Formula revision to be undertaken in June of this year. Because the 1963 program was unusually large, the School Board did not act on this recommendation and decided that the 1963 Formula should be the same as in 1962. The Board, however, agreed that the review for 1964 should be completed by June and invited the Advisory Council to submit at that time its recommendations for 1964.

The Committees of the Advisory Council have met individually. In addition, one general meeting of the Council was called for the express purpose of discussing the Ceiling Cost Formula. At this meeting it was noted that the recommendations of the various Committees when applied to the Formula called for a substantial increase. The amount of this increase is set forth in the following table:

At a meeting of the above-named Committee held this day, the following members being present, viz., Mr. Wells (Chairman), Mesdames Grossberg and McBrien, Messrs. Brown, Lowes, Mills, Parker and Stainsby, it was decided to report and recommend as follows:

- 1. In favour of the financial sections of Report No. 5 of School Accommodation Committee, Part I and Report No. 8 of Buildings and Sites Committee, Part I.
- 2. That the Executive Secretary be authorized to arrange for the preparation of the 1963 composite Board picture by Ashley and Crippen Limited at a cost of \$270.00 plus \$10.00 for each new sitting.
- 3. That the Report of the Metropolitan Auditor on the audit of the books and accounts of the School Board for the year ending December 31, 1962, be received.
- 4. That the following be appointed as a Special Committee to transact necessary business during the summer adjournment of the School Board, viz., the Chairman of the Board, the Vice-Chairman of the Board, the Chairman of the Finance Committee, the Chairman of the School Accommodation Committee, the Chairman of the Buildings and Sites Committee, the Chairman of the Legislation and By-laws Committee and the Chairman of the Toronto Board of Education and that any three of the foregoing persons be a quorum. REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE RE EMPLOYEE PARKING JUNE 14, 1963

To the Chairman and Members of the Metropolitan School Board:

At a recent meeting of the School Board, a Special Committee was named to inquire into the feasibility of area boards of education making a charge for parking of cars by employees on school property. The Committee has attempted to assess the problem from several points of view.

In the first place, basic to any plan for making charges in connection with employee parking would be the legal powers of school boards to make such charges together with any tax implications of such a plan. The Committee requested the School Board's Solicitor to give his opinion on these two matters. A copy of the opinion is appended to this report.

In the second place, the Committee considers that it is administratively possible to impose a parking charge on Board employees. Any comprehensive plan would envisage parking arrangements being made on a fairly long-term basis, probably a year; certainly not less than one month. Lease arrangements by the employee could be achieved by a pay deduction at the source. The employee would then be issued a parking sticker which would be good for the period of lease. The plan would probably require that the custodial staff supervise the parking areas and periodic checks to ensure that only cars properly tagged were using the spaces. A few spaces would have to be provided at each location for casual visitors who are at the school on official business. This arrangement would not affect the regular daily use by employees.

Thirdly, it is generally conceded that the existing parking arrangements are part of the working conditions provided by School Boards for their employees. Imposition of a parking charge would represent a change in these conditions. In view of the general equality of salaries the Committee agrees that imposition of parking charges would have to be applied uniformly across the Metropolitan Area in order to avoid upsetting the existing salary relationships.

There may be some difficulty in arriving at an appropriate charge for uniform application throughout the Metropolitan Area. The case for a parking charge for employees is strongest in the downtown areas. Indeed, the commercial value of parking facilities decreases rapidly as one leaves the center of the City. To each teacher the privilege of having a place to park on the school property has the same value wherever in Metropolitan Toronto that teacher may teach. Moreover, teachers employed by any board

may be expected to accept an assignment anywhere in the school district under the board's jurisdiction.

It is interesting to note that the principle inherent in this analysis of the school parking problem has its parallel in private industry. The survey of parking charges made by the Committee indicates that while free parking for employees is not general in the downtown area, it appears to be the accepted practice with many large firms no more remote from the center of the City than Eglinton Avenue or Don Mills.

For these reasons, the Committee recognizes that there would be difficulties in the establishment of an appropriate charge uniformly throughout the Metropolitan Area. It is convinced, however, that such a charge could be determined and believes that from this point of view this plan is feasible.

Finally, from a survey of the opinion of area boards, it is clear that in the suburbs where this is not a serious problem the boards are disinclined to consider imposing a parking charge. Since the Metropolitan School Board appears to lack the legal authority to impose such a plan on all boards, it could be negotiated only if all were agreed. There seems little likelihood that agreement could be reached. Indeed, some boards have made it clear that they will oppose any attempt to implement a common plan for the area as a whole. Until there is some change in the present jurisdiction of area boards or until enabling legislation is secured, it does not appear feasible to secure by mutual agreement a plan for charging for parking on a Metropolitan wide basis.

In conclusion, the Committee affirms the feasibility of imposing a parking charge on both administrative and economic grounds. But in view of the Solicitor's opinion and the survey of the views of area boards, implementation of such a plan is not considered feasible at the present time.

Re: Charges for parking on school property

In accordance with your telephone request and letter of June 13, 1963, I have examined the law relating to the following motion:

"That the School Board's solicitor be requested to submit a legal opinion as to whether or not area boards of education may charge fees for parking on school properties and further that the solicitor report on the tax implications, if any, in the event that a school board institutes a fee for use of parking facilities on school sites."

It is my opinion that area boards of education do not have legal authority to charge fees for parking on school property. Parking areas are included with "other land required for school purposes" in the definition of a school site in the Schools Administration Act. The powers and rights of the boards are authorized directly or indirectly by the statutes creating them and extend to those that are necessary or incidental to the proper carrying out of their statutory duties. In this instance there is no express authority to charge fees for parking and I have not found any such power by implication.

In view of the answer to the first question, the second becomes hypothetical. However, if the question is restricted to charging for pupil or teacher parking where no profit is made it is probable that under the existing legislation the parking area will remain exempt from municipal taxation. On the other hand if a request should be made for legislation in connection with parking fees the matter of the exemption from taxation should be considered.

REPORT OF THE SPECIAL EDUCATION COMMITTEE

SEPTEMBER 10, 1963

To the Chairman and Members of the School Accommodation Committee:

Special Vocational School Facilities

In a report dated December 6, 1961, the Special Education Committee submitted an analysis of the probable number of spaces required in special vocational schools and, on the basis of this analysis, recommended in favour of the erection of schools in North York and Etobicoke to accommodate 400 and 300 pupils respectively. The implications of this report were three-fold. In the first place, the report recognized the availability of Federal-Provincial funds. This circumstance tipped the scale in favour of erecting segregated schools as opposed to making provision for these pupils in a multi-purpose secondary school. Secondly, the report indicated that by 1970 there might be 7,500 pupils in the Metropolitan Area who would profit from the program provided in a special vocational school. Finally, the Committee endorsed the principle of co-education in these schools, and two units in North York and Etobicoke have been established on this basis.

A review of this earlier report by the Secondary School Committee led to an increase in the accommodation of the proposed schools to 480 in the North York unit and to 400 in the Etobicoke school.

Following the adoption of this report, the sites of the new schools were selected and approved by the Metropolitan School Board. Plans were endorsed and the schools now are almost ready for operation. During the same period the Toronto Board of Education replaced its three existing special vocational schools and expanded their facilities. The York Township Board of Education was also encouraged to increase facilities at the Frank Oke School and the decision to make it a co-educational school was reached. In all, the Metropolitan Area has facilities for approximately 2,400 pupils.

In the previous report it was estimated that of the 7,500 pupils who might be eligible for such schools, only half would actually attend. This judgment was made on the basis of experience with

schools of this type located in downtown areas. There was at one time a reluctance on the part of parents and school authorities in the suburbs to require children with limited learning ability to face the added burden of a long trip to and from school each day. For many years it was necessary to convince parents of the advantages provided in the school before consent would be obtained.

The replacement of the Toronto schools and the relocation of the boys' school to Broadview and Danforth Avenues, and the erection of two fine new schools in Etobicoke and North York have had the effect of overcoming any resistance that parents might have had with respect to attendance at such schools. The development of the revised secondary school curricula with its concept of a multi-stream secondary school program has made the relationship of these schools to other forms of secondary education clear. The result is already evident in that there are long waiting lists at each of the existing schools. It now follows that, instead of half of the 7,500 pupils previously considered eligible, it may well be by 1970 that most of them will voluntarily choose a special vocational school.

In this context, the Committee has considered the request of the Scarborough Board of Education for approval of a school in the Eglinton Avenue and Midland Avenue area. The Committee has been furnished with Scarborough's analysis of its own probable needs. It is estimated that a special vocational school is required of from 500 to 700 pupil spaces for Scarborough pupils alone. Moreover, Scarborough officials have carefully analyzed the relationship of the Bendale Vocational School (with its emphasis upon two-year and three-year occupational training) to the proposed special vocational school. It is recognized that there will be some overlapping of purpose but that, based upon present needs, the special vocational school is required. It is also noted that this school will probably serve the easterly portions of East York and North York.

It is recommended, therefore, that the application of the Scarborough Board of Education for a special vocational school be approved and that this application be facilitated in every way in order that maximum advantage may be taken of the existing Federal-Provincial assistance with respect to the cost of the building. In general terms, the Committee agrees that the site selected by the Scarborough Board of Education now under expropriation is a desirable one and is suitably located in relation to other schools of this type.

The foregoing delegation waited upon the Minister of Education at his request for a discussion of the relationship of the Metropolitan School Board to the programs for the retraining of unemployed workers under Schedule No. 5.

The Minister of Education indicated that serious consideration was being given to the erection of a permanent school to provide for the retraining of both employed and unemployed workers. He reaffirmed the view of the Department that the operation of schools should continue to be a local function but that there should be a substantial subsidy from higher levels of government toward this particular type of work. He commented, however, that if local boards were to accept responsibility for the erection and management of such a school the local authority should share in the cost. Tentatively he envisaged a division of cost as follows:

Provincial Government 25% Federal Government 50% Local authority 25%

The Minister indicated quite clearly that the Department viewed this problem, insofar as Metropolitan Toronto was concerned, as one which affects the area as a whole. He indicated that the Department was pleased to receive the letter of the Metropolitan School Board indicating its willingness to assume some of the responsibility for this work. He agreed that some such plan as that outlined by the Chairman, D. W. Brown, should be developed. Mr. Brown's plan envisaged a Special Committee of the Metropolitan School Board including, after the manner of a local Advisory Vocational Committee, members representative of key organizations with interest in this special problem.

The question was discussed as to whether or not the Metropolitan School Board had the facilities to perform the detailed administrative tasks re this type of school. It was acknowledged that some adjustment would have to be made to meet problems of accounting, planning of the new school, and its operation and maintenance. It was suggested that these functions might be allocated to one of the local boards, presumably the board of the area where the school would be located. The Executive Secretary suggested that if the Metropolitan School Board was to be responsible for the school, it would be better for the Board to assume responsibility for its management as well.

The Minister of Education indicated that the Department's decision on the matter would be reached at an early date and that the School Board would be advised accordingly,

On Wednesday, June 26th, the foregoing delegation at the request of the School Board waited upon the Minister of Education for a general discussion of the financing of Ryerson type classes in Metropolitan Vocational Schools.

The delegation reaffirmed a view expressed a year previous by letter that the Province should increase its support for this work as long as it seems desirable for local boards to provide courses equivalent to the first year of Ryerson. Indeed the view was expressed that a good case could be made for the assumption by the Province of the entire cost.

The Minister expressed the gratitude of his Department for the action of Metropolitan Area Boards in providing these courses in a period of critical shortage of accommodation. He indicated that the Department would take under advisement the request for additional financial subsidy.

Other relevant information advanced during the discussion included the following:

- The Department of Education has not yet decided whether or not a second school of the Ryerson type should be built within Metropolitan Toronto. Some newspapers had reported the Minister as saying that a second school would be built.
- 2. With the completion of the present Ryerson expansion there will be space to accommodate in September 1963 up to an additional 500 students. Decision to operate the school below capacity was based mainly on the difficulties of securing satisfactory staff. Moreover, the admission in 1964 of the large number of second year students from the classes operating in Metropolitan Toronto would make it impossible to admit correspondingly large first year classes in subsequent years.

The Minister indicated that he would at an early date convey the views of his Department to the School Board with respect to the operation of Ryerson type courses in the secondary schools.

Research in the Metropolitan Area

The following resolution adopted in February, 1963, by the Scarborough Board of Education was referred to the Executive Secretary's Committee for comment:

"Resolved that a communication be forwarded to the Metropolitan School Board requesting that a Committee of the Board or the Board itself study the matter of making Education Research a Metro responsibility."

The following report is respectfully submitted.

Educational research in Canada had its origin at the provincial level. In Ontario the first research was done by the Department of Educational Research of the Ontario College of Education. Since its establishment it has devoted a portion of its research potential to projects initiated by the Department of Education. It enjoys the added advantage of being a Department of the University, working closely with the graduate school in education. In other provinces educational research is mainly a function of faculties of education or departments of psychology in the universities.

In the last ten years a number of national organizations, such as the Canadian Education Association and the Canadian Teachers

Federation, have established research divisions. In 1961 plans were laid for a federation of existing agencies under the Canadian Council for Research in Education. Similarly there has been a trend toward the establishment of Provincial associations in which existing research organizations join to share their experiences and work. It is evident, therefore, that this type of development is well advanced and that research facilities at the provincial and national levels will be able to serve those needs which can best be met on this broad base.

The following paragraph from the monograph "Research in Education" prepared for the Canadian Conference (1962) describes another phase in the evolution of research facilities:

"A most interesting and promising development in research organization in Canada has been the development of research divisions and research officers by local school boards. This is an ideal situation in that it permits local research into local problems, and makes probable the communication of findings to the ultimate consumers, the teachers. Local boards assume the entire burden of staffing, research and publication where publication occurs. Plans in two cities, Toronto and Vancouver, call for research bureaux which will compare in size and budget with any in the United States. Cities from coast to coast are working toward local research committees or research divisions to meet local research needs."

In the Metropolitan Area consideration was given in 1956 to cooperative action at the Metropolitan level in the establishment of a research service to serve the area as a whole. At that time the research department proposed by the Toronto Board of Education was in an early stage of planning and it was deemed inadvisable to direct attention at that stage to the consideration of a Metropolitan scheme. At this early date the other Area Boards of Education had not sensed the same need for local research activities. Accordingly the plan for cooperative action was not endorsed.

Since that time, however, other boards have undertaken educational research at the local level. Interest has grown to the point that an association, the Metropolitan Toronto Educational Research Council, has been formed to provide a contact point for local research personnel. All boards have been asked to share in the cost of this project. The Council enjoys the support of the Ontario Department of Educational Research. Not only is the Department a member of the Council but its Director, Dr. R. W. B. Jackson, is the temporary Chairman and his staff is prepared to give active support to the work of the Council. It is proposed that application be made for a charter which would render the Council eligible to receive grants from member boards.

The Executive Secretary's Committee is unanimous in its view that an expansion of the fact finding facilities of the Metropolitan School Board is desirable at this time. The School Board staff, in a limited way, have over the years, compiled substantial data. The appointment of the Royal Commission to study the Metropolitan system of government gives emphasis to the need for an expanded program of statistical research. Personnel should be acquired who can apply more sophisticated methods to this work and who can assist the Board in a more scientific interpretation of the data required.

The Executive Secretary's Committee believes that this venture should be undertaken in cooperation with the Metropolitan Toronto Educational Research Council. Although the bulk of the research to be undertaken on behalf of the Metropolitan School Board will be statistical in nature, the experience of the past ten years has indicated that it is virtually impossible to disassociate the administrative and academic functions. Indeed, it is generally conceded that the decisions of the Metropolitan School Board should be related to the educational practices and philosophical goals of the local boards. A research section established by the Metropolitan School Board could do its best work in association with the research officers now serving certain area boards. Moreover the contact which an association affords with the Ontario Department of Educational Research would be a very important link for the School Board.

It is recommended that a Director of Statistical Research be appointed by the Metropolitan School Board and that his salary and status be equivalent to that of local research officials. It is suggested that his first responsibility would be to assess the immediate research needs of the Metropolitan School Board and to submit a plan for this work, such plan to include the staff required. In the development of this Section, it is believed that the Advisory Council, particularly the Executive Secretary's Committee, could be in a position to give continuing advice.

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REPORT OF THE SPECIAL EDUCATION COMMITTEE PART II

SEPTEMBER 11, 1963.

To the Chairman and Members of the Metropolitan School Board:

The Special Education Committee has had for study and comment (a) the application of the Etobicoke Board of Education for

establishment under the Metropolitan School Board special educational subsidy of a second educational rehabilitation class; and (b) the application of the Toronto Board of Education for the establishment of a similar class. The applications are as follows:

Etobicoke Board of Education:

Grand Avenue Public School —Rehabilitation class
Number of pupils —10
I.Q. Range —91 to 108
Age Range —6 to 8
Department of Education Approval —(pending)

Toronto Board of Education:

Oriole Park Public School —Rehabilitation class
Number of pupils —6
I.Q. Range —72 to 93
Age Range —7 to 10 years
Department of Education Approval —(pending)

In previous reports this Committee has noted that the special educational programs suited to pupils eligible for these classes are still in an early stage of development. The problem of children with behaviour difficulties based upon emotional factors is a continuing one in all school jurisdictions. The Committee, some months ago, received a verbal report from each of the school areas in Metropolitan Toronto as to the ways in which this problem is being met. In the main, the techniques were such as could be undertaken by regular staff in the normal school situation. Some more formal and specific arrangements were noted. Among them was the special class approach provided for subsidy in Etobicoke for the past two years.

It is note-worthy that the Etobicoke Board of Education on the basis of two successful years of operation with the first class has now decided to expand its program. This would seem to indicate that this particular approach may have reached the second stage and may be moving out of the purely experimental basis of the first special class.

In connection with the Toronto application, it is noted that the proposal is advanced to establish a class with one teacher rather than two. The Committee considers this variety of approach highly desirable and wishes to emphasize that the classes now under consideration will only serve a small part of the total need.

Recognition should be made of other efforts and other approaches to the problem. In North York, for instance, children with similar difficulties are now accommodated in classes whose composition and enrolment has been deliberately fashioned to produce the

best possible climate for the rehabilitation of three or four children with serious behaviour problems. It may be that a system of subsidy should be worked out in connection with this approach to the problem.

In addition, there are voluntary organizations established to serve the needs of children with behaviour problems which it is presumed are emotionally based. Already close links have been forged between educational authorities and their voluntary agencies. A seminar is planned in the near future in which it is expected that there will be a comprehensive study of these existing services.

The Committee therefore endorses subject to the approval of the Department of Education, the proposals of the Etobicoke and Toronto Boards of Education respectively as part of the early development of a school program with the specific needs of this special group of children in mind. It recommends approval on the same understanding that the initial class was approved, namely, that as circumstances warrant the Board be apprised of the results achieved in this important area.

REPORT OF SUMMER COMMITTEE

To the Metropolitan School Board:

On June 25 the School Board adopted the following resolution:

"That the following be appointed as a Special Committee to transact necessary business during the summer adjournment of the School Board, viz., the Chairman of the Board, the Vice-Chairman of the Board, the Chairman of the Finance Committee, the Chairman of the School Accommodation Committee, the Chairman of the Buildings and Sites Committee, the Chairman of the Legislation and By-laws Committee, the Chairman of the Toronto Board of Education and any other member of the School Board who may be able to attend and that any three of the foregoing persons be a quorum."

The Summer Committee met on July 11, July 25 and August 15, and begs to report as follows:

1. That it concurred in the following comments of area boards of education in connection with the subdivision plans noted below and directed that the Department of Municipal Affairs and the Metropolitan Toronto Planning Board be so advised:

North York Board of Education:

Public school accommodation—The North York Board of Education will require a public school site of approximately 6 acres within the boundaries of the proposed subdivision. Block F. 6.0 acres is geographically acceptable as a public school site. Public school pupils will temporarily attend Drewry Avenue Public School, eventually the proposed Drewry West Public School to be erected on Block F.

12. The Honourable Minister of Education in a communication dated August 9th advised that a conference on school design and construction sponsored by the Department of Education will be held on September 4 and 5 at the Royal York Hotel. The conference will bring together educators, architects, contractors, school trustees, municipal authorities, town planners, and others interested in the matter of school design and relevant topics. The Minister invited the School Board to select three members or officials to participate in the conference.

The Summer Committee directed the Chairman and Vice-Chairman to select the delegates to attend the conference.

13. The Summer Committee was advised that the Executive Committee of Metropolitan Council deferred until early September consideration of the proposed ceiling cost formula for school construction for the year 1964.

The Summer Committee directed that a delegation consisting of the Chairman and Vice-Chairman of the Board, the Chairman of the Finance Committee and the Chairman of the Buildings and Sites Committee attend the meeting at which the ceiling cost formula is under discussion and further that arrangements be made for a meeting with the Executive Committee which will not conflict with the conference on school design to be held on September 4 and 5.

To the Chairman and Members of the Buildings and Sites Committee

In consideration of the 1963 capital program, the Metropolitan School Board was strongly urged to provide for the Scarborough Board of Education two schools required for September 1965. The decision on the part of Scarborough to advance planning a full two years for secondary schools resulted from its inability to have ready for September opening, schools for which the planning had to be done in a shorter period.

When the budget was under consideration other Boards did not seem to share this concern, although there was evidence that schools had been included under a program with opening scheduled a year earlier than was really expected. It now appears that the problem about which Scarborough was so concerned is a general one.

As the members of the Committee will recall, the solution to the Scarborough situation was achieved by approving one of two schools in this category and by arranging with the Ontario

Municipal Board an approval in principle of a second to permit the planning and engineering work to proceed.

This plan makes clear that it is not necessary to advance planning a full year. Indeed the Scarborough Board acknowledged during the discussion that, when the sod is turned immediately after the frost is out of the ground, one can be reasonably confident that the school will be finished by a year from the following September or in about eighteen months.

An understanding of the present routine is a prerequisite for the consideration of what is now proposed. The tentative capital program of each local board is received in mid-fall. The staff combine these submissions into a composite proposal which is forwarded to the Metropolitan School Board in late November or early December. Negotiation is more or less suspended then until the New Year. In an election year, this means that serious review of the program must be postponed until late January. When the negotiations are as protracted as they were, in 1963, final approval of the capital program may not be achieved until late March. Review of individual projects is then commenced but the approval routine, even when there are no delays, requires so much time that no building can actually be commenced until early June or later. It is this delay which is at the root of the problem.

Although there are some hazards in attempting to advance the planning of the capital program to an earlier date, it is now generally recognized that such an attempt should be made. Essentially we would hope to achieve this goal by eliminating the presentation of a tentative program. It is therefore proposed that area boards be apprised during the month of June of the new routine and that each be invited to examine and prepare its program for submission in final form to the Metropolitan School Board not later than November 15th. Within the program, each board would be requested to indicate what portion of the local request required sod-turning at the earliest possible date. The proposal envisages the negotiations continuing through the balance of the year with final approval of the capital program by the School Board being at the last regular meeting of the Board. This would permit presentation of our final capital program to the Metropolitan Council at its first business meeting in 'mid-January. In form it would differ from the previous programs in that selected projects would be grouped and designated as urgent with the request that Municipal Board approval for these projects be secured as quickly as possible. It would be hoped in this way to secure final Ontario Municipal Board approval not later than April 1st. Indeed, it might be possible to advance the approval to some time during March. Such a plan would come close to meeting the eighteen month deadline which local officials now feel is required if a school is to be ready for opening at the desired time.

Two factors make this year a good year to experiment with the new procedure. In the first place, it is anticipated that the 1964 ceiling cost formula will be approved in June. Secondly, since 1964 is the second year of a two-year term, it would seem likely that the Metropolitan Council would be more ready to advance consideration of the capital program to an earlier date. The plan has the advantage, moreover, that it can work in an election year if the Metropolitan Council is sympathetic since Council action is not in fact required until the first meeting in January.

REPORT No. 10 OF FINANCE COMMITTEE

PART I

AUGUST 15, 1963

To the Metropolitan School Board:

At a special meeting on Thursday, August 15th, the following members being present, viz. T. L. Wells (Chairman), Mrs. I. McBrien, Messrs. Brown, Mills and Stainsby, a communication was received from the Chairman's Committee to the effect that the School Board's Executive Secretary, Mr. W. J. McCordic, has been offered a Fellowship tenable at the Institute of Education, University of London, England, for a period of approximately ten months beginning October 1st, 1964.

This Fellowship is offered by the Imperial Relations Trust. The following extract from a letter written by the Director of the London Institute indicates briefly the purpose and nature of the Fellowship:

We are looking for a scholar of senior standing who would be able to contribute something while with us to our studies of Education in Canada, either by way of occasional lectures, or by looking at our relevant library shelves, or just by discussion in the Common Room. We should hope at the same time to give him an opportunity of prosecuting any research or studies related to English Education in which he might be interested.

It seems to me that the offer of this Fellowship presents an unusual opportunity for a person of senior standing in the Universities or public school systems to participate in educational activities at the University of London and at the same time to enrich greatly his own professional interests.

From a list of applicants, who were described by the Secretary of the Canadian Education Association as "all Canadian educators of the first magnitude", a Canadian Selection Committee submitted three names. The final choice was made by the Institute of Education in London. The Committee considers that in winning this award the Executive Secretary has brought honour not only to himself but to the Board as well.

In apprising this Committee about the Fellowship, the Chairman's Committee indicated that it endorsed the plan most heartily. The Finance Committee agrees that significant advantage will accrue to the Metropolitan Area as a result of Mr. McCordic's study abroad. In particular, he will have an opportunity to study at first-hand the efforts being made in greater London to alter the existing scheme of public education in that great city. There is evidence in the Report of the Royal Commission on Local Government in Greater London and in associated writings that the problems of London and Toronto have many similarities.

The Finance Committee believes that the circumstances are such as to warrant the granting of leave of absence over a period that would permit the Executive Secretary to take maximum advantage of this opportunity.

Accordingly, it is recommended that the Executive Secretary be granted leave of absence for a period of up to one year commencing September 1, 1964 and that, during the period of his absence, he be paid 60 per cent. of his regular salary.

In accepting this Fellowship, it is understood that the Executive Secretary undertakes on his return to give at least three years' service in his present or in a similar educational post in the Metropolitan area.

REPORT No. 11 OF FINANCE COMMITTEE

To the Metropolitan School Board:

At a meeting of the above-named Committee held this day, the following members being present, viz., Mrs. McBrien, Messrs. E. M. Davidson, Lowes, Parker and Stainsby, it was decided to report and recommend as follows:

- 1. In favour of the financial sections of Report of the Summer Committee, Part I, dated August 15, 1963.
- 2. The Committee had before it for consideration correspondence from the Metropolitan Auditor, the School Board's Solicitor and the Deputy Minister of Education, concerning the operation of Grade 9 and 10 commercial classes in a number of senior public schools in the City of Toronto. The correspondence from the Deputy Minister of Education indicated that the Department of Education is of the opinion that the classes are improperly classified as secondary school classes for attendance and legislative grant purposes and therefore the grants for the year 1963 and thereafter will be calculated on the basis of elementary school classes. In the light of this decision, the Metropolitan Auditor expressed the opinion that an inequitable situation would arise if the classes were maintained as secondary classes and the costs of operation charged against the secondary school account of the Toronto Board, when the grants are being calculated on the basis of elementary school classes.

On January 26, 1954, the School Board adopted the following resolution:

"That the academic secondary school maintenance assistance payment of \$250.00 per pupil be paid to local school boards within the Metropolitan area on behalf of Grade 9 and 10 students who may be enrolled in other than exclusively secondary school accommodation provided:

- (1) that the curricula and programme for such students is satisfactory to the Department of Education, and
- (2) that the full charges for operating such class or classes be a charge against the secondary school account of the local board."

The Committee was advised that the Director of Education, Toronto Board of Education, is prepared to verify that the courses taken in the commercial classes are at the secondary school level. Assurance has also been given the Committee that the cost of operation of the classes will continue to be a charge against the secondary school account. The Committee notes that children of separate school supporters have been admitted to the classes in the past without payment of fees and this arrangement will be continued in the future.

In view of the foregoing it is recommended that the maintenance assistance payments for pupils enrolled in the Grade 9 and 10 commercial classes in senior public schools in the City of Toronto be continued at the commercial secondary school rate.

- 3. That in accordance with section 142 of the Metropolitan Act approval be given to the Scarborough Board of Education to sell a small portion of the Cedarbrae Secondary School site to the Township of Scarborough for the sum of \$1.00 to eliminate a jog in the roadway at the north-east corner of the school site.
- 4. Your Committee has been advised that the Royal Commission on Metropolitan Toronto under the Chairmanship of H. Carl Goldenberg, has invited interested parties to submit briefs not later than January 31, 1964, to the Commission regarding the structure and organization of Metropolitan Toronto, and that all parties desirous of making submissions are to notify the Commission of their intention so to do not later than September 30th.

The Committee recommends that a submission be made to the Royal Commission on Metropolitan Toronto and further that the Chairman of the Board appoint a special committee to undertake the preparation of a brief. It is understood that any brief submitted will of course be reviewed by the School Board prior to its submission to the Commission. (Amended)

- 5. Your Committee received for information a copy of the annual report prepared by the staff indicating the financial implications for each area municipality as a result of the Metropolitan arrangement for schools.
- 6. That Disbursement List No. 112 dated September 2, 1963, containing Part I accounts totalling \$2,935,713.76 be approved. Appendix page 222.

The Committee was advised that approval of all five of the foregoing applications would result in the Etobicoke Board exceeding its 1963 capital allocation by a sum of \$12,138.00. The Executive Secretary reported to the Committee that the Forest Hill Board of Education will not require all of the capital funds included in the 1963 estimates and that approximately \$26,000.00 would be available for transfer to the Etobicoke Board.

REPORT No. 11 OF FINANCE COMMITTEE

PART II

SEPTEMBER 6, 1963

- 1. In favour of the financial sections of Report of the Summer Committee, Part II, dated August 15th.
- 2. Your Committee had before it for consideration a communication from Project Planning Associates Limited indicating that it has been engaged by the Metropolitan Separate School Board to survey future school needs in Metropolitan Toronto. To assist in the survey Project Planning Associates requested information as to the number of Roman Catholic pupils enrolled in public schools by area municipalities as of September 1962.

The Committee recommends that the Executive Secretary be authorized to provide the information requested by Project Planning Associates Limited.

3. In 1958 the Metropolitan School Board's Director of Assessment Revision, Mr. T. P. Topping, appealed the assessment, as separate school supporters of L. J. McGuinness and Company Limited and Mimico Warehousing Company Limited to the Court of Revision in respect of four properties in Etobicoke and Mimico. The Court of Revision, following a judgment of the Court of Appeal to the effect that questions of school support could only be decided by a superior Court, held that it had no jurisdiction and dismissed the appeals. The County Judge and The Ontario Municipal Board did likewise. An appeal on behalf of Mr. Topping was then taken to the Court of Appeal and that Court, reversing its previous judgment, held that the Court of Revision and other tribunals mentioned did have jurisdiction. The Court of Appeal accordingly remitted the matter to the Municipal Board for further consideration.

While the matter was pending before the Municipal Board the Court of Appeal gave judgment in another case (Timmins Public School Board vs Hollinger Consolidated Gold Mines) in which it held that under the Assessment Act in its then form,

- (a) only persons claiming with respect to themselves to have been wrongly placed upon or omitted from the assessment roll as public or separate school supporters or ratepayers residing in the municipality could appeal school support, and
- (b) as a result of (a), a school board assessed only for property exempt from taxation had no right to appeal.

The Solicitor noted that as Mr. Topping was not a ratepayer in Etobicoke or the Lakeshore Municipalities he himself clearly had

no right of appeal under the decision in the Timmins case. Neither had the Metropolitan School Board. The Etobicoke and Lakeshore Boards which did pay some taxes (though not in Mimico) probably could have appealed, not as Boards but as ratepayers. Accordingly, Mr. Topping's only possible standing as a proper appellant would have been as agent for these "ratepayer" Boards and on this basis it was argued that the appeals were properly before the Municipal Board.

By a decision dated August 26, 1963, the Municipal Board, however, came to the conclusion that where the right of appeal is given to a ratepayer it cannot be exercised by an agent acting for that ratepayer. The Municipal Board accordingly held that Mr. Topping's appeals must fall.

It should be noted that after the decision of the Court of Appeal in the Timmins case The Assessment Act was amended to give school boards a specific right to appeal school support and that this right, by a concurrent amendment to The Municipality of Metropolitan Toronto Act, has been given to the Metropolitan School Board and any agent thereof.

The Deputy Metropolitan Solicitor expressed his opinion that the chances of success on an appeal from the decision of the Municipal Board of August 26, 1963, are negligible and accordingly he recommended that no further appeals be taken.

In view of the opinion of the Deputy Metropolitan Solicitor, your Committee recommends that no further appeal be made.

The Metropolitan Auditor in his communication noted that maintenance assistance payments were paid on behalf of children being educated at the Toronto Psychiatric Hospital, the Hospital for Sick Children, Bloorview Hospital and the Loyal True Blue and Orange Home but as yet no authority has been given to make maintenance assistance payments on behalf of these children. The Committee notes that authority has been sought by means of an amendment to the Metropolitan Act to make maintenance assistance payments on behalf of pupils at the institutions noted. Recent correspondence from the Department of Education indicates that the Department is prepared to recommend enactment of the necessary amendment at the next session of the Legislative Assembly. REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE APPOINTED TO CONSIDER AND REPORT ON (a) THE SALARY RANGE AND DUTIES OF THE DIRECTOR OF STATISTICAL RESEARCH (b) ON STAFF ARRANGEMENTS DURING THE ABSENCE OF THE EXECUTIVE SECRETARY.

OCTOBER 8, 1963

To the Metropolitan School Board:

At its regular meeting, Tuesday October 8th, the Metropolitan School Board adopted a recommendation of the Finance Committee that a Director of Statistical Research be appointed by the Metropolitan School Board and that his salary and status be equivalent to that of local research officers.

In accordance with the further instructions of the School Board a special committee met, the following members being present, viz., Mr. Brown (Chairman); Messrs. Davidson, Parker, Stanbury and Wells, and decided to report and recommend as follows:

- 1. It is recommended that the Director of Statistical Research be appointed, effective January 1st, 1964: that his salary be fixed in the range of \$10,000.00 to \$14,500.00, starting salary to be commensurate with qualifications and experience and that the duties of such officer shall be as follows:
 - (a) To review and collate the existing statistical records of the Metropolitan School Board, having regard to the organization of this material in such manner as to enhance the usefulness of this data to the School Board.
 - (b) To undertake such specific tasks of statistical research as the School Board may direct from time to time.
 - (c) In association with the Executive Secretary to recommend to the School Board additional research studies pertaining to those matters within the purview of the School Board.
 - (d) To undertake a comprehensive study of the existing facilities for recording basic administrative data such as enrolment, attendance, per pupil costs, construction costs, etc., with a view to proposing techniques and methods by which these activities might be made more efficient and more generally useful.
 - (e) To establish whatever contacts may be necessary with other research officers to keep the School Board informed regarding the nature and results of other research activities throughout the Metropolitan area.
 - (f) To undertake such other administrative responsibilities in connection with the on-going work of the School Board as may from time to time be prescribed.

(g) To make recommendations with respect to staff required to assist him in this programme.

It is further recommended that the Executive Secretary be directed to advertise this position in the daily press and by such other means as may be deemed expedient to make this appointment known to other personnel now engaged in education in the Metropolitan area.

With respect to the forthcoming leave of absence of the Executive Secretary, it is recommended that the Assistant Secretary of Finance, Mr. R. I. Thorman, be appointed acting Executive Secretary during the Executive Secretary's absence and that the School Board be directed in connection with its regular budget activities for 1964 to fix and make provision for a suitable honorarium in addition to his regular salary, to compensate him for the assumption of this added responsibility.

Dear Sirs: Re: Ajax Public School Board and the Town of Ajax

At the meeting of the Legislation and By-laws Committee of your board on Tuesday, October 8, 1963, the Committee requested the Solicitor to give a summary of the effect of the decision of Mr. Justice Grant in the Ajax Public School case on the operations of the boards of education in the metropolitan area. It is my opinion that this case does not affect the boards of education in the metropolitan area because of specific provisions in the Metropolitan Act.

The facts of the Ajax case were exceptional; in particular it is noted that an application to finance the improvement by the issue of debentures had been rejected by the electors and to include the cost of the proposed improvement in the current levy for one year would have resulted in a 5 mill increase in the tax rate.

His Lordship, while remarking in one instance that the Council could oversee the actions of the school board, went on to quote precedents contrary to his remark. In addition, he confirmed the principle in the cases quoted by stating on Page 25 of his Reasons for Judgment "the Council can not oversee the act of the board, save only to examine to see that the acts are *intra vires*".

He concluded that the words of Section 69 of the Public Schools Act "such sums as may be required by the board for school purposes" do not give the board the right to demand sums to pay for permanent improvements "of the character sought herein".

It is not clear from his Judgment whether he is saying that no amounts may be included in the current budget for permanent improvements or whether he means that there is a limit to the amount that may be included. In either event the decision does not affect the present operations of boards of education in the metropolitan area as specific authority is given to the boards in Section 140 of the Metropolitan Act to include additional sums to be obtained from current revenue for permanent improvements.

Had the project *not* been eligible for the special vocational grant the ceiling formula would have been (790 pupils spaces x \$1690.00) \$1,284,400.00. The School Board, as a result of review of data in support of a future addition approved an advance against said future addition of \$162,240.00. It would have been possible therefore to approve a debenture ceiling for the project in the amount of \$1,446,640.00 i.e., \$1,284,400.00 plus \$162,240.00. In this event the Etobicoke Board would have been required to pay from current funds an amount of \$244.00. However, because of the part approval of the project under the provisions of the Federal-Provincial Special Vocational Grant Scheme and the resultant calculation of

a ceiling cost formula for that part of the building not approved for special grant the Etobicoke Board has been required to spend an amount of \$69,961.00.

The Committee at its meeting had before it for consideration a communication from the Etobicoke Board of Education requesting that the School Board review the financing plan for the Scarlett Heights Secondary School and consider approving for debenture funds the difference between the amount of the Federal-Provincial Grant and the ceiling formula for the unapproved areas and the ceiling formula which would have been applicable to this project had no part been eligible for special vocational grant. The amount involved is \$69,447.00.

During discussion of the Etobicoke Board's request it was noted that the financing arrangements for Scarlett Heights school were completed in 1962 and that to alter this arrangement would pose difficulties both with the Metropolitan Council and the Ontario Municipal Board. The Committee agreed that the Etobicoke Board is entitled to the additional funds requested and recommends therefore that the advance against the future addition as carried forward in the School Board's building records be reduced by an amount of \$69,447.00. (The School Board's building record cards will now show an advance of \$92,793.00 and such amount will be deducted from the ceiling formula for the future addition to the school. The plan will obviate any difficulties which might arise by reason of attempting to secure a revised approval of the Metropolitan Council and the Municipal Board).

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REPORT OF CHAIRMEN'S COMMITTEE

NOVEMBER 15, 1963

To the Chairman and Members of the Finance Committee:

The attached report of a special committee representing the Executive Committee of the Metropolitan Council and the Chairmen's Committee of the School Board was considered at a joint meeting of the foregoing committees on Friday, November 15.

The report which was approved in principle by the members of Executive and the Chairmen's Committees makes two specific recommendations which are of sufficient urgency to warrant consideration even in advance of the Report of the Royal Commission on Metropolitan Toronto.

The recommendations are as follows:

I. Capital Financing

It is recommended that the Metropolitan School Board go on record as favouring (a) assumption by the School Board of all existing local school debt and that the Metropolitan Council through the Executive Committee be requested to approve such plan and (b) that, effective January 1, 1964, the Metropolitan School Board assume all school debt up to an amount calculated in each case on the basis of a ceiling cost formula prepared by the School Board and concurred in by the Metropolitan Council and, further that joint application be made to the Province of Ontario for the required enabling legislation to give effect to (a) above.

II. Teachers' Salaries

It is recommended that the Metropolitan School Board again submit its request for legislation relating to the establishment of uniform teacher salaries and that the Metropolitan Council lend its support to this submission.

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REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE TO CONSIDER THE MATTER OF SCHOOL FINANCE

OCTOBER 9. 1963

To the Chairman and Members of the Executive Committee, the Chairmen's Committee of the Metropolitan School Board:

On May 24th at 10:00 a.m. the Executive Committee of the Metropolitan Council and the Chairmen's Committee of the Metro-

politan School Board met at the School Board offices, 155 College Street, for a general discussion of the problems of school finance. The meeting culminated with the appointment of a Special Committee consisting of Reeve A. M. Campbell and Controller A. A. Lamport, representing the Executive Committee and Trustees E. M. Davidson and T. H. Wells representing the Chairmen's Committee. This Special Committee was charged with the responsibility of undertaking an intensive study of the problem of School Finance and to prepare for further consideration a brief for presentation to the Government of the Province of Ontario. The Special Committee met twice, on June 21st and October 9th, and has carefully considered statistical data prepared by the School Board staff bearing upon this problem. On the basis of this study, the Special Committee respectfully submits the following observations and recommendations.

Since consideration was first given to making a submission to the Provincial Government, a Royal Commission has been established to enquire into the Government and Municipal administration of the Municipality of Metropolitan Toronto. Your Committee is confident that the financial inequities which are known to exist in the matter of the financing of public education in the eleven school areas of Metropolitan Toronto will be given thorough study. The Committee considers, therefore, that any submission at this time should be confined in scope to those matters which are of such significant urgency that they require consideration and solution before the Commission can be expected to report. Of the various matters within this category, the Committee recommends that specific requests be made in connection with two matters.

1. Capital Financing

Under the terms of the Metropolitan Toronto Act, debt arising from the erection of new schools and the acquisition of lands for school sites is apportioned between the Metropolitan School Board and the area boards. The Metropolitan School Board is required to assume that portion of school debt which is recognized by the Province of Ontario for legislative grant purposes. This includes:

(a) Buildings—

Elementary Schools, \$20,000.00 per classroom; Secondary Schools, \$25,000.00 per classroom.

(b) Schools Sites-

The local assessed value of the lands involved adjusted by a Provincial equalizing factor.

Over the past ten years the cost of school buildings has risen sharply and the ceiling cost formula by which the debenturable portion of school cost is determined has been adjusted upwards on several occasions. Only one adjustment has been made in the

Province's policy with respect to recognition for grant purposes, namely, secondary school approvals were raised from \$20,000.00 per classroom to \$25,000.00 per classroom. The effect of rising costs in relation to a relatively static grant formula has resulted in an increasing portion of the school building cost being borne by the local area school boards.

This trend has very special significance in the case of the Townships of Scarborough and North York. When the 1963 capital program was under consideration by the Ontario Municipal Board, the Chairman indicated that in his view the net debt of the Township of Scarborough including its share of Metropolitan commitments had reached a level which should not be prudently exceeded. He indicated that he might have to give, in 1964, serious consideration to withholding approval of projects which would have the effect of increasing Scarborough's net debt beyond this safe limit. The net debt position of North York is comparable but at the moment has not reached the same critical stage.

The Metropolitan Toronto Act already provides as follows:

Section 145 (5) Page 70

Every order of the Municipal Board granting approval of an application under subsection 2 or requiring the issuing of debentures under subsection 4 shall direct,

- (a) that the amount of the debt to be created for the portion of the proposed expenditure approved by the Minister for legislative grant purposes, if any, shall be repaid by levies against all the area municipalities;
- (b) that in addition to such amount, if any, there shall be repaid by levies against all the area municipalities such amount of the debt to be created as may be determined by the School Board from time to time in accordance with a formula prepared by the School Board and approved by the Metropolitan Council for uniform application in the Metropolitan Area; and
- (c) that the balance of such debt, if any, shall be repaid by levies only against the area municipality or area municipalities in which the applicant board of education has jurisdiction. R.S.O. 1960, c. 260, s. 145.

Your Committee believes that the problems anticipated by the Chairman of the Ontario Municipal Board could be avoided for at least the next few years if the School Board with the consent of the Metropolitan Council were to take advantage of this legislation and provided that the School Board assume all debt incurred up to the existing ceiling cost formula.

The Metropolitan School Board staff analysed for the Committee the probable effect of such action on the individual school rates had it been taken in 1963. This is shown in the following table;

- 1. The above schedule attempts to show the effect of payment by the Metropolitan School Board of the cost of all school buildings in accordance with the ceiling cost formula, and site purchases. This would be in addition to the maintenance assistance payments which are presently made.
- 2. Under this plan local boards could finance any additional building requirements over and above the ceiling cost formula from their local mill rate.
- The effect in mills of the plan has been calculated upon 1962 data and then expressed in terms of the 1963 residential mill rate.

Brackets denote red figures.

The Committee noted that the action proposed did not have as significant an effect upon the school rates as one might have expected. The three municipalities whose credit rating, by virtue of the volume of school construction required, will come first under review, would be the beneficiaries of the scheme. The cost to the other municipalities is not great.

It is recommended that the Metropolitan School Board go on record as favouring (a) assumption by the School Board of all

existing local school debt and that the Metropolitan Council through the Executive Committee be requested to approve such plan and (b) that, effective January 1, 1964 the Metropolitan School Board assume all school debt up to an amount calculated in each case on the basis of a ceiling cost formula prepared by the School Board and concurred in by the Metropolitan Council, and, further that joint application be made to the Province of Ontario for the required enabling legislation to give effect to (a) above.

2. Teacher Salaries

The Metropolitan Toronto Act presently provides that the Metropolitan School Board shall establish each year, in connection with its budget operations, the maintenance assistance payments to be paid to Area Board on behalf of public elementary, academic secondary, commercial secondary, and technical secondary pupils. The Act further provides that the per pupil payments shall be uniform throughout the area. Fixing maintenance assistance payments is a particularly crucial decision since it determines for the year in question what proportion of the total operating cost of the various school districts shall be borne by the Metropolitan Area as a whole.

Because some district enjoy a more favourable assessment than others, through the system of maintenance assistance payments these areas contribute more in taxes to meet Metropolitan school needs than the Boards of these areas receive. Conversely, areas with relatively unfavourable assessments receive more from the Metropolitan School Board than their ratepayers contribute in Metropolitan school taxes.

As costs have risen it has become increasingly difficult for trustees from some of the favourably endowed areas to support corresponding increases in maintenance assistance payments. In arriving at a decision trustees of necessity are mindful of their own local problems and have become reluctant to increase Metropolitan support to boards whose policies give them any advantage over the favourable endowed boards. Area boards find themselves in the position of being required to compete with each other for the services of the more competent teachers. It is difficult, therefore, for boards which contribute more to Metropolitan education than they receive to become reconciled to the adoption by any board which benefits from the Metropolitan arrangements of higher teachers' salaries in an effort to attract a greater share of the good teachers. In 1963, for instance, maintenance payments were held below the figure to which they should have been logically increased because the area boards again failed to achieve, on a voluntary basis, a mutually acceptable salary policy.

Throughout the past ten years, boards have cooperated voluntarily in studies relating to teachers' salaries. Strenuous efforts were made to work toward uniformity. Throughout this process one board of education, although it has always shared salary information, has exercised its right under the Metropolitan Act to pursue salary policies and to set salary levels which other boards were not prepared to emulate.

For the past five years the Metropolitan School Board, on the instructions of a majority of the area boards, has requested from time to time that the Province amend the Metropolitan Act to provide that teachers' salaries shall be uniform throughout the Metropolitan area and that the Metropolitan School Board be empowered to serve as an agent of the area boards in achieving this result.

These activities over the past five years make it clear that the present differences in salary policy stand in the way of the more effective use of the maintenance assistance payments as an instrument of equalization. Moreover, there is growing evidence that, unless action is taken at once, the voluntary efforts and cooperation which now obtain will be abandoned and the teacher salary problem will become even more chaotic than at present. In the view of the Special Committee the establishment of a plan for uniform teachers' salaries throughout the Metropolitan Area should be taken in 1964 and not be deferred until after the Goldenberg Commission reports. The Special Committee recognizes that the Government may be reluctant to introduce legislation in advance of the Commission report. It believes, however, that the overwhelming majority now in favour of the plan make its implementation as a consequence of a further study by the Commission a virtual certainty. Action at once on this critical issue is imperative if any reasonable equalization is to be achieved in the years before the Government can act upon any general plan proposed by the Royal Commission.

It is recommended, therefore, that the Metropolitan School Board again submit its request for legislation relating to the establishment of uniform teacher salaries and that the Metropolitan Council lend its support to this submission.

In summary, your Committee takes the view that any action undertaken before the Commission reports should be simple in character and bear upon only the most urgent financial problems. Action on the two foregoing proposals would enhance the chances of the Metropolitan School Board in cooperation with the eleven

area boards achieving for the interim period a more satisfactory degree of equalization.

To the Metropolitan School Board:

At a meeting of the above-named Committee held this day, the following members being present, viz., Mr. Wells (Chairman), Mrs. Grossberg and Mrs. McBrien, Messrs. Brown, E. M. Davidson, Lowes, Mills, Parker and Stainsby, it was decided to report and recommend as follows:

- 1. In favour of Report No. 12 of Buildings and Sites Committee, Part I and the Report of the Chairmen's Committee dated November 15, 1963.
- 2. The Committee had before it for consideration a communication from the Toronto Board of Education indicating that on October 17 the Toronto Board approved a new group life insurance plan for its employees. The provisions of the plan are as follows:
 - "(a) That group life insurance coverage for employees of the Board be provided at the rate of twice annual salary up to and including age 55, reducing to one and one-half times annual salary after the age of 55.

"That foregoing plan would provide basic coverage for male employees, both teaching and non-teaching. This group of employees is known as 'Class A—Males' in the Board's specifications. Insurance coverage for females and dependents, as set out in the Board's specifications, would be as follows:

Females qualifying for married status under the Income Tax Act must elect Class A status.

Class B Life Insurance
Females not in Class A \$2,000.00

Females other than those on the teaching staff may not participate in group life insurance until reaching the age of 30. On becoming eligible for coverage, females in Class B may elect to be covered under the Class A schedule if the election is made within 31 days of becoming eligible.

Dependents Group Life
Wife \$1,000.00
Each child 500.00

- "(b) That the group life insurance plan include paid-up insurance for all employees on retirement, equal to 1% of the total of the annual group life insurance coverages for each employee from the inception of the plan up to the time of retirement. A minimum policy of \$500.00 will be provided for all employees upon retirement.
- "(c) That, as the estimated cost of providing the insurance coverage specified in paragraphs (a) and (b) will not exceed \$7.00 per \$1,000.00 of group life insurance coverage per annum, contributions by employees and the Board be as follows:

Employees \$4.80 per \$1,000.00 of group life insurance per annum Board \$2.20 per \$1,000.00 of group life insurance per annum

Total \$7.00 (estimated cost)

"Upon adoption of the new plan, employees will have the option of either retaining the coverage under the existing plan or of participating in the new plan, but once a choice has been made employees will have no further opportunity to change from one plan to the other.

"(d) That, as the Canada Life Assurance Company submitted the lowest quotation to provide group life and paid-up insurance similar to the coverages outlined in this report, and as the company's average retention quotation (the amount charged by the company to administer the plan) is the second lowest, the Canada Life Assurance Company be appointed to administer the Board's new group life insurance plan."

Since the employees of the Metropolitan School Board are included in the Toronto Board's present group life plan the Toronto Board enquired as to whether or not the Metropolitan School Board is prepared to permit its employees to participate in the new scheme.

Your Committee recommends that the School Board approve of the participation of its employees in the new group life insurance plan of the Toronto Board of Education.

3. The Committee had before it for consideration a communication from Mr. J. D. Cumberland, Solicitor, indicating that the Metropolitan Toronto Educational Research Council is making application for Incorporation and requesting approval to the Incorporation and use of the name "Metropolitan Toronto Educational Research Council".

It is recommended that the School Board consent to the application for Incorporation and to the use of the name "Metropolitan Toronto Educational Research Council".

4. Since the Ontario Curriculum Institute will hold a study conference and an annual meeting on Friday, December 13, 1963, and since a number of the members will be attending same, it is recommended that the meeting of the Finance Committee scheduled for December 13 be held instead on Thursday, December 12th at 12 noon.

- 8. That the Executive Secretary be authorized to make application to the appropriate authorities for approval of an initial bulk site purchase fund for the year 1964 of \$3,000,000.00.
- 9. Earlier this year the School Board included in the current estimates funds equivalent to one-half mill in the dollar on the secondary school assessment and one-half mill in the dollar on the public school assessment to provide for capital expenditures from current funds.

It is recommended that the allocation of 1963 current funds for capital purposes as shown on the schedule attached be approved. (For details of schedule see pages 267 to 271.)

10. Estimates

The Committee had before it for preliminary review the 1964 composite capital estimates totalling \$49,022,402.00. Representatives of the various area boards of education attended the meeting to discuss their respective programmes. During review of the estimates it was noted that approximately \$7,000,000.00 might be eligible for financing under the Federal-Provincial special vocational grant scheme. In addition, an amount of approximately \$4,200,000.00 could be financed from current funds.

In view of the total programme the Committee directed the Executive Secretary to commence discussions with the various area boards concerned regarding individual applications contained within the total estimates and further that the Executive Secretary confer with the Commissioner of Finance regarding applications which might be eligible for approval under the provisions of the

Municipal Works Assistance Programme sponsored by the Federal Government in co-operation with the Provincial Government.

In its review of the estimates the Committee noted the rapid increase in requests for provision of special vocational school accommodation. Accordingly, the Committee recommended that the School Board make representations to the Provincial and Federal Governments to solicit their continued financial support for the construction of special vocational schools.

The Committee also requested the Committees of the Advisory Council to review the applications for special vocational school accommodation having regard for the needs of the Metropolitan area as a whole.

To the Metropolitan School Board:

At a meeting of the above-named Committee held this day, the following members being present, viz., Mr. Wells (Chairman); Mrs. McBrien, Messrs. E. M. Davidson, Lowes, Mills, and Stainsby, it was decided to report and recommend as follows:

- 1. In favour of the financial sections of Report No. 13 of Buildings and Sites Committee, Part I.
- 2. That the Inaugural meeting of the Metropolitan School Board be held on Tuesday, January 14th, 1964 at 5.00 p.m.
- 3. That an amount of \$9,500.00 be included in the 1964 current estimates to cover audit fees for the year 1964.
- 4. That the Executive Secretary and the Assistant Secretary of Records be delegated to attend the annual conference of the Ontario Association of School Business Officials in Niagara Falls January 19 to 21, 1964, and that their expenses be paid.
- 5. The Metropolitan Salary Co-ordinating Committee has arranged a dinner meeting on Monday, December 23 at the School Board's offices. Since the Committee is an an hoc Committee of the School Board, it is recommended that dinner expenses in connection with the meeting be paid by the School Board.
- 6. The following amounts were included in the 1963 current estimates to provide for premium on foreign exchange (based on a rate of 8 per cent.) in connection with debenture debt charges payable in United States funds:

The Metropolitan Treasury Department has indicated that the premium on foreign exchange for the year 1963 will be approximately \$232,000.00. The School Board also established a foreign exchange reserve fund which was invested in Canadian Deposit Receipts of the Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce and these funds together with interest thereon to December 31, 1963, will amount to approximately \$327,000.00.

Upon recommendation of the Commissioner of Finance and the Executive Secretary your Committee recommends:

- (a) the total cost of foreign exchange for the year 1963 be charged against 1963 current revenues and
- (b) that the foreign exchange stabilization reserve fund of \$327,000.00 be reinvested in Canadian Deposit Receipts of the Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce or a similar kind of investment as of January 1, 1964.
- 7. That, as recommended by the Commissioner of Finance, the Executive Secretary be authorized to include in the 1964 current estimates the following amounts to cover premium on foreign exchange in connection with debenture debt repayable in United States funds:

- 8. That the Vice-Chairman of the Board and the Executive Secretary be authorized to arrange for appropriate recognition of the services of the Chairman of the School Board, such presentation to be made at the dinner arranged in connection with the final board meeting of the year.
- 9. At its meeting on December 19, 1961, the Metropolitan School Board approved the application of the Etobicoke Board of Education for the Kingsmill Vocational School as a Special Vocational School as defined in Part III of the Secondary School and Boards of Education Act.

As a consequence, the Metropolitan School Board reimburses the Etobicoke Board of Education for the total cost of operation.

Based upon the salaries of the teachers, the cost of supplies and transportation and other direct expenditures, it is recommended that, for purposes of reimbursing the Etobicoke Board of Education, the per diem, per pupil cost of \$5.10948 be approved.

- 10. That an honorarium in the amount of \$25.00 be paid to Mrs. A. Mitchell in recognition of her assistance over the past year in preparing refreshments for the School Board.
- 11. That Disbursement List No. 113 dated December 12, 1963, containing Part I accounts totalling \$12,896,829.30 be approved. Appendix page 275.
