Greetings from the Great Reunion in the sky!

In February 1943, I was drafted! The usual three years of service followed. But get this: I spent three trimesters at Lafayette as a cadet destined for follow-up education at University of Pennsylvania Medical School. Of course, it didn't happen—the stated date of transfer to U.P. was the date of Fate—from cadet captain to buck private again. I ended up in infantry training in the swamps of Louisiana.

I visited all the capitals of the world that counted: New York, London, Paris, I was wounded in Belgium, four days before the Battle of the Bulge. A few months of hospital, I was eventually discharged after a stint as a disc jockey on A.F. Network.

College years followed! I was bunked over the years at Easton, Blair, and Newkirk halls (big mice, dead bugs, carry your own coal up for the potbelly, ashes down).

Then in the real world, after various jobs (and two master's degrees) I decided to teach and loved it! I taught elementary, junior high, high, undergrad and graduate school. Somewhere along the way, I received a Ph.D. from London University.

But what the hey? I've owned or visited a fair bit of real estate in many places, had a glorious family—wife Catherine, children Cathy and Harvey, followed by six grandchildren; even left a fair-sized bequest to the College. Who could ask more?
