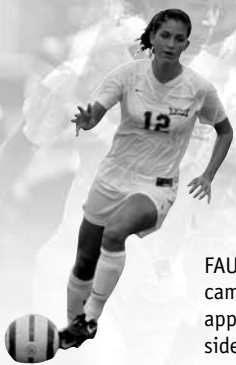

DIRECTIONS TO FAU FIELD

FAU Field is located on Florida Atlantic University's Boca Raton campus. From I-95, take exit 45 (Glades Road) and go east approximately one-half mile; the main entrance is on the left side of the road. After turning left, proceed straight for approximately one-quarter of a mile through a traffic light, take the first left and the field will be on the left behind the baseball and swimming facilities.

CREDENTIALS

Media credentials are issued to members of the working media only. Working space at the media tables is limited and will be assigned on a first-come, first-serve basis. There are no phone lines available at the field. There is no charge for parking.

Requests for credentials should be made either in writing or by phone to: Florida Atlantic University, Athletic Media Relations, 777 Glades Road, Boca Raton, FL 33431. The phone number is (561) 297-3063. Requests may also be faxed to (561) 297-3963.

Working members of the media are asked to present press credentials at the main entrance where they will be directed to seating. Access to the designated media area will be given to those who have received credentials through the Athletic Media Relations Office.

PHONE LINES FOR RADIO

All requests for phone lines for visiting radio crews must be made at least one month in advance through the Athletic Media Relations Office. Requests for additional phone lines or ISDN service will need to be directed through AT&T. Please contact the Athletic Media Relations Office for information.

INTERVIEWS

All interviews with the head coach, members of the staff or players during the season must be made through the Athletic Media Relations Office. For phone interviews, all players will be asked to return calls. The Athletic Media Relations Office will not release player telephone numbers.

Practices are open to the media if advance arrangements are made through the Athletic Media Relations Office. Please make arrangements at least one day prior to attending practice.

Prior to the end of the game, all media covering the game should make their requests for post-game player interviews with a member of the Athletic Media Relations Staff. Players will then be brought to the media area following the interview session with the coaches.

FILING REPORTS

All members of the print media will have access to phone lines in the Oxley Center after the game. Unfortunately, wireless internet is not available at FAU Field.

MEET THE TEAM



Brian Dooley

HEAD COACH



Brian Dooley, a longtime South Florida soccer fixture, enters his eighth season as head coach at Florida Atlantic University. His eight years at the helm, coupled with his

previous four-year stint as head coach of Barry University, have made him one of the most successful collegiate coaches not only in the Southeast, but the entire NCAA. Eleven times he has guided his teams to 11 or more wins, including seven seasons of 14-plus win campaigns.

Since joining FAU, Dooley built one of the most dominating programs in the Atlantic Sun Conference before FAU moved into the Sun Belt Conference in 2006-07. He capped the Owls' final A-Sun campaign with a 2005 A-Sun Tournament Championship to go with the team's regular season title and an NCAA College Cup berth, the first in school history. FAU also led the nation in shutout percentage (16 shutouts in 21 games, .762) in 2005.

The Owls finished at 11-8-2 in 2006, the program's seventh-consecutive winning season, in its first year

as a member of the Sun Belt. The Owls advanced to the second round of the conference tournament before falling to the eventual champion Denver.

The appearance in the 2005 A-Sun Championship was FAU's seventh under Dooley, while the regular season title was the third in four seasons. The Owls were the only team to make appearances in all seven A-Sun postseason tournaments from 1999-2005.

Dooley enters the 2007 campaign with a 154-57-12 overall record in his 11 seasons as a NCAA DI soccer coach. In his eight seasons at FAU, he's averaged nearly 13 wins per season while compiling a record of 101-45-9 (.681).

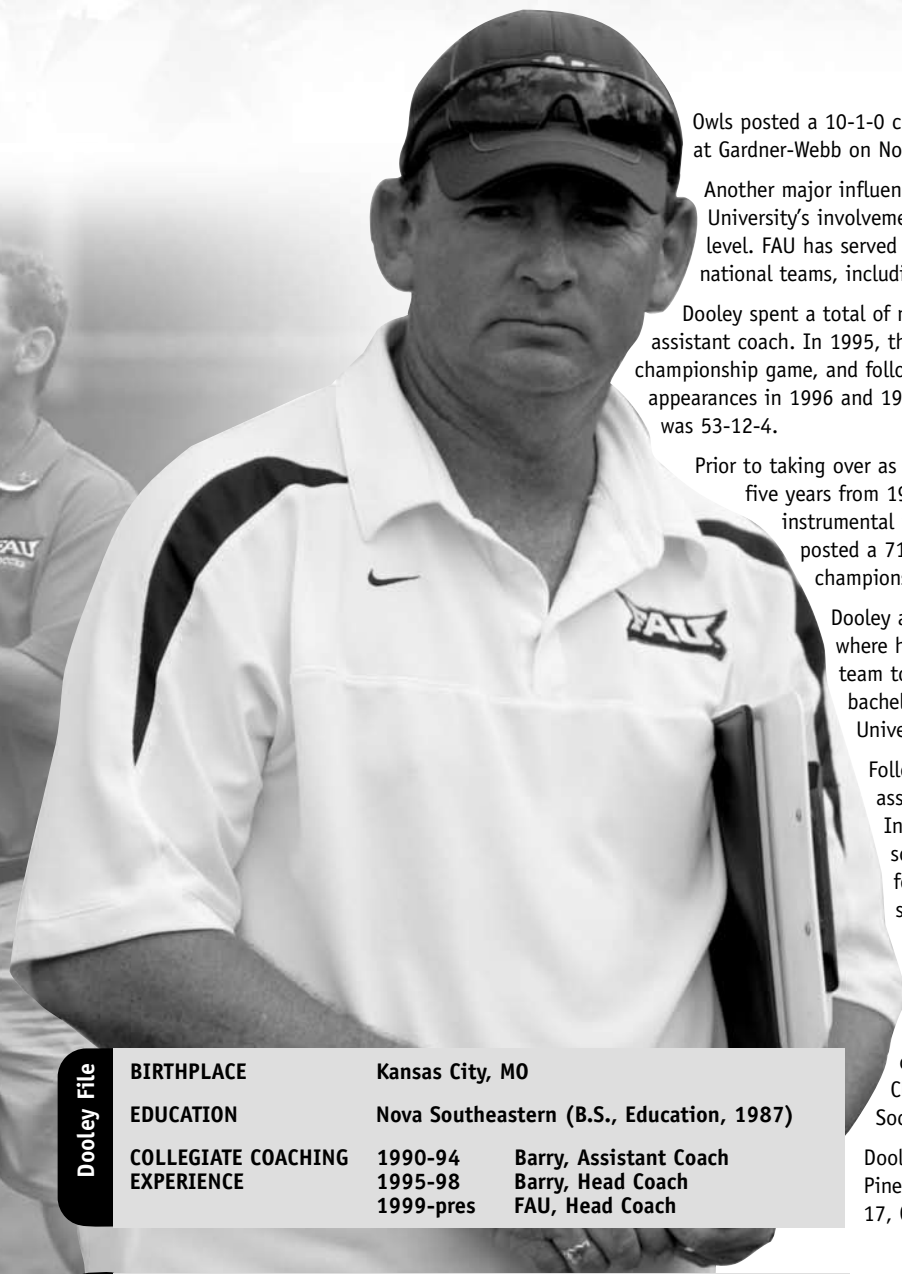
Dooley's imprint on the FAU program has been staggering. His 101 wins in eight years are 61 more than the program had in its first eight seasons (1991-98). He has coached three A-Sun Players of the Year, 18 First-Team All-Conference selections, 18 Second-Team All-Conference selections, one Freshman of the Year and 11 All-Freshman selections.

From 2000-05 Dooley's teams compiled a 49-8-2 A-Sun Conference record (.847). In 2002, he led FAU to its first A-Sun regular season title as the

Owls posted a 10-1-0 conference record. In addition, FAU's 2-0 win at Gardner-Webb on Nov. 2 gave Dooley 100 career victories.

Another major influence Dooley has had on the program is the University's involvement in women's soccer on an international level. FAU has served as a host practice facility for several national teams, including the USA National Team.

Dooley spent a total of nine seasons at Barry, his first five as an assistant coach. In 1995, the Lady Bucs advanced to the national championship game, and followed that campaign with quarterfinal appearances in 1996 and 1997. Barry's overall record in the Dooley era was 53-12-4.

Prior to taking over as Barry's head coach, he was an assistant for five years from 1990-94. During that time, he played an instrumental role in the team's success as the Lady Bucs posted a 71-11-2 record and won back-to-back NCAA championships in 1992 and 1993.

Dooley attended Florida International University where he was a midfielder who helped lead the team to the 1982 NCAA title. He received a bachelor's degree from Nova Southeastern University in 1987.

Following his playing career, Dooley was an assistant women's soccer coach at Florida International for five years and the head girl's soccer coach at Hollywood Hills High School for four seasons. He also was head boy's soccer coach at South Plantation High School for seven seasons before taking the head coaching position at Barry.

Dooley has been involved in youth soccer for more than a decade. He currently is the coaching director for the Weston Soccer Club. He is a member of the Florida Youth Soccer Association State Coaching State.

Dooley and his wife, Marie, live in Pembroke Pines and are the parents of three boys: Sean, 17, Connor, 14, and Ciaran, 8.

ASSISTANT COACH

Carrie Terrill joined the Florida Atlantic University women's soccer staff in the

spring of 2007 as an assistant soccer coach. Before joining the Owls, she was living in Charleston, SC where she acted as the Girls' Director of Coaching for the Charleston United Soccer Club.

Prior to the Charleston United she served as an assistant with the University of Toledo and three years before that at Charleston Southern University. She has been a state staff coach

for the Olympic Development Program for five years in South Carolina as well in Ohio.

Terrill has also been involved with coaching club teams for the past seven years. She holds both an NSCAA Premier Diploma and an NSCAA Goalkeeping I Diploma.

As a student-athlete, Terrill played for UNC-Charlotte where she earned Conference USA All-Freshman Team honors and twice earned Conference USA All-Conference honors before transferring to Charleston Southern. As a Buccaneer, she was named Big South Player of the Year and was a member of the All-Conference team. Terrill also was named her team's Most Valuable Attacking Player.

During her prep career, her accomplishments have allowed her to remain as one of the

leading scorers in North Carolina history. She also played on the North Carolina State Team from 1995-1997 and was selected to the Region III Team in 1997.

Terrill also played professionally for three years in the W-League with the Charlotte Speed.

Terrill is originally from Charlotte, NC, and holds a bachelor's of science degree in psychology from Charleston Southern.



Chris Gnehm

GOALKEEPER COACH

Chris Gnehm joined Florida Atlantic University women's soccer staff

in the fall of 2002 as an assistant coach with an emphasis on goalkeeping.

Gnehm began his coaching career in the summer of 1995 with the Soccer Plus Goalkeeping School in Wethersfield, CT. His collegiate coaching career began as the assistant men's and women's soccer coach at

Averett University in Danville, VA, a position he held from 1996-1997. He then assumed a similar position at Monmouth University from 1998-1999. The following fall he was named the assistant head soccer coach at Hampden-Sydney College in Hampden-Sydney, VA. Following a one-semester stint, Gnehm moved to Gardner-Webb University for the spring of 2000 and to Ferrum College in Ferrum, VA, from the fall of 2000 to December 2001.

Gnehm obtained a bachelor of science degree in physical education from Averett University in the spring of 1997. He is a member of the NSCAA and earned first team

all-state soccer honors as a high school senior in 1992. The four-year collegiate starter for Averett also served as the team's captain from 1993-1996. He currently holds Averett's school record for most saves in a single season (1996) career saves (1992-1996).

Away from the soccer field, Gnehm worked as an actor/model from 1979-1988. He has been a part of nearly 60 commercials, involving products such as Cracker Jack, Nike, Coleco Vision, Cheetos, Life Cereal and Jell-O Pudding. Print ads include Wrangler Kid, Gravy Train and FAO Schwartz.

While there are 31 NCAA conferences that sponsor multiple sports, the Sun Belt is one of only eleven to participate in the Bowl Championship Series (BCS) and Division 1-A football, now known as the Football Bowl Subdivision. The Sun Belt was formed in 1976 with six members competing in four men's sports, and today comprises 13 institutions of higher learning while sponsoring 19 championship sports for men and women. The conference has influence in a region that carries significant importance, as its membership is spread out over eight states that represent 113 total electoral votes. Thus, if you carry the Sun Belt, you are almost half way to the White House!

The Sun Belt Conference enters its 32nd season in 2006-2007 with a proud history of athletic and academic success. The conference sponsors 10 women's sports — basketball, cross country, golf, soccer, softball, swimming and diving, tennis, indoor and outdoor track and field, and volleyball; and nine men's sports — baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, swimming and diving, tennis, and indoor and outdoor track and field.

Each of the 19 sports has seen numerous team and individual accomplishments, and 12 Sun Belt Conference schools are currently graduating its student athletes at a rate higher than their school's student body. All Sun Belt schools are committed to excellence in the 21st century, and facility upgrades and expansion are occurring on virtually every campus.

Because of its status as a member of the Division 1-A football coalition, the Sun Belt Conference has a permanent seat on the NCAA's 16-member Board of Directors. As a result, the conference has a crucial voice on some of the most pressing issues in college athletics and will always have a role in the implementation of any future NCAA legislation and guidelines.

The conference continues to utilize television to grow and promote the league. Adding volleyball, baseball and softball to the conference's television package has resulted in more national and regional television exposure for the league than at any time in its history. The conference's regional television package enables live telecasts of Sun Belt events to reach over 20 million households. Additionally, ESPN televised the conference's men's basketball championship game for the 27th straight season in 2007, marking its longest affiliation with any conference in the country.

The Sun Belt Conference has partnered with XOS Technologies, Inc. to deliver a full-service, customized, public and premium web site to

provide fans with a broad range of real-time information and content about the conference's athletic teams. The Sun Belt is one of the few conferences in the nation to provide video highlights and features on its website from each of the league's respective championships. This technology serves as a great recruiting tool for schools by enabling anyone in the world with internet access to view the conference's championship events, and fans in five different countries viewed the conference's most recent soccer championship.

Prominent Sun Belt alumni include United States Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice (Denver), NFL Hall of Fame football player "Mean" Joe Greene (North Texas), Arizona Diamondbacks All-Star baseball player Luis Gonzalez (South Alabama), former member of the United States Senate and House of Representatives John Breaux (Louisiana-Lafayette), country music superstar Tim McGraw (Louisiana-Monroe), and actor Andy Garcia (Florida International).

The conference's first 30 years have also produced numerous individual national champions along with Olympic track medalists including Earl Bell, Tom Hill and Al Joyner (Arkansas State), Hollis Conway (Louisiana-Lafayette), and Tayna Lawrence (Florida International). Old Dominion's Anne Donovan received the Naismith Trophy recognizing the nation's top women's basketball player in 1983, helped the United States win the Olympic gold medal in 1984, and helped the Lady Monarchs capture the national championship in 1985 (one of eight women's Final 4 appearances by Sun Belt schools: Old Dominion — 1983, 1985; Western Kentucky — 1985, 1986, 1992; Louisiana Tech — 1994, 1998, 1999). Sun Belt teams have also participated in the men's NCAA Final 4 (UNC-Charlotte in 1977), the College World Series (Louisiana-Lafayette in 2000), the women's College World Series (Louisiana-Lafayette in 1993, 1995, 1996, 2003), and had 10 players selected in the first round of the NBA Draft.

The Sun Belt Conference is led by Commissioner Wright Waters, who is in his eighth full year as commissioner. He was named the conference's fourth commissioner in February of 1999 following the tenures of Vic Bubas (1976-1990), Jim Lessig (1990-1991), and Craig Thompson (1991-1998). The league's annual all sports champion is awarded the Vic Bubas Cup, named after the conference's first commissioner.

The conference office has been headquartered in downtown New Orleans since 2000 after moving from suburban Metairie, La., where it had been based since 1991. Prior to moving to the "Big Easy," the league was based in Tampa, Fla., from 1977-1991. The original conference office was located in Charlotte, N.C., from 1976-77.

FRANK T. BROGAN became the fifth president of Florida Atlantic University in March 2003. Previously, he was lieutenant governor of Florida, the state's commissioner of education, superintendent of schools in Martin County, Florida, and a principal, assistant principal, dean and fifth-grade teacher in Martin County public schools.

President Brogan and his twin brother, John, were born in Cincinnati, Ohio, the youngest of six children. The first member of his family to graduate from college, President Brogan received a bachelor's degree in education *magna cum laude* from the University of Cincinnati in 1976. Two years later, he moved to Florida to teach at Port Salerno Elementary School on the Treasure Coast. He continued his education at FAU earning a master's degree in education in 1981. In rapid succession, he became dean of students at Indiantown Middle School, assistant principal and then principal at Murray Middle School, Martin County's elected superintendent of schools, Florida's commissioner of education (the youngest person ever to hold that office), and, in 1999, lieutenant governor on the Bush-Brogan ticket. He had just been elected to a second term as lieutenant governor when he decided to seek the presidency of his alma mater, FAU.

President Brogan has been a champion of public education all his life. He considers his most important achievement as commissioner of education to have been building greater accountability into Florida's public school system, and he

to higher education across the University's seven-county service region; encouraging diversity in FAU's student body, faculty and staff; supporting world-class research initiatives; fostering close, mutually supportive relationships with the

important causes. During the past few years, he has become especially involved in the fight against cancer — a disease that claimed the life of his first wife, Mary. He has used his remarkable speaking ability to crusade in the fight against breast cancer and he currently serves as statewide chairman of Florida's Dialogue on Cancer. He has received a public service award from the Pioneers in Prostate Cancer.

For 2007-08 President Brogan was named vice president of the Sun Belt Conference Executive Committee—an eight-person team providing oversight for conference through approval of conference-wide rules/legislation, the conference office budget and tournament championship sites as well as other duties.

Levow's efforts will blend nicely with his relationships as the past

president of the University Faculty Senate, a position that saw him hold a seat on the Board of Trustees.

Levow is a professor and associate chair for Broward programs in the department of Computer Science and Engineering at Florida Atlantic. He joined FAU in 1970 with the charge of establishing the University's first program in computer science housed in the mathematics department. He later transferred to the computer systems department and then

joined the computer science department when it was formed.

He has served terms as chair of mathematics and computer science and engineering. Most recently, he was responsible for developing the undergraduate degree program in information engineering technology for students with an AS degree in computing technology.

Upon Levow's arrival at FAU he became involved in faculty governance and has three times served as head of the

university/faculty senate. He has also served the University in a variety of advisory roles on issues related to computing.

Dr. Levow earned his bachelor's and doctoral degrees in mathematics and applied mathematics, respectively, from the University of Pennsylvania. Prior to FAU he held positions in industry and at the University of Hawaii.

Craig Angelos DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

CRAIG ANGELOS was named director of Athletics at Florida Atlantic University in July 2003, assuming oversight responsibility for the institution's 17-team intercollegiate athletic programs. Since that time the total number of sports has grown to 18 and the department services more than 500 student-athletes.

Angelos enthusiastically embraced his multi-faceted role and has moved at a rapid pace to take the program to newer heights, by working with President Brogan, FAU students and staff. His philosophy for running a successful intercollegiate athletic program is built on four fundamental principles: institutional control, academic excellence, fiscal integrity and winning championships.

He took over a young athletic department and immediately negotiated entrance into the Sun Belt Conference (one of the 11 1-A conferences) and developed a plan and to lead the institution's transition from NCAA Div. I-AA to I-A. He initiated the University's brand identity campaign which came to conclusion in 2005 and has become a revenue stream for both the University and athletics. Along the way, a television contract was secured in 2004 that saw ESPN and Fox Sports become regulars at both home and away football contests; something FAU has repeated year after year. The department also became the fourth university within the state of Florida to have an all-sports apparel deal with Nike, joining Florida State, Florida and Miami. In 2005-06 the bar of success was raised with seven of the 10 sponsored FAU sports advancing to postseason play. In all, FAU captured five conference women's championships and was one of just eight schools nationally to

capture five or more women's championships. His leadership in 2006-07 saw the Owls flourish in the department's first full-season in the Sun Belt Conference and the Atlantic Soccer Conference.

During Angelos' tenure, the Owls have captured 12 conference titles and FAU has represented the University in postseason competition 17 times. Four individuals earned All-America status while two earned Academic All-America honors. The department's commitment to a holistic approach to student athlete excellence shows with more than 35% of the student-athletes maintaining a 3.0 GPA and with the National Consortium for Academics and Sports honoring FAU as an Academics and Sports Outreach and Community Service Program Honor Roll member in 2005. This was made possible in part due to the recent creation of a Champs/Lifeskills program that assists the student-athletes development in the areas of academic and athletic excellence, personal and career development and community service.

Perhaps, most significantly, under Angelos' leadership the department has been able to develop a balanced budget plan and has witnessed a steady rise in community involvement and donor commitment providing more scholarship dollars each year.

His complete renovation of fundraising measures has resulted in major gift increases of 400%, an Owl Club fund increase of 130% and an increase in special event revenue of 150%. Angelos' efforts to market the teams, build a fan base and showcase the University on national television have greatly enhanced the overall image of the athletics program.

Angelos has also hired two new basketball coaches. In April 2005, he brought Matt Doherty back to the college ranks. In just one season, men's basketball revenues tripled and attendance more than doubled. That foundation, laid by both Angelos and Doherty, was continued in 2006-2007 by former associate head coach and newly

hired head coach Rex Walters. Attendance continued to climb and under Walters' direction the Owls hosted the first round of the Sun Belt Conference tournament in a basketball environment that is unmatched in the Owls 18-year history.

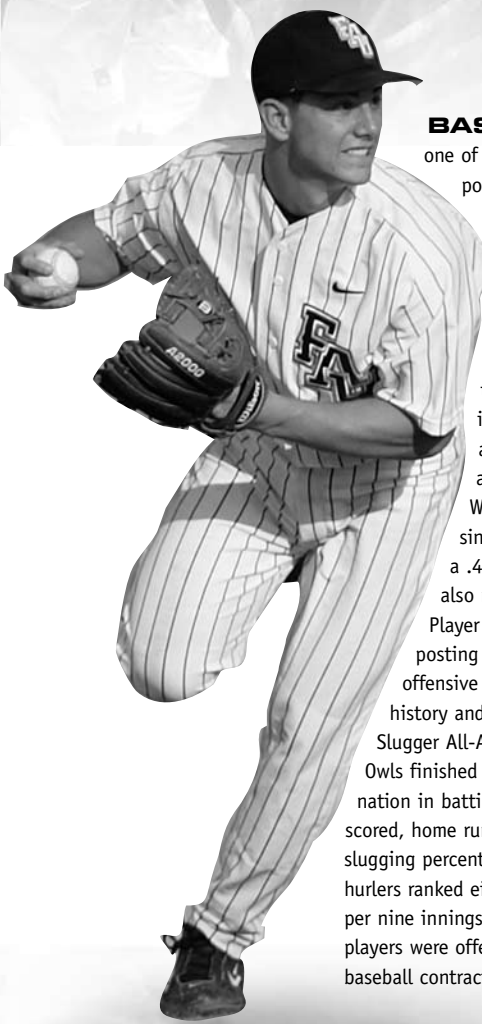
Almost immediately after his arrival at FAU, Angelos initiated a master plan and review of all athletic facilities. His plan's implementation began in the fall of 2006 with a new \$4.5 million track and field complex that opened in the spring of 2007 and welcomed fans with the first spring game being played in April on the new field. Weeks prior to the track opening celebration, a \$10 million renovation began on the arena called home by the men's and women's basketball team as well as volleyball. Perhaps the gem of the projects includes the plan of building an on-campus football venue that would solidify the athletic department's position among top-tier institutions. More importantly, the entire University would benefit by his vision of developing an "innovation village" that would create much needed additional student housing, retail establishments, additional parking, and a hotel and conference center.

Prior to coming to FAU, he was the deputy director of Athletics and chief operating officer at Indiana University. While there, he supervised many aspects of the athletic department including the

football program and was instrumental in negotiating a Nike contract for 23 of its 24 sports. Previously, he was at the University of Miami (FL) for eight years, serving in a variety of positions but primarily as the second in command under UM's athletics director Paul Dee. Prior to Miami, he spent three years at the NCAA as a legislative assistant interpreting the association's rules and regulations. He has served as an intercollegiate athletics administrator for nearly 16 years.

A graduate of the Creighton University School of Law in Omaha, NE, Angelos worked for a short time in a mid-size litigation firm in Los Angeles, CA. However, he ultimately decided to combine his legal background and his love for athletics and gravitated towards a career in intercollegiate athletics. During his undergraduate years at Brigham Young University in Provo, UT, Angelos was the starting first baseman on the varsity squad. He later played for one year in the Italian professional baseball league in Buttrio, Italy.

The 45-year-old Angelos and his wife, Kristin, have been married for 22 years. They will gain another intercollegiate prospective in 2007-08 as their eldest daughter Alayna (18) joins the women's basketball team at BYU. The couple has five other children, Alexis (15), Abigail (12), Austin (10), Aaron (7) and Alivia (4).



BASEBALL... used one of the nation's most powerful offenses to reach the conference tournament in the team's first year in the Sun Belt. For the first time in program history, the team had two individuals finish with a .400-plus batting average, and Robbie Widlansky broke FAU's single-season mark with a .430 average. He was also named the Sun Belt's Player of the Year after posting one of the best offensive seasons in Sun Belt history and earned Louisville Slugger All-American honors. The Owls finished in the top-10 in the nation in batting average, runs scored, home runs per game and slugging percentage, while FAU hurlers ranked eighth in strikeouts per nine innings. In total seven players were offered professional baseball contracts.



MEN'S BASKETBALL

earned the no. 6 seed in the Sun Belt Conference Tournament, thanks to the conference's most efficient offensive attack in terms of field goal percentage. The Owls led the conference in assists and had two athletes voted onto the All-Conference Second-Team. FAU hosted a First Round Sun Belt Tournament game against Florida International, picking up a 91-88 overtime win in Head Coach Rex Walters' postseason debut. The other highlight win during the season was a 78-73 triumph at perennial power Western Kentucky.



WOMEN'S BASKETBALL saw Head Coach Chancellor Dugan pick up win no. 100 against Akron on November 17, 2006. She is just the second FAU women's basketball coach to reach the century mark, joining Wayne Allen, who finished with 167 wins. Dugan was also nominated for the Palm Beach County Coach of the Year award. The Owls picked up their first Sun Belt win against New Orleans at the FAU Arena.

CHEER TEAM performs regularly at home and away football games, men's and women's basketball home games and is a constant at community events. The squad, shorthanded due to injury, placed 12th at nationals in 2007 and performed an exhibition at King of the Jungle in Fort Lauderdale. The team finished second in 2001 and 2003 at the NCA competition and owns a national pairs championship.

CROSS COUNTRY finished 5th on the women's side and 11th on the men's at the Sun Belt Championships under Head Coach Alex Smolka. The women had two runners who narrowly missed qualifying for the NCAA National Championships with strong showings at the NCAA Regional. The women's team won three meets during the year, while the men earned one victory and three top-three finishes.

DANCE has garnered national attention in the last few years. The squad performs at football and basketball games, as well as pep rallies and charitable events, featuring dozens of routines and nearly as many creative outfits and dance styles. The program placed second in the nation in 2005 at the National Dance Association competition and helped raise money for programs such as Breast Cancer Awareness during the 2006-07 season.

FOOTBALL played the nation's fourth most difficult non-conference schedule. The experience gained got the Owls off to a threatening Sun Belt start, startling many who had picked the league's newcomer last. FAU finished 4-3 in the Belt and were in the hunt for a bowl appearance late into the season. The Owls played before a record crowd at Clemson, faced off against Steve Spurrier and also traveled to Kansas State and Oklahoma State. The inexperienced team showed maturity and ability with several players, specifically Frantz Simeon, being listed among the nation's statistical leaders. At season's end, Nello Faulk worked out for several NFL teams and attended the Jaguar's mini-camp. Two players continued to shine in Europe and Lawrence Gordon returned to the CFL.



MEN'S GOLF had three top-five finishes in its first season under Angelo Sands, who was hired on Nov. 17, 2006 as the head coach. The Owls have seven projected returners, giving the 2007-08 squad a veteran presence that will help boost the program under the direction of Sands.

WOMEN'S GOLF finished third at the Sun Belt Conference Tournament under the guidance of Head Coach Joan Joyce. The Owls had an individual take top honors three times in 2006-07, and the team won the Cincinnati Springs Invitational. Sophomore Praewnapa Phol-Uayporn earned All-Conference honors and was a strong candidate for the NCAA Regional.

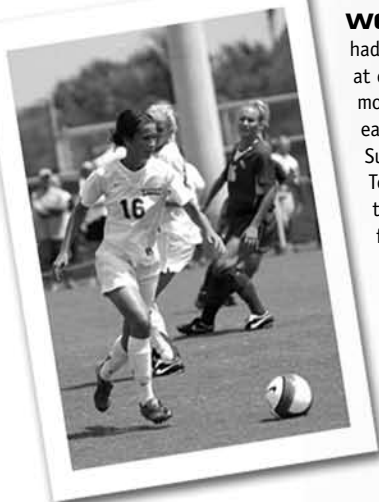


MEN'S SOCCER had an eventful year under Head Coach Kos Donev. The team advanced to the finals of the Atlantic Soccer Conference Tournament in its first year in the league. FAU would end the season with a 7-9-1 record and place two players on the All-Atlantic Soccer Conference second team.



WOMEN'S SOCCER

had a seven-game winning streak at one point and posted eight more shutouts on the way to earning the no. 4 seed in the Sun Belt Championship Tournament. The Owls advanced to the second round before falling to eventual conference champion Denver. FAU placed three on all-conference teams and two on the all-tournament team. A 2-1 win over rival Miami highlighted the 2006 campaign.



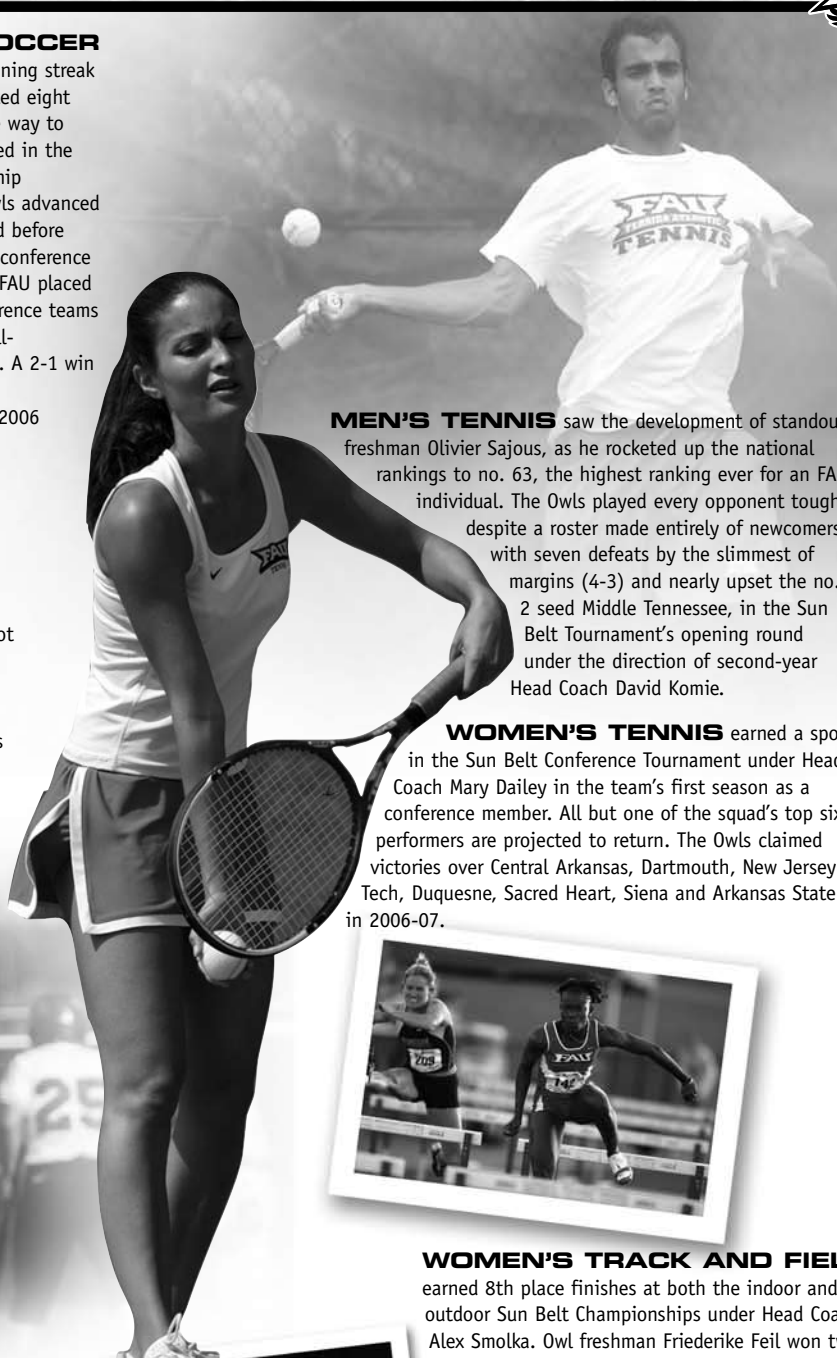
SOFTBALL won both the regular season and postseason Sun Belt Championships and swept the Sun Belt's Player, Pitcher and Coach of the Year awards. The Owls had the highest RPI of any team not invited to participate in an NCAA Regional. It was just the second time since 1999 that FAU did not participate in a regional. The Owls won three games on Championship Saturday to emerge from the loser's bracket as conference champions, their 10th postseason title in the last 11 years.



SWIMMING AND DIVING

defended their Sun Belt Conference crown and had a

swimmer advance to the NCAA Championships for the third time in the last four years. Head Coach Steve Eckelkamp and Diving Coach Ashleye Henyan both earned Women's Coach of the Year honors. The men's team finished fifth at the Sun Belt Championship and broke three school records during the season.



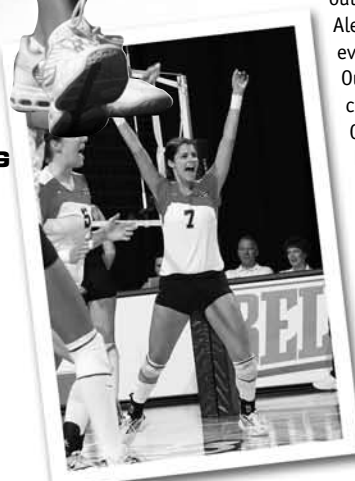
MEN'S TENNIS saw the development of standout freshman Olivier Sajous, as he rocketed up the national rankings to no. 63, the highest ranking ever for an FAU individual. The Owls played every opponent tough, despite a roster made entirely of newcomers, with seven defeats by the slimmest of margins (4-3) and nearly upset the no. 2 seed Middle Tennessee, in the Sun Belt Tournament's opening round under the direction of second-year Head Coach David Komie.

WOMEN'S TENNIS earned a spot in the Sun Belt Conference Tournament under Head Coach Mary Dailey in the team's first season as a conference member. All but one of the squad's top six performers are projected to return. The Owls claimed victories over Central Arkansas, Dartmouth, New Jersey Tech, Duquesne, Sacred Heart, Siena and Arkansas State in 2006-07.



WOMEN'S TRACK AND FIELD

earned 8th place finishes at both the indoor and outdoor Sun Belt Championships under Head Coach Alex Smolka. Owl freshman Friederike Feil won two events and was named Freshman of the Year and Outstanding Women's Track Performer at the indoor championships. During the outdoor campaign, the Owls produced three automatic qualifiers for the NCAA East Regional.



VOLLEYBALL advanced to the Sun Belt Conference Tournament in the team's first season as a conference member. The team will be the first to play in the newly renovated FAU Arena, which underwent a \$10 million facelift over the summer. Head Coach Jody Brown is approaching his 200th win at FAU.

DR. MICHELLE DOMAS BROWN was named the director for the Student-Athlete Center for Academic Excellence in 2005.

Brown, who reports to the Dean for Undergraduate Studies, oversees the student athlete center for academic excellence, serves as a liaison between the athletic and

academic communities at FAU and is responsible for coordinating the NCAA's Academic Progress Rate (APR) initiatives. Her primary objective is to ensure that student-athletes have the resources and support structure in place to reach their educational goals.

Brown has been at FAU since 1997. Before taking her position with the SACAE in October 2002, she was an assistant director for Freshman Programs. Throughout her tenure at FAU, she has worked with students in many capacities focusing on their personal development and academic success.

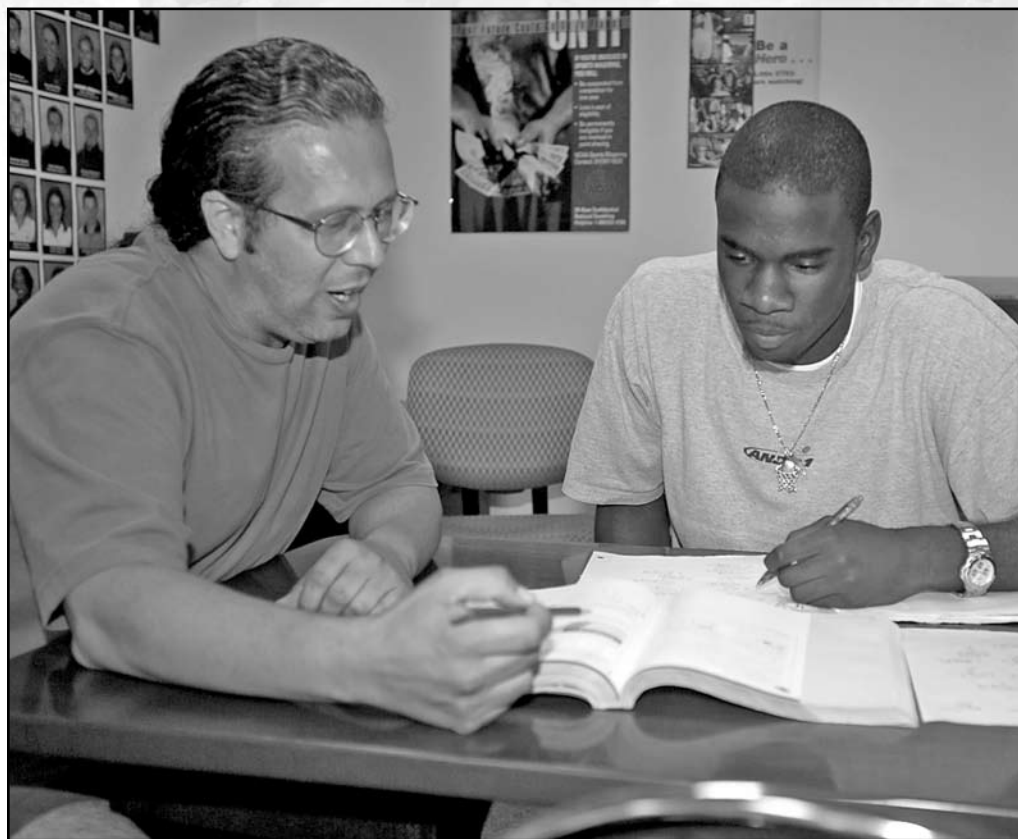
coordinator and floor manager when USF hosted the NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament 1st and 2nd Round.

The University's commitment to the student-athlete is a dual one. Participation in the athletic arena is not viewed as an obstacle to the attainment of one's educational goals, rather it is seen as a complementary

activity. Each supports the other. Athletic excellence is stressed, but academic achievement is never compromised.

The University realizes that student-athletes are required to commit a large percentage of their personal time to University-sponsored athletic activities. For this reason, the University recognizes the need for a support program for its intercollegiate athletes. The Student-Athlete Center for Academic Excellence is designed to assist all student-athletes in achieving their educational goals.

Academic counselors work collaboratively with faculty and campus advising centers to ensure that student-athletes are taking the appropriate classes and making progress toward their degrees. Counselors also work with students on a variety of learning enhancement activities, including study skills and time

management strategies. In addition to individualized counseling, a comprehensive tutorial program is also available to student-athletes through the Academic Center. Tutors come highly recommended by faculty and they are generally available to work with students in all subject areas.

The Student-Athlete Center for Academic Excellence also coordinates community outreach and "life skills" activities for FAU student-athletes. FAU takes considerable pride in the accomplishments of our student-athletes in the community. In fact, the FAU Athletic Department was recognized recently by the National Consortium of Academics and Sport as one of the top universities in the country for commitment to community service.



CHAMPS/Life Skills Program

Florida Atlantic's CHAMPS/Life Skills Program made a transition in 2006-2007 from a program that was administered through the Center for Academic Excellence to one that is embraced by the entire athletics department.



PERSONAL DEVELOPMENT

The Student-Athlete Center for Academic Excellence offers a variety of personal development programs for student athletes. In recent years, FAU's personal

development programming has been conducted through a series of workshops designed to help students not only make a successful transition to college life, but also to prepare them for success beyond FAU once they graduate. Recent workshops have focused on time management, study skills, drug and alcohol awareness, gambling, financial planning, sport psychology, health and wellness topics and better interview techniques.

FAU's Life Skills program also includes sections for the First Year Experience course (SLS 1501) that are specifically designed for freshmen student-athletes. While the curriculum



for these classes will follow the traditional SLS model that is currently in place at FAU, certain topics (e.g., time management, freshmen transitional issues, drug and alcohol education, communicating with the media,

etc.) are taught in a manner that will help meet the unique needs of the student-athlete population. Students' involvement with this class has had a positive impact on their academic performance and helps them build a community.

STUDENT-ATHLETE ADVISORY COUNCIL (SAAC)



Each athletic team at FAU has at least two representatives on the Student-Athlete Advisory Council (SAAC), a leadership and service organization that exists for the betterment of the student-athlete experience. SAAC meetings provide students with a vehicle to express any concerns they may have with existing

practices and to offer suggestions for improvements in the future. The SAAC also organizes a wide variety of community outreach activities each semester. Senior soccer player Megan Coyne served as president of FAU's SAAC in a year that saw SAAC participate in several outreach events including fundraisers for the American Cancer Society and for the University of New Orleans. Coyne was also selected by the Sun Belt Conference to represent its 11 members at the National SAAC Meetings. SACC organized a holiday party and donated gifts to a community of underprivileged youth, worked a YMCA haunted house and visited several local elementary schools. In 2007-2008 Chris Eberthart (baseball) will serve as the SAAC president, Jarrid Smith (football) vice president, Jessica Badder (women's soccer) secretary and Brittney Comer (women's soccer) will serve as the treasure.

Melissa Dawson became Florida Atlantic University's Associate Athletic Director and Senior Women's Administrator June 1, 2001. She is the University's first person to hold the SWA position, in a full-time capacity, demonstrating the University's commitment both to growth and to the development of women's sports.

Since coming to Florida Atlantic, Dawson has placed her fingerprints on the quality of game operations. Included in her overall plan to improve facilities was the recent addition of a track complex and to bring the arena back online after a complete renovation. She also works hand-in-hand with the training and equipment rooms to encompass the needs of the entire athletic department. She supervises several individual teams and spearheads the department's efforts to assure the equity and student welfare of the entire department, many times taking the lead from the SAAC committee, which she sponsors.

Dawson came to FAU from Florida State University. While the title of SWA is new for her, the inner working of college athletics is not. The Inverness, FL native held various positions at FSU during her 12-year tenure. She began as an equipment manager for the Seminoles and continued her career in an administrative role, primarily working with women's volleyball, basketball and softball. She graduated in April of 1992, from Florida State, with a bachelor of science in physical education.

The following fall, Dawson's title changed once again to Assistant Home Event Manager, a position that provided her the opportunity to coordinate all invitationals, conference championship and NCAA tournaments hosted by FSU.

She was again promoted in August of 1993 to Assistant Director of Athletic Facilities and Operations, a position she held until her departure from FSU for FAU. As FSU's Assistant Director of Facilities, Dawson directly supervised the daily operations of volleyball, soccer and softball and assisted in the daily game operations for tennis and swimming. She also served as the manager for eight athletic facilities was the liaison between FSU and Nike and supervised an equipment staff of five, all while earning a master of science in athletic administration in April of 1996.

She has served as the tournament director or assistant tournament director for ACC Championships, NCAA Regional Championships, a 24-team softball tournament and the 1996 NCAA Division I Women's Tennis Championship.

Ed Hayward came to FAU in March 1996, with the daunting task of establishing a strong compliance office while preparing and guiding the University through the NCAA Self Study. He accomplished task one and has proved invaluable as both a certification officer and as an ear for coaches, players and administrators, especially in problem resolution.

Hayward was rewarded in the winter of 1999 with a promotion to Associate AD at which time he assumed the responsibility of overseeing several sports. He has been a constant through the administrative changes.

Hayward came to FAU after serving as Florida International University's Compliance Retention and Academic Support Athletic Coordinator from January 1992 to February 1996.

While at FIU, he was directly responsible for the academic support of 240 student-athletes, evaluation of incoming transcripts, intervention and retention group for at-risk students, the academic study hall program and interpretation of NCAA bylaws and rules.

Hayward, who received his masters of science in sports administration in December of 1991 from St. Thomas University, came to Florida from Tennessee Technological University where he served as Admissions Counselor for the University's Office of Admissions from 1988 to 1990.

While at Tennessee Tech, he was responsible for gathering academic profiles of recently admitted students, the presentations to prospective students and their parents, community college and high school visits, and evaluation of transcripts.

Hayward, who received his B.A. with an emphasis in journalism in 1988 from Tennessee Tech University, became involved with the support and advisement of Foot Fraternity Inc (football) while working at Tech and continued his community support upon becoming a resident of Miami. He was a four-year letterman for the Golden Eagles ('83-'85, '97) and in the program's extended history is one of seven to rush for 1,000 yards (1,021 '85).

He has been a road race coordinator for the Miami Runners Club and has served on the board of directors. Hayward also volunteers for Boys Town of Florida, Miami division, and was a football coach for the North Miami Parks' Recreation Department.

Terry Mohajir was named Florida Atlantic University's Associate Athletics Director for Development in December 2004, and assumed new responsibilities in December of 2006 as the Associate AD for External Relations. The added responsibilities of overseeing development, marketing, ticket sales, corporate sales and the media relations department are both a compliment to his ability to raise unrestricted dollars necessary to balance the athletic department's budget and the need to centralize efforts.

Since coming to Florida Atlantic he has been heavily involved in creating a comprehensive fundraising program with a focus on major gifts, the annual fund and special events. Since Mohajir arrived, the department has enhanced the major gift program 400 percent, and has increased Owl Club giving 130 percent. In addition, the special events revenues have increased 150 percent. He also coordinates all fundraising efforts for the proposed 170 million dollars worth of facilities expansions.

Mohajir joined the staff after serving in a similar role at the University of Missouri-Kansas City from 1997-2004. As the assistant athletics director for

external relations at UMKC, Mohajir oversaw all marketing and promotions, sports information, fundraising, radio and TV contracts, corporate sales, tickets and event operations. While at UMKC, Mohajir was responsible for a 450 percent increase in the educational athletics endowment. He oversaw an 80 percent increase in sponsorships and an 89 percent upswing in the athletics fund donor base. There was also a 33 percent increase in ticket revenue under his direction. One of his more visible accomplishments was leading the fundraising and construction efforts for a new training room and strength and conditioning center.

Prior to working at UMKC, Mohajir was a football ticket sales and promotions account executive for the University of Kansas from 1996-97, and was an assistant offensive line and gameday special team's football coach for the Jayhawks from 1993-96. Mohajir graduated from Arkansas State with a major in sports management and a minor in marketing in 1993, where he was a starter on the football team. 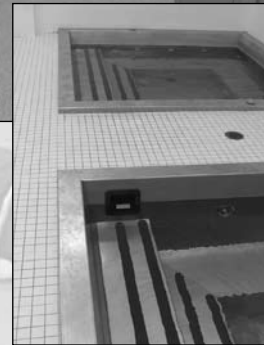

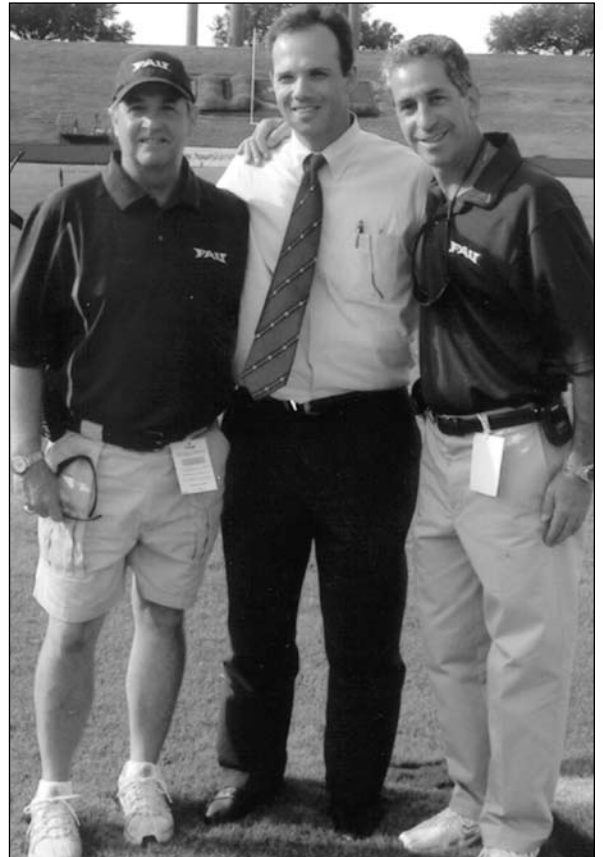

THE TOM OXLEY ATHLETIC CENTER

Tom Oxley, a local businessman, FAU alum and avid polo enthusiast, stepped forward with a donation that allowed the athletic center to become a reality. The 54,000-square-foot, state-of-the-art facility houses the football locker room, training room, weight room, meeting rooms and coaches' offices. The Oxley Center also houses individual locker rooms for women's track, soccer, softball and volleyball, as well as the respective coaches' offices. The athletics director and administrative staff also call the Oxley Center home. All FAU students are welcome to use the computer study labs and classrooms. The facility overlooks the baseball "B" field, FAU Field, FAU Softball Stadium, the Boca Raton Airport and two football practice fields.



TRACK AND FIELD COMPLEX

FAU Track opened on January 11, 2007 and was available for immediate use by FAU's indoor/outdoor track and cross country programs, as well as the entire student body. The \$4.2 million project features FieldTurf in the center of the eight-lane track, along with four long jump pits, a high jump area and two pole vault pits. FAU Track is located directly behind FAU Arena and east of FAU Softball Stadium.



TENNIS COURTS

FAU's men's and women's tennis programs make use of two tennis facilities. The newly renovated FAU courts complete the athletic complex, with six lighted courts nestled among FAU Stadium, the Aquatic Center and FAU Field. The two programs also utilize Patch Reef Park, a facility that houses 17 lighted tennis courts and locker rooms for both teams.

BASEBALL STADIUM

FAU Stadium is home to one of the most respected and successful programs in NCAA baseball history. The Owls, who were ranked as high as no. 8 nationally in 1999, utilize both FAU Stadium and the "B" field, which is used primarily as a practice facility. The "B" field was the original home of the baseball program, but with growing support, FAU Stadium was constructed in 1991. Plans are once again in the works for a new baseball facility as part of Florida Atlantic's efforts to maintain top-notch athletic facilities. FAU Stadium features AAA baseball lighting, is known as the best playing surface in South Florida and recently received an endorsement from Cal Ripken Jr. FAU fans enjoy the beach/picnic atmosphere along each foul line where beach chairs, coolers and family fun are a staple.



FOOTBALL PRACTICE FIELDS

The two full-sized football practice fields behind the Oxley Center are used not only by the Owls' booming football program, but by several other teams within the athletic department as a means for strength training and conditioning. The field features a commemorative memorial, dedicated to the program's first senior class in 2004.



SOCCER CHAMPIONSHIP PLAYING FIELD

FAU Field was completed as part of a 10-year development program to create five on-campus soccer fields in conjunction with the Greater Boca Raton Beach Tax District. FAU hosted the Atlantic Sun Conference women's soccer championship in 2000 and 2003, and the University has served as a practice site for several international teams, Team USA and the women's soccer professional combines. Recently, the U.S. Under-20 team faced Guatemala on FAU Field in front of 1,600 fans.



AQUATIC CENTER

The Aquatic Center features an Olympic-sized meter pool and is home to FAU's men's and women's swimming and diving programs. The pool has hosted the Independent Collegiate Conference Swim Meet and has served as the winter training facility for hundreds of collegiate swimmers and features a diving well for one and three meter events. The dive team also utilizes the facilities at the Coral Springs Aquatic Center for platform practice and competition.



FAU ARENA

FAU Arena opened its doors to women's basketball in 1984. Men's basketball and women's volleyball joined FAU Arena as tenants in 1988. The facility seats 5,000 and underwent a \$10 million renovation in the summer of 2007. In addition to a new roof, renovated men's and women's locker rooms and an upgraded exterior, chair backs were added to the bleachers and a new video scoreboard was hung to give FAU Arena an exciting new feel as the programs grow in the Sun Belt Conference.

SOFTBALL STADIUM

FAU Softball Stadium houses the most successful program in Florida Atlantic's history. Through the assistance of FAU football, Hooters, Inc. and the State of Florida Title IX fund, the Owls can continue their success in one of the top facilities in the country. The Owls, who recently captured their 10th postseason conference championship in the last 11 years, play on a field lined with palm trees and a beautiful view of South Florida sunsets. The stadium is complete with concession stands, a press box and a covered batting cage along with recently remodeled dugouts

purchase of all equipment and the layout of the Tom Oxley Center's Equipment Room. Just four years later, Short was recognized by his peers as the South Region Equipment Manager of the Year.

Short first met Coach Schnellenberger after he transferred from the University of Georgia and became a student manager at the University of Miami, where Schnellenberger was coaching.

Short's 23-year relationship with UM (1977-2000) saw him develop professionally from a student manager to the university's equipment manager, a position he held from 1987 to 2000. He is one of a handful who experienced the team's rise from near extinction to the '80's dominance, to the fall of the early 90's and its return to power in 1999. Short was a member of the staff for three

National Championship teams at the University of Miami ('83, '89, '91).

Short has published two articles on equipment management in *Athletic Business*. He has also served as a speaker at three AEMA (Athletic Equipment Managers Association) conventions on shoulder pad fitting. He is a frequent speaker at high schools throughout Miami-Dade and Broward counties. He also serves on the advisory council for Schutt Athletic, Riddell, and World Sporting Goods.

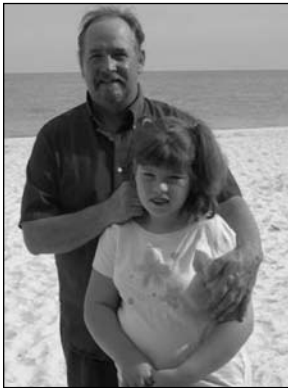
