Minimal invasive surgery through robotic technology

Consultant laparoscopic and robotic cancer surgeon Dr Vishnu Agarwal says that when his patient, Asha Agarwal was told that she was in the first stage of uterine cancer, she was understandably in shock. She thought she was in for a long and painful treatment when she decided to consult Dr Vishnu. She says, "After consulting with him, I was relieved of my anxiety when I was told about minimal invasive surgery through robotic technology. We immediately agreed and he performed a robotic surgery and removed my uterus. This was done by making just centimetre size small holes in my abdomen. A big incision was avoided as done in an open surgery. Although I am a heart patient and have

had an angioplasty earlier, in Dr Vishnu's expert hands and this latest technology, my post-operative recovery period was smooth and almost painless. After a week I was so fit that I was even allowed to fly to Singapore to visit my son. I am thankful to Dr Vishnu and his team for their precise treatment and patience for helping me sail through this trying time." Dr Agarwal, who has specially trained from South Korea and France in laparoscopic and robotic cancer surgery says that medical science has developed in such a way that most radical cancer surgeries can be



done without causing much trauma and pain to patients. "Patients can return to their normal activities fast and cosmetically, it is much better. Even for breast cancer, most times a patient can undergo breast conservation surgery and avoid going for whole breast removal, which is cosmetically better and cure rates are same," he says.
