Methodology:

This poll was conducted between June 29-July 1, 2019 among a national sample of 1472 Registered Voters. The interviews were conducted online and the data were weighted to approximate a target sample of Registered Voters based on age, educational attainment, gender, race, and region. Results from the full survey have a margin of error of plus or minus 3 percentage points.
