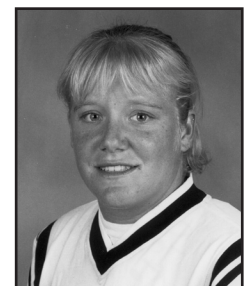



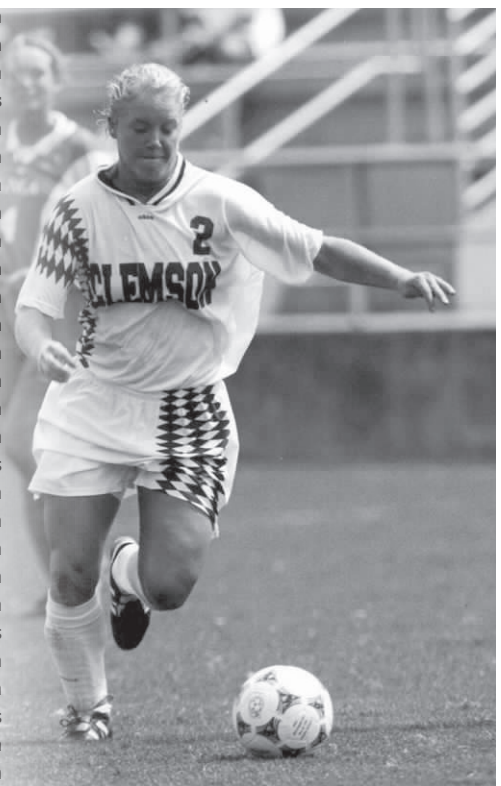

NCAA Quarterfinals Ranked 10th in Final National Poll

The 1997 season was highlighted by the Tigers' first ever appearance in the NCAA Tournament's Final Eight. In the tournament's first round match on November 17, Clemson defeated Georgia 1-0 at Riggs Field. Sophomore forward Jennifer Crawford scored her 17th goal of the season to lead Clemson to victory over the Bulldogs.

In the Round of 16, three Clemson players, sophomore midfielder Beth Keller, junior forward Sheri Bueter, and junior midfielder Sara Burkett, had one goal and one assist each in leading the 10th-ranked Tigers to a 5-0 win over UNC Greensboro at Clemson on November 22. Clemson's season came to an end in the NCAA Quarterfinals with a 3-0 loss to Santa Clara in Santa Clara, CA on November 29.

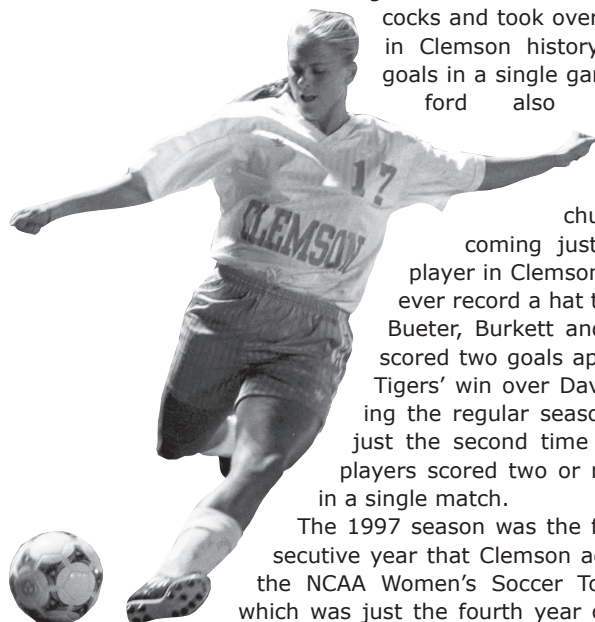
On the season, Clemson was led in goals by Crawford with 17, which ranks her fourth in Tiger history for single season goals. Burkett was Clemson's assist leader, tallying 12 that season and moving into second place in Clemson record books for single season assists. The Tigers notched three wins over top 10 teams, #4 William & Mary, #5 Virginia and #8 Virginia. Burkett became Clemson's first All-American in women's soccer and was named first-team All-ACC for the third straight year. Bueter was also an all-conference selection, and both she and Burkett were named to the NSCAA's All-Southeast Region Team.

Clemson had a six-match winning streak that included wins over fourth-ranked William & Mary, Furman, N.C. State, Florida State and rivals South Carolina and Georgia. Crawford netted four goals in the win over the Gamecocks and took over first place in Clemson history for most goals in a single game. Crawford also recorded a hat trick against Massachusetts, becoming just the third player in Clemson history to ever record a hat trick.

Bueter, Burkett and Crawford scored two goals apiece in the Tigers' win over Davidson during the regular season. It was just the second time that three players scored two or more goals in a single match.

The 1997 season was the fourth consecutive year that Clemson advanced to the NCAA Women's Soccer Tournament, which was just the fourth year of the program's existence.

Sheri Bueter netted five goals and nine assists for the Tigers in 1997, including a goal and an assist in the team's Round of 16 win over UNC-Greensboro.



NCAA Quarterfinals Ranked Sixth in Final National Poll

In 1999, the Tigers advanced to the quarterfinals of the NCAA Women's Soccer Tournament for the second time in the program's six-year history. After receiving a first-round bye, Julie Augustyniak scored with only 41 seconds remaining to give Clemson a 1-0 win over Marquette in the second round match held at Clemson, SC on November 13. It was defender Augustyniak's first goal of the season.

The eighth-ranked Tigers went on to battle 11th-ranked Wake Forest to a 0-0 tie at Riggs Field in the Round of 16 on November 20 and advanced to the Final Eight by winning the penalty kick round 3-1. Freshman Cindy Mullinix scored what proved to be the key penalty kick for Clemson. North Carolina defeated Clemson 3-0 at Chapel Hill in the quarterfinal round on November 27, ending the Tigers' 1999 season.

Clemson finished the year with a 14-7-2 record overall and a 4-3 mark in league play. The Tigers finished sixth in the final NSCAA poll and ninth in the final Soccer America listing. It marked the sixth straight season Clemson advanced to the NCAA Women's Soccer Tournament since 1994, the program's first year.

The Tigers were led in scoring in 1999 by freshman Deliah Arrington with nine goals and seven assists. Beth Keller recorded eight goals and seven assists and freshman Heather Beem had seven goals and seven assists on the season. Clemson goalkeeper Katie Carson posted 12 solo shutouts and allowed only 17 goals in 23 games. She had a then-record 0.74 goals against average and recorded 109 saves. The 109 saves moved her into first place in Tiger record books for single season saves.

Clemson's Keller and Nancy Augustyniak were named First-Team All-ACC, while Julie Augustyniak was named to the second team. Keller, Carson, Nancy Augustyniak and Alison Burpee were all named to the NSCAA All-Southeast Region team. Nancy Augustyniak and Carson were also named to the All-ACC Tournament Team in 1999.

Five Clemson players, Beem, Carson, Rachel Gallegos, Arrington and Keller were named to Soccer America's Team-of-the-Week during various weeks of the season and Beem and Gallegos also garnered Atlantic Coast Conference Player-of-the-Week honors that season.

Defender Julie Augustyniak scored her first goal of the season with 0:41 seconds left on the clock to help the Tigers to a 1-0 victory over Marquette in the second round of the 1999 NCAA Tournament.

NCAA Quarterfinals ACC Regular Season Champions Ranked Fifth in Final National Poll

The Tigers' 2000 season included an ACC regular season title and an appearance in the NCAA Tournament's Final Eight for the second consecutive year. Clemson won 12 straight matches to start the season and set a school record for most consecutive wins at any time during a season.

The Tigers upset number-one ranked North Carolina 2-1 on September 13, marking the program's first ever upset win over a top-ranked team. Deliah Arrington scored the winning goal for Clemson and the team earned a number two national ranking in all three polls following the victory.

Winning the ACC regular season title, Clemson led the 2000 All-ACC women's soccer teams with a school-record four first-team selections in Deliah Arrington, Nancy Augustyniak, Lindsay Browne and Katie Carson. Coach Ray Leone won the Atlantic Coast Conference Coach of the Year award and Browne was named ACC Freshman of the Year as well as to the ACC All-Freshman team. Julie Augustyniak and Browne were members of the All-ACC Tournament Team in 2000.

The Tigers finished the year ranked seventh in the final Soccer America poll and fifth in the final NSCAA poll. In the NCAA Tournament, Clemson defeated Duke 2-1 in the second round at Riggs Field on November 11 and then defeated Florida State 2-0 in the Round of 16 on November 17, also on Riggs Field. In the quarterfinals, UCLA ended the Tigers' season by winning 2-1 at Clemson on November 25.

Junior goalkeeper Katie Carson recorded 59 saves on the season and posted a goals allowed average of 0.63, which put her in first place in Tiger record books for single season goals allowed average.

Nancy Augustyniak was named a second-team All-American by the NSCAA and Lindsay Browne was honored as the National Freshman of the Year by Soccer America. Nancy Augustyniak, Deliah Arrington, Julie Augustyniak and Browne were named All-Americans by SoccerTimes.com. Head Coach Ray Leone was named Southeast Region Coach of the Year by the NSCAA and four Clemson players were named to the NSCAA All-Southeast Region Team in 2000.

NCAA Quarterfinals Ranked Tied for 14th in Final National Poll

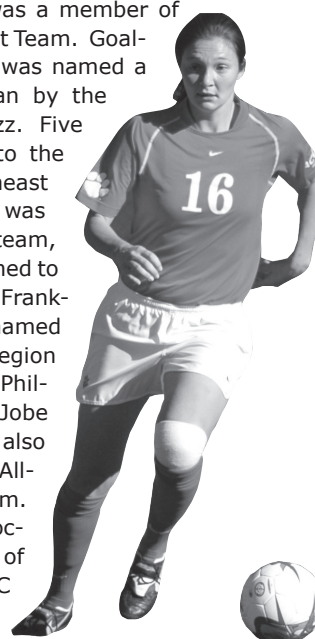
The 2006 season marked the fourth time in program history that the Tigers have advanced to the NCAA Quarterfinals. In the first round of the tournament, Clemson battled Vanderbilt to a 1-1 tie and then advanced on penalty kicks 4-3 on November 10 at Riggs Field. The Tigers then faced Oklahoma State in the second round at Riggs on November 12. The game was scoreless in regulation and Clemson won the penalty kick round by a score of 4-2.

In the Round of 16 in Stanford, CA on November 17, Clemson faced Stanford and had a third-straight match advance to penalty kicks after ending in a tie in regulation (0-0). Clemson won 4-2 in the penalty kick round, marking the third consecutive match the Tigers tied and advanced by winning penalty kicks. The Tigers made NCAA soccer history by becoming the first team ever to advance three consecutive matches in tournament play by winning penalty kicks.

The 21st-ranked Tigers then faced ACC foe and fifth-ranked Florida State in the Final Eight on November 24, falling 2-1 at Tallahassee for only their second loss in 11 matches. Clemson finished the season with an 11-8-5 overall record and a 5-3-1 mark in conference play. Molly Franklin led the team in scoring with six goals and four assists for 16 points. Clemson finished 15th in the Soccer Buzz final poll and in a tie for 14th in the final NSCAA poll.

Four Tigers were named to the All-ACC team, as Julie Bolt, Elizabeth Jobe and Ashley Phillips were named to the second team and Katie Vogel was named to the All-ACC Freshman Team. Forward Meghan Smith was a member of the All-ACC Tournament Team. Goalkeeper Ashley Phillips was named a third-team All-American by the NSCAA and Soccer Buzz. Five players were named to the Soccer Buzz All-Southeast Region team. Phillips was named to the first team, Bolt and Jobe were named to the second team and Franklin and Vogel were named to the Southeast Region All-Freshman team. Phillips (first team) and Jobe (second team) were also named to the NSCAA's All-Southeast Region team. Vogel was named to Soccer America's Team of the Week and the ACC Player-of-the-Week for the week of Oct. 17.

April 3, 1993 - Clemson announced that it would field a women's soccer team for the 1994 season.

June 30, 1993 - Tracey Leone was named Clemson's first-ever women's soccer coach.

August 20, 1993 - Tracey Leone started work at Clemson University.

September 4, 1994 - Clemson played its first-ever women's soccer match against North Carolina at Chapel Hill. The top-ranked Tar Heels defeated the Tigers 7-0.

September 9, 1994 - The Tigers played their first home match against Loyola (MD). Keri Nelson recorded the Tigers' first-ever goal at the 28:09 mark in the game. Nikki Tompkins was credited with the first assist in program history. Clemson earned its first-ever women's soccer victory by a score of 5-1.

September 18, 1994 - Clemson upset #15 Vanderbilt 2-1 in overtime in Nashville. It was the program's first win over a ranked team. The Commodores were ranked 15th in the ISAA poll and 16th by Soccer America.

September 26, 1994 - Clemson entered the national rankings for the first time in program history. The Tigers were ranked 17th by the ISAA and 19th by Soccer America.

October 15, 1994 - Clemson won its first Atlantic Coast Conference match with a 4-2 victory over N.C. State at home. Ironically, the Tiger men's team won their first conference match over N.C. State on November 11, 1967.

November 2, 1994 - The Tigers' Carmie Landeen and Sheri Bueter were named second-team All-ACC as announced by the league's office. Landeen was also named ACC Rookie-of-the-Year.

November 3, 1994 - Clemson lost to N.C. State in overtime in the first round of the ACC Tournament in Chapel Hill, NC. It was the first-ever match played in the conference tournament for the Tigers.

November 6, 1994 - Clemson received its first-ever bid to the NCAA Women's Soccer Tournament. The Tigers were the only first-year team in the nation to earn a bid.

November 9, 1994 - Clemson played N.C. State to a 1-1 tie after 150 minutes of the Tigers' first-ever NCAA Tournament match, but the Wolfpack advanced to the next round by winning penalty kicks, 5-4.

September 29-30, 1995 - The Tigers won the Clemson Tournament with a 6-0 victory over Florida State and a 7-0 defeat of South Carolina.

October 17, 1995 - Clemson claimed its 25th all-time victory in a 4-0 win over UNC-Asheville.

November 1, 1995 - Meredith McCullen and Sara Burkett were named first-team All-ACC and Carmie Landeen earned second-team all-conference honors.

November 6, 1995 - Clemson finished the season ranked 16th in the ISAA poll and 15th according to the Soccer America listing.

November 12, 1995 - The Tigers lost to Texas A&M by a score of 4-1 in the first round of the 1995 NCAA Tournament in College Station, TX.

September 13-14, 1996 - Clemson defeated Virginia 2-1 on September 13 and Georgia Washington 2-0 on September 14 en route to winning the Virginia Invitational.

November 1, 1996 - The Tigers defeated eighth-ranked Maryland by a score of 2-0 at Historic Riggs Field, recording the program's first-ever win over a top-10 team.

November 6, 1996 - Sara Burkett was named to the All-ACC first team and Beth Keller was a member of the conference's second-team.

November 7-10, 1996 - The Tigers played host to the ACC Tournament on Historic Riggs Field. Clemson lost to North Carolina in the championship game by a score of 4-1. The Tigers appeared on television in the semifinal and championship games, marking the first time that the team had ever been on television.

November 11, 1996 - Clemson finished 11th in the final Soccer America poll.

November 17, 1996 - The Tigers lost to Wake Forest 2-1 in the first round of the NCAA Women's Soccer Tournament held in Clemson, SC.

December 12, 1996 - Clemson was ranked 18th in the final NSCAA poll.

September 23, 1997 - Clemson recorded its 50th all-time win in history with a 2-1 victory at N.C. State.

November 6, 1998 - Beth Keller netted two goals in the Tigers' ACC Tournament semifinal win over Virginia, who was ranked 13th in the nation entering the contest.

November 8, 1998 - North Carolina defeated Clemson in the ACC Championship game at Orlando, FL. The game was televised live.

November 11, 1998 - Clemson finished 11th in the final Soccer America poll.

November 15, 1998 - The Tigers defeated 11th-ranked Vanderbilt in the Round of 32 at the NCAA Women's Soccer Tournament. The win was Clemson's 16th of the season.

November 21, 1998 - Penn State defeated Clemson 1-0 in the NCAA Tournament Round of 16 at State College, PA.

December 9, 1998 - Clemson finished 11th in the final NSCAA poll.

November 13, 1999 - Clemson's Julie Augustyniak scored with 0:41 seconds left in regulation as the Tigers defeated Marquette 1-0 in the second round of the NCAA Women's Soccer Tournament.

November 20, 1999 - Clemson and Wake Forest tied 0-0 in the NCAA Tournament Round of 16 at Historic Riggs Field, but the Tigers advanced to the quarterfinals via penalty kicks.

Head Coach Ray Leone was named the Southeast Region Coach-of-the-Year.

Defender Nancy Augustyniak was the 33rd overall pick and defender Julie Augustyniak was the 64th overall pick as the twins were both drafted by the Atlanta Beat. Midfielder Amy Gray was the 90th pick overall by the Washington Freedom and forward Beth Keller was selected 98th overall by the Philadelphia Charge. Lindsay Massengale, a defender, was taken as the 108th overall pick by the Boston Breakers.

December 30, 2000 - Ray Leone resigned as the head coach of the Tigers to become the head coach at Arizona State.

September 12-14, 2003 - Clemson defeated Dayton 2-0 and Rhode Island 2-0 as the Tigers won the Furman Invitational.

November 3, 2003 - Courtney Foster was named ACC Player-of-the-Week for the second consecutive week, becoming the first Tiger in history to garner the conference weekly honor in consecutive weeks.

November 14, 2003 - Clemson advanced to the NCAA Tournament for the 10th consecutive season. Georgia defeated the Tigers in the first round in Knoxville, TN.

November 12, 2004 - The Tigers reached the NCAA Tournament for the 11th straight season. Clemson fell to Auburn 2-0 in the first round of the tournament.

October 20, 2005 - Clemson upset eighth-ranked Duke 1-0 at Riggs Field. Courtney Foster scored the match's lone goal.

November 1, 2005 - Courtney Foster, Allison Graham and Ashley Phillips were named to the All-ACC Second Team.

November 11, 2005 - Clemson fell to Virginia Commonwealth in the first round of the NCAA Tournament. It was the 12th consecutive season that the Tigers received a bid to the national tournament.

December 14, 2005 - Goalkeeper Ashley Phillips was named to the NSCAA All-Southeast Region First Team.

September 9-11, 2006 - Clemson defeated Furman 4-0 and Charlotte 3-0 to win the Carolina's Cup tournament in Greenville, SC.

October 15, 2006 - The Tigers upset ninth-ranked Wake Forest 2-1 at Historic Riggs Field.

October 31, 2006 - Julie Bolt, Elizabeth Jobe and Ashley Phillips were named to the All-ACC Second Team and Katie Vogel was named to the All-ACC Freshman Team.

November 10, 2006 - Clemson tied Vanderbilt 1-1 after two overtime periods in the first round of the NCAA Tournament in Clemson, SC. The Tigers advanced to the tournament's second round by winning penalty kicks 4-3.

November 12, 2006 - Clemson and Oklahoma State played to a 0-0 draw in the NCAA Tournament's second round at Historic Riggs Field. Clemson won the penalty kick round 4-2 to reach the NCAA Final 16.

November 17, 2006 - The Tigers achieved an NCAA Tournament first by advancing three consecutive matches in tournament play by winning penalty kicks. Previously tying Vanderbilt and Oklahoma State and advancing by way of penalty kicks, on this date, Clemson tied Stanford 0-0 in Stanford, CA and won the penalty kick round 4-2 to reach the NCAA Tournament Quarterfinals.

November 24, 2006 - Clemson fell to Florida State in the NCAA Tournament Quarterfinals. It was the Tigers' fourth trip to the national quarterfinals in the program's 13-year history.

December 6, 2006 - Ashley Phillips was named a third-team All-American by the NSCAA. Phillips (first team) and Elizabeth Jobe (third team) were named to the NSCAA All-Southeast Region team. Phillips was also a third-team All-American according to Soccer Buzz.

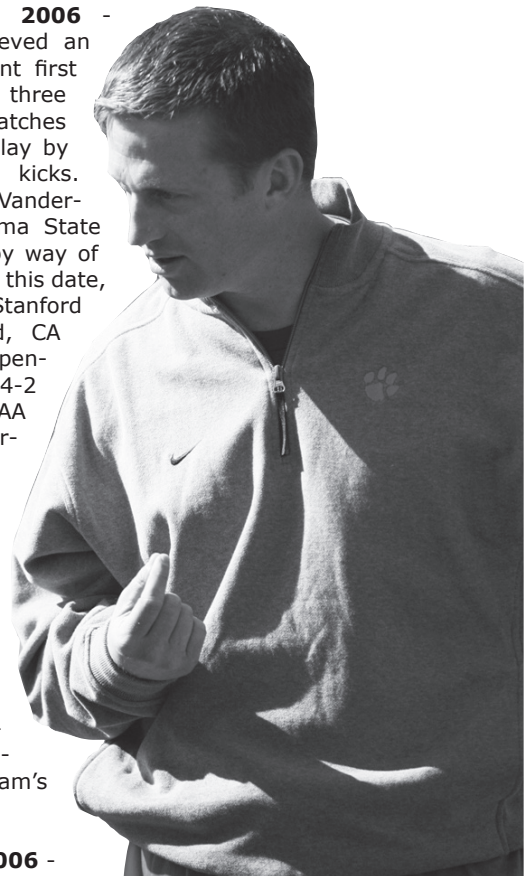
November 7, 2007 - Ashley Phillips was named First Team All-ACC and Julie Bolt and Elizabeth Jobe earned second team honors. The three players combined have amassed eight career all-conference honors.

November 16, 2007 - The Tigers were selected to the NCAA Tournament for the 14th consecutive season. Clemson came back from a two goal deficit to defeat Charlotte 4-2 in the first round before falling to #15 Tennessee 1-0 in double overtime in the second round of the tournament.

November 30, 2007 - Todd Bramble resigned as the coach of Clemson to become the head coach at Alabama.

January 14, 2008 - Hershey Strosberg was named the fourth head coach in Clemson women's soccer program history.

October 6, 2008 - Former Tiger All-American Nancy Augustyniak Goffi was the 11th overall pick in the Women's Professional Soccer League draft by the Boston Breakers. Another former star, Jenny Anderson-Hammond, was the 22nd overall pick in the draft, by the NJ/NY Sky Blue FC.



Hershey Strosberg was named the Head Coach of the Tigers on January 14, 2008.



The 2006 Tigers made NCAA soccer history by becoming the first men's or women's team in history to advance three consecutive matches in tournament play by winning penalty kicks.
