Mission & Goals Statement of the Department of Athletics

The Georgetown University Department of Athletics, as part of a university with roots in the Jesuit tradition of education, commits itself to the comprehensive development of the student. The interdependence of the physical, emotional, moral and intellectual aspects of personal growth requires simultaneous and balanced focus. This objective does not imply that each facet of an individual's psychological, social and academic growth is of equal importance. It does require that Georgetown provide the means and encouragement for each person to develop according to his or her own interests and abilities. This is especially true in athletics, whether at the recreational, intercollegiate, intramural or instructional level. In addition to physical development, the Department of Athletics promotes principles of character, development and sportsmanship within the framework of an abiding and broadened commitment to community. Accordingly, the Athletics Department is committed to, fosters and pursues the fair and equitable treatment of both men and women, and the provision of equitable access and opportunities for minority students and institutional personnel.

Anti-Discrimination Policy

In accordance with the requirements of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972, and Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, and the implementing regulations promulgated under each of these federal statutes, Georgetown University does not discriminate in its programs, activities, or employment practices on the basis of race, color, national origin, sex, age or disability. The University's compliance program under these statutes and regulations is supervised by Rosemary Kilkenny, Special Assistant to the President of Affirmative Action Programs. Title IX And NCAA Peer Review

The Georgetown University Athletics Department has recently undergone two extensive reviews of its athletic programs: an audit by the Department of Education concerning Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972, and Georgetown's inaugural review under the NCAA's new Athletics Certification program. The Department of Education has found Georgetown's athletic programs to be in compliance with Title IX, and the University was certified by the NCAA in November of 1995.

NCAA Position on Gambling

The NCAA opposes all forms of legal and illegal sports wagering. Sports wagering has the potential to undermine the integrity of sports contests and jeopardizes the welfare of student-athletes and the intercollegiate community. Sports wagering demeans the competition and competitors alike by a message that is contrary to the purposes and meaning of "sport." Sports competition should be appreciated for the inherent benefits related to participation of student-athletes, coaches and institutions in fair contests, not the amount of money wagered on the outcome of the competition. For these reasons, the NCAA membership has adopted specific rules prohibiting athletics department staff members and student-athletes from engaging in gambling activities as they relate to intercollegiate or professional sporting events.

2005 OUTLOOK

Head coach Dave Nolan and the Georgetown women's soccer team begin the 2005 season with hopes of continuing their success from the previous season. In Nolan's first season as head coach, the GU women's soccer team ended the year with an overall record of 9-9-1 and a 5-4-1 fifth-place record in the conference, marking their highest finish ever in BIG EAST play. They also advanced to the BIG EAST Championship for the second time in three years.

Georgetown faces the challenge of replacing the graduated seniors from 2004 whose experience translated to leadership on the field. The team will need to replace three seniors, one defensive player: Casey McCann; one midfielder: Nicole DePalma; and one defender: Elizabeth Roberti. DePalma was a captain her senior year and was also an All-BIG EAST Second-Team selection. However, the Hoyas have a strong returning squad as well as an impressive incoming freshman class.

FORWARDS

Senior Shara McNeill will be the anchor and is expected to play an important role on this season's team. McNeill led the team with seven assists in 2004

Sophomore Elaina Filauro returns to the Hoyas this season on the attack. She started 13 games for the Hoyas in 2004 while playing in 18. She also scored her first goal as a Hoya against St. John's. Sophomore Sarah Fetters will be back on the front this season where she played 17 games in 2004.

Joining them on the attack is incoming freshman Brittany Berry. Berry played for the Bethesda Eclipse last year as well as participating on the Georgetown Visitation soccer team earning Washington Post All-Metropolitan honors as well as All-Conference.

MIDFIELDERS

The midfield will be one of the biggest strengths this year. Sophomore Sara Jordan is returning to the midfield where she started in all 19 games last season and was second in scoring, assists and points. Redshirt senior Alexandra Hardy participated in every game last season.

Junior Chrissy Skogen will also be returning. A member of the All-Hoya Classic Team, Skogen also scored the tying goal against Villanova in 2004. Fellow junior, Cristina Araps, returns to the midfield and also has experience on defense. A versatile player who is dangerous from all points on the field, she earned a spot on the BIG EAST All-Rookie Team in 2003.

Junior Shante Cofield will again help the midfield after participating in 12 games in 2004. Sophomore Lindsey Appezzato and incoming freshmen Laura Snyder and Stephanie Zare will learn from the experience of their fellow players while contending for playing time.

DAVE NOLAN

Head Coach • Second Season Career Record: 9-9-1 (.500)

Dave Nolan begins his second year as head coach with the Hoyas but has been the assistant



for Georgetown for the past five years. In his first season, the Hoyas had their best-ever regular-season BIG EAST finish by ending the year in fifth place. While an assistant, Nolan coordinated recruiting, developed goalkeepers and worked closely with head coach Diane Drake in all aspects

of preparing the team. He brings a wide range of coaching experience to the Hilltop, having played and coached at various national and international levels.

Nolan came to GU in 1999 after spending the 1998 season on the Seton Hall women's soccer staff, serving as the goalkeeper coach. In addition, he was the Director of Coaching at the Emerald Soccer School in South Orange, N.J. Nolan spent the summer of 1999





University during the 1997 fall season. Before moving into the college ranks, he was hired in January 1997 as a director of the prestigious Soccer Plus Goalkeeping Academy, run by former US National Women's Team coach and current commissioner of the WUSA, Tony DiCicco, a position Nolan still holds.

In addition to coaching at Georgetown, Nolan has helped to develop players for the U-16, U-17, U-19 and U-21 U.S. National teams. He is the coach for the DC U-17 team, Super Y, where he helped lead them to a national championship appearance in 2003.

Nolan is also the coach of the U-18
Bethesda Excel, a club soccer team who has made an unprecedented three consecutive national championship appearances resulting in Bethesda Excel being the two-time national runners-up.
Bethesda Excel was the Region 1
Champions in 2003, 2004, and 2005. Additionally, the team has always been ranked in the top two between 2003 and 2005.

A member of the National Team Pool in Ireland at the Youth Level, Nolan came to the United States and played soccer at Seton Hall. A four-year starter, he led the Pirates to four-consecutive NCAA tournament berths and two BIG EAST Conference championships. Selected to the 1987 BIG EAST Conference Tournament Team, Nolan was named the BIG EAST Conference Student-Athlete of the Year in 1991. Nolan was a New Jersey State Under-23 team selection in 1992 and a New Jersey Senior Side representative from 1993 to 1997. He received a bachelor's degree in Finance in 1991 and later earned a master's degree in Business Administration in 1993, also from Seton Hall.

Nolan holds an advanced national license from the National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA) and a United States Soccer Federation "A" license. In addition, he works with the U-15 Regional staff. Nolan is a Maryland ODP coach, holding international credentials including an Irish FA Preliminary badge and a coaching diploma from the KNVB (Royal Dutch Soccer Association).

COACHING STAFF

NAOMI HINES

Assistant Coach • Third Season

Naomi Hines enters her third year as an assistant coach with the Hoyas. Hines' specialty with the team is training goalkeepers. In addition to coaching at GU, Hines works with the Under 12 Sterling Avalanche



(2003-present), who were the ODSL Division I Champions for one season and the runners-up for two.

She worked as a goalkeeper coach for the Bethesda Excel (with Georgetown head coach Dave Nolan), the 2005 national runner-up,

whose goalkeeper won the Golden Glove. Prior to her work with the Avalanche and Excel, Hines worked the George Mason University Soccer Camps (2000-04) and the Soccer Plus Goalkeeper Camps (2002).

Hines currently plays on the Northern Virginia Majestics (1999; 2003-present), a women's soccer league team. Before joining the Majestics, Hines played for the Maryland Pride (2000-02).

Hines graduated in 2003 from George Mason, having played all four years of her college career. She earned honors such as the NSCAA Regional All-American, Soccer Buzz Regional All-American, First-Team All-Virginia and First-Team All-CAA. She graduated with honors earning her degree in English, was a CAA Scholar Athlete all four years, received the CAA Commissioner's Academic Award (2003) and was on the Dean's List all four years.

TAMMY PEARMAN

Assistant Coach • Second Season

Tammy Pearman, a two-time collegiate All-American and member of the U.S. Women's National Soccer Team, enters her second season on the Georgetown staff. In her playing career, Pearman was a four-year letterman on George Mason's soccer team and helped lead the Patriots to a second

place finish in the NCAA championship game in 1993. She was twice named an All-American and Scholar-Athlete in her time at Mason.

While with the U.S. Women's National Team from 1995 to 1997,

Pearman scored the winning


goal in sudden-death overtime to clinch the U.S. Cup championship. She was a member of the U.S. Women's National Soccer Team player pool that trained for the 1996 Olympic games and subsequently competed in various professional leagues.

Pearman played for the Oki F.C. Winds of the Japanese Professional Women's Soccer League, as well as with the Women's Semi-Professional Maryland Pride team and the New York Power of the Women's United Soccer Association.

A. LEIGH MAURELLI

Head Strength & Conditioning Coach Fifth Season

"Augie" Leigh Maurelli joined the Georgetown athletic department staff in January of 2001 as a strength and conditioning coach of the football program. In the fall of 2003, Maurelli assumed the



Prior to his arrival at the Hilltop, Maurelli played four

years of varsity football at Johns Hopkins, where he obtained a Bachelor of Science degree in Mechanical Engineering in 1997 and subsequently served as an assistant football coach for three years. In 1996 he set several university records, including a combined lift of 1,380 pounds in the bench press, clean and squat.

In 2002, Maurelli received a Master of Business Administration degree in Finance from Georgetown University's McDonough School of Business.

In addition to professional positions that he held at Johnson Controls in Baltimore from 1997-2000, Goldman Sachs & Co. in New York during the summer of 2001, and his current position as a Research Associate at MCG Capital in Washington, D.C., Maurelli is also a certified USOC Competitor and Coach, CSCS, registered USWF lifter and has been featured in *Ironman* magazine.

The 2004 women's soccer team ended a successful season with its best record since 2002. With first-year head coach Dave Nolan, the squad reached the BIG EAST Championship tournament for the second time in three years, just nearly missing the semifinals. The team finished with an overall record of 9-9-1 and a 5-4-1 conference mark.

Along with the team's success, there were individual postseason accolades as well. Senior captain Nicole DePalma was named to the All-BIG EAST Second Team, and junior forward Shara McNeill earned All-BIG EAST Third-Team honors. During the season, DePalma and sophomore Chrissy Skogen were named to the Hoya Classic All-Classic Team. In addition, DePalma was named the BIG EAST Offensive Player of the Week (Oct. 25), as well as being named the ECAC Player of the Week for Oct. 26.

Freshman defender Karen Waskewich was named to the Soccer America Team of the Week for her efforts during the week of Oct. 26. Also, freshman goalkeeper Jade Higgins was named Rookie of the Week during the week of Sept. 27. One Hoya was honored as COSIDA

Academic All-America as senior captain Casey McCann earned All-District II Second-Team honors.

The Hoyas climbed the record books during the 2004 campaign. In career statistics, DePalma ended her career placing second in career points with 62 and first in career assists with 22. McCann placed tied for sixth in career goals (15). McNeill follows closely behind DePalma in career assists with 14, tied for fourth. In single-season records, DePalma ranked third in points with 22, as well as ranking second in goals with nine. Freshman Sara Jordan tied for eighth in goals with seven, as well as sixth in assists with six. In addition, McNeill tied for third in single season assists with seven.

Georgetown got the 2004 season off to a strong start, notching a 7-1 victory over visiting cross-town opponent Howard and giving Nolan his first career victory as head coach. Jordan, Laura Boova and Karen Waskewich all tallied their first career points as Hoyas. The Hoyas next traveled to Bucknell, where they shutout the Bison 4-0. Keeper Higgins recorded her first career shutout, and McNeill notched the game-winning goal.



2004 REVIEW

The Hoyas looked to continue their winning ways into the Hoya Classic, where they hosted Dartmouth, Quinnipiac and George Washington. Georgetown faced Dartmouth in the first game of the Classic, but two goals by Dartmouth handed the Hoyas their first loss of the season. Despite the loss, the Hoyas were ready for the second game against Quinnipiac where the Hoyas

were victorious, 5-1, gaining momentum before a three-game road series.

Georgetown next traveled to George Mason where the Hoyas faced William & Mary. Despite a hard fought game, the Hoyas would drop the game to the Colonials 3-0. Georgetown looked to rebound against George Mason two days later, but the Hoyas would again fall 3-1, despite a one-goal deficit with 14 minutes remaining in the game. After the two losses and the BIG EAST regular season only two games away, the Hoyas traveled back to D.C. to face cross-town opponent American hoping to gain a win. Unfortunately, the Eagles would top the Hoyas by a score of 3-1.

In the first BIG EAST regular-season matchup against St. John's, the Hoyas were fired up and came out ready to play. Ali Hawkins scored the game winning goal 37:22 into the matchup. Freshman Sarah Fetters added an insurance goal at the 44-minute mark for her first career point, while Alexandra Hardy

knocked one in less than two minutes into the second half. The 3-0 shutout was the second of Higgins' career. As they next traveled to Providence, the Hoyas brought momentum as they topped the Friars 1-0. McNeill scored the game winner with only seven minutes left in regulation.

On a two-game winning streak in BIG EAST play, the Hoyas traveled to Connecticut hoping to keep the streak alive. Despite scoring first and leading going into the second half, the Huskies scored two quick goals and kept the lead for the rest of the game. The Hoyas were defeated 3-1. Georgetown next hosted Rutgers at home, looking for a BIG EAST victory that would help secure a spot in post season play. Things didn't go as planned for Hoyas as the Scarlet Knights scored twice to claim victory 2-0. Facing national prominence, the Hoyas hosted the No. 1 nationally ranked Irish of Notre Dame. Hoping for a little luck and a few goals to get back on the winning side, Georgetown scored first, but the Irish scored less than a minute later to tie the game. It looked as though the game may have been headed into overtime, but with 44 seconds remaining, the Irish snuck one in the goal to claim victory 2-1.

After losing the close game to Notre Dame,
Georgetown traveled to Villanova hoping for a victory.
With a header by Skogen off a cross from Cristina
Araps, the Hoyas faced off in overtime against the
Wildcats. With both teams having
scoring opportunities, but none
able to capitalize, the Hoyas would
settle for a 1-1 tie.

With the tie against Villanova, the Hoyas looked to build on the great effort against Syracuse and gain a win to secure a bid to the BIG EAST Championship. However, the win wasn't to be as Syracuse scored a goal only three minutes into the game and iced the victory with another with only four minutes remaining. Despite the loss, the Hoyas rebounded in a non-league victory over Liberty, demonstrating their drive and determination after being down 1-0 at half. DePalma led the Hoyas in the comeback over Liberty, scoring two goals and the final lifting the Hoyas over the Flames 4-1.

In their final home matchup, the Hoyas hosted the Pirates of Seton Hall. The Hoyas kept the momentum of their victory over Liberty and shutout the Pirates 2-0. Jordan scored the game winner off an assist from Laura Boova.

Knowing that the last two BIG EAST games were crucial for the postseason

bid, the Hoyas faced No. 16 West Virginia. Waskewich came through for the Hoyas, scoring the lone goal of the game only 8:32 into the matchup off a free kick. A little luck and determination was on Georgetown's side, as the final left the Hoyas up 1-0. Georgetown carried the win with them as they stomped on Pittsburgh 4-0, claiming a bid to the BIG EAST Championship.

The Hoyas traveled to Boston College for the first round of the BIG EAST Championship, and after a scoreless first half for both teams, BC knocked in a goal at the 72-minute mark for the win. The loss would end the season for the Hoyas.

Despite the season of momentum gains and losses, the Hoyas were able to build on the wins by the end of the season and use wins for a successful 2005 season. The 2004 Hoyas ended with a final mark of 9-9-1 overall and a 5-4-1 record in BIG EAST play. GU returns nine starters, after the graduation of seniors DePalma, McCann and Elizabeth Roberti.

ATHLETIC ADMINISTRATION

JOHN DEGIOIA

University President

John J. "Jack" DeGioia is Georgetown University's 48th President. He began working at Georgetown



after graduating in 1979 and has held various positions of increasing responsibility throughout the University. From 1998 until June 2001 DeGioia served as Senior Vice President, overseeing University-wide operations for financial affairs, information technology, facilities and

student housing, human resources, athletics, general counsel and other areas.

From 1992 to 1998 DeGioia served as Chief Administrative Officer of Georgetown's Main Campus, which consists of undergraduate and graduate programs. He oversaw an annual budget in excess of \$200 million and all of Georgetown University's Main Campus operations, including undergraduate admissions, student financial aid, finance and budget, athletics, student affairs, academic computing services, facilities, minority student affairs and the student career center.

DeGioia served as Georgetown University's Dean of Student Affairs from 1985 to 1992. In this capacity, he supervised the departments of student life, student services and facilities, athletics, career planning, student health, counseling and psychiatry

and public safety, with combined budgets of more than \$35 million and a staff of 250.

DeGioia earned a bachelor's degree in English from Georgetown University in 1979 and his Ph.D. in philosophy in 1995. He served as assistant to then-Georgetown University president Timothy S. Healy, S.J. from

1982 to 1985. He is married to Theresa Miller DeGioia (C '89). They have one child.

BERNARD MUIR

Director of Athletics

Georgetown University named Bernard M. Muir to be Director of Athletics, effective July 1, 2005. As Director of Athletics, Muir oversees the operations of all Georgetown University intercollegiate and intramural athletic programs, which include more than 100 coaches and staff who support more than

650 student-athletes participating in 27 sports, the majority of which compete in the BIG EAST Conference. He is the 10th person in Georgetown's history to serve as Director of Athletics.

Muir previously served as Deputy Director of Athletics for Administration and Facilities at the University of Notre Dame,

where he oversaw campus athletics facilities, game management operations and club and intramural sports and recreation. He has served as primary administrator for a number of sports and as secondary administrator for football. Prior to that position, he served as Senior Associate Athletic Director for Student Welfare and Development, where he handled issues related to student-athlete recruitment, integration into campus life and academic performance.

Muir was an eight-year staff member at the NCAA and the director of the Division I NCAA Men's Basketball Championship. He joined the NCAA staff in

December 1992 as assistant director of the Division I Men's Basketball Championship

and was promoted to director in August 1998. 

WELCOME TO GEORGETOWN

Combining the tradition of being the oldest Catholic institution of higher learning in the United States (founded in 1789) with an awareness of

ever-changing educational needs, Georgetown University continues to challenge the minds of young women and men eager to learn.

Georgetown University's
104-acre campus is perched
on a hilltop overlooking the
Potomac River and includes
more than 60 buildings.
Among these buildings
are the solar-powered
Edward B. Bunn Intercultural
Center, the Vincent T. Lombardi
Cancer Research Center and the
Thomas and Dorothy Leavey Center
which contains the University's
bookshop and a Marriott hotel
with 150 rooms.

The Yates Field House, a four-level complex opened in 1979, offers recreational and relaxation opportunities for sports-minded University students. Among the features at Yates are four basketball courts, four squash courts, a volleyball court, weight training area, jogging track, an eight-lane pool with separate diving well, two exercise/dance rooms and fully-stocked Pro Shop.

Georgetown is represented in intercollegiate varsity sports by 27 men's and women's teams. The intramural program offers 23 different leagues with women's, men's dorm and open divisions. The Leisure

and Recreation Education Department offers instructional course in such activities as modern dance, fitness and aerobics.

The total enrollment of
13,164 students includes 6,537
undergraduates and 6,627
students seeking degrees in
the graduate, law and medical
schools. The University is served
by 1,095 full-time and 317
part-time faculty.

Georgetown University focuses its wide-ranging



curriculum on international studies, languages and linguistics, government, politics, business and nursing. The School of Foreign Service was the first of its kind and is the largest in the nation; the Law Center is the largest in the country, with an active clinical program; and the Medical Center includes a 535-bed private teaching hospital.

The success of the University's philosophy and endeavors is reflected in the student body and applicant pool. Students come from all 50 states and 132 foreign countries. Georgetown maintains competitive admissions standards, accepting only 23 percent of its applicants for the freshman class of 2008.

WHAT'S A HOYA?

Many years ago, when all Georgetown students were required to study Greek and Latin, the University's teams were nicknamed "The Stonewalls." It is suggested that a student, using Greek and Latin terms, started the cheer "Hoya Saxa!" which translates into "What Rocks!" The name proved popular, and the term "Hoyas" was eventually adopted for all Georgetown teams.

GEORGETOWN SOCCER
