

FUNERAL OF FATHER SAUVAL.

Number of Priests Will Attend at Fall River To-day.

FALL RIVER, Mass., May 5.—The affection for the Rev. Father Charles B. Sauval, O. S. D., late pastor of St. Anne's Church, was shown in a remarkable way this afternoon when practically the entire French-Canadian population of the city, 25,000 in number, witnessed the transfer of the priest's body from the rectory to the church. The body was taken under the escort of the semi-military bodies of the Catholic parishes of the city. The bearers of the casket were from the parish, while the honorary bearers included the Rev. Father Rouleau of Ottawa.

In the church the service for the dead was chanted by the Rev. Father Gauthier of St. Hyacinthe, P. Q., Provincial Superior of the order. The funeral will occur in the morning, Bishop Hawkins of the Providence Diocese officiating. The body will be placed in a crypt in the church.

There are priests here from all over the eastern part of the United States and Canada, especially those of the Dominican order.

State Senator Russell Dead.

TROY, N. Y., May 6.—Senator Michael Russell died at his home in this city about 1 o'clock this morning. Senator Russell was stricken with apoplexy in the Senate Chamber a few weeks ago, when he was carried out by other Senators and conveyed to the Albany Hospital. Last Thursday he was brought to his residence in this city, and had failed rapidly since. Mr. Russell was born in this city in 1844. He enlisted in the One Hundred and Sixty-ninth New York Volunteers in the civil war and served three years, returning home after being severely wounded, with a Captain's brevet. Later he entered the grocery business, in which he remained until his death. He served in the Assembly in 1898, 1899, and 1900, and in the Senate during the last session.

Sir Dinshaw Manockjee Petit Dead.

BOMBAY, May 5.—Sir Dinshaw Manockjee Petit, the well-known millionaire and Parsee philanthropist, is dead.

Sir Dinshaw, who was born in 1823, was created a Baronet in 1890. He was a merchant and magistrate in the Bombay Presidency, and a member of the Supreme Legislative Council of Calcutta.

JAMES CHADWICK, a prominent business man of Newburg, died there Saturday, aged seventy-one years. He was born in England, and came to America in 1859. He was President of the Newburg Bleachery.
