Edward Fowler Leeds died yesterday at his Summer home in North Long Branch. He was taken ill on Saturday. He was born in New York forty-two years ago. Mr. Leeds was one of the pioneers in the phonograph business, having taken a leading part therein for almost twenty years. He organized the Leeds and Catlin Company and was its President. He leaves a widow and four young sons

Sigmund Rosenwald.

Sigmund Rosenwald, a tobacco importer, died at his Summer home at Elberon, N. J., on Tuesday evening after a long illness. He was born in Germany in 1851, and was the sole survivor of his family. For many years he had been an importer of leaf tobacco at 145 Water Street. He was prominent in Hebrew charities and a Director of the Hebrew Orphan Asylum, also Vice President of the United Hebrew Charities. The funeral will be held at Elberon on Friday morning.
