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Yank Invaders to Blast Foe With Secret Arms

London, May 5 (U.P.) - U.S. invasion forces were told today that they will smash into Axis Europe with new weapons never before tried in combat, and a Stockholm dispatch said the Germans expect at least one Allied force will land in Denmark on the shortest route to Berlin...

Brig. Gen. Henry B. Saylor, chief ordnance officer of the U. S. Army in the European theater, wrote in the army newspaper Stars and Stripes that the new weapons, representing the best American military science yet has produced, were sent to Britain after being tested thoroughly at proving grounds in the United States...

"Every American soldier participating in the forthcoming operations may be assumed that his weapons, ammunition, tanks and vehicles are superior or at least equal to those of the enemy," Saylor said. U. S. Has New Gun

American arsenals now have produced an all-purpose gun surpassing the German 88-millimeter gun in quality and quantity, he reported and added that it might be possible to call new American ammunition with higher explosive charges, as well as certain small arms, "secret weapons."

A Berlin dispatch in the Stockholm Aftonbladet said German military leaders believed the Allies plan to invade Denmark with "powerful forces," probably simultaneously with a cross-channel landing in France...

The Danish-German border lies only 225 miles from Berlin and occupation of Denmark might pave the way for the Allied fleets to force the Baltic for further landings in northern Germany and a new and shorter sea link with Russia.

Nazi sources continued their wild speculation over "D-day" for the invasion. Paul Joseph Goebbels, German Propaganda Minister, in his latest article for his magazine, Das Reich, said only that Germany knows the "enemy has finished his preparations for the coming invasion."

Goebbels acknowledged that the Allies have achieved aerial superiority, but denied that the Luftwaffe had been "knocked out of the air."

The allied communique reports that the attacking Imperial forces were making "satisfactory progress in the opening stages of the offensive."

State Body Backs OPA in Milk Row

Albany, May 5 - Action of the State War Council in affirming support of Office of Price Administration regulations affecting ceiling prices today left the matter of the dispute over farm milk prices in the Mohawk-Hudson milk marketing area strictly up to the courts.

The War Council's affirmation continued the OPA regulations in force with the effect of State law until June 30, 1945. However, C. Chester DuMont, State Agriculture Commissioner, already has granted increases in farm milk prices in the area, putting them 60 cents a hundred pounds over the OPA ceiling.

War Council members pointed out that DuMont was required to permit the price increase under State laws which permit price rises after a public hearing and approval of the producers in the area to be effected. Likewise, the War Council said, it is necessary to continue support of the ceiling prices set up by the OPA.

The result is that the courts are likely to be asked to determine whether the OPA regulations, as accepted by the War Council, may override the State law.

Cumberland Hospital authorities reported today that Edwin Laskowski, 16-year-old student at Brooklyn High School for Specialty Trades, who was injured when a piece of phosphorus exploded in his hands yesterday, was in critical condition. Exact nature of his injuries was not disclosed, but it was reported yesterday that both hands suffered compound fractures and at least two fingers were blown off.

Two other students, Howard Davidson of 5114 Tilden Ave., and Robert Novak of 923 23rd St., also 16, who were burned by flaming particles of the chemical in a classroom of the school, were sent home from the hospital last night. Laskowski lives at 358 12th St.

Meanwhile, the Police Department and the Kings County District Attorney were conducting separate investigations into the explosion.

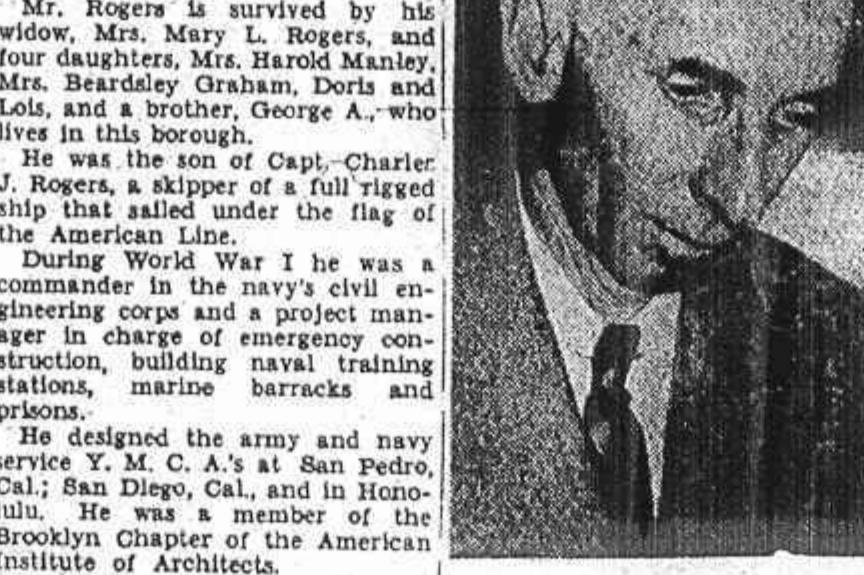
"As a successor to the late Admiral Koga, Admiral Soemu Toyoda has been appointed and has a ready taken command of the combined fleet.
