

# REED'S RULE IS ENDED

## THE FIFTY-SECOND CONGRESS OVERWHELMINGLY DEMOCRATIC.

A MAJORITY OF MORE THAN ONE HUNDRED—THE DEMOCRATS CARRY THE NEW YORK ASSEMBLY.

The Democrats have completely overthrown the Republicans in the House of Representatives, and have secured a majority larger than the most sanguine Democrat had been led to expect. The gains have been made everywhere, but particularly in the East and in the West. Connecticut elects three Democrats out of four. Iowa, that has but one Democrat in the present Congress, will have a majority of the delegation of that State. The Democrats get half of the Massachusetts delegation, and may have a majority of the twelve members. The New-York delegation is more strongly Democratic than it has been for many years. The Democrats secure a majority of the delegation from Pennsylvania, making unexpected gains in the Congressional representation.

Maryland will have a solid Democratic delegation, the Republicans losing McComas, one of the most useful men of the party in the House. Virginia not only rejects Langston, who was violently seated by the Republicans, but with him all the other Republican candidates.

For the first time since 1863 the Democrats have captured the Assembly. The Assembly of 1890 consisted of 72 Republicans and 56 Democrats. The Assembly of 1891 will consist of 67 Democrats and 61 Republicans. It is true that the Republicans control the Senate by 19 to 13, but the Democrats, under the leadership of Gov. Hill, will deprive a sufficient number of Republicans who have been elected by narrow majorities of their seats in order to overcome the vote on joint ballot. The Republicans have lost in all sixteen members, namely, one in Albany, Clinton, Dutchess Second, Erie Fifth, Kings Twelfth, Lewis, Montgomery, New-York Seventh, Eleventh, and Thirteenth, Oneida First, Orange First, Warren, Wayne First, and in the Westchester First and Second Districts.

The Democrats have lost only in the Chemung District, where Gov. Hill failed to elect his personal representative, and in Herkimer, where Warner Miller retrieved the district for his party.

The Fifty-first Congress, expiring March 3, 1891, is entitled to 330 members. At the close of the first session there were 326 members, four vacancies having been created. One in each of the States of Missouri, New-York, and Pennsylvania was caused by death, and one, in Arkansas, was made by the action of the Republicans in vacating the seat of the Representative of the Second District. At the beginning of the session the House of Representatives stood—Republicans, 169; Democrats, 161; majority, 8. At the close of the session, in October, the division was—Republicans, 175; Democrats, 151; Republican majority, 24—the increased majority having been obtained by unseating Democrats and seating Republicans.

The Fifty-second Congress will consist of 332 members, the whole number having been increased by the admission of Idaho and Wyoming, with one member each. Short-term members for the second half of the Fifty-second Congress have been elected in one district in each of the States of California—in consequence of a resignation; Missouri, New-York, and Pennsylvania. The parties will be represented in the Fifty-second Congress as follows: Democrats, 219; Republicans, 112; Democratic majority, 107.

In the following list of members-elect the names of Democrats are in italics and those of Republicans in roman. Names followed by a star (\*) are those of men re-elected; a dagger (†) indicates a candidate of the Farmers' Alliance:
