

## TIGERS DOWN LEHIGH.

Princeton Not Required to Attempt New Plays Against Pennsylvanians.

PRINCETON, N. J., Oct. 5.—Princeton showed a better knowledge of the rudiments of football than Lehigh to-day, and cleverly romped away with five touchdowns, while holding the Pennsylvanians scoreless. Princeton's 35-0 victory this afternoon was the result of a snappy fighting play that at times swept the Lehigh eleven off their feet. It was distinctly a "new style" contest, twenty-two forward passes being attempted by the two teams. Although Lehigh, forced to the limit, was obliged to show everything, the Tigers laid back on the Minnesota shift and the formations they have shown in the two previous games.

Electrifying end runs, accurate forward passes, and a quick diagnosis of plays kept the contingents of both elevens on edge throughout the four periods. Princeton attempted eight forward passes with "Ham" Andrews at the tossing end. Four of them were successful for a total gain of ninety-five yards. Capt. Pazzetti tried fourteen passes, and, although six of them succeeded, the gain was considerably less than on the Tigers' four successes. At the beginning of the last period, with the ball in midfield, the Andrews-Pendleton combination on two successive forward tosses covered fifty-eight yards to the goal line.

Although not presenting a concentrated interference, Princeton showed a decided brace throughout. "Ham" Andrews at left end and Fred Trenkman at full back. De Witt's regular position, could not be swamped by the heavy interference of the visitors, and many times hurled the fast Lehigh backs for appalling losses. Although the Princeton line did not rise to the attack with a punch, they offered spectacular individual play and tackled hard. John Logan, a Brooklyn boy, at right guard, pierced the experienced Lehigh line often during the first half, and played more like a veteran than a recruit. Trenkman's work at full back puts him in a class with De Witt.

Pazzetti and Hoban, the former Dartmouth star, invaded Princeton's territory several times, and between them made twelve first downs possible for Lehigh. Their closest approaches to a score, however, were filtering attempts at field goals. The line-up:
