

# NORTH CAROLINA DELEGATES. WORKING THE CONVENTION IN FAVOR OF ARTHUR.

RALEIGH, N. C., May 1.—The Republican State Convention met at 3 P. M. to-day and elected L. W. Humphrey, of Wayne County, permanent President. A committee of 15 was appointed to confer with the Liberal Convention to suggest a State ticket and a platform. A resolution was introduced to instruct the committee to report the name of a Republican for Governor. This brought a test vote on the proposition to continue the coalition movement of 1882, and the resolution only received 31 votes out of 238. The convention took a recess in order to give the committee time to report. The convention again assembled at 8 o'clock, and the conference committee was allowed until to-morrow morning to make its report. It is understood that the committee agreed to recommend Dr. Tyre York for Governor; W. A. Guthrie, of Cumberland, for Lieutenant-Governor; Daniel L. Russell, of New-Hanover, for Associate Justice of the Supreme Court; Washington Duke, of Durham, for Treasurer; George W. Stanton, of Wilson, for Secretary of State; Solomon Poole, of Orange, for Superintendent of Public Instruction; Charles A. Cook, of Warren, for Attorney-General.

Dr. J. J. Mott was elected a delegate to Chicago from the State at large by acclamation. There was a sharp contest for the other three delegates to Chicago. It was known that W. P. Canaday, Sergeant-at-Arms of the Senate, was not in favor of Arthur, and a strong fight was made on him by the friends of Arthur and he was defeated. W. S. Dockery, James E. O'Hara, and James H. Harris were elected. Dockery is for Blaine and O'Hara and Harris are for Arthur. Harris and O'Hara are colored. The convention then adjourned until to-morrow.

The Republican Convention of the Fourth Congressional District met here to-day and elected Charles D. Upchurch and John H. Williamson delegates to Chicago. Both are for John A. Logan. The convention of the Fifth District met as a subdivision of the State Convention and elected Thomas K. Keogh United States Marshal of the Western District, and P. H. Winston, Jr., delegates to Chicago. Both are for Arthur and then for Logan. The contest in the Sixth and Seventh Districts have not yet been arranged.

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
