## LITTLE GIRL WAS SCARED

### Principal in Moving Picture Act Barked at Niagara Rapids.

### POLICE THEN INTERFERED

Proposed Production of Thrilling Rescue From Brink of Horseshoe Fall is Prevented—May Attempt it on American Side.

A manager for a moving picture firm which is staging a thrilling rescue photo-drama at Niagara Falls had his troubles yesterday afternoon. The principal actor in the play is Florence Foley, six years old, of No. 1145 East Seventh street, New York, who is here with her mother.

Yesterday morning near the Loop pond on the state reservation, the child, after Coroner Emes had been called to look over affairs, was cast adrift in a motorboat at a point about a quarter of a mile above the American fall. She had on a life belt and about her waist was a rope. Irene Deal, who is somewhat of a swimmer, jumped into the river, swam to the boat and brought the child ashore perched on her shoulders. Miss Deal also had a lifebelt and a rope about her.

In the afternoon the moving-picture motors went to the Canadian side of the river for the rough water effect. It was proposed that little Florence Foley should jump into the river near the safe house of the Ontario Power company, but when the child had a good look at the water she began to cry. Her mother wept too. Officer Kelley of the Ontario police came along in the storm of tears and, taking the little girl in his arms, called the show off.

"We won't try it on the Canadian side, again," said the director. "We'll stage the whole play on the American shore."

But it is believed that the reservation authorities will interfere with the program.

## APPOINTMENT OF DEPUTY COLLECTOR

### John Riorden Has Indorsement of Democratic Leaders for Position at Niagara Falls—Successor to Col- lector Murray of Buffalo.

The appointment of a deputy collector of customs for the sub-port of Niagara Falls, is now being considered by Assistant Secretary Charles S. Hamlin of the treasury department, who has called for the papers in the case. Collector Murray of Buffalo, has recommended George J. Riorden, in charge of the Black Rock office while John Riorden, connected with the Falls office, has the backing of Democratic leaders in the district.

It is also known that Mr. Hamlin is considering a successor for collector Murray of Buffalo and it is understood that Senator O'Gorman has been asked to suggest the man for the place. Representatives Smith and Driscoll, of Buffalo and Gittins of Niagara Falls will first be consulted, however. Mr. Gittins is the only one from this district now at Washington, but all three congressmen are expected to confer on the matter within 10 days and make up a slate.
