

POLICE CAPTAIN BOGART.

Ex-Police Captain James Z. Bogart, who had been on the retired list of the department nearly 11 years, died on Monday night at No. 131 East One Hundred and Twelfth-street. He was a native of the United States, and was born on March 26, 1821. He was a member of the old Municipal Police, and on the organization of the Metropolitan force in 1857 he became a member of that force, his appointment dating April 23, 1857. He passed through the different grades of roundsman and Sergeant, and was promoted to a Captaincy. He served as such in the Twelfth, Twenty-second, and Thirty-first Precincts, and was in command of the Twenty-second Precinct when he was retired on June 6, 1870, on a pension of \$1,000 a year. Since his retirement he has kept a fish-stand at No. 2,040 Third-avenue.
