

## **DR. RUDOLF EMMERICH DIES.**

**Bacteriologist Who Injected Cholera Bacilli Into His System.**

MUNICH, Bavaria, Nov. 18.—The death has been announced of Dr. Rudolf Emmerich, Professor of Hygiene and Bacteriology in the University of Munich. He was born in 1852.

Dr. Emmerich fought through the Franco-Prussian war. Following this, he was assistant professor at Leipzig, and since 1902 had been at Munich.

Dr. Emmerich, with Prof. von Pettenkofer, was appointed by the Sultan of Turkey to rectify the sanitary conditions of Constantinople during the cholera epidemic of 1895. He experimented with cholera bacilli by injecting them into his own system, and proved that cholera is less virulent when the infection is derived from a human being than from the ground. More recently he proved that cholera is caused by a saltpetrous acid, and made successful experiments for the rectification of typhus-cholera.

Dr. Emmerich's book, the "Handbook of Domestic Hygiene," is an authority.

## **TWO TRUANT OFFICERS DIE.**

**Ellis Morris Was Oldest In City—**

**J. M. Odell Falls from Window.**

Ellis Morris, 73 years old, of 312 West 109th Street, the oldest Truant Officer employed by the city, died on Tuesday night at his home of a complication of diseases.

James M. Odell, 61 years old, of 790 Riverside Drive, the second oldest Truant Officer, fell out of a window of his home yesterday afternoon and was killed.

The men were friends and were well known at the Children's Court, to which Mr. Morris had been attached for a number of years. Mr. Morris was a veteran of the Confederate Army and was well known in Masonic circles.
