

MRS. A. D. TRUAX TO WED.

Lawyer's Widow to Marry Ex-Senator F. W. Griffith on Aug. 3.

The engagement is announced of Mrs. Martha Riggs Truax of 56 East Eighty-seventh Street, widow of Arthur D. Truax, a lawyer of this city and a daughter of Mrs. Herman L. Riggs of Palmyra, to Frederick W. Griffith of Palmyra, N. Y., Vice President of the Garlock Packing Company. Mrs. Truax is a niece of Pliny T. Sexton, Chancellor of the New York State Regents. She was graduated from Smith College in 1903 and the next year married Mr. Truax, a son of the late Justice Truax. He died suddenly in 1916, leaving, besides his widow, a daughter, Margaret.

Mr. Griffith was graduated from Hamilton College in 1886 and is a member of its Board of Trustees. He has served as an Assemblyman and State Senator from his district as a Republican. His first wife, who was Miss Mary Adams of Phelps, N. Y., died a year ago. He has two sons, both in the service of their country.

The wedding, which has been set for Aug. 3, will be quiet and will take place at the Brick Church.
