

SOPRANO WEDS 'CELLIST.

Miss Susan Metcalfe Married to Pablo Casals by Justice Keogh.

NEW ROCHELLE, N. Y., April 4.—Miss Susan Metcalfe, an American mezzo soprano, and Pablo Casals, a 'cellist, were married this morning by Supreme Court Justice Martin J. Keogh. It was the first marriage Justice Keogh had ever performed. The bride and bridegroom will have their certificate approved by the Spanish Consul in New York City.

The ceremony, which took place in front of the big open fireplace in Justice Keogh's courtroom, was witnessed by only a few relatives, among them being Louis Metcalfe, brother of the bride; her mother, Herman Kobbe, and her sister, Mrs. Kobbe. The couple will live in Europe.

Mrs. Casals is the daughter of Mrs. Helene Rochet and the late Dr. Frank J. Metcalfe. She was born in Florence, Italy, where her parents lived many years. She was educated in the conservatories of Italy and France and sang in many of the capitals of Europe. She met Mr. Casals ten years ago while on a concert tour. Mrs. Casals, who is a neighbor of Justice Keogh, has taken a great interest in the New Rochelle Forum, which was established by the Justice twelve years ago, and sang at one of the Forum meetings a few weeks ago.

Mr. Casals is the son of Charles Casals of Barcelona, Spain, and Philas Defillo of Porto Rico. He is a native of Vendrell, Spain. His present address is 20 Villa Molitas, Paris, France. For years he was 'cellist of the Paris Opera and traveled extensively in the United States, Europe, and South America on concert tours. He is also a conductor and composer of orchestral works.
