

PRINCE OF SAXONY TO WED.

Heir to Throne Engaged to Duchess
Marla Amelle.

AMSTERDAM, June 1.—The engagement of George, (Frederick Augustus George,) Crown Prince of Saxony, to Duchess Marla Amelie, eldest daughter and heir to the throne of Duke Albert of Württemberg, is announced in the Lokal Anzeiger of Berlin.

Prince George was wounded early in the war, and was taken to Dresden for treatment, where the Emperor decorated him with the Iron Cross. Since he became twenty he has been initiated gradually into State affairs, and everything has been done to give him a full appreciation of his duty as King, in the event of the death of King Frederick. He is now 25 years of age.

The Prince has not seen his mother for several years, since her so-called "Memoirs" were published. She eloped from the royal palace some years ago with his tutor, Giron, and was divorced by King Frederick, being compelled to renounce her title as Crown Princess Louise. Her later escapade, in marrying an Italian pianist, Toselli; the publicity of a divorce from him; with the publication of her memoirs, ridiculing her husband's family, had the effect of completely alienating King Frederick and his Government from her. She was an Archduchess of the Tuscany line of the imperial house of Hapsburg.

Prince George's marriage has received a good deal of attention by his father and the Dresden Court. Princess Stephanie of Hohenzollern was spoken of as a prospective bride of the Prince. He has two brothers and three sisters.

It is said that King Frederick has always harbored a grudge against the Kaiser. In March the Kaiser sent him a message of congratulation on the "glorious conclusion" of the war on the eastern front. He has always refused to yield to pressure brought to bear upon him by the Kaiser to marry again.
