## In Memoriam: Joan Z. Steinbrenner

The New York Yankees mourn the passing of Vice Chairperson Joan Steinbrenner, who was surrounded by her family as she passed away on December 14, 2018, at her home in Tampa, Fla. She was 83 .
"Joan was a compassionate and caring matriarch whose profound love for her family and those in the community always inspired us," said the Steinbrenner family."Her elegance and grace touched everyone around her, and we know her spirit will live on through her legacy of good works. We are grateful to have had her in our lives, and she will be deeply missed."

Born on August 25, 1935, in Mt. Vernon, Ohio, Mrs. Steinbrenner (whose first name is pronounced Jo-Ann) was married to Yankees Principal Owner George M. Steinbrenner III from May 12, 1956, until his passing on July 13, 2010.

Mrs. Steinbrenner participated in many community projects and supported numerous philanthropic organizations over the years. In her native Ohio, she worked with the Cleveland Orchestra and was deeply involved with the Lake Erie Nature \& Science Center, where she performed and taught puppetry to local children. Among her many community roles after relocating to Florida, she was named State Chairperson for the Florida Special Olympics in 1981 and 1982, and for two years was on the Board of Directors of the National Society to Prevent Blindness. She was also a charter member of Town and Gown, which was established in 1977 in an effort to form a bond between community supporters in the downtown Tampa area and the University of South Florida.

Additionally, Mrs. Steinbrenner was a longtime board member for Children's Home, Inc., and was one of the original members of the H.B. Plant Museum Society. From 1991 to 2000, she served on the Development Council of the St. Joseph's Hospital Foundation Board. She was also a member of the Junior League of Tampa and The Chiselers, and sat on the Board of Directors of the Florida Orchestra.

A graduate of Upper Arlington High School in Columbus, Ohio, and Ohio State University, Mrs. Steinbrenner earned a degree in dental hygiene. She is survived by four children (Hank, Jennifer, Jessica and Hal), 14 grandchildren and three great grandchildren.

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## Harold Z. (Hal) Steinbrenner

Managing General Partner / Co-Chairperson
Hal Steinbrenner begins his 29th season with the New York Yankees organization in 2019 and his 11th as Managing General Partner / Co-Chairperson. On November 20, 2008, Major League Baseball formalized Mr. Steinbrenner's role as the New York Yankees' Managing General Partner.

Under Mr. Steinbrenner's leadership, the Yankees have retained and enhanced their global popularity while continuing to field championship-caliber teams. Since taking the position of Managing General Partner, the Yankees' .569 combined winning percentage (921-699) is the best in all of baseball.
In 2018, the Yankees drew more than 3 million fans at home for the 20th consecutive season, extending their alltime Major League record. They also led the AL in average home attendance for the 15 th time in the last 16 seasons. The club's Twitter, Facebook, and Instagram accounts each have the most followers among Major League Baseball teams, as the Yankees reach a global audience of more than 14 million fans over social media on a daily basis.

In recent years, Mr. Steinbrenner and the Yankees organization have focused on improving the experience for fans of all ages by providing more family-friendly and socially oriented spaces at the Yankees' spring training home - George M. Steinbrenner Field in Tampa - and at Yankee Stadium in the Bronx. Steinbrenner Field enhancements have included a complete modernization of the seating bowl and concession areas, and Yankee Stadium now features a dedicated children's zone as well as unique gathering areas for all ticketholders to enjoy.

The 50 -year-old son of George Steinbrenner was elected General Partner by the New York Yankees Partnership in 1996, and he held that title for 13 seasons. In 2007, Mr. Steinbrenner was also named Chairman of Yankee Global Enterprises, LLC. In his first full year as Managing General Partner in 2009, the Yankees capped their historic inaugural season in Yankee Stadium with their 27th World Championship.

Along with General Partner / Co-Chairperson Hank Steinbrenner, his responsibilities include overseeing all areas of the club's business and baseball operations, and directing the financial aspects of the New York Yankees, Yankee Global Enterprises and their affiliates. He has also overseen the dynamic growth of Yankee Stadium as a marquee all-season entertainment venue for college football, soccer, hockey, concerts and other non-baseball events.

In 2014, Mr. Steinbrenner was appointed to Major League Baseball's eight-owner Executive Council. The group serves as a sounding board for the Commissioner, advising him on all major issues. Mr. Steinbrenner also serves on the Board of Directors for Legends Hospitality, LLC, a holistic solution provider in the sports, music and entertainment industry which offers expertise in global planning, global sales and hospitality. Created with the Dallas Cowboys in 2008, Legends serves a diverse group of iconic venues, including Yankee Stadium, AT\&T Stadium, One World Observatory, Golden 1 Center and the University of Notre Dame, among others. Additionally, he is Chairman and CEO of Steinbrenner Hotel Properties and holds a seat on both the Board of Directors of the Boys \& Girls Club of Tampa Bay and the Special Operations Warrior Foundation.

Mr. Steinbrenner attended Culver Military Academy and graduated from Williams College in 1991 with a Bachelor of Arts degree. He earned a Master's degree in Business Administration from the University of Florida in 1994. Mr. Steinbrenner and his wife, Christina, currently reside in Tampa, Fla.


## Henry G. (Hank) Steinbrenner

## General Partner / Co-Chairperson

Henry G. (Hank) Steinbrenner begins his 12th season as General Partner and 10th season as Co-Chairperson of the New York Yankees. Along with Managing General Partner / Co-Chairperson Hal Steinbrenner, Hank, the oldest son of the late George Steinbrenner, is responsible for overseeing all areas of the club's business and baseball operations.

Mr. Steinbrenner is directly involved in player negotiations, setting long-term player recruitment goals and overall club strategy.

Mr. Steinbrenner serves as Vice President and a Director of Bay Farms Corporation, serves on the board of the YES Network and the Gold Shield Foundation, and has been a member of the board of the Ocala Breeders Sales Company. He has also been involved in a number of not-for-profit causes and children's charities in New York and Tampa Bay, including The Joshua House, St. Joseph's Children's Hospital, Gigi's Playhouse Tampa, The Children's Dream Fund and the New York Yankees' foundations.

In 2016, Mr. Steinbrenner, along with his son George Michael IV, made an entry into auto racing by contributing to the formation of Steinbrenner Racing. After racing the past two seasons in Indy Lights, a developmental circuit, the group announced in 2018 a partnership with Harding Racing. The 2019 season will mark the inaugural year of Harding Steinbrenner Racing, which will compete on the IndyCar circuit - with George Michael IV becoming the youngest team owner in IndyCar history.

Mr. Steinbrenner, who has four children and one granddaughter, attended Culver Military Academy and Central Methodist College and resides in Tampa, Fla.


## Jennifer Steinbrenner Swindal <br> General Partner／Vice Chairperson

Jennifer Steinbrenner Swindal begins 2019 in her 11 th full season in the role of General Partner／Vice Chairperson of the New York Yankees．She also serves as the President of the New York Yankees Foundation and the New York Yankees Tampa Foundation，overseeing numerous local，regional and national outreach efforts．

Within the scope of her roles，which include the implementation and integration of a wide range of community programs relating to the New York Yankees，Ms．Steinbrenner supervises three Tampa－area Children＇s Holiday Concerts that have been sponsored by the Steinbrenner family for more than 25 years．At least 5，000 children annually participate in the events，which provide musical education and exposure to the fine arts．She has also been instrumental in the development and growth of the Bronx Winter Wonderland event，which sees thousands of local youth visit the Stadium each year for a holiday extravaganza complete with decorations，festive music and food，and a holiday gift for each child in attendance．

Ms．Steinbrenner has a distinguished record of contributing to various community projects and initiatives，including current commitments on the Board of Directors of Mary Lee＇s House（a child protection and advocacy center in Tampa）， St．Joseph＇s Children＇s Hospital Foundation，and Boys \＆Girls Club of Tampa Bay．

Ms．Steinbrenner also serves on the Executive Committee of the Gold Shield Foundation，which was established in 1981 by her father，George M．Steinbrenner III．The foundation，which currently covers seven counties in the Tampa Bay area，works to ensure that the families and dependent children of fallen police officers and firefighters receive early financial assistance and are guaranteed funds towards a college education．

In addition，Ms．Steinbrenner serves on the Board of Directors for Legends Hospitality，LLC，a holistic solution provider in the sports，music and entertainment industry，which offers expertise in global planning，sales and hospitality．

Having previously served in the Yankees Public Affairs Department in 1984－85 and spending 23 years actively participating in the philanthropic community，Ms．Steinbrenner has held prior board positions with the Children＇s Cancer Center of Tampa，Florida State Fair Authority（Executive Committee，Agricultural Committee，and Chairwoman of the Marketing Committee），H．B．Plant Museum at the University of Tampa，New York Pops，Harlem RBI，Florida Orchestra，Tampa Bay Salvation Army，Red Cross Angels of Tampa and Culver Academies．Additionally， Ms．Steinbrenner held the title of Senior Vice President of New Stadium Public Affairs in 2008.

A Morehead Scholar and 1981 graduate of the University of North Carolina with a Bachelor of Science degree in business administration，Ms．Steinbrenner previously served on the UNC Board of Visitors and Parents Council．Ms． Steinbrenner has two children，Haley Swindal Tantleff，and Stephen Swindal，who currently works with the Yankees in their Baseball Operations Department．She also celebrated the arrival of her first grandchild，Lily George，in 2016.

Ms．Steinbrenner was born in Cleveland，Ohio，and makes her home in Tampa，Fla．


## Jessica Steinbrenner

## General Partner／Vice Chairperson

Jessica Steinbrenner begins 2019 in her 11th full season as General Partner／Vice Chairperson for the New York Yankees．The younger daughter of George M．Steinbrenner previously served in the role of Senior Vice President for the team in 2008.
Ms．Steinbrenner is the owner of Bach Stables，LLC，a thoroughbred breeding and racing operation，and holds the position of Chief Executive Officer of the Steinbrenner－family－ operation，and holds the position of Chief Executive Officer of the Steinbrenner－family－
owned Bay Farms Corporation．She also served on the board of the Florida Thoroughbred Breeders＇and Owners＇Association．Ms．Steinbrenner is actively involved in the aftercare of retired thoroughbreds．
Ms．Steinbrenner served as the Executive Producer for the 2018 full length feature film The Little Mermaid，the live－action adaptation of Hans Christian Andersen＇s classic fairy tale．She has also authored two children＇s books：My Sleepy Room and My Messy Room．

Ms．Steinbrenner attended Culver Girls Academy and graduated from Sweet Briar College in Virginia．She has four children and one grandson，and currently resides in Tampa，Fla．


## Randy Levine President

Randy Levine begins his 20th season as President of the New York Yankees in 2019. He was named to his position in January 2000, becoming the first person to hold the post with the club since 1986.

Under his supervision and guidance, the franchise constructed the state-of-the-art Yankee Stadium, completing the facility on time for the beginning of the 2009 season, which culminated in the franchise's 27th World Championship. The Yankees have topped the American League in average home attendance in 15 of the last 16 seasons.
Mr. Levine was a principal founder of the YES Network, which is the most-watched regional sports network in the United States. He was also one of the lead negotiators in the sale of 80 percent of the network to 21 st Century Fox. In 2008, Mr. Levine was instrumental in creating Legends Hospitality, LLC, with the Dallas Cowboys, which currently operates at the Yankees' and Cowboys' stadiums, as well as many other world famous venues, including One World Observatory. In 2004, he helped organize Yankees-Steiner, a leading sports memorabilia company.

Mr. Levine has also spearheaded the Yankees' international brand expansion, including a transformational partnership in 2013 with Manchester City Football Club to acquire Major League Soccer's 20th expansion team. New York City Football Club (NYCFC), began play in 2015 at Yankee Stadium and ranks fourth in MLS home attendance through its first four seasons, drawing an average attendance of over 25,000 during that span. In 2010, Mr. Levine led a Yankees delegation that visited Tokyo, Beijing and Hong Kong with the 2009 World Series Trophy, marking the first-ever time that the Yankees have brought one of their World Series trophies to Asia. In addition, Mr. Levine helped develop the joint venture agreement in Japan between the Yankees and Yomiuri Shimbun, which is the parent company of the Yomiuri Giants.

In 2007 alone, the Yankees became the first Major League organization to sign players from the Israel Baseball League, embarked on their first-ever large-scale outreach into Taiwan by holding a clinic for high school players and coaches in Taipei, Taiwan, and established a first-of-its-kind working relationship with the Chinese Baseball Association. Mr. Levine is also the Yankees' principal liaison to Major League Baseball and contributes to player negotiations and contract issues.

Mr. Levine has been at the forefront of bringing a diverse array of entertainment and special events to Yankee Stadium, transforming the venue into a year-round destination for a variety of college football, soccer, hockey, music, boxing and corporate events. Highlights have included the January 2014 Coors Light NHL Stadium Series featuring the New York Rangers, New York Islanders and New Jersey Devils; international soccer matches showcasing the likes of Manchester City, Liverpool, Real Madrid, AC Milan, Paris Saint-Germain and Chelsea; concerts by Paul McCartney, Madonna, Garth Brooks, JAY Z, Justin Timberlake, Eminem and Romeo Santos; as well as renewing the tradition of college football at the home of the Yankees with over a dozen games featuring iconic institutions such as Notre Dame, Army, Boston College, Syracuse and Penn State.

The Yankees president has also been the driving force behind the creation, organization and implementation of the New Era Pinstripe Bowl. The nationally broadcast contest - which has drawn approximately 40,000 fans per game since its inception in 2010 - provides the schools, their alumni and traveling supporters the unparalleled and thoroughly unique opportunity to enjoy a full week of bowl festivities in New York City during Christmas week. Recently, Mr. Levine organized a Yankees investment in prominent esports company Vision Esports.

Before joining the Yankees, Mr. Levine served as New York City's Deputy Mayor for Economic Development, Planning and Administration. He also served as New York City's Labor Commissioner.

From 1995 through 1997, Mr. Levine was Chief Negotiator for Major League Baseball. In 1996, he negotiated the labor agreement that for the first time included revenue sharing, luxury taxes and Interleague play. Prior to that, Mr. Levine served as Principal Associate Deputy Attorney General and Principal Deputy Attorney General at the United States Department of Justice. He has also served as a special delegate to the United States Department of Labor and was a board member for the Hudson River Park. Mr. Levine presently serves on the board of the Taylor Hooton Foundation and Hofstra University, and has served on the Boards of the ASPCA, George Washington University and the Yogi Berra Museum.

Mr. Levine has served on the Board of Directors of the New Jersey Nets and New Jersey Devils and is a member of the Board of Directors of the YES Network, Legends Hospitality, LLC, and NYCFC. He is also an officer of Yankee Global Enterprises, LLC. Additionally, Mr. Levine serves on the International, Labor Policy and Legislative Committees of Major League Baseball.

Mr. Levine has been a partner in the New York law firm of Proskauer Rose Goetz \& Mendelson, was Counsel at the law firm of Akin Gump Strauss Hauer \& Feld, and is presently Counsel at the law firm of Jackson Lewis P.C.

Born on February 22, 1955, in Brooklyn, N.Y., Mr. Levine received a Bachelor of Arts degree from George Washington University in 1977, and in 2011 was named as Chair of the school's athletic committee. His strategic plan led to the GW basketball team winning its first National Championship, the 2016 National Invitation Tournament. He now serves as vice chair of the Hofstra Athletic Committee. In 2018, City \& State magazine named Mr. Levine one of its 50 over 50 leaders in New York. He received his J.D. from Hofstra University School of Law in 1980. Mr. Levine and his wife, Mindy, reside in Manhattan.



## Lonn A．Trost

 Chief Operating Officer \＆General CounselLonn A．Trost begins his 20th season as Chief Operating Officer of the New York Yankees in 2019．He was named to the position on January 10，2000，after serving as the club＇s Executive Vice President from 1997－99．This year also marks Mr．Trost＇s 23rd season as Yankees General Counsel，a position he has held since 1997.

Mr．Trost is responsible for the overall day－to－day functioning of the Yankees＇ operations．Under his direction，the Yankees have seen tremendous growth in brand recognition and sponsorship opportunities，while drawing more than 3 million fans at home for a Major League－record 20 consecutive seasons．During that stretch，the Yankees established single－season home attendance records nine times（1998－99；2002－08）．In addition，the Yankees have topped the American League in average home attendance in 15 of the last 16 seasons．

Additionally，Mr．Trost，along with Hal Steinbrenner and Randy Levine，spearheaded the most complex undertaking in New York Yankees history－construction and development of Yankee Stadium，which is the largest privately funded building project in the history of the Bronx．While remaining true to the architectural grandeur of the 1923 original， the current facility is one of the most technologically advanced sports venues in the world．In the 2016－17 offseason， Mr．Trost facilitated a series of major structural enhancements designed to improve the experience for all fans at Yankee Stadium．The new upgrades included a first－ever children＇s play zone and seven new social gathering spaces．

Mr．Trost has played a significant role in Yankee Stadium becoming a year－round multi－purpose home to special events．Since 2010，Yankee Stadium has played host to an array of landmark activities that transcend baseball，including the 2014 Coors Light NHL Stadium Series featuring the New York Rangers，New York Islanders and New Jersey Devils； concerts by Paul McCartney，Madonna，Garth Brooks，JAY Z，Romeo Santos，Justin Timberlake and Eminem；a world championship boxing match between Miguel Cotto and Yuri Foreman；as well as renewing the tradition of college football at the home of the Yankees with games featuring iconic institutions such as Notre Dame and Army．In addition， Mr．Trost has been an integral figure in the development and growth of the New Era Pinstripe Bowl－held annually for the last nine years during Christmas week．The event has averaged over 40，000 fans since its inception in 2010.

Mr．Trost was also responsible for reintroducing a long－dormant Yankees tradition of hosting marquee professional soccer at Yankee Stadium．Since 2012，some of the most high－profile soccer teams in the world－AC Milan，Chelsea， Liverpool，Manchester City，Paris Saint－Germain and Real Madrid－have played summertime matches in front of more than 200，000 fans．In 2013，the Yankees established a partnership with Manchester City Football Club and jointly acquired Major League Soccer＇s 20th expansion team．New York City Football Club（NYCFC）began play in 2015 at Yankee Stadium and ranks fourth in MLS home attendance through its first four seasons，drawing an average attendance of 25,516 over the span．

Before joining the Yankees，Mr．Trost was a partner and member of the Executive Committee of the law firm of Shea and Gould from 1972 to 1994．He was also a partner at the New York law firm of Herrick，Feinstein from 1994 through 1997．While with these firms，he served as outside general counsel for numerous sports franchises，institutions and agents．Among his clients were the New York Yankees and Mets，the New Jersey Nets and Devils，the National Baseball Hall of Fame，Little League Baseball and TCI Cable．

Mr．Trost was instrumental in the creation of the YES Network and is a member of its Board of Directors．In addition， he serves as an officer and on the Board of Directors for Yankee Global Enterprises and is on the Board of Directors for Legends Hospitality，both of which he participated in founding．While he maintains his responsibilities with the New York Yankees Partnership and the Yankees＇other affiliates，he is also actively involved with the Tourette Syndrome Association．

Mr．Trost began his legal career in 1971 with the U．S．Justice Department，Office of Chief Counsel（Treasury Department）．A 1968 graduate of Hunter College in the Bronx，Mr．Trost received his J．D．from Brooklyn Law School in 1971．It＇s interesting to note that Mr．Trost＇s initial employment with the Yankees was as a grandstand vendor in the mid－1960s in the original Yankee Stadium．He resides in Monroe Township，N．J．，with his wife，Carol．They have two children，Evan and Audra，and four grandchildren，Ariella，Alexander，Bryn and Brooklyn．

# Brian Cashman Senior Vice President, General Manager 



Brian McGuire Cashman has literally grown up in the Yankees family. He joined the organization in 1986 as a 19-year-old intern in the Minor League and Scouting Department and now holds one of the most demanding jobs in sports as Yankees Senior Vice President and General Manager.

Over the course of his 33 seasons with the team, he has earned five World Series rings, including four as General Manager. Since the Dodgers' Buzzie Bavasi in the 1950s and 60s, Mr. Cashman is the only general manager to win four World Series titles in that role. Notably, he has won his titles with two different managers - Joe Torre in 1998, 1999 and 2000, and Joe Girardi in 2009.

Mr. Cashman assumed his current post on February 3, 1998. At age 30, he became the second-youngest General Manager in Baseball history. In his first season, he became the youngest-ever GM to win a World Series, and with championships in 1999 and 2000, he became the only GM in Baseball history to win world titles in each of his first three seasons. A pennant in 2001 gave him four straight League Championships, placing him alongside Hall of Fame Yankees General Managers Ed Barrow (1936-39, four) and George Weiss (1949-53, five) as the only GMs in Baseball history to win four-or-more straight league titles at any point in their careers.

Among his peers, Mr. Cashman has achieved unparalleled success while carrying on the winning tradition of the Yankees. His lifetime winning percentage of . 587 (1,995-1,403-2) is the highest of any General Manager with at least 10 seasons of experience whose career began in 1950 or later and marks the best team winning percentage in the Major Leagues during that same stretch. Now in his 22nd season, Mr. Cashman is the longest-tenured General Manager in baseball and is the longest-serving Yankees GM since Barrow led the team from October 28, 1920, through February 20, 1945.

With the start of Mr. Cashman's ascension to the GM role in 1998 and continuing through the 2018 season, the Yankees own the best record in Major League Baseball for any stretch of at least nine seasons, including the most recent such stretch spanning the 2010 through 2018 seasons.

In all, his clubs have earned 17 berths in the playoffs, including 12 Division titles, six AL pennants and four World Series titles. His feat of reaching the playoffs in each of his first 10 seasons (1998-2007) remains unmatched in Baseball history. In addition, the Yankees have won at least 84 games in all 21 seasons of Mr. Cashman's tenure as General Manager, while the most any other team has reached that plateau over the stretch has been 17 times (Boston). Mr. Cashman has also overseen the ascension of the Yankees' Player Development program that has consistently infused the Major League roster with young, elite talent in recent years. By producing the AL "Rookie of the Year" winner Aaron Judge in 2017, as well as runners-up Gary Sánchez in 2016 and Miguel Andújar in 2018, the Yankees are the first club to place a player in the top-two in "Rookie of the Year" voting in three consecutive seasons since the Seattle Mariners from 1999-2001.

There have been three women in Major League history to hold the position of Assistant General Manager, and Mr. Cashman has hired two of them: Jean Afterman, the Yankees' current Senior Vice President and Assistant General Manager; and Kim Ng, who worked for the Yankees from 1998-2001 and currently holds the position of Senior Vice President of Baseball Operations for Major League Baseball.

Various groups have honored the achievements of the Yankees and Mr. Cashman. With the club's most recent World Series title, the Yankees were named " 2009 Male Team of the Year" by the United States Sports Academy and were nominated as "Team of the Year" in the Laureus World Sports Awards competition. In both 1998 and 2000, the Yankees earned ESPY Awards - presented by ESPN - as "Outstanding Team of the Year," and were named "Organization of the Year" by Baseball America in 1998 and by USA Today in 1999.

Mr．Cashman has been honored as＂Executive of the Year＂six times：by Baseball America in 2017；the Boston Chapter of the BBWAA in 2000， 2009 and 2017；and in 1999 and 2003 by the New Jersey Sportswriters＇Association．In 2001，he received his third consecutive ＂40 Under 40＂Award presented by Street \＆Smith＇s Sports Business Journal to recognize the top 40 people under the age of 40 who have made the greatest impact in the sports business industry．He has since been inducted into the publication＇s＂ 40 Under 40＂Hall of Fame．In 2003，Mr．Cashman was honored by the Latino Sports Writers and Broadcasters Association with their annual＂Latino Achievement Award＂for his contributions to the Latino media．

Philanthropy and community involvement play equally important roles in Mr．Cashman＇s scope of work．For the past nine years he has served on the Board of Directors of Covenant House International，which provides services for homeless youth．He was honored by the organization with their Beacon of Hope Award in 2011，having participated in the group＇s CEO Solidarity Sleepout in each of the last eight years by sleeping on the streets of Manhattan to raise money and draw attention to its cause．

In each of the last nine offseasons，Mr．Cashman has rappelled down the 22－story Landmark Building in Stamford，Conn．，as part of the Christmas－themed Heights and Lights Program，promoting activity in the city＇s downtown business district．In 2013，he joined the Board of Directors for TGEN（Translational Genomics Research Institute）Pancreatic Cancer．He also traveled to Vermont in November 2011 to join fellow GMs Theo Epstein and Neal Huntington at an event organized by ESPN＇s Buster Olney to support farm relief in the wake of Tropical Storm Irene．

For his efforts at work and in the community，Mr．Cashman was presented with the 2018 Joan Payson／Shannon Forde Community Service Award by the N．Y．Chapter of the BBWAA and the 2016 Jacob K．Javits Lifetime Achievement Award by the ALS Association Greater New York Chapter．He was also recognized by the Catholic Youth Organization of New York with the 2011 John V．Mara Sportsman of the Year Award and the 2005 Ossie Davis Award for Inspirational Leadership for promoting diversity in the workplace．

His career as a full－time Yankees employee began following his graduation from Catholic University in 1989，when Mr．Cashman became a full－time Assistant in Baseball Operations．He was later promoted and transferred to Tampa，Fla．， where he served as Assistant Farm Director from 1990 to 1992．He returned to New York and became Assistant General Manager，Baseball Administration in November 1992.

Born on July 3，1967，in Rockville Center，N．Y．，Mr．Cashman grew up in Lexington，Ky．He attended Georgetown Prep in Rockville，Md．，and was inducted into the school＇s Athletic Hall of Fame in 2015．Mr． Cashman attended Catholic University in Washington，D．C．，where he majored in history．He also played intercollegiate baseball for the Cardinals，breaking the then－team record for hits in a single season．His love for baseball developed when former Brooklyn Dodger Ralph Branca and his wife，Ann，arranged for him to serve as a batboy for the Los Angeles Dodgers in spring training in 1982.


For the past nine years，Brian Cashman has served on the Board of Directors of Covenant House International， which provides services for homeless youth．He was honored by the organization with their Beacon of Hope Award in 2011．Additionally in each of the last eight years，Cashman has participated in the group＇s CEO Solidarity Sleepout by sleeping on the streets of Manhattan to raise money and draw attention to its cause．

## Jean Afterman

## Senior Vice President, Assistant General Manager

Jean Afterman enters her 18th season as the Yankees' Assistant General Manager and eighth as Senior Vice President in 2019. She became only the third female to hold the position of Assistant General Manager in Major League Baseball history, and is currently the only woman to hold the title.

Ms. Afterman has been an integral part of the Yankees' efforts and operations in Asia. In her first year with the Yankees, she was instrumental in developing the club's relationship with the Yomiuri Giants of the Japan Central League and signing three-time MVP Hideki Matsui. In 2007, she joined team President Randy Levine and General Manager Brian Cashman on a week-long trip to Asia that concluded with a working agreement with the Chinese Baseball Association. She once again joined Levine and Cashman in 2010, when the Yankees brought the 2009 World Series trophy to Tokyo, Beijing and Hong Kong. While in Hong Kong, Ms. Afterman was given the honor of throwing out one of the ceremonial first pitches at the 2010 Phoenix Cup, an annual international women's baseball tournament.

Her contributions and leadership have been repeatedly recognized. In 2010, Ms. Afterman was named by WISE (Women in Sports and Events) as one of the "Women of the Year," and was tabbed by New York Moves magazine as a "Power Woman." Ms. Afterman was named one of the 2004 "Power 100 " by the Sporting News, and was selected as one of the "50 Most Powerful Women in New York" by the New York Post in 2003 and 2007. Also in 2007, Ms. Afterman was profiled as one of Crain's New York Business' " 100 Most Influential Women in New York Business." In 2008, she was profiled by Forbes as one of the top female executives in Baseball, and in 2013, she was once again profiled on the front page of her hometown newspaper, the San Francisco Chronicle. In 2017, she was named one of Street \& Smith's Sports Business Journal's "Game Changers," and was profiled by both the YES Network and ESPN.com. She is a frequent guest speaker on the topics of women in sports and the business of baseball, having participated in events sponsored by Major League Baseball, Columbia Business School, New York University, SABR, Beyond Sport, the Sports Lawyers Association and WISE, among others. In 2018 and 2019, Ms. Afterman was a member of the Steering Committee for the Integrity and Impact Award presented at the BT Sport Industry Awards in London.

Ms. Afterman joined the Yankees with a diverse business and legal background, focusing on international sports and licensing with an emphasis on U.S.-Japan matters. Prior to joining the Yankees, she managed her own practice, providing athletic representation and management with a specialization in arbitration proceedings. From 1994-99, Ms. Afterman was General Counsel at KDN Sports, Inc., and handled business and legal affairs for international baseball clients, including Hideo Nomo, Hideki Irabu, Masato Yoshii, Alfonso Soriano and more than 30 Major and Minor League players. In 1996, Ms. Afterman was appointed by the U.S. Secretary of Agriculture to a federal advisory committee, the National Organic Standards Board.

A graduate of the University of California at Berkeley in 1979, Ms. Afterman was the recipient of the Rosalynn Schneider Eisner Prize and the Mark Goodson Scholarship Grant. She received her J.D. from the University of San Francisco School of Law in 1991. In 2009, she was named "Alumni of the Year" by the Katherine Delmar Burke School in San Francisco.

Ms. Afterman maintains an active role in the Bronx community, working closely with P.S. 35, an elementary school within walking distance from Yankee Stadium. Over the last 11 years, she has organized Yankees-sponsored Read-A-Thons and directed a mentoring program which matches Yankees employees with fourth and fifth grade students. Additionally, she has worked with high school-aged students through New York City's Explorers program, which engages young people through career-orientation programs. She received the 2009 "Exploring Leadership Award" for her work with the group. In 2012 and 2013, she served on the Board of Trustees of the Women's Sports Foundation, and in 2015, she was appointed to serve on the advisory committee that oversees the Commissioner's Front Office and Field Staff Diversity Pipeline Program. In 2018, Ms. Afterman joined the Board of Directors of DREAM (formerly Harlem RBI).


## Michael Fishman

## Vice President, Assistant General Manager

Michael Fishman begins his second season as a Vice President and fifth season as an Assistant General Manager, working with General Manager Brian Cashman in all areas related to baseball operations, including player acquisitions and evaluation, roster management, staffing and personnel decisions, player contract negotiations and salary arbitration. In addition, he oversees all aspects of the club's baseball research, statistical analysis, and baseball information systems.

The 2019 season marks his 15th year with the Yankees organization, having been hired by the club in July 2005 as a Baseball Operations Analyst. From November 2006 through the 2014 season, he was the club's first Director of Quantitative Analysis, responsible for all of the Yankees' proprietary baseball operations systems and assembling a staff devoted to quantitative research. In this role, he oversaw all statistical research projects, providing information, recommendations and advance scouting reports to the baseball operations department and coaching staff. He also oversaw the baseball operations internship program.

Prior to joining the Yankees, Mr. Fishman was an actuarial associate with AXA Equitable Life Insurance Company.
Born in New York City and raised in Fairfield, Conn., Mr. Fishman graduated summa cum laude and Phi Beta Kappa from Yale University in 2001 with a Bachelor of Arts in Mathematics.

Over the last several seasons, Mr. Fishman has regularly given his time to school-age children and graduate students, speaking to them on a variety of topics related to the application of mathematics in the professional world.

He resides in Westchester Co., N.Y., with his wife, Sheryl, his daughter, JJ, and his son, Ellis.


## Tim Naehring

## Vice President, Baseball Operations

Tim Naehring begins his fourth season as Vice President of Baseball Operations with the Yankees, assisting General Manager Brian Cashman with player acquisitions, roster management and evaluation of all player personnel.

This season marks his 12th with the Yankees, having served as a professional scout from the fall of 2007 through the end of the 2015 season. After covering the minors and Majors in 2008, he was primarily responsible for covering the National League and crosschecking the American League from 2009-15.

Mr. Naehring began his front office career with the Cincinnati Reds during spring training in 1999, becoming a special assistant to general manager Jim Bowden. From October 2000 through 2005, he was the Reds' Director of Player Development, and he also held the role of Minor League Field Coordinator from October 2000 through 2003 and during the 2006 and 2007 seasons.

A native and current resident of Cincinnati, Mr. Naehring is a 1985 graduate of La Salle High School, where he was a three-sport athlete in baseball, soccer and basketball. He attended Miami (Ohio) University from 1985-88 and was named Mid-American Conference Player of the Year after his final season.

In June of 1988, he was drafted by the Boston Red Sox in the eighth round of the First-Year Player Draft. Mr. Naehring went on to play parts of eight Major League seasons with Boston from 1990-97, batting . 282 ( 527 -for-1,872) with 49 home runs and 250 RBI in 547 career games before a torn right elbow ligament ended his career on June 23, 1997.

In 1996, Mr. Naehring founded the Athletes Reaching Out Foundation (ARO), which has funded various good works in the greater Cincinnati area, including a mini-Fenway Park in Miamitown, Ohio.

He and his wife, Kris, have a daughter, Jamison, and a son, J.T.


## Damon Oppenheimer

## Vice President, Domestic Amateur Scouting

Damon Oppenheimer enters his 27th season with the Yankees and 17th as a Vice President in the organization's scouting department. Since 2005, Mr. Oppenheimer has fully directed the Yankees' efforts related to Major League Baseball's First-Year Player Draft, including the evaluation of all eligible players and the Yankees' selections. As part of his responsibilities, he manages all of the club's crosscheckers and area scouts throughout the United States, Canada and Puerto Rico.

Mr. Oppenheimer was twice honored during the most recent offseason. At the 16th Annual "In the Spirit of the Game" Awards in January, Mr. Oppenheimer received the George Genovese Lifetime Achievement in Scouting Award from the Professional Baseball Scouts Foundation. He was also acknowledged by his scouting peers at the Baseball Winter Meetings with the 2018 West Coast Scout of the Year Award.

This season marks his fifth with the title of Vice President of Domestic Amateur Scouting. Between 2003 and 2014, he held various other Vice President titles, including those for Amateur Scouting (2007-14), Scouting (2005-06), Player Development and Scouting (2004) and Professional Scouting (2003).

A native of San Diego, Calif., Mr. Oppenheimer began his player development career as a part-time scout for the Padres while finishing his degree at the University of Southern California. He was hired as a full-time scout by San Diego in 1988, continuing in that role until he joined the Yankees as the Midwest crosschecker in 1993.

Mr. Oppenheimer became the team's Western crosschecker for the 1995 season and briefly joined the Texas Rangers as a national crosschecker from November 1995 through July 1996 before returning to the Yankees in August 1996 as a national crosschecker. He also served as the Yankees' director of player personnel from 2000-02.

The former USC catcher batted .364 in 1985, earning Pac-10 All-Conference honorable mention before being selected by Milwaukee in the 18th round of that June's First-Year Player Draft. He appeared in 12 games for Single-A Beloit in 1985 before getting injured the following year in spring training, ending his professional playing career. Mr. Oppenheimer returned to school and received his bachelor's degree in exercise science in 1987.

He and his wife, Tina, reside in Wesley Chapel, Fla., and have three children: A.J., Sierra and Gehrig.


## Kevin Reese

## Senior Director, Player Development

Kevin Reese begins his 18th year with the Yankees organization, his 12th as a scout or member of the front office, and his second as Senior Director of Player Development.

Mr. Reese joined the Yankees Pro Scouting Department at the conclusion of his playing career and held the title of Professional Scout from 2008 through 2014. For the three seasons from 2015-17, he was the Yankees' Director of Pro Scouting, overseeing the coordination of scout coverages and the intake of reports while using compiled information to help guide trade discussions and free agent signings. Additionally, Mr. Reese scouted the Yankees' own affiliates, organized advance scouting for the postseason and contributed to the construction of the Yankees' Major League and minor league rosters.
A native of San Diego, Mr. Reese was originally selected by the Padres in the 27th round of the 2000 First-Year Player Draft from the University of San Diego, where he was a two-time West Coast Conference first-team selection and later named to the West Coast Conference's 40th Anniversary All-Conference Team in 2007. On December 18, 2001, he was acquired by the Yankees in exchange for infielder Bernabel Castro.

Over 849 games across eight minor league seasons from 2000-07 (including 2000-01 with the Padres organization), Mr. Reese, a left-handed-hitting outfielder, posted a .292 ( 953 -for-3,269) batting average with 546 runs scored, 192 doubles, 37 triples, 67 home runs, 395 RBI, 372 walks, 138 stolen bases, a .370 on-base percentage and an .804 OPS. Mr. Reese also appeared in 12 Major League games with the Yankees over two seasons (2005-06), batting .385 ( 5 -for-13) with two runs scored, one RBI, two walks and one stolen base.

He and his wife, Laura, reside in Odessa, Fla., and have four children: Jackson, Kannon, Brooklyn and Gwynn.

Community Spotlight: The Yankees are committed to supporting efforts to ensure excellence in the lives of children through their active participation in the performing arts. In addition to being provided with various resources, Highbridge Voices and Renaissance Youth Center were each invited to perform the national anthem before a 2018 Yankees home game. Renaissance Youth Center, who performed the National Anthem on August 10, 2018, works to empower atrisk inner city youth to use music to maximize their potential as productive and positive members of society. Highbridge Voices, who performed the national anthem on August 14, 2018, is an extended-day music and academic program designed to inspire excellence in the lives of children.


On Aug. 14, 2018, Highbridge Voices sang the national anthem prior to the Yankees' game vs. Tampa Bay.

El Museo del Barrio: In recognition of El Museo del Barrio's community initiatives and focus, the Yankees partnered with the museum to support their efforts associated with bilingual public programs, educational activities, festivals and special events. Located in the East Harlem section of New York City, El Museo's mission is to present and preserve the art of all Latin Americans in the United States and educate its diverse public in the richness of Caribbean and Latin American cultural history

Flower Festival: The Flower Festival is a Colombian cultural program that promotes arts, culture and tradition. The festival has evolved into a multicultural event in New York City where now, not only Colombia is exhibiting its flowers, dancers, silleteros, musicians and other artistic expressions, but other countries as well. The Yankees proudly recognized the Festival's mission of promoting arts, culture and traditions in New York City with an on-field pregame ceremony on July 3, 2018, while showcasing a custom Yankee flower medallion that was also on exhibit at the festival on July 8, 2018, in Queens.

## EDUCATION

Bronx Education All-Star Day: For two consecutive years, the Yankees have partnered with the New York City Department of Education (DOE) to implement an incentive program that motivates and enhances the educational experience for students (grades 5-8) attending Bronx-based schools (Districts 7-12) and recognizes their accomplishments throughout the school year. From the beginning of the academic year in September up until April, students are highlighted for their achievements and commitment to leadership, academics, community service and teamwork. Last year - on Thursday, April 26, 2018 - over 9,000 students were recognized at Yankee Stadium during a pregame celebration for excelling in the aforementioned areas of focus. In addition, all students, teachers and DOE officials were invited to stay and enjoy that afternoon's Yankees game.

161st Street Merchants' Association's 17th Annual Back-to-School Jamm: The New York Yankees Foundation collaborated with the 161st Street Merchants' Association to provide local youth with 2,500 backpacks and back-toschool supply kits to ensure they started the 2018-19 school year on a positive note. The Association is committed to promoting business growth and development along 161st Street in the Bronx. On an annual basis, the Association hosts a Back-to-School Jamm for local residents that provides attendees with health and educational resources, entertainment, and food and beverages.

Sport Management Mentoring Program: The Sport Management Mentoring Program was established to expose students throughout New York City to career options associated with professional sports. On a monthly basis, the Yankees work in conjunction with schools and communitybased organizations that identify local youth to participate in a mentoring seminar at Yankee Stadium. At these sessions, Yankees front office personnel lead interactive discussions and share insightful information about their educational background, career paths and day-to-day responsibilities. They also provide an overview of what takes place off the field and away from public view, engaging students with supporting materials. In addition, students are treated to a working lunch and a private, behind-the-scenes tour of Yankee Stadium. At the conclusion of the seminar, students have a better understanding of the business side of a sports franchise and potential career opportunities that exist.

Lauren's Kids "Kids Care" Walk: Lauren's Kids, Inc. is committed to preventing child abuse by promoting awareness, reinforcing advocacy and embracing child safety concepts. Lauren's Kids works in conjunction with school administrators to implement "Safer, Smarter Kids" - a sixweek sexual abuse prevention curriculum, in elementary schools. With the Yankees' support, Lauren's Kids provides programming in Bronx-based schools. On June 21, 2018, students and educators in the Bronx who completed the program demonstrated their commitment to end child abuse and promote the message of hope and healing by participating in Lauren's Kids "Kids Care Walk." The Walk commenced at Community School 55 in the Bronx and concluded at Yankee Stadium, where students paraded around the warning track to show support and draw awareness to child safety. In addition, students were invited to stay for that afternoon's Yankees game where Lauren's Kids was honored during an on-field pregame ceremony.


On June 21，2018，Lauren＇s Kids＂Kids Care Walk＂concluded at Yankee Stadium，where students and educators who completed the six－week sexual abuse prevention program participated in a ceremony and were presented with tickets to a Yankees game．

Morris High School Campus Robotics Program： Since its inception in 1999，the Yankees have been proud supporters of the Morris High School Campus Robotics Program that sees students from the school participate in competitions where teams work together to create robots designed to complete various tasks．The program encourages students to pursue careers in science，math and engineering．On an annual basis，the Yankees recognize the students＇accomplishments in various ways，including an on－field pregame ceremony，showcasing the Program＇s commitment to providing local youth with a superior educational experience．

Literacy Inc：On July 3，2018，the Yankees partnered with Literacy，Inc．（LINC）to host the fourth annual Reading on the Rails event at Yankee Stadium．The program encourages youth and families to travel with a book and read，even when getting to and from locations in their normal，daily lives． The event began with a reading session for kids on their train ride to the stadium．Once there，children，parents and LINC staff gathered inside to take part in various literacy activities，including a parent workshop．Participants were then highlighted in an on－field pregame ceremony and invited to stay for that night＇s Yankees game．LINC reaches in excess of 9,000 children and 5,000 parents annually and is committed to addressing illiteracy among children growing up in poverty in New York City．Through the consistent support of the New York Yankees Foundation and fundraising efforts，resources have been dedicated to enhance these efforts．

## HEALTHY LIFESTYLE

Healthy Home Plate：The Yankees，Legends Hospitality， Ace Endico，Peapod and Food Bank for New York City partner to implement and host the Healthy Home Plate Program at Yankee Stadium．The Healthy Home Plate Program provides area youth with the opportunity to participate in a program focused on the importance of preparing affordable，healthy meals and incorporating these meals into their lifestyle． Kitchens located within Yankee Stadium become classrooms， where Sous Chefs engage youth with hands－on cooking demonstrations．During the interactive lesson，nutritionists from the Food Bank for New York City educate students about nutrition and the value of the ingredients in the recipes prepared．Ace Endico supplies the ingredients for the meals prepared in class．In recognition of the students＇ participation and completion of the Program，their efforts are showcased during a pregame ceremony at Yankee Stadium． In addition，each participant receives a personalized chef＇s jacket，certificate，cookbook of healthy recipes，bag filled with provisions for students to prepare healthy meals at home，a gift card from Peapod and tickets to attend the game．

High School Blood Donor Championship：The Yankees and the New York Blood Center established a partnership to address the issue of a declining blood donor population． As a result，the New York Yankees High School Blood Donor Championship was created．High schools based in the metropolitan area are provided with incentives（tickets， promotional items，etc．）to motivate staff and students 16
years of age or older to donate blood at their school blood drives．The total number of donations collected at each school competing in the Blood Donor Championship is tallied at the conclusion of the academic year，and the top schools are invited to attend a game at Yankee Stadium where they are honored during an on－field pregame ceremony．The New York Yankees High School Blood Donor Championship has surpassed approximately 1.2 million donations collected since the program＇s inception in 1996.

Fans for the Cure：The Yankees teamed up with Fans for the Cure，New York－Presbyterian Hospital，Columbia University Medical Center and Weill Cornell Medicine to save the lives of their fans and employees from prostate cancer during Prostate Cancer Awareness Month．Prior to the Yankees game on September 20，2018，fans，media members and employees 40 years of age or older were encouraged to visit medical professionals in a designated area of the Stadium to undergo a brief prostate cancer screening．

## MULTICULTURAL

Hispanic Heritage Month：The Yankees proudly celebrated Hispanic Heritage Month during August and September by highlighting，recognizing，celebrating and embracing Hispanic heritage，language，culture and traditions．
－Better Money Habits：The Yankees，New York City Department of Education and The Hispanic／Latino Organization for Leadership and Advancement（HOLA）， under the Bank of America Diversity \＆Inclusion Framework， partnered to offer a financial education workshop to a group of Bronx middle school students from P．S．／II．S． 218 on September 17，2018．Topics discussed included money management and the basics of banking and savings． HOLA＇s mission is to support financial wellness in the community and promote economic and social growth．
－Community Achievement Awards：The Yankees Community Achievement Awards recognizes organizations and individuals for their outstanding work and contributions to the betterment of the surrounding communities．The following organizations and individuals were recognized during an on－field pregame ceremony prior to the Yankees＇game on September 2， 2018.

－Legends Food Activation：As part of a number of themed activities and festivities in 2018，Yankee Stadium＇s food service provider，Legends Hospitality added two new items to their menu selection during September．＂Fiesta de Leche，＂a Latin－inspired shake that includes tres leches cake， condensed milk，cinnamon and horchata，rimmed with puffed rice and topped by a churro．＂Tostones sliders＂are mini－burgers pressed with adobo spice，then topped with sautéed onions，fried salami，cheese and cilantro crema， served together on a tostones bun．

- Pregame Performances:The Yankees celebrated Hispanic Heritage Month with multiple musical performances. Fans enjoyed music from salsa artist Frankie Negron on Friday, August 31, 2018, in the Masterpass Batter's Eye Deck. Negron has garnered numerous plaudits, including two Premio Lo Nuestro Awards for"Song of the Year"and multiple Grammy and Billboard Award nominations. In addition, Toby Love, an American singer and songwriter from the Bronx, performed on September 21, 2018. Love was originally a backup singer for the bachata band Aventura before beginning his solo career. In 2008, he received four Billboard Latin Music Awards nominations, winning in two categories: "Tropical Airplay Song of the Year," and "Latin Rap/Hip Hop Album of the Year."


The Yankees celebrated multicultural artists during its Pregame Concert in 2018.

- Bronx Dominican Day Parade: This year marked the 29th anniversary of the Bronx Dominican Day Parade's efforts to serve and cultivate Latin culture and traditions in the Bronx community. The Yankees were proud to once again participate in the scholarship program by providing 10 scholarships to local students selected by the Bronx Dominican Day Parade. The scholarships acknowledged the students'hard work, dedication and contributions to the community. The scholars were recognized during an on-field pregame ceremony on July 27, 2018, and were also invited to attend that evening's game with their families and friends.
- National Puerto Rican Day Parade: The National Puerto Rican Day Parade was established to create awareness and empower the Puerto Rican community by promoting culture, education, scholarships and civic engagement. The Yankees extended their educational outreach efforts by providing scholarships to five students who exemplified the values of hard work and dedication in their communities. The students, selected by the National Puerto Rican Day Parade, along with members of the Education Committee, were recognized in an on-field pregame ceremony on June 12,2018 , and were invited to watch that evening's game with their families and friends.


## RECREATION

Pitch In For Baseball: Pitch In For Baseball provides new and gently used softball and baseball equipment to boys and girls around the world who want to play ball, but lack the resources to do so. The Yankees and Pitch In For Baseball partner with the Public Schools Athletic League and New York City Parks and Recreation to ensure local youth have access to equipment needed to participate in organized baseball and softball programs. Annually, the Yankees and Pitch In For Baseball identify 10 Bronx-based high school teams and fully

equip approximately 150 young athletes with all the gear needed to take the field during their seasons. Pitch In For Baseball also supplies 10 Bronx-based Little Leagues with gear to support their programs.

PLAY BALL, Stickball: The Yankees and Major League Baseball - in partnership with the New York Emperors Stickball League (NYESL) and the 161st Street Business Improvement District - hosted a "PLAY BALL: Stickball" event on River Avenue between 158th and 161st Streets featuring youth participants from the New York Emperors Stickball League and other local youth organizations on September 15 and September 22. Teams faced off for the opportunity to be recognized during an on-field pregame ceremony prior to the Yankees game on September 22, 2018, at Yankee Stadium.


The Yankees partnered in hosting the "PLAY BALL: Stickball" tournament on Sept. 15 and 22, 2018.

2018 PSAL Championship Games: The Yankees partnered with the Public Schools Athletic League (PSAL) to host the PSAL Baseball \& Football Championship Games at Yankee Stadium in 2018. Over the course of three games, approximately 10,000 tickets combined were distributed to guests that witnessed Harry Van Arsdale Education Campus and Bathgate High School compete for the AA Baseball Championship, Grand Street Campus and James Monroe Campus compete for the AAA Baseball Championship and Erasmus Hall High School and South Shore High School square off in the Football Championship game.


James Monroe Campus High School won the 2018 AAA PSAL Championship at Yankee Stadium on June 11, 2018, defeating Grand Street Campus, 3-0.

2018 MVP Scholar－Athlete Awards Ceremony：The Yankees collaborated with the PSAL and Nike to host the 2018 MVP Scholar－Athlete Awards Ceremony at Yankee Stadium． Eleven scholar－athletes from each of the five boroughs of New York City were recognized for their accomplishments in the classroom and for their athletic achievements．In addition， the MVP Scholar－Athletes were recognized on－field at the end of the first quarter of the New Era Pinstripe Bowl at Yankee Stadium，on December 27， 2018.


On Dec．27，2018，the Yankees hosted the MVP Scholar－ Athlete Awards Ceremony，honoring 11 students from each of the five boroughs．

## SOCIAL RESPONSIBILITY

Yankees－Stonewall Scholars Initiative：In 2019，the Yankees will collaborate with Stonewall Inn and the NYC Department of Education to implement the Yankees－ Stonewall Scholars Initiative．This initiative will commemorate the 50th anniversary of the Stonewall Inn uprising and celebrate the achievements of New York City Public School graduating seniors who have demonstrated academic achievement，a commitment to equality and impactful support of the LGBTQ community．The Yankees will provide five $\$ 10,000$ scholarships to be presented to one student from each of the five boroughs of New York City．The recipients of the scholarship will be celebrated during a home game at Yankee Stadium in June of 2019．This initiative was announced on September 21，2018，as part of a pregame ceremony featuring representatives from the Yankees，New York City Department of Education and Stonewall Inn．


In an on－field ceremony at Yankee Stadium Sept．21，2018， the Yankees announced the Yankees－Stonewall Scholars Initiative．

Line Of Duty：During the 2018 season，the Yankees teamed up with the New York City Police Department to host the surviving children and widows／widowers of police officers killed in the line of duty．In honor of the legacy of these fallen heroes and over the course of ten home games，the Yankees provided Line Of Duty families with complimentary tickets．

Covering Bases：The Yankees introduced a new community program called Covering Bases during the 2018 season．The goal of this initiative is to enhance the organization＇s community outreach with an ongoing commitment from front office employees to engage our neighbors and serve the local community．The program is intended to create a positive and cohesive structure where employees will not only develop an appreciation and respect for the community that the Yankees serve，but also create extended relationships with members of the
organization with whom they might not have previously interacted．In August，covering bases kicked off with volunteer events with two Yankees community partners－ Citymeals－on－Wheels and the Food Bank for New York City． Yankees volunteers with Citymeals－on－Wheels assembled 441 emergency food packages，enough to provide 3，500 meals to seniors in need throughout the Bronx．While working with the Food Bank for New York City，volunteers repackaged 9，324 lbs．of food that provided 7，770 meals to disadvantaged residents throughout New York City．


Yankees employees gave their time to community efforts through the organization＇s new Covering Bases program．

American Red Cross Get Alarmed NYC：The Yankees teamed up with the American Red Cross and the Fire Department of New York to support the Get Alarmed NYC Program，the largest smoke detector giveaway and installation program in the nation．On Saturday，April 28，2018， Yankee Stadium served as the hub to help train and dispatch volunteers to install alarms in the Highbridge community of the Bronx．The event began with a training and education session；thereafter，volunteers traveled into the community installing over 800 smoke／carbon monoxide alarms in the homes of Bronx residents．

Community Paint Project：The Yankees teamed up with Publicolor to transform P．S．／I．S． 218 in the Bronx with color on August 7，2018．Publicolor engages disconnected youth in their education through a continuum of design－based programs and academic support．The objective of this team project was to create a beautiful，warm，welcoming and student－centric environment．Yankees employees volunteered their time to paint the facility alongside area youth．

CC Sabathia＇s Celebrity Softball Game：The Yankees and the PitCCh In Foundation partnered to host CC Sabathia＇s Celebrity Softball Game on Thursday，June 28，2018，at Yankee Stadium．The event began with a red carpet VIP reception， followed by the softball game itself and a trophy presentation． All proceeds from the event benefited the PitCCh In Foundation＇s and the New York Yankees Foundation＇s efforts to enrich the lives of inner city children through education and athletics．

4 ＋44 Awards Ceremony：The Yankees partnered with Bronx Community Board 4 （CB4）to host local police officers and firefighters at the $4+44$ Police Officer and Firefighter Outstanding Service Award Ceremony at Yankee Stadium on November 29，2018．Award recipients were acknowledged for their commitment to make a difference in the lives of local residents．

Make-A-Wish Foundation, Metro New York and Western New York: Since 1980, the Make-A-Wish Foundation has enriched the lives of children who have been diagnosed with life-threatening medical conditions through its wishgranting work. On an annual basis, the Yankees work in conjunction with the Make-A-Wish Foundation to grant approximately 30 wishes. In addition, resources dedicated through the New York Yankees Foundation support Make-AWish's efforts to lift children's spirits and convey the message that wishes can come true.

Approximately 3,400 local youth were treated to a holiday extravaganza in Yankee Stadium's Great Hall, complete with festive decorations, music, including caroling by the DREAM choir, and food and hot chocolate. In addition, and as a result of the commitments from the New York Yankees Foundation, Walmart and Neil and Amanda Friedman, every child in attendance was presented with a holiday gift of their choosing.

## AT THE HELM IN 2018

- Guided the Yankees to a 100-62 record, the club's best record since 2009 (103-59) and the 20th 100-win season in franchise history... is one of six managers in Baseball history to lead his team to at least 100 wins in his rookie season, joining Ralph Houk (1961 Yankees, 109-53), Alex Cora (2018 Red Sox, 108-54), Dusty Baker (1993 Giants, 103-59), Sparky Anderson (1970 Reds, 102-60) and Mickey Cochrane (1934 Tigers, 101-53).

The Yankees collected at least 50 wins at home in each of their first four seasons at the current Yankee Stadium （2009－12）．．．in 2012，Yankee Stadium became the second ballpark to host the postseason in each of the first four years of its existence，joining Atlanta＇s Turner Field（first six）—credit：Elias．

The Yankees own the two highest single－season home winning percentages all time：． 805 （62－15）in 1932 and .802 （65－16）in 1961.

- Held opponents to a Major League-low .115 (10-for-87) batting average with runners in scoring position...is tied for the sixth-lowest single-season mark-and is the second-lowest single-season AL mark (Tampa Bay's Blake Snell, .088 in 2018)-since 1974 ( min .75 AB ).

- Recorded 51K over 27 appearances from 9/23/14-6/2/15, setting a record for most strikeouts by a Yankee over a stretch without allowing any earned runs since it became an official stat in 1913 (credit: Elias)...his 49K through $6 / 2$ were the most strikeouts by a Yankee in games prior to allowing his first earned run of the season (since ER became an official statistic in 1913)...were the most by any pitcher since Aroldis Chapman (52K) in 2012.
- Was named to his second career All-Star team (also 2014)...made his All-Star debut in the AL win in Cincinnati on $7 / 14$, tossing a scoreless seventh inning, including a strikeout of Giants' 2 B Joe Panik (1.0IP, 1BB, 1K).

- Was the first Red Sox OF to earn a Gold Glove since Ellis Burks in 1990 and the fifth to win it while serving as the club's center fielder (Jimmy Piersall, 1958; Reggie Smith, 1968; Fred Lynn, 1975 and 1978-80; and Burks, 1990).
- Was just the fourth Major Leaguer ever to reach $200 \mathrm{H}, 30 \mathrm{HR}, 100 \mathrm{RBI}$ and 35 SB in a single season...was the fourth Major Leaguer (fifth time) ever with 45 doubles, 30HR and 35SB in a season.
- Led the Majors in total bases (364) and extra-base hits (83), becoming the first player to lead Baseball in total bases while serving as his team's primary leadoff hitter since San Francisco's Bobby Bonds in 1973.
- Became the first player in Red Sox history with at least 30HR and 30SB in a single season...was the seventh Red Sox (eighth time) with 20HR and 20SB in a season and first since Nomar Garciaparra in 1997...with Dustin Pedroia (20HR, 26SB), were the first Boston teammates to reach the 20/20 mark in the same year.

## Baseball Glossary

## HOW TO FIGURE...

Batting Average: $(H / A B)$ Hits divided by at-bats.
ERA: (ERx9/IP) Multiply earned runs by nine and divide the total by innings pitched.

Slugging Percentage: $(T B / A B)$ Total bases $(1 B=1,2 B=2$, $3 B=3, H R=4$ ) divided by at-bats.

On-Base Percentage: $(\mathrm{H}+\mathrm{BB}+\mathrm{HBP}) /(\mathrm{AB}+\mathrm{BB}+\mathrm{HBP}+\mathrm{SF})$ Add hits, walks, hit by pitch and divide by the total of at-bats plus walks plus hit-by-pitch plus sacrifice flies.

Fielding Percentage: $(P O+A) /(P O+A+E)$ Total putouts plus assists divided by total chances.

Winning Percentage: The number of games won divided by the total games played (not including ties).

Magic Number: Determine the number of games yet to be played, add one, then subtract the number of games ahead in the loss column of the standings from the closest opponent.

## QUALIFYING RULES

Batting Championship: To qualify for a batting title, a player must make 502 or more plate appearances (calculated by 3.1 plate appearances per team game scheduled, which is 162 ).

Pitching Championship: To qualify for the lowest ERA, a pitcher must throw at least 162.0 innings.

Fielding Championship: To qualify as the top fielder:
(a) a catcher must have played in at least 81 games at catcher.
(b) an infielder or outfielder must have played at his position in at least 108 games.
(c) a pitcher must have 162.0 innings pitched.

Rookie: A player shall be considered a rookie unless, during a previous season or seasons, he has (a) exceeded 130 at-bats or 50 innings pitched in the Major Leagues; or (b) accumulated more than 45 days on the active roster of a Major League club or clubs during the period of the 25-player limit.

Save: Credit a pitcher with a save when:
(1) He is the finishing pitcher in a game won by his club;
(2) He is not the winning pitcher, and
(3) He qualifies under one of the following conditions:
a. He enters the game with a lead of no more than
three runs and pitches for at least one inning, or
b. He enters the game with the potential tying run either on base, at bat or on deck, or
c. He pitches effectively for at least three innings
*No more than one save may be credited each game.

## CAREER NOTES

- Is the Yankees' longest-tenured player, having been drafted by the club in the third round of the 2005 First-Year Player Draft and making his Major League debut with the Yankees in 2008...is one of five players drafted by the Yankees to collect at least $1,000 \mathrm{H}$ with the club (also Thurman Munson, Don Mattingly, Derek Jeter and Jorge Posada), all of whom spent their entire careers in pinstripes.
- Is one of four players in Yankees history to collect at least 1,000H and 200SB with the club over his first 10 seasons: also Derek Jeter, Willie Randolph and Hal Chase.

- Hit an AL-best five leadoff HRs ( $7 / 2$ vs. Tampa Bay, $7 / 13$ at Baltimore, $7 / 29$ at Texas, $7 / 30$ at Texas and $8 / 31$ at Toronto), tied with Milwaukee's Carlos Gomez and Colorado's Charlie Blackmon for most such HRs in the Majors...tied Los Angeles-AL's Kole Calhoun for the most HR in the AL out of the leadoff spot in the lineup (17).
- Scored 4R on 3BB without a hit in $4 / 24$ win at Boston...became just the second Yankee in franchise history with at least 4 R in a single game without a hit (also Bert Daniels on $5 / 10 / 1913$ at Detroit, 0 -for- 3 with 4R)—credit:Elias.
- Was named AL "Player of the Week" after batting . 478 (11-for-23) with $8 \mathrm{R}, 3$ doubles, $5 \mathrm{HR}, 7 \mathrm{RBI}, 5 \mathrm{BB}$ and a Major League-leading 1.261 slugging percentage in six games from $7 / 28-8 / 3$...all of his games during his "Player of the Week"-winning stretch came during the Yankees' six-game road trip to Texas and Boston...became the first player to hit at least .478 with 5 HR on one road trip since Mickey Mantle hit .550 (11-for-20) with 8 HR on a six-game road trip to Boston and Washington from 6/28-7/3/66 (credit: Elias).
- Homered in three consecutive games (7/28-30) for the first time in his career (4HR total over the stretch)...hit two solo HRs-his first career multi-HR game-in $7 / 28$ loss at Texas.
- Hit leadoff HRs on 7/29 and 7/30 at Texas, becoming the third Yankee in 50 years (since 1965) to hit a leadoff HR in consecutive team games (also Chuck Knoblauch, 7/30-31/99, and Derek Jeter, 8/17-18/01).
- Was ejected from $9 / 2$ loss vs. Boston by HP umpire Tim Timmons in the fifth inning (arguing a called third strike)... was his third career ejection (also 7/21/10 vs. Los Angeles-AL and 7/19/13 at Boston).
- Missed six games from 9/6-12 (Game 1) with a lower abdominal strain.
- Hit the 15,000 th home run in Yankees franchise history with a fifth-inning solo shot in $9 / 21$ win vs. Toronto.
- Underwent surgery to repair a core muscle injury to his right rectus abdominis muscle on 10/16...the surgery was performed by Dr. William Meyers at the Philadelphia Vincera Institute in Philadelphia.
- Signed a four-year contract extension with the Yankees on 2/24/14, beginning in the 2015 season and extending through 2018, with a club option for 2019.


## 2013

- Hit . 273 (147-for-539) with 81R, 33 doubles, 10 triples, 8 HR, 52 RBI and 24SB in 145 games ( 130 starts in CF, one at DH) with the Yankees....was the first Yankee to lead the AL in triples since Hank Bauer and Gil McDougald each had an AL-leading 9 triples in 1957...was the first Yankee since Snuffy Stirnweiss in 1945 with at least 30 doubles, 10 triples and 20SB in a single season.
- Was named AL "Player of the Week" for 6/4-9, batting .520 (13-for-25) with 5 R, 5 doubles, 1 HR and 6 RBI during the stretch...was his first career "Player of the Week" award.
- With his 10th-inning "walk-off" single in $8 / 9$ win vs. Detroit and ninth-inning "walk-off" HR in $8 / 11$ win vs. Detroit, became the first Yankee with two "walk-off" hits in a span of three-days-or-fewer since Claudell Washington in 1988 (credit: Elias). ..the single was his first "walk-off" hit since 6/16/11 vs. Texas...the solo HR was his first career "walk-off" HR and fifth "walk-off" hit.
- Collected his 500th career hit with a fifth-inning single in $8 / 26$ loss at Toronto.
- Did not play in the Yankees' final 15 games of the season (9/13-29) with a left oblique strain...left $9 / 12$ win at Baltimore after the top of the first inning with the injury, which was suffered on a checked swing.


## 2012

- Was limited to 16 games (8GS in LF) with the Yankees, batting . 323 ( 10 -for- 31 ) with 7R, 2 doubles and 3RBI.
- Was placed on the 15 -day D.L. on $4 / 19$ (retro. to $4 / 18$ ) with a right elbow strain... was transferred to the 60 -day D.L. on $6 / 26$ and reinstated on $9 / 25$, missing 142 team games...was scratched from the lineup prior to $4 / 18$ loss vs. Minnesota...the injury occurred during $4 / 17$ win vs. Minnesota, on a diving catch to end the third inning.
- Began a rehab assignment with Triple-A Scranton/Wilkes-Barre on 5/8...played in two rehab games before being returned from rehab on 5/10 after experiencing soreness and swelling...played in an additional rehab game with Single-A Charleston on $6 / 8 \ldots$ was again returned from rehab after experiencing right elbow stiffness.
- Met with Dr. Timothy Kremchek on 6/14, who agreed with the Yankees' previous diagnosis of an elbow muscle strain, bone bruise and joint inflammation which had not fully healed... underwent arthroscopic surgery on the elbow on $7 / 24$, performed by Dr. Christopher Ahmad at NewYork-Presbyterian Hospital.
- Made his first appearance since $4 / 17$ in $9 / 26$ win at Minnesota, entering as a ninth-inning defensive replacement in LF...his pinch-hit at-bat in $10 / 1$ win vs. Boston and pinch-hit single in $10 / 3$ win vs. Boston were his first plate appearance and hit, respectively, since $4 / 17 \mathrm{vs}$. Minnesota.
- Appeared in five postseason games for the Yankees, going 0-for-8 with 2SB...started ALCS Game 3 (in LF) and Game 4 (in CF), both at Detroit.


## 2011

- Hit 259 (132-for-510) with 87R, 19 doubles, 7HR, 36RBI and 60BB in 159 games ( 124 starts in LF and 10 in CF) with the Yankees...tied for the AL lead and tied for second in the Majors with 49 stolen bases (in 62 attempts).
- Along with Coco Crisp, was the co-recipient of the Negro Leagues Baseball Museum's James "Cool Papa" Bell Award, given annually to the AL and NL leaders in stolen bases...was successful in 44 of his last 51 steal attempts ( $86.3 \%$ ), beginning on $5 / 20$, after having just 5SB in his first 11 tries.
- Hit his first career leadoff HR—and the Yankees' only leadoff HR in 2011-in 6/19 win at Chicago-NL.
- Successfully stole a base in 22 straight attempts from 6/25-8/9, the longest such streak by a Yankee since Derek Jeter's 22 in-a-row from 7/20/01-6/2/02 (credit: Elias)...Elias also notes it was the longest single-season streak by a Yankee since Rickey Henderson's franchise record of 28 straight steals without being caught in 1988.
- Recorded 13SB in July, tied with Rajai Davis for most in the AL for the month...was the first Yankee since 1920 (when the AL began tracking caught stealing) with 13 -or-more SB in a calendar month without being caught....his total was the highest for a Yankee in a calendar month since Tony Womack stole 14 bases in May 2005.
- Hit . 412 (7-for-17) with 3R, 1 double and 5RBI in the ALDS loss vs. Detroit. ..tied for team lead in hits for the series.


## 2010

- Hit . 277 (132-for-477) with 97R, 20 doubles, 7 triples, 5HR, 47RBI and 47SB in 150 games ( 96 starts in LF, 38 in CF) with the Yankees...stole 47 bases in 56 attempts (83.9\%).
- Led all Major Leaguers with 4.61 pitches seen per PA...swung at only $7.6 \%$ of first pitches, the lowest such mark in the Majors.
- Became the seventh Yankee since 1941 to reach the 40 -steal plateau in a season (also Rickey Henderson, Roberto Kelly, Mickey Rivers, Steve Sax, Alfonso Soriano and Snuffy Stirnweiss). . .marked the most steals by a Yankee in a season since Rickey Henderson in 1988 (93SB). ..recorded 45.6\% of the Yankees' 103SB in 2010, the highest percentage by a Yankee since Henderson in 1988 (63.7\%, 93-of-147)—credit: Elias.
- Stole home on the back end of a double steal in the fourth inning of 4/4 Opening Day loss at Boston...became the first Yankee to steal home since Alex Rodriguez on 7/31/04 vs. Baltimore (also part of a double steal) and the first player to steal home on Opening Day since Oakland's Mike Bordick on 4/6/92 vs. Kansas City (credit:Elias).
- Was removed from 6/8 win at Baltimore for PH (Thames) in the eighth with a sore left thumb and missed the next two

- Hit . 270 (67-for-248) with 48R, 3HR, 23RBI and 26SB in 108 games ( 63 starts in CF) with the Yankees....went 26-for-31 in stolen base attempts (83.9\%), ranking third among Major League rookies in stolen bases...became the third Yankees rookie over the last 50 years (since 1960) to steal at least 26 bases in a season, joining Alfonso Soriano (43SB in 2001) and Willie Randolph (37SB in 1976).
- Hit his first Major League home run-a two-run HR in the second inning—and was 2-for-3 with $2 \mathrm{R}, 1$ triple, 3RBI and 1 BB in $5 / 13$ win at Toronto...along with Ramiro Peña, became the first pair of Yankees rookies to both triple in the same game since 8/31/70, when Thurman Munson and Johnny Ellis did so off Mike Cuellar-credit: Elias.
- Hit an inside-the-park solo HR and tripled in $5 / 15$ win vs. Minnesota after entering defensively in the fourth in CF when Johnny Damon was ejected...was the first inside-the-park HR by a Yankee since Ricky Ledee on 8/29/99 vs. Seattle. . .was the fifth Yankees rookie since 1969 with an inside-the-park HR (Johnny Ellis-1969, Deion Sanders-1990, Derek Jeter-1996 and Ricky Ledee-1999).
- Homered and was 5 -for- 6 in $6 / 26$ win at the Mets...was the third Yankees rookie in club history with at least 5 H and 1 HR in the same game, joining Joe DiMaggio in 1936 (5H, 1HR) and Shane Spencer in 1998 (5H, 2HR).
- Was placed on the 15-day D.L. from 7/26-9/7 with a fractured left thumb (missed 40 team games).
- Appeared in 14 of the Yankees' postseason games, going 2-for-13 with 3R and 1SB...started the final two games (WS Games 5 and 6) in CF when Melky Cabrera was removed from the roster with a hamstring strain.
- Won the James P. Dawson Award, given by the BBWAA to the most outstanding Yankees rookie in spring training.


## 2008

- Saw his first Major League action, hitting . 228 (29-for-117) with 5 doubles, 2 triples, 16RBI and 13SB in 42 games ( 17 starts in CF, 15 starts in LF) over two stints with the Yankees ( $6 / 30-7 / 25$ and 8/15-9/28).
- Was signed to a Major League contract and selected to the Yankees' 25 -man active roster from Triple-A Scranton/Wilkes-Barre on 6/30, making his Major League debut that night in a loss vs. Texas and going 0-for-3 with 1SB as the leadoff hitter...according to Elias, was the first Yankee to make his Major League debut in the leadoff spot since Roberto Kelly on 7/29/87 vs. Kansas City.
- Was 8-for-8 in SB attempts before his first CS in 9/15 win vs. Chicago-AL...according to Elias, was the first Yankee to begin his Major League career with eight straight successful SB attempts since Andy Fox (8-for-8 in 1996).
- Recorded his first Major League hit—a seventh-inning single off Warner Madrigal—and was 1-for-4 with 2R, 1 RBI, 1 BB and 1SB in $7 / 2$ win vs. Texas, also recording his first run and RBI.

- Hit the first "walk-off" HR in Scranton/WB Yankees history on 4/23 vs. Buffalo, a solo HR in the bottom of the ninth.

- Made his professional debut, hitting . 284 (80-for-282) with 62R,5HR, 32RBI and 19SB in 73 G with short-season Single-A Staten Island...reached safely in a team-best 24 straight games from 7/17-8/10...hit . 235 (4-for-17) in four playoff games for the NYPL Champions.

- Graduated from the College of Charleston and was the highest-drafted player in the school's history after walking on the baseball team...in his senior year at Charleston, led the Cougars with a 447 batting average (122-for-273) and helped guide the team to a 48-15 regular season record and an NCAA tournament berth.
- Was named the winner of the "Heart and Hustle Award" in 2017, an award presented annually by the MLB Players Alumni Association to honor one Major Leaguer who demonstrates a passion for baseball and embodies the values, spirit and tradition of the game... has been named the Yankees' "Heart and Hustle Award" nominee five times in his career (2010, '13-15, '17), most by a Yankee since the award's inception in 2005.
- Was named the Yankees' nominee for the 2017 Roberto Clemente Award, his second nomination (also 2016). . the award recognizes a player from each MLB club who "best represents the game of Baseball through extraordinary character, community involvement, philanthropy and positive contributions, both on and off the field"...three Yankees have won the award since its inception in 1971:Derek Jeter (2009), Don Baylor (1985) and Ron Guidry (1984).
- Wore two pairs of specially designed New Balance cleats (one gold pair, one multi-colored pair) on 9/1/17 vs Boston, which were auctioned off as a fundraiser for Children's Cancer Awareness Month... proceeds from the auction went to Memorial Sloan Kettering Pediatric Center.

- Hit ninth-inning two-run "walk-off" HR in $6 / 29$ win vs. Texas, his first career "walk-off" hit...became the ninth SS in Yankees history to hit a "walk-off" HR...the others: Derek Jeter ( $4 / 5 / 05$ vs. Boston), Gene Michael ( $6 / 23 / 71$ vs. Detroit), Mickey Mantle (7/22/54-G1 vs. Chicago-AL - started in CF), Frank Crosetti (8/31/44-G2 vs. Washington-AL), Phil Rizzuto (4/23/41 vs. Boston), Tony Lazzeri (7/5/27 vs. Washington-AL), Ernie Johnson (7/29/25 vs. St. Louis-AL) and Roger Peckinpaugh (6/29/21-G2 vs. Boston).
- Batted in the cleanup spot in the starting lineup for the first time in his career in $8 / 13$ win vs. Tampa Bay, hitting a two-run HR and going 2 -for- 4 with 1 double.

- Hit a pinch-hit solo HR for Ronald Torreyes in the seventh - the second of back-to-back HRs with Ellsbury-in 9/13 win vs. Los Angeles-NL...was his first career pinch-hit HR.

- Hit. 206 in April, 232 in May, 258 in June and .317 in July....was the second player in Yankees history to improve his monthly averages by 25 or more points in every month, April through July (min. 50AB each month), joining Melky Cabrera in 2007 (.200, . 254, .298, .368)—credit: Elias...Giancarlo Stanton later did so in 2018 (.218, .264, .298, .323)...hit . 310 in August and .248 in September/October.
- Hit . 237 (49-for-207) with 21R, 8 doubles, 4HR, 16RBI, a 622 OPS and 9E in his first 63 games of the season (4/6$6 / 21$ )...over his final $92 \mathrm{G}(6 / 22-10 / 4)$, hit .283 ( 90 -for- 318 ) with 36 R, 16 doubles, 5 HR, 40 RBI, a 730 OPS and $4 E$.
- Ranked as the fifth-most valuable fielder in the AL and 12th-most valuable fielder in the Majors across all positions according to DEF metric (FanGraphs)...had 14.2 defensive runs above average.
- Made his Yankees debut in 4/6 Opening Day loss vs. Toronto, going 0-for-2 with 1HP in his first career Opening Day start at SS...collected his first hit and RBI as a Yankee with a fifth-inning single in 4/9 loss vs. Toronto.
- Hit three-run HR—his first HR as a Yankee—in 5/22 loss vs. Texas...snapped a 205AB homerless stretch.

## Bobby Murcer Recognized

Oklahoma Christian University dedicated the new Bobby Murcer Indoor Training Facility on September 23, 2011.

OCU officials and members of Bobby Murcer's family were on hand to celebrate the opening of the $\$ 503,000$ facility, named after the Oklahoma City native and New York Yankees player and broadcaster, who died in July 2008 at age 62 after battling brain cancer.

Although he never attended Oklahoma Christian, Murcer-who attended Southeast High School in Oklahoma City and was one of the state's most famous baseball players before being drafted by the Yankees-had strong ties with many people associated with the university, as he and his wife, Kay, attended Memorial Road Church of Christ, which is located immediately southwest of the OCU campus.

The Bobby Murcer Indoor Training Facility is located on the northwest corner of the Oklahoma Christian campus, next to Dobson Field, where the Eagles' baseball team plays its home games. The 12,800-square-foot facility includes 8,000 square feet of workout space, including batting cages. The facility also includes a clubhouse with showers, an athletic training area, a weight training area and laundry facilities.

The lobby of the facility includes photos from Murcer's playing and broadcasting careers, special wallpaper depicting various scenes from OCU's baseball history and plaques honoring the Oklahoma Christian players who have received NAIA All-America honors through the years.

Former Yankee Allie Reynolds (pictured) is one of only five pitchers to record two regular-season no-hitters in the same season, accomplishing the feat in 1951... prior to Reynolds, Cincinnati's Johnny Vander Meer was the first pitcher to hurl two no-hitters in the same season, doing so in back-to-back starts in June 1938...Detroit's Virgil Trucks (1952), California's Nolan Ryan (1973) and Washington's Max Scherzer (2015) are the only other pitchers to match the record.

Reynolds' first no-hitter of the 1951 season came on July 12 vs. Cleveland...his second no-hitter, took place in Game 1 of a doubleheader on Sept. 28 vs . Boston in an $8-0 \mathrm{win} . .$. notably with the Yankees'subsequent victory in Game 2, they clinched the American League pennant.

## Core Four

According to Elias, Derek Jeter, Hall of Famer Mariano Rivera and Jorge Posada became the first trio of teammates in MLB, NBA, NFL and NHL history to appear in at least one game together in each of 17 consecutive seasons from 1995-2011. The second-longest trios in Yankees franchise history played 13 years together (Bill Dickey, Lefty Gomez and Red Ruffing from 1930-42; and Whitey Ford, Elston Howard and Mickey Mantle from 1955-67).
Jeter and Posada appeared in 1,693 regular season games together for the Yankees, surpassing Lou Gehrig and Tony Lazzeri ( 1,659 games) for the most games played together by any pair of teammates in franchise history.
Elias also notes that, in 2013, Rivera and Jeter each played in their 19th season with the Yankees, becoming the first pair of players to be teammates in 19 or more consecutive seasons since Alan Trammell and Lou Whitaker with Detroit, who were also together 19 straight seasons from 1977-95.
The first game in which Derek Jeter and Mariano Rivera appeared together was Sept. 28, 1996 at Fenway Park. Jeter started and went 0 -for-4. Andy Pettitte also appeared in his first career game with the duo that day, starting and going 2.01P. Rivera pitched 1.0IP and earned the hold. Posada also pinchhit in the contest, striking out. The Yankees won, 4-2, and the losing pitcher was Roger Clemens.

- His 114RBI were most by a Yankee since Curtis Granderson (119) and Robinson Canó (118) in 2011...the Yankees were 44-20 when he had at least 1RBI and 23-5 when he had multiple RBI.
- Is the fourth rookie in Yankees history with at least 100RBI in a season: Joe DiMaggio (125 in 1936), Tony Lazzeri (114 in 1926) and Hideki Matsui (106 in 2003).
- Became the eighth player in Yankees history with at least 100R, 100RBI and 100BB in a season, joining Lou Gehrig (11x: 1926-27, '29-32,'34-38), Babe Ruth (10x: 1920-21,'23-24, '26-28, '30-32), Mickey Mantle (3x: 1954,'56, '61), Charlie Keller (2x: 1941-42), George Selkirk (1939), Bernie Williams (1999) and Jason Giambi (2002) . . .only Ruth (10x), Gehrig ( 5 x ), Mantle ( 2 x ) and Giambi accomplished the feat while also hitting at least 40HR...is the fourth Yankee ever with at least 110R, 110RBI and 110BB in a season (Ruth-10x, Gehrig-5x, Mantle-2x).
- Joined Boston's Ted Williams (1939) as the only players ever with at least 100R, 100RBI and 100BB as a rookie.
- Had 38 games with at least 1R, 1RBI and 1BB, most by a Yankee since Lou Gehrig in 1936 (43).
- Became the fourth rookie all-time to draw 100BB and score 100R in a season, joining Ted Williams in 1939 (131R, 105BB), Lu Blue in 1921 (103R, 103BB) and Jim Gilliam in 1953 (125R, 100BB).

－Hit ． $426 / .588 / 1.049$（26－for－61）with 31R， 5 doubles， 11 HR ， 24 RB and 24 BB in 19 games vs．Baltimore．．．his 31R were the most by any player vs．any opponent in one season since Boston＇s Ted Williams scored 31R in 1947 vs. St．Louis－AL．．．Elias notes it marked the most by a rookie vs．one team since Joe DiMaggio in 1936 vs．the Browns （31R）．．．his 11 HR were the most by a Yankee vs．a single opponent in a season since 1961，when Roger Maris hit 13HR vs．Chicago－AL and Mickey Mantle hit 11HR vs．Washington－AL．．．according to Elias，tied Cleveland＇s Hal Trosky（11HR in 22G vs．Chicago－AL in 1934）for the most homers by a rookie against one team in a single season．．．his 24BB were the most by a Yankee vs．an opponent since 1959.

－Was named AL＂Rookie of the Month＂for April，batting． 303 （23－for－76）with 23R，10HR and 20RBI in 22 games．．．was the third Yankee ever to hit at least 10HR in March／April（Alex Rodriguez：14HR in 2007 and Graig Nettles：11HR in 1974）．．．ranked among all AL leaders with 23 （1st），a ． 750 SLG（1st），10HR（T1st）and 20RBI（T5th）in April．．．tied a Major League rookie record for the most home runs in April，previously set by Chicago－AL＇s José Abreu in 2014 and tied by Colorado＇s Trevor Story in 2016 （credit：ESPN Stats \＆Info）．．．was the fourth Yankee ever to win the award （also Hideki Matsui－June 2003，Robinson Canó－September 2005 and Gary Sánchez－August 2016）．

－Recorded his first career multi－HR game in $4 / 28$ win vs．Baltimore，hitting solo HR in the fifth and two－run HR in the sixth．．．at 25 years， 2 days old，was the youngest Yankees outfielder with 2HR in a game since Melky Cabrera （ $24 y, 254 d$ on $4 / 22 / 09$ vs．Oakland）．．．collected his second career multi－HR game in $5 / 2$ win vs．Toronto．．．at 25 years， 6 days old，became the youngest Yankees outfielder with multiple 2HR games since Dan Pasqua（23y， 268d on 7／12／85 and 24y，217d on 5／22／86）．
－Was named AL＂Rookie of the Month＂for May after batting ．347／．441／．642（33－for－95）with 17R， 5 doubles，7HR and 17 RBI in 26 games and leading all AL rookies in BA，runs，hits，HR，RBI and OBP，while ranking second in SLG．．．was his second straight＂Rookie of the Month＂honor，having also won the award in April．．．became the first Yankee ever to win the award twice．．．was the first Yankee to win any monthly award in consecutive months since Don Mattingly was named AL＂Player of the Month＂in both August and September of 1985.
－Had a career－long 32－game on－base streak from 5／28－6／30，batting ．339／．483／．720（40－for－118）with 34R， 7 doubles， 1 triple，12HR，32RBI and 32BB over the span．．．was the longest single－season streak by a Yankee since Derek Jeter had a 34 －game streak to end the 2012 season（ $8 / 27-10 / 3 / 12$ ）and the longest single－season streak for a Yankees rookie since Charlie Keller in 1939 （ 40 games）．．．reached base safely in 42 consecutive starts from 5／28－7／16（G1）， batting .321 （ 51 －for－159）with $39 \mathrm{R}, 8$ doubles， $15 \mathrm{HR}, 36 \mathrm{RBI}$ and 38 BB in his starts over the span．．．was the longest single－season streak by a Yankee since Mark Teixeira（42G，6／6－7／26／10）．

－Hit safely in 17 straight home games from 6／10－7／28（．379／．461／．864，25－for－66，20R， 2 doubles，10HR，17RBI，9BB）， matching the second－longest single－season streak by a Yankee at the current Yankee Stadium（since 2009）： Carlos Beltrán，18G（7／19－8／26／15）and Robinson Canó，17G（5／17－6／17／10）．．．was the longest home hitting streak by a rookie in franchise history（previous：Hideki Matsui，16G in 2003）—credit：Elias．
－His first－inning solo HR in $6 / 10$ win vs．Baltimore had an exit velocity of 121.1 mph ，setting a record for hardest hit HR in the Statcast－era（since 2015）．．．was surpassed by Giancarlo Stanton＇s 121.7 mph HR on 8／9／18．
－Hit his Major League－leading 20th home run of the season on $6 / 11$ vs．Baltimore，becoming the first rookie in Major League history to be the first player to 20HR in a season．．．hit solo HR and two－run HR and went 4－for－4 with 4R， 1 double and 1BB in the game．．．at 25 years， 46 days old，became the youngest Yankee to go 4 －for－4 or better with 2HR since Mickey Mantle（ 24 years， 211 days）went 4 －for－ 4 with 2 HR on 5／18／56 at Chicago－AL．．．his sixth－inning solo HR went 495＇（per Statcast），the longest measured HR hit in the Majors in 2017.

－Made his Major League debut in 8／13 win vs．Tampa Bay，hitting solo HR in the second off Matt Andriese and going 2－for－4 with 2R．．．the HR came in his first career PA，becoming the fifth Yankee in franchise history（and second in the inning immediately following Tyler Austin＇s solo HR）to accomplish the feat（also John Miller，Marcus Thames and Andy Phillips）．．．per ESPN Stats \＆Info，was the longest HR by a Yankee at Yankee Stadium since 6／10／11（Alex Rodriguez vs．Cleveland offFausto Carmona）．．．became the third player in the history of the current Yankee Stadium to hit a ball into or over the centerfield batters eye glass（also Seattle＇s Russell Branyan on 7／2／09 and Houston＇s Carlos Correa on 4／6／16）．．．with Austin also making his Major League debut in the game，became the first pair of teammates in Major League history to each homer in their Major League debuts in the same game．．．there had been just one other game in Baseball history in which two players each hit HRs in their first Major League at－bats， but they were on opposing teams（Brooklyn at Philadelphia on 4／19／38－the Phillies＇Emmett＂Heinie＂Mueller and the Dodgers＇Ernie Koy－both in the first inning）．．．．became the first pair of Yankees to make their Major League debuts as starters in the same game since C Johnny Ellis and CF Jim Lyttle on $5 / 17 / 69$ vs．California．．．was signed to a Major League contract and selected to the Yankees＇ 25 －man roster prior to the game．
－Hit solo HR－his second in as many career games－in 8／14 loss vs．Tampa Bay．．．according to Elias，became the second player in Baseball history to homer in his first at－bat in each of his first two Major League games， joining the Cardinals＇Keith McDonald in 2000．．．is the second player in Yankees history to homer in each of his first two Major League games，joining Joe Lefebvre，who did so from 5／22－23／80．．．joined Colorado＇s Trevor Story（first 4G，6HR from 4／4－8）as the only two players to accomplish the feat in 2016.
－Was placed on the 15 －day disabled list on $9 / 14$ with a Grade 2 right oblique strain．．．injury occurred on a swing taken in the bottom of the fourth in $9 / 13$ win vs．Los Angeles－NL（was removed in the top of the fifth）．

- Allowed 1H over 6.0 scoreless innings in $8 / 12$ win vs. Texas... at 38 years, 22 days, was the oldest pitcher to toss at least 6.0 scoreless frames with one-or-zero hits since Philadelphia's Jamie Moyer ( 46 years, 240 days) allowed 1 H in 7.0 IP on $7 / 16 / 09$ at Florida...was the oldest Yankee to accomplish the feat since Randy Johnson (42 years, 361 days) on 9/6/06 at Kansas City (7.0IP).
- Allowed 2R-or-fewer in eight of his final 11 starts, including his final start of the season on 9/27 at Tampa Bay (W, 5.0IP, 1H, 0R, 5K, 2HP)...was his seventh career start with at least 5.0 scoreless innings and 1 H -or-fewer.
- Made two official spring training starts, going $1-0$ with a 1.50 ERA ( $6.0 \mathrm{IP}, 4 \mathrm{H}, 1 \mathrm{ER}, 1 \mathrm{BB}, 4 \mathrm{~K}, 1 \mathrm{HR}$ ).
- Started ALDS Game 4 vs. Boston, taking the loss after permitting 3 ER in $3.0 \mathrm{IP}(5 \mathrm{H}, 2 \mathrm{BB}, 1 \mathrm{~K}, 1 \mathrm{HP})$.
- On 11/7/18, was re-signed by the Yankees to a one-year contract for the 2019 season.
- On $12 / 11 / 18$, underwent a heart procedure to insert a stent that relieved a blockage in one of his arteries...the procedure was performed at NewYork-Presbyterian Hospital...on 1/8/19, underwent a scheduled follow-up stress test and was cleared to begin workouts, which included baseball activities.


## 2017

- In his 17th Major League season, went $14-5$ with a 3.69 ERA (148.2IP, 139H, $64 \mathrm{R} / 61 \mathrm{ER}, 50 \mathrm{BB}, 120 \mathrm{~K}, 21 \mathrm{HR}$ ) in 27 starts. . opponents hit . 246 (139-for-566); LH . 253 ( 25 -for-99), RH . 244 (114-for-467)...the Yankees went 19-8 in his 27 starts... posted a 1.9 WAR and 4.49 FIP (FanGraphs).
- Tied for fifth in the AL in winning percentage (.737)...tied for ninth in the AL with seven road wins.
- Tied Luis Severino for the Yankees lead in wins, matching his highest win total since going 15-6 in 2012 (also 14-13 in 2013).
- Was placed on the 10 -day disabled list from $6 / 15$ (retroactive to $6 / 14$ ) to $7 / 4$ with a left hamstring strain and from 8/11 (retroactive to 8/9)-8/19 with right knee inflammation.
- For the first time since 2010, allowed a higher BA to LHB (.253) than RHB (.244)...allowed HRs to LHB in back-to-back starts (Moustakas on $9 / 25$ vs. Kansas City, Kepler on $9 / 19$ vs. Minnesota) after going more than a year without allowing a HR to a LHB (span of 124 LHB since 9/8/16).
- Went 9-0 with a 1.71 ERA (68.1IP, 13ER) in 11 starts following a Yankees loss.
- Moved from 22nd to 18 th place on the all-time strikeout list, surpassing Frank Tanana ( 2,773 ), Cy Young $(2,799)$, Mike Mussina $(2,813)$ and Mickey Lolich $(2,832)$...on $8 / 19$ at Boston, surpassed Lolich $(2,679)$ for the record for strikeouts by a left-hander in AL history.
- Won all four starts vs. Boston, going 4-0 with a 1.04 ERA (26.0IP, 3ER)... was just the second Yankee since 1966 to go $4-0$ or better vs. Boston in a single season, joining Randy Johnson in 2005 ( $5-0$ in six starts)...was the first Yankee to win each start against the Red Sox in a single season, while making at least four of them, since Monk Dubiel in 1945 ( $6-0$ in six starts)...including a start on 9/29/16, won five consecutive starts vs. Boston, the second Yankee since 1966 to do so (Mike Mussina, five straight wins from 9/2/01-6/1/02) ...his 1.04 ERA was the third-lowest by a Yankee vs. the Red Sox (min. 20.0IP) since 1958 (Rudy May-0.83 in 1980, Scott Sanderson-0.96 in 1991).
- From 5/16-6/7, won five consecutive starts, each following a Yankees loss...was his longest streak of winning starts since 4/17-5/10/12 (five straight).
- In 8/1 loss vs. Detroit, made his 500th career regular season start...including Sabathia, four of the last six Major League pitchers to make at least 500 career starts eclipsed the milestone in a Yankees uniform: also Andy Pettitte ( $6 / 3 / 13 \mathrm{vs}$. Cleveland), Mike Mussina (9/18/07 vs. Baltimore), Randy Johnson (7/21/05 at Los Angeles-AL)...only Jamie Moyer (500th career start with Seattle) and Bartolo Colon (500th career start with the Mets) made theirs with other teams.
- Made his 250 th start as a Yankee in $8 / 31$ win vs. Boston.
- Made four postseason starts for the Yankees, going 1-1 with a 2.37 ERA (19.0IP, 16H, 7R/5ER, 10BB, 19K, 1HR).
- Posted a 3.72 ERA (9.2IP, 4ER) and did not record a decision in two starts in the ALDS vs. Cleveland...tied a postseason career high with 9 K in no-decision in ALDS Game 5 win at Cleveland (4.1IP, $5 \mathrm{H}, 2 \mathrm{ER}, 0 \mathrm{BB}$ ), becoming the fourth pitcher ever to record at least 9 K with $0 B B$ in a "winner-take-all" postseason game.
- Was 1-1 with a 0.96 ERA ( 9.1 IP, 1ER) in two starts in the ALCS vs. Houston...recorded his first career scoreless postseason start in ALCS Game 3 win vs. Houston ( $6.0 \mathrm{IP}, 3 \mathrm{H}, 4 \mathrm{BB}, 5 \mathrm{~K}$ )...was his 21 st career postseason start, snapping the longest streak of starts with at least 1R allowed to begin a postseason career in Major League history...took the loss in ALCS Game 7 at Houston despite allowing just 1ER in 3.1IP ( $5 \mathrm{H}, 3 \mathrm{BB}, 0 \mathrm{OK}$ ).


## 2016

- Went 9-12 with a 3.91 ERA (179.2IP, 172H, 83R/78ER, 65BB, 152K, 22HR, 9HP, 2WP) in 30 starts...the Yankees were $15-15$ in his starts...had 16 quality starts...opponents hit . 250 (172-for-687); LH . 209 (28-for-134), RH . 260 (144-for-553)...had 2.6 WAR (FanGraphs).
- Went 6-4 with a 3.26 ERA ( 91.0 IP, $33 E R$ ) in 15 road starts, the 10 th-lowest road ERA in the AL...had a 1.75 ERA (36.0IP, 7ER) in six road starts against AL East opponents, three of them scoreless starts.
- Led the AL with a $24.0 \%$ soft-hit percentage, second-best in the Majors to Chicago-NL's Kyle Hendricks' $25.1 \%$ (FanGraphs)...his $24.7 \%$ hard-hit percentage was lowest in the AL, second in the Majors to Washington's Tanner Roark's $24.3 \% \ldots$ his $16.9 \%$ line drive percentage was third-lowest in the Majors.
- Climbed from 27th to 22nd place on the all-time strikeout list $(2,726 \mathrm{~K})$...surpassed Bob Feller $(2,581)$ on $4 / 16$ vs. Seattle, Warren Spahn $(2,583)$ on $4 / 22$ vs. Tampa Bay, Tom Glavine $(2,607)$ on $5 / 26$ vs. Toronto, Chuck Finley $(2,610)$ on $5 / 31$ at Toronto and David Cone $(2,668)$ on $8 / 12$ vs. Tampa Bay...on $6 / 16$ at Minnesota, became the 11th pitcher to reach $2,500 \mathrm{~K}$ in the American League.
- In four May starts, went 2-2 and led the AL (min. 25.0IP) with a 1.04 ERA (26.0IP, 3ER), more than a full run lower than the next-best AL pitcher (Oakland's Rich Hill-2.13); was the second-lowest ERA in the Majors to Clayton Kershaw (0.91)...also marked the lowest ERA in a calendar month by a Yankees pitcher (min. 25.01P) since Hiroki Kuroda (0.55) in July 2013.
- Posted a 0.82 ERA (44.0IP, 4ER) over seven starts from $5 / 4-6 / 16 \ldots$ was the first Yankees pitcher to allow a total of $4 E R$-or-fewer over a seven-start stretch since 1984, when Phil Niekro allowed 8R/4ER in 54.1IP ( 0.66 ERA) over seven starts from 4/10-5/14/84...according to Elias, was just the third Yankee in 40 years (since 1977) to post an ERA as low as 0.82 over a seven-start span, joining Niekro in 1984 and Ron Guidry (0.64) in 1978.
- Was placed on the 15 -day D.L. on $5 / 6$ (retroactive to $5 / 5$ ) with a left groin strain... was reinstated on $5 / 20$.
- On $8 / 17 \mathrm{vs}$. Toronto, became the first Yankee ever record at least 12 K and 7ER in the same game...marked his highest strikeout total since 6/7/12 vs. Tampa Bay (12K).
- Made his 200th start as a Yankee on $4 / 16$ vs. Seattle...reached $3,000.0$ career innings on $4 / 22$ vs. Tampa Bay...earned his 100th win as a Yankee on $5 / 20$ at Oakland...made his 100th start at Yankee Stadium on 7/16 vs. Boston...reached 3,000 .0IP as an AL pitcher on $8 / 28$ vs. Baltimore.
- Underwent arthroscopic right knee surgery for a routine cleanup on $10 / 11 \ldots$ the surgery was performed by Yankees Head Team Physician Dr. Christopher Ahmad at NewYork-Presbyterian Hospital.


## 2015

- Went 6-10 with a 4.73 ERA ( 167.1 IP, $88 E R$ ) and one complete game in 29 starts...led the team in innings pitched and starts. . .opponents hit . 285 (188-for-659, 28HR) ; LH . 186 ( 24 -for-129, 3HR), RH .309 ( 164 -for-530, 25HR).
- Was on the 15 -day disabled list from 8/24-9/9 with right knee inflammation... went 2-1 with a 2.17 ERA (29.0IP, 7ER) in his final five starts after coming off the D.L.
- Tied a career high with 28HR allowed (also 2013), tied for sixth-most in the AL... allowed 25HR to RHB, tied for second-most in the Majors.
- Earned the victory in the Yankees' 10,000 th win in franchise history in his start on $10 / 1$ vs. Boston...earned his 200th career AL win on 6/7 vs. Los Angeles-AL.
- Surpassed Mariano Rivera ( $1,173 \mathrm{~K}$ ) for seventh place on the Yankees' all-time strikeout list on $9 / 20$ at the Mets...surpassed Bob Shawkey (1,167K) for eighth place on $9 / 14$ at Tampa Bay...recorded his 2,500th career strikeout on $6 / 7$ vs. Los Angeles-AL (Johnny Giavotella).
- Was ejected in the sixth inning of his start on 6/7 vs. Los Angeles-AL.
- Was 3-4 with a a career-worst 5.28 ERA (46.0IP, 27ER) in eight starts with the Yankees...despite not pitching a full season, finished with a $9.39 \mathrm{~K} / 9.0 \mathrm{IP}$ ratio ( $48 \mathrm{~K} / 46.0 \mathrm{IP}$ ), the highest mark of his career.
- Made his 11th career Opening Day start and sixth with the Yankees (2009-14), becoming the fifth pitcher in franchise history to make at least six Opening Day starts for the club (Ford-7, Guidry-7, Stottlemyre-7 and Gomez-6)...struck out Dexter Fowler in the fourth inning for his 1,000th strikeout as a Yankee, reaching the mark in 1,119.1IP with the club...among the 12 pitchers to record at least 1,000K with the Yankees, only Roger Clemens (1,078.1IP) and Mariano Rivera (1,084.0IP) reached the milestone in fewer innings (credit: Elias).
- Was placed on the 15 -day disabled list on $5 / 11$ with right knee inflammation... was transferred to the 60 -day D.L. on $7 / 1$...made two rehab starts with Single-A Tampa (on 6/28) and Double-A Trenton (on 7/2), combining to go 0-1 with a 7.50 ERA (6.0IP, 5ER) before having his rehab shut down.
- Underwent season-ending arthroscopic right knee surgery on 7/23...the surgery was performed by Dodgers Head Team Physician Dr. Neal EIAttrache in Los Angeles.


## 2013

- In 32 starts with the Yankees, went $14-13$ with a 4.78 ERA (211.0IP, 112ER).
- Recorded a win in the Yankees' 4-1 victory over Boston on $5 / 31$ ( $7.1 \mathrm{IP}, 6 \mathrm{H}, 1 \mathrm{ER}, 0 \mathrm{BB}, 10 \mathrm{~K}$ )...was the fifth time in his career he had recorded at least 10K without walking a batter and first time as a Yankee (also 7/18/08 at San Francisco, 7/29/07 vs. Minnesota, 9/26/06 vs. Chicago-AL and 9/7/05 at Detroit).
- Recorded his 36 th career complete game on $6 / 5$ vs. Cleveland ( $9.0 \mathrm{IP}, 7 \mathrm{H}, 4 \mathrm{ER}, 1 \mathrm{HR}, 1 \mathrm{BB}, 9 \mathrm{~K}$ ), his first CG against the Indians, the team that drafted him in 1998.
- Earned his 200th career win on 7/3 at Minnesota...according to Elias, became the 27th pitcher in Major League history, and just the eighth in the Expansion Era (since 1961), to reach 200 wins before turning 33 years old (following Don Drysdale, Catfish Hunter, Ferguson Jenkins, Greg Maddux, Juan Marichal, Jim Palmer and Tom Seaver)...according to Elias, was the 92nd pitcher to win 200 career games in the Modern Era and 111th hurler all-time to reach the plateau.
- Following his last start of the season on $9 / 20$ vs. San Francisco, was placed on the 60 -day disabled list with a Grade 2 left hamstring strain on 9/25 (retroactive to 9/21).


## 2012

- Was $15-6$ with a 3.38 ERA (200.0IP, 75ER) and 197 K in 28 starts for the Yankees...made his sixth career (and third straight) All-Star appearance (did not pitch in AL's $8-0$ loss in Kansas City)...his .714 winning percentage ranked third in the AL.
- Had two stints on the 15-day disabled list, missing 18 team games with a left groin strain (6/28-7/16) and 14 games with left elbow inflammation ( $8 / 12$, retro to $8 / 9,-8 / 23$ ).
- On $8 / 8$ at Detroit, surpassed the $2,500.0$-inning mark for his career, becoming the youngest pitcher (age 32) to reach that milestone since Greg Maddux did so at age 31 in 1997 (credit: Elias).
- Made his 125th regular season start with the Yankees on 9/8 at Baltimore, recording the loss...went 72-28 (.720) over his first 125 regular season starts with the team, marking the most wins in franchise history through 125 starts since Ron Guidry went 75-30 (.714) to that point in his career (credit: Elias)...also marked the highest such winning percentage in Yankees history since Whitey Ford went 73-22 (.768) over his first 125 starts.
- Went 2-0 with a 1.53 ERA (17.2IP, 3ER) in two ALDS starts vs. Baltimore...tossed a complete game in "winner-take-all" ALDS Game 5 at Yankee Stadium (9.0IP, 4H, 1ER, 2BB, 9K), establishing postseason career highs in innings pitched, strikeouts and pitches thrown (121)...became just the second Yankee to throw a complete game in an ALDS contest (also David Wells on 10/4/97 in Game 3 at Cleveland)...his 17.2IP in the series were the most ever by a Yankee in a single ALDS, surpassing David Cone (15.2IP in the 1995 ALDS vs. Seattle)...made one ALCS start in Game 4 at Detroit, allowing 6R/5ER in 3.2IP in the loss ( $11 \mathrm{H}, 2 \mathrm{BB}, 3 \mathrm{~K}, 2 \mathrm{HR}$ ).
- Was seen by Dr. James Andrews on 10/25 in Birmingham, Ala., and underwent arthroscopic surgery on his left elbow to remove a small bone spur.


## 2011

- Was 19-8 (.704) with a 3.00 ERA (237.1IP, 79ER) and 230K in 33 starts with the Yankees, his third consecutive season with at least 19 wins...finished fourth in AL Cy Young voting ( 63 total points), and received two sixthplace votes for AL MVP.... his ERA to three decimals was 2.996, which Elias recognizes as a sub-3.00 ERA...was his second career season with a sub-3.00 ERA (also 2008, 2.70 in 35 starts)... his 237.1IP were the most by a Yankees pitcher in a sub-3.00 ERA season since Andy Pettitte in 1997 (240.1IP, 2.88 ERA).
- Was named to the AL All-Star Team, his fifth selection (also 2003-04, '07 and '10)....was unavailable to pitch.
- Ranked among all pitchers in wins (second in AL, tied for fourth in Majors), strikeouts (second in AL, fourth in Majors), winning pct. (fourth in AL, eighth in MLB) and innings pitched (fourth in AL, tied for fourth in MLB).
- With 230K, became the third Yankees pitcher to record at least 225K in a season (Ron Guidry, 248 in 1978; Jack Chesbro, 239 in 1904)...marked the second-highest total of his career (251 in 2008).
- Went $18-4$ with a 2.49 ERA (206.1IP, 57ER) against teams other than Boston...went 1-4 with a 6.39 ERA (31.OIP, 22 ER ) vs. Boston, marking his first time losing to a team four times in one season....became the first Yankee to take four losses vs. the Red Sox in a single season since Pat Dobson went 1-4 in 5GS in 1975...his first three losses vs. Boston were to Josh Beckett, marking the first time one pitcher defeated him three times in a single season.
- Became the Majors' first 10-game winner with a victory on $6 / 25$ vs. Colorado...according to Elias, was the first Yankees pitcher to be first in the Majors to 10 wins in a season (tied or outright) since Tommy John in 1979...marked his 50th win as a Yankee, matching Chien-Ming Wang as the quickest to 50 wins as a Yankees starter over the last 30 years (1982-2011)...at 50-19, became the fifth pitcher in 60 years with fewer than 20 losses at the time of their 50th win for the Yankees: also Whitey Ford, Ron Guidry, David Cone and Wang.
- Recorded his 12 th career shutout in a $1-0$ win on $7 / 10 \mathrm{vs}$. Tampa Bay (9.0IP, 4H, 1BB, 9K).
- Had a career-long 23.2-inning scoreless streak from 6/30-7/10, the longest scoreless stretch by a Yankees starter since Tom Underwood in May 1980 (24.2IP) - credit: Elias.
- Collected a career-high 14 K in $7 / 26$ win vs. Seattle (7.0IP, 1H, 1ER, 3BB)...retired his first 19BF before allowing a one-out single to Brendan Ryan in the seventh... was his longest career bid for a perfect game...marked the most strikeouts in a single game by a Yankees left-hander since David Wells struck out 16 on 7/30/97 vs. Oakland...struck out seven straight batters beginning with the first out of the fourth, marking the longest such stretch by a Yankee since Ron Davis tied the then-AL record with eight consecutive Ks on 5/4/81 at California...according to Elias, became the fifth left-hander in the Live Ball Era (since 1920) to limit an opponent to 1 H -or-fewer with at least 14 K ...the only other Yankee to record such an outing-regular or postseason-was Roger Clemens, who had 15K and allowed 1H at Seattle in Game 4 of the 2000 ALCS.
- Was named the "AL Pitcher of the Month" for July (4-1, 0.92 ERA), his fifth "Pitcher of the Month" award.
- Allowed a career-high 5HR (all solo) on 8/12 vs. Tampa Bay...tied the franchise record for most HR allowed in a game (sixth time)...was one of two to allow all solo HRs (Joe Ostrowski, $6 / 22 / 50$ at Cleveland). ..tied a career high by surrendering 3HR in the third (Kotchman/Shoppach back-to-back, Damon).
- Appeared in three postseason games (2GS) in the Yankees' ALDS loss vs. Detroit, posting a 6.23 ERA (8.2IP, 10H, $6 \mathrm{ER}, 11 \mathrm{~K}$ ) with no decisions...had Game 1 start cut short by a postponement (rain) after just $2.01 \mathrm{P} . .$. made his first career relief appearance in Game 5 loss (1.1IP, 2H, 1ER, $2 \mathrm{BB}, 4 \mathrm{~K}$ )...snapped a stretch of 370 consecutive regular season and postseason starts to begin his career...among pitchers whose first career relief appearance came in the postseason, had the third-longest streak before it was snapped (Mike Mussina-400, John Smoltz-380).


## 2010

- Was 21-7 with a 3.18 ERA (237.2IP, 84ER) and 197K in 34 starts with the Yankees, marking his first career 20-win season...the Yankees went 23-11 in his starts...finished third in AL Cy Young Award voting and garnered six votes in AL MVP voting (two eighth place, three ninth place and one 10th place).
- Named to The Sporting News' 2010 list of the 50 greatest players in baseball today (No. 13), as selected by a panel of 125 Hall of Famers, major award winners and other baseball experts.
- Became just the second Yankee since 1986 to win at least 21 games (Andy Pettitte, 21-8 in 2003 and 1996)....remains the Yankees' most recent 20-game winner.
- Ranked among pitching leaders in wins (first in AL, tied for first in MLB), innings pitched (second in AL, third in MLB), winning percentage (third in MLB and AL), starts (tied for first in AL, tied for third in MLB), strikeouts (sixth in AL ) and ERA (seventh in AL)...became the first pitcher in franchise history to earn at least a share of the American League lead in wins in consecutive seasons (also tied for the AL lead with 19 wins in 2009).
- Became the 34th Yankee to record a 20-win season, marking the 59th 20-win season in franchise history... became the ninth Yankees LHP to collect at least 20 wins in a season...marked the most single-season wins by an AfricanAmerican pitcher in Yankees franchise history...was the Majors' first African-American 20-game winner since Florida's Dontrelle Willis in 2005 (22-10) and the AL's first since Oakland's Dave Stewart in 1990 (21-12).
- Was named to his fourth career All-Star team but did not pitch in the AL's 3-1 loss in Anaheim.
- Went 11-2 with a 3.00 ERA (111.0IP, 37ER) at Yankee Stadium, beginning the season 11-0 at home... became the first Yankee to win his first 11 home decisions of a season since David Cone and David Wells in 1998 (credit: Elias).
- Did not allow a HR over a career-long 80.2-inning stretch between Luke Scott's HR on 6/3 vs. Baltimore and Victor Martínez's HR on 8/7 vs. Boston.
- Carried a no-hitter through two outs in the eighth inning of a 10-0 win on $4 / 10$ at Tampa Bay until Kelly Shoppach singled to left field ( $7.2 \mathrm{IP}, 1 \mathrm{H}, 2 \mathrm{BB}, 5 \mathrm{~K}$ )... was the deepest he had ever gone in a game without allowing a hit.
- Threw complete games in consecutive starts on $4 / 16$ vs. Texas ( 6.0 IP in win) and $4 / 22$ at Oakland ( 8.0 IP in loss), despite not throwing 9.0IP in either start...was the first Yankee with back-to-back CGs since David Wells in September 1998.
- Won a career-best eight straight starts from $6 / 3-7 / 11$, recording a 1.81 ERA $(59.2 \mathrm{P}, 43 \mathrm{H}, 13 \mathrm{R} / 12 \mathrm{ER}, 18 \mathrm{BB}, 50 \mathrm{~K}$, 2HR)...became the first Yankee to win at least eight consecutive starts since Mike Mussina won nine straight from 9/24/02-5/7/03, and the most in a single season since Roger Clemens won eight in a row from 5/26-7/4/01.
- Made his 300th career start in $6 / 3$ win vs. Baltimore, recording the victory... at 29 years, 317 days old, became the youngest pitcher at the time of his 300th start since Dwight Gooden (age 29 years, 205 days on 6/9/94) and the youngest lefty since Fernando Valenzuela (age 29 years, 226 days on 6/15/90)—credit: Elias.

－Started the first－ever regular season game in the current Yankee Stadium on $4 / 16$ vs．Cleveland，leaving without a decision in a 10－2 Indians victory（ $5.2 \mathrm{IP}, 5 \mathrm{H}, 1 \mathrm{ER}, 5 \mathrm{BB}, 4 \mathrm{~K}$ ）．
－Recorded a $4-0$ complete－game shutout victory on $5 / 8$ at Baltimore（ $4 \mathrm{H}, 1 \mathrm{BB}, 8 \mathrm{~K}$ ）．．．．marked the first CG SHO by a Yankee since Chien－Ming Wang on 7／28／06 vs．Tampa Bay（2H，2BB，1K），snapping a franchise－record 414－game stretch without a Yankees pitcher recording a shutout（credit：Elias）．
－Recorded his 1,500 th career strikeout on $7 / 28$ at Tampa Bay（Carl Crawford）．

－Went 17－10 with a 2.70 ERA（253．0IP，76ER）in 35 combined starts with Cleveland and Milwaukee．．．led the Majors in innings pitched，complete games（10）and shutouts（five）and ranked second in strikeouts（career－high 251） and fourth in ERA．．．despite his mid－season trade，finished fifth in NL Cy Young Award voting and sixth in NL MVP voting．
－His five shutouts were the most in a single season since Randy Johnson＇s six in 1998 and his 10CG were the most since Johnson＇s 12 in 1999.
－Remains the only pitcher in the Modern Era（since 1900）to record at least 120 strikeouts for two teams in the same season（ 123 with Cleveland， 128 with Milwaukee）．．．was also the first to do it in both leagues in one season．．．the only other pitcher to reach 100K with two teams was Randy Johnson in 1998 （213 with Seattle， 116 with Houston）．
－Lost his first three decisions（0－3，4GS， 13.50 ERA）．．．over his remaining 31 starts（beginning 4／22），posted a 17－7 record and a 1.88 ERA，leading the Majors in ERA over the span．

- Won a career-high 12 straight decisions over 16 starts from 6/10-8/31, pitching to a 1.55 ERA over the stretch (128.0IP, 96H, 22ER, 28BB, 126K).
- Was acquired by Milwaukee on 7/7 in exchange for OF Matt LaPorta, LHP Zach Johnson, RHP Rob Bryson and a player to be named later (OF Michael Brantley)...became the fifth defending Cy Young Award winner to be traded before the end of the following season, joining Frank Viola, David Cone, Pedro Martínez and Roger Clemens...was leading the AL with 123 K at the time of the trade.
- Went $11-2$ with a 1.65 ERA (130.2IP, 24ER) in 17 starts as a Brewer, tossing seven complete games and three shutouts...the Brewers went 14-3 in his starts...opponents batted . 222 (106-for-478, 6HR)...after joining the Brewers, led the Majors in ERA, tied Cliff Lee for the most wins and ranked second in strikeouts (128).
- Won his first nine decisions over his first 13 starts after joining Milwaukee, winning the NL "Pitcher of the Month" Award in July (4-0, 2.27 ERA) and August (5-0, 1.12).
- Became the second pitcher in 90 years (1918-2007) to win his first nine decisions following a mid-season change of teams, joining Doyle Alexander, who went 9-0 after going from the Braves to the Tigers in 1987.

- Bested Boston's Josh Beckett (119 points to 86) to become the first African-American Cy Young Award winner since the Mets' Dwight Gooden won the NL award in 1985, and the first AL winner since Oakland's Vida Blue in 1971...also placed 14th in AL MVP voting... was named AL "Pitcher of the Year" by the MLBPA and The Sporting News and was named Indians "Man of the Year" by the Cleveland chapter of the BBWAA.
- Tied for first in the AL in starts, tied for second in wins, ranked second in complete games (four) and third in pitches thrown $(3,582)$, tied for third in winning pct. (.731), placed fifth in strikeouts and tied for ninth in GIDPs induced (23)...along with teammate Fausto Carmona (19 wins), became the first set of Tribe teammates since 1956 to each win at least 19 games.
- Reached double-digit wins for the seventh straight season to begin his career, becoming the second pitcher (and first LHP) in club history to accomplish the feat, joining RHP Addie Joss (first eight seasons from 1902-09).

- Led the Majors with six complete games, the most by an Indians LHP since Greg Swindell tossed seven in 1991...had the lowest road ERA (2.90) in the AL and the league's second-lowest day ERA (2.33)...ranked third in the AL in ERA, sixth in K/9.0IP (8.03) and opponents' average (.247), and tied for eighth in strikeouts (172).
- Made his third career Opening Day start on $4 / 2$ at Chicago-AL and left the game in the third inning with a strained right oblique muscle ( $2.11 \mathrm{P}, 3 \mathrm{H}, 3 \mathrm{ER}, 1 \mathrm{BB}, 3 \mathrm{~K}$ ).... was placed on the 15 -day disabled list the following day...made one rehab start with Triple-A Buffalo ( $5.0 \mathrm{IP}, 6 \mathrm{H}, 2 \mathrm{R}, 1 \mathrm{ER}, 1 \mathrm{BB}, 5 \mathrm{~K}$ ) before being activated on $5 / 2$.
- Was named AL "Pitcher of the Month" for May, going 5-1 with a 1.20 ERA (45.0IP, 6ER) in six starts after coming off the D.L. on $5 / 2$.
- Underwent arthroscopic surgery on his right knee on $9 / 29$ at the Cleveland Clinic to remove torn cartilage.
- Went $15-10$ with a 4.03 ERA (196.2IP, 88ER) in 31 starts with the Indians...ranked sixth in the AL in K/9.0IP ratio (7.37) and seventh in strikeouts (161), tied for eighth in wins and placed 10th in opponents' average (.248).
- Began the season on the 15 -day D.L. ( $3 / 25-4 / 16$ ) after straining his right oblique muscle warming up prior to his first spring start on $3 / 6 \mathrm{vs}$. Detroit... was his first trip to the Major League disabled list in his career.
- Hit his first career HR on 5/25 at Cincinnati in the fourth inning off Elizardo Ramírez...had 4RBI on the year (most by an Indians pitcher since 1972).
- Lost a career-high five straight starts from 7/6-30, then won seven straight starts from 8/5-9/7, recording the longest winning streak for an Indians pitcher since Ken Schrom from 6/6-7/10/86.
- Had his 2006 club option exercised by Cleveland on $4 / 27$ and was signed to a two-year extension.


## 2004

- Posted an 11-10 record with a 4.12 ERA (188.0IP, 86ER) in 30 starts with Cleveland...was selected to his second consecutive All-Star team, pitching 1.0 inning in the AL win in Houston.
- Was scratched from his start on $4 / 22$ vs. Kansas City due to an irritated left biceps tendon and did not start from 4/17-30.
- Made his 100th career start on $5 / 1$ vs. Baltimore, earning the win...became only the second Indians pitcher to make 100 career starts before age 24, joining Hall of Famer Bob Feller (175GS).
- Left his start on $6 / 26$ vs. Colorado after $1.01 P$ with irritation in his left shoulder...after MRI results in Cleveland were negative, traveled for a second opinion to Birmingham, Ala., on $6 / 28$ to visit Dr. James Andrews, who cleared him to return... was $3-0$ with a 2.57 ERA in six June starts ( $35.0 \mathrm{IP}, 27 \mathrm{H}, 10 \mathrm{ER}, 11 \mathrm{BB}, 26 \mathrm{~K}$ ).
- Notched his 50 th career win on $7 / 27$ vs. Detroit at the age of 24 years, 6 days, becoming the youngest pitcher to reach 50 career wins since Atlanta's Steve Avery on 10/1/93 (23 years, 170 days).
- Sat out the season's final two weeks due to a strained right hamstring.


## 2003

- Was 13-9 with a 3.60 ERA (197.2IP, 79ER) in 30 starts, earning his first career All-Star selection...at 22 years, 352 days, became the youngest Indians All-Star since RHP Dennis Eckersley in 1977 and was the first Cleveland left-hander to make the AL All-Star Team since Greg Swindell in 1989...did not appear in the All-Star Game.
- Ranked sixth among AL pitchers with a 3.09 home ERA, eighth with a 3.38 night ERA and 10th in overall ERA.
- Made his first career Opening Day start on $3 / 31$ at Baltimore (ND, 7.0IP, 2ER) and was the youngest O.D. starting pitcher (22 years, 253 days) in the Majors since the Mets' Dwight Gooden (22y, 143d) on 4/8/86 at Pittsburgh...was the youngest Indians O.D. starter since Eckersley (22y, 186d) on 4/7/77 at Boston.
- Tossed his first career complete-game shutout in a $1-0$ win on $8 / 15 \mathrm{vs}$. Tampa Bay ( $4 \mathrm{H}, 3 \mathrm{BB}, 9 \mathrm{~K}$ )... was the first complete-game, 1-0 shutout by an Indians hurler since Bud Black in 1990...collected a pinch-hit single in the 11th inning off Mike Williams in a 15 -inning game on $6 / 20$ at Pittsburgh, becoming the first Cleveland pitcher to record a pinch-hit since Dick Donovan on 7/28/63 (G2) vs. the Kansas City A's.


## 2002

- Went 13-11 with a 4.37 ERA (210.0IP, 102ER) in 33 starts, leading Cleveland pitchers in wins, innings pitched, starts and strikeouts (149)...ranked seventh in the AL with 0.73 HR/9.OIP (17HR, 210.0IP), ninth with 3,379 pitches thrown and 10th in strikeouts.
- Became the fifth pitcher in 16 seasons (since 1987) to win 30 games over his first two seasons in the Majors.
- Took a no-hitter into the eighth inning of his second start on $4 / 7$ at Detroit before yielding a leadoff single to Randall Simon...collected his first Major League hit on $6 / 15$ at Colorado, a single off Dennys Reyes.
- Signed a four-year contract through 2005 with a club option for 2006 on 2/23.


## 2001

- Saw his first Major League action with Cleveland, going 17-5 with a 4.39 ERA (180.1IP, 88 ER) in 33 starts, leading all rookie pitchers in wins, starts and strikeouts (171)...became the first Indians pitcher since Gene Bearden (20-7) in 1948 to earn at least 17 wins in his rookie season...at 20 years old, was the Majors' youngest active player all season...led AL rookies in innings and ERA.
- Finished second in AL "Rookie of the Year" voting with 73 points, to Seattle OF Ichiro Suzuki.
- Among AL pitchers, ranked third in winning pct. (.773), tied for sixth in wins and was seventh in strikeouts...his .228 opponents' BA (149-for-654) was the second-lowest mark among AL starters...led the AL with 13 road wins.
- Became the first player to finish a season under 22 years of age with at least 17 wins since Atlanta's Steve Avery (18-8) in 1991 and was the first AL pitcher to accomplish the feat since the White Sox' Britt Burns in 1980 (1913)...marked the most wins by a left-handed rookie since Seattle's Dave Fleming in 1992 (17-10).
- After the season, was named The Sporting News' AL "Rookie Pitcher of the Year" and was selected to the Baseball Digest and TOPPS Major League All-Rookie teams.
- Was a member of the Opening Day roster and made his Major League debut on $4 / 8$ vs. Baltimore, drawing a no-decision in Cleveland's $4-3$ win ( $5.2 \mathrm{IP}, 3 \mathrm{H}, 3 \mathrm{ER}, 2 \mathrm{BB}, 3 \mathrm{~K}, 1 \mathrm{HR}$ )...at 20 years, 261 days, was the youngest pitcher to start and appear in a game for Cleveland since Julián Tavárez (20 years, 77 days) on 8/7/93...registered his first Major League win in his second start on $4 / 13$ at Detroit ( $5.0 \mathrm{IP}, 5 \mathrm{H}, 4 \mathrm{ER}, 2 \mathrm{BB}, 2 \mathrm{~K}$ ), in a 9-8 Indians victory.
- Won the AL "Rookie of the Month" Award in July, going 3-0 with a 2.83 ERA as the Indians went $6-0$ in his starts.
- Won his first career postseason start in ALDS Game 3 vs. Seattle ( $6.01 \mathrm{P}, 6 \mathrm{H}, 2 \mathrm{ER}, 5 \mathrm{BB}, 5 \mathrm{~K}$ )...at 21 years, 84 days, became the youngest Indians pitcher to start an ALDS game and, at the time, the third-youngest starting pitcher in Division Series history (youngest in ALDS history) behind Los Angeles-NL's Fernando Valenzuela (1981, 20 years, 339 days) and St. Louis' Rick Ankiel (2000, 21 years, 77 days).


## 2000

Split the season between Single-A Kinston and Double-A Akron, posting a combined 3.57 ERA (146.1IP, 58ER) in 27 starts over the two stops while striking out an organization-high 159 batters.

- Has two of the top-six single-season strikeout totals in Yankees history ( 230 K in 2017, 220K in 2018)... is one of three pitchers in Yankees history with multiple 200-strikeout seasons (also David Cone, 1997-98 and Ron Guidry, 1978-79)...his 450K from 2017-18 are the most over a two-season span in Yankees history (previously Guidry, 449K from 1978-79).
- With his 500th strikeout on 7/23/18 at Tampa Bay, became just the third Yankees pitcher to reach the mark prior to his 25th birthday (Al Downing, Lefty Gomez).
- Has five games with at least 10 K and OBB, tied with David Cone and Masahiro Tanaka for the second-most in Yankees history behind Mike Mussina (seven).
- Since 1908, his 85 regular season starts are the fourth-most by a Yankees pitcher prior to turning 25 years old (Waite Hoyt-121, Al Downing-102, Lefty Gomez-93)...is the first pitcher to have multiple 30-start seasons in his age-24 seasons or younger since Julio Teheran and Shelby Miller did so from 2013-15, and the first Yankee to do so since Steve Kline in 1971-72.
- The Yankees are 44-19 in his 63 starts since the start of 2017, the most team wins started by a pitcher in the Majors in that span...are 37-10 in his last 47 starts since 7/8/17...from 7/8/17-7/12/18, the Yankees went 31-4 in his 35 starts, the first time the Yankees won at least 31 games in a pitcher's 35 -start span since going 31-4 over 35 Ron Guidry starts from 8/10/77-8/15/78 (Elias).
- Has allowed 1R-or-fewer in 27-of-63 starts since the start of 2017, tied for the fifth-most such starts in the Majors in that span (Chris Sale-30; Jacob deGrom-29; Justin Verlander-29; Blake Snell-28).
- Made his Major League debut as a 21 -year-old in 2015, going 5-3 with a 2.89 ERA ( $62.1 \mathrm{IP}, 20 \mathrm{ER}$ ) in 11 starts. . . was just the fourth pitcher in Yankees history to record at least five wins and post an ERA of 3.00-or-lower in his age-21 season or younger, joining Whitey Ford (1950), Hank Thormahlen (1918) and Ray Keating (1914).
- Was the first Yankee to allow 1ER-or-fewer in each of his first three career starts at the current Yankee Stadium.
- Is 6-2 with a 1.46 ERA (61.2IP, 10ER) in 11 career Interleague appearances (nine starts)...is third-lowest among active pitchers (min. 50.0IP), behind relievers Craig Kimbrel (1.14) and Dellin Betances (1.35).
- In 81 career minor league games ( 78 starts), held opponents to a .219 batting average ( 325 -for- 1,483 ) while averaging more than a strikeout per inning ( $403 \mathrm{~K} / 401.1 \mathrm{IP}$ )...allowed a total of 12 HR in the minors ( 1,611 BF)...pitched in the 2014 MLB All-Star Futures Game in Minnesota.
- Is 1-1 with a 5.63 ERA (16.0IP, 10ER) in four career postseason starts, all in 2017...is one of two pitchers in Yankees history to start four postseason games prior to turning 24 years old (Waite Hoyt, 4GS)...made his postseason debut in the 2017 AL Wild Card Game vs. Minnesota (ND, 0.1IP, 3ER), matching the shortest start by a Yankees pitcher in postseason history (also Art Ditmar in 1960 WS Game 1 at Pittsburgh and Bob Turley in 1958WS Game 2 at Milwaukee)...at 23 years, 225 days old, was the youngest Yankee to start a postseason game since Andy Pettitte (23.111) in 1995 ALDS Game 2 vs. Seattle... with 9K in 2017 ALDS Game 4 vs. Cleveland, is the secondyoungest Yankee ( 23 years, 231 days) to record 9K in a postseason game, behind Dave Righetti ( 22 years, 314 days for 1981 ALDS Game 2 at Milwaukee-10K)...started two potential elimination games at age-23; only two other such games in Yankees history were started by pitchers 23-or-younger: Mel Stottlemyre ( 22 years, 337 days in 1964 WS Game 7 at St. Louis) and Waite Hoyt ( 22 years, 34 days in 1921 WS Game 8 vs. New York Giants).
- Went $19-8$ with a 3.39 ERA (191.1IP, $173 \mathrm{H}, 76 \mathrm{R} / 72 \mathrm{ER}, 46 \mathrm{BB}, 220 \mathrm{~K}$, 19 HR ) and one complete game in 32 starts...held opponents to a . 238 BA (173-for-726); LH .252 (81-for-321), RH . 227 (92-for405)...ranked seventh among Major League pitchers and fourth among AL pitchers with 5.7 WAR (FanGraphs).
- Was named via the Player Ballot to his second career All-Star team (also 2017)... was the first Yankees starting pitcher to be named to consecutive All-Star teams since CC Sabathia made it to three straight from 2010-12...tossed a scoreless second inning ( $1 \mathrm{H}, 2 \mathrm{~K}$ ) in the AL's 8-6, 10 -inning win, allowing a double to Matt Kemp and striking out Bryce Harper and Brandon Crawford.
- Ranked third in the Majors (and AL) in wins, behind Tampa Bay's Blake Snell (21-5) and Cleveland's Corey Kluber (20-7)...were tied for second-most by a Yankee in the last 10 seasons (since 2009) behind CC Sabathia (21-7 in 2010)...in 13 seasons since 2006, tied for the second-highest win total by any pitcher in his age-24 season or younger, behind Clayton Kershaw (21-5 in 2011), and was the first AL pitcher that young to win at least 19 games since David Price (19-6) in 2010...were the second-most wins by a Yankees pitcher, age-24-or-younger, in the last 50 seasons (since 1969), behind Andy Pettitte (21-8 in 1996).
- No Yankees pitcher had won 15 games in a season since 2012 (Phil Hughes-16, Hiroki Kuroda-16, CC Sabathia-15)...the club's five-year drought without a 15-game winner had been tied for the Majors' secondlongest active drought, with Philadelphia also ending its five-year drought (Aaron Nola, 17-6 in 2018) and San Diego's extending its drought to 11 seasons (Jake Peavy, 19-6 in 2007).
- Finished eighth in the AL with 220 strikeouts...was the sixth-highest single-season strikeout total in Yankees history...ranked fourth in the AL with a $4.78 \mathrm{~K} / \mathrm{BB}$ ratio and seventh with a $10.35 \mathrm{~K} / 9.0 \mathrm{IP}$ ratio...had five double-digit-strikeout games, tied for 10th-most by a Yankee in a single season, and tied for the most since CC Sabathia had six in 2012.
- Tied for sixth in the AL in starts and ranked ninth in the AL in ERA...was sixth among qualified AL pitchers with a 2.95 FIP (FanGraphs).
- His 32 starts tied for the most by a Yankee in the last six seasons (since 2013).
- The Yankees went 24-8 in his 32 starts, tied for the most team wins started by one pitcher in 2018...were the second-most Yankees wins started by one pitcher in a season in the last 20 years (since 1999) behind Roger Clemens (27) in 2001...the Yankees won 10 straight Severino starts from 4/16-6/4, the longest winning streak in one Yankees pitcher's starts since Iván Nova started 12 consecutive wins from 6/10-9/2/11...the Yankees were 18-2 in his first 20 starts; according to STATS, Inc., was only the second time in the Live Ball Era that the Yankees won at least 18 of a pitcher's first 20 starts of a season (were 18-2 in Ron Guidry's first 20 starts in 1978).
- Led Major League starters with an average fastball velocity of 97.6 mph (FanGraphs)...per Statcast, threw 50 pitches in the sixth inning or later that registered at 99.0 mph -or-faster, the most by a starter in the Majors (Chris Sale was second with 16)...threw first-pitch strikes to 68.9 percent of batters, the highest mark in the AL and third-highest in the Majors...opponents hit . 191 ( 56 -for-293) with 11BB, 119K and 6 HR in ABs ending in a slider (Brooks Baseball).
- Became the fifth pitcher in Yankees history to record at least 10K with OBB three times in a single season, joining Mike Mussina (4 in 2001), David Cone (3 in 1998), Masahiro Tanaka (3 in 2017) and David Wells (3 in 1998).
- Led the Majors in wins before the All-Star break, going 14-2 with a 2.31 ERA ( $128.1 \mathrm{IP}, 33 \mathrm{ER}$ ) in 20 starts... was the fourth pitcher in franchise history to record at least 14 wins prior to the All-Star break, joining Mel Stottlemyre ( $14-7$ in $24 G S$ in 1969), Whitey Ford ( $16-2$ in 21GS in 1961) and Lefty Gomez (14-2 in 19G/17GS in 1934)...was only the fourth Major League pitcher in the last 16 seasons (since 2003) to record at least 14 wins prior to the All-Star break, joining Los Angeles-NL's Clayton Kershaw (14-2 in 19GS in 2017), Chicago-AL's Chris Sale (14-3 in 18GS in 2016) and Colorado's Ubaldo Jimenez (15-1 in 18GS in 2010)... went just $5-6$ with a 5.57 ERA (63.0IP, 39ER) in 12 starts after the break.
- Went $10-2$ with a 2.74 ERA ( 92.0 IP, 28ER) in 15 starts at Yankee Stadium... was one of seven pitchers with at least 10 home wins in 2018...became the fourth pitcher to earn at least 10 wins in a season at the current Yankee Stadium, joining CC Sabathia (11-2 in 2010, 10-5 in 2013), Phil Hughes (11-4 in 2010, 11-4 in 2012) and Hiroki Kuroda (11-6 in 2012).
- From 9/3/17-7/1/18, went $11-0$ with a 1.83 ERA (88.2IP, 18ER) over 14 home starts, all Yankees wins...the 11 wins were the most consecutive winning decisions at home by a Yankee since CC Sabathia was 16-0 from 7/18/09-9/2/10...marked the Yankees' longest winning streak in one pitcher's starts at the current Yankee Stadium and the longest since winning 16 consecutive David Cone home starts from 8/17/97-8/27/98.
- From 9/27/17-6/16/18, completed 6.0IP with 2R-or-fewer in nine consecutive home starts, surpassing David Cone (eight straight, 5/29-8/12/98) for the longest such streak by a Yankees starter since 1908.
- Went 9-6 with a 3.99 ERA (99.1IP, 44ER) in 17 road starts...tied for fourth in the AL in road wins.
- From 4/7/17-6/26/18, recorded at least 6 K in 23 consecutive road starts, the fourthlongest streak in Major League history (Randy Johnson-33GS from 8/22/98-8/14/00; Pedro Martinez-28GS from 8/24/99-6/21/01; Randy Johnson-25GS from 8/30/00-5/11/02)...was nearly triple the length of the next-longest streak in Yankees history (eight, by Roger Clemens and Melido Perez).
- From 7/15/17-3/29/18, compiled a streak of seven consecutive road starts with 1 R-orfewer...was tied for the AL's second-longest such streak since 1908, behind Minnesota's Johan Santana (eight starts from 7/17-9/29/04)...tied Al Downing (5/149/14/68) for the longest streak by a Yankee in that span...was 5-0 with a 0.78 ERA (46.1IP, 4ER) during the streak.

- His 305HR are tied with Nelson Cruz for most in the Majors since 2010...marked the ninth-highest total all-time for a player before his 29th birthday (Alex Rodriguez-369; Ken Griffey, Jr.-350; Jimmie Foxx-343; Eddie Mathews-338; Mickey Mantle-320; Albert Pujols-319; Andruw Jones-309 and Mel Ott-306).
- Is one of two players with at least 20HR in each of the last nine seasons (since 2010), joining Nelson Cruz...is the 11th player ever to hit at least 20HR in at least each of his first nine Major League seasons.
- Is one of four players with at least four 35 HR seasons since 2012...is one of six players (also Mike Trout, Nelson Cruz, Edwin Encarnacion, Anthony Rizzo and Justin Upton) to hit at least 25HR in each of the last five seasons. . .has done so seven times in nine career seasons (2011-12,'14-18).
- His 32 career multi-homer games are tied with Edwin Encarnación and Ryan Braun for third-most among active players, behind Albert Pujols (58) and Miguel Cabrera (39)...is one of nine players in Baseball history with at least 30 multi-HR games prior to turning 29 years old.
- Since the start of his career in 2010, his $13.75 \mathrm{AB} /$ HR ratio leads the Majors (min. 1,500AB)...is the fourth-best mark all-time, behind Mark McGwire (10.61), Babe Ruth (11.76) and Barry Bonds (12.92).
- With his trade from the Marlins to the Yankees on 12/11/17, became the second reigning league MVP in Major League history to be traded prior to the start of the following season; on 2/16/04, the Yankees acquired reigning AL MVP Alex Rodriguez from Texas in exchange for Alfonso Soriano and a PTBNL (Joaquin Arias)...Elias notes that the only other MVP to change teams in the season following his award was Barry Bonds, who won the NL MVP with Pittsburgh in 1992 and signed with San Francisco as a free agent prior to the 1993 season.
- Was the fifth player to be acquired by the Yankees the year immediately after leading or tying for a league lead in HRs, joining Babe Ruth (acquired in 1920), Johnny Mize (1949), Alex Rodriguez (2004) and Chris Carter (2017).
- His acquisition made the 2018 Yankees the second team in Major League history to acquire Baseball's reigning home run champion after leading the Majors in team homers the prior year; the 1919 Yankees led the Majors with 45 home runs, then acquired Babe Ruth (29HR in 1919) from Boston prior to the 1920 season (credit:Elias).
- Made his postseason debut in 2018...his 1,144 career regular season games at the time of his first playoff game were second-most among active players who have never reached the postseason, behind Seattle's Kyle Seager (1,155G)...his 305 regular season home runs lead that group, 112 more than second-place Khris Davis (193HR), who also made his playoff debut in the 2018 AL Wild Card Game.
- Wears an extended helmet flap to protect his face after suffering facial lacerations, small fractures and dental damage when he was hit in the face by a pitch thrown by Milwaukee's Mike Fiers on 9/11/14.
- His 267HR with the Marlins are most in franchise history...entered 2018 as one of only four active players who hold a franchise's all-time home run lead, joining Ryan Braun (302HR with Milwaukee), Evan Longoria (261HR with Tampa Bay) and Ryan Zimmerman (251HR with Washington).
- Is also the Marlins' all-time leader in RBI (672), extra-base hits (479) and total bases (1,983)...ranks second in walks (487), third in runs scored (576), doubles (202) and games played (986) and fifth in hits (960)...his 34.1 WAR are the most by any player in Marlins history (FanGraphs)...his 60 assists lead all Marlins outfielders.
- Led the Marlins in home runs each season from 2011-17...according to Elias, is one of two active players to outright lead the same franchise in home runs in at least seven consecutive seasons, joining Albert Pujols, who led St. Louis in homers in seven straight seasons from 2001-07.
- Has made eight Opening Day rosters, seven with the Marlins (2011-17) and one with the Yankees (2018).
- Hit .266/.343/509 (164-for-617) with 102R, 34 doubles, 38HR, 100RBI and 70BB in 158 games ( 85 GS at DH, 37 in RF and 35 in LF) in his first season with the Yankees...reached the 100RBI plateau for the second straight season and third time in his career (105RBI in 2014 and 132RBI in 2017)...reached 100R for the second time (123R in 2017).
- Was the Yankees' nominee for the 2018 Hank Aaron Award...won the award in both 2014 and ' 17 with Miami.
- Batted $.316 / .391 / .645$ ( 48 -for-152) with 9 doubles, 1 triple, 13 HR and 28 RBI off left-handed pitching.
- His 38HR were fifth-most by a player in his first season as a Yankee, trailing Babe Ruth (54HR in 1920), Jason Giambi (41HR in 2002), Mark Teixeira (39HR in 2009) and Roger Maris (39HR in 1960).
- With 38 HR and 34 doubles, was one of nine Majors Leaguers to reach 30 doubles and 35 HR this season...was the first Yankee to reach those benchmarks in the same season since Mark Teixeira in 2009 ( $39 \mathrm{HR}, 43$ doubles).
- Had a Major League-leading 74 batted balls with an exit velocity of at least 110 mph according to MLB Statcast (next: Nelson Cruz-50)...had five of the Majors' 10 hardest-hit home runs of 2018.

- Batted . $371 / .423 / .700$ ( 26 -for- 70 ) with 13R, 6 doubles, 5 HR and 17 RBI in 18 games vs. Boston. . .hit 486 (18-for-37) with 7R, 4 doubles, 2HR and 9RBI in nine games at Fenway Park.
- Became the first Yankee to hit at least 20HR before the All-Star break during his first season with the club since Mark Teixeira in 2009 (21HR before the break)... is the first Yankee to do so after being traded to the team since Alex Rodriguez in 2004 (22HR)...is the only active player with at least 20HR before the break each season since 2014.
- Went 3-for-5 with 3R, 1 double, 2HR and 4RBI in his Yankees debut in $3 / 29$ win at Toronto, marking his 29th career multi-HR game...according to Elias, was just the second player in Yankees history to homer twice in his first game with the club, joining Roger Maris, who began his 1960 AL MVP Award-winning season by going 4-for-5 with $2 R, 1$ double, 2 HR and 4 RBI on $4 / 19 / 60$ at Boston...was the first player to homer in his first plate appearance as a Yankee since Tyler Austin and Aaron Judge did so in consecutive at-bats on 8/13/16 vs. Tampa Bay.
- Became the second Yankee since 1908 to collect at least 3XBH and 4RBI on Opening Day, joining Roger Maris ( 3 XBH, 4RBI) on $4 / 19 / 60$ at Boston...along with Chicago-AL's Matt Davidson ( 3 -for-4, 4R, 3HR, 5 RBI in 2018), became the first Major League hitters to accomplish the feat since Toronto's J.P. Arencibia (3XBH, 5RBI) on 4/1/11 vs. Minnesota...became the seventh Yankee to hit 2HR on Opening Day, the first since Joe Pepitone on 4/9/63 at the Kansas City A's... his ninth-inning homer to center was measured at 109.4 mph .
- Hit . 218 in April, . 264 in May, 298 in June and .323 in July...was the third player in Yankees history to improve his monthly averages by 25 or more points in every month, April through July (min. 50 AB each month), joining Melky Cabrera in 2007 (.200, .254, .298, .368) and Didi Gregorius in 2015 (.206, .232, .258, .317)—credit: Elias.
- Made his first career start in LF in $4 / 1$ loss at Toronto.
- Hit his third HR of the season in $4 / 4$ win vs. Tampa Bay, becoming the first player ever to hit at least $3 H R$ in the first six team games in his first season as a Yankee.
- His first-inning single in $4 / 6$ loss vs. Baltimore was his 2,000 th career total base.
- Struck out a career-high, and franchise-record-tying, five times twice on the Yankees' first homestand ( $4 / 3$ win vs. Tampa Bay and $4 / 8$ loss vs. Baltimore).

－Went 9 －for－9 with 4R， 3 doubles， 1 HR，4RBI and 2BB over consecutive games at Tropicana Field（ $6 / 24$ and 7／23）．．．according to Elias，became the first Yankee to record hits in nine consecutive at－bats at one road venue since Lou Piniella also had nine straight hits at Kansas City＇s Kauffman Stadium from 9／3／82－5／3／83．．．was the first MLB player to reach safely（via $\mathrm{H} / \mathrm{BB} / \mathrm{HP}$ ）at least five times without making an out in consecutive games at one road venue since Cleveland＇s Michael Brantley on $6 / 9 / 14$ and $5 / 15 / 15$ at Texas＇Globe Life Park（credit：Elias）．
－Was one of five AL All－Star＂Final Vote＂candidates．．．was the 10th Yankee to appear on the Final Vote ballot， joining SS Didi Gregorius（2017），OF Brett Gardner（2015），RHP David Robertson（2013），OF Nick Swisher（2010）， 1B Jason Giambi（2008），SS Derek Jeter and OF Hideki Matsui（2005），Matsui（2004）and Giambi（2003）．
－Reached base safely in 21 straight games from 8／4－8／25（G2），tied for the third－longest streak of his career．．．was his longest such streak since reaching safely in a career－high 27 straight games from 7／24－8／22／17 with Miami．．．reached base safely multiple times in seven straight games from $8 / 16-24$ ，tied for the longest such streak of his career．
－Scored at least 1 R in a career－high nine straight games from 8／6－14，matching Didi Gregorius（nine straight，4／20－ 28）for the longest streak by a Yankee in 2018.
－Hit his sixth career grand slam（first since a＂walk－off＂grand slam on $4 / 18 / 14$ vs．Seattle）in $8 / 8$ win at Chicago－ AL．．．hit 170HR between grand slams．

- Hit his 43rd HR on $8 / 14$ vs. San Francisco (off Ty Blach), breaking Gary Sheffield's club record of 42HR in 1996...had tied Sheffield with his 42nd HR the previous day, $8 / 13$ vs. Colorado (off Germán Márquez).
- On $8 / 27$ vs. San Diego, hit his 50th HR (off Clayton Richard), becoming the 28 th player to reach the milestone in a single season...with 50 HR in the Marlins' first 129 games, was the seventh-fastest player to the number, behind San Francisco's Barry Bonds in 2001 (117th team game), the Cubs' Sammy Sosa in 1999 (121st), St. Louis' Mark McGwire in 1999 (124th) and 1998 (125th), the Yankees' Roger Maris in 1961 (125th) and the Yankees' Babe Ruth in 1921 (125th)...was the eighth-fastest player, by date, to hit 50HR, and the first player to reach the 50-homer mark in August since 2001 (Bonds/Sosa).
- On 9/28 vs. Atlanta, hit home runs No. 58 (third PA) and No. 59 (fifth and final PA)...in 14PA with a chance to hit a 60th HR, went 5-for-14 (.357) with one double.
- Was acquired by the Yankees from the Marlins along with cash considerations in exchange for 2B Starlin Castro, RHP Jorge Guzman and INF Jose Devers on 12/11.


## 2016

- In 119 games with the Marlins, hit .240/.326/.489 (99-for-413) with 56R, 20 doubles, 1 triple, 27HR, 74RBI and 50BB...marked a career low in batting average but led Miami in home runs for the sixth consecutive season.
- Won the Home Run Derby at San Diego's PETCO Park, defeating the defending champion, Chicago-AL's Todd Frazier, in the final round to become the first Marlin to win the event...set a Derby record with 61 home runs over three rounds ( 24 HR in Round 1, 17HR in semifinals, 20HR in finals), topping the previous mark of 41 by Philadelphia's Bobby Abreu at Detroit's Comerica Park in 2005...according to MLB Statcast, his home runs traveled an estimated combined distance of 27,187 feet ( 5.15 miles)...hit the 10 longest homers and 18 of the 19 longest homers in the contest...also had the 20 hardest-hit homers.

- Won fourth career NL "Player of the Week" Award for 7/3-9 (.391, 9 -for-23, $6 \mathrm{R}, 1$ double, 1 triple, $4 \mathrm{HR}, 8 \mathrm{RBI}, 3 \mathrm{BB}$ in 6 G ).
- Was placed on the 15 -day disabled list from 8/14-9/6 with a left groin strain.


## 2015

- Played in a career-low 74 games, hitting $.265 / .346 / .606$ ( 74 -for-279) with $47 \mathrm{R}, 12$ doubles, 1 triple, 27HR, 67 RBI and 34BB for the Marlins...tied for 10th in the NL in home runs.
- On 4/16 at Atlanta, hit his first HR of the season and 155th of his career, surpassing Dan Uggla (154) to become the Marlins' all-time home run leader.
- Earned the NL "Player of the Month" Award for June after batting .344/.404/.800 (31-for-90) with 18R, 5 doubles, 12 HR and 23 RBI in 24 games...was his second career monthly award...during the month, led the Majors in slugging pct. (min. 50PA) and OPS (1.204), tied for the NL lead in home runs, was third in XBHs (17) and total bases, and tied for fourth in RBI...set a Marlins franchise record for home runs in June, and tied a then-franchise record for HRs in any month.
- Was named NL "Player of the Week" for 6/8-14 (.520, 13-for-25, $7 \mathrm{R}, 4$ doubles, $5 \mathrm{HR}, 12 \mathrm{RBI}, 4 \mathrm{BB}$ in 7 G ).
- On $6 / 26 \mathrm{vs}$. - On 5/13 vs. the Mets, hit the third "walk-off" grand slam in Marlins history, a two-out, tie-breaking shot off Manny Acosta...joined Dan Uggla (6/11/08 vs. Philadelphia) and Bobby Bonilla (9/16/97 vs. Colorado).

- Was named NL "Player of the Week" for 8/20-26 (.286, 8-for-28, 7R, 1 double, 5HR, 8RBI in 7G).

- Won five consecutive starts from 4/14-5/8, then lost five consecutive starts from 5/14-6/6...was the third Yankees pitcher since 1913 to win at least five consecutive starts and lose at least five consecutive starts within the same season, joining Bob Turley (5-0, 0-5) in 1955 and Bullet Joe Bush (5-0, 0-5) in 1924...Tanaka is the only one to have one streak immediately follow the other.
- In $4 / 27$ win at Boston, threw the second shutout of his career ( $3 \mathrm{H}, 0 \mathrm{BB}, 3 \mathrm{~K}$ )...threw just 97 pitches ( 72 strikes) and faced 29 batters... was the first complete-game shutout by a Yankee since Brandon McCarthy on 8/21/14 vs. Houston...snapped a streak of 380 consecutive starts by the Yankees without a CGSHO (the Yankees' franchise record is 414 games without a CGSHO)....was the first complete-game shutout by a Yankee at Fenway Park since Mike Mussina on $8 / 28 / 02 \ldots$ was the first Yankee to toss a nine-inning complete-game shutout by a Yankee in fewer than 100 pitches since David Wells ( 96 pitches) on $4 / 10 / 03$ vs. Minnesota.
- On $5 / 14$ vs. Houston and $5 / 20$ at Tampa Bay, allowed 6 R and $3 H R$ in consecutive starts for the second time in his career (also 6/21-27/15)...the only other Yankees pitcher since 1908 to do so was Orlando Hernández on 5/25/01 and 8/21/01.
- In 5/26 loss vs. Oakland, set a then-career high with 13 K (and OBB) but took a loss in the Yankees' 4-1 defeat ( $7.11 \mathrm{P}, 5 \mathrm{H}, 1 \mathrm{ER}$ ) ... was his eighth career double-digit strikeout game...tied a Yankees record for most strikeouts while taking a loss (third time, also Roger Clemens twice: 5/28/00 vs. Boston-13K; $6 / 17 / 99$ vs. Texas-13K).
- In 6/17 loss at Oakland, became the first pitcher in Yankees history to record 10K without completing 5.0IP (4.0IP, 8H, 5ER , 1BB, 10K, 3HR, 1WP)... was the seventh pitcher in Major League history to last 4.0IP-or-less in a game with double-digit strikeouts...only Cleveland's Danny Salazar recorded fewer outs (10K in 3.2IP on 4/10/14 at Chicago-AL).
- In $6 / 23$ win vs. Texas, tossed 8.0 scoreless innings ( $3 \mathrm{H}, 2 \mathrm{BB}, 9 \mathrm{~K}$ ) but took a no-decision in a matchup with the Rangers' Yu Darvish...marked the 15th game in Major League history featuring two Japanese-born starting pitchers...marked the first time that Tanaka and Darvish matched up stateside after four meetings in NPB from 2007-11...Darvish also threw 7.0 scoreless innings as the two pitchers combined for 15.0 scoreless innings (5H, 2BB, 19K).
- In $7 / 28$ win vs. Tampa Bay, set a then-career high with $14 \mathrm{~K}(8.0 \mathrm{IP}, 2 \mathrm{H}, 1 \mathrm{ER}, 0 \mathrm{BB}, 1 \mathrm{HR}$ )...retired the first 17 batters of the game before Adeiny Hechavarria's two-out single in the sixth broke up the perfect game bid.
- Recorded his 500th career strikeout on $5 / 31$ at Baltimore (Manny Machado in the third inning)... was the 27th Major League pitcher since 1913 to reach 500K within 86 career games.
- Made his 100th Major League start on $8 / 27$ vs. Seattle...recorded his 600 th career strikeout.
- In $9 / 29$ win vs. Toronto, set a Major League career high with 15 K over 7.0 shutout innings (3H, 0BB)...became the seventh Yankees pitcher to record at least 15K in a game...was the second-highest strikeout total without a walk in Yankees history (Michael Pineda, 16K on $5 / 10 / 15$ vs. Baltimore)... was the first Yankees pitcher to record at least 15 K with OBB in a scoreless start, the 21st such game (18th different pitcher) in Major League history...was the highest strikeout total by an AL pitcher in 2017, one of two 15K games in the Majors (Washington's Stephen Strasburg, 15K on 5/27/17 vs. San Diego)... was tied for the third-highest single-game strikeout total by a Japanese pitcher (Nomo-17K on 4/13/96 with the Dodgers vs. Florida and 16K on 6/14/95 with the Dodgers at Pittsburgh; Darvish-15K on 8/12/13 with Texas at Houston).
- Made three postseason starts, going 2-1 with a 0.90 ERA (20.0IP, 10H, 2ER, 3BB, 18K)...was the fifth-lowest ERA by a Yankee in one postseason (min. 18.0IP)...was the third Yankees pitcher to record multiple scoreless starts of at least 7.0IP in a single postseason, joining Roger Clemens (2000) and Whitey Ford (1960)...was the fifth pitcher in Baseball history with multiple scoreless starts with at least 7.01P and 3 H -or-fewer in one postseason, joining San Diego's Kevin Brown (1998), the Yankees' Roger Clemens (2000), Arizona's Randy Johnson (2001) and Detroit's Kenny Rogers (2006).
- In ALDS Game 3 vs. Cleveland, tossed 7.0 scoreless innings ( $3 \mathrm{H}, 1 \mathrm{BB}, 7 \mathrm{~K}$ ) to earn his first career postseason win...was the first Yankee to record 7.0 scoreless innings with at least 7 K in the postseason since Roger Clemens in 2000 World Series Game 2 vs. the Mets (8.0IP, 9K)...took the loss in ALCS Game 1 at Houston ( $6.0 \mathrm{IP}, 4 \mathrm{H}, 2 \mathrm{ER}, 1 \mathrm{BB}, 3 \mathrm{~K}$ )...tossed 7.0 shutout innings ( $3 \mathrm{H}, 1 \mathrm{BB}, 8 \mathrm{~K}$ ) in a win in ALCS Game 5 vs . Houston.


## 2016

- In his third season with the Yankees, went 14-4 with a 3.07 ERA (199.2IP, 68ER) in 31 starts...set career highs in wins, innings pitched, starts and quality starts (19)...opponents hit . 236 (179-for-759); LH . 237 (88-for-372), RH . 235 ( 91 -for-387)... was sixth among AL pitchers with a career-best 4.6 WAR (FanGraphs)...the Yankees went 23-8 in his starts.
- Was scratched from his final two scheduled starts with a mild strain to the flexor mass in his right forearm.
- Ranked third in the AL in ERA behind Toronto's Aaron Sanchez (3.00) and Detroit's Justin Verlander (3.04)...ranked third in the AL in opponents' OBP (.272) and BB/9.0IP ratio (1.62), fourth in K/BB ratio (4.58) and fifth in winning percentage (.778).
- Led the AL with a 2.34 road ERA (104.0IP, $92 \mathrm{H}, 33 \mathrm{R} / 27 \mathrm{ER}, 19 \mathrm{BB}, 75 \mathrm{~K}, 9 \mathrm{HR}$ ), while going $7-3$ in 16 road starts...trailed only the Mets' Noah Syndergaard (2.29) among Major League pitchers.
- On $4 / 5$ vs. Houston, made his second career Opening Day start (ND, 5.2IP, 2ER).
- On $4 / 17$ vs. Seattle and $8 / 24$ at Seattle, Tanaka and the Mariners' Hisashi Iwakuma faced each other in the 12 th and 13th games in Major League history featuring two Japanese-born starting pitchers...Tanaka earned the win in both games...the two pitchers were teammates on the Tohoku Rakuten Golden Eagles from 2007-11, as it marked the first instances of two Japanese former NPB teammates starting against one another in a Major League game.
- Went 4-1 with 3.00 ERA (39.0IP, 34H, 14R/13ER, 1BB, $38 \mathrm{~K}, 5 \mathrm{HR}$ ) in six starts in August... was the fourth pitcher in Major League history to record at least 38 K with one-or-zero walks in a calendar month.
- From 8/7-19, became the first pitcher in Yankees history (and ninth in Major League history) to record at least 8 K and OBB in three consecutive starts... was the first pitcher in AL history (and the second in Major League history) to record at least 8 K with no walks and earn a win in three consecutive starts (Clayton Kershaw, 7/8-23/15).
- Set a career high (since tied) by allowing 4HR in a win on $9 / 21$ at Tampa Bay (6.0IP, 4ER)...all 4HR were solo HRs in the third inning, as he became the first Yankees pitcher to allow 4HR in an inning since Chase Wright on 4/22/07 at Boston.
- Finished the season on his first career seven-game winning streak (8/7-end of the season) while logging a 2.28 ERA (59.1IP, 15ER) over the nine-start span.
- Went 12-7 with a 3.51 ERA (154.0IP, 60ER) and one complete game in 24 starts...recorded a 2.2 WAR and 3.98 FIP (FanGraphs)...allowed a 221 (126-for-571, 25HR) opponents' average; LH . 223 ( 60 -for-269, 13HR), RH . 219 ( 66 -for- $302,12 \mathrm{HR}$ )...the Yankees went $15-9$ in his 24 starts.
- Was placed on the 15-day D.L. from 4/29-6/3 with right wrist tendinitis and a right forearm strain...missed a start in late September after suffering a right hamstring strain while running out a groundball on 9/18 at the Mets.
- On $4 / 6$ vs. Toronto, became the fourth Japanese-born pitcher in Major League history to start on Opening Day (and the first in Yankees history)...at 26 years and 156 days, was just the second Yankees pitcher under age-27 to start on Opening Day since 1975 (Andy Pettitte, 25 years, 290 days in 1998)...had started only once on Opening Day during his seven-year career with the Tohoku Rakuten Golden Eagles in Japan (2012).
- His 0.99 WHIP led the AL and was sixth-lowest in the Majors (min. 150.0IP)... was the eighth pitcher in Yankees history to post a WHIP under 1.00 (min. 150.0IP) and one of just two since 1945, joining Ron Guidry ( 0.95 in 1978).
- Led AL pitchers (min. 150.0IP) with a .254 opponents' OBP, while his 221 opponents' BA ranked fifth...ranked fourth with a $1.58 \mathrm{BB} / 9.0 \mathrm{IP}$ ratio ( $154.0 \mathrm{IP}, 27 \mathrm{BB}$ ) and fifth with a $5.15 \mathrm{~K} / \mathrm{BB}$ ratio ( $139 \mathrm{~K}, 27 \mathrm{BB}$ ).
- His $1.46 \mathrm{HR} / 9.0 \mathrm{IP}$ ratio ( $25 \mathrm{HR} / 154.0 \mathrm{IP}$ ) was fourth-highest in the AL, but 19 of his 25 HR allowed were solo HRs...did not allow a three-run HR or grand slam until his final start of the season on $9 / 30 \mathrm{vs}$. Boston (three-run HR by Travis Shaw).
- When John Ryan Murphy replaced Brian McCann in the second inning on $6 / 3$ at Seattle, it marked the first time in Tanaka's Major League career that he pitched to a catcher other than McCann...he had McCann as his starting catcher for each of his first 32 career starts (through his 7/17/15 start), becoming the first Yankees pitcher in the last 100 years to make his first 32 MLB starts all with the same catcher (credit: Elias)... was the longest such streak in the Majors since the Dodgers' Chad Billingsley (first 36 career starts from 2006-07 with Russell Martin).
- Made his MLB postseason debut in the AL Wild Card Game, taking the loss in the Yankees' $3-0$ defeat vs. Houston (5.0IP, 4H, 2ER, 3BB, 3K, 2HR)...allowed solo HRs to Colby Rasmus leading off the second inning and Carlos Gómez leading off the fourth.
- On $10 / 20 / 15$, had arthroscopic surgery to remove a bone spur from his right elbow...the bone spur was preexisting, dating back to his pitching career in Japan...the procedure was performed by Dr. David Altchek at the Hospital for Special Surgery in New York.


## 2014

- Made 20 starts in his first Major League season, going $13-5$ with a 2.77 ERA ( $136.1 \mathrm{IP}, 123 \mathrm{H}, 47 \mathrm{R} / 42 \mathrm{ER}, 21 \mathrm{BB}, 141 \mathrm{~K}$, 15 HR ) and three complete games...finished fifth in AL Rookie of the Year voting...marked the lowest ERA by a Yankees rookie (min. 15GS) since Dave Righetti went 8-4 with a 2.05 ERA (105.1IP, 24ER) in 1981...recorded a 3.1 WAR and 3.04 FIP (FanGraphs).
- Became the fifth rookie to lead the Yankees in wins, joining Fritz Peterson (12-11 in 1966, tied), Bob Grim (20-6 in 1954), Bill Bevens (13-9 in 1945) and Russ Ford (26-6 in 1910)....also led the club in complete games.
- Paced all Major League rookies in complete games and ranked third in wins and ninth in innings pitched...no other rookie recorded more than one complete game...led MLB rookies ( min . 100.0IP) in K/BB ratio (6.71) and $B B / 9.01 P$ ratio (1.39), was second in K/9.0IP ratio (9.31), third in ERA and fourth in opponents' BA (.240).
- Was selected via the Player Ballot to attend his first All-Star Game...was one of three Yankees chosen as AL AllStars (also SS Derek Jeter and RHP Dellin Betances)....according to Elias, Tanaka and Betances became the first pair of rookie teammates in Yankees history to be named to the same All-Star Game...the duo also became the ninth and 10th Yankees rookies to earn All-Star selections, following Joe DiMaggio (1936), Joe Page (1944), Spec Shea (1947), Bobby Richardson (1957), Ryne Duren (1958), Tom Tresh (1962), Willie Randolph (1976) and Hideki Matsui (2003)-credit: Elias.
- Completed at least 6.0IP in each of his first 18 starts (4/4-7/8)...according to Elias, became the first pitcher to record at least 6.0IP in each of his first 18 Major League starts since John Farrell (21 straight w/ Cleveland from 8/21/87-6/6/88)...was also the first Yankees pitcher to accomplish the feat...became the first pitcher to record at least 6.0IP in each of his first 18-or-more starts as a Yankee since Carl Mays from 1919-20 (18GS).
- Produced a quality start (at least 6.OIP and 3ER-or-fewer) in each of his first 16 games, tied with Montreal's Steve Rogers (1973) for the longest such streak to begin a Major League career (since earned runs became an official stat in 1912)-credit: Elias...was also the longest quality starts streak to begin a season since Greg Maddux (16) in 1994...tied CC Sabathia (6/3-8/22/10) for the longest QS streak in Yankees history.
- His five double-digit-strikeout games led MLB rookies...according to Elias, joined AI Downing ( $8 x$ in 1963) as the only Yankees rookies to produce at least three 10K games in a season.
- Was the first Yankees rookie to record at least 3CG since Orlando Hernández in 1998 (also 3CG).
- Made his Major League debut in $4 / 4$ win at Toronto ( $7.0 \mathrm{IP}, 6 \mathrm{H}, 3 \mathrm{R} / 2 \mathrm{ER}, 1 \mathrm{HR}, 0 \mathrm{BB}, 8 \mathrm{~K}$ )...according to Elias, became the sixth pitcher since 1900 to earn a win in his Major League debut while completing at least 7.OIP with at least 8 K and OBB...the only other Yankees pitcher to accomplish the feat was Rich Beck on 9/14/65 at Washington (7.0IP, 8K).
- Recorded 10 K on $4 / 9$ vs. Baltimore and on $4 / 16$ vs. ChicagoNL, becoming only the fourth pitcher since 1913 to record at least 10K twice within his first three MLB games (also Stephen Strasburg, Daisuke Matsuzaka and Karl Spooner)...according to Elias, Tanaka became the first rookie pitcher ever to register at least 10 K in consecutive games for the Yankees...Elias also notes that Tanaka joined Washington's Stephen Strasburg as the only two pitchers since 1900 to record at least 8 K in each of their first three career games...became the second Yankee to record at least 10 K and 7.0 IP with 1BB-or-fewer in consecutive starts (David Wells on 9/1/98 vs. Oakland and 9/7/98 at Boston; since joined by Luis Severino, in 2017 and in 2018).
- Improved to 6-0 and recorded his first Major League shutout in his eighth career start on $5 / 14$ at the Mets ( $4 \mathrm{H}, 0 \mathrm{BB}, 8 \mathrm{~K}$ )...joined Andy Pettitte (6/30/00) as the only Yankees starters to throw a completegame shutout against the Mets (credit: Elias)...became the first Yankees rookie to begin his career 6-0 as a starter since Whitey Ford went $9-0$ in 12 starts in 1950...according to Elias, became the first pitcher since 1900 to earn at least six wins and record at least 60 K in his first eight appearances in the Majors...became the first
 pitcher since 1900 to register at least 60 K while issuing fewer than 10 BB in his first eight career games ( $66 \mathrm{~K}, 7 \mathrm{BB}$ ).
- Went 1 -for-4 in $5 / 14$ win at the Mets, hitting a two-out single off Jose Valverde in the ninth inning...became the first pitcher to record his first MLB shutout and first career hit in the same game since Pittsburgh's Jeff Karstens on 8/6/08 at Arizona (credit: Elias)...became the first Yankees pitcher to accomplish the feat since Ron Klimkowski on 9/18/70 at Detroit.
- Suffered his first career Major League loss in his ninth career start, a Yankees' 6-1 defeat on 5/20 at ChicagoNL ( $6.0 \mathrm{IP}, 8 \mathrm{H}, 4 \mathrm{R} / 3 \mathrm{ER}, 1 \mathrm{BB}, 7 \mathrm{~K}$ )...had been unbeaten in his previous 42 regular season starts ( $34-0$ ) in Nippon Professional Baseball and Major League Baseball. . .marked his first regular season loss since 8/19/12, when the Seibu Lions defeated the Rakuten Golden Eagles at the Seibu Dome.
- Was named the AL's "Pitcher of the Month" for May after going 5-1 with a 1.88 ERA (43.0IP, 9ER), one shutout, 6BB and 42K over six appearances...became the first Yankees rookie to win an "AL Pitcher of the Month" award since its inception in 1979...became the third Japan-born pitcher to win the award, joining Hideo Nomo (June 1995 and September 1996) and Hideki Irabu (May 1998 and July 1999).
- According to Elias, became only the fifth pitcher since 1900 to record at least 100 K through his first 13 career games (103K), joining Hideo Nomo (119K), Kerry Wood (118K), Herb Score (107K) and José DeLeón (106K).
- Improved to 11-1 and lowered his ERA to 1.99 following $6 / 17$ win vs. Toronto... became the first Yankees pitcher to win at least 11 of his first 12 decisions in a season since Roger Clemens went 11-1 to begin the 2001 season.
- Was placed on the 15 -day disabled list with right elbow inflammation on 7/9...was transferred to the 60-day D.L. on 9/2...missed 65 games from 7/9-9/20.
- Returned from the 60-day disabled list on $9 / 21$ and started that day vs. Toronto, earning his 13th win in a 5-2 Yankees victory ( $5.1 \mathrm{IP}, 5 \mathrm{H}, 1 \mathrm{ER}, 0 \mathrm{BB}, 4 \mathrm{~K}$ )...made his final start in $9 / 27$ loss at Boston (1.2IP, $7 \mathrm{H}, 7 \mathrm{R} / 5 \mathrm{ER}, 2 \mathrm{BB}, 2 \mathrm{~K}$ ).
- Made five official spring training appearances (three starts) for the Yankees, going 2-0 with a 2.14 ERA (21.0IP, 15H, 5ER, 3BB, 26K)...earned the "James P. Dawson Award" as the Yankees' top rookie in spring training, as voted on by the club's beat writers...led Yankees pitchers in strikeouts.

- Won his final 28 decisions in his Japanese regular season career, going 4-0 over his final four starts in 2012 and 24-0 in 2013...surpassed Kiyoshi Matsuda from 1951-52 and Kazuhisa Inao in 1957 (20 each) for most consecutive wins in NPB history.
- Was a two-time winner (2011 and '13) of the prestigious Sawamura Award as Nippon Professional Baseball's best pitcher... was named Pacific League MVP in 2013...was named "Pitcher of the Month" a Nippon Professional Baseball-record 12 times...was a seven-time NPB All-Star (2007-13)...earned three Gold Glove Awards (201113)... was the recipient of the Pacific League's 2011 and ' 13 "Best Nine Award" as the league's best pitcher...was named "Rookie of the Year" in 2007.
- Pitched for Japan in the 2009 and ' 13 World Baseball Classics, combining to make eight appearances (one start) and post a 2.89 ERA (9.1IP, 13H, 4R, 3ER, 0BB, 1HR, 17K), helping guide the 2009 team to a championship...also competed on Japan's national team in the 2008 Olympics, tossing 7.0 scoreless innings over three games.
- Posted NPB's lowest ERA and most wins in $2011(1.27,19)$ and ' $13(1.27,24)$ and the most strikeouts in $2012(169)$.
－Went $24-0$ with one save and a 1.27 ERA（ $212.0 \mathrm{IP}, 30 \mathrm{ER}$ ）and 183 K in 28 games（ 27 starts）with Rakuten．．．tossed eight complete games and two shutouts．．．led NPB in wins and ERA，setting an NPB record in victories．

- Of his $24 \mathrm{HR}, 13$ came with runners on base...ranked third in the Majors with seven three-run HR... of his 24 HR , 12 tied the game (2) or gave the Yankees the lead (10)...hit 13HR from the ninth spot in the lineup, the most by a Yankee in a single season from the No. 9 spot in franchise history.

- His 24HR marked the second-highest single-season total by a Yankee in his age-21 season or younger, behind 21-year-old Joe DiMaggio (29HR in 1936)...owns the third-most career HRs by a Yankee prior to turning 22, trailing only Mickey Mantle (57) and DiMaggio (29).
- Had 15HR during the first half, one of five Yankees rookies to hit at least 10HR before the All-Star break, joining Aaron Judge (30HR in 2017), Miguel Andújar (12HR in 2018), Joe DiMaggio (11HR in 1936) and Nick Johnson (11HR in 2002)—credit:Elias...joined Andújar as the first Yankees rookies with at least 10HR before the All-Star break in the same season (first team to do so since the 2016 Dodgers: Corey Seager-17, Trayce Thompson-13).
- His 15HR before the All-Star Game were tied with Robinson Canó (15HR in 2011) for fourth-most by a Yankees second baseman entering the break, trailing only Canó (21HR in 2013, 20HR in 2012 and 16HR in 2010).
- Was twice named AL"Player of the Week:" 5/21-27 and 8/27-9/2.
- Started at 2B in first 20 games after his recall, with the Yankees going 17-3 ...became the first position player in the Modern Era (since 1900) to start and be on the winning side in 16 of his first 17 Major League games.
- Is the second-youngest Yankee to record at least 17H in his first 15 career games (4/22-5/6), just two weeks older than Ben Chapman, who collected 17H from 4/19-5/4/30...is one of three 21-year-olds in Yankees history to record hits in 12 of his first 15 career games (Joe DiMaggio, Frankie Crosetti)...is the youngest Yankee to collect at least 11 RBI through his first 15 games.
- Made his Major League debut on $4 / 22$ at $21 \mathrm{y}, 130 \mathrm{~d}$ old and was the ninth-youngest player to appear in a game in 2018 (Atlanta's Ozzie Albies, a "younger" 21 years old, Kolby Allard-20 years, Ronald Acuña-20 years, Mike Soroka-20 years, and Bryse Wilson-20 years, San Diego's Luis Urías-a "younger" 21 and Washington's Víctor Robles-a "younger" 21 and Juan Soto-19 years)...was the youngest position player to appear in a game for the Yankees since Melky Cabrera (age 20) in 2005.
- Made his Major League debut in $4 / 22$ win vs. Toronto, going 0 -for- $4 \ldots$...was recalled from Triple-A Scranton/WB prior to the game...collected his first Major League hit in $4 / 23$ win vs. Minnesota (single off Tyler Kinley)...at 21 years, 131 days old, was the youngest Yankee to record a hit since Melky Cabrera ( $20 y, 338 \mathrm{~d}$ ) on 7/15/05 at Boston.
- Doubled in $4 / 25$ win vs. Minnesota...at 21 years, 133 days old, became the youngest Yankee to record an extrabase hit since Derek Jeter doubled on 9/26/95 at Milwaukee at 21 years, 92 days old.
- Stole his first career base in $4 / 30$ loss at Houston... at 21 years, 138 days, was the youngest Yankee to steal a base since Bobby Murcer on $9 / 23 / 66$ vs. Boston ( 20 years, 126 days)...the loss marked his first time being on the losing side of a Major League game, snapping a career-opening eight-game winning streak... became the fourth position player in the Modern Era (since 1900) to start and be on the winning side in each of his first eight Major League games, joining Atlanta C Evan Gattis (won and started his first 10G in 2013), Washington-AL OF Babe Ganzel (first 9G in 1927) and Philadelphia SS Dave Bancroft (first 8G in 1915)...two pitchers also started team wins in their first 8G: St. Louis' Allen Watson (1993) and Chicago-AL's John Whitehead (1935).
－Was named AL＂Rookie of the Month＂for May．．．in 24G，hit ．325／．380／．663（27－for－83）with 13R，9HR and 24RBI， leading all Major League rookies in batting average，HR and RBI during the month（min．75AB）．．．was the fifth Yankee（eighth time）to win AL＂Rookie of the Month＂and the third current Yankee to do so，joining Gary Sánchez （Aug．2016）and Aaron Judge（four times in 2017）．．．teammate Miguel Andújar won in June and August 2018.
－Hit safely in nine straight games（5／2－11），the youngest Yankee to tally as long a hitting streak since Mickey Mantle had a 10 G hitting streak from $6 / 24-7 / 3 / 52$（G1），ending at $20 y, 257 \mathrm{~d}$ ．
－Had 3RBI，including a game－tying two－run ninth－inning single in $5 / 3$ win at Houston．．．became the youngest Yankee （age 21y，141d）with a game－tying or go－ahead hit in the ninth inning－or－later since Bobby Murcer（20y－134d）on $10 / 1 / 66$ at Chicago－AL（RBI single in the ninth in a $5-3 \mathrm{win}$ ）．．．had 3 RBI on $5 / 4$ ，becoming the youngest Yankee（ 21 y ， 141d－21y，142d）ever with at least 3RBI in consecutive games（prev．Jerry Priddy， 21 years， 179 days，5／6－7／41）．

－Was named via the Player Ballot to his first career All－Star team（did not play due to injury）．．．became the fourth Yankee to be named to the AL All－Star team at age 21－or－younger，joining Joe DiMaggio（age 21 in 1936），Mickey Mantle（ages 20－21 from 1952－53）and Willie Randolph（age 21 in 1976）．．．was the 12th Yankees rookie selected to an AL All－Star team，joining starters Aaron Judge（2017），Hideki Matsui（2003）and Joe DiMaggio（1936）and reserves Dellin Betances（2014），Masahiro Tanaka（2014），Willie Randolph（1976），Tom Tresh（1962），Ryne Duren （1958），Bobby Richardson（1957），Spec Shea（1947）and Joe Page（1944）．．．was the fourth Yankee to make the All－Star team as a rookie since 2014 （Betances，Judge and Tanaka）after the team had just one rookie All－Star from 1977－2013（Matsui in 2003）．
－Hit solo HR and three－run HR and set a career high with 4RBI in $8 / 1$ loss vs．Baltimore．．．was his second career 2HR game（also 5／21 at Texas）．．．became the second player in Yankees history to record at least two multi－HR games before turning 22 years old，joining Joe DiMaggio，who had three in 1936．．．at 21 years， 231 days old， was the youngest Yankee ever to record a second career multi－HR game， 10 days younger than DiMaggio was on 7／23／36 at St．Louis－AL（21 years， 241 days）．
- Collected his 50th career RBI with a sacrifice fly on $8 / 5$ at Boston...reached the mark in his 74 th game, the seventh-fastest Yankee to 50RBI, behind Joe DiMaggio (46th game), Joe Gordon (53rd), Tony Lazzeri (57th), Bob Meusel (65th), Gary Sánchez (69th) and Mickey Mantle (73rd).

- After the season, played in 18 games for the Scottsdale Scorpions of the Arizona Fall League and was the recipient of the AFL's 2016 Joe Black MVP Award...was the youngest MVP in AFL history (at the time) as he batted $.403 / .513 / 645$ ( 25 -for- 62 ) with 15R, 4 doubles, 1 triple, 3 HR, 11 RBI and 14BB...was also named the AFL "Player of the Week" twice and was named to the AFL Top Prospects Team and AFL Fall Stars Game.
- Following the season, was named by BaseballAmerica as the No. 1 prospect in the Yankees organization, Baseball's No. 5 prospect overall, the FSL's No. 2 prospect and the Carolina League's "Best Defensive Shortstop" and "Best Infield Arm"...was ranked the No. 3 overall prospect by MLB Pipeline and No. 4 overall prospect by ESPN.
- Combined with Single-A South Bend and Single-A Myrtle Beach to bat . 287 (140-for-487) with 54R, 24 doubles, 5 triples, 3 HR , 64 RBI and 22 SB in 126G...was fifth among all Cubs farmhands in batting average and stolen bases.
- Was named to the Midwest League Mid-Season and Postseason All-Star teams and was tabbed the Midwest League Prospect of the Year.
- Following the season, was named the top prospect in the Cubs organization by Baseball America, as well as the No. 41 overall prospect in baseball.

- Following the season, was tabbed by Baseball America as the No. 8 prospect in the Cubs organization.

## 2018 Postseason Summary

WILD THINGS: The Yankees clinched the 54th playoff appearance in franchise history ( 116 seasons, $46.6 \%$ ) with a 100-62 record...qualified for the postseason for the 20th time in 24 seasons since 1995 (missed in 2008,'13-14,'16).

- After defeating Oakland, 7-2, in the AL Wild Card Game, were eliminated by Boston in the ALCS, 3-games-to-1.
- Were just the second 100-win Wild Card team in the Wild Card era (since 1994), joining the 2001 Oakland Athletics (102-60)...were the first 100-win team to play in a Wild Card Game and the fourth team in the Division Era (since 1969) to win at least 100 games and not win their division, joining the 2001 A's (102-60), 1993 San Francisco Giants (103-59) and 1980 Baltimore Orioles (100-62).
- Became the first team ever to win consecutive Wild Card Games and the second to win multiple Wild Card Games (San Francisco, 2-0)...was their third appearance in the AL Wild Card Game (lost in 2015 vs. Houston, won in 2017 vs. Minnesota, won in 2018 vs. Oakland) and their seventh AL Wild Card berth overall (1995, '97, 2007, '10, '15, '17-18)...matched Pittsburgh (1-2) for the most appearances by a team in the Wild Card Game...also joined Pittsburgh and Colorado (2017-18) as the only teams to play in consecutive Wild Card Games.

YOUTH MOVEMENT: At 21 years, 294 days old in the AL Wild Card Game, INF Gleyber Torres was just the third Yankee since 1958 to appear in a postseason game at age 21-or-younger, joining Jesús Montero (21y, 310d in 2011 ALDS Game 4) and Phil Hughes (21y, 102d in 2007 ALDS Game 1)...was the youngest position player to appear in a postseason game for the Yankees since INF Tom Carroll (19y, 15d) in 1955 World Series Game 5.

- Singled in ALDS Game 1 at Boston, becoming the second-youngest player in Yankees history (21 years, 296 days) to record a postseason hit, behind Mickey Mantle (first postseason hit at 19 years old in 1951 World Series Game 2 vs. the New York Giants).

BRONX BOMBERS: In the AL Wild Card Game, DH Giancarlo Stanton ( 117.4 mph in the eighth) and RF Aaron Judge ( 116.1 mph in the first) hit the two hardest postseason home runs of the Statcast era (since 2015).

JUDGE'S ORDERS: In five games during the 2018 postseason, RF Aaron Judge went 8 -for-19 (.421) with 6R, 1 double, 3HR, $4 R B I$ and $3 B B$.

- Became the second Yankee to homer in each of the team's first 3G of a postseason, joining Hank Bauer (1958 World Series Games 1-3)...note: Johnny Mize homered in 1952 World Series Games 3-5 after missing the first 2G of the Series...was the third Major League player to begin a postseason with 3 G with at least 2 H and 1HR, joining St. Louis' Matt Carpenter in 2014 and Bauer in 1958.
- Also hit 4HR in the 2017 postseason...was the second Yankee to hit at least three postseason HRs in consecutive years (Reggie Jackson: 5HR in 1977, 4HR in 1978)...is one of 10 players all-time to hit at least 7HR in his first 16 postseason games (one of two Yankees Bernie Williams-7HR).

SEEING RED: The ALDS vs. Boston marked only the fourth time that the Yankees and Red Sox faced off in a postseason series (the Yankees won 1999 ALCS, won 2003 ALCS, lost 2004 ALCS, lost 2018 ALDS).

- Was the first postseason meeting of 100-win teams prior to the World Series since 1977, when the Yankees defeated Kansas City in the ALCS...was the second consecutive postseason with a matchup of 100 -win teams, following the 2017 World Series between Houston and Los Angeles-NL.

THE SANCHINO: C Gary Sánchez went 2-for-5 with 2 HR and 4RBI in ALDS Game 2 at Boston, hitting a solo HR in the second and a three-run HR in the seventh.

- Became the second Yankees catcher to hit multiple HRs in a postseason game, joining Yogi Berra, who hit 2HR in the 1956 World Series-clinching Game 7 win at Brooklyn on $10 / 10 / 56 \ldots$ is one of only 10 catchers with a postseason multi-HR game in Major League history.
- Marked just the fourth multi-HR game by a righthanded batter in Yankees postseason history, joining Chad Curtis (1999 WS Game 3 vs. Atlanta), Scott Brosius (1998 WS Game 3 at San Diego) and Tony Lazzeri (1932 WS Game 4 at Chicago-NL).

## 2018 Regular Season Summary

WILD THINGS: With their $9 / 22$ win vs. Baltimore, the Yankees clinched the 54th playoff appearance in franchise history ( 116 seasons, $46.6 \%$ )...have qualified for the postseason in 20 of the last 24 seasons since 1995 (missed in 2008, '13-14, '16)... were eliminated from contention for the AL East division title with a $9 / 20$ home loss to Boston.

- Marks their seventh AL Wild Card berth (1995, '97, 2007,
' 10, '15, '17-18) and their third appearance in the AL Wild Card Game (lost in 2015 vs. Houston, won in 2017 vs. Minnesota).
- Is their third appearance in the AL Wild Card Game (lost in 2015, won in 2017), matching Pittsburgh (1-2 in NLWCG from 2013-15) for the most appearances by a team in the Wild Card Game...also join the Pirates and Colorado (2017-18) as the only teams to play in consecutive Wild Card Games.
- Will host their third AL Wild Card Game, joining the Pirates (3x: 2013-15) as the only teams to host multiple Wild Card Games....home teams are 5-7 all-time in the Wild Card Game (AL 3-3, NL 2-4).

ABOVE BOARD: With a 100-62 (.617) record in 2018, the Yankees posted their 26th consecutive season with a winning record (1993-2018), the second-longest such stretch in Major League history, behind only the Yankees' own streak of 39 straight winning seasons from 1926-64.

- Finished second in the AL East, 8.0G behind Boston (108-54)...was their largest deficit in the division since finishing 12.0 G back in both 2013-14.
- Reached a season-high watermark of 39G above . 500 at the end of play on $9 / 29$ (100-61)...was their highest watermark since finishing the 2009 season with a 10359 record (44G over .500).

THE HUNDREDS: With a 100-62 (.617) mark, the Yankees had the third-best record in the Majors (and AL) despite finishing in second place in the AL East...trailed only Boston (108-54, .667) and Houston (103-59, .636)...marked the first time in Major League history that one league had three 100 -win teams.

- Became the fourth team in the Division Era (since 1969) to win at least 100 games and not win its division, joining the 2001 Oakland Athletics (102-60), 1993 San Francisco Giants (103-59) and 1980 Baltimore Orioles (100-62).
- Were the second team since 2005 to post a winning percentage of at least .600 and not won its division, joining the 2015 Pittsburgh Pirates ( $98-64, .605$ ).

NEW SKIP ON THE BLOCK: Manager Aaron Boone was named the 33rd manager in club history on December 4, 2017...is the 18th Yankees manager to have also played for the club.

- Became the fourth Yankees manager to lead the team to a postseason berth in his rookie managerial season, joining Ralph Houk in 1961 (won World Series), Yogi Berra in 1964 (lost WS) and Dick Howser in 1980 (lost ALCS).
- Became the sixth manager in Baseball history to lead his team to at least 100 wins in his rookie season, joining Ralph Houk (1961 Yankees, 109-53), Alex Cora (2018 Red Sox, 108-54), Dusty Baker (1993 Giants, 10359), Sparky Anderson (1970 Reds, 102-60) and Mickey Cochrane (1934 Tigers, 101-53).
- Made his managerial debut in $3 / 29$ win at Toronto, becoming the 11th manager to win his Yankees managerial debut on Opening Day and the 18th to win his Yankees managerial debut at any point during the season...was the fourth consecutive manager to win his Yankees managerial debut (Joe Girardi in 2008 vs. Toronto, Joe Torre in 1996 at Cleveland and Buck Showalter in 1992 vs. Boston).

RAIN, RAIN, GO AWAY: The Yankees had 21 games impacted by weather ( 9 postponements, 5 delayed pregame, 4 delayed in-game, 1 called early, 1 suspended and 1 rescheduled for later in the same day).

HEAVYWEIGHT MATCHUPS: Among the AL's five postseason qualifiers, the Yankees had the best record against the other four teams, going 22-17 (5-2 vs. Cleveland, $5-2$ vs. Houston, $3-3$ vs. Oakland, $9-10$ vs. Boston).

- Went $13-5$ at home vs. AL playoff teams ( $2-1$ vs. Oakland, $6-3$ vs. Boston, $3-0$ vs. Cleveland, 2-1 vs. Houston).
- The Yankees went a Major League-best 41-30 (.577) against teams that finished with records of .500 -orbetter... was their best such mark since 2009 (52-35, .598).

BEASTS OF THE EAST: The Yankees went 44-32 (.579) against the AL East for the second straight year, their best record within the division since going 45-27 (.625) in 2009.

- Went 21-18 on the road in the division, their best such record since they were $24-13$ in 2006...won at least one series in all four AL East road venues for the first time since 2013.
- Went $56-30$ outside the AL East: $23-11$ vs. the AL Central, 22-10 vs. the AL West and 11-9 in Interleague.

A BRONX TALE: With a $53-28$ (.654) record at Yankee Stadium, the Yankees had the second-best home record in the Majors (Boston, 57-24, .704)...marked their secondbest record in a single season at the current Yankee Stadium (57-24 in 2009).

- Posted a winning home record for the 27 th consecutive season (1992-2018), the second-longest such streak in Major League history, trailing only the Yankees' 47-year streak of winning home records from 1918-64 (Elias).
- Went 19-8 in series openers at Yankee Stadium in 2018.
- From $4 / 16-8 / 12$, went $13-0-4$ in 17 home series, their longest streak without dropping a series at home since going 20-0-5 over 25 home series from 9/15/97-8/16/98.
- For the second straight year, Yankees batters established a new club record by hitting a Major League-leading 144 HR at home (previously 140HR in 2017)...was tied for the fifth-highest single-season home HR total in Major League history...homered in 70-of-81 home games, with multiple HRs in 42-of-81.

HOME COOKING: From 4/21-5/9, the Yankees won 11 consecutive home games, breaking the record for the longest winning streak at the current Yankee Stadium...eclipsed the previous mark of nine wins from 5/30-6/15/10...was their longest single-season home winning streak since winning 12 consecutive games at the original Yankee Stadium from 4/25-6/1/85.

TOP OF THE TABLE: From the end of play on $5 / 8$ through $7 / 1$, the Yankees had at least a share of first place for 33 -of56 days...had sole possession of both first place and the Majors' best record for 12 consecutive days from the end of play on $6 / 15$ through the end of play on $6 / 26 \ldots$..the end of play on 7/1 marked the latest in a season they had had sole possession of MLB's best record since the end of play on 7/27/12 (.606, 60-39).

- The Yankees and Red Sox held at least a share of the Majors' two best records for 84 -of- 92 days from the end of play on $5 / 3$ through the end of play on $8 / 2$.

FRAME BY FRAME: The Yankees outscored opponents in seven of nine innings, as well as extra innings...were outscored, $96-76$, in the sixth inning, and were even in the second inning (76-76).

- Ranked second in the Majors with 118 runs scored in the first inning (Arizona-129R)...was their highestscoring frame...outscored their opponents by 129 runs in the first five innings (511-382).

LET'S PLAY TWO: The Yankees went 1-0-3 in four doubleheaders in 2018 (split on 6/4 at Detroit, split on 7/9 at Baltimore, split on $7 / 28$ vs. Kansas City, win on $8 / 25$ at Baltimore)...marked their most twinbills since playing five in 2011...the sweep was their first since $4 / 16 / 14$ vs. ChicagoNL, snapping a streak of 10 doubleheaders ( $0-4-6$ ) without one...was their longest such streak since the start of 1980.

WE WERE ON A BREAK：The Yankees went 62－33（．653） before the break，their 23 rd consecutive season with a pre－ All－Star record of ．500－or－better（1996－2018）．．．was their third－best record at the All－Star break in the last 60 seasons （since 1959），behind 1998 （61－20，．753）and 1980 （51－27，．654）．
－Was the second－best mark in the Majors at the break in 2018 （Boston，68－30，．694）．．．in the Divisional Era（since 1969），was the best record by any team outside of first place at the All－Star break．．．only two other teams have ever entered the break with as high a winning percentage and not in first place（1954 Yankees，56－28， ．667； 1940 Brooklyn，45－23，．662）．
－Entered the All－Star break with a record at least 29G above .500 for just the fourth time in franchise history： also 61－20 in 1998 （＋41）， $53-22$ in 1939 （＋31），and 56－26 in 1953 （＋30）．
－Were 38－29（．567）after the All－Star break．．．was their 26th consecutive season with a winning record after the break（1993－2018）．．．is the second－longest such streak in Major League history，after their own 32－year streak from 1933－64．

－Was their highest total home attendance since 2012 （3，542，406）．
－Set a current Yankee Stadium record with 23 sellouts， surpassing the previous mark of 20 sellouts in 2011.
－Also led the AL in average road attendance $(30,461)$ ， the only AL team above 30，000．
－Saw an increase in average attendance of 4，048 per home date from 39，835 in 2017 （up 7．9\％）．

－Rookies took $20.9 \%$ of plate appearances（1，310－of 6,271 ）and pitched $9.6 \%$ of the team＇s innings in 2018 （139．2－of－1，456．1）．．．in 2017，rookies accounted for $16.4 \%$ of plate appearances（ 1,042 －of－ 6,354 ） $18.5 \%$ of innings（268．0－of－1，448．2）
－Players in their age－27 seasons or younger accounted for over half of the team＇s extra－base hits（281－of－559） and nearly half of the hits（ 645 －of－ 1,374 ），home runs （131－of－267）and RBI（403－of－821）．
－Per Baseball－Reference，the Yankees＇weighted average hitters＇age（ 27.2 years old）was the fifth－youngest in the Majors in 2018.

YOUTH MOVEMENT：The Yankees＇Opening Day starting lineup on $3 / 29$ at Toronto featured eight players（out of 10 ）under 30 years old：（all except 34 －year－old LF Brett Gardner and 32 －year－old 2B Neil Walker）．．．were their most under－30 starters on Opening Day in the DH era （since 1973）and their most since $4 / 10 / 68$ vs．California（8－ of 9 ，all but 36 －year－old 1B Mickey Mantle）．
－Despite having only one rookie（Tyler Austin），the Yankees＇Opening Day active roster＇s average age of 28 years， 150 days，was the club＇s youngest since at least 1993．．．marked the third consecutive year that their average age on Opening Day was under 30 years old （ 28.334 in 2017， 29.099 in 2016）．．． 18 of the 25 active players were younger than 30 years old．

ROARING 20＇s：In a $4 / 22$ win vs．Toronto，the Yankees fielded an entire starting lineup of players younger than 30 years old for the first time since 9／29／89 vs．Detroit．．．．the ages ranged from 2B Gleyber Torres（ 21 years， 130 days） to C Austin Romine（29 years， 151 days）．
－According to STATS Inc．，with an average age of 26 years， 46 days，the starting lineup was their youngest since $9 / 26 / 70$ at Detroit（ 25 years， 35 days）．

OF NATIONAL IMPORTANCE：The Yankees went 11－9 （．550）against the National League，facing all five NL East opponents．．．have posted a winning record in 18 －of－ 22 Interleague season series since the advent of Interleague play in 1997 （18－3－1）．
－Went 5－5 at home and 6－4 on the road．
－Went 3－3 against the Mets．．．have won or split five consecutive season series since 2014．．．with a 69－49 record in the Subway Series，have the most victories by any team over a single opponent in Interleague history（next－most： Los Angeles Angels， $66-54$ vs．Los Angeles Dodgers）．
－At 237－165（．590），the Yankees own the second－best record and second－most wins all－time in Interleague play behind Boston（243－160，．603）．

SWEEPSTAKES：The Yankees recorded 12 series sweeps in 2018，their most in a season since 2009 （14）．．．swept four－game series vs．Minnesota（ $4 / 23-26$ ）and at Baltimore（ $8 / 24-26$ ）．
－For the second straight year，were swept in multi－game series just twice（6／22－24 at Tampa Bay－3G，8／2－5 at Boston－4G），matching their fewest in a single season since 2006 （1）．
－Did not lose more than two consecutive games until a three－game losing streak from 6／22－24 at Tampa Bay．．．was the latest into a season（in terms of games played）the Yankees went without a losing streak of at least three games since 8／20－22／54（Games 122－ 124）．．．were the last team in 2018 to suffer three consecutive losses．

BRONX BOMBERS: Yankees batters broke the singleseason Major League home run record with 267 home runs...Gleyber Torres hit the record-breaking HR, a fourthinning two-run shot on $9 / 29$ at Boston (off Eduardo Rodriguez), to surpass the 1997 Seattle Mariners (264HR) in the penultimate game of the season...also broke the Yankees' previous franchise record of 245HR in 2012.

- Marked the 25th team home run title in club history, their second consecutive...was the 10th straight season that an AL East club sat atop the leaderboard (2009-18).
- Homered in 131-of-162 games ( $80.1 \%$ ), tying the Major League record (2012 Yankees)...had 78 multi-HR games, tying the Major League record (Texas in 2005, Seattle in 1997)... hit at least 3HR in 37 games, the most in Yankees history (prev. 33 in 2004) and fifth-most in Major League history... hit at least 4HR in a franchiserecord 16 games (prev. 14 in 2005 and '17), tied for second-most in Major League history.
- Led the Majors with 120 HR with runners on base, the second-highest total in Major League history (Seattle122HR in 1996)...led the Majors with HRs with multiple runners on base for the third time in four seasons (37HR in 2018, 43HR in 2017, 47HR in 2015).
- Tied for fourth in the Majors with eight grand slams, two each by four players (Andújar, Bird, Gregorius, Stanton)...were their most grand slams since hitting 10 in each season from 2010-12.
- Hit a Major League-best 29 three-run home runs...their 68 three-run HRs since the start of 2017 are 11 more than any other club (Texas-57).
- Led the Majors in home runs in July (37), August (53) and September (46).
- Hit 161 home runs before the All-Star break, the most in Major League history (prev. Seattle-151HR in 1999).
- Hit a Yankees-record 144 HR at home ( 81 G ), tied for the fifth-highest home HR total in Major League history...hit 123HR on the road, second-most in the Majors (Oakland-136HR) and the third-highest total in franchise history ( 128 HR in $1961,124 \mathrm{HR}$ in 2003).
- Hit 188 HR as right-handed batters and 79 HR as lefthanded batters...topped their previous club record of 159HR by right-handed batters set in 2017.

TATER TROTS: The Yankees became the first team in Major League history to have 12 players hit at least 10HR in the same season...five teams have had 11 players reach double-digit home runs: Detroit in 2004, Houston in 2015 and 2017, Minnesota in 2016 and Toronto in 2018...had four players (Judge, Gregorius, Sánchez, Stanton) reach 10 HR in the first 40 team games, the fastest quartet of teammates to do so in Yankees history.

- Had five players with at least 25 HR , matching the franchise record (also 2009)...were 1HR by Gleyber Torres (24HR) away from matching the MLB record of six players with 25HR, set by Boston in 2003.
- Had six players with at least 20HR for the fourth time in club history (also 7 in 2009, 6 in 2004, 6 in 1961).
- Had 19 different players homer, tied for the seventhhighest total in franchise history.
- OF Giancarlo Stanton led the club with 38 HR , the only Yankee to reach 30HR...the Yankees are the only franchise in Major League history to hit as many as 240 HR in a season without a 40HR hitter, having done so three times: 2018, 2009 (leader: Mark Teixeira-39HR) and 2004 (leaders: Alex Rodriguez/Gary Sheffield-36HR).

SULTANS OF SWAT: According to Statcast, Yankees batters had a Major League-leading 124 hits with exit velocities of at least 110.0 mph (next-most: Chicago-AL, 72)...led the Majors with 41 HR of at least 110.0 mph (nextmost: Chicago-AL/Texas, 29).

- Had the Majors' 12 hardest-hit batted balls, including 10 by Giancarlo Stanton (Gary Sánchez second, Aaron Judge fifth)...Stanton's home run on 8/9 vs. Texas (121.7 mph ) was the hardest-hit batted ball in the Majors.

MULTI-TASKING: Yankees batters tied a Major League record with 24 individual multi-HR games, joining the 1961 Yankees and 1966 Atlanta Braves.

- Had 10 different players record a multi-HR game: Gregorius (5), Stanton (4), Sánchez (3), Austin/Gardner/ Hicks/Torres/Voit (2), Bird/Walker (1)...not included was RF Aaron Judge, who led the AL with seven multiHR games in 2017.
- Were the first team in Major League history to record six individual multi-HR games within the first 15 games of a season...were also the first team in to have five different players record a multi-HR game in the first 14 games of a season.
- CF Aaron Hicks had the Yankees' lone 3HR game of the season on $7 / 1 \mathrm{vs}$. Boston, the first by a Yankee since Alex Rodriguez on $7 / 25 / 15$ at Minnesota...was one of two games in 2018 in which a Yankee homered from both sides of the plate, also 2B Neil Walker on $8 / 10$ vs. Texas...are two of the 14 players in Yankees history to homer from both sides of the plate in a game.

SWINGING AWAY: Yankees batters finished second in the Majors in runs scored (851) and runs per game (5.25) for the second consecutive season (Boston, 876R, 5.41 runs/game).

- Hit .249/.329/.451 with 269 doubles, 23 triples, 267HR, 625BB, 63SB, 21CS and 59SF...ranked second in the Majors in slugging, OPS (.781) and total bases $(2,490)$, third in walks and fourth in extra-base hits (559)...also led the Majors in sacrifice flies.
- Drew walks in an AL-high 10.0\% of plate appearances.
- Set a team record with 1,421 strikeouts (previously 1,386 in 2017)...was only ninth-highest in the Majors.
- Saw 4.00 pitches per plate appearance, highest in the AL and third-highest in the Majors.
- Hit . 281 in July, their first calendar month with a team BA of .280-or-higher since hitting 288 in August 2011.
- Were not shut out for 110 games from $8 / 11 / 17-6 / 9 / 18$, their longest such streak since 7/11/77-5/31/78 (123G)...was the Majors' longest streak between shutouts since Detroit went 158 straight games without being shutout from 7/17/11-7/16/12.
- Hit a double in 30 consecutive games from $4 / 5-5 / 9$, the second-longest doubles streak in Yankees history (34G, 5/12-6/19/1936).
- Tied a Major League record by collecting at least 2XBH in each of their first 27 games of the season...marked the third such streak in Major League history, also Toronto in 2005 and Washington in 2017...collected at least 1XBH in 86 consecutive home games (5/12/17$5 / 9 / 18$ ), the longest such streak in franchise history (credit: Elias).
- The Yankees had a streak of 15 consecutive home games with at least 5 R from $7 / 3-8 / 13 \ldots$ was the second-longest streak in club history (21G from 6/27/14/38)...was tied for the Majors' eighth-longest streak since 1900, and tied for the longest since the start of 2001 (also Boston, 15 straight from 8/2-9/1/05).

SPOT CHECK: According to Elias, the Yankees became the first team in Major League history to hit at least 20HR from all nine batting spots: No. 1 (27HR), No. 2 (39HR), No. 3 (27HR), No. 4 (44HR), No. 5 (35HR), No. 6 (26HR), No. 7 (23HR), No. 8 (26HR), No. 9 (20HR).
bABY BOMBERS: 3B Miguel Andújar tied for the lead among Major League rookies with 27 HR , while INF Gleyber Torres finished fourth with 24 HR...Elias confirmed that the Yankees were the third team in Major League history to have multiple rookies with at least 24HRs, joining the 2006 Florida Marlins (Dan Uggla-27, Josh Willingham-26) and 1961 Los Angeles Angels (Ken Hunt-25, Lee Thomas-24)...prior to 2018, no pair of Yankees rookies had hit 15HR in the same season.

- Four Yankees rookies have reached 20 HR in the last three seasons after just four had done so prior to 2016 (also Aaron Judge-52 in 2017, Gary Sánchez-20 in 2016).
－Andújar tied the AL rookie record with 47 doubles （also Boston＇s Fred Lynn in 1975）．．．only Brooklyn＇s Johnny Frederick had more（52 in 1929）．．．surpassed Joe DiMaggio（45 in 1936）for the Yankees rookie record．．．tied for the seventh－highest doubles total in Yankees history．．．became the first rookie third baseman（min．50\％of games at 3B）in Major League history with at least 40 doubles and 25 HR in his rookie season．．．his 76XBH led all 2018 rookies and were third－ most by a rookie in Yankees history behind DiMaggio （88 in 1936）and Aaron Judge（79 in 2017）．
－Torres＇24HR were the second－most by a Yankee in his age－21 season or younger（Joe DiMaggio，29HR at age－ 21 in 1936）．
－Yankees rookies won three of the six AL＂Rookie of the Month＂Awards（Torres－May，Andújar－June／August）， and have won eight of the last 14.

ARMS TO FARE WELL：Yankees pitchers ranked fifth in the AL（10th in the Majors）with a 3.78 ERA．．．was their fourth－lowest mark in the last 33 seasons（since 1986）， behind 2017 （3．72）， 2011 （3．73）and 2014 （3．75）．
－Led the Majors with a 2.62 ERA（244．0IP，71ER）in 27 games in June，posting their lowest staff ERA for a calendar month since a 1.92 ERA over 21G in August 1981.
－Led the Majors with an average fastball velocity of 94.5 mph（FanGraphs）．

K／9 UNIT：Yankees pitchers recorded 1，634 strikeouts， the second－highest total in 2018 and in Major League history（Houston－1，687K in 2018）．．．are one of three teams in Major League history to reach 1，600 strikeouts in a season（also Cleveland－1，614K in 2017）．．．broke the previous club record of $1,560 \mathrm{~K}$ in 2017 ．
－Posted a $10.10 \mathrm{~K} / 9.0 \mathrm{IP}$ ratio（ $1,634 \mathrm{~K} / 1,456.1 \mathrm{IP}$ ）and 26．6\％strikeout rate，both the third－highest marks in Major League history（Houston－10．44／28．5\％in 2018； Cleveland－10．08／27．5\％in 2017）．．．surpassed their previous club records of 9.69 and $25.7 \%$ in 2017.
－Ranked fifth in the Majors with a 3.31 K／BB ratio，the second－best mark in franchise history（3．44 in 2014）．
－Had a franchise－record 88 double－digit－strikeout games（previously 82G in 2017）．．．．was the third－highest total in Major League history（Houston－96G in 2018， Cleveland－92G in 2017）．
－Set a Major League record by notching at least 8 K in 24 consecutive games from 8／15－9／9．

BLANK CHECK：Yankees pitchers threw 11 shutouts，tied for their most since they had 14 in 2005 （also 11 in 2008）．
－Pitched a 13 －inning shutout on 6／6 at Toronto，the team＇s second－longest shutout in the last 42 seasons（since 1977），behind a 15 －inning blanking on $8 / 7 / 09$ vs．Boston．

STRIKE FORCE：Yankees pitchers recorded 43 strikeouts from 8／6－8 at Chicago－AL，setting a club record for a three－ game series．．．broke the previous mark of 42 K from $5 / 5$ 7／17 at Chicago－NL．
－Led by 12 K from CC Sabathia，combined for 20 K in 13.0 IP on $8 / 7$ at Chicago－AL．．．marked just the second time in franchise history that they reached 20 K in a game，previously tying a Major League record with 26K in 18．0IP on $5 / 7 / 17$ at Chicago－NL．

FOR STARTERS：Yankees starting pitchers set a club record with a $9.20 \mathrm{~K} / 9.0 \mathrm{IP}$ ratio（ $881 \mathrm{~K} / 861.2 \mathrm{IP}$ ）．．．allowed one－or－zero runs in 57 starts，their second－highest total in franchise history（ 58 starts in 1968）．．．the Yankees went a Major League－best 62－9（．873）when their starting pitcher tossed at least 6．01P．
－Used 12 different starting pitchers，their second－most in the last 10 seasons since 2009 （13 in 2014）．
－Recorded at least 8 K in five consecutive starts from 8／5－ 9 ，the longest streak in franchise history．．．．was the ninth such streak in Major League history（credit：STATS，LLC）．

PEN PALS：Yankees relievers set a Major League bullpen record with a $11.40 \mathrm{~K} / 9.0 \mathrm{IP}$ ratio（ $753 \mathrm{~K} / 594.2 \mathrm{IP}$ ）．．．surpassed the mark of 10.92 set by the 2017 Yankees．．．their 753K were the second－most by a bullpen in Major League history，behind the 2018 Rays（ 754 K in 824．1IP）．．．became the first bullpen in Major League history to strike out at least $30.0 \%$ of its batters faced（30．2\％），surpassing the 2017 Yankees（29．0\％）for the Major League record．
－Have led the Majors in K／9．0IP ratio out of the bullpen in each of the last five seasons： 2014 （10．25）， 2015 （10．11）， 2016 （10．15）， 2017 （10．92）and 2018 （MLB－record 11．40）．
－Had four of the Majors＇top－17 relievers in strikeouts： Dellin Betances（third，115K），Chad Green（T－11th，94K）， Aroldis Chapman（T－14th，93K），David Robertson（17th， 91）．．．are the first bullpen in Major League history to have four relievers record at least 90K．
－Ranked fourth in the Majors in ERA（3．38）behind Houston（3．03），Chicago－NL（3．35）and Oakland（3．35）．
－Their 74．2\％save conversion rate（49SV，17BS） was second－highest in the Majors behind Texas （75．0\％）．．．also tied for the third－fewest blown saves．
－According to FanGraphs，their 9．7 WAR was the highest by a bullpen in Major League history（prev．Los Angeles－ NL， 9.6 in 2003）．
－In a 5／1 win at Houston，five relievers combined to strike out 13 batters over 8.0 shutout innings．．．set a Yankees bullpen record for the most strikeouts in a nine－inning game，breaking the mark of 12 K ，done twice（ $6 / 21 / 16$ at Colorado； $6 / 3 / 33$ vs．Philadelphia－AL）．．．was tied for the ninth－most strikeouts by a bullpen in a nine－inning game in Major League history（credit：Elias）．

RISP AVERSION：Yankees pitchers limited opponents to a ． 222 BA with RISP in 2018，the lowest mark in the Majors （next：Houston，．224）．．．marked their second consecutive season leading the AL in opponents＇BA with RISP（． 218 in 2017）．．．was just their second sub－． 230 figure in the last 40 seasons（since 1979）．

CLOUD NINE：The Yankees had a season－long nine－game winning streak from 4／21－29．．．prior to the streak，had not won or lost more than two consecutive games in 2018．．．was their longest winning streak since winning 10 straight from $6 / 8-18 / 12$ ，and the second－longest April winning streak in club history（10 straight from 4／13－23／87）－credit：Elias．

PLAY 18：The Yankees went 17－1 from 4／21－5／9，their best 18G stretch since going 17－1 from 6／2－18／53（which was part of a larger 21－1 stretch from 5／27－6／18／53）．．．over the stretch，outscored opponents，110－45，and out－homered opponents，25－13．

HEY NOW，YOU＇RE AN ALL－STAR：Four Yankees were named to the AL All－Star Team in 2018：LHP Aroldis Chapman（fifth All－Star nod），OF Aaron Judge（second）， RHP Luis Severino（second）and INF Gleyber Torres （first）．．Judge was elected by the fan vote，while Chapman， Torres and Severino were elected via the Player Ballot．
－Judge became the first Yankee to start consecutive All－ Star Games since Robinson Canó（2010－13）and the first Yankees OF to start two straight since Curtis Granderson （2011－12）．．．Chapman made his first AL All－Star Team after making four in the NL．．．Severino was the first Yankees starting pitcher to be named to consecutive All－ Star teams since CC Sabathia made it to three straight from 2010－12．．．Torres was the fourth Yankee to make the AL All－Star team at age 21－or－younger，joining Joe DiMaggio（age 21 in 1936），Mickey Mantle（ages 20－21 from 1952－53）and Willie Randolph（age 21 in 1976）．
－The Yankees have sent multiple players to the All－Star Game in 26 consecutive seasons（since 1993）．．．have sent at least four players in two straight years（five in 2017）．
－Have had four rookies make the All－Star team in the last five seasons（Betances／Tanaka in 2014，Judge in 2017，Torres in 2018）．．．had just one rookie All－Star from 1977－2013（Matsui－2003）．

DELLIN DONUTS: RHP Dellin Betances set an AL record by logging at least one strikeout in 44 consecutive relief appearances from $5 / 29-9 / 22 \ldots$ was the third-longest streak in Major League history, behind Cincinnati's Aroldis Chapman (49, 8/21/13-8/13/14) and Milwaukee's Corey Knebel (46, 10/2/16-7/15/17).

- His 115 K ranked third among Major League relievers, trailing Milwaukee's Josh Hader (143K) and Seattle's Edwin Díaz (124K).

STANTON ISLAND: In his first season as a Yankee, OF Giancarlo Stanton tied for sixth in the Majors with 38HR and ranked seventh in the AL with 100 RBI ....his 38 HR were the fifth-most by a player in his first season as a Yankee, behind Babe Ruth (54HR in 1920), Jason Giambi (41HR in 2002), Mark Teixeira (39HR in 2009) and Roger Maris (39HR in 1960).

LONG(BALL) AND SHORT OF IT: With 27HR in just 134G, SS Didi Gregorius set a Yankees franchise record for home runs in a season by a shortstop, surpassing his own total from 2017 (25HR).

- Was named the April AL "Player of the Month" after leading the Majors with 10HR and 30RBI and ranking second with a .739 slugging mark.

JUST FOR HICKS: CF Aaron Hicks hit 27HR, third-most among MLB switch-hitters to Cleveland's José Ramírez (39) and Francisco Lindor (38)...was the seventh switch-hitter in Yankees history to hit 25HR in a season, joining Mickey Mantle (10x), Bernie Williams ( 5 x ), Mark Teixeira (4x), Tom Tresh ( 3 x ), Jorge Posada ( 2 x ) and Nick Swisher ( 2 x ).

- On $7 / 1$ vs. Boston, recorded his first career 3HR game, the first by a Yankee since Alex Rodriguez on 7/25/15 at Minnesota....homered from both sides of the plate in a game for the second time in his career (also 4/13/17 vs. Tampa Bay)... is one of five players (three Yankees) to hit 3HR in a game at the current Yankee Stadium... was the first Yankees leadoff hitter to hit 3HR in a game, just the 27th such game in Major League history...St. Louis' Matt Carpenter joined the group on 7/20/18 at Chicago-NL.

SEVY LIFTING: RHP Luis Severino went 19-8 with a 3.39 ERA (191.1IP, 72ER) in 32 starts...ranked third in the Majors in wins behind Tampa Bay's Blake Snell (21-5) and Corey Kluber (20-7)...was the highest total by a Yankee since CC Sabathia was also 19-8 in 2011.

- With 220 K , compiled his second consecutive 200 K season, just the third pitcher in Yankees history to accomplish the feat (David Cone, 1997-98; Ron Guidry, 1978-79).
- The Yankees went $24-8$ in his starts, tied with three others for the most team wins started by one pitcher in the Majors in 2018.

PITCCHING IN: LHP CC Sabathia continued his climb up Baseball's career wins and strikeout lists, finishing the season ranked 17th all-time in strikeouts $(2,986)$ and tied for 50th all-time in wins (246).

- Was also the Yankees' nominee for the 2018 Roberto Clemente Award, his third career nomination (2011, '14).

REINFORCEMENTS: The Yankees acquired four former All-Stars in four separate second-half trades: LHP Zack Britton on 7/24 from Baltimore, LHP J.A. Happ on 7/26 from Toronto, RHP Lance Lynn on 7/30 from Minnesota, and OF Andrew McCutchen on 8/31 from San Francisco.

- Also acquired 1B Luke Voit on 7/28 from St. Louis...from 8/24 through the end of the season, Voit led the AL with 14 HR while hitting .351/.426/.763 ( 40 -for-114) with $26 \mathrm{R}, 5$ doubles, 31 RBI and 14 BB in 32G...led the AL and was second in the Majors in HRs in that span (Milwaukee's Christian Yelich-15HR).
- Happ went $7-0$ with a 2.69 ERA ( $63.21 \mathrm{P}, 19 \mathrm{ER}$ ) in 11 starts...the Yankees went 9-2 in Happ's 11 starts and 6-3 in Lynn's nine starts ( $15-5$ in their 20 combined starts).
- McCutchen tied for the AL lead in walks in September and hit .253/.421/.471 (22-for-87) with 18R, 2 doubles, 1 triple, $5 \mathrm{HR}, 10 \mathrm{RBI}, 22 \mathrm{BB}, 4 \mathrm{HP}$ and 1 SB in 25 G .

EARLY BIRDS: The Yankees opened their season with a 6-1 win on $3 / 29$ at Toronto...marked the earliest regular season game in Yankees history... prior to 2018, had played only four games in March, most recently on $3 / 31 / 11$ vs. Detroit.

- Snapped a six-game Opening Day losing streak, notching their first season-opening win since 3/31/11 vs. Detroit...was the longest such losing streak in team history and the longest active losing streak in the Majors.

OCTA-GONE: In the Yankees' home opener on $4 / 3$ vs. Tampa Bay, SS Didi Gregorius went 4 -for- 4 with 3R, 1 double, $2 \mathrm{HR}, 8 \mathrm{RBI}$ and 1 BB ...set a single-game franchise record for RBI by a shortstop and RBI by a Yankee in a home opener...also tied his career high with four hits ( 7 x ) and reached base safely a career-high-tying five times (5x).

- Was the 12th Yankee all-time with at least 8RBI in a game and just the second in the last 22 seasons (since 1997), joining Alex Rodriguez (10RBI on 4/26/05 vs. Los Angeles-AL)...was just the second middle infielder in Yankees history to accomplish the feat, joining singlegame franchise recordholder 2B Tony Lazzeri (11RBI on $5 / 24 / 36$ at Philadelphia)...the Yankees became the first franchise to have a player at all eight positions (excluding pitcher) record at least 8RBI in a game (credit: Mark Simon, Sports Info Solutions).
- Marked the seventh of eight times an MLB shortstop had at least 8RBI in a game and one of two in 2018 (Washington's Trea Turner on 7/5/18 vs. Miami)...was the first since Boston's Nomar Garciaparra had 8RBI on 7/23/02 (G1) vs. Tampa Bay...is one of seven shortstops in MLB history with an 8RBI game (Turner, Garciaparra2x, Miguel Tejada, Cal Ripken Jr., Chris Speier and Travis Jackson)...was the third shortstop to do it with 4 H (Tejada, 6/30/01 at Texas; Jackson, 8/4/23 at Cincinnati).
- The 8RBI set a new single-game record for the current Yankee Stadium (since 2009).
- Was only the second Yankees cleanup hitter in the last 61 years (since 1958) to record at least 8RBI in a game (also Danny Tartabull, 9RBI on 9/8/92 at Baltimore) and the fifth all-time (DiMaggio-2x, Gehrig-2x, Berra, Tartabull).

SHOWCASE SHOWDOWN: According to Elias, the Yankees' game at Fenway Park on $8 / 3$ marked the latest in a season that the Yankees (68-39) and Red Sox (76-34) had faced each other while owning the Majors' two best records since the teams played an AL East tiebreaker game in Game 163 on 10/2/78 at Fenway Park when they were both 99-63 (the Yankees won, 5-4).

- The Yankees and Braves entered their $7 / 2-4$ series at Yankee Stadium with the best records in their respective leagues...per Elias, it marked the third time since the start of Interleague play in 1997 that the teams with the AL's and NL's best records squared off that late into a season (Kansas City at St. Louis, 1G on 7/23/15; Arizona at Seattle, 3G from 7/15-17/01)...marked the Yankees' second consecutive series against a team that entered with the best record in its league (Boston, 6/29-7/1).

TAKING ONE FOR THE TEAM: According to Elias, 48 different position players pitched in a Major League game in 2018, the most in a season in the Expansion Era (since 1961)...the Yankees were one of five clubs to not use a position player on the mound.

- The Yankees have not used a position player to pitch since $8 / 25 / 15$ vs. Houston (INF Brendan Ryan), the second-longest active streak in the Majors behind Colorado (INF Todd Zeile on 9/14/02 vs. Los Angeles-NL).

TO BE THE BEST, YOU'VE GOT TO BEAT THE BEST: Each of the Yankees' wins during their eight-game winning streak from 5/1-9 came against teams in sole possession or tied for first place at the start of the game ( 3 G at Houston, 3G vs. Cleveland, 2G vs. Boston)...according to Elias, it marked the second-longest winning streak against strictly first-place teams (sole possession or tied) by any club in MLB history, behind Cincinnati, which won 10 consecutive games, all against first-place opponents, from 6/21-7/1/99.

21 BLACK JACKS: From 5/19-23, Yankees batters tied a Major League record by hitting 21 HR over a five-game span...joined Boston (6/14-19/77) and Cincinnati (9/47/99); Aaron Boone hit three of the Reds' 21HR

- Hit at least 3HR in all 5G, the longest streak of 3HR games in franchise history (previously 4G from 7/27$30 / 56$ and 6/8-11/17) and tied for the second-longest in Major League history behind Baltimore's 6G from 5/8-13/87...only seven teams have hit at least 3HR in at least five straight games.
- Hit at least 4HR in three straight games for the first time in franchise history from 5/19-21...over the same stretch, became the fourth team in the Modern Era (since 1900) with at least 8XBH in three straight games, joining Boston (6/27-29/03), Cleveland (4/9-11/99) and Washington-AL (6/14-16-G1/35)....were the first team in Major League history to collect both 4HR and 8XBH in three consecutive games.

RANGER DANGER: Yankees batters hit 23HR in 7G vs. Texas, tying a club single-season record for home runs vs. a non-AL East opponent (since MLB went to divisions for the 1969 season)...also hit $23 H R$ in 11G vs. Seattle in 1998. Hit 17HR in their first 4G vs. Texas, the most home runs in Major League history by one team in a season's first four matchups with a single opponent (credit: Elias).

- Have an eight-game multi-HR streak vs. Texas (since 9/10/17), tied for the longest multi-HR streak vs. one opponent in franchise history (also 8G vs. the Kansas City A's from 5/5-6/26/56, 8G vs. Chicago-AL from 7/238/5/37)...is tied for the fifth-longest multi-HR streak vs. one opponent in Major League history, trailing the Dodgers ( 10 G vs. the Mets, current through end of 2018), Cincinnati (10G vs. Brooklyn from 5/2-6/24/56), Texas (9G vs. Toronto from $8 / 17 / 02-8 / 8 / 03$ ) and Minnesota (9G vs. Cleveland from 4/9-7/15/63).

FOURCLOSURE: The Yankees had four different pitchers earn saves in a four-game sweep from 8/24-26 at Baltimore: Zack Britton, Luis Cessa, Dellin Betances, David Robertson.

- Elias confirmed that since saves became an official statistic in 1969, only one other team ever swept a fourgame series with four different pitchers earning saves: from 6/1-4/89, Baltimore's Mark Thurmond, Kevin Hickey, Gregg Olson and Mark Williamson earned saves a four-game sweep over Detroit at Tiger Stadium.
- Marked the first time in franchise history that the Yankees won four consecutive games, each with a different pitcher earning a save...were the first team to accomplish the feat since Tampa Bay from 6/29-7/2/08 (Troy Percival, J.P. Howell, Grant Balfour, Dan Wheeler).
- With Tommy Kahnle's save on $8 / 21$ win at Miami, five different pitchers saved five consecutive Yankees wins...marked the first time the Yankees ever had five different pitchers save five consecutive team wins (within a single season)...the Dodgers were the previous team to accomplish the feat, doing so over a 13-game span from 5/11-24/11 (Vicente Padilla, Kenley Jansen, Matt Guerrier, Mike MacDougal, Javy Guerra)

WALK-OFF FAME: The Yankees had eight "walk-off" wins in 2018: 4/26 vs. Minnesota (Sánchez three-run HR), 5/4 vs. Cleveland (Andújar RBI single), 5/6 vs. Cleveland (Torres three-run HR), 5/12 vs. Oakland (Walker RBI single), 5/29 vs. Houston (Torres RBI single), $6 / 20$ vs. Seattle (Stanton two-run HR), 8/28 vs. Chicago-AL (Walker pinch-hit solo HR), $9 / 22$ vs. Baltimore (Hicks RBI double).

- Their eight "walk-off" wins were fourth-most in the AL (9-Oakland/Tampa Bay/Toronto) and tied for eighthmost in the Majors... were tied for their most in the last 10 seasons ( 15 in 2009, 9 in 2014).
- On 5/6 vs. Cleveland, INF Gleyber Torres became the youngest player in franchise history (21 years, 144 days) to hit a "walk-off" home run, surpassing Mickey Mantle (21 years, 185 days on $4 / 23 / 53$ vs. Boston).

THROWBACK WEEKEND: On 6/17, the Yankees hosted the 72nd annual Old-Timers' Day at Yankee Stadium...Old-Timers were headlined by first-timers Andy Pettitte, Aaron Boone, Nick Swisher and Jason Giambi...Yankees alumni and current YES Network broadcasters David Cone, John Flaherty and Paul $\mathbf{O}^{\prime}$ Neill were also part of the festivities.

DOWN ON THE FARM: The Yankees qualified their top two minor league affiliates for their respective league's postseasons in 2018...Triple-A Scranton/Wilkes-Barre reached the International League's Governors' Cup Championship Series for the third consecutive season, losing to Durham in five games...Double-A Trenton reached its third consecutive postseason but was swept in the first round of the Eastern League playoffs.

- LHP Justus Sheffield (first team) and RHP Michael

King (second team) were named to the 2018 Minor League All-Star Team by Baseball America.

GRAPEFRUIT JUICE: The Yankees completed their 2018 spring training schedule with an 18-13-1 record (.581), the fifth-best mark in the Grapefruit League...over the last two springs, the Yankees have a 42-22-2 mark...SS Didi Gregorius and OF Billy McKinney led the team with 5HR and 13RBI each...the Yankees' 140BB were most in the Majors, led by OF Aaron Hicks, who tied for third in the Grapefruit League with 11BB...LHP Jordan Montgomery led the Yankees in innings pitched (21.0) and strikeouts (20)...neither RHP Jonathan Holder (12K/0BB in 11.0IP) nor LHP Aroldis Chapman (10K/0BB in 4.1IP) issued a walk...RHP Masahiro Tanaka had a 12.51 K/9.0IP ratio (19K/13.2IP)...INF Miguel Andújar won the 2018 James P. Dawson Award as the most outstanding rookie in Yankees camp after batting .267 (12-for-45) with 8R, 2 doubles, 1 triple, 4 HR and 10RBI in 15 games...over 16 games at George M. Steinbrenner Field this spring, the Yankees drew 158,106 fans for an average of 9,882 per game, which led the Grapefruit League...the club also enjoyed sellout crowds for seven of those 16 games.

## Two-Stadium Doubleheaders

On three occasions, the Yankees and Mets have played two-stadium day-night doubleheaders. Each instance was precipitated by a rainout. According to the Elias Sports Bureau, the first occurrence in 2000 marked the first dual-venue doubleheader in the Majors since September 7, 1903, when the New York Giants and the Brooklyn Superbas (later called the Dodgers) faced off in Game 1 (Giants 6 - Brooklyn 4) at Washington Park in Brooklyn and Game 2 (Brooklyn 3 -Giants 0 ) at the Polo Grounds in Manhattan.

## Played for or Managed Yankees and Mets

Through the 2018 season, there have been 132 players to appear in at least one game for both the Yankees and Mets. The first was "Marvelous" Marv Throneberry, who broke in with the Yankees (1955, '58-59) before joining the Mets via a May 9, 1962, trade with Baltimore. The only other Yankee to play on the Mets in their inaugural 1962 season was Gene Woodling, who played six seasons in the Bronx from 1949-54, winning World Series championships in each of his first five seasons with the club. He was purchased by the Mets from Washington on June 15, 1962. There have been 34 players who have played on World Serieswinning Yankees teams who have also appeared in at least one game for the Mets. Conversely, there have been nine World Serieswinning Mets (1969-Swoboda; 1986-Elster, Gooden, Jefferson, Mazzilli, Ojeda, Orosco, Santana and Strawberry) to play for the Yankees at some point in their careers.

On January 13, the baseball community was deeply saddened by the passing of Mel Stottlemyre, who was honored with a plaque in Monument Park in 2015. A five-time All-Star who played all 11 of his Major League seasons in pinstripes (1964-74), he tallied a 164-139 career record with a 2.97 ERA, earning four World Series rings as the Yankees' pitching coach from 1996-2005.

## History New York Yankees



The Yankees are baseball's most storied franchise. With 27 World Championships and 40 American League pennants, the club stands alone in both categories.
The team's glorious history has surprisingly humble origins at the start of the previous century, when the upstart American League declared itself a Major League following the 1900 season. At that time, the league sought to place a team in New York for the 1901 campaign. But due to the political strength of the National League's New York Giants, the American League instead put a team in Baltimore, calling it the Orioles, with the hope of establishing a team in New York as soon as possible.

Managed by John McGraw, the 1901 Orioles finished 68-65 and failed to draw substantial crowds. The following season, McGraw, uncertain about the club's future, precipitated a midseason release from his contract. He immediately teamed with Giants owner Andrew Freedman and Cincinnati Reds owner John T. Brush, helping them acquire a majority interest in the Orioles. With control of Baltimore's players, the pair of owners decimated the squad, divvying up the players between them. On July 17, 1902, the Baltimore Orioles were left with five players on their roster and were forced to forfeit their game against the St. Louis Browns. The American League quickly stepped in and lent Baltimore players from other teams so they could finish the season.

Prior to the start of the 1903 campaign, the two leagues reached a truce, part of which involved the National League agreeing to allow an American League team in New York City. With the Orioles having been dissolved, saloon owner Frank Farrell and ex-New York chief of police Bill Devery were awarded the right to establish a new franchise in New York for $\$ 18,000$.

New York's American League entry was the city's third Major League team, joining the Giants and Brooklyn Dodgers of the National League. The new club played its home games at American League Park, a hastily constructed all-wooden structure at 168th Street and Broadway in Manhattan. Because the site was one of the highest spots in the borough, the team was commonly called the "Hilltoppers" or "Highlanders" and their home field "Hilltop Park."The club played its inaugural game on April 22, 1903, at Washington, losing, 3-1, to the Senators. The next day, they defeated the Senators, 7-2, recording the very first win in franchise history.

Led by future Hall of Famers Jack Chesbro, Clark Griffith and Wee Willie Keeler, the 1903 Highlanders finished with a 72-62 record, 17.0 games out of first place. The club nearly captured the American League pennant in 1904-finishing 1.5 games behind the Boston Americans (later known as the Red Sox)-as Chesbro went 41-12 with a 1.82 ERA in 454.2 innings pitched, setting a modern era (since 1900) record with his win total. That season marked the first of three second-place finishes for the club between 1904 and 1910.

After a devastating fire severely damaged the Polo Grounds in 1911, the Highlanders' owners invited the Giants to share Hilltop Park until their home could be rebuilt. Two years later, the Giants returned the favor and allowed the Highlanders to become tenants in their new, vastly superior facility.

Following the move in 1913, newspapers and the public increasingly referred to the club as the "Yankees," which first appeared in the press in 1904. While no official announcement was ever made to formally establish the team's nickname, 1913 is considered the year that "Yankees" became the team's principal moniker.


Manager Miller Huggins [L] led the Yankees to three World Series championships and six American League pennants after being hired by owner Jacob Ruppert [R] in 1918.

From 1911 to 1919, the Yankees won as many as 80 games in a season only twice. However, three key moves-the January 1915 purchase of the ballclub by Colonel Jacob Ruppert and Colonel Tillinghast L'Hommedieu Huston, the 1918 hiring of Manager Miller Huggins by Ruppert (without Huston's blessing) and the 1919 midseason trade for right-handed pitcher Carl Mays ( 26 wins in 1920 and 27 wins in 1921)—set the stage for the greatest course-altering transaction in baseball history, when on January 5, 1920, the Yankees completed the purchase of the contract of George Herman "Babe" Ruth from the Boston Red Sox for $\$ 100,000$ plus interest along with a reported $\$ 300,000$ personal loan against the mortgage on Fenway Park.

Ruth's impact was immediate. The Yankees won 95 games in 1920, their highest victory total up to that point, then captured their first AL pennant a year later. With the Babe hitting 54 home runs in 1920-more than any other team in the American League-Yankees attendance at the Polo Grounds doubled to $1,289,422$. In 1921, the Giants, being outdrawn in their own park, asked the Yankees to vacate the Polo Grounds as soon as possible. Now bitter rivals, the two teams squared off in the World Series in 1921 and 1922 with the Giants winning on both occasions.

Though he came up on the wrong end in both Series, Yankees pitcher (and 1969 Hall of Fame inductee) Waite Hoyt allowed just one earned run over 35.0 combined innings over the two Fall Classics. Remarkably, he went 2-2 in his five appearances (four starts), including a 1-0, Seriesclinching loss (on an unearned run) in Game 8 of the 1921 best-of-nine championship.

With their departure from the Polo Grounds inevitable, the Yankees' owners set out to build a ballpark of their own. Designed to be baseball's first triple-decked structure with an advertised capacity of 70,000, it would be the first baseball facility to be called a "stadium" at its inaugural opening.

The team's upcoming success was masterminded by business manager and future Hall of Famer Ed Barrow, whose responsibilities from 1921 through 1945 included both player personnel and the club's finances. He developed a fantastic relationship with Huggins from the outset and brought in Paul Krichell, who not only developed the Yankees
scouting department but personally signed Lou Gehrig, Phil Rizzuto and Whitey Ford to their first Yankees contracts.

Construction on the original Yankee Stadium began on May 5, 1922, and in only 284 working days, it was ready for its inaugural game on April 18, 1923, against the Boston Red Sox. An announced crowd of 74,200 fans packed the Stadium for a glimpse of Baseball's grandest facility while thousands milled around outside after the fire department finally ordered the gates closed. Appropriately, Ruth christened the Stadium with a three-run homer to cap a four-run third inning as the Yankees, behind starter Bob Shawkey, won, 4-1.

Playing in their new stadium, dubbed "The House that Ruth Built" by New York Telegram sportswriter Fred Lieb, the Yankees won the American League by 16.0 games in 1923 , using just eight pitchers all season. Each of their five starting pitchers-Shawkey, Hoyt, Joe Bush, Sam Jones and Herb Pennock-won at least 16 games. In October, the Stadium hosted the first of 37 World Series at the structure, and the Yankees won the first World Championship in franchise history, defeating their former landlord, the Giants, in six games.

Less than two seasons later, one of the greatest players in franchise history was given his chance to crack the lineup. On June 1, 1925, in a 5-3 loss vs. Washington, Huggins called upon Gehrig, a 21-year-old first baseman with 34 career games to his name, to pinch-hit for light-hitting shortstop Paul "Pee Wee" Wanninger. It would mark the first of 2,130 consecutive games played by the "Iron Horse," who replaced Wally Pipp as the Yankees' starting first baseman the very next day. The story of Gehrig replacing Pipp because of a headache is a myth. Pipp, who led the AL in homers in 1916 and 1917 and was an integral part of the Yankees' World Series clubs from 1921-23, had a poor start to the season, and Manager Miller Huggins wanted to see what the younger, much-heralded Gehrig could do.

After the Yankees suffered a tough loss to the St. Louis Cardinals in the 1926 World Series (which famously ended with Babe Ruth making the final out in Game 7 while trying to steal second base), the Yankees rolled to World Championships in both 1927 and 1928, sweeping the Pittsburgh Pirates and St. Louis Cardinals, respectively. The 1927 club, known as "Murderers' Row," is often the yardstick by which team greatness is measured. During that season, Ruth broke his own singleseason home run record (previously 59 in 1921) with his 60th on September 30, 1927, off Washington's Tom Zachary. Gehrig also added 47 homers and 173 RBI.

In his 15 seasons in pinstripes from 1920-34, Ruth helped establish a winning tradition with seven American League pennants and four World Championships. He finished his unparalleled career with 714 home runs (including 49 with the Red Sox from 1914-19 and six with the Boston Braves in 1935). He also tallied 12 American League home run titles and six RBI crowns, including five seasons with more than 150 RBI. A charter member of Baseball's Hall of Fame, he remains widely regarded as the greatest player of all time.

Throughout Ruth's time in pinstripes, he often overshadowed the soft-spoken, Manhattan-born Gehrig, who posted incredible numbers in his own right. From 1926 through 1938, Gehrig drove in at least 112 runs each season. A player on seven World Championship clubs (1927-28, 1932, 1936-39) and a major contributor to the first six, he finished with a .340 lifetime batting average and 493 career home runs in just 8,001 at-bats. He was the AL's starting first baseman in each of the first five Major League Baseball All-Star Games, and in 1934, became the first of two Yankees in franchise history (also Mickey Mantle in 1956) to win the Triple Crown, hitting .363 with a career-high-tying 49 homers and 166 RBI. He also still holds the American League record for RBI in a single season with 184 in 1931.

After the 1934 season, Ruth's last in New York, the Yankees purchased the contract of a budding star named Joe DiMaggio from the San Francisco Seals of the Pacific Coast League. Two years later, DiMaggio made his debut in pinstripes and helped the Yankees to an incredible string of four consecutive World Championships under Manager Joe McCarthy from 1936 through 1939. The 1930s also produced one of the game's greatest leftyrighty pitching combinations in future Hall of Famers Lefty Gomez and Red Ruffing. A four-time 20-game winner-including 24-7 in 1932 and 26-5 in 1934Gomez posted a 6-0 record in five World Series. Ruffing, who was acquired on May 6, 1930, from Boston for outfielder Cedric Durst and $\$ 50,000$, had been 39-96 with the Red Sox since his 1924 rookie season. After coming to the Yankees, however, he built his Cooperstown credentials, going 231-124 in pinstripes while posting 20 , 20, 21 and 21 wins on the four World Championship clubs from 1936 through 1939. He was also an exceptionally good hitter for a pitcher, totaling 36 career home runs and a 269 lifetime batting average.

From 1931 through part of the 1946 season, the Yankees were led by McCarthy, who compiled a Yankees-record 1,460 wins in his time at the helm. Having also spent time leading the Chicago Cubs (1926-30) and Boston Red Sox (1948-50), he is eighth on the all-time managerial wins list with 2,125 victories. With the Yankees, he reached eight World Series (1932, 1936-39, 1941-43), winning a World Championship in all but one-the 1942 Fall Classic against St. Louis.

Sadly, in 1939, Gehrig was diagnosed with a crippling disease, eventually determined to be
amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS), and his streak of playing in 2,130 consecutive games came to an end. On May 2, he took himself out of the lineup prior to the Yankees' 22 -2 win at Detroit. He never played in a Major League game again.

On July 4 of the same season, the Yankees honored their captain with an emotional Lou Gehrig Appreciation Day at Yankee Stadium, and on Jan. 6, 1940, team president Ed Barrow announced that his No. 4 would become the first-ever retired number in baseball. Gehrig passed away from the effects of ALS on June 2, 1941.

DiMaggio became the pillar of the next generation of Yankees


Joe DiMaggio champions. In his 13 seasons in pinstripes (1936-42 and '46-51), DiMaggio made the AL All-Star team every year, and his club played in the World Series in all but three years (1940, '46, '48), winning nine World Series titles. Along the way, he tallied three AL MVP Awards (1939, '41, '47) and batted . 325 over his career, marking the third-highest average in franchise history. The legendary "Yankee Clipper" compiled one of the game's most remarkable records in 1941, when he hit safely in an all-timebest 56 consecutive games.

DiMaggio's retirement after the 1951 season at the age of 37 was made easier by the emergence of Mickey Mantle, who played side-by-side with DiMaggio in the outfield in the Yankee Clipper's final campaign. With contributions from future Hall of Famers Yogi Berra, Whitey Ford and Phil Rizzuto, the Yankees were nearly unstoppable from the late 1940s through the early 1960s. Manager Casey Stengel sublimely handled the Yankees juggernaut following his surprising appointment prior to the 1949 season, as the club marched to an all-time record five consecutive World Series titles from 1949 through 1953.

His emphasis on platooning players (often to their chagrin) allowed him to exploit matchups in a way not emphasized at that time. Nicknamed "The Old Perfessor," with a vernacular called "Stengelese," he remains one of the most colorful personalities in the game's history. In 12 seasons as manager of the Yankees, Stengel brought his club to the World Series 10 times, winning on seven occasions (also 1956 and 1958).

His staff during the remarkable five-year run of championships was anchored by a trio of starters who each pitched eight seasons with the Yankees and combined for 10 All-Star appearances while with the club. Allie Reynolds, known as "Superchief," went 131-60 with a 3.31 ERA in 295 games (209 starts) from 1947-54, after being acquired from Cleveland in exchange for fellow

Hall of Famer Joe Gordon. Reynolds also finished 70 regular season games for the Yankees in an era before the save was an official statistic. The No. 2 starter, Vic Raschi, broke into the Majors at age 27 and didn't become a full member of the Yankees rotation until the second half of the 1947 season. He won exactly 21 games in each of three consecutive years from 194951 and tallied a .706 winning percentage (120-50) and 3.47 ERA with the club from 1946-1953. The leastheralded of the three, "Steady" Eddie Lopat, went 11359 with a 3.19 ERA with the Yankees from 1948-1955, including an AL-leading 2.43 ERA in 1953.

For all of the great players of the 1950s and early 60 s , Mantle overshadowed everyone. He would achieve greatness despite suffering from osteomyelitis (a painful inflammatory bone disease) and numerous other injuries. A powerful switch-hitter, he belted 536 home runs, collected 2,415 hits and batted .300 or higher 10 times in an 18-year career. In his first 14 seasons in pinstripes (1951-64), the Yankees missed the World Series only twice (1954 and 1959) and won the Fall Classic seven times. With his .353 batting average, 52 homers and 130 RBI in 1956, he remains the last Yankees player to win the Triple Crown.

Ford, who played his whole career in pinstripes, is the Yankees' all-time wins leader. His lifetime record of 236106 gives him the second-best career winning pct. (.690) of any pitcher with 100 or more decisions who began his career in the modern era (since 1900), trailing only careerYankee Spud Chandler (.717, 109-43, from 1937-47). Ford paced the AL in victories three times and in ERA and shutouts twice. He still holds many World Series records, including those for wins (10), consecutive scoreless innings (33.0) and strikeouts (94).

The heart of the Yankees for 18 seasons, Berra played on 14 pennant winners and 10 World Championship teams-a record number for any individual player in MLB history. He is one of only 10 players in Major League history to win three MVP Awards and was selected to the All-Star team in every season from 1948 through 1962. Incredibly, he led the Yankees in RBI every season from 1949-55, had more career 100 -RBI seasons (five) than Mantle (four), and hit at least 20 homers in 11 different seasons. Known as much for his quotes ("It ain't over 'til it's over" and "I really didn't say everything I said," etc.) as he is for his accomplishments on the field, he remains one of the most beloved players to ever play the game.

Elected to the Baseball Hall of Fame in 1994, Rizzuto was a defensive-minded shortstop who played on 10 pennant winners and eight World Series championship teams from 1941 through 1956, capturing the league's MVP award in 1950 with a .324 batting average and 125 runs scored. Following his playing career, he became a longtime Yankees broadcaster, known for punctuating big moments with his signature phrase, "Holy cow!"

However, not every notable Yankee was a future Hall of Famer. In Game 5 of the 1956 World Series vs. Brooklyn, right-hander Don Larsen authored baseball's greatest pitching performance, retiring all 27 Dodgers batters for the only perfect game in World Series history.

The Yankees opened the 1960s winning pennants in the first five seasons (1960-64) and World Series titles in 1961 and 1962. Incredibly, in the 29 seasons from 1936 to 1964, the Yankees won 22 pennants and 16 World Championships. The 1961 club is still regarded as one of the best teams in baseball history. With Mantle and Roger Maris embroiled in a season-long race to break Ruth's single-season home run record, the Yankees rolled to 109 wins en route to a World Championship. Maris broke Ruth's record when he belted his 61st home run on October 1 off Boston's Tracy Stallard at Yankee Stadium in the last game of the season.

Age finally caught up with the ballclub after a seven-game Series loss to the St. Louis Cardinals in 1964. The Yankees finished above fourth place just once in the next nine seasons, bottoming out in 1966 with the club's first last-place finish since 1912.

The team's fall from grace ended on January 3, 1973, when it was sold by CBS to a group headed by George M. Steinbrenner III. With the addition of Catfish Hunter (baseball's first marquee free agent), shrewd trades that brought Ed Figueroa, Mickey Rivers, Chris Chambliss and Willie Randolph to the club, and a strong nucleus that included Thurman Munson, Graig Nettles, Roy White and Sparky Lyle, the Yankees returned to the postseason in 1976, ending an 11-year drought (1965-1975) by winning their first American League East title. Then on October 14,


Reggie Jackson hit three home runs in Game 6 of the 1977 World Series.

1976, in the deciding Game 5 of the American League Championship Series vs. Kansas City, Chambliss launched a ninth-inning, pennant-winning home run to put the Yankees back in the World Series.

This newfound success took place in a remodeled Yankee Stadium after the club played the 1974 and 1975 seasons in Shea Stadium while vast improvements were made to the original facility (for more details, see "History of Original Yankee Stadium").

After a disheartening four-game sweep by the Cincinnati Reds in the 1976 World Series, the Yankees introduced Reggie Jackson-the most prolific slugger of his era-as the club's newest free-agent acquisition. Jackson capped an exciting 1977 season with one of baseball's greatest individual batting performances. In the World Series-clinching win vs. Los Angeles in Game 6 at Yankee Stadium, "Mr. October" belted three home runs on three swings of the bat to join Babe Ruth (and now Albert Pujols and Pablo Sandoval) as the only players to hit three home runs in a single World Series game.

In 1978, the Yankees overcame a 14.0-game deficit in the American League East to force a one-game playoff with Boston at Fenway Park to decide the division. Shortstop Bucky Dent erased a $2-0$, seventhinning Red Sox lead with a dramatic three-run homer, and the Yankees went on to win, 5-4. The Yankees then defeated Kansas City for the third straight year in the ALCS, and took care of the Dodgers in six games for their first back-to-back World Series titles since 1961-62.

The 1978 season also saw Ron Guidry compile one of the most dominating pitching seasons in baseball history. On the way to earning his nickname of "Louisiana Lightning," Guidry went $25-3$ with a 1.74 ERA, winning the AL Cy Young Award in unanimous fashion and setting franchise records with 248 strikeouts and nine shutouts. On June 17 that season, Guidry set the single-game club record for strikeouts, fanning 18 California Angels at Yankee Stadium in a game that established the Stadium tradition of fans applauding for a strikeout once a Yankees pitcher reaches two strikes. A five-time Gold Glove Award winner and fourtime American League All-Star, Guidry also racked up 20-win seasons in 1983 (21-9) and 1985 (22-6).

Sadly, the 1970s ended with tragedy. Thurman Munson, the 1976 AL MVP and the Yankees' first captain since Gehrig, was killed when the private jet he was piloting crashed on August 2, 1979, at Akron-Canton

Airport in Ohio. Only 32 years old at the time of his death, Munson was the undisputed leader of the Yankees teams that won three consecutive pennants and two World Championships. After the captain's death, the Yankees would make only one World Series appearance (1981) over the 16-year stretch from 1979-95 despite compiling the best record in the Majors during the 1980s.

During this period, Don Mattingly became one of the most popular players in franchise history, batting .307 in a 14 -year career (1982-95) played entirely in pinstripes. He compiled an incredible six-year stretch from 1984 through 1989, in which he batted .327 and topped 100 RBI five times, including a career-high 145 in 1985, when he captured the AL MVP Award. A year earlier, he outdueled teammate Dave Winfield for the 1984 AL batting crown (. 343 to .340 ), going 4 -for- 5 on the final day of the season. Mattingly's performance and loyalty were recognized when he was named Yankees captain from 1991-95.

Winfield, who came to the Yankees as the game's most sought-after free agent in 1981, compiled Hall of Fame credentials in his nine seasons in pinstripes (1981-88, '90). With the Yankees, he belted 205 home runs with 818 RBI and won five Gold Glove Awards.

After a 13-year absence (1982-94), the Yankees returned to postseason play in 1995 as the American League's first-ever "Wild Card" entry. A heart-wrenching five-game loss to the Seattle Mariners in the Division Series marked the start of a 13-year run of postseason appearances (1995-2007) — a record topped only by the Atlanta Braves' 14-season streak (1991-93, 1995-2005).

In 1996 under new skipper Joe Torre, the Yankees returned to the World Series against Atlanta, coming back from an 0-2 deficit to win four straight games, including Games 3, 4 and 5 on the road. Following a Division Series exit in 1997, the Yankees won three straight World titles from 1998 through 2000, giving them four championships in five years. Their 114 regular season victories in 1998 shattered the 44-yearold AL mark of 111 wins set by the 1954 Cleveland Indians (since broken by Seattle in 2001) and their 125 total victories, including 11 postseason wins, remains the highest single-season total in baseball history.

Beginning in the early 90s, the Yankees made a concerted effort to draft and cultivate homegrown talent such as Bernie Williams, Derek Jeter, Andy Pettitte, Jorge Posada and Mariano Rivera. In addition, trades and free-agent acquisitions brought All-Stars such as Wade Boggs, Scott Brosius, David Cone, Jimmy Key and Tino Martinez to the Bronx. Another of those players, Paul O'Neill, acquired in a November 3, 1992, trade with Cincinnati, became adored by Yankees fans
for his intense and gritty approach and was given the nickname＂warrior．＂Winner of the 1994 batting title （．359），he was a key part of the club＇s turn－of－the－ century success．

In 2001，the Yankees fell just shy of becoming the second team in history to win four consecutive World Series titles，but they nevertheless captured the hearts of the nation in the aftermath of the terrorist attacks of September 11．The Yankees dropped the first two games of the Series at the Arizona Diamondbacks＇Bank One Ballpark but rallied to win the next three at Yankee Stadium behind dramatic ninth－inning comebacks in Games 4 and 5．On consecutive nights，Martinez and Brosius erased two－run，ninth－inning Diamondbacks leads with home runs，and the Yankees won both games in extra innings．It was in Game 4 that Jeter earned his＂Mr． November＂nickname with a 10th－inning＂walk－off＂home run．The victories marked the first time in World Series history that a team won two games in the same Series when trailing by at least two runs in the ninth inning．

No one embodies the Yankees＇success since 1996 more than Jeter，who was a rookie on that squad．He played his franchise－record 20th and final season with the Yankees in 2014，retiring with a personal career winning percentage of ． 593 （ $1,628-1,117-2$ ）and five World Series rings．He is sixth in baseball history with 3,465 career hits and tops the Yankees＇all－time list in hits，games played $(2,747)$ ，doubles $(544)$ ，stolen bases $(358)$ ，at－bats $(11,195)$ ， singles $(2,595)$ and hit－by－pitches （170）．Jeter also recorded eight 200 －hit seasons and is one of two players in franchise history along with Gehrig （eight）with as many as four． In fact，according to the Elias Sports Bureau，no other player in Baseball history has had as many as four 200－hit seasons while playing at least 100 games at shortstop per year． Jeter capped his farewell season with a dramatic＂walk－off＂RBI－single in his final career game at Yankee Stadium and another RBI－single in his final career at－bat three days later at Boston＇s Fenway Park．

Posada and Rivera also crafted special places for themselves in the annals of the franchise．Posada，a 24th－round selection in the 1990 First－Year Player Draft，hit at least 20 home runs in eight different seasons．Known for his toughness and durability，the Puerto Rico－ born backstop started at least 120 games in eight consecutive seasons from 2000－07，and retired after the 2011 season having never worn another uniform．

Rivera，who retired at the conclusion of the 2013 season with 652 career saves，became Baseball＇s all－time saves leader in 2011，surpassing Trevor Hoffman（601）． His reputation was cemented by postseason excellence， which included an 8－1 record and 0.70 ERA in 96 career postseason games（ 141.0 innings pitched）and an all－time record 33.1 consecutive scoreless postseason innings．His Major League－leading 42 career postseason saves are
almost as many as the second，third and fourth place totals combined（44）．Additionally，his 2.21 career ERA is the second－lowest all time among pitchers with at least 1，000．0IP since ERA was made an official statistic in 1912 in the NL and 1913 in the AL（Eddie Cicotte－2．20）．

In 2004，the organization acquired Alex Rodriguez in a trade with Texas．After his arrival in the Bronx，the 14－time All－Star transitioned to a new position at third base and was named AL MVP in 2005 and 2007，while becoming the seventh－and youngest－player in Baseball history to reach the 600－home run plateau in 2010.

The original Yankee Stadium took its curtain call in 2008，which was also the first of 10 seasons under manager Joe Girardi．Full of nostalgia and notable events， 2008 featured the third Papal Mass in Stadium history on April 20 and a 15－inning，4－3 American League victory in the All－Star Game on July 15．Though the Yankees played their last－ever home game in the original Stadium on September 21，2008，defeating the Baltimore Orioles， 7－3，the drama of the season didn＇t end until its final day as Mike Mussina earned a win in the first game of a doubleheader over Boston at Fenway Park to become the oldest first－time 20－game winner in Baseball history．

The following season was storybook material as the club finished the inaugural season in the newly－ constructed Yankee Stadium with the best regular season record in the Majors（103－59）and a 2009 World Series win over the Phillies in six games．Free－agent acquisitions CC Sabathia（ 19 wins）and Mark Teixeira （second in AL MVP voting，39HR，122RBI）each played major roles in the club＇s success．

The joy，however，was shortlived as the franchise mourned the losses of Principal Owner George M． Steinbrenner III and longtime public address announcer Bob Sheppard in the summer of 2010.

While the Yankees have been regular participants in the postseason since the mid－90s（having made the playoffs in 20－of－24 seasons from 1995－2018），the organization is committed to complementing player development with shrewd acquisitions to bring a 28th championship to the Bronx．

Going forward，the future of the franchise looks extremely bright as the club looks to build on recent postseason appearances．Manager Aaron Boone won 100 games in his first year at the helm in 2018，and he has a roster infused with young talent，including 2017 AL Rookie of the Year Aaron Judge，Gary Sánchez，Luis Severino，Gleyber Torres and Miguel Andújar，among many others．＊

## History of the Yankees Uniform \& NY Logo

When the Yankees (then "Highlanders") first took the field for their inaugural season in 1903, their uniforms did not resemble the iconic style for which they are known today. A large ornate " N " decorated one breast and a large ornate " $Y$ "the other. Two years later for the 1905 season, the " $N$ " and " $Y$ " were merged side by side into a monogram on the left breast, creating a forerunner of the now legendary emblem.
It wasn't until 1909 that the most recognizable insignia in sports-the interlocking "NY"-made its first appearance on the caps and left sleeves of Highlanders uniforms. It is thought that the design was inspired by a similar one created in 1877 by Tiffany \& Co. for a medal to be given by the New York City Police Department to Officer John McDowell, a policeman shot in the line of duty. Perhaps because one of the club's owners, Bill Devery, was a former New York City police chief, the design was adopted by the organization. The familiar " NY " eventually migrated from the left sleeve to the left breast of home uniforms from 1912-15, albeit in a larger version than is currently worn today.
In 1912, their final season at Hilltop Park, the Yankees (as they were frequently called by then) made a fashionable debut at their April 11 home opener by wearing pinstripes for the first time in their history. The club was not the first team to wear pinstripes (eight of baseball's other 15 teams had already worn them at some point), and they would actually abandon the look in the following two seasons (1913-14). By 1915, though, home pinstripes were back for good.
In 1916, the Yankees removed the "NY" monogram from the jersey and went with a plain, pinstripes-only look. The "NY" remained off the uniform-except for the capfor the next 20 years until it was reinstated in 1936. Babe Ruth, whose Yankees career spanned 1920-34, played his entire Yankees career without ever wearing the club's now-legendary insignia on his jersey.

The Yankees utilized numerous cap designs from 1903 until 1921-including pinstripes in 1915, '16, '19 and '21-until they finally settled on a solid navy cap with the interlocking "NY" insignia in 1922.
The club's road uniforms have remained relatively unchanged since 1918-solid grey with "NEW YORK" in block letters across the chest. The notable exception was from 1927-30, when "NEW YORK" was replaced by "YANKEES." In 1973, with the introduction of more breathable double-knit uniforms, Yankees road jerseys added navy-and-white banded trim to the cuffs of the sleeves as well as white shadowing behind the jersey lettering.

The home uniform remains the Yankees' signature look. With the exception of minor alterations-including bolder pinstripes in the 1940s-it has remained mostly unchanged for more than 70 years. The most-recent tweak to either Yankees uniform set was the switch from glossy to matte road helmets prior to the 2016 season.

In keeping with the team's reverence of tradition, the Yankees have worn "alternate" uniforms just twice in their history. On April 8, 1996, at Detroit, the team wore replica uniforms of the Negro National League's New York Black Yankees, and on April 20, 2012, in Boston (on the 100th anniversary of the first game at Fenway Park), the Yankees wore polyester reproductions of their 1912 ensemble. Additionally, on three occasions, the Yankees have worn their batting practice caps during regular season games (Aug. 9, 2013, and May 12 and 14, 2014).
In recent years, the Yankees have also participated in other MLBwide initiatives relating to various holidays, including camouflage and American-flag inspired elements on Memorial Day and Independence Day, and pink and baby blue elements on Mother's Day (to recognize breast cancer awareness) and Father's Day (for prostate cancer awareness).
Most recently, the Yankees joined all MLB clubs in wearing special "Players Weekend" jerseys in 2017 and 2018. The Yankees' pullover tops were navy with gray sleeves with the Yankees script wordmark across the front. The jersey also included individualized nicknames on the back, marking the only times the Yankees have had last names or nicknames on the backs of their jerseys. *

## Origin of Numbered Uniforms

Numbers first appeared on Major League uniforms on June 26, 1916, when the Cleveland Indians wore large numerals on their left sleeves in an experiment that lasted just a few weeks. Another brief trial by Cleveland the next season and a similar sleeve trial by the St. Louis Cardinals in 1923 both proved temporary. It wasn't until the 1929 season that another attempt was made, as both Cleveland and the Yankees began their seasons with numbers as a permanent part of their respective uniforms. Though the Yankees are typically credited as being the team with the longest-standing such policy, it should be noted that the Indians began their season two days earlier than the Bombers, as the Yankees' April 16 Opening Day contest was rained out.

The initial distribution of numbers to the Yankees roster was made according to the player's respective position in the batting order. Therefore, in 1929, leadoff hitter Earle Combs wore No. 1, Mark Koenig No. 2, Babe Ruth No. 3, Lou Gehrig No. 4, Bob Meusel No. 5, Tony Lazzeri No. 6, Leo Durocher No. 7, Johnny Grabowski No. 8, Benny Bengough No. 9 and Bill Dickey No. 10 (Grabowski, Bengough and Dickey shared the catching duties). By the mid-1930s, other teams adopted the idea, and uniform numbers became standard for all teams. *s

## Top Hat Logo Design

Though not appearing on the uniform, the Yankees "top hat" logo is one of the most identifiable in sports. It was created by well-known, longtime graphic artist Henry Alonzo "Lon" Keller after a commission from then-Yankees co-owner Larry MacPhail. An initial version consisting solely of the Yankees script with a top hat above the " $k$ " first appeared on the cover of the 1946 spring training roster. MacPhail, however, asked Keller to further develop his work. The designer's more elaborate design debuted during the 1946 season and remains largely unchanged to the present day. (Information regarding Keller's contribution was taken from articles in the 1976 Yankees scorecard and the Aug. 22, 1995, edition of Yankees Magazine.) N


## Origin of the Names "Highlanders" and "Yankees"

In the early 1900 s, fans, the media and front office personnel did not see club nicknames as the defining elements they are today. People thought of clubs by the city they represented and the league in which they played. Anything beyond that was the work of clever newspapermen trying to freshen up the references to teams in their stories.

Much of the logo-and nicknameoriented merchandise items we have today, such as caps, T-shirts or jerseys simply didn't exist a century ago when games weren't televised and men uniformly wore jackets and ties to the park.

When the Yankees franchise was launched in New York prior to the 1903 season, the enmity between the upstart American League (about to enter its third season) and the longestablished National League was just beginning to ebb. It was commonplace for clubs and the media to refer to AL teams as "Americans" and NL clubs as "Nationals," especially as half of the cities with Major League Baseball at the time
had teams in both leagues (Boston, Chicago, New York, Philadelphia and St. Louis). This terminology frequently served to differentiate the New York AL team from the two longstanding NL clubs-the Brooklyn Superbas (as the Dodgers were then known) and the New York Giants-with whom they were now battling for fans.

The club's first home in New York was a rickety wooden structure often referred to as "American League Park." It was located on 168th St. and Broadway, one of the highest spots in Manhattan. As a result, the team became known as the "Hilltoppers" and their field "Hilltop Park."
The name "Highlanders," as the team of that era is mostpopularly remembered today, also started in the club's formative years. It originated not only as a nod to their elevated Manhattan perch, but also as a reference to club president Joseph W. Gordon, whose last name conjured up thoughts of the famous Scottish army unit, the Gordon Highlanders.

Other nicknames for the team were the "Greater New Yorks" and "Griffiths," the latter of which was a reference to Clark Griffith, who managed the club from 1903-08.
As early as 1904, however, the name "Yankees" became common in the press. The earliest known use was in an April 7, 1904, article in the New York Evening Journal that bore the headline "YANKEES WILL START HOME FROM SOUTH TODAY," which was published following a successful spring training. A week later, the same newspaper's coverage of Opening Day was headlined "YANKEES BEAT BOSTON," and the term also appeared in the article's lead sentence.
The name "Yankees" likely owes its success to newspaper typesetters and editors grateful for a team nickname with fewer letters than "Highlanders" or "Hilltoppers."

When the franchise moved from Hilltop Park to the low-lying Polo Grounds in 1913, the media and public dropped the other nicknames (which were no longer fitting) in favor of "Yankees."

## Patches \& Armbands on the Yankees Uniform

Over the Yankees' history, temporary patches and armbands have been worn to commemorate special occasions and mourn losses in the Yankees family. The list below represents the most thorough compilation of such additions. Annual alterations such as Major League Baseball's Mothers' Day and Fathers' Day ribbons, or permanent additions such as MLB logo patches on the backs of caps and jerseys are not included in the list below.

## Important Dates in Yankees History

Jan. 9, 1903 - Frank Farrell and Bill Devery purchase the right to establish a new AL franchise in New York City for $\$ 18,000$.
March 12, 1903 - The New York franchise is approved as a member of the American League. The team will play in a hastily constructed, wooden ballpark at 168th Street and Broadway Because the site is one of the highest spots in Manhattan, their home field is referred to as "Hilltop Park."
Apr. 22, 1903 -The Highlanders (as the Yankees were commonly known then) play their first game, a 3-1 loss at Washington.
Apr. 23, 1903 - Pitcher Harry Howell records the first victory in franchise history, a 7-2 win at Washington.
Apr. 30, 1903 - The Highlanders notch a 6-2 win vs. Washington in their inaugural home opener at Hilltop Park.
May 11, 1903 - John Ganzel hits the first home run in franchise history - an inside-the-park homer at Detroit's Bennett Park off George Mullin in an 8-2 Highlanders victory.
Apr. 29, 1906 - At Hilltop Park, the Highlanders and A's raise \$5,600 to benefit victims of the San Francisco earthquake and fire.
Apr. 11, 1912-Pinstripes first appear on Highlanders uniforms.
Apr. 21, 1912 - At the Polo Grounds, the Highlanders and Giants stage a benefit game for survivors of the Titanic. The Giants win, $11-2$, as $\$ 9,425.25$ is raised.
May 3, 1912 - The Highlanders lose at Philadelphia, 18-15. The 33 combined runs tie for the highest total in franchise history (also $5 / 22 / 30-\mathrm{G} 2$ and $6 / 3 / 32$, each in 20-13 Yankees wins at the A's).

Apr. 1913 - The name "Yankees" becomes the predominant nickname of the club after the team moves to the Polo Grounds, home of the National League's New York Giants.
Apr. 5, 1913 - The Yankees play an exhibition game against the Dodgers, losing, 3-2, in the first-ever game at Ebbets Field.
Apr. 17, 1913 - The Yankees play their first home game at the Polo Grounds, losing to Washington, 9-3. It marks the beginning of 10 seasons as tenants of the National League's New York Giants.
Jan. 11, 1915 - Col. Jacob Ruppert and Col. Tillinghast L'Hommedieu Huston agree to purchase the Yankees for $\$ 460,000$. The deal is formally completed on Jan. 30.
Apr. 24, 1917 - Lefthander George Mogridge becomes the first Yankee to throw a no-hitter in a 2-1 win at Fenway Park.
Apr. 3, 1919 - In a spaghetti-eating contest during spring training in Jacksonville, Fla., Yankees outfielder Ping Bodie defeats an ostrich named Percy, after Percy passes out following his 11th plate of pasta (credit: SABR Biography Project).
Jan. 5, 1920 - After being announced two days earlier, the Yankees complete the purchase of the contract of Babe Ruth from the Boston Red Sox for $\$ 100,000$ plus interest and a $\$ 300,000$ loan against the mortgage on Fenway Park.
May 1, 1920 - Babe Ruth hits his first homer as a Yankee in a 6-0 win over the Red Sox at the Polo Grounds.
Feb. 5, 1921 - The Yankees issue a press release announcing the purchase of 10 acres of land in the West Bronx that will eventually become the site of the original Yankee Stadium. The land was purchased from the estate of William Waldorf Astor for $\$ 675,000$.
Oct. 5, 1921 - The Yankees play the first postseason game in franchise history, as Carl Mays tosses a complete game shutout to defeat the Giants at the Polo Grounds in World Series Game 1.

May 5, 1922 - The construction contract for Yankee Stadium is awarded to White Construction Company with the edict that the job is to be completed "at a definite price" of $\$ 2.5$ million by Opening Day 1923

Apr. 18, 1923 - Yankee Stadium hosts its first regular season game as the Yankees defeat Boston Red Sox, 4-1, before an announced crowd of 74,200 . Thousands more fans are turned away when fire marshalls order the gates closed. Babe Ruth hits the Stadium's first home run - a three-run shot in the third inning - and starter Bob Shawkey records a complete-game win.

Apr. 30, 1923 - The Yankees sign 19-year-old Columbia pitcher and position player Lou Gehrig to a professional contract.
May 21, 1923 - Yankees announce that Col. Ruppert buys out Col. Huston for $\$ 1.5$ million to become sole owner of the Yankees.
Sept. 28, 1923 - The Yankees record 30 hits in a 24-4 win over Boston at Fenway Park. The hit total remains the most in a nineinning game in franchise history.
Oct. 15, 1923 - The Yankees defeat the New York Giants, 6-4, at the Polo Grounds in Game 6 of the World Series, clinching the first World Championship in franchise history.
June 1, 1925-Lou Gehrig begins his record streak of 2,130 consecutive games played, pinch-hitting for "Pee Wee" Wanninger in a 5-3 loss to Washington at Yankee Stadium.
Oct. 6, 1926 - Babe Ruth becomes the first player to hit three home runs in a single World Series game in Game 4 at St. Louis.
June 23, 1927 - In an 11-4 Yankees win at Fenway Park, Lou Gehrig become the first (of two) players in franchise history to hit 3HR in a single game against the Red Sox (also see May 8, 2010).
Sept. 30, 1927 - Babe Ruth breaks his own single-season Major League record by hitting his 60th home run (off Tom Zachary) in a 4-2 win over Washington at Yankee Stadium.
Apr. 20, 1928 - Yankee Stadium's LF stands are enlarged to three decks.
Oct. 9, 1928 - In Game 4 of the World Series vs. the Cardinals at St. Louis'Sportsman's Park, Babe Ruth hits three home runs, marking his second three-homer World Series game.
Apr. 18, 1929 - The Yankees wear numbered uniforms for the first time, two days after the Indians permanently adopt them as well (Numbers would become standard for all teams by 1932).
Sept. 24, 1929 - The Yankees celebrate Babe Ruth Day at Fenway Park defeating Boston, 5-3. Ruth goes 2-for-3 with a double, and Tom Zachary (pitching for the Yankees) records his final decision of the season, improving to 12-0, still a Major League record for most wins in a season without a loss.
June 4, 1933 - Starter Johnny Allen allows a first-inning single to Philadelphia's Ed Coleman, then holds the A's hitless the rest of the way, notching a one-hit shutout in a 6-0 home victory in the second game of a doubleheader.


Hilltop Park was home to the Yankees from 1903 through 1912.

July 6, 1933 - In the very first MLB All-Star Game, Babe Ruth hits the game's first HR - a two-run shot off the Cardinals' Bill Hallahan - leading the AL to a 4-2 victory at Comiskey Park. Lefty Gomez starts for the AL, tossing 3.0 scoreless IP to earn the win. He also records the first All-Star RBI with a second-inning single.
June 6, 1934 - Myril Hoag goes 6-for-6 in a 15-3, nine-inning win in Game 1 of a doubleheader at Boston, becoming the first of only two Yankees to go 6-for-6 in a single game (see June 7, 2008- Johnny Damon).
Nov. 21, 1934 - The Yankees purchase Joe DiMaggio from the San Francisco Seals of the Pacific Coast League for $\$ 25,000$ and five players.
May 24, 1936 - The Yankees tally their single-game franchisehigh in runs in a 25-2 win at Philadelphia. Tony Lazzeri is the star with three home runs (including two grand slams) and a triple. His 11 RBI set a still-standing AL single-game record.
Apr. 20, 1937 - The Yankees' 15th season at Yankee Stadium opens with the right-field stands enlarged to three decks. Wooden bleachers are replaced by a concrete structure, and the distance to center field drops from 490 feet to 461 feet.

June 29 - July 17, 1947 - The Yankees reel off a franchise-record 19 consecutive wins, outscoring their opposition 119-41.
Oct. 3, 1947 - Yankees pitcher Bill Bevens loses his no-hitter and the game with two outs in the bottom of the ninth as pinch-hitter Cookie Lavagetto doubles home two runs in a 3-2 Dodgers win in Game 4 of the World Series at Ebbets Field.
June 13, 1948 - Babe Ruth's uniform No. 3 is retired at Yankee Stadium's 25th Anniversary celebration. The visit marks the Babe's final Stadium appearance.
Aug. 16, 1948 - Babe Ruth dies of throat cancer in New York at age 53 .
Oct. 12, 1948 - The Yankees announce that Casey Stengel will replace Bucky Harris as manager.
Oct. 1-2, 1949 - The Yankees come back from a one-game deficit with two games to play, defeating Boston in the final two games of the season at Yankee Stadium, 5-4 and 5-3, respectively, marking the first of five consecutive American League pennants.
Oct. 5, 1949 - In Game 1 of the World Series at Yankee Stadium, Tommy Henrich breaks up a scoreless pitchers' duel between the
May 30, 1938 - A franchiserecord crowd of 81,841 attends a doubleheader sweep of Boston at Yankee Stadium.
June 22, 1938 - In a rematch of their 1936 bout, Joe Louis KOs Max Schmeling in 124 seconds to avenge his prior loss to the German and retain the heavyweight title in front of 70,043 fans at Yankee Stadium and an estimated 70 million people listening on the radio.
Aug. 27, 1938-Monte Pearson authors the first Yankee Stadium no-hitter by a Yankee, defeating Cleveland, 13-0, in Game 2 of a doubleheader.
Jan. 13, 1939 - Col. Ruppert passes away, and his estate takes ownership of the ballclub.
Apr. 30, 1939 - Lou Gehrig plays in the last of his 2,130 consecutive games, going 0-for-4 in a 3-2 loss vs. Washington at the Stadium.
May 2, 1939 - Lou Gehrig's playing streak of 2,130 consecutive games ends when he does not make an appearance in a 22-2 Yankees win at Detroit. Babe Dahlgren plays first base for the Yankees and contributes a double and a home run.
June 26, 1939 - At Philadelphia's Shibe Park, the Yankees play their first-ever night game, losing to the Athletics, 3-2.
July 4, 1939 - "Lou Gehrig Appreciation Day" is held at Yankee Stadium in between games of a doubleheader vs. Washington. Gehrig makes his famous "luckiest man on the face of the earth" speech.
May 15, 1941 - Joe DiMaggio's 56-game hitting streak begins with a single off Edgar Smith in a 13-1 loss vs. Chicago.
June 2, 1941 - Lou Gehrig dies of amyotrophic lateral sclerosis at the age of 37 in the Riverdale section of the Bronx.
July 2, 1941 - In an 8-4 win vs. Boston, Joe DiMaggio goes 1-for5 with a three-run home run, extending his hitting streak to 45 games and surpassing Wee Willie Keeler's single-season Major League record 44-game streak set in 1897.

July 17, 1941 - Joe DiMaggio's consecutive-game hitting streak ends at 56 when he goes 0 -for- 3 in a 4-3 win at Cleveland. Indians 3B Ken Keltner twice robs DiMaggio with great fielding plays. DiMaggio hits safely in his next 16 games, giving him hits in 72 of 73 games.
Aug. 14, 1942 - The Yankees set a still-standing MLB fielding mark with 7DP in an 11-2 win at Philadelphia (since tied three times).

June 26, 1944-The Yankees, Dodgers and Giants play a three-way exhibition game at the Polo Grounds to promote the purchase of war bonds. Each team batted six times and played the field six times while a crowd of 50,000 fans bought $\$ 5.5$ million in war bonds. Brooklyn wins by a score of 5 to 1 (Yankees) to 0 (Giants).
Jan. 25, 1945 - Dan Topping, Del Webb and Larry MacPhail purchase the Yankees for $\$ 2.8$ million from the estate of the late Col. Jacob Ruppert. MacPhail replaces Ed Barrow as President and General Manager.
May 28, 1946 -The first night game is played at Yankee Stadium, a 2-1 loss vs. Washington before 49,917 fans.
Apr. 27, 1947 - "Babe Ruth Day" is celebrated at Yankee Stadium and throughout Major League Baseball. the Dodgers' Reynolds and the Dodgers' Don Newcombe, hitting a game-winning solo HR in the bottom of the ninth.
Apr. 17, 1951 - Mickey Mantle makes his Major League debut, going 1 -for-4 in a 5-0 win vs. Boston at Yankee Stadium. The game also marks Bob Sheppard's first as Yankees public-address announcer. Boston's Dom DiMaggio is the first hitter announced.
Sept. 28, 1951 - In an 8-0 Game 1 win in a doubleheader vs. Boston at Yankee Stadium, Allie Reynolds becomes the second of five players in Baseball history to toss two no-hitters in the same season (also Johnny Vander Meer in 1938, Virgil Trucks in 1952, Nolan Ryan in 1973 and Max Scherzer on 2015). Reynolds had previously no-hit the Indians at Cleveland's Municipal Stadium on July 12 in a 1-0 win.
Dec. 11, 1951 - Joe DiMaggio officially announces his retirement.
Oct. 7, 1952 - Second baseman Billy Martin makes a running catch on a two-out, seventh-inning, based-loaded pop-up off the bat of Jackie Robinson to preserve the Yankees'lead in a 4-2 World Seriesclinching Game 7 win at Brooklyn's Ebbets Field.
Apr. 17, 1953 - Mickey Mantle clears the LF wall at Washington's Griffith Stadium with a 565 -foot home run off Chuck Stobbs in the fifth inning of a 7-3 Yankees win. Yankees PR representative Red Patterson retrieves the ball and reportedly measures off the distance, giving birth to the phrase"tape-measure home run."
Oct. 5, 1953 - Billy Martin singles home the winning run in the ninth inning of a 4-3, Game 6 victory over the Brooklyn Dodgers at Yankee Stadium. The win clinches the Yankees' all-time record fifth-consecutive World Championship.
Apr. 14, 1955 - Elston Howard becomes the first black player in Yankees history, making his Major League debut in an 8-4 loss at Boston. He records an RBI single in his only plate appearance.
Oct. 4, 1955 - Brooklyn's Johnny Podres outduels Yankees starter Tommy Byrne and two relievers, 2-0, clinching the Dodgers' first World Championship. The World Series loss snaps the Yankees' string of seven consecutive appearances in the Fall Classic without losing a Series (1943, '47, '49-53). It also marks the Yankees' first World Series loss to Brooklyn after wins in


Elston Howard became the Yankees' first African-American player on Apr. 14, 1955.

May 30, 1956 - Batting against Pedro Ramos in Game 1 of a doubleheader vs. Washington, Mickey Mantle nearly hits a home run out of Yankee Stadium, with the ball striking the upper deck frieze in right field.

Oct．8， 1956 －Don Larsen hurls the only perfect game in World Series history，a 2－0，Game 5 win over Brooklyn at Yankee Stadium．
Oct．10， 1956 －In World Series Game 7，Johnny Kucks pitches a 9－0 complete game shutout over Brooklyn at Ebbets Field．
June 15， 1957 －Following the＂Copacabana incident＂，the Yankees trade Billy Martin to Kansas City with Woodie Held，Bob Martyn and Ralph Terry for Ryne Duren，Jim Pisoni and Harry Simpson．
Apr．22，1959－Whitey Ford pitches a 1－0，14－inning complete game shutout at Washington，allowing seven hits with 15 strikeouts．
May 7， 1959 －The Yankees and Dodgers play an exhibition game before 93,103 fans at the L．A．Coliseum．The game is played to honor paralyzed Dodgers catcher Roy Campanella．
Oct．8， 1960 －Second baseman Bobby Richardson sets an all－ time World Series record（since tied by Hideki Matsui on 11／4／09 vs．Philadelphia，Albert Pujols on 10／22／11 w／St．Louis at Texas and Addison Russell on 11／1／16 w／Chicago－NL at Cleveland） with 6RBI in Game 3 of the World Series vs．Pittsburgh，hitting a grand slam in the first inning and two－run single in the fourth inning of a 10－0 Yankees win．
Sept．26， 1961 －Roger Maris hits his 60th home run of the season off Baltimore＇s Jack Fisher in a 3－2 Yankees win at Yankee Stadium， tying Babe Ruth＇s Major League record．
Oct．1， 1961 －Roger Maris hits his 61st home run in the season＇s final game off Boston＇s Tracy Stallard at Yankee Stadium， establishing a then－Major League record and still－standing AL record．It was the only run in a 1－0 Yankees victory．The ball was caught in right field by local teenager Sal Durante．
June 24， 1962 －Jack Reed＇s two－run，22nd－inning home run ends the longest game in Yankees history，a 9－7 win at Detroit．
Oct．16，1962－In Game 7 of the World Series，superb fielding from RF Roger Maris holds Matty Alou at third base after a two－out， ninth－inning Willie Mays double．Bobby Richardson then snares a screaming line drive off the bat of Willie McCovey for the game＇s final out，securing a 1－0，Series－clinching victory over the Giants at Candlestick Park．New York scores the game＇s only run when Tony Kubek grounds into a fifth－inning double play．It would be the last championship for the Yankees until 1977.
May 22， 1963 －In an 8－7，11－inning win vs．the Kansas City A＇s， Mickey Mantle hits the upper deck frieze in right field for the second time in his career，this time off righthander Bill Fischer．
June 20， 1963 －The Yankees lose to the Mets at Yankee Stadium， $6-2$ ，in the first－ever Mayor＇s Trophy game．
Nov．2，1964－CBS purchases 80 percent of the Yankees for $\$ 11.2$ million．The network later buys the remaining 20 percent．
May 14， 1967 －Mickey Mantle becomes only the sixth player－ and second Yankee－to reach the 500 home run plateau，when he connects off Baltimore＇s Stu Miller in a 6－5 win at Yankee Stadium．
Aug．23， 1968 －The Yankees play the longest tied game in franchise history，matching Detroit，3－3，in Game 2 of a doubleheader at Yankee Stadium．Yankees pitcher Lindy McDaniel tosses seven perfect innings in relief in the 19－inning affair．
June 8， 1969 －＂Mickey Mantle Day＂is celebrated at Yankee Stadium and his uniform No． 7 is retired．
June 24，1970－Bobby Murcer hits HRs in four consecutive ABs over two games of a doubleheader vs．Cleveland at Yankee Stadium．
Aug．8， 1972 －The Yankees sign a 30 －year lease to play in a remodeled Yankee Stadium with completion scheduled for 1976.
Jan．3， 1973 －A limited partnership，headed by George M． Steinbrenner III as its managing general partner，purchases the Yankees for a net price of $\$ 8.7$ million from CBS．
Apr．6， 1973 －At Fenway Park in Boston，the Yankees＇Ron Blomberg becomes MLB＇s first designated hitter．Batting in the top of the first inning，he walks with the bases loaded off Luis Tiant．He goes 1 －for－ 3 with 1 RBI as the Yankees lose to the Red Sox，15－5．
Sept．30， 1973 －The Yankees play their final game in Yankee Stadium before gets remodeled，losing 8 －5 vs．Detroit．Tigers pitcher John Hiller gets Yankees first baseman Mike Hegan to fly out to centerfield for the game＇s final out．
Apr．6， 1974 －The Yankees begin the first of two seasons at Shea Stadium as Yankee Stadium is remodeled．The Yankees will go 90－69 at Shea over the two seasons（1974－75）．
Dec．31， 1974 －Free agent Catfish Hunter signs a then－record five－year contract with the Yankees．
Aug．1， 1975 －Billy Martin replaces Bill Virdon for his first of five stints as manager．

Apr．15， 1976 －Remodeled Yankee Stadium opens with an 11－4 win over Minnesota．The Twins＇Dan Ford hits the first home run．
Apr．17，1976－In a 10－0 win，catcher Thurman Munson homers off the Minnesota Twins＇Jim Hughes，marking the first home run hit by a Yankee in remodeled Yankee Stadium．
Oct．14， 1976 －Chris Chambliss＇ninth－inning home run off Mark Littell in Game 5 of the ALCS vs．Kansas City at Yankee Stadium gives the Yankees their 30th AL pennant and first trip to the World Series since 1964.
Nov．29， 1976 －Free agent Reggie Jackson signs a five－year contract．
June 30， 1977 －The Yankees set a franchise record（since tied on $6 / 21 / 05$ vs．Tampa Bay and $10 / 1 / 12$ vs．Boston）with four home runs in a single inning in an 11－5 win at Toronto．Cliff Johnson hits three homers in the game，including two of the Yankees＇four in the eighth inning．
Oct．9， 1977 －The Yankees rally for one run in the eighth and three runs in the ninth for a 5－3，series－ clinching win in the decisive Game 5 of the 1977 ALCS at Kansas City．Sparky Lyle earns the win for the second consecutive night，finishing the game with 1.1 scoreless innings on no rest following his scoreless 5．1－inning relief appearance at Kauffman Stadium in Game 4.
Oct．18， 1977 －Reggie Jackson hits three home runs（on three consecutive pitches）in Game 6 of the World Series vs．the Los Angeles Dodgers at Yankee Stadium．Jackson，Babe Ruth， Albert Pujols and Pablo Sandoval are the only players to hit at least three homers in a single World Series game．


Apr．13， 1978 －The Yankees defeat the White Sox，4－2，in the Yankee Stadium opener on＂Reggie！＂Candy Bar Day．When Jackson slugs a three－run HR in the first inning，the field is showered with the chocolate and peanut candy bars，which were given out free to fans at the game．
June 17， 1978 －Ron Guidry establishes a franchise record by striking out 18 batters in the Yankees＇ $4-0$ win vs．California．
July 24， 1978 －Billy Martin resigns as manager．
July 25， 1978 －Bob Lemon is named manager，replacing Billy Martin．
July 29， 1978 －On Old－Timers＇Day，the Yankees announce that Billy Martin will return as Yankees manager in 1980 and Bob Lemon will become general manager（also see June 18，1979）．
Oct．2， 1978 －The Yankees， 14.0 games behind Boston as late as July 19，defeat the Red Sox，5－4，at Fenway Park in only the second one－ game playoff in AL history．Bucky Dent＇s three－run，seventh－inning home run becomes one of the most memorable in Baseball history．
June 18， 1979 －Billy Martin is rehired as Yankees manager， replacing Bob Lemon．
Aug．2， 1979 －Yankees Captain Thurman Munson dies in a plane crash in Canton，Ohio，at age 32 ．His No． 15 is immediately retired．
Aug．6， 1979 －After delivering a eulogy at Thurman Munson＇s funeral earlier that morning in Canton，Ohio，Bobby Murcer hits a three－run seventh inning homer and a two－run ninth－inning single， accounting for all five of the Yankees＇runs in an emotional 5－4 comeback win vs．Baltimore at Yankee Stadium．
Oct．28， 1979 －Dick Howser replaces Billy Martin as manager．
Dec．15， 1980 －Free agent Dave Winfield signs a then－record 10－year contract．
Nov．21， 1980 －Gene Michael replaces Dick Howser as manager．
May 4， 1981 －Yankees reliever Ron Davis enters in the bottom of the seventh of a 4－2 Yankees win at California．After getting Don Baylor to pop out，he strikes out eight consecutive Angels to record the save．The performance ties the AL record for consecutive strikeouts in a single game， previously set by Nolan Ryan（twice）and later tied by Roger Clemens and Blake Stein．Davis remains the all－time MLB leader in consecutive strikeouts in a relief appearance．
Sept．6， 1981 －Bob Lemon is named manager for a second time，replacing Gene Michael．

Apr. 26, 1982 - Gene Michael becomes manager for a second time, replacing Bob Lemon.
Aug. 3, 1982 - Clyde King replaces Gene Michael as manager.
Jan. 11, 1983 - Billy Martin is named Yankees manager for the third time, replacing Clyde King.
July 4, 1983-Dave Righetti pitches the sixth regular season no-hitter in franchise history and the first since 1951 in a 4-0 win vs. Boston at Yankee Stadium. Righetti strikes out Wade Boggs for the final out.
July 24, 1983 - The Yankees and Kansas City play the infamous "Pine Tar" game at Yankee Stadium. George Brett hits a two-out, ninth-inning home run off Goose Gossage to give the Royals an apparent 5-4 lead. Manager Billy Martin points out that the pine tar on Brett's bat is above the allowable 18 inches and Brett is subsequently called out for using an illegal bat. The Yankees (temporarily) win 4-3 (see Aug. 18, 1983).
Aug. 18, 1983 - Kansas City's protest is upheld and play is resumed at Yankee Stadium from the point immediately after Brett's home run.
 Yankees pitcher Ron Guidry plays CF while lefthanded first baseman Don Mattingly plays second base. Royals' reliever Dan Quisenberry retires the Yankees in order in the bottom of the ninth for a 5-4 Royals win.
Dec. 16, 1983 - Yogi Berra is named manager for the second time, replacing Billy Martin.
Apr. 8, 1985 - At 46 yrs., 7 days old, Phil Niekro becomes the oldest Opening Day starter in Yankees franchise history (and third-oldest all time), allowing 5ER in 4.01P while picking up the loss in a 9-2 Yankees defeat at Boston.
Apr. 28, 1985 - Billy Martin is named manager for a fourth time, replacing Yogi Berra.
Aug. 4, 1985-The Yankees celebrate"Phil Rizzuto Day" at Yankee Stadium, dedicating a plaque in his honor and retiring his No. 10. The Yankees lose their scheduled game to the Chicago White Sox, 4-1, as Tom Seaver wins his 300th career game.
Oct. 6, 1985 - Phil Niekro tosses a four-hit complete game shutout in an 8-0 victory at Toronto's Exhibition Stadium for his 300th career win.
Oct. 17, 1985 - Lou Piniella is named manager for the first time, replacing Billy Martin.
June 29, 1987 - At Toronto's Exhibition Stadium, the Yankees defeat the Blue Jays, 15-14, behind a pair of grand slams from Don Mattingly and Dave Winfield.
July 18, 1987 - Don Mattingly homers off Texas' Jose Guzman to tie Dale Long's Major League record of hitting a home run in eight consecutive games (Mattingly hits 10 HR during the streak).
Sept. 29, 1987 - Don Mattingly hits a grand slam off Boston's Bruce Hurst, setting a Major League record (tied by Travis Hafner in 2008) with six grand slams in a season.
Oct. 19, 1987 - Billy Martin is named manager for the fifth time, replacing Lou Piniella.
June 23, 1988 - Lou Piniella is named manager for the second time as Billy Martin is replaced as Yankees manager for the fifth and final time.
July 27, 1988 - Tommy John commits three errors on one play during the fourth inning of a 16-3 Yankees victory vs. Milwaukee. John becomes the first pitcher in the Modern Era to commit three miscues in the same inning.
Oct. 7, 1988 - Dallas Green is named manager, replacing Lou Piniella.
Dec. 9, 1988 - The Yankees sign a 12 -year television contract with the Madison Square Garden Network.
Aug. 18, 1989 - Bucky Dent is named manager, replacing Dallas Green.
Dec. 25, 1989 - Billy Martin dies in an automobile accident near Binghamton, N.Y., at age 61.
June 6, 1990 - Stump Merrill is named manager, replacing Bucky Dent.
July 1, 1990 - With a no-hitter intact with two out in the bottom of the eighth at Comiskey Park, the Yankees make three errors behind starter Andy Hawkins, leading to four unearned runs as the Yankees go on to lose, 4-0. While initially ruled a "no-hitter," MLB removes the designation in 1991 after redefining a "nohitter" as requiring a pitcher(s) to complete at least 9.0IP.

Oct. 29, 1991 - Buck Showalter replaces Stump Merrill as manager.
Sept. 4, 1993 - Jim Abbott tosses a no-hitter in a $4-0$ win vs. Cleveland at Yankee Stadium.
Aug. 13, 1995-Mickey Mantle dies of cancer at age 63 in Dallas, Tex.
Sept. 6, 1995 - Lou Gehrig's record of 2,130 consecutive games played is broken when Baltimore's Cal Ripken, Jr. plays in his 2,131st.
Oct. 4, 1995 - The Yankees play the longest postseason game in their history, a 15-inning, 7-5 win over Seattle at Yankee Stadium won on a two-run homer by Jim Leyritz. The contest was the final Yankee Stadium game for Don Mattingly.
Nov. 2, 1995 - Joe Torre is named the Yankees' 31st manager, replacing Buck Showalter.
Mar. 1, 1996 - The Yankees defeat the Cleveland Indians, 5-2, in the first ever game at Legends Field (renamed George M. Steinbrenner Field in 2008), the club's new spring training home.
Apr. 9, 1996 - The Yankees defeat the Kansas City Royals, 7-3, in a snowy Bronx home opener. Starter Andy Pettitte earns the win as newcomers Joe Girardi (replacing Mike Stanley) and Tino Martinez (replacing Don Mattingly) get booed during pregame introductions. Hitting in the ninth spot, rookie shortstop Derek Jeter goes 1 -for- 3 with a single.
May 1, 1996-Outfielder Gerald Williams goes 6-for-8 with 1HR and 3RBI in a 15-inning, 11-6 win at Baltimore. With Myril Hoag (6/6/1934 at Boston) and Johnny Damon (6/7/2008 vs. Kansas City), he is one of three Yankees in franchise history with six hits in a single game.
May 14, 1996 - Dwight Gooden hurls the eighth regular season no-hitter in Yankees history, a 2-0 blanking of the Seattle Mariners at Yankee Stadium.
June 16, 1996 - Mel Allen, the legendary "Voice of the Yankees" from 1939-64, passes away at age 83.
Aug. 25, 1996 - A monument in honor of Mickey Mantle is unveiled in Yankee Stadium's Monument Park.
Oct. 23, 1996-In Game 4 of the World Series at Atlanta, Jim Leyritz hits a three-run, eighth-inning homer off the Braves'Mark Wohlers, tying the game, 6-6. The Yankees go on to win, 8-6, in 10 innings.
Oct 24, 1996 - The Yankees' Andy Pettitte (8.1IP) outduels Atlanta's John Smoltz (8.0IP), 1-0, in Game 5 in Atlanta.
Oct. 26, 1996 - In Game 6 of the World Series at Yankee Stadium, John Wetteland closes out a 3-2 win vs. Atlanta, giving the Yankees their first World Championship in 18 years.
June 23, 1997 - With 16 K in a 5-2 Yankees win at Detroit, David Cone establishes the Yankees' all-time single-game high for an RHP (since tied by Michael Pineda in 2015).
May 17, 1998 - David Wells tosses the first regular-season perfect game by a Yankee (and 14th in Baseball history), defeating Minnesota 4-0 at Yankee Stadium.
Sept. 25, 1998 - The Yankees set a then-American League record with their 112th win of the season (a 6-1 win vs. Tampa Bay at Yankee Stadium), breaking the mark of 111 by the 1954 Indians.
Sept. 27, 1998 - The Yankees finish their regular season with a 114-48 (.704) mark, becoming the first team since the 1954 Indians (111-43, .721) with a winning percentage above 700 .
Oct. 21, 1998 - The Yankees complete an incredible season with a four-game World Series sweep of the San Diego Padres to capture the franchise's 24th World Championship. The 3-0 win gives the club a $125-50$ record over the entire season (114-48 in the regular season, 11-2 in postseason).
Mar. 8, 1999 - Joe DiMaggio dies at age 84 in Hollywood, Fla.
Apr. 25, 1999 - A monument in honor of Joe DiMaggio is unveiled in Yankee Stadium's Monument Park in front of a sold out Stadium and many of DiMaggio's former teammates. Paul Simon sings "Mrs. Robinson" while standing in center field.
July 18, 1999 - On "Yogi Berra Day," David Cone tosses the 15th regular season perfect game in Baseball history, one season after David Wells accomplishes the feat. Coincidentally, Don Larsen who tossed a perfect game in the 1956 World Series - throws out the ceremonial first pitch.
Oct. 27, 1999 - The Yankees play Baseball's last game of the century and complete a four-game sweep of the Atlanta Braves, capturing their 25th World Championship.

Apr．23，2000－In a 10－7 Yankees win at Toronto，Jorge Posada and Bernie Williams become the first pair of teammates in MLB history to each homer from both sides of the plate in the same game．
July 8， 2000 －The Yankees and Mets play the first two－ stadium，split doubleheader in nearly 100 years with the Yankees sweeping both games by the score of 4－2．Game 1 took place at Shea Stadium followed by Game 2 that night at Yankee Stadium．It marked the first day－night doubleheader to take place in different venues since the New York Giants and Brooklyn Superbas faced off on 9／7／1903．
Oct．21， 2000 －The Yankees＇World Series Game 1 win vs．the Mets at Yankee Stadium marks their 13th consecutive victory in World Series play，breaking the 12－game record－streak of the 1927， 1928 and 1932 Yankees．

Oct．26， 2000 －The Yankees win World Series Game 5 over the Mets at Shea Stadium，clinching their third consecutive World Championship in the first＂Subway Series＂since 1956．It marks the first time a club has won three consecutive World Series titles since the 1972－74 Oakland Athletics．

Sept．2， 2001 －Mike Mussina comes within one out of a perfect game at Fenway Park，before Carl Everett singles with two outs in the ninth．
Sept．23， 2001 －Yankee Stadium hosts＂A Prayer for America＂ service for those lost on September 11．It was the first large－ scale，formally staged program offered in memory of those killed or missing and presumed dead in World Trade Center attacks．

Oct．13， 2001 －With a 1－0 lead and two out in the bottom of the seventh of Game 3 of the ALDS in Oakland，Derek Jeter picks up Shane Spencer＇s errant throw from the outfield and＂flips＂the ball in a backhand motion to Jorge Posada，who tags Jeremy Giambi for the final out of the inning．The Yankees go on to win the game， $1-0$ ，and the series 3 games to 2 ．The play will be known as the＂Flip Play．＂
Oct．30， 2001 －President George W．Bush throws out the first pitch prior to the Yankees＇2－1 World Series Game 3 win vs． Arizona at Yankee Stadium．

Oct．31， 2001 －In Game 4 of the World Series vs．Arizona at Yankee Stadium，Tino Martinez＇s two－out，bottom－of－the ninth， two－run home run off Byung－Hyun Kim sends the game into extra innings．Shortly after the stroke of midnight，Derek Jeter wins the game with a＂walk－off＂solo home run in the 10th， earning him the nickname＂Mr．November．＂

Nov．1， 2001 －In the late innings of Game 5 of the World Series vs．Arizona at Yankee Stadium，fans serenade Paul O＇Neill，who is playing in his last game at Yankee Stadium． Scott Brosius＇two－out，bottom－of－the ninth，two－run home run off Byung－Hyun Kim sends the game into extra innings， and Alfonso Soriano singles in the winning run in the 12th．
May 17， 2002 －Jason Giambi becomes only the 21st player－ and second Yankee－to hit a＂walk－off＂grand slam with his team trailing by three runs（Babe Ruth did it on $9 / 24 / 25$ ）．His 14th－inning slam off Minnesota＇s Mike Trombley erases a 12－9 Twins lead，giving the Yankees a 13－12 win．

Apr．8， 2003 －Hideki Matsui hits a grand slam in his Yankee Stadium debut，leading the Yankees to a 7－3 win over Minnesota．
June 3， 2003 －Derek Jeter is named team captain．
June 13，2003－In a 5－2 win vs．St．Louis at Yankee Stadium，Roger Clemens records his 300th career win and 4，000th strikeout．
Oct．16， 2003 －In Game 7 of the ALCS vs．Boston at Yankee Stadium， Aaron Boone becomes the fifth player－and second Yankee（also Chris Chambliss， 1976 ALCS vs．Kansas City）－to end a postseason series with a＂walk－off＂HR，when his 11th－inning leadoff solo shot off Tim Wakefield clinches the Yankees＇ 39 th pennant．
Mar．30－31，2004－The Yankees play their first－ever regular season games outside of North America，splitting a pair against Tampa Bay at the Tokyo Dome，losing 8－3 and winning 12－1，respectively．
July 1， 2004 －Derek Jeter makes his most famous catch，diving into Yankee Stadium＇s third base stands to nab a 12th－inning popup off the bat of Boston＇s Trot Nixon．John Flaherty wins the game with a 13th－inning RBI single．
Apr．26， 2005 －Alex Rodriguez hits three home runs（all off Bartolo Colon）and becomes just the second Yankee in franchise history to record at least 10 RBI in a game（also Tony Lazzeri， 11 on $5 / 24 / 36$ ）in a $12-4$ win vs．the Angels at Yankee Stadium．
June 15， 2005 －The Yankees announce plans for a new Yankee Stadium to be constructed in Macombs Dam and John Mullaly Parks，located on the north side of 161st Street（adjacent to the site of the original Stadium）．
Apr．29， 2006 －For the second time in franchise history，the Yankees score in each inning of a game during a $17-6$ win vs． Toronto（also 7／26／39 vs．St．Louis）．

May 11， 2006 －Hideki Matsui is removed from the game in the top of the first vs．Boston after fracturing his left wrist．According to Rule 10.24 （c），his 1，768 consecutive－games－played streak（1，250 with the Yomiuri Giants and 518 with the Yankees）comes to an end as he did not play one half－inning in the field or complete a time at－bat by reaching base or making an out．His streak as a Yankee is the longest since Lou Gehrig＇s（ 2,130 games）．
May 16， 2006 －The Yankees tie a franchise record by overcoming a nine－run deficit vs．Texas to win，14－13，in nine innings．Jorge Posada hits a two－run＂walk－off＂home run off Akinori Otsuka．
Aug．16， 2006 －The Yankees break ground for a new Yankee Stadium，scheduled to be ready for Opening Day 2009.

Aug．4， 2007 －In a $16-8$ win vs．Kansas City，Alex Rodriguez becomes the 22nd and youngest（ $32 \mathrm{y}, 8 \mathrm{~d}$ ）player in MLB history to reach the $500-\mathrm{HR}$ mark．He is the third player to hit his 500th career homer as a Yankee，joining Babe Ruth and Mickey Mantle．
Sept．5， 2007 －Bob Sheppard works his final game as Yankees Public Address Announcer，a 3－2 win over Seattle．
Oct．30， 2007 －Joe Girardi is named the 32nd manager in Yankees franchise history．
Mar．18， 2008 －The Yankees visited Blacksburg，Va．，to play an exhibition game vs．Virginia Tech to honor the victims and aid in the healing process following the tragic events on the college＇s campus on Apr．16，2007．Prior to the game at English Field， Yankees players and staff visited the campus＇memorial site．
March 27， 2008 －Prior to the Yankees＇final home spring training game，Legends Field is renamed George M．Steinbrenner Field．
June 7， 2008 －Johnny Damon goes 6－for－6 in the Yankees＇12－11 win vs．Kansas City，matching the franchise record for hits in a nine－inning game（see June 6， 1934 －Myril Hoag）and becoming the only Yankee in original Yankee Stadium history to record six hits in a game of any length．His final hit is a＂walk－off＂single．
Sept．16， 2008 －Derek Jeter singles off Chicago＇s Gavin Floyd in the first inning for his 1，270th career hit at Yankee Stadium， surpassing Lou Gehrig for the most all－time hits at the ballpark．
Sept．21， 2008 －The Yankees play their last ever game in the original Yankee Stadium．Julia Ruth Stevens，daughter of Babe Ruth，throws out the first pitch，and Jose Molina hits the park＇s final home run in the fourth inning．Following the Yankees＇ $7-3$ win over Baltimore，Derek Jeter thanks the fans over the Stadium PA system．
Sept．28， 2008 －On the season＇s final day at Boston＇s Fenway Park，Mike Mussina records his 20th win of the year，becoming the oldest pitcher in MLB history to win 20 games for the first time．
Nov．8， 2008 －Local Bronx high school youth groups are joined by former players Scott Brosius，David Cone， Jeff Nelson and Paul O＇Neill and Yankees General Partner Jennifer Steinbrenner Swindal in removing home plate，the pitcher＇s rubber and pails of dirt from the original Stadium，then installing them in the current Stadium．
Apr．3－4， 2009 －The Yankees play their first exhibition games in Yankee Stadium，defeating the Cubs， $7-4$ and $10-1$ ， Mike Mussina［R］smiles with Wang tosses the first pitch Johnny Damon on Sept．28，2008， in the Apr． 3 contest．
 after becoming the oldest pitcher to win $\mathbf{2 0}$ games for the first time．

Apr. 16, 2009 - The Yankees play the first regular season game in Yankee Stadium history, falling to Cleveland, 10-2. CC Sabathia tosses the Stadium's first official pitch, Johnny Damon records the first hit (first-inning single off Cliff Lee) and Jorge Posada hits the first HR (fifth-inning off Lee).
May 14 - June 1, 2009 - The Yankees set an all-time MLB mark with 18 consecutive errorless games (safely handling 660 chances).
Sept. 11, 2009 -Derek Jeter breaks Lou Gehrig's all-time franchise mark of 2,721 hits with a single off Baltimore's Chris Tillman at Yankee Stadium. Gehrig had held the mark since 9/6/37.

Oct. 4, 2009 - Alex Rodriguez hits a three-run HR and a grand slam in the sixth inning of the season finale at Tampa Bay in a 10-2 Yankees win, setting an all-time AL mark with 7RBI in an inning.
Nov. 4, 2009 - The Yankees win their 27th World Series, defeating Philadelphia in Game 6, 7-3. Hideki Matsui ties Bobby Richardson's World Series mark ( 1960 Game 3 vs. Pittsburgh) with 6RBI (since tied by Albert Pujols in 2011 and Addison Russell in 2016). Andy Pettitte records the win, becoming the first pitcher to start and record the win in the clinching game in all three rounds of a single postseason. Manager Joe Girardi joins Billy Martin and Ralph Houk as the only Yankees to win aWorld Series with the club as a player and manager.

June 12-13, 2010 - Jorge Posada becomes the first Yankee since Bill Dickey (June 3, G2 - June 4, 1937) to hit grand slams in back-to-back games. He accomplishes the feat in 9-3 and 9-5 wins vs. Houston.
July 11 and 13, 2010 - Longtime Yankees P.A. announcer Bob Sheppard passes away at his home in Baldwin, Long Island, at age 99 and Yankees Principal Owner George M. Steinbrenner III passes away in Tampa, Fla. at age 80

Aug. 4, 2010 - Alex Rodriguez becomes the seventh (and youngest) player in MLB history to hit his 600th HR, accomplishing the feat at 35 years, 8 days old in a 5-1 win vs. Toronto.
Sept. 20, 2010 - The Yankees dedicate a monument to Principal Owner George M. Steinbrenner III in Monument Park.
July 9, 2011 - Derek Jeter becomes the 28th player all time to record 3,000 hits, accomplishing the feat with a third-inning solo home run off David Price in a 5-4 win vs. Tampa Bay. He goes 5 -for5 on the day, matching his personal career high in hits.
July 30, 2011 - In Game 2 of a doubleheader vs. Baltimore, the Yankees score 12 first-inning runs in a $17-3$ win, sending 16 men to the plate with 13 reaching base (seven singles, two doubles, 1HR, $2 B B$ and 1 E ). All nine batters had at least 1 H and 1 R . The club sets a franchise record for most runs scored in the first inning in any game.
Aug. 25, 2011 - In a 22-9 win vs. Oakland, Robinson Cano, Russell Martin and Curtis Granderson each hit grand slams. The Yankees become the first MLB team to hit three grand slams in a single game.
Sept. 19, 2011 - Mariano Rivera records his 602nd career save, closing out a 6-4 win vs. Minnesota at Yankee Stadium to surpass Trevor Hoffman and become the all-time Major League leader.
Oct. 3, 2012 - With a 4HR performance in the season finale vs. Boston, the Yanks set a single-season franchise record with 245 HR .

Aug. 13-14, 2013 - Alfonso Soriano records 2HR and 6RBI then 2 HR and 7RBI in consecutive games vs. Los Angeles-AL. He becomes just the third player all time since RBls became official statistic in 1920 to record at least 6RBI in consecutive games.
Sept. 22 and 26, 2013 - The Yankees celebrate the career of Mariano Rivera with a 50-minute pregame ceremony, including the unveiling of his No. 42 in Monument Park and a live performance of "Enter Sandman" by Metallica. Four days later at Yankee Stadium, Rivera makes his final career appearance. He is removed from the game by longtime teammates Derek Jeter and Andy Pettitte, who come out of the dugout to make the pitching change.
Aug. 23, 2014 - The Yankees retire Joe Torre's No. 6.
Sept. 7, 2014 - The Yankees hold "Derek Jeter Day" in front of a sellout crowd of 48,110.
Sept. 21, 2014 - Brett Gardner hits the 15,000th home run in franchise history in a 5-2 win vs. Toronto.
Sept. 25, 2014 - Derek Jeter plays his final game at Yankee Stadium, hitting a "walk-off" single to defeat Baltimore, 6-5, after closer David Robertson allows three runs in the top of the ninth to allow the Orioles to tie the score.

May 10, 2015 - Michael Pineda records 16 K vs. Baltimore in just 7.0IP, becoming just the third pitcher in franchise history with at least 16 K in a single game (LHP Guidry-18K and RHP Cone-16K).
May 24, 2015 - The Yankees retire Bernie Williams' No. 51.
June 19, 2015 - Alex Rodriguez records his 3,000th career hit with a solo HR off Detroit's Justin Verlander at Yankee Stadium.
Aug. 8-9, 2015 - The Yankees are shut out in consecutive games for the first time since 5/12-13/99, having played 2,665 games in between, ending the longest streak of not being shut out in consecutive games in MLB history.
Aug. 22-23, 2015 - The Yankees retire Jorge Posada's No. 20 and Andy Pettitte's No. 46 on consecutive days.
Oct. 1, 2015 - The Yankees record the 10,000th regular season win in franchise history, defeating Boston, 4-1, to clinch a postseason berth and the club's first-ever appearance in the AL Wild Card Game. They are the first AL club to reach the 10,000-win plateau, and - according to the Elias Sports Bureau - own the best winning pct. (.569) of any franchise at the time of its 10,000th win.
Aug. 13, 2016 - On a day when the 20th anniversary of the 1996 team is celebrated during a pregame ceremony, Tyler Austin and Aaron Judge make their Major League debuts and hit back-to-back homers in the second inning in their first career plate appearances. It marks the first time in MLB history that teammates making their debuts each homered in the same game. There had been just one prior game in MLB history in which two players each hit HRs in their first career at-bats, but they were on opposing teams (Brooklyn at Philadelphia on 4/19/38 the Phillies' Emmett "Heinie" Mueller and the Dodgers' Ernie Koy - both in the first inning).
Aug. 14, 2016 - Mariano Rivera's Monument Park plaque is unveiled in a pregame ceremony.
Sept. 28, 2016-Mark Teixeira hits his 409th and final career home run - a"walk-off" grand slam vs. Boston in a 5-3 Yankees win.
May 7, 2017 - The Yankees outlast the Cubs, 5-4, in 18 innings at Wrigley Field, as the teams combine for an all-time MLB high 48 strikeouts. Yankees pitchers tie the all-time single-game mark with 26 K (third time in MLB history).
May 14, 2017-In between games of a Mother's Day doubleheader vs. Houston, Derek Jeter's No. 2 is retired and his Monument Park plaque is unveiled.
Sept. 25, 2017 - In an 11-3 win vs. Kansas City, Aaron Judge hits his 49th and 50th home runs of the season, tying and breaking Mark McGwire's all-time MLB rookie home run mark (49HR in 1987).
Oct. 8, 2017 - In ALDS Game 3 vs. Cleveland, Greg Bird hits a solo HR to lead off the seventh, joining Jorge Posada (2001 ALDS Game 3 at Oakland, fifth inn.) and Tommy Henrich (1949 WS Game 1 vs. Brooklyn, ninth inn.) as the only Yankees to homer in a 1-0 postseason win.
Oct. 11, 2017 - The Yankees win ALDS Game 5 at Cleveland, 5-2, overturning a two-games-to-none deficit to win the series over the AL's winningest regular season team. Didi Gregorius drives in three runs with a first-inning solo HR and a two-run homer in the third, both off AL Cy Young Award winner Corey Kluber.

Mar. 29, 2018 -Giancarlo Stanton makes his Yankees debut, going 3-for-5 with 1 double, 2HR and 4RBI at Toronto. He becomes just the second Yankee to homer twice in his first game with the club, joining Roger Maris (2HR on 4/19/60 at Boston). He also becomes the seventh Yankee to hit 2HR on Opening Day, the first since Joe Pepitone on 4/9/63 at the K.C. A's.
Apr. 3, 2018 - Didi Gregorius goes 4 -for- 4 with 1 double, 2HR, 1BB and 8RBI in Yankees' 11-4 home opener win vs. Tampa Bay, setting single-game franchise records for RBI by a shortstop, RBI by a Yankee in a home opener and RBI in the current Yankee Stadium.
May 6, 2018 - At 21 years, 144 days old, Gleyber Torres becomes the youngest Yankee in franchise history to hit a "walk-off"HR with a three-run shot in the ninth inning of a $7-4 \mathrm{win}$ vs. Cleveland.

Sept. 29, 2018 - In the fourth inning of the Yankees' penultimate game of the season (an 8-5 win at Boston), Gleyber Torres hits the Yankees' MLB single-season record-breaking 265th homer of the season to surpass the 1997 Seattle Mariners (264HR). The Yankees go on to finish with 267 HR on the year.

## Lou Gehrig Appreciation Day－July 4， 1939

Prior to the Yankees＇May 2，1939，game at Detroit＇s Briggs Stadium，captain Lou Gehrig gave the umpires his team＇s lineup card－which did not have his name on it．He watched the entire game from the bench，marking the end of his 2，130－consecutive－ games－played streak．＂The Iron Horse＂was suffering the effects of amyotrophic lateral sclerosis（ALS），a disease known since as Lou Gehrig＇s disease．He would never play again．

Just over two months later，on July 4，1939， Lou Gehrig Appreciation Day was held in front of approximately 62,000 fans at Yankee Stadium． Ceremonies took place between games of a doubleheader against the Washington Senators．Gehrig and his teammates were joined by members of the 1927 Yankees．After speeches by Mayor Fiorello La Guardia and Postmaster James A．Farley，Manager Joe McCarthy said his public goodbye to Gehrig：＂Lou，what can I say except that it was a sad day in the life of everybody who knew you when you came to my hotel room that day in Detroit and told me you were quitting as a ballplayer because you felt yourself a hindrance to the team．My God，man，you were never that．＂

Various gifts were presented to Gehrig from club employees and the rival New York Giants．His teammates gave him a trophy，which was inscribed with a poem by New York Times writer John Kieran．As the crowd chanted，＂We want Lou；We want Lou．．．，＂ Gehrig stepped to the microphone to deliver one of the most oft－quoted speeches in American history．
＂For the past two weeks you＇ve been reading about a bad break．Today I consider myself the luckiest man on the face of the Earth．I have been in ballparks for 17 years and have never received anything but kindness and encouragement from you fans．
＂When you look around，wouldn＇t you consider it a privilege to associate yourself with such fine－ looking men as are standing in uniform in this ballpark today？Sure，I＇m lucky．Who wouldn＇t consider it an honor to have known Jacob Ruppert？ Also，the builder of baseball＇s greatest empire，Ed Barrow？To have spent six years with such a grand

little fellow as Miller Huggins？To have spent the next nine years with that smart student of psychology， the best manager in baseball today，Joe McCarthy？ Who wouldn＇t feel honored to room with such a grand guy as Bill Dickey？
＂When the New York Giants，a team you would give your right arm to beat，and vice versa，sends you a gift－that＇s something．When the groundskeepers and office staff and writers and old－timers and players and concessionaires all remember you with trophies－that＇s something．When you have a wonderful mother－in－law who takes sides with you in squabbles against her own daughter－that＇s something．When you have a father and a mother who work all their lives so that you can have an education and build your body－it＇s a blessing． When you have a wife who has been a tower of strength and shown more courage than you ever dreamed existed－that＇s the finest I know．
＂So I close in saying that I might have been given a bad break，but I＇ve got an awful lot to live for．Thank you．＂
On January 6，1940，Yankees team president Ed Barrow announced that No． 4 would be retired from use．To this day，Gehrig remains the only Yankee ever to wear the number．

Gehrig died on June 2，1941，at his home in the Riverdale section of the Bronx．He was 37．

## Babe Ruth Day－April 27， 1947

On April 27，1947， Babe Ruth Day was celebrated throughout Major League Baseball，as the Babe said goodbye in an on－field ceremony at Yankee Stadium． Dressed in a topcoat， Ruth，weakened by throat cancer，made the following remarks：

＂Thank you very much，ladies and gentlemen． You know how bad my voice sounds－well it feels just as bad．
＂You know this baseball game of ours comes up from the youth．That means the boys．And after you＇re a boy and grow up to know how to play ball， then you come to the boys you see representing themselves today in your national pastime．The only real game－I think－in the world is baseball．
＂As a rule，some people think if you give them a football，or a baseball，or something like that－ naturally they＇re athletes right away．But you can＇t do that in baseball．You＇ve gotta start from way down［at］the bottom，when you＇re 6 or 7 years of age．You can＇t wait until you＇re 15 or 16．You gotta let it grow up with you．And if you＇re successful，and you try hard enough，you＇re bound to come out on top－just like these boys have come to the top now．
＂There＇s been so many lovely things said about me，and I＇m glad that I＇ve had the opportunity to thank everybody．Thank you．＂
Ruth memorably returned to Yankee Stadium on June 13，1948，to celebrate the 25th anniversary of Yankee Stadium and have his uniform No． 3 retired．

He died on August 16，1948，at Memorial Hospital in New York at age 53．His body laid in state at the entrance of Yankee Stadium on Aug． 17 and 18，before his funeral on Aug． 19 at New York＇s St．Patrick＇s Cathedral．

## George M. Steinbrenner III (1930-2010)



From 1973 until his passing on July 13, 2010, George M. Steinbrenner III created a legacy of winning unmatched by his peers. His foresight, drive and commitment permanently transformed not only the Yankees organization, but the game of Baseball.

On January 3, 1973, a group of businessmen formed and led by Mr. Steinbrenner purchased the New York Yankees from CBS for a net price of $\$ 8.7$ million. It took just five years for his aggressive leadership to turn the organization back into World Champions. In his time as Principal Owner of the club (1973-2010), the Yankees won more pennants (11) and World Series (7) than any other team in baseball, while posting a Major League-best . 566 winning percentage ( $3,364-2,583-3$ record) over the stretch.

In addition to the team's on-field success under the direction of Mr. Steinbrenner, the New York Yankees consistently shattered franchise and league attendance records at home and on the road. In 2009, they drew 3,719,358 fans in their first season of play in the current Yankee Stadium, topping the American League in attendance for the seventh straight season (200309). The Yankees remain the only franchise in Baseball history to draw more than 4 million fans at home in four consecutive seasons (2005-08).

Mr. Steinbrenner's foresight into both sports and business continued to build the value and prominence of the franchise, positioning it for the future. In 2002, Sporting News named him the No. 1 "Most Powerful Man in Sports," and Forbes magazine has continued to list the Yankees as the most valuable franchise in all of Baseball.

Mr. Steinbrenner's vision led to the creation of YankeeNets, which owned the New Jersey Nets and New Jersey Devils and ultimately led to the launch of the YES Network, a trailblazing enterprise that has been the nation's most watched regional sports network since 2003. Additionally, Mr. Steinbrenner teamed with long-time friend and Dallas Cowboys owner Jerry Jones, creating Legends Hospitality, LLC, a concession and merchandising company which currently operates at the Yankees' and Cowboys' new stadiums.

In 2006, his participation in the groundbreaking ceremony for the new Yankee Stadium underscored his role as the principal impetus in moving the much-anticipated facility towards its opening in 2009.

Mr. Steinbrenner's tenure of over 37 years exceeded that of any other New York Yankees owner by 13 years (Colonel Jacob Ruppert purchased the Yankees with Tillinghast L'Hommedieu Huston in January 1915, bought out Huston in 1923, and maintained sole ownership in the club until his death in January 1939-a total of 24 years). During Mr. Steinbrenner's time as the sole Principal Owner of the Yankees, the other 29 Major League clubs had over 100 owners or ownership groups.

Mr. Steinbrenner's success in the sports world began at an early age. He was a multi-sport athlete at Culver Military Academy (where he is in the Athletic Hall of Fame) and at Williams College. He began his successful coaching career as an assistant football coach at two Big Ten universities, Northwestern and Purdue. Then he assembled championship basketball teams in the National Industrial and American Basketball Leagues. In 2002, he was honored with the prestigious
 Gold Medal Award from the National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame for a lifetime of "outstanding commitment, dedication and dynamic leadership in his business, as well as his personal life."

Mr. Steinbrenner devoted as much time and effort to the U.S. Olympic Committee (USOC) as he did to his many other sporting endeavors. He was on the U.S. Olympic Foundation Board from 1986-2002 and served as Chairman over the last six years of his tenure. He also was Chairman of the 1989 Olympic Overview Commission, which was created to evaluate the structure and efforts of the U.S. Olympic program, and served as Vice President of the USOC from 1989 to 1992. As a result of his distinguished service, he was presented with the General Douglas MacArthur USOC Foremost Award and the F. Don Miller United States Olympic Award. In 2005, the U.S. Olympic Foundation created the George M. Steinbrenner Sports Leadership Award in his honor, which celebrates a member of the U.S. Olympic family who has made outstanding contributions to sport.

Additionally, Mr. Steinbrenner was a member of the Baseball Hall of Fame's Board of Directors and served on the NCAA Foundation Board of Trustees beginning in 1990.

Most of Mr. Steinbrenner's philanthropic endeavors were performed without fanfare. However, he was repeatedly recognized by the communities in which he immersed himself. In 1993, he earned the Tampa Civitan Club's "Outstanding Citizen" Award, and in 1998, Tampa Law Enforcement named him "Citizen of the Year" for founding a scholarship fund for the children of slain law enforcement officers. Mr. Steinbrenner was also honored as an "Outstanding New Yorker" by the N.Y. Society of Association Executives in 1997 and credited in 2009 by the Museum of the City of New York as one of the "New York City 400," recognizing "people who have helped create the world's greatest city since its founding in 1609."

In February 2008, the Tampa City Council and the Board of the Hillsborough County Commissioner's Office both passed resolutions endorsing the renaming of Legends Field in Tampa after Mr. Steinbrenner to pay tribute to his numerous contributions to the area. On March 27, 2008, Mr. Steinbrenner-joined by his familypulled down a curtain draped above the outfield scoreboard to unveil the new name for the Yankees' spring training home: George M. Steinbrenner Field.

In the fall of 2009, George M. Steinbrenner High School opened in Lutz, Fla. The school was named after Mr. Steinbrenner by the Hillsborough County School Board in recognition of his philanthropic involvement in the community, particularly with the school system.

Mr. Steinbrenner was dually honored in January 2011, winning the Joan Payson Community Service Award from the New York chapter of the BBWAA and having his legacy of charitable work recognized at the 22nd annual Baseball Assistance Team (B.A.T.) Dinner.

At the time of his passing, he was survived by his wife, Joan; sisters, Susan Norpell and Judy Kamm; children, Hank, Hal, Jennifer and Jessica; and his grandchildren. \$

## Chronology of Yankees Ownership

Jan. 9, 1903: Frank Farrell and Bill Devery purchase the rights to establish a new American League franchise in New York for $\$ 18,000$.
Jan. 11, 1915: Col. Jacob Ruppert and Col. Tillinghast L'Hommedieu Huston agree to purchase the Yankees for $\$ 460,000$. The transfer is formally completed on January 30.
May 21, 1923: Col. Ruppert buys out Col. Huston for $\$ 1.5$ million (transfer is completed on June 1).
Jan. 13, 1939: Col. Ruppert passes away and his estate takes over ownership of the club.
Jan. 25, 1945: Dan Topping, Del Webb and Larry MacPhail purchase the Yankees for $\$ 2.8$ million from the estate of the late Col. Ruppert (Topping and Webb later buy out MacPhail's share following the 1947 season).
Nov. 2, 1964: CBS purchases 80 pct. of the Yankees for $\$ 11.2$ million and later buys the remaining 20 percent (Webb sells his 10 pct. share in March 1965 and Topping sells his 10 pct. share in September 1966).
Jan. 3, 1973: A limited partnership, headed by George M. Steinbrenner as its Managing General Partner, purchases the Yankees from CBS for a net price of $\$ 8.7$ million.
Nov. 20, 2008: Hal Steinbrenner named Managing General Partner.

On September 20, 2010, prior to the team's game vs. Tampa Bay, the Yankees unveiled a monument in Mr. Steinbrenner's honor in Monument Park, reflecting the special connection, appreciation and responsibility that he felt toward Yankees fans.

## Bob Sheppard - "The Voice of Yankee Stadium"

Bob Sheppard will forever be the "The Voice of Yankee Stadium." With his instantly recognizable elocution - in which each syllable was given meticulous attention - Sheppard provided a soundtrack of irreproachable dignity to Yankee Stadium for 57 years.

Sadly, he passed away on July 11, 2010, at his home in Baldwin, N.Y., with his wife, Mary, by his side. He was 99 years old.

Born in Ridgewood, Queens, Sheppard began his tenure as Yankees public address announcer on April 17, 1951—Opening Day of Joe DiMaggio's final season and the day of Mickey Mantle's Major League debut. Among the approximately 4,500 baseball games he worked over his tenure with the Yankees were 121 consecutive postseason contests from 1951 to 2006, including 62 games in 22 World Series.

Sheppard's incredible career behind the microphone started when he volunteered his services for a charity football game in Freeport, Long Island, in the late 1940s. An executive from the Brooklyn Dodgers football team of the All-America Conference was at the game. He liked Sheppard's style ("clear, concise and correct") and hired him. The football Dodgers folded after just one season at Ebbets Field (1948), but one of their opponents-the New York football Yankees-heard Sheppard's booming voice and offered him their PA job at Yankee Stadium. Baseball's Yankees discovered him as a result and offered him their PA role for the 1950 season. Though he turned down their offer due to conflicts with his teaching schedule, he changed his mind the following year.

In addition to his baseball duties, Sheppard was the public address voice for the New York football Giants for 50 seasons-from their move to Yankee Stadium in 1956 until his retirement after the 2005 season. Sheppard also served the New York Titans of the American Football League at the Polo Grounds, the New York Stars of the World Football League at Downing Stadium, the New York Cosmos soccer team, and St. John's University's basketball and football teams. Sheppard also handled PA duties for five Army-Navy football games in Philadelphia.

Some of the events he listed as the most memorable of his incredible career were: Don Larsen's perfect game in Game 5 of the 1956 World Series on October 8, 1956; Roger Maris' $61^{\text {st }}$ home run on October 1, 1961; Reggie Jackson's three home runs in Game 6 of the World Series on October 18, 1977; and the GiantsColts overtime NFL Championship Game on December 28, 1958.

Sheppard attended St. John's College, which eventually became St. John's University. Always a talented athlete, he received a full athletic scholarship to the school,

playing quarterback on the football team all four years. He later enrolled at Columbia University, where he received his master's degree in speech and worked his way up from teacher-in-training to substitute teacher to permanent teacher to department chairman. In order to supplement his teaching salary, Sheppard played
 semiprofessional football on Sundays in Long Island with the Valley Stream Red Riders and the Hempstead Monitors, earning $\$ 25$ a game.

In 1998, Sheppard was presented with the prestigious William J. Slocum "Long and Meritorious Service" Award by the New York chapter of the BBWAA as well as the "Pride of the Yankees" award by the ballclub.

On May 7, 2000, a plaque was dedicated to Sheppard in Monument Park of the original Yankee Stadium to commemorate his $50^{\text {th }}$ anniversary season. Additionally, the Yankee Stadium media dining room was named "Sheppard's Place" prior to the 2009 season to commemorate his legacy. The native New Yorker was elected to the St. John's University Sports Hall of Fame, the Long Island Sports Hall of Fame and the New York Sports Hall of Fame.
He was awarded honorary doctorates from St.
John's University (Pedagogy) and Fordham University (Rhetoric), and in 2007, received St. John's' Medal of Honor, the highest award that the university can confer on a graduate.

Sheppard also made cameo appearances in numerous motion pictures and television shows, including $61^{*}$, 1 t's My Turn, It Could Happen to You, For Love of the Game, Anger Management, Seinfeld and Mad About You.

Sheppard announced his final game at Yankee Stadium on September 5, 2007, a 3-2 Yankees victory over the Seattle Mariners.

On Sept. 21, 2008, Sheppard provided a valedictory in the bottom of the seventh inning of the final game at the original Yankee Stadium. Unable to say goodbye in person as he continued to recover from an illness that had kept him away from the Stadium since the final weeks of the 2007 season, Sheppard gave his tribute through a taped segment which played on the video board. He recited, "Farewell, old Yankee Stadium, farewell / What a wonderful story you can tell / DiMaggio, Mantle, Gehrig and Ruth / A baseball cathedral in truth."

## Voices Before Sheppard

Not even Bob Sheppard himself could remember who preceded him as Yankee Stadium's public address announcer. Surprisingly, the history of Sheppard's predecessors at the microphone - or, earlier, the megaphone - spanned four decades and three ballparks before Sheppard's first game on April 17, 1951.
The lineage extends to Hilltop Park in 1910, when the Yankees were commonly called the "Highlanders." On June 11, Sporting Life noted a new method of announcing the starting batteries. Writer E.H. Simmons described an unnamed scorecard vendor with a "deep, carrying voice" shouting the names through a megaphone at the start of each game.

In 1913, the Yankees began playing their home games at the Polo Grounds, which was also home to the New York Giants. Jack Lenz and George Levy debuted as announcers for both teams two years later. When Yankee Stadium opened in 1923, Levy continued working with the Giants while Lenz carried his megaphone to the Bronx. "I grabbed the offer," Lenz recalled in 1935. "Who wouldn't, with the old Bambino holding forth at the Stadium?"

Lenz's game-day duties began with receiving the starting lineups from the managers of both teams 15 minutes before the first pitch. After delivering a copy of each lineup to the umpire, Lenz relayed the "necessary dope" to writers in the press box via telephone. He then raised his megaphone and announced the batting orders and batteries - first toward the bleachers, then to the upper tiers of the grandstand, and finally to the lower stands. During games, Lenz occupied Field Box 133 adjacent to the Yankees dugout. He broadcasted each batter's name only once, prior to the first plate appearance by each respective player. Lenz also announced lineup changes made throughout the game.

Lenz became a fixture at Yankee Stadium. Fans chuckled at his occasional malapropisms, such as advertising a doubleheader as "two games for the price of one omission." The New York Evening Journal praised Lenz as "the
 mild-mannered megaphone man" upon announcing his 2,000th game in 1933. Lenz set aside his megaphone to inaugurate Yankee Stadium's public address system during Game 3 of the 1936 World Series.

George Levy occasionally joined Lenz at the Stadium. In 1927, Lenz and Levy announced the Opening Day lineups to 72,000 fans as part of a "two-ply announcer system." Levy replaced Lenz as Yankee Stadium's official announcer by 1939 and was likely responsible for a famous gaffe made on May 31, 1946.
"Will the spectators in the front row boxes please remove their clothing...," Levy began, only to have the second half of the request ("from the front railing") obscured by the crowd's laughter.

Al Frazin served as Yankee Stadium's public address announcer from 1947 through 1950. Frazin, a longtime announcer at Madison Square Garden, handled P.A. duties in the 1930s for the pro football Brooklyn Dodgers, who were owned by future Yankees co-owner Dan Topping. Frazin served in the U.S. Army during World War II and was recalled into active military service in August 1950.

Research indicates that Yankees public relations director Arthur "Red" Patterson handled public address duties immediately prior to Bob Sheppard's debut in 1951. Patterson likely filled AI Frazin's vacated position through the 1950 World Series.

## Current Yankees Public Address Announcer Paul Olden

On April 15, 2009, the Yankees announced that Paul Olden would assume full-time duties as Yankee Stadium public address announcer, replacing the iconic Bob Sheppard. Olden, a 12-time Super Bowl public address announcer (1994-2005), first manned the Yankees booth during the team's workout day on April 2. He also worked the team's first-ever Stadium exhibition games vs. Chicago-NL on April 3-4.

Sheppard, the Yankees PA announcer since 1951, had been suffering from a bronchial infection and was last able to perform his role on September 5, 2007. His longtime backup, Jim Hall, handled PA responsibilities in 2008.

Olden had a long broadcasting career prior to taking the Yankees PA position, including three seasons in the Yankees television broadcast booth from 1994-96 alongside Phil Rizzuto and Bobby Murcer. He also called games on the radio for the Tampa Bay Devil Rays (19982004), California Angels (1991), and Cleveland Indians (1988-89), as well as for the NFL's New York Jets (1993-96) and Los Angeles Rams (1991-92).

Previously, Olden did fill-in radio work with the NBA's New Jersey Nets (1995-96) and MLB's Angels (1989-90, '92). He was also a full-time radio broadcaster for UCLA's basketball and football teams (1989-1992) and worked for The Football Network (2003), FOX SportsNet LA (1997) and ESPN (1991-92), calling Major League Baseball and college football.

Olden's other prior PA work included the NCAA's Outback Bowl from 2002-05 and USC Trojans baseball from 1972-76. He also did on-air radio work for KPMC and KNX in Los Angeles.

Born in Chicago and raised in L.A., Olden attended Los Angeles City College and Los Angeles Valley College (2006-08). He was presented with a New York Emmy Award for best local sports coverage in 1994 for his work on Yankees telecasts. H*

## The 1927 Yankees - "Murderers' Row"

Many baseball writers and historians consider the 1927 Yankees the greatest baseball team of all time. With a lineup known as Murderers' Row, the Yankees marched to a 110-44 regular season record, leading the AL from wire-to-wire and finishing ahead of the second-place Philadelphia A's by 19.0 games. The club featured seven Hall of Famers in uniform (outfielders Babe Ruth and Earle Combs, first baseman Lou Gehrig, second baseman Tony Lazzeri, pitchers Waite Hoyt and Herb Pennock, and manager Miller Huggins). Additionally, the team was constructed by an eighth Hall-of-Famer (general manager Ed Barrow) and owned by a ninth (Jacob Ruppert).

Ruth had his signature season, hitting 60 home runs, including 17 in September. With his final blast of the year off the Washington Senators' Tom Zachary, he surpassed his own single-season record of 59 set in 1921. Ruth also led the Majors in on-base pct. (.486), slugging pct. (.772), runs (158), walks (137) and strikeouts (89).

Hitting behind Ruth in the clean-up spot, Gehrig won the AL MVP Award, batting .373 with 173 RBI, 117 extra-base hits and 447 total bases. While this marked Gehrig's breakout season, his winning the award had a lot to do with the rules of the time, which prohibited a repeat winner (Ruth had won in 1923). Nevertheless Gehrig's totals for extra-base hits, total bases and RBI are the second-highest, third-highest and tied for the fourthhighest, respectively, in a single season in Baseball history.

As a club, the Yankees led the Majors in almost every offensive category, including runs (975), triples
(103), home runs (158), walks (642), batting avg. (.307), on-base pct. (.384) and slugging pct. (.488). Ruth and Gehrig alone tallied 107 combined homers, just two shy of the New York Giants, who had the second-most as a team in the Majors.

For all the attention that the hitters received, the pitchers were every bit as good. They led the Majors with a 3.20 combined ERA and allowed the third-fewest walks (409) and homers (42) among the Majors' 16 teams. They tossed 82 complete games (second in the AL ) and led their league with 11 shutouts.

The group was paced by Hoyt, who had the best overall season of his career, going 22-7 with a 2.64 ERA and tying for the AL lead in wins. Urban Shocker, a four-time former 20-game winner with the St. Louis Browns, went $18-6$ with a 2.84 ERA, while dealing with a mitral valve disorder that forced him to sleep sitting up and contributed to his death the following year. The biggest surprise on the staff was Wilcy Moore-a player recommended to Barrow in 1926 by "bird dog" scout Jack Walsh (popular legend holds that Barrow discovered Moore while reading minor league statistics in The Sporting News). Moore became a spot starter as well as the Yankees' principal all-purpose relief pitcher, tossing 213.0 innings ( 93.0 as a starter, 120.0 as a reliever), going $19-7$ with a Major League-leading 2.28 ERA.

The Yankees capped off their season with a fourgame World Series sweep of Pittsburgh, outscoring the Pirates 23-10. Ruth hit the only two homers of the Series and Moore tossed a complete game in the clincher.

## "Culmination of a Dynasty" - The 1939 Yankees

n a year that the American and National Leagues celebrated the 100th anniversary of the mythologized creation of baseball, the 1939 Yankees overwhelmed opponents with flawless execution and a balanced attack of pitching, defense and clutch hitting. The club tallied 106 regular season victories before taking four straight from Cincinnati to win the last of four consecutive World Series championships.

Discipline and intensity formed the bedrock of the club's success. Talented young stars-harvested from baseball's most fertile farm system-adopted their veteran teammates' no-nonsense attitude. Manager Joe McCarthy even banned card playing, smoking and radio playing from the team's clubhouse.

The season began with concern over Lou Gehrig's declining on-field performance. His severely diminished skills mystified teammates and sportswriters. The ailing first baseman batted just . 143 through the first eight regular season games before benching himself on May 2 to end his streak of 2,130 consecutive games played.

Babe Dahlgren assumed first base duties, and the Yankees hit their stride in May. The team soon made a mockery of the American League pennant race, winning 28-of-32 games through June 4, including a 12-game winning streak. On June 26, the Yankees played the first night game in franchise history at Philadelphia's Shibe Park. Two days later they launched 13 home runs in a doubleheader sweep of the A's (by scores of 23-2 and 10-0).
"It hardly seems necessary to say that the Yankees appear headed for

Bill Dickey (C), Joe Gordon (2B), Red Rolfe (3B), George Selkirk (LF) and Joe DiMaggio (CF). Gehrig served as honorary captain in the AL's 3-1 victory.

Standout performances powered McCarthy's winning machine in 1939. Dickey (.302, 24HR, 105RBI) had a .403 onbase percentage, and Rolfe (.329, 14HR, 80RBI) paced the AL in runs scored (139), hits (213), and doubles (46), while fielding every inning of every game at third base. Gordon $(.284,28 \mathrm{HR}$, 111RBI) was an All-Star in his second big league season, and rookie outfielder Charlie Keller (.334, 11HR, 83RBI) posted what would be his highest career single-season average. Selkirk (.306, 21HR, 101RBI) scored 103 runs in just 128 games.

Red Ruffing led the staff with a 21-7 mark and posted a 2.93 ERA despite an ailing arm. Six other pitchers each won between 10 and 13 games on an evenly-worked staff that led the AL with a 3.31 ERA and had only two pitchers start more than 20 games or toss more than 154 innings (Ruffing28GS/233.1IP and Lefty Gomez-26GS/198.0IP).

Of all the 1939 Yankees, Joe DiMaggio's star shone the brightest. Despite a torn leg muscle early in the season, the graceful center fielder batted an AL-best. 381 (176-for-462) with 30 home runs and 126 RBl in 120 games, earninghis"YankeeClipper" nickname from radio broadcaster Arch McDonald along the way. With 53 RBI in August, he is one ofjust two players in MLB history to reach the total in any single calendar month (also the Cubs' Hack Wilson, Aug. 1930). Though DiMaggio's batting average hovered above the . 400 mark into early September, a lateseason eye infection triggered a Richards Vidmer in the Herald Tribune. "They have everything September dip. Nonetheless, he went on to earn the first of that a championship club needs, from pitching to power, defensive skill, leadership and a fine balance of youth and experience."

Indeed, the team's success stemmed from this potent blend. The Yankees scored 967 runs and surrendered 556. The 411 run differential remains a modern era (since 1900) record.

On July 4, a reported 61,808 spectators packed Yankee Stadium for ceremonies honoring Lou Gehrig. The team captain had been diagnosed with Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis (ALS), a terminal illness now commonly called "Lou Gehrig's Disease." The honoree stood silently, with head bowed, through speeches and gift presentations. When he finally addressed the crowd, Gehrig uttered one of the most famous declarations ever made on a baseball field, calling himself"the luckiest man on the face of the Earth." He concluded by offering that "I might have been given a bad break, but l've got an awful lot to live for."

Just one week later, Yankee Stadium hosted the seventh annual All-Star Game on July 11. McCarthy managed an AL starting lineup that included six Yankees-Red Ruffing (P),

## The 1961 Yankees and Roger Maris' 61-Home Run Season

The 1961 Yankees are considered to be among the greatest teams of all time. Led by Roger Maris, who broke Babe Ruth's all-time single-season home run mark, the club powered their way to the 19th World Series championship in franchise history.

The Yankees finished the regular season with a 10953 (.673) record, eight games ahead of the 101-61 (.623) Detroit Tigers. The clubs were just 1.5 games apart in the standings heading into the final full month of the season before the Yankees reeled off a 13 -game winning streak from Sept. 1-12 to vault an insurmountable 11.5 games in front. Their massive win total was fueled by a 65-16 mark at Yankee Stadium, the best single-season home record in Major League history.

The Yankees had sluggers up and down the lineup, including Moose Skowron ( 28 HR ), Yogi Berra ( 22 HR ), Elston Howard ( 21 HR) and "Super-sub" Johnny Blanchard, who hit 21 homers in just 243 at-bats. Of the 240 home runs the Yankees hit, 10 were pinch-hit homers, setting a still-standing single-season franchise mark.

The pitching staff was paced by Whitey Ford, who had a career year, going 25-4 with a 3.21 ERA. Under first-year manager Ralph Houk, Ford took the ball every fourth day for the first time in his career and set career highs in wins, winning percentage (.862), starts (39) and innings pitched (283.0), earning the Cy Young Award as the best pitcher in both leagues. Bill Stafford (14-9, 2.68 ERA), Ralph Terry (16-3, 3.15 ERA) and Rollie Sheldon (11-5, 3.60 ERA) were the Yankees' other top starters, and Luis Arroyo picked up 15 wins in relief, the highest total by a reliever in franchise history.

In the World Series, the Yankees triumphed over Cincinnati, 4-games-to-1, as Ford tossed 14.0 combined scoreless innings, earning wins in Game 1 and 4. With the Series knotted at one game apiece, Game 3 proved pivotal. Down, 2-1, heading into the eighth, Blanchard tied the game with a solo homer before Maris hit a game-winning solo shot in the ninth. The Yankees then outscored the Reds 20-5 over the final two contests to win the first of two consecutive World Series titles.

Much of the season's drama centered on the chase by the M\&M Boys - Roger Maris and Mickey Mantle - to break Ruth's seemingly untouchable single-season record

of 60 home runs, which he set with the 1927 Yankees. Maris, the American League MVP in 1960 and 1961, was joined in his pursuit by Mantle, who topped out at 54 home runs after sitting out seven of the club's final 10 games with an abscess in his right hip.

Maris tied Ruth's mark on Sept. 26 at Yankee Stadium with a home run off Baltimore's Jack Fisher in the team's 159th game of the season. Needing one homer to break the record with four games to go (the Yankees had played a tie earlier in the year), Maris was given a full game off prior to going homerless in the first two games of a three-game series against Boston at Yankee Stadium.

In the season's final game on Oct. 1, Maris connected in the fourth inning off Tracy Stallard, hitting a line-drive into the right-field stands for his 61st home run, which turned out to be the only run in a 1-0 Yankees victory. The quiet and humble Maris had to be pushed back onto the field by his teammates for his curtain call.

The chase was not without controversy as writers and fans loyal to Ruth clamored that the record should receive a special notation given that the American League was playing a 162-game schedule in 1961 due to the addition of two expansion teams. With the exceptions of 1901-03 and 191819, the AL had always played a 154-game format.

Ford Frick, a former sportswriter and New York City sportscaster who had previously ghostwritten Ruth's 1928 autobiography Babe Ruth's Own Book of Baseball, was the commissioner of baseball at the time. In the middle of the season, he issued the directive that baseball's official record book, The Little Red Book of Major League Baseball, compiled by the Elias Sports Bureau, should show two records - one for a 154game schedule and another for a 162-game schedule. Contrary to popular lore, an asterisk was never used for the notation, and separate designations remained in the official record book until 1991, when Major League Baseball finally rescinded the distinction.

Maris' 61 in 1961 remains the highest single-season home run total in American League history and the seventh-highest single-season total all time, behind those of Barry Bonds $(73)$, Mark McGwire $(70,65)$ and Sammy Sosa (66, 64 and 63). 师

## The 1998 Yankees－＂Most Wins in a Single Season＂

TThe 1998 Yankees were one of the most dominant teams in Major League baseball history．Despite starting the season with a three－game losing streak and dropping four of their first five，they proceeded to go 64－16 dating from their sixth game of the year，marking the best single－season 80－game run in franchise history．

Ultimately，the Yankees finished the regular season 114－48（．704）and won the AL East by 22.0 games，marking the third－largest margin of any league or division winner in Major League history，behind only Cleveland in 1995 （＋30．0）and Pittsburgh in 1902 （＋27．5）．Their regular season winning percentage trailed only the 1927 Murderers＇Row team（．714）for the best in franchise history，and their 125－50 overall record，including the postseason，marks the most single－season wins by any team all time．

The 1998 club excelled at every facet of the game， leading the American League in runs scored（965），runs per game（5．96），on－base percentage（．364），fewest runs per game allowed（4．05）and ERA（3．82）．They ranked second in stolen bases（153）and tallied the league＇s third－fewest errors（98）．Five members of the club（Scott Brosius，Derek Jeter，Paul O＇Neill，David Wells and Bernie Williams）were named to the AL All－Star team．

The club fielded a remarkably balanced lineup as


Bernie Williams led the AL with a .339 batting average in 1998. the first of his eight career 200 －hit seasons．The future captain led the AL with 127 runs scored while making his first All－Star team．

O＇Neill，Williams and Tino Martinez were the Yankees principal 3－4－5 hitters，though Martinez batted cleanup for stretches，including when Williams was on the disabled list with a sprained right knee from June 11 －July 18．O＇Neill，in his sixth year with the club after parts of eight seasons with Cincinnati，batted .317 （191－for－602）with 40 doubles，24HR and 116 RBI ，setting career highs in hits and runs scored （95）．Williams won his only career batting title，posting a ． 339 （169－for－499）mark with 26HR，97RBI and a ． 422 on－ base percentage．He also won a Gold Glove for his play in centerfield．

Martinez led the club with 123RBI and solidified the defense at first base．On the opposite corner，Scott Brosius had a career year，batting .300 （159－for－530）with 19HR and 98RBI， making his only All－Star team．The catching duties were split between Jorge Posada （． $268 \mathrm{BA}, 17 \mathrm{HR}$ and 63RBI in 111 games） in his first year as the first－string backstop and Joe Girardi（． 276 $B A$ in 78 games）．

One of the hallmarks of the club was its depth． Darryl Strawberry hit 24 home runs in just 295 at－bats and Tim


Raines put up a .395 on－base percentage in 109 games． Rookie Shane Spencer lit up the Bronx with 10 homers in 67 at－bats，including eight after being called up in September and seven in the Yankees＇last 11 games of the season．The bench was so strong that over the course of the season，the substitutes（．370）had a better on－base percentage than the starters（．364）．

The pitching staff was anchored by David Cone（20－7， 3．55 ERA in 31GS），who tied for the AL and Major League lead in wins．Lefthander David Wells（18－4，3．49 ERA in 30GS） led the AL with five shutouts and a 1.05 WHIP．Along with tossing a perfect game on May 17 vs ．Minnesota，Wells also had eight complete games during the season，a total that no Yankee has equaled since．

Orlando Hernandez added a boost to the rotation following his June call－up．Signed in March as a free agent from Cuba，＂El Duque＂went 12－4 with a 3.13 ERA in 21 starts． Andy Pettitte（16－11，4．24 ERA）and Hideki Irabu（13－9， 4.06 ERA）rounded out the rotation，which often got bailed out by utility pitcher Ramiro Mendoza，who went 10－2 with a 3.25 ERA in 41 appearances，including 14 starts．Mike Stanton （4－1，5．47 ERA in 67G），Jeff Nelson（5－3，3．79 ERA in 45G）and lefthanded specialist Graeme Lloyd（3－0，1．67 ERA in 50G in his best career season）provided the bridge to Mariano Rivera（3－0，1．91 ERA），who notched 36 saves and allowed just four of 24 inherited runners to score．

In the postseason，the Yankees swept Texas in three games in the ALDS， outscoring them 9－1 and outhitting them 23－13． The ALCS was trickier as Cleveland took a 2－games－ to－ 1 series lead before the Yankees won in six games． David Wells earned MVP honors，winning both of his starts in Game 1 and Game 5.

The Yankees met San Diego in the World Series， and the turning point came early．Down 5－2 in the
 seventh inning of Game 1

Tino Martinez celebrates his World Series Game 1 grand slam with Derek Jeter． at Yankee Stadium，Knoblauch tied the score with a three－ run homer．Five batters later，Tino Martinez hit a two－out， full－count grand slam off Mark Langston into the upper deck in right field to cap a seven－run inning in a 9－6 Yankees win．

The Yankees never looked back．They won Game 2，9－3， and they took Game 3 due to the heroics of World Series MVP Scott Brosius（． 471 BA， 8 －for－17，2HR，6RBI），who got the Yankees on the board in the seventh with a solo home run and then provided the margin of victory with a three－run homer in the eighth，propelling the Yankees to a 5－4 win．

Andy Pettitte held the Padres scoreless over 7.1 innings in Game 4，which was closed out by Mariano Rivera，who recorded his third save of the series and sixth of the postseason．Rivera tossed 13.1 scoreless innings in 10 appearances during the 1998 postseason，allowing just six hits．

The championship was the Yankees＇second in three years（also 1996） and the first of three consecutive（1998－ 2000）．It marked the highpoint of one of the greatest eras in club history， establishing the yardstick by which all of baseball＇s post－ integration teams are measured．

## Official Scoring at Yankee Stadium

The Yankees-Tigers contest at the Polo Grounds on May 15, 1922, might be the most significant game in the history of official scoring. In the second inning that wet day, Yankees shortstop Everett Scott failed to come up with a ground ball off the bat of Ty Cobb. Official scorer John Kieran (the first Sports of the Times columnist and founding editor of the Information Please Almanac) charged an error on Scott. Glancing over his shoulder as he fled the rain that was blowing into the press box, Fred Lieb (national president of the Baseball Writers Association of America and New York chapter chairman) scored it a hit. It was so reported by the Associated Press, for whom Lieb was compiling the box score. As was the custom, Kieran did not announce his call and Lieb, who was probably more interested at that moment in staying dry, did not ask.

The hit/error mattered - a lot. When official American League statistics were compiled (at the end of the season), the one-hit discrepancy was discovered. Cobb's season average was either . 401 or .399. A predictable brouhaha ensued. Despite Lieb's willingness to cede to Kieran's official capacity, and despite the BBWAA's December vote that no hit be awarded, AL president Ban Johnson ordered the record to reflect that Cobb earned a hit and thus a .401 average. So it remains, officially, for all time.

As a result of "The Case of the Two-Point Base Hit" (as it was known), official scorers were instructed to contemporaneously communicate their calls to the press box, and the leagues assured the BBWAA that, in the future, a scorer's judgment would not be questioned.

Scorers' calls on close plays have also had a hand in Yankee Stadium no-hitters (and near misses). Had Lieb scored Whitey Witt's leadoff grounder to third on Sept. 11, 1923, an error and not a hit, Boston's Howard Ehmke would be remembered with Johnny

Vander Meer as hurlers of consecutive no-hitters. And had John Drebinger of The Times not changed a hit (originally scored an error) back to an error after consulting during the game with Detroit's Johnny Pesky regarding Phil Rizzuto's fourth-inning grounder to short, Virgil Trucks would have thrown only one no-hitter in 1952.

Dan Daniel of the World-Telegram scored many Yankees home games during Joe DiMaggio's 56game hitting streak in 1941, and according to Jerome Holtzman (later the official historian of Major League Baseball), he awarded at least two arguable hits to help keep the streak alive. Four years later, a reversed call on the last day of the season by Bert Gumpert of the Bronx Home News gave Yankees second baseman Snuffy Stirnweiss the hit he needed to edge the White Sox's Tony Cuccinello for the AL batting title by .000087 .

The cavalcade of scorers who have worked at Yankee Stadium includes some of the giants of the baseball writers industry: Lieb, Daniel, Sid Mercer (an original BBWAA member in 1908), Frank Graham (Lou Gehrig's first biographer), John Drebinger (who covered 203 consecutive World Series games over 34 years), Dick Young (who covered New York baseball for the Daily News and New York Post for 44 years), Leonard Koppett (author of The Thinking Fan's Guide to Baseball), Jack Lang (BBWAA secretary-treasurer for 22 years), Maury Allen (author of over 30 sports books), Red Foley (senior scorer in New York for 15 years) and Bill Shannon (senior scorer in New York for nine seasons and author of Official Scoring in the Big Leagues).

## Yankees in Cooperstown

Including 2019 inductees Mariano Rivera，Mike Mussina and Lee Smith，there are 56 members of the Baseball Hall of Fame who have played，managed，coached，owned or been a general manager for the New York Yankees at one time or another．The Yankees＇first inductee was Babe Ruth，who entered the Hall in its inaugural 1936 class along with Ty Cobb，Walter Johnson，Christy Mathewson and Honus Wagner．Of recent note， 2019 inductee Mariano Rivera became the first ever individual to be inducted unanimously via the writer＇s ballot，receiving a vote on 425 －of－ 425 submissions．

In addition to the 56 individuals below，at least three Hall of Famers worked for the Yankees in other capacities， including Joe Kelley（HOF in 1971 －Yankees scout from 1915－25），Dick Williams（HOF in 2008 －NYY adviser from 1995－2001）and Pat Gillick（HOF in 2011 －NYY scouting director from 1974－76）．

The Elias Sports Bureau notes that there have been eight HOFers who spent their entire playing careers with the Yankees：Earle Combs，Lou Gehrig，Bill Dickey，Joe DiMaggio，Phil Rizzuto，Whitey Ford，Mickey Mantle and Mariano Rivera．

Currently，the choice of which insignia appears on the cap of each Hall of Famer＇s plaque belongs to the Hall of Fame itself．The decision is based on the＂historical accomplishments＂of the player and＂where that player makes his most indelible mark，＂though the wishes of the inductee are always considered．It is important to remember that caps have not always had insignias and some players＇images are cast as profiles without visible insignias．

## Yankees Retired Uniform Numbers

Through the end of the 2018 season, the Yankees have retired 21 uniform numbers to honor 22 Yankees players and managers, including Lou Gehrig's No. 4, which was the first retired number in MLB history. Contrary to popular belief, the number was not retired on July 4, 1939 (when the Iron Horse gave his famous "Luckiest Man" speech), but on Jan. 6, 1940, via announcement by team president Ed Barrow. On April 15, 1997, Major League Baseball retired No. 42 throughout the game to honor the Dodgers' Jackie Robinson. While the number could never again be issued by an MLB team, players already assigned No. 42 could continue to wear it. Mariano Rivera was grandfathered into that decision and was the last active player to use the number. During a pregame celebration on Sept. 22, 2013 (one week prior to his last day in uniform), the Yankees organization also retired the number for him, placing a Yankees-style " 42 " within the Yankees Retired Number Display in Monument Park. As part of that ceremony, the Yankees also recognized Robinson by unveiling a new bronze plaque to replace the Dodgers-style " 42 " which had previously been on display.

Born: Nov. 25, 1914 in Martinez, Calif. • Died: March 8, 1999 in Hollywood, Fla. • HT: 6-2 • WT: 193 • B/T: R/R
The"Yankee Clipper" is considered by many experts as the best all-around baseball player in history. The California native was a sensational hitter for both average and power, and a splendid, graceful, ballhawking center fielder with a powerful and accurate arm. A two-time batting champion and three-time MVP, he compiled a .325 lifetime batting average from 1936 to 1951 and powered the Yankees to nine World Series titles despite losing three complete seasons (1943-45) to military service. Many rate his 56-game hitting streak in 1941 as the top baseball feat of all time. He was inducted into the Hall of Fame in 1955.
Joe Torre (Number retired: August 23, 2014)
Born: July 18, 1940 in Brooklyn, N.Y. • HT: 6-2 • WT: $212 \cdot \mathrm{~B} / \mathrm{T}: \mathrm{R} / \mathrm{R}$
With a calming influence in the clubhouse and a stoic outward expression in the dugout, Torre piloted the Yankees to six World Series appearances (1996, '98-2001, '03) and four championships (1996, '982000) during his tenure from 1996-2007. The 2014 Hall of Famer led the club to the playoffs in all 12 seasons at the helm, going 1,173-767-2 (.605) in the regular season and 76-47 (.618) in the postseason, including a 21-11 mark in the World Series. His regular season wins total is second in club history to Joe McCarthy, who went 1,460-867-21 over 16 seasons.


7Mickey Mantle (Number reticed: June 8, 1969
Born: Oct. 20, 1931 in Spavinaw, Okla. • Died: Aug. 13, 1995 in Dallas, Tex. • HT: 6-0 • WT: $201 \cdot$ B/T: S/R
"The Mick" was the most feared hitter on some of the most successful teams in history. Fast and powerful, his reported 565 -foot home run in Washington in 1953 brought about the term "tape-measure home run." In the 14 seasons between 1951 and 1964, he led the Yanks to 12 Fall Classics and seven World Championships. He still owns records for most homers, RBI, runs and walks in World Series play. In 1956, Mantle had one of the greatest seasons ever at the plate, hitting 52 homers with 130RBI and a .353 average to win the Triple Crown. A three-time AL MVP (1956-57,'62), he was inducted into the Hall of Fame in 1974.


81081 Berra（Number retired：July 22,1972 on Old－Timers＇Day）
Born：May 12， 1925 in St．Louis，Mo．• Died：Sept．22， 2015 in West Caldwell，N．J． Height：5－8 • Weight： 191 •B／T：L／R

Beloved by generations of baseball fans，Berra was part of the foundation of the dominant Yankees teams from the end of World War II through the early 1960s．Although he never led the league in a single major offensive category， he is one of just 10 players all time to win at least three Most Valuable Player Awards．Selected to play in the All－Star Game in 15 successive seasons from 1948－62，he played on 14 pennant winners and an all－time record 10 World Champions．He led the Yankees to the 1964 pennant as manager and was inducted into the Hall of Fame in 1972.


8B11 Dickey（Number retired：July 22， 1972 on Old－Timers＇Day）
Born：June 6， 1907 in Bastrop，La．－Died：Nov．12， 1993 in Little Rock，Ark．
Height：6－1 • Weight： $185 \cdot$ B／T：L／R
Regarded as one of the greatest catchers of all time，Dickey was a durable and tireless worker，catching more than 100 games in an AL－record 13 consecutive seasons（1929－41）．In 1931，he did not allow a single passed ball in 125 games behind the plate，another AL record．Dickey also excelled as a hitter，batting over .300 in 10 of his first 11 full seasons，while hitting 202 homers during his career．He handled Yankees pitching staffs on eight World Series teams，winning seven championships．He was inducted into the Hall of Fame in 1954.


$\square$Roger Maris（Number retired：July 21， 1984 on Old－Timers＇Day） Born：Sept．10， 1934 in Hibbing，Minn．• Died：Dec．14， 1985 in Houston，Tex． Height：6－0 • Weight： 197 • B／T：L／R
In one of the most dramatic assaults on a baseball record，Maris surpassed Babe Ruth＇s single－season record of 60 home runs on the final day of the 1961 season．Maris＇ 61 homers that season was a Major League record until 1998 and still remains the American League mark．A two－time American League MVP（1960－61）， he is considered one of the best defensive right fielders in Yankees history．


10Phil Rizzuto ${ }^{\text {Number retired：Aug．} 4,1985}$
Born：Sept．25， 1917 in New York，N．Y．• Died：Aug．13， 2007 in West Orange，N．J． Height：5－6－Weight： 150 •B／T：R／R
Playing 13 years for the Yankees，the＂Scooter＂went to nine World Series，winning seven．Diminutive yet tough， he was a skilled bunter and baserunner with a ． 273 career batting average．In 1950，Rizzuto earned the AL MVP Award，batting .324 with 200 hits， 92 walks and 125 runs．In the 1951 World Series，he batted .320 and was named Series MVP．He also spent 40 years as a Yankees broadcaster（1957－96）tossing around his signature phrase，＂Holy cow！＂and calling his partners＂Huckleberry．＂He was inducted into the Hall of Fame in 1994.


15Thurman Munson ${ }_{\text {Numbereretired by amoumemeneton Ang } 3,1979)}$ Born：June 7， 1947 in Akron，Ohio • Died：Aug．2， 1979 in Canton，Ohio Height：5－11 • Weight： $190 \cdot$ B／T：R／R
Munson was the undisputed leader and most respected man on Yankees teams that won three consecutive AL pennants from 1976－78 and two World Championships in＇ 77 and＇ 78 ．He was a tremendous defensive catcher，winning three straight Gold Glove Awards（1973－75）and the AL MVP in 1976．In each season from 1975－77，Thurman drove in more than 100 runs and hit better than ． 300 ．There is no more tragic date in Yankees history than August 2，1979，when Munson passed away in a plane crash at age 32.


WWhitey HOTA，（Number retired：Aug．3， 1974 on Old－Timers＇Day）
Born：Oct． 21,1928 in New York，N．Y．
Height： $5-10 \cdot$ Weight： $181 \cdot B / \mathrm{T}: \mathrm{L} / \mathrm{L}$
＂The Chairman of the Board＂was the ace pitcher on the great Yankees teams of the 1950s and early＇ 60 s．His lifetime record of 236 －106 gives him the best winning percentage（．690）of any pitcher with 200－or－more decisions whose career began in the modern era（since 1900）．He paced the AL in victories three times，and in ERA and shutouts twice．The 1961 Cy Young Award winner still holds many World Series records，including 10 wins， 33.0 consecutive scoreless innings and 94 strikeouts．He was inducted into the Hall of Fame in 1974.


## T Jorge POSada（Number retired：Aug．22，2015） <br> Born：Aug．17， 1971 in Santurce，P．R． <br> Height：6－2－Weight： $215 \cdot B / T: S / R$

One of the best－hitting catchers of his era，Posada spent each of his 17 Major League seasons with the Yankees， batting .273 with 379 doubles， 275 homers，1，065 RBI，a .374 OBP and .848 OPS in 1，829 games from 1995－2011． A player on five World Series winners（1996，＇98，＇99，2000，＇09），Posada was also a five－time All－Star and five－time Silver Slugger winner．He is one of just seven catchers all time to have at least 11 seasons of 17 －or－more home runs．


Don Mattingly（Number retired：Aug．31，1997）
Height：6－0－Weight： $185 \cdot$ B／T：L／L
Respected for his talent，professionalism and humility，＂Donnie Baseball＂was the premier first baseman of the mid－1980s before back problems robbed him of much of his power at age 29．Nevertheless，he remained the most loved Yankee of his era and a defensive star，tallying nine Gold Gloves in his 14 years in pinstripes（1982－ 95）．The＂Hit Man＂won the 1984 AL batting title（．343）and the 1985 American League MVP（．324，35HR，145RBI）， setting the（since－tied）all－time record with six grand slams in a single season．


32Elston Howard (Number retired: July 21, 1984 on Old-Timers' Day) Born: Feb. 23, 1929 in St. Louis, Mo. • Died: Dec. 14, 1980 in New York, N.Y. Height: 6-2 - Weight: 196 • B/T: R/R

Howard became the first black player in Yankees history when he made the club in the spring of 1955. The versatile, two-time Gold Glove Award-winning catcher contributed to nine AL pennant-winning teams in his first 10 seasons with the club. Winner of the 1963 American League MVP (.287, 28HR, 85RBI), Howard was elected to the All-Star Game in nine different seasons (1957-65). A clubhouse leader as a player from 1955-67 and as a Yankees coach from 1969-79, his dignified manner and competitive spirit set a powerful example.


Casey Stengel (Number retired: Aug. 8, 1970 on Old-Timers' Day) Height: 5-11 • Weight: 175 • B/T: L/L
In a distinguished 54-year professional career, "The Old Perfessor" became one of the game's greatest managers. His feat of guiding the Yankees to 10 pennants and seven world titles in a 12-year span from 1949-60 ranks as one of the top managerial accomplishments of all time. Simply put, Casey Stengel was one of the best things to ever happen to the game of Baseball. He was an authentic baseball ambassador, making the game fun for millions of Americans. He was inducted into the Hall of Fame in 1966.


42Mariano Rivera
(Number retired by MLB on Apr. 15, 1997. Rivera recognized by NYY on Sept. 22, 2013) Born: Nov. 29, 1969 in Panama City, Panama • Height: 6-2 • Weight: $195 \cdot$ B/T: R/R

Rivera is the Majors' all-time leader with 652 career saves. Even more impressive is his 2.21 career ERA, which is the second-lowest mark among pitchers with at least 1,000.0IP since ERA became an official MLB statistic (1912-NL/1913-AL).The"Sandman" pitched 19 seasons, racking up an all-time best 15 seasons of at least 30 saves in 1,115 career games. His postseason dominance is legendary, including MLB record marks with 42 postseason saves, a 0.70 ERA (min: 30.0 IP ) and 96 appearances. In 141.0 career postseason IP, he allowed just $86 \mathrm{H}, 11 \mathrm{ER}$, 21 BB and 2 HR with 110 K . He won five World Series (1996, '98-2000, 09 ) and appeared in two others ( $2001, \not 03$ ).


44Reggie JackSO1 (Number retired: August 14, 1993)
Born: May 18, 1946 in Wyncote, Pa.
Height: 5-10 • Weight: 181 • B/T: L/L
"Mr. October" blasted 563 career home runs, including 144 as a Yankee from 1977-81. In Game 6 of the 1977 World Series, Jackson hit 3HR, all on the first pitch, as the Yankees beat the Dodgers to wrap up the club's first World Championship since 1962. He was an All-Star in each of his five years in pinstripes and had his best year with the club in 1980 (.300, 41HR, 111RBI), finishing second in AL MVP voting. Jackson said, "Some people call October a time of pressure. I call it a time of character." He was inducted into the Hall of Fame in 1993.


## 46 Andy Pettitte (Number retired: August 23, 2015) <br> Born: June 15, 1972 in Baton Rouge, La.

Height: 6-5 • Weight: 225 • B/T: L/L
Reliable and consistent throughout his career, Pettitte pitched 15 seasons with the club (1995-2003, '07-10, '12-13), going 219-127 with a 3.94 ERA ( $447 \mathrm{G} / 438 \mathrm{GS}, 2,796.1 \mathrm{IP}, 2,020 \mathrm{~K}$ ). The left-hander is the franchise leader in strikeouts and is tied with Whitey Ford for the most starts. He trails only Ford ( 236 wins, $3,171.0 \mathrm{IP}$ ) and Red Ruffing ( 231 wins, $3,168.0$ IP) in wins and innings pitched. A three-time AL All-Star (1996, 2001 and'10), Pettitte is the only pitcher drafted by the Yankees to win 200 games in the Majors. As a Yankee, Pettitte went $18-10$ with a 3.76 ERA ( 251.1 IP, 105ER) in 40 career postseason starts, winning five World Series titles (1996, '98-2000, '09). He famously started and won all three series-clinching games in the 2009 postseason.


CLRon Guidry (Number retired: August 23, 2003)
Born: Aug. 28, 1950 in Lafayette, La.
Height: 5-11 • Weight: 165 • B/T: L/L
Known as "Louisiana Lightning," Ron Guidry was a four-time All-Star and three-time 20-game winner whose 1978 season was one of the most dominant by a pitcher in Major League history. He went 25-3 with a 1.74 ERA in leading the Yankees back from a 14.0-game AL East deficit and winning the AL Cy Young Award in unanimous fashion. He also set still-standing franchise records with nine shutouts, 248 total strikeouts and 18 strikeouts in a single game (June 17 vs. California). From 1986 through his retirement in 1989, "Gator" also served as a co-captain with Willie Randolph. He remains in the Yankees' all-time top 10 in games pitched (368), innings pitched ( $2,392.0$ ), wins (170), winning percentage (.651), strikeouts ( 1,778 ) and shutouts (26).


51 Bernie Williams<br>(Number retired: May 24, 2015)<br>Born: Sept. 13, 1968 in San Juan, P.R.<br>Height: 6-2 - Weight: 205 - B/T: S/R

Williams played his entire 16-year Major League career with the Yankees (1991-2006), batting 297 (2,336-for7,869 ) with 449 doubles, 278 home runs and 1,257RBI in 2,076 games. A five-time AL All-Star (1997-2001), fourtime Gold Glove winner (1997-2000) and one-time Silver Slugger Award recipient (2002), Williams won the 1998 AL batting title with a .339 average. A four-time World Series champion (1996, '98, '99, 2000), he is the Yankees' all-time postseason leader in HR (22) and RBI (80) and ranks third in games played (121). He was named the 1996 ALCS MVP after batting .474 (9-for-19) with 2HR and 6RBI in the Yankees' five-game victory over the Orioles. In Game 1 of the 1999 ALCS vs. Boston, he hit a memorable 10th-inning, "walk-off" home run.

He was killed in an air training accident on Oct. 12, 1918, in Cazaux, France at age 24 .

## Yankees Captains

The function of a team captain in baseball has changed over time. Early 20th century baseball rules required teams to designate an active, uniformed player as captain to do many things a modern-day manager typically would take care of, such as changing pitchers, positioning fielders and arguing with umpires. Non-playing managers at that time were limited to directing players from within the confines of the dugout. By the mid-1910s, however, managers assumed the modern responsibilities they have today, and the designation of captain became largely ceremonial. (Please note that extensive research efforts have not uncovered if the Yankees had a captain in 1912. Additionally, Everett Scott filled the role of captain during the 1922 and 1923 World Series).

## All-Time Numerical Roster

In 1929, the New York Yankees and Cleveland Indians became the first teams to make numbers a permanent part of the uniform. Other teams quickly adopted the idea and, by 1932, uniform numbers became standard for all teams. The Yankees' initial distribution of numbers was made according to the player's spot in the batting order. Therefore, in 1929, leadoff hitter Earle Combs wore No. 1; Mark Koenig No. 2; Babe Ruth No. 3; Lou Gehrig No. 4; Bob Meusel No. 5; Tony Lazzeri No. 6; Leo Durocher No. 7; Johnny Grabowski No. 8; Benny Bengough No. 9; and Bill Dickey No. 10 (Grabowski, Bengough and Dickey shared catching duties). After some exhaustive research, the Yankees' Media Relations staff compiled the following list of Yankees uniform numbers.

## OPENING DAY HOME RUNS

The Yankees have hit 104 Opening Day home runs in franchise history by 63 different players, most recently in 2018, when Giancarlo Stanton hit two at Toronto (including one in his first PA as a Yankee). Prior to Stanton, Joe Pepitone (pictured) was the last Yankee to homer twice on Opening Day (1963).

Babe Ruth hit a franchise-high five OD-HRs, and he is followed by Yogi Berra, Mickey Mantle and Jorge Posada (4HR each). Jorge Posada and Curtis Granderson (2010 at Boston) are the most recent pair of Yankees to hit back-to-back homers in an opener, and they marked the first Yankees to accomplish the feat since Dave Winfield and Steve Kemp in 1983 at Seattle.

The 1923 Yankees - The first World Series-winning team in franchise history
Led by Manager Miller Huggins, the 1923 Yankees went 98-54 during the regular season before winning the first World Series in franchise history, 4-games-to-2 over the New York Giants. The season was a turning point for the Yankees in many ways, most notably because it marked the inaugural season of the original Yankee Stadium. The victory also established the Yankees as New York City's dominant team after losses to John McGraw's Giants in the prior two Fall Classics, 5-games-to-3 in 1921 and 4-games-to-0 (with one tie) in 1922.

## First Home Runs in Franchise History <br> Courtesy of the Elias Sports Bureau

The first home run in franchise history was hit by John Ganzel on May 11, 1903. It was a fifth-inning, inside-the-park, solo homer at the Detroit Tigers' Bennett Park off George Mullin in an 8-2 Highlanders victory.
The first home run hit at home in franchise history was by Ernie Courtney on June 1, 1903, at Hilltop Park off Boston's Tom Hughes. The two-run, one-out homer in the bottom of the ninth accounted for the Highlanders' only runs in an 8-2 loss.


## 1921 American League Champion Yankees

The first pennant-winning team in franchise history
The Yankees won their first American League pennant in 1921, finishing 98-55, 4.5 games ahead of Cleveland. The club was led by Babe Ruth, who batted .378 (204-for-540) with 59HR and a career-high 171RBI. Carl Mays (27-5), Waite Hoyt (19-13) and Bob Shawkey (18-12) fronted a pitching staff that allowed the fewest earned runs in the American League (579). In the World Series, the last of Baseball's three-year experiment with a nine-game format, the Yankees were defeated 5-games-to-3 by the Giants, with whom they shared the Polo Grounds. Hoyt, who lost Game 8, 1-0, on an unearned run in the first inning, went 2-1 (27.0IP) in three complete games. Injuries suffered by Ruth in Game 2 (cut arm while sliding, which later became infected) and Game 5 (wrenched knee) limited him to just one pinch-hitting plate appearance in the final three games of the Series.

## Perfect Games

## Don Larsen - Oct. 8, 1956 <br> World Series Game 5 vs. Brooklyn at Yankee Stadium

With the 1956 World Series knotted at two games apiece, Don Larsen authored what many consider the greatest game ever pitched, a 2-0 perfect game over the Brooklyn Dodgers in front of 64,519 at Yankee Stadium.

Amazingly, Larsen didn't even know he was going to be pitching that day until he got to the Stadium. As was the Yankees' tradition at the time, he arrived in the clubhouse to find a brand new baseball placed in one of his shoes by coach Frank Crosetti, which was manager Casey Stengel's way of letting a pitcher know he was being tabbed to start.

Larsen's date with history came on the heels of a disastrous start in Game 2 in which he was pulled with a 6-1 lead with two out in the second inning. He faced just 10 batters in the outing, allowing four unearned runs on four walks and a single in a game that the Yankees ultimately lost, 13-8.

After realizing he was getting the Game 5 start, Larsen went into the training room and took a nap, only to be awakened less than an hour before the first pitch.

According to the 6-foot-4-inch righthander, he had the best control of his career on that October day, reaching three balls once in the entire game with a full count on Pee Wee Reese in the first inning.

The perfect game was preserved by three notable fielding plays. In the second inning, Jackie Robinson was retired on a groundout that ricocheted off 3B Andy Carey's glove to SS Gil McDougald, who threw out the speedy infielder at first. Additionally, Brooklyn's Gil Hodges was robbed twice, first on a fly to deep left center that was tracked down by CF Mickey Mantle and again in the eighth by Carey on a low liner.

Brooklyn starter Sal Maglie held the first 11 Yankees batters off the bases until Mantle's fourth-inning solo homer into the right-field stands. The balance of the scoring came on Hank Bauer's sixth-inning RBI single which brought in Carey, who had been advanced to second on a sac bunt by Larsen.

In the ninth, Larsen set down Carl Furillo on a fly to right before getting Roy Campanella on a grounder to 2B Billy Martin. As his last gasp, Dodgers manager Walter Alston sent pinch-hitter Dale Mitchell to bat but he was famously called out on strikes by National League umpire Babe Pinelli, who was calling his final game behind the plate after a distinguished career.

The momentum from the win did not carry over to Game 6 at Ebbets Field as Yankees starter Bob Turley lost a 10-inning duel with Brooklyn's Clem Labine, 1-0. Game 7, however, was a romp as sophomore pitcher Johnny Kucks tossed the game of his life, shutting out the Dodgers, $9-0$, on three hits and three walks to give the Yankees' their 17th World Championship and avenge their seven-game Series loss to Brooklyn in 1955.

Larsen's performance was the sixth perfect game all time, fourth in the modern era and first since the White Sox's Charlie Robertson blanked Detroit, 2-0, on April 30, 1922, at Navin Field. It remains the only perfect game in postseason history.

Larsen played with seven franchises over his 14-year Major League career, finishing with an 81-91 record. He tallied a 45-24 mark in five seasons with the Yankees before being part of the Dec. 11, 1959, trade that brought Roger Maris to New York from the Kansas City Athletics.

## David Wells－May 17， 1998 vs．Minnesota at Yankee Stadium

The 1998 season was full of highlights for the Yankees，a team that went 114－48 on the way to a World Series title．But one of the season＇s signature moments came on＂Beanie Baby Day＂in front of 49，820 fans at Yankee Stadium when David Wells pitched the second perfect game in franchise history， matching the feat of Don Larsen，who，like Wells， attended Point Loma H．S．in San Diego．

By the time the game rolled around to the seventh，Wells and his teammates were well aware of what was taking place．The only player willing to talk to him was pitcher David Cone，who tried to ease the tension by saying，＂I think it＇s time．．．to break out the knuckleball．＂

The 34－year－old lefthander struck out nine of his first 17 hitters and 11 over the game，including Twins catcher Javier Valentin three times．He reached three balls on just four batters．

The Yankees gave Wells an early lead，scoring runs on a wild pitch in the second and a Bernie Williams solo－HR in the fourth．They tacked on two more in the seventh on an RBI triple by Darryl Strawberry and an RBI single from Chad Curtis．

In the ninth，Wells got leadoff hitter Jon Shave to pop to Paul O＇Neill in right and Valentin to strike out swinging．Pat Mears made the final out，flying out to O＇Neill．Delirious fans cheered Wells being carried off the field on his teammates＇ shoulders．Then they filed out too，clutching their Beanie Babies．

## David Cone－July 18， 1999 vs．Montreal at Yankee Stadium

Fans arrived at Yankee Stadium on July 18，1999，to celebrate Yogi Berra Day，but they left saluting David Cone．The righthander needed just 88 pitches to throw the third perfect game in Yankees history in front of 41,930 fans and a host of legendary Yankees，including Don Larsen，who threw out the game＇s ceremonial first pitch．

On a day in which the temperature hovered in the 90 s，the Yankees gave Cone a 5－0 second－inning lead via a pair of two－ run homers from Ricky Ledee and Derek Jeter sandwiched around an RBI－double by Joe Girardi．

Cone＇s masterpiece，just one season removed from David Wells＇perfect game at Yankee Stadium，was a picture of economy．Of the last 20 regular season and postseason perfect games thrown since 1922，Cone required the fewest pitches．It also gave the Yankees a record three perfect games in their history，a mark since tied by the White Sox（Charlie Robertson，Mark Buehrle and Philip Humber）．It was the third perfect game at the original Yankee Stadium－the most for any single venue．

Over the course of the game，Cone got 13 outs in the air，four on the ground and 10 via strikeout．The closest he came to allowing a baserunner was with one out in the eighth，when second baseman Chuck Knoblauch made a nice play ranging far to his right before throwing out Jose Vidro at first．The final out was a foul pop to third off the bat of Orlando Cabrera， which was snagged by the sure－handed Scott Brosius．Cone＇s gem remains the only perfect game in the history of regular season Interleague Play．

## All－Star Selections and Starts

The Yankees have had 425 all－time All－Star selections（ 55 pitchers with 134 selections；and 75 position players with 291 selections）． Additionally，the AL team has been skippered by nine different Yankees managers on 32 total occasions．

According to Major League Baseball，on three occasions Yankees elected to start the game were ultimately replaced in the starting lineup （OF Reggie Jackson by Fred Lynn in 1978，SS Derek Jeter by Asdrubal Cabrera in 2011，and 3B Alex Rodriguez by Adrian Beltre in 2011）． Conversely，there have been five Yankees who have started the game after replacing the originally elected starters（Bobby Murcer replacing Tony Oliva in the OF in 1971，Thurman Munson replacing Carlton Fisk at C in 1974，Willie Randolph replacing Paul Molitor at 2B in 1980，Graig Nettles replacing George Brett at 3B in 1980，and Derek Jeter replacing Alex Rodriguez at SS in 2000）．

There have been 12 Yankees rookies selected to the ASG（Joe DiMaggio－1936，Joe Page－1944，Spec Shea－1947，Bobby Richardson－1957， Ryne Duren－1958，Tom Tresh－1962，Willie Randolph－1976，Hideki Matsui－2003，Dellin Betances－2014，Masahiro Tanaka－2014，Aaron Judge－2017 and Gleyber Torres－2018）．

In 1939，Lou Gehrig（who retired earlier that season）was named an honorary AL team member．That selection is not included in the totals below．
Formal balloting was not conducted by Major League Baseball in 1945，when the All－Star Game was canceled due to WWII travel restrictions．The AP polled 13 of 16 AL managers who unofficially voted RHP Hank Borowy，1B Nick Etten，2B Snuffy Stirnweiss and 3B Oscar Grimes as All－Stars，with the former three as starters．However，the 1945 voting was unofficial and is not included in the totals below．

# All－Star Games at the Original Yankee Stadium 

The Yankees have hosted four All－Star Games，including the 2008 Midsummer Classic in the original Yankee Sta－ dium＇s final season．The Stadium also hosted the All－Star Game in 1977 （ $\left.48^{\text {th }}\right), 1960$（ $29^{\text {th }}$ ）and 1939 （seventh）．Only Cleveland＇s old Municipal Stadium hosted as many All－Star Games as Yankee Stadium．Overall，New York City has hosted nine MLB All－Star Games，the highest total in Major League history，with the Polo Grounds（1934 and 1942），Ebbets Field（1949），Shea Stadium（1964）and Citi Field（2013）also serving as host sites．The 2008 game marked the first time the Midsummer Classic was held in the host team＇s final season at its ballpark．

## Seventh All－Star Game <br> American League 3，National League 1 July 11，1939，Yankee Stadium

Yankee Stadium was chosen to host the 1939 All－Star Game due to the World＇s Fair which was being held at Flushing Meadows in Queens during the 1939 season．The Cubs＇ Gabby Hartnett managed the National League squad while Yankees skipper Joe McCarthy led the American League team，which featured nine Yankees All－Stars（Crosetti， Dickey，Dimaggio，Gomez，Gordon，Murphy，Rolfe，Ruffing， Selkirk），six of whom started．Additionally，Lou Gehrig（who retired earlier that season）was named an honorary member of the AL squad．Yankees centerfielder Joe DiMaggio went 1 －for－4 in the game，hitting a solo home run．

## 29th All－Star Game

National League 6，American League 0
July 13， 1960 （Game \＃2），Yankee Stadium
Yankee Stadium was the host site for baseball＇s second All－Star Game in three days in 1960．The National League completed the All－Star sweep with a 6－0 win，having won Game 1 on July 11 in Kansas City，marking the only year that both All－Star games were won by the same team． Yankees hurler Whitey Ford was the starting pitcher for the AL squad，while fellow Yankees Yogi Berra（catcher）， Mickey Mantle（left field），Roger Maris（center field）and Bill Skowron（first base）all appeared in the starting lineup． The National League used six different pitchers to combine on the shutout effort and hit an All－Star record－tying four home runs，including one by Willie Mays．The 38，000 fans who attended the game witnessed Ted Williams in his final All－Star appearance．

## 48th All－Star Game

National League 7，American League 5 July 19，1977，Yankee Stadium

Showcasing its renovation，Yankee Stadium hosted the All－Star Game on July 19，1977，in a game dedicated to Jackie Robinson．With the Yankees defending their 1976 pennant，Billy Martin managed the AL team on his home field．The National League won its sixth consecutive All－Star Game，part of the Senior Circuit＇s 11－game win streak．Joe Morgan opened the game with a home run off Jim Palmer as the NL squad scored four first－inning runs． Yankees outfielder Reggie Jackson and second baseman Willie Randolph were AL starters．National League Manager Sparky Anderson described the game＇s final score by saying，＂the only reason we＇re here is to kick the living hell out of those guys．＂

## 79th All－Star Game

American League 4，National League 3 July 15，2008，Yankee Stadium

In the final Midsummer Classic at the original Yankee Stadium，the American League emerged with a 4－3 win in 15 innings as Texas＇Michael Young brought home Minnesota＇s Justin Morneau with a＂walk－off＂sacrifice fly．The 4－hour， 50－minute contest was the longest All－Star Game time－ wise and tied for the longest ASG in innings（also 1967 at Anaheim，2－1 NL win）．It was the AL＇s 12th straight All－Star Game victory and ensured American League home－field advantage in the World Series．SS Derek Jeter started and recorded the game＇s first hit in the first inning．RHP Mariano Rivera pitched 1.2 scoreless innings．Yankees Manager Joe Girardi joined the AL coaching staff as did Yankees Head Athletic Trainer Gene Monahan，who made his fourth All－ Star Game appearance（also 1977，＇86 and＇92）．Pregame ceremonies included 49 Hall of Famers，marking one of the largest gatherings of living baseball HOFers ever．The festivities were highlighted by Yankees Principal Owner／ Chairperson George Steinbrenner，who delivered baseballs to the ceremonial first pitch participants（Reggie Jackson， Whitey Ford，Yogi Berra and Goose Gossage）．

## Exhibition Games vs. Mets/Dodgers/Giants

## Notable Exhibitions between the Yankees, Dodgers and Giants

The Yankees, Dodgers and Giants played a number of preseason games against each other over the years in Florida and on the East Coast (while heading north from spring training). The clubs also played games in New York just prior to the start of the season. Additionally, many in-season exhibitions were arranged, including the Mayor's Trophy Games (noted in left column) and other charitable endeavors. Some of the most notable games are listed below.
July 4, 1909-AtWashington Park in Brooklyn, the Yankees dropped a benefit game for newsboys, 7-3. Due to a rule banning exhibition games between teams of the AL and NL, the catchers and pitchers switched teams for the contest.
Sept. 4, 1910-The Yankees defeated the Giants, 4-2, in a newsboys benefit at Washington Park in Brooklyn, with various Dodgers (then known as the Superbas) playing for both teams.
October 1910 - The Yankees and Giants faced each other for the first time in a series of exhibition games following the 1910 regular season (while the World Series was contested elsewhere). Pitcher Christy Mathewson won three of the games as the Giants won the series, 4 games to 2 . In a similar exhibition rematch after the 1914 regular season, the Giants again defeated the Yankees, 4 games to 1.
Apr. 21, 1912 - At the Polo Grounds, the Yankees and Giants staged a benefit game for survivors of the Titanic. The Giants won, $11-2$, as $\$ 9,425.25$ was raised before a crowd of 14,083 .
Apr. 5 and 7, 1913-The Yankees helped the Dodgers (known then as the "Superbas") open Ebbets Field with an exhibition game won by Brooklyn, 3-2, in front of approximately 30,000 fans. Dodgers rookie outfielder Casey Stengel hits the park's first unofficial home run. Two days later, in icy conditions before approximately 1,000 fans at Ebbets field, the Yankees came out on top, 8-4.
Sept. 30, 1917-On a tiny field at Fort Hamilton in Brooklyn, the Yankees defeated the Dodgers (then known as the Robins), 11-8. Seven "home runs" were hit in a game played for soldiers soon to be sent off to fight in World War I.
Sept. 9 and 24, 1931-The three local clubs played a two-day, roundrobin with proceeds going to the Mayor's Unemployment Fund. In the first game in front of 60,549 fans at Yankee Stadium, the Yankees defeated the Giants, $7-3$, netting $\$ 59,642$ as Babe Ruth hit the game's only home run. On Sept. 24, the teams played a doubleheader at the Polo Grounds, bringing in $\$ 48,135$ for the fund with 44,119 fans on hand. The Giants defeated Brooklyn, 3-1, in Game 1 and the Yankees defeated the Dodgers (then known as the "Robins"), 5-1, in Game 2 behind homers from Lyn Lary, Bill Dickey and Lou Gehrig. Contests among the players were held in between games, including Babe Ruth hitting the longest fungo ( 421 ft ., 8 in .) and Ben Chapman making the longest throw ( 392 ft ., 10 in .).
June 26, 1944 - The Yankees, Giants and Dodgers played a mid-season"three-cornered" exhibition game at the Polo Grounds, which generated over $\$ 6.5$ million worth of war bond sales. Each team batted in six innings and played defense for six innings with Brooklyn coming out on top (Dodgers 5 - Yankees 1 - Giants 0 ). The clubs reprised the format for the sake of charity five years later (see entry for July 11, 1949).
July 9, 1945-The Yankees defeated the Giants, 7-1, in a rain-shortened 7 -inn.game in front of 41,267 at the Polo Grounds. The contest was one of seven interleague games in the Majors to benefit the war effort and serve as a substitute for the All-Star Game, which had been canceled.
July 11, 1949 - In a reprise of their June 26, 1944, exhibition game at the Polo Grounds (see above), the Yankees, Giants and Dodgers played a three-cornered"Night of Champions" benefit game for the N.Y. Heart Fund, Babe Ruth Foundation and Lou Gehrig Memorial Fund. Approximately $\$ 32,000$ was raised as 26,120 Yankee Stadium spectators saw Brooklyn win on total runs, 6 to 3 to 3 .
Oct. 12, 1958-In a rare postseason exhibition at Yankee Stadium, a team of AL All-Stars led by Mickey Mantle lost to a team of NLAll-Stars led by Willie Mays, 6-2, in front of 21,129.
May 7, 1959-At the L.A. Coliseum in front of a record baseball crowd of 93,103 , the Yankees defeated the Dodgers, 6-2, with net proceeds going to benefit recently paralyzed catcher Roy Campanella.

June 27, 1960 - The Dodgers defeated the Yankees, 4-3, in front of 53,492 in their first game at Yankee Stadium since Don Larsen's perfect game in the 1956 World Series.
July 24, 1961 - The Giants defeated the Yankees, 4-1, in front of 47,346 at Yankee Stadium. Mickey Mantle's solo HR accounts for the Yankees' only run.

## Mayor's Trophy Game

In the majority of seasons from 1944-83, the Yankees played the Giants, Dodgers or Mets in an annual mid-season exhibition game. The Mayor's office began sponsoring the contests beginning in 1946 and awarded a trophy to the game's winner. The proceeds from each game supported sandlot baseball programs and other New York charities. The Yankees won 20 of the 32 Mayor's Trophy Games played going 7-1 vs. the Giants, $3-2$ vs. the Dodgers and 10-8-1 vs. the Mets.

> The Yankees and Mets used to meet on a regular basis in spring training, dating back to the Mets'inaugural season in 1962. The very first game between the clubs was a 4-3 Mets victory on March 22, 1962, at their spring facility in St. Petersburg. The clubs met twice during the spring last year, with the Yankees winning both games (3/7/18 at Port St. Lucie, 11-4; and 3/10/18 at GMS Field, 10-3). The clubs are not scheduled to meet during 2019 spring training.

## Forfeited Games

The Yankees have played in four forfeited games in their history（described below），winning them all．Player statistics from forfeited games count in the historical record，however the final score of each game is officially recorded as 9－0． Interestingly，a forfeited game precipated the creation of the Yankees franchise．
The Baltimore Orioles were a charter member of the American League in 1901．Prior to their game vs．St．Louis on July 17，1902，New York Giants owner Andrew Freedman and Cincinnati Reds owner John T．Brush gained a controlling interest in Baltimore with the help of its former manager John McGraw．The two owners then sent almost all of the Orioles players to their respective NL teams，leaving the Orioles unable to field a squad．Though the they were forced to forfeit that day，the American League soon stepped in by providing players from other teams so they could finish the season．At the end of the season，the Orioles were dissolved and a new franchise filling its AL spot was established in New York in 1903.

In their short time in Baltimore，the Orioles also participated in three other forfeits，all of which were losses（May 31， 1901 at Detroit；August 21， 1901 vs．Detroit；and June 28， 1902 vs．Boston）．

July 2， 1906 at Philadelphia（Game 2）：With two outs in the bottom of the ninth inning and the Highlanders leading，5－1，Columbia Park spectators started swarming the field．According to The New York Times，＂the three or four policemen on hand to handle the crowd of 11,000 spectators were powerless．＂After waiting 15 minutes， umpire Timothy C．Hurst forfeited the game to the Highlanders．

September 3， 1906 vs．Philadelphia（Game 2）：With two outs in the bottom of the ninth and the Highlanders trailing，3－1，with runners on second（Willie Keeler）and third（Wid Conroy），Jimmy Williams hit a grounder to A＇s shortstop Monte Cross．Keeler ran into Cross just as he was about to handle the ball，allowing the ball to roll into outfield and Conroy and Keeler to score，tying the game．After a heated argument from A＇s first baseman and captain Harry Davis，umpire Frank O＇Loughlin awarded the game to New York．

June 13， 1924 at Detroit：At the start of the ninth inning at Navin Field with the Yankees leading，10－6，Tigers pitcher Bert Cole threw a pitch that narrowly missed hitting Babe Ruth in the head．Cole immediately hit the next batter，Bob Meusel，with a pitch in the ribs．Meusel＇s protest incited a riot，leading to both benches becoming involved and the storming of the field by incensed fans．Umpire William G．Evans was forced to forfeit the game to the Yankees when the field could not be cleared．Ultimately，Meusel was fined $\$ 100$ and suspended 10 days，Cole was fined $\$ 50$ and suspended 10 days，and Ruth received a $\$ 50$ fine but no suspension．AL President Ban Johnson said of the fights that day，＂They must be staged in a vacant lot，far removed from the ball parks．＂

September 30， 1971 at Washington：At Robert F．Kennedy Stadium，unruly fans cascaded onto the field with two outs in the top of the ninth inning and the Senators winning，7－5，in the last game before the Senators＇relocation to Texas for the 1972 season．After three minutes of on－field chaos，including the bases literally being stolen，the umpires awarded the Yankees the victory．

During the Series he went 2-1 in three starts, allowing just 5ER in 25.0 IP with two walks and 16 strikeouts. The title was the Yankees' second in a row and their 10th in a 16 -year span dating to 1947 . For Terry, his clutch Game 7 performance was a measure of redemption. Two years earlier he allowed Bill Mazeroski's Game 7,World Series-winning,"walk-off"home run, which gave Pittsburgh the 1960 championship even though the Pirates had been outscored by the Yankees, 5527, over the course of the Series.

## Yankee <br> 

The New York Yankees began a new chapter in their storied history with the opening of Yankee Stadium in 2009. Located directly across the street from the site of the original, the new Stadium's architecture is a celebration of the spirit and tradition of the franchise. While firmly rooted in the past, the Stadium has a vision toward the future, incorporating the best in technology and state-of-the-art guest services.

All of the Stadium's modern amenities exist within the framework of classic elements of the original, most notably the instantly recognizable frieze that again circles the grandstand. Among the countless fan-friendly elements, massive video boards give Yankees fans more information than ever before, and concessions have been placed on concourses that allow for continuous viewing of the game.

Yankee Stadium, as a living museum, has been designed to set the standard-much like the team has done with its 27 World Championships.

## HOMAGE TO THE ORIGINAL

The current Yankee Stadium evokes the spirit of the original, while restoring many of the lost treasures from before the renovations of 1974-75.

The signature frieze once again outlines the top of the Stadium bowl. As in the past, it is attached to a roof that extends into the Stadium, covering the top rows of the Grandstand.

Monument Park has been relocated to its original position in center field, albeit behind the fence, unlike before the renovation when the monuments were on the playing field. All plaques, monuments and tribute displays for the 22 Yankees who have had their numbers retired are on display for fans, who may visit Monument Park prior to all home games.

On the Main Level, near Section 210, the New York Yankees Museum presented by Bank of America-a museum within the living museum that is Yankee Stadium—presents Yankees history through displays of artifacts and memorabilia. Items include a "Ball Wall" with hundreds of signed baseballs from Yankees greats,
 Thurman Munson's locker from the original Yankee Stadium and a replica of a locker from the Yankees clubhouse in the current Stadium. On game days, fans are welcome in the museum beginning 90 minutes prior to the scheduled first pitch until the end of the eighth inning. On non-game days, visitors can enjoy the museum as part of Yankee Stadium tours.

Babe Ruth Plaza, located on the south side of the Stadium in between Gates 4 and 6, honors the man proverbially credited with building the original House that Ruth Built. Through a series of storyboards displayed on light posts, the Babe's life story is recounted throughout the plaza.

## THE STADIUM SITE

The Yankees are proud to play in the Bronx, which is home to approximately 1.5 million residents and is one of the five boroughs that make up New York City.

The Stadium sits on former parkland from Macombs Dam Park and Mullaly Park, with the Stadium grounds bounded by Jerome Avenue to the west, River Avenue to the east, and 161st Street to the south. The northern edge of the site is located between 162nd Street and 164th Street. In a nod to tradition, the footprint of the original Stadium has been replicated in the new Stadium.

Yankee Stadium is the fourth permanent home of the New York Yankees, following Hilltop Park (1903-12), the Polo Grounds (1913-
 22), and the original Yankee Stadium (1923-73, '76-2008). The Yankees also played two full seasons at Shea Stadium (1974-75) in Queens when the original Stadium underwent remodeling.

## INNOVATIUE ARCHITECTURE AND MODERN AMENITIES

One of the goals in building Yankee Stadium was to bring fans closer to the action in a facility more attuned to modern needs and expectations. The new building is 63 percent larger than the original Stadium with about 500,000 square feet of additional space.

Improved sight lines, wider concourses and the installation of nearly 1,400 high-definition video monitors throughout the Stadium all ensure guests won't miss a minute of on-field action while in their seats or at concession stands. In addition to the live game broadcast, these centrally controlled Internet protocol monitors can also provide up-to-the-moment news, scores, weather, traffic information and safety updates.

The Great Hall is a 31,000-square-foot space located between the Stadium's exterior wall and the interior of the Stadium. Spanning from Gate 4 to Gate 6, it is covered overhead but has massive open-air

Statue of Yogi Berra in the New York Yankees Museum presented by Bank of America archways, which help support the Yankees' green initiatives. It is home to large banners bearing the images of past Yankees greats from Babe Ruth and Lou Gehrig to more modern stars such as Don Mattingly and Paul O'Neill. A 24-foot-high-by-36-foot-wide


The Great Hall stretches from Gate 4 to Gate 6.

10 mm true high-definition video board and a 5 -foot-by- 386 -foot LED ribbon board immediately greet guests who enter through this portion of the Stadium.

The audio/visual experience at Yankee Stadium is highlighted by a 59-foot-high-by-101-foot-long 16 mm true high-definition centerfield video board, which is flanked by two smaller video boards that display day-of-game lineups, game-in-progress information, statistics and out-of-town scores. Additionally, the entire length of the Terrace Level is spanned by a 3-foot-high, 1,278-foot long full-color LED ribbon board. A distributed sound system optimizes speaker placement for audio quality vastly superior to that in the original Stadium. The entire Stadium is built with a future-proof infrastructure designed by Cisco Systems that is easily adaptable to new technologies. A 7,000-square-foot state-of-the-art FedEx Banquet and Conference Center is designed to meet the needs of guests who wish to host business functions in the ballpark.

## URBAN PLANNING

The site for Yankee Stadium was in part selected for its proximity to mass transit. Like the original Stadium, it is served at the 161st Street/Yankee Stadium subway stop by the No. 4, B and D trains.

Metro-North offers train service to Yankee Stadium from anywhere in its service territory, and Yankee Stadium is accessible by New York City Transit bus lines. For more information, call the MTA at 511 or visit www.mta.info.

Pedestrian access points are located at Yankee Stadium's four gates: Gate 2 on Jerome Ave. and 164th St.; Gate 4 at Jerome Ave. and 161st St.; Gate 6 at River Ave. and 161st St.; and Gate 8 at River Ave., south of 164th St.

There are many distinct retail stores in Yankee Stadium，including the Yankees Team Store behind home plate on the Field Level（which houses the largest selection of Yankees merchandise）and the Yankees Team Store at Gate 6，which is open year－round（Please call 646－977－8777 for store hours）．Additionally，Yankees－ Steiner authenticated memorabilia can be found a store located on the Field Level near Section 114A．

Yankee Stadium is also home to two premier dining establishments．The iconic Hard Rock Cafe Yankee


The Yankees Steakhouse is located at Gate 6. Stadium at Gate 6 is open year－round and houses music memorabilia and Yankees－related pieces． The Yankees Steakhouse at Yankee Stadium， located above the Hard Rock Cafe，offers an upscale dining experience，including dry aged USDA prime steaks，fresh seafood and an impressive collection of premium wines．

More casual fare can be found at the Pepsi Food Court on the third－base side of the Field Level concourse and in other locations throughout the Stadium．For more information，please visit＂Social Areas Open to All Fans at Yankee Stadium＂in this section of the book．

## DISABLED SERVICES

The Yankees strive to provide an accessible environment for all their Guests at Yankee Stadium． Wheelchair accessible and designated aisle seats are available at various price points and locations and include Yankees Premium seat locations．The Stadium also offers enhanced accessibility for Guests with hearing loss or low vision and for Guests who are deaf or blind．For more information，please e－mail disabledservices＠yankees．com or call（718）579－4510（voice）or（718）579－4595（TTY）．

There are two dedicated open－caption video boards for Guests who are deaf or have hearing loss： one in left field，just below Section 233B，and one in right field，just below Section 206．Captioning is also provided on the right－center field video board，the high－definition video board in the Great Hall， high－definition televisions throughout Yankee Stadium and on the video board in the New York Yankees Museum presented by Bank of America．

## COMMITMENT TO SAFETY

In 2012，Yankee Stadium became the first sports venue in the United States to be covered with a federal SAFETY Act designation and certification from the U．S．Department of Homeland Security．In 2017，Yankee Stadium became the first sports venue in the United States to be renewed under the SAFETY Act designation and certification by the U．S．Department of Homeland Security．

As part of Major League Baseball＇s initiative to standardize security procedures at all 30 Major League parks， all Guests are required to be screened via metal detectors before entering Yankee Stadium．These procedures， which result from MLB＇s continuing work with the Department of Homeland Security，are in addition to bag checks that are now uniform throughout MLB．

Due to the enhanced security measures，the Yankees strongly urge all fans to budget extra time for entry into the ballpark when planning their trip to the Stadium．
＂Nothing is more important to us at Yankee Stadium than the safety of the fans we serve，＂said Yankees Chief Operating Officer Lonn Trost．＂To that end，we are committed to the procedures that Major League Baseball and the Department of Homeland Security have asked us to implement．We want our fans to feel safe in Yankee Stadium，and our staff is dedicated to maintaining the highest security standards possible．＂

## BRONX INCENTIVES

Yankee Stadium is one of the premier building projects to take place in the Bronx in the last 60 years．The hard work and dedication of engineers，architects and construction professionals in building and designing the Stadium made the facility one of the most impressive and fan－friendly venues in the Majors．Equally important was the project＇s dedication to support local community groups，institutions and residents as the Yankees remain devoted to the long－term development of the Bronx．

Building a new state－of－the－art facility required an army of talented and experienced professionals．As part of the Yankees＇commitment to ensure the Stadium project created economic opportunities in the Bronx，the Yankees made a concerted effort to recruit a wide range of vendors and employees from the local community． Of the 190 contracts awarded， 63 were allotted to Bronx－based businesses（accounting for over 33 percent of the contracts and resulting in $\$ 133$ million in contracts to Bronx－based businesses）．The Yankees also stayed committed to hiring at least 25 percent of the total workforce from Bronx residents，again providing incentive to the surrounding community．

In conjunction with the construction of the Stadium，the Yankees also established a $\$ 1$ million grant for professional skills training for Bronx residents．Among the supported initiatives was Project H．I．R．E．（Help In Re－entering Employment），which taught Bronx residents functional construction skills for practical use in local building projects．

# SUSTANMABILTY INTHITITVES at Yankee Stadium 

# Listed below are some of the ecologically intelligent measures being taken at Yankee Stadium to help promote a sustainable environment. 

High Efficiency LED Lighting: Prior to the 2016 Major League Baseball season, the Yankees installed the newest, most efficient lighting in the world, known as light-emitting diodes (LED). At the time we installed LED field lighting, Yankee Stadium became only the second MLB stadium to use the most state-of-the-art energy-efficient lighting system available. The LED lights used at Yankee Stadium are 40\% more efficient and $50 \%$ brighter than the previous field lighting used at the Stadium, which were also the most efficient lights available for use at the time. Increased Color Temperature of the light produced results in higher contrast, improving player reaction time, alertness and visual acuity. Improved Color Rendering provides the truest colors the human eye can see. Reduced Flicker Rate means the lighting can now support UHD Ultra Slow Motion filming. Improved optical design with twice the aiming points reduces glare and light pollution, and the energy saved from the new field lighting is enough to power about 45 homes every day.

Energy Efficient Technologies and Design: The Great Hall at Yankee Stadium, through which the majority of guests arrive, is the largest open air public entry at any sports venue in the world, a 31,000 square-foot inspirational space spanning from Gate 4 to Gate 6 . By building this area with massive open-air archways that allow for natural cooling and ventilation, the space requires no air conditioning. Through the use of natural air-cooling, the energy savings per game is approximately the same as 125 New York City apartments shutting off their air-conditioning on a hot summer day. The Stadium's interior is controlled by automation technologies designed to identify and eliminate wasted or inefficient energy use. The Stadium's high tech energy management program ensures that energy use is reduced and the efficiency of all equipment used is optimized. The diverse systems used to operate Yankee Stadium are carefully calibrated to specific usage patterns, reducing the power consumption of lighting and ventilation systems when they're not needed.

Offsetting Unavoidable GHG Emissions: Even the most efficient operations engender unavoidable greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions. Stadium energy use, team and employee travel, motors that require fossil fuel use, non-recyclable waste generation, and occasional leaks of refrigerants are all examples of GHG impacts that the Yankees carefully measure and offset through a collaboration with The South Pole Group. The high quality, third party verified GHG offsets that the Yankees invests in are carefully chosen to advance the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals, benefitting communities in need in Africa by promoting new employment opportunities, improving health and safety, and protecting biodiversity. As a result, the Yankees are leading the way towards a low-carbon, more sustainable future.

Mass Transit: Yankee Stadium benefits from one of the greatest mass transit systems of any city in the world. Located within close proximity of the subway, Metro-North, buses and other mass transportation systems, visitors to Yankee Stadium have better access to mass transit than at any other stadium in Major League Baseball. Yankee Stadium owns no public parking garages, and guests and employees are encouraged to use public transportation in order to reduce the number of cars on the road and their GHG emissions.

## YANKEES ESTABLISH FIRST ENVIRONMENTAL SCIENCE APPOINTEE POSITION IN PROFESSIONAL SPORTS

On Jan. 29, 2019, the New York Yankees announced the creation of an environmental science advisor position, appointing recognized industry leader Dr. Allen Hershkowitz to the new role, the first of its kind in professional sports. The appointment represents a defining moment in the team's decades-long commitment to sustainability, and serves to deepen an existing dedication to environmentally-friendly practices and community-wide awareness. Recognized as one of the mostenvironmentally intelligent and healthiest sports venues in the world, with Hershkowitz as Environmental Science Advisor, the Yankees will look to further advance their efforts and invest in the development of best practices that can be adopted by organizations across the sport sector. Specifically, Hershkowitz will seek to guide a number of new and existing environmental initiatives for the Yankees and at Yankee Stadium, with a primary focus on the areas of energy use, waste management, water conservation, and food services.

## YANKEES RECOGNIZED BY NEW YORK STATE AS LEADER IN INNOVATION AND SUSTAINABILITY



At the 13th Annual New York State Environmental Excellence Awards on Nov. 15, 2016, the N.Y. State Department of Environmental Conservation recognized the Yankees among eight New York-based organizations for their state-of-the-art programs and commitment to environmental sustainability, social responsibility and economic viability.
"DEC is proud to present Environmental Excellence Awards to these eight businesses and organizations that have demonstrated outstanding leadership in adopting innovative solutions to protect our environment and enhance our economy," said DEC Commissioner Basil Seggos. "These projects set a high bar for others to follow in addressing critical environmental and public health issues such as increasing energy efficiency, cleaning up our waters, keeping materials out of landfills, and making our healthcare sector more sustainable."


## YANKEES WIN ENVIRONMENTAL LEADERSHIP AWARD FROM

 GREEN SPORTS ALLIANCEOn June 4, 2015, with former MLB Commissioner, Bud Selig, in attendance, the Yankees were the recipient of the 2015 Environmental Leadership Award, presented by the Green Sports Alliance. The award recognizes a sports team and venue that best exemplifies the practices of promoting a sustainable environment. Green Sports Alliance members represent nearly 300 sports teams and venues from 20 different sports leagues and 14 countries across the world. Yankees President Randy Levine (third from L) and V.P. of Stadium Operations Doug Behar (second from R) accepted the award on behalf of the organization.

Composting and Recycling：The Yankees are committed to achieving zero waste and promoting a circular economy based on composting，recycling，and the recovery and use of waste oil．Compostable cutlery and food－service packaging， trays，boxes，plates and cups，are used instead of non－compostable petroleum－ based plastics．Food waste is composted and not landfilled，and cardboard，glass， metal，plastics and paper are recycled．Through the overall efforts of fans and Stadium staff，approximately 85 percent of the Stadium＇s total trash is diverted away from landfills，making Yankee Stadium one of the most successful recycling venues in all of sports．The use of trash compactors for the small percentage of non－recovered waste at Yankee Stadium improves air quality by reducing the number of trash packer trucks needed．The trucks that are required use Ultra Low Sulfur diesel which produces fewer emissions into the air，and these emissions are offset by the Yankees．

Recovery of Waste Cooking Oil：During the course of a typical season，more


The Yankees installed new LED lighting prior to the 2016 season，reducing Yankee Stadium＇s carbon footprint． than 20，000 gallons of cooking oil from the Stadium are recovered and recycled． This oil is used to produce more than 18,600 gallons of biodiesel fuel which，when used in vehicles，results in a carbon reduction of more than 30,000 pounds－the equivalent of removing approximately 27 cars from the road for a year．

Water Conservation：Yankee Stadium is a responsible steward when it comes protecting New York City＇s precious and irreplaceable water system．Through careful monitoring and high efficiency plumbing fixtures，Yankee Stadium saves more than 3 million gallons of water each year，a reduction of 22 percent from water use prior to 2009.

Healthy Air Quality：Yankee Stadium uses high－performance filters and a regular replacement program to ensure particle removal effectiveness of MERV 13 or greater，for better air quality and energy efficiency in our HVAC system．

Smart Construction：The structural steel used in the construction of Yankee Stadium was fabricated from recycled material，and the concrete forms were reusable．Used recycled concrete aggregate was incorporated into the concrete design mix．All construction vehicles and equipment were required to use low－sulfur fuel．During construction， 75 percent of construction waste was diverted from landfills．

JUNE 15， 2005 －The Yankees announce plans for a new Yankee Stadium to be constructed on parkland north of $161^{\text {st }}$ Street－adjacent to the original Stadium＇s longtime site．

## Social Areas Open to All Fans at Yankee Stadium

On Oct. 24, 2016, the New York Yankees announced that Yankee Stadium would undergo its first series of major design enhancements which are intended to improve the Guest experience for fans of all ages. Enhancements prior to the 2017 season included numerous new social gathering spaces and additional dynamic food and beverage areas.
"We have listened to our fans and ticketholders and their top requests were for more family-friendly and sociallyoriented spaces at Yankee Stadium," said Yankees Managing General Partner Hal Steinbrenner. "Yankees fans will now have many more dedicated areas for spending time with Guests who have tickets in other sections of the Stadium, allowing all Guests to be able to enjoy the game from multiple vantage points while having unique food and drink options available to them. We are also especially excited to provide an engaging children's play area for families to utilize prior to and throughout the game. Having these types of spaces in Yankee Stadium is fundamental to the expectations of our fans, and we look forward to making them a huge part of the Yankee Stadium experience today and beyond."
The following Yankee Stadium food and drink locations are accessible to all Yankee Stadium Guests, regardless of their ticketed seats. Highlights include:

PLYMOUTH ROCK KIDS CLUBHOUSE: The Plymouth Rock Kids Clubhouse is Yankee Stadium's first-ever children's zone. Shaped like a mini-baseball field with a soft artificial surface, the 2,850 -square-foot area is located on the 300 Level in right field and outfitted with Yankees-themed playground equipment, including oversized baseballs, bases and baseball cards. The Kids Clubhouse is accessible to all Yankee Stadium Guests.
Children may play among the colorful fixtures, including a 6-foothigh replica World Series trophy. Parents can join their children on the play area or choose to oversee them from a nearby dugout. Television monitors ensure that no one misses any game action. There is also a shaded section of the play area with interactive exhibits, and the Clubhouse includes two family restrooms equipped with changing tables. Nursing mothers will have an additional private space, which includes lounge chairs, a television and power outlets for those using electric breast pumps.

"We want our youngest fans to feel as ifYankee Stadium is an extension of their local park or backyard,"Steinbrenner said. "The Kids Clubhouse is designed to nurture their love for experiencing games in person, while providing parents the resources they need to keep their children entertained prior to and during the game."

MASTERPASS BATTER'S EYE DECK: Located on the 200 level in center field with a clear, sweeping view of the entire Stadium, the Masterpass Batter's Eye Deck was expanded to 3,500 square feet with drink-rails overlooking the field. This outdoor gathering space features craft beers, cocktails and a large selection of food options.

BULLPEN TERRACES: Frank's RedHot Terrace in left field and the Toyota Terrace in right field (on the 100 Level in the former Sections 239 and 201, respectively) are open-air social gathering areas overlooking the visitors and Yankees bullpens. Both terraces feature
 their own specialty food and drink options. Drink-rail locations at the landings have power/USB outlets. As a result of the 2017 reconfiguration, all obstructed-view seats in the Bleachers have been removed.

BUDWEISER PARTY DECKS: The 300 Level of the Stadium includes Budweiser Party Decks at Sections 311 and 328 , featuring shaded stand-alone bar areas serving beer, cocktails and food. Drink-rail and barstool seating provides fans a relaxed and casual setting from which to enjoy sweeping views of the field and game action.

AT\&T SPORTS LOUNGE featuring DirecTV service: The AT\&T Sports Lounge featuring DirecTV service at Section 134 on the Field Level includes a full bar with craft beers and cocktails. Tables, stools and large-screen televisions tuned to the Yankees broadcast and other live sporting events provide a sports-bar atmosphere on the Stadium's main outdoor concourse in left field. Additionally, power/USB outlets are available for charging phones or tablets.


PEPSI FOOD COURT: Located between sections 125 and 127B on the Field Level, the Pepsi Food Court contains a wide variety food and drink options for all fans. Centered around a bar with large-screen televisions, fans may enjoy the wide-ranging fare at shaded tabletop seating.

## New York City FC

## History of the Original Yankee Stadium

One year after changing the course of Baseball history with the purchase of Babe Ruth from the Boston Red Sox, the Yankees made another acquisition that would forever alter the way the game was watched.

On February 5, 1921, the Yankees issued a press release announcing the purchase of 10 acres of property in the west Bronx. The land, purchased from the estate of William Waldorf Astor for $\$ 675,000$, sat directly across the Harlem River from the Manhattansituated Polo Grounds, which the Yankees had been unhappily sharing with their landlord, the New York Giants of the National League, since 1913.

The relationship between the clubs crumbled after the 1920 season when the Yankees' attendanceboosted by their new slugging sensation-doubled to almost 1.3 million, approximately 25 percent more than that of the Giants. In 1921, the Giants asked the Yankees to vacate the Polo Grounds as soon as possible. With their departure from the Polo Grounds now inevitable, Yankees co-owners Jacob Ruppert and Tillinghast I'Hommedieu Huston set out to build a spectacular ballpark of their own, Baseball's first triple-decked structure. With an advertised capacity of 70,000 , it would also be the first to be labeled a "stadium."

Original plans by the architect-the Osborn Engineering Company of Cleveland, Ohio-had the Stadium triple-decked and roofed all the way around. An early press release, in fact, described the Yankees' new home as a field enclosed with towering embattlements rendering the events inside "impenetrable to all human eyes, save those of aviators." But the initial grand design was quickly scaled back with the triple-decked grandstand not reaching either foul pole. Contrary to the owners'
wishes, the action would be visible from the elevated trains that passed by the outfield, as well as from the buildings that would spring up across River Avenue. Fortunately, a purely decorative element survived the project's early downsizing and would become the park's most recognizable feature. A 15-foot-high copper frieze adorned the front of the roof, which covered much of the Stadium's third deck. It would give Yankee Stadium a stately dignity that became its signature.

The new stadium would favor left-handed power hitters with the right-field foul pole only 295 feet from home plate (though the right-field fence would shoot out to 429 feet in right-center). The left-field pole measured only 281 feet from the plate, but righthanded hitters would be neutralized by a 395 -foot left field and a whopping 460 feet to left-center. The new stadium would also be patron-friendly, boasting an unheard of "eight toilet rooms for men and as many for women scattered throughout the stands and bleachers." (After the Stadium was remodeled 50 years later, it included more than 50 restrooms.) The club's executive offices would be moved from Midtown Manhattan and relocated between the main and mezzanine decks with an electric elevator connecting them with the main entrance.

The construction contract was awarded to New York's White Construction Company on May 5, 1922, with the edict that the job be completed "at a definite price" of $\$ 2.5$ million by Opening Day 1923. Incredibly, it was. In only 284 working days, Yankee Stadium was ready for its inaugural game on April 18, 1923 vs. the Boston Red Sox.

An announced crowd of 74,200 fans packed Yankee Stadium while thousands more milled around outside after the fire department finally ordered the
gates closed. Before the game began, John Philip Sousa and the Seventh Regiment Band led both clubs to the flagpole in deep center field, where the American flag and the Yankees' 1922 pennant were raised. Appropriately, Ruth christened his new home with a three-run homer to cap a four-run third inning as the Yankees coasted to a 4-1 win over the Boston Red Sox.

Because it was widely recognized that Ruth's tremendous drawing power made the new stadium possible, New York Evening Telegram sportswriter Fred Lieb dubbed it "The House That Ruth Built." Later that season, the Stadium hosted the first of 37 World Series, as the Yankees won their first World Championship by defeating their former landlord, the Giants. Of course, as the original Stadium became the stage for a staggering 26 world titles, it would also become known as "The Home of Champions."
In its early years, when wooden bleachers surrounded the outfield, a grass slope rose toward the outfield walls from foul pole to foul pole. Outfielders, especially Ruth in right, routinely backed up the small hill to pull down fly balls. Advertising signs lined the tops of the bleachers except in right-center, where a lone manually operated wooden scoreboard was large enough to record 12 innings for games played by every club in the two major leagues. Over the years, the board would be replaced by more modern models. The Yankees, in fact, would unveil Baseball's first electronic message board in 1959.

By 1928, the Stadium was ready for its first major face-lift. The tripledecked grandstand in left field was extended beyond the foul pole and several rows of box seats were removed in order to extend the left-field foul pole distance to 301 feet. The right-field grandstand was extended in 1937, allowing for "upperdeck" home runs in both directions. With the grandstand expansion, the remaining wooden bleachers were replaced with a concrete structure, and the distance to center field dropped from 490 feet to a stilldistant 461 feet.

In 1932, the Yankees began their tradition of commemorating their heroes with monuments and plaques when they dedicated a monument to Manager Miller Huggins, who had died suddenly during the 1929 season. Five more monuments were added (one each for Lou Gehrig, Ruth, Mickey Mantle

and Joe DiMaggio and one to honor the victims and heroes of the terrorist attacks of September 11, 2001) along with numerous plaques. For years, existing monuments were in the field of play in deep center field, and outfielders occasionally had to work around them to retrieve baseballs hit to that part of the park.

Except for the addition of lights in 1946, the look of Yankee Stadium remained relatively unchanged until the winter of 1966-67. Then, under the direction of the Yankees' new owner, CBS, the 44 -year-old facility received a $\$ 1.5$ million modernization, most of which was spent on 90 tons of paint. The brown concrete exterior was painted white as was the timeworn greenish copper frieze. Also, all of the grandstand seats went from green to blue, a color scheme that would be retained when the Stadium was completely remodeled after the 1973 season.

On August 8, 1972, after years of debate about the future of the aging ballpark, the Yankees signed a 30year lease with the City of New York, which called for Yankee Stadium to be completely modernized in time for the 1976 season. After completing the Stadium's 50th-anniversary in 1973, the Yankees moved to Shea Stadium for two seasons while the majority of Yankee Stadium was torn down and rebuilt.

The most striking change of the modernization was the removal of the numerous obstructive steel columns that supported the second and third decks, as well as the roof. By "cantilevering" the upper decks and lowering the playing field while increasing the slope of the lower stands, sight lines for fans were dramatically improved. Capacity was reduced from 65,010 in 1973 to 54,028 upon reopening as wider plastic seats replaced wooden seats.
Of course, with the removal of the original roof, the Stadium almost lost its most-recognizable feature: the copper frieze. However, an innovative design concept included an exact replica of the frieze atop the new 560 -foot-long scoreboard wall, which stretched across the rear of the bleachers. The board also included Baseball's first "telescreen," which could provide instant replays of the action by employing a then-incredible "nine shades of gray."

Yankee Stadium's exterior changed dramatically, as three escalator towers were added, one at each of the Stadium's three entrances. With seven additional

rows of seats added to the upper deck, the already grand Stadium received an even more majestic look. A 138 -foot Louisville Slugger-shaped smokestack, commonly called "The Bat," was added outside the Stadium near the home-plate entrance.

The renovated Stadium also saw the mammoth fence distances in left and center field greatly reduced as "Death Valley" in left-center was brought in from 457 feet to 430 feet, and straightaway center field was slimmed from 463 feet to 417 feet. Subsequent alterations prior to the 1985 and 1988 seasons brought fences in to the configuration that is now replicated in the current Yankee Stadium.
The remodeled original Yankee Stadium reopened on April 15, 1976-with the Yankees topping Minnesota, 11-4. Like its predecessor and successor, it hosted the World Series in its inaugural season. In fact, the remodeled Stadium hosted the Fall Classic in its first three seasons, as the Yankees followed their 1976 Series loss to Cincinnati by winning back-to-back World Series titles in 1977 and 1978 over the Dodgers.

As one of the world's most prestigious addresses, the original Yankee Stadium was also the home for scores of other sports, entertainment and cultural events. While the Yankees were on the road or in the offseason, the Stadium opened its gates to college and pro football, soccer, political assemblies, religious conventions, concerts and even the circus.
Boxing immediately found a home at Yankee Stadium with Benny Leonard winning a 15 -round decision over Lou Tendler for the lightweight title just three months after the gates opened on July 23, 1923. When Muhammad Ali stopped Ken Norton on September 28, 1976, it marked the 30th championship fight at the Stadium. All previous Stadium title bouts had taken place between 1923 and 1959-perhaps none more memorable than the June 22, 1938, heavyweight championship rematch between Joe Louis and Germany's Max Schmeling. After suffering a knockout loss in the initial non-title encounter at the Stadium two years earlier, Louis-now the heavyweight champavenged his defeat with a stunning first-round KO.
Football also became an immediate fixture at Yankee Stadium with Syracuse and Pittsburgh inaugurating a rich history of collegiate and professional matchups on October 20, 1923. Five years later at Yankee Stadium, on November 12, 1928, during halftime of a scoreless Army-Notre Dame contest, legendary coach Knute Rockne made his famous "Win One for the Gipper" speech, spurring the Fighting Irish to a $12-6$ victory.

I$n$ the bottom of the seventh inning of the Yankees' final home game on September 21, 2008, a taped valedictory was given on the Yankee Stadium video board by longtime public address announcer Bob Sheppard, who was unable to say goodbye in person as he continued to recover at home from an illness that had kept him away from the Stadium for the entire season. His appearance on screen brought a reverential hush to the crowd as everyone recognized they were about to hear the most perfect of all couplings perhaps for the last time-Bob Sheppard's voice reverberating in the original Yankee Stadium. He said the following:
> "Farewell, old Yankee Stadium, farewell. What a wonderful story you can tell. DiMaggio, Mantle, Gehrig and Ruth, A baseball cathedral in truth."

The New York Football Giants also called Yankee Stadium home from 1956 through 1973 and on December 28, 1958, took part in what has since been dubbed "The Greatest Game Ever Played." With the NFL championship at stake, a crowd of 64,185 watched the Baltimore Colts tie the game, 17-17, on a Steve Myrha field goal with seven seconds left. Eight minutes into professional football's first-ever "sudden-death" overtime period, the Colts' Alan Ameche crashed into the end zone from the 1-yard line, ending a contest that would help establish pro football as a major sport.

The Stadium was also an important stop for religious conventions, especially those of the Jehovah's Witnesses. In 1950, the group began holding conventions at the Stadium, including one that drew 123,707 people on August 3, 1958the largest single-day event in Stadium history. On October 4, 1965-with the Yankees out of the World Series for only the third time in 17 years-the Stadium held the first-ever Papal Mass in the United States as Pope Paul VI celebrated Mass before a crowd in excess of 80,000. Pope John Paul II also celebrated Mass at the original Yankee Stadium on October 2, 1979, during his tour of the United States.

On August 16, 2006, a groundbreaking ceremony was held for a new Yankee Stadium to be ready for the 2009 season. The location chosen for the new building was the north side of $161^{\text {st }}$ Street and River Avenue in the Bronx, directly across the street from the site of the original.
As part of its final season in 2008, Yankee Stadium hosted a third papal visit on April 20 from Pope Benedict XVI, NYU's commencement ceremony on May 14 (believed to be the firstever college commencement in Stadium history) and a 15 -inning, 4-3, AL victory in the All-Star Game on July 15 (the fourth at Yankee Stadium, joining Midsummer Classics in 1939, 1960-Game 2 and 1977).

The building took its final bow on Sept. 21, 2008, when the Yankees played the last game in Stadium history. Gates opened at 1:00 p.m., allowing approximately 13,000 fans the opportunity to visit Monument Park and walk around the warning track. With a national Sunday night audience watching on television, all-time Yankees greats, along with the evening's starting lineup, took their positions in the field before Julia Ruth Stevens, daughter of Babe Ruth, tossed out the ceremonial first pitch. Fittingly, the game ended in a Yankees victory, this one over the Baltimore Orioles, 7-3. After the final out, the club assembled by the pitcher's mound at the side of captain Derek Jeter. Over the PA, he thanked the crowd for their years of support, while reminding everyone of the new memories soon to be made. N

## Negro Leagues at the Original Yankee Stadium

For almost 20 years in the 1930s and '40s, Yankee Stadium was a regular home to Negro Leagues baseball. During that time the greatest black stars of the day drew thousands offans to watch players prohibited from playing in the Major Leagues at the time. Almost every Negro Leagues player of note over that two-decade stretch played at Yankee Stadium, including Hall of Famers Leroy "Satchel" Paige, John Henry "Pop" Lloyd, "Cool Papa" Bell, Oscar Charleston, Buck Leonard, Hilton Smith and Josh Gibson, who hit some of the longest home runs in the Stadium's history.

Yankee Stadium opened to black baseball on July 5, 1930, when Yankees owner Jacob Ruppert donated the free use of the facility to the New York Lincoln Giants and Baltimore Black Sox for a benefit doubleheader to raise money for the Brotherhood of Sleeping Car Porters, one of America's most prominent black unions. The games raised approximately $\$ 3,500$ and included the appearance of Bill "Bojangles" Robinson who entertained the crowd along with the $369^{\text {th }}$ Hell Fighters marching band.

Black baseball games at Yankee Stadium usually took place on Sundays when the Yankees played on the road. Sometimes a pair of teams would play a doubleheader, while at other times four-team doubleheaders were scheduled in order to maximize attendance and profits. Bands often performed and celebrities such as Joe Louis and New York City Mayor Fiorello LaGuardia were common. Track races and other pregame contests also delighted fans.

In 1931, Lloyd organized an AllStar team of black players named the "Harlem Stars," which played several games at Yankee Stadium. Eventually, that team became the New York Black Yankees of the Negro National League. The club went on to use Yankee Stadium for a portion of their home schedule between 1936 and 1947, often wearing the used uniforms of the Major League Yankees. In the

spring of 1941, Paige, black baseball's greatest pitcher, briefly joined the Black Yankees, pitching and winning his only game in a New York uniform at Yankee Stadium.

Yankee Stadium also served as the venue for black baseball All-Star games and championship contests. One of the most memorable Negro Leagues All-Star games took place on August 27, 1939, when the Negro National League defeated the Negro American League, 10-2, with the help of Gibson's bases-clearing triple.

Ruppert's death in 1939 did not put a stop to black baseball at the Stadium. In fact, the Yankees sponsored a Jacob Ruppert Memorial Cup tournament among Negro National League teams. Ten doubleheaders were held at Yankee Stadium that summer to determine a winner, and on September 24, 1939, the Baltimore Elite Giants were crowned champs in Ruppert's name.

In October 1946, Yankee Stadium was home to two noteworthy exhibition games between an AfricanAmerican All-Star team managed by Paige and an American League All-Star team led by future Hall of Famer BobFeller. Cleveland Indians pitcher Bob Lemon hit a home run to win the first game for the AL but Paige out-pitched Feller in the second game to earn a split.

When Jackie Robinson finally broke the color barrier with the Brooklyn Dodgers in 1947 (after having played at the Stadium as a member of the Kansas City Monarchs in 1945), it was a watershed moment in the history of civil rights in the United States. But it also precipitated the decline and eventual extinction of the Negro Leagues.

Black baseball's relationship with the New York Yankees came to a close on August 20, 1961, as stars of the Negro American League gathered for its All-Star Game at Yankee Stadium. Paige, reportedly 55 years old at the time, pitched three scoreless innings and claimed the game's Most Valuable Player honors. \#

## Previous Homes of the Yankees

## Hilltop Park

American League Park (commonly known as Hilltop Park) was the Yankees' first home. Hastily constructed in just six weeks on one of the highest points in Upper Manhattan, the all-wooden ballpark sat on a block bounded by Broadway, 165th Street, Fort Washington Avenue and 168th Street, in close proximity to the New York Giants' 157th Street home, the Polo Grounds. The first game at Hilltop Park was played on April 30, 1903-a 6-2 win over Washington, started by Hall of Famer Jack Chesbro.

The ballpark had a covered grandstand ringing the infield from first base to third base and uncovered bleachers running up the foul lines. There was seating for approximately 15,000 people, but as was the case in many ballparks of that time, it could accommodate overflow crowds both in the outfield and along foul ground in the infield, occasionally bringing capacity up toward 25,000.

When a fire ravaged the Polo Grounds on April 14, 1911, the Yankees allowed the Giants to play their home games at Hilltop Park until the Polo Grounds could be rebuilt. From April 15 through May 30, the Giants put together a 20-8 record at their temporary home.

The Yankees were successful in their 10 years at Hilltop Park, compiling a 398-342-8 all-time record there. The club's final game at the structure came on October 5, 1912 -an 8-6 win vs. Washington. After the Yankees' lease at Hilltop Park expired at the end of the season, they decided to leave the rickety ballpark to become renters at the Polo Grounds, where the Giants became their landlords. The move, unthinkable years earlier, was facilitated by the Yankees' post-fire hospitality.

In 1914, Hilltop Park was torn down. Currently, its former location is the site of NewYork-Presbyterian Medical Center.

## Polo Grounds

The Yankees called the Polo Grounds home from 1913 through 1922, sharing the park with the New York Giants. Located on West 157th Street and Eighth Avenue in Upper Manhattan, the Polo Grounds was overlooked by a promontory called Coogan's Bluff to the west. To the east was the Harlem River-on the other side of which Yankee Stadium was built in 1923.

The Polo Grounds was constructed with straight sides, and the outfield fences by the foul poles ran parallel to each other and away from home plate. The foul poles in left and right were approximately 277 and 258 feet away from the plate, respectively, while left-center, center and right fields were all in the range of 445-483 feet away from home.

The Yankees compiled a 416-338-10 all-time regular season record at the uniquely-shaped facility, winning the first two pennants in franchise history while tenants in 1921 and 1922. The club lost both of those World Series


The Polo Grounds, located on West 157th Street and Eighth Avenue in Upper Manhattan, served as the home of the Yankees from 1913-22. to the NL Champion Giants- 5 games to 3 in 1921 and 4 games to none with one tie in 1922-in Fall Classics played entirely at the Polo Grounds.

The American Leaguers were welcome tenants as long as they remained less popular than the Giants. But with Babe Ruth's arrival in 1920 and the team's subsequent success, the dynamic quickly changed. After the Yankees started outdrawing the Giants in their own park in 1920 and 1921, the National Leaguers asked the Yankees to vacate to a new facility as soon as possible. The 1922 season marked their final season in Manhattan before their April 18, 1923, Yankee Stadium debut in the Bronx.

The Polo Grounds remained home to the Giants until they moved to San Francisco in 1958. It stood empty until 1962 when the Mets arrived to play two seasons there before moving into Shea Stadium. In 1964, the Polo Grounds was demolished. Apartment buildings called the Polo Grounds Towers occupy the site today.

The current Yankee Stadium has been featured in film, appearing in The Adjustment Bureau (2011), Megan Leavey (2016) and Set It Up (2018), as well as episodes of television's Extreme Makeover: Home Edition (2010), Entourage (2011), White Collar (2012) and God Friended Me (2019). The Stadium was also the site of Mariah Carey's music video for her 2009 song "I Want to Know What Love Is," and has been featured in a handful of commercials and talk shows such as the Tonight Show Starring Jimmy Fallon and Late Night with Seth Myers.

## Monument Park

Since 1932，the New York Yankees have honored their all－time greats with the dedication of monuments and plaques in Yankee Stadium． The tradition continues in the current Stadium in Monument Park，located behind the outfield fence in center field．

The first monument was dedicated on May 30， 1932，to the memory of Miller Huggins，who died suddenly in 1929．The diminutive manager guided the Yankees to six American League pennants and three World Championships in his 11－plus seasons．

The first plaque was placed on the center－field wall in April 1940，a tribute to Jacob Ruppert，the former owner who built Yankee Stadium and brought the tradition of winning to the Yankees．

Two additional monuments followed：in 1941 for Lou Gehrig and in 1949 for Babe Ruth．Later plaques were placed in center field for General Manager Ed Barrow （1954）and two great Yankees center fielders， Joe DiMaggio and Mickey Mantle（1969）． After his death，Mantle＇s plaque was removed and replaced by a fourth monument on August 25，1996．On April 25， 1999，DiMaggio－who passed away less than two months earlier－

legends－the＂Voice of the Yankees，＂Mel Allen（1998）， and the＂Voice of Yankee Stadium，＂public address announcer Bob Sheppard（2000）．Yankees greats Don Mattingly（1997），Reggie Jackson（2002），Ron Guidry （2003）and Red Ruffing（2004）had their plaques added prior to the closing of the original Yankee Stadium．At the currentStadium，Tino Martinez，Goose Gossage，Paul O＇Neill and Joe Torre（all 2014），Bernie Williams，Willie Randolph，Mel Stottlemyre，Jorge Posada and Andy Pettitte（2015），Mariano Rivera（2016）and Derek Jeter

Plaques commemorating the visits of Pope Paul VI in 1965 and Pope John Paul II in 1979 were dedicated by the Knights of Columbus，and a plaque commemorating the Yankees＇interlocking＂NY＂ insignia was added to the park in 2001．A plaque was also dedicated in 2008 following the visit of Pope Benedict XVI，and another was added in 2014 to commemorate the 1990 visit of Nelson Mandela．

In 1985，after the left－center－field fence of the original Stadium was moved in，the Yankees were able to open Monument Park for up－close fan viewing． By 1988，long lines and increased fan interest caused the Yankees to move the fence in further and expand the area．A special walkway was added with an exhibit honoring those Yankees who have had their uniform numbers retired．

In a pregame ceremony on Sept．11，2002，the Yankees dedicated a monument in remembrance of the victims and heroes of the 9／11 tragedy．It was the sixth monument dedicated in Yankee Stadium and the first to non－Yankees personnel．

During a special pregame ceremony on Sept．20， 2010，the entire Yankees team joined the Steinbrenner family and Yankees alumni in unveiling a monument for longtime Principal Owner George M．Steinbrenner III，who passed away on July 13 of that season．

More recently in the current Yankee Stadium，a plaque commemorating the achievements of Jackie Robinson was added on Sept．22，2013－the same day the Yankees honored the career of Mariano Rivera．In all，there are seven monuments（for four Yankees players，one manager，one owner and one to commemorate the tragedy of 9／11）and 37 plaques （for 24 Yankees players，three
managers，one owner，one executive，one PA announcer， one broadcaster，three Papal visit commemorations， one honoring the visit and life of Nelson Mandela， one celebrating the life of Jackie Robinson and one noting the history of the Yankee Stadium on September 21， 2008.

was honored with the Stadium＇s fifth monument．（The two plaques which previously honored DiMaggio and Mantle were donated by the Yankees to the Yogi Berra Museum and Learning Center in Montclair，N．J．）．

Originally，the monuments，plaques and Stadium flagpole were located in the field of play on the warning track in straight－away center field， approximately 10 feet in front of the wall．On many occassions，long hits and fly balls forced fielders to go behind the monuments to retrieve the baseball．

One tradition of Yankee Stadium before it was remodeled was to allow fans to exit through the center－field gates via the warning track，where they could pause and reflect on the achievements of these honored legends．After the Stadium was remodeled in 1974 and 1975，the monuments and plaques were relocated to an area off the field between the Yankees＇ and visitors＇bullpens．

In 1976，two more plaques were added to memorialize managers Joe McCarthy and Casey Stengel．In the 1980s，plaques were dedicated to Yankees greats Thurman Munson （1980），Elston Howard and Roger Maris（1984），Phil Rizzuto（1985），Billy Martin （1986），Whitey Ford and Lefty Gomez（1987），Yogi Berra and Bill Dickey（1988），and Allie Reynolds（1989）．The team also dedicated two plaques to non－uniformed Yankees

\section*{Yankees Around the Globe}

A
sthe game of Baseball continues to grow on a global scale, "America's Pastime" has become infused with talent from every corner of the world.

The New York Yankees, as one of the most recognized brands in the world, are dedicated to making meaningful and lasting footprints throughout the international Baseball community.
The Yankees began the 2018 season with six foreign-born players, hailing from five nations outside of the United States (Cuba, Dominican Republic, Japan, the Netherlands, Venezuela). Shortstop Didi Gregorius of the Netherlands was one of only three European-born players to appear on a Major League Opening Day roster in 2018 (German-born Max Kepler of Minnesota, Lithuanian-born Dovydas Neverauskas of Pittsburgh).

Signing and developing exceptional talent from around the globe has become a trademark of the Yankees organization. Some of the club's acquisitions include 2019 Hall of Fame inductee and Panamá native Mariano Rivera, five-time All-Star Jorge Posada of Puerto Rico, seven-time All-Star Alfonso Soriano out of the Dominican Republic, twotime All-Star Hideki Matsui from Japan, and 2006 Cy Young Award runner-up Chien-Ming Wang from Taiwan. Japanese pitcher Masahiro Tanaka has been a stalwart in the Yankees starting rotation after signing via the posting system in 2014.

The organization has developed top minor league talent from around the world, placing three foreign-born players in the top-three of AL "Rookie of the Year" balloting since 2016 (Gary Sánchez, Miguel Andújar, Gleyber Torres). The Yankees have filled their minor league ranks in recent years by signing players from Australia, Brazil, Canada, China, Colombia, Cuba, the Czech Republic, Israel, Mexico, Nicaragua, Panamá, Poland, South Korea, Taiwan and Venezuela. In addition, the Yankees field a Dominican Summer League team and operate a state-of-the-art Latin Baseball Academy in the Dominican Republic.

In June of 2019, the Yankees will continue to do their part in growing the game by playing a two-game series against the rival Boston Red Sox in London, England.

\section*{The Latin Béisbol Academy}

For the vast majority of the Yankees' Latin American prospects, the Latin Béisbol Academy is the starting point for their professional careers.

Located in Boca Chica, Dominican Republic, the academy was constructed from scratch, allowing player development personnel to manage every detail of the project, from the trainer's room to the clubhouses to the classrooms. The finished product is a four-building, four-field complex with the capacity to house up to 110 players. There is also a small apartment building for coaches and instructors. Officially opening in June 2005 and finally completed in the spring of 2006, the academy has a campus-like feel to it that is not lost on the ballplayers, many of whom are spending time away from their families for the very first time.

Previously, the Yankees had leased a variety of facilities in Latin America for scouting and player development use, but it became apparent that it was necessary to develop their own facility.

As a dedicated investor in Latin American talent, the Yankees make every effort to provide their players with a well-rounded education off the field. The complex is staffed with educators who teach players academic disciplines such as Spanish and English, along with broad-based life skills such as conflict resolution, financial literacy and American customs. Players are also given guidance on how to deal with the heavy travel inherent to a baseball lifestyle. Throughout their time at the academy, the young Yankees hopefuls participate in clinics with local children, reminding them to always be mindful of their community.

The Yankees also arrange for past and present Major League stars, such as Mariano Rivera and Reggie Jackson, to be guest lecturers for the prospects. In November 2007, Yankees Manager Joe Girardi visited the Béisbol Academy. The players received a special visitor in January 2011 when professional boxing champion Miguel Cotto paid a visit.

The players and staff are also active in local community events, hosting annual instructional clinics in the Dominican Republic, Nicaragua and Venezuela. In addition, the Yankees' Latin complex has hosted R.B.I. (Reviving Baseball in the Inner City) tournament games, joined the Yankees organization in 2007 to donate \(\$ 65,000\) in food and cash to hurricane-damaged areas in the D.R. and Nicaragua, and adopted an orphanage in La Romana, D.R., supplying it with food, money and clothing. In 2013, the Yankees donated a fire truck and an ambulance-along with firefighting and medical equipment-to the city of Boca Chica.

In July 2010, Dominican Summer League players delivered gifts to ailing children at a local hospital in Santo Domingo. The Latin Béisbol Academy also played host to a fundraiser game in 2010 against the Dominican National Police Department to raise money for local charities throughout the D.R. And in 2011, select Yankees draft picks held a clinic in San Pedro de Macoris for more than 100 kids, handing out shoes, equipment and uniforms to participants.

The Yankees field a DSL team annually and won back-to-back titles in 2005-06. With the hard work and dedication of the Yankees Player Development staff, the organization looks forward to the future, when these young players will lead the way to a 28th World Championship in the Bronx.


\section*{Yankees Travel to Panamá}

In conjunction with Major League Baseball and the Major League Baseball Players Association, the Yankees traveled to Panamá prior to the 2014 season for the "Legend Series," a set of two exhibition games against the Miami Marlins at Panamá City's Rod Carew Stadium. The trip served as a tribute to the career of former Yankees reliever and Panamá native Mariano Rivera, who had capped off his Hall of Fame career by retiring as MLB's all-time saves leader at the conclusion of the 2013 season.

Rivera played host for the weekend, which featured a number of charitable events away from the field. Chief among them was a gala benefitting the Mariano Rivera Foundation, the proceeds of which supported the Children's Hospital in Panamá City, the largest pediatric hospital in the country. Yankees players also visited the hospital, bringing with them a large donation of toys and spending time with the children.

Rivera also took a Yankees contingent - including General Partner/Vice Chairperson Jennifer Steinbrenner Swindal, President Randy Levine, COO Lonn Trost, Manager Joe Girardi, hitting coach Kevin Long, bench coach Tony Peña, spring training instructor Willie Randolph, outfielder Brett Gardner and reliever David

The visit marked the first appearance by Major League Baseball in the Central American country since 1947, when the Yankees faced the Brooklyn Dodgers in several exhibition games on a trip that also included stops in Cuba, Puerto Rico and Venezuela.

\section*{Yankees Teach in Taiwan}

In January 2009, the Yankees joined the Chinese Taipei Baseball Association under the auspices of Major League Baseball in holding a clinic for high school pitchers, catchers and coaches at the National Taiwan Sport University's Taoyuan Campus in Taipei, Taiwan. It marked the Yankees' first-ever large-scale outreach in Taiwan and represented the club's initiative in cultivating baseball talent and increasing brand recognition in Asia and the greater international community. The five-day clinic focused on pitching and catching fundamentals and philosophy.

\section*{Yankees and Chinese Baseball Association Reach Memorandum of Understanding}

The New York Yankees and the Chinese Baseball Association (CBA) held a press conference in Beijing, China, on Jan. 29, 2007, to announce a Memorandum of Understanding that for the first time formalized a strategic alliance between a Major League Baseball club and the CBA. During the Yankees' 2009 World Series trophy tour, club officials met with the CBA in Beijing to further the cooperation agreement between the two entities.

The agreement, subject to Major League Baseball's rules, regulations and agreements pertaining to the People's Republic of China, states that the Yankees will provide the CBA with guidance in training baseball players, including sending coaches, player development staff, scouting and training personnel to China to assist the CBA. The partnership also allows the CBA to send staff to the Yankees' facilities in the United States in furtherance of those goals.

During their 2007 trip, the Yankees were represented in Beijing by team President Randy Levine, Senior Vice President and General Manager Brian Cashman, Vice President and Assistant General Manager Jean Afterman, and Vice President of Corporate Sales and Sponsorship Michael Tusiani. Beijing Womei Advertising Company Limited and Sportscorp China, headed by President and Managing Director Marc Ganis and Managing Director Kenneth Huang, coordinated the meetings and were instrumental in the Yankees' involvement in China.

The CBA was represented by Chairman Hu Jianguo, Secretary General Shen Wei and Deputy Secretary General Tian Yuan.

On June 16, 2007, the Yankees announced the signings of catcher Zhenwang Zhang and left-handed pitcher Kai Liu to minor league contracts, marking the first-ever acquisition by a Major League organization of Chinese baseball players. Both players were members of the Chinese National team that competed in the 2008 Olympics in Beijing.

\section*{Partners in Japan}

During the 2002 season, the Yankees entered into a working agreement with the Yomiuri Giants, winners of 22 Japan Series Championships. Pursuant to the agreement, the teams consented to share baseball information, ideas and strategies. Also in 2002, the Yankees pursued and signed three-time Central League MVP Hideki Matsui. A ninetime Japanese League All-Star and three-time home run champion, Matsui became the first bona fide power hitter to make the transition from Japan to the Major Leagues.

In 2004, the Yankees traveled to Tokyo to open the regular season against the Tampa Bay Devil Rays. The historic trip marked the 70th anniversary of Babe Ruth and Lou Gehrig's 1934 All-Star tour of Japan. It also recognized the anniversary of the founding of the Yomiuri Giants franchise, Japan's oldest professional baseball team. The two-game series was just the second-ever Major League season opener to take place in Japan. At the time, the two games were the highest-rated televised Major League games in Japan's history.

\section*{Yankees Championship Trophy Tour of the Dominican Republic，Japan and China}

Following their 2009 championship season，the Yankees embarked on a world tour with their 2009 World Series Trophy，traveling to the Dominican Republic and Asia．

A Yankees contingent took the championship trophy to the Dominican Republic for a three－day tour from Jan．7－9， 2010．The D．R．leg of the trophy tour included stops at the National Palace for a ceremony with President Dr．Leonel Fernández，who was joined by bench coach Tony Peña，and players Robinson Cano，Damaso Marte，Francisco Cervelli and Edwar Ramirez as well as by several Yankees minor leaguers．The next day，the Yankees visited the U．S．Embassy and the National Police Headquarters．That evening，the Yankees displayed the trophy for fans at the Dominican Winter League playoff game between the Licey Tigers and Escogido Lions at Quisqueya Stadium in Santo Domingo．


The Yankees＇ 2009 World Series trophy visited the MLB Café in Tokyo，where it was displayed alongside the Yomiuri Giants＇ 2009 Championship trophy． On their final day in the D．R．，the Yankees placed the trophy on display for residents of the town of Casa de Campo．

Threeweeks later，a Yankeesdelegation consisting ofteam President Randy Levine，SeniorVice Presidentand General Manager Brian Cashman，Vice President and Assistant General Manager Jean Afterman and Senior Vice President of CorporateSales andSponsorshipsMichaelTusianitookthetrophyonasix－day tourtoTokyo，Beijing and HongKongfrom Jan． 31 through Feb．5， 2010.

The contingent was met by fans and media at Tokyo＇s Narita Airport，marking this first－ever occasion of a Yankees World Series Trophy being brought to Asia．The next day，another historic moment took place at the MLB Café in Tokyo as the trophy was displayed alongside the Yomiuri Giants＇ 2009 Japan Series championship trophy．

From there，the trophy traveled to China，where fans in Beijing and Hong Kong had their first opportunity to gaze at Major League Baseball＇s grandest prize．The trophy tour in China was organized by QSL Sports，which has been active in the promotion of Baseball in the People＇s Republic of China and operates the China Youth Baseball League together with the Chinese Baseball Association．The events in China were hosted by QSL Sports，New World Department Stores（one of the largest owners and operators of department stores in China），and K11，the＂World＇s First Art Mall，＂which integrates elements of art，culture and nature，while elevating the shopping experience．

On Feb．3，2010，Yankees officials met with the CBA in Beijing to further the cooperation agreement between the two entities，after which the groups held a joint press conference at the Kunlun Hotel．Later that evening， the championship trophy made its first public appearance in China at the New World Department Store，which included traditional Chinese performances and ceremonies．Joining the Yankees delegation were CBA officials， New World representatives and the Beijing Yankees youth baseball team，which is part of MLB＇s＂Play Ball＂youth baseball program in China．

Hong Kong marked the final stop on the Asian tour，with a Feb．5，2010，event at the Hyatt Regency hotel adjacent to the recently－opened K11 Mall．The next morning，the trophy was introduced to players and fans during the opening ceremony for the 2010 Phoenix Cup，Hong Kong＇s International Women＇s Baseball Tournament．

The Yankees thank their partner Delta Air Lines for ensuring the safe transportation of the World Series trophy and appreciate the efforts of Sportscorp China，led by president Marc Ganis．

Chinese youth were on hand with the trophy during a press event with the Chinese Baseball Association．

\section*{Michael Kay}

Now in his 18th season as the play-by-play announcer for the YES Network, Kay also serves as the host of YES' CenterStage series and hosts his own radio talk show on ESPN Radio in New York. In 2008, 2013 and 2016, he handled play-by-play duties for the ESPN Radio Network's coverage of the AL Division Series.

A 36-time Emmy Award nominee and 10-time Emmy winner, Kay was named by Radio Ink magazine the second-most influential local sports talk show host in America in 2012.

Before joining the YES Network, Kay worked at the MSG Network from 1989-2001 as a Yankees reporter. In 1992, he added the assignment of Knicks locker room reporter to his responsibilities and continued in that role through the 1998-99 season.
In addition to his television work, Kay also worked as a Yankees analyst on WABC Radio from 1992-2002. Kay was a winner with Bob Goldscholl (WBBR) for "Best Sports Reporter" at the 2000 New York Metro Achievement in Radio Awards. After the Yankees'World Series victories in 1996, 1998, 2000 and 2009, Kay and John Sterling were asked by New York City's Mayor to host the post-parade victory celebration at City Hall.

In 1998, Kay also began co-hosting Sports Talk with John Sterling and Michael Kay, an MSG-produced nightly sports radio call-in show which aired on WABC Radio during the winter months. During the baseball season, Kay and Sterling hosted Yankee Talk which aired 90 minutes prior to all weekend Yankees games.

Shortly after graduating from Fordham University in 1982 with a B.A. in Communications, the Bronx, N.Y., native became one of the hot sports reporters in New York City with a style that combined great reporting skills with quality writing. While at Fordham, he honed his skills working for the school newspaper and radio station, working at Sports Phone and as the public address announcer for the New York Pro Summer Basketball League. In 2018, he was the recipient of the WFUV "Vin Scully Award for Excellence in Sports Broadcasting" and was inducted to the New York State Broadcasters Association Hall of Fame.

In 1982, Kay landed a job as a general assignment writer for the New York Post. Two years later he began covering college basketball (1984-85) and then the New Jersey Nets, whom he covered for two seasons before becoming the newspaper's general basketball writer. In 1987, he moved to baseball where he served as his paper's Yankees beat reporter. While he was in that position, he got his first television job with MSG Network as host of the "Hot Stove League" segment of MSG's Sports Night. In 1989, Kay moved from the Post to the New York Daily News, where he covered the Yankees until 1992, when he made the jump to radio. With the move, he became the first newspaper reporter in any sport to make the jump into the broadcast booth full-time, performing both play-by-play and analysis.

Kay was given the "Dick Young Award for Excellence in Sports Media" by the New York Pro Baseball Scouts in 1995. He was also a part of the Yankees/MSG Production team that was nominated for New York Emmy Awards for six consecutive years. In 1998, he was on the MSG team that won for "Outstanding Live Sports Coverage-Series." In 1996 and ' 97 , he was a member of the MSG team that won New York Emmys for "Outstanding Live Sports Coverage-Single Program" for Dwight Gooden's no-hitter and "The Battle for New York: Yankees vs. Mets."

Kay resides in Connecticut, and in 2005 had an honorary street sign in his name erected on the Grand Concourse in the Bronx. He is active with the Alzheimer's Association in memory of his mother, Rose, who passed away from the disease in 2006. Kay has also joined Joe Girardi for the "Remember When, Remember Now" banquet at the Grand Central Oyster Bar to benefit Girardi's Catch 25 Foundation and Alzheimer's research. He co-hosted the 2013 B.A.T. fundraising dinner in New York, and served as master of ceremonies at the 2013 Thurman Munson Awards fundraising dinner in New York.

In 2016, Kay was inducted into the New York State Baseball Hall of Fame and in 2018 was inducted as part of the inaugural class to the Bronx High School of Science Hall of Fame. He and his wife, Jodi, were married in February 2011 and have a daughter, Caledonia Rose, born in January 2013 and a son, Charles Applegate, born in November 2014.


\section*{Ken Singleton}

Former Major Leaguer Ken Singleton enters his 18th season as a game analyst and announcer for YES Network broadcasts of the New York Yankees, occasionally handling play-by-play duties as well.

Prior to joining YES, Singleton divided his time calling play-by-play and providing commentary at the MSG Network. In 1998, he was part of MSG's production team that won four New York Emmys for its Yankees coverage.

Singleton joined the MSG Network in 1997 from The Sports Network (TSN), where he served as analyst for the Montreal Expos from 1985-96. From 1991-96, he also called play-by-play and served as analyst for CIQ Radio, the Expos' flagship radio network. In 1996 and ' 97 , FOX Sports named him as a lead analyst for Saturday afternoon baseball broadcasts. In 1997 and '98, he worked as an analyst for Major League Baseball International.

Singleton enjoyed a 15-year Major League career with the New York Mets, Montreal Expos and Baltimore Orioles, batting .282 with 317 doubles and 246 HR . He is one of only 14 players in Baseball history to hit 35 or more home runs in a season as a switch-hitter. He also ranks among the all-time leaders in most Baltimore offensive categories, including homers, RBI and total bases. During his career, Singleton was named to the American League All-Star team in 1977, '79, and'81. He was named Most Valuable Oriole in 1975, '77, and '79 and was a member of the Orioles' 1983 World Championship team. In 1982, he was the recipient of Major League Baseball's Roberto Clemente Award, honoring him for his contributions both on and off the field.

Born in Manhattan and raised in nearby Mount Vernon, N.Y., Singleton played both baseball and basketball in high school, and also played baseball in the Bronx Federation League at Macombs Dam Park on the current site of Yankee Stadium. After getting a basketball scholarship to Hofstra University and playing baseball as well for one year, Singleton was drafted by the Mets in 1967. In 2015, he was inducted into the New York State Baseball Hall of Fame.

Singleton serves on the Board of Directors for the Cool Kids Campaign, a nonprofit organization that helps children and their families who are dealing with cancer. He was honored with the "Denzel Lifetime Achievement Award in Sports" at the Boys \& Girls Club of Mount Vernon's 100th Anniversary Gala in March 2012.


\section*{David Cone}

David Cone returns to the YES Network for his 12th season as an analyst．Upon his retirement from the game，Cone joined the YES Network team during its inaugural year in 2002，again for 2008－ 09 and returned in 2011．He has received two Emmy nominations for his work，in 2015 and 2018.

Cone compiled a 194－126 record， 3.46 ERA and 2，688 strikeouts in his 17－year Major League career with the Kansas City Royals（1986，1993－94），New York Mets（1987－1992，2003），Toronto Blue Jays （1992，＇95），New York Yankees（1995－2000）and Boston Red Sox（2001）．He was a five－time All－Star （1988，1992，1994， 1997 and 1999）and captured the American League Cy Young Award in 1994 after posting a 16－5 record with a 2.94 ERA．With the award，he became the first pitcher to win the Cy Young despite not leading the league in any category or pitching for a first－place club．

While with the Yankees，Cone was 64－40 with a 3.91 ERA and 888 strikeouts，and was part of four World Championship teams（1996，1998， 1999 and 2000）．He had arguably his finest season in pinstripes in 1998，when he was 20－7 with a 3.55 ERA and 209 strikeouts．A year later，on July 18，1999，he hurled the 14 th perfect game in modern Major League history（since 1900，including postseason）in a 6－0 win vs．the Montreal Expos at Yankee Stadium．The performance also marked the third perfect game ever thrown by a Yankees pitcher，following Don Larsen＇s in Game 5 of the 1956 World Series vs．Brooklyn and David Wells＇vs．Minnesota in 1998．The Kansas City，Mo．native was selected by his hometown Kansas City Royals in the third round of the 1981 First－Year Player Draft．

He compiled an 8－3 career postseason record and also won a World Series title with the 1992 Blue Jays．
In 1996，Cone established the David Cone Charitable Gift Fund．He was honored with numerous awards for his community service as a player and still pursues his charitable endeavors，working with the Maria Fareri Children＇s Hospital at the Westchester Medical Center．


\section*{Jack Curry}

Jack Curry joined the YES Network in 2010 as a studio analyst，reporter and program contributor， following a 20－year career covering the Yankees for The New York Times．In addition，he contributes as a columnist on YESNetwork．com and has the hosted JCTV：Jack Curry TV，an innovative YESNetwork．com original series which launched in 2013 and Yankees Access specials．Curry earned two Emmy nominations in 2014 for JCTV：Jack Curry TV and has four nominations for several Yankees features as well as a nomination in the Writer：Commentary／Editorial category in 2017．He has received four Emmys for his work as part of the YES Yankees broadcast team and has received a total of 10 nominations．
During his career with the Times，Curry authored more than 4，500 articles，covered 18 World Series， 11 All－Star Games and two World Baseball Classics．The New Jersey native also was nominated for a Pulitzer Prize in 1999，and won multiple Times Publisher Awards．

Curry＇s television experience extends back to 1991，when he began contributing to Madison Square Garden Network＇s Yankees pre－game show and weekly baseball magazine show．Since November 2005，Curry has been a regular contributor to YES＇Yankees Hot Stove show，and for the last six seasons，he has appeared on YES＇Yankees Access shows．In addition，he was a featured panelist on MSG＇s Angles roundtable show，was a frequent guest on WCBS－TV＇s Baseball Insider weekly studio show，and has also provided expert baseball analysis and commentary on television and radio programs such as ESPN＇s Outside the Lines，MSNBC＇s Countdown with Keith Olbermann，ESPN Radio＇s The Michael Kay Show and various WFAN Radio programs．

Curry also co－wrote a book with Derek Jeter entitled The Life You Imagine：Life Lessons for Achieving Your Dreams， which was a New York Times best－seller．In January 2013，Curry received the Broadcast Achievement Award from the New Jersey Sports Writers Association and was named＂Top Sports Analyst＂by the New Jersey－based 201 Magazine． A 1986 graduate of Fordham University，Curry resides with his wife，Pamela，in New Jersey．


\section*{John Flaherty}

Former Yankees catcher John Flaherty enters his 14th season as a field reporter，studio analyst and game analyst for YES Network telecasts．He received New York Emmy Award nominations in 2010，2011， 2013 and 2017 for his work at YES．

Drafted by Boston in 1988，Flaherty progressed through the Red Sox farm system before joining their Major League squad in 1992．He played 14 seasons in the Majors with Boston（1992－ 93），Detroit（1994－96），San Diego（1996－97），Tampa Bay（1998－2002）and the Yankees（2003－05）， compiling a .252 average with 80 HR in 1,047 games．

Flaherty brought his knowledge of the game and his veteran style of leadership to the Yankees clubhouse when he signed as a free agent in 2003．He played in 134 games with the Yankees across three seasons， and will be long remembered for his dramatic pinch－hit，＂walk－off＂single to defeat the Boston Red Sox in the 13th inning on June 1， 2004 －the contest that featured Derek Jeter＇s famous dive into the third base stands．

Flaherty is a New York City native and a graduate of George Washington University．On May 15，2009，he was awarded an honorary Doctorate of Humane Letters from St．Thomas Aquinas College in Sparkill，N．Y．In 2015，he was inducted into the New York State Baseball Hall of Fame．



\section*{Bob Lorenz}

Bob Lorenz returns for his 16th year with the YES Network, serving as the primary studio anchor for Yankees pre- and post-game shows. Lorenz also serves as the host of the Brooklyn Nets pre- and post-game shows, as well as the network's Yankees Hot Stove and Emmy Award-winning Forbes SportsMoney programs. Lorenz has won 15 Emmy Awards during his time with the YES Network. In April 2011, he won his third consecutive New York Emmy Award recognizing him as the top sports anchor in New York. He also has play-by-play credits at YES that include Yankees regular season and spring training telecasts, Staten Island Yankees games and Ivy League football.

Prior to joining the YES Network in 2003, Lorenz served as an anchor for CNN/Sports Illustrated, which he joined in April of 1991. He hosted CNN's signature weekly sports programming, including NFL Preview, College Football Preview, This Week in the NBA, SI Cover to Cover and Page One. He also hosted CNN's weekly baseball show from 1992 to 1996 and, from 1994 to 1996, hosted CNN's College Basketball Preview and College Coaches Corner. In addition to those duties, Lorenz also worked on a variety of programs for CNN's sister networks, TBS and TNT, hosting Super Bowl specials and serving as back-up host on Inside the NBA on TNT.

Before joining CNN, Lorenz was a reporter and anchor at WPTV-TV in West Palm Beach, Fla. Having joined the station in 1988, he wrote, produced and anchored four weekend sportscasts. Lorenz earlier served as sports director at KIEM-TV in Eureka, Calif., and was a writer at CBS Extravision in Los Angeles and an analyst/anchor for Citicable in Torrance, Calif.

Lorenz is on the Honorary Event Committee for the Connecticut chapter of Make-A-Wish and has emceed its annual Make-A-Wish Ball. He has also emceed the Annual Miracle Ball, which raises money and awareness for the Miracle League of Westchester County in New York. He holds a degree in broadcast journalism from the University of Southern California.


\section*{Meredith Marakovits}

Meredith Marakovits returns for her eighth season with the YES Network as the New York Yankees clubhouse reporter, reporting on the team within the network's Yankees game telecasts, pre- and post-game shows, Yankees Batting Practice Today show and Yankees Hot Stove. Marakovits also appears on YES'special Yankees programming and contributes to YESNetwork.com. She has also filled in as YES' Brooklyn Nets reporter and pre-and post-game show host. She has won five Emmy Awards while covering the Yankees at YES and two individual Emmy nominations for her Yankees reporting. She also appears frequently as a guest on MLB Network shows The Rundown and MLB Now.

Previously, Marakovits served as the Philadelphia 76ers sideline reporter with Comcast SportsNet Philadelphia, also participating in several Comcast SportsNet regional sports network programs. She also covered the Yankees and Mets for 1050 ESPN radio, and contributed elsewhere to WFAN radio in New York.
Prior to her work in New York, she served as the Phillies reporter for 950 ESPN Radio/97.5 the Fanatic. This came after her stint as the pre- and post-game host and field reporter for the Triple-A Lehigh Valley IronPigs Television Network.

A Northampton, Pa., native, Marakovits is a 2005 graduate of La Salle University in Philadelphia, where she played volleyball and received a degree in communications. She began her career for Service Electric 2's sports division as a sideline reporter for college football, basketball and indoor football broadcasts. In December 2013, Marakovits was honored on the Rockne Wall of Fame at her alma mater - Allentown (Pa.) Central Catholic High School - for her athletic exploits.


\section*{Paul O'Neill}

Paul O'Neill returns for his 18th season in broadcast television, serving as a game analyst for the YES Network. He received New York Emmy Award nominations in 2011 and 2013 for his analyst work on YES.

The five-time All-Star outfielder played 17 years in the Majors, spending his final nine seasons in pinstripes. He appeared in six World Series, winning five titles, including four with the Yankees (1996, '98-2000).

Affectionately known as a"warrior" to most Yankees followers, O'Neill began his Major League career in 1985 with the Cincinnati Reds and earned the first of his five World Series championships in 1990. He joined the Yankees in 1993 after eight seasons with the Reds, and in 1994 claimed the American League batting title with a .359 average. From July 1995 to May 1997, he played in 235 consecutive games in right field without making an error. In 2001, at the age of 38, O'Neill became the oldest player in Major League history to steal 20 bases and hit 20 home runs in the same season.
He lives in his native Cincinnati with his wife, Nevalee, and their three children: Andrew, Aaron and Alexandra. He was named "Father of the Year" in June 2008 by the National Father's Day Council at its 67 th Annual Father of the Year dinner in New York. O'Neill was inducted into the New York State Baseball Hall of Fame in November 2017.


\section*{Ryan Ruocco}

Ryan Ruocco returns for his sixth season as part of the broadcast team, holding a variety of roles within the YES Network's coverage of the New York Yankees. He serves as a backup calling play-by-play and fills in hosting YES' Yankees pre- and post-game shows and periodically handles clubhouse reporting duties. He also shares play-by-play duties with broadcast veteran lan Eagle on YES' Brooklyn Nets telecasts.

Ruocco has worked at YES since 2007, when he started as a statistician for the network's Yankees telecasts. Ruocco was a member of YES' Nets broadcast team which won a 2014 New York Emmy Award for Best Live Sports Series, and he earned individual New York Emmy nominations in 2015, 2017 and 2018 for his Nets work on YES.

In addition to his YES work, Ruocco is one of the primary NBA play-by-play voices on ESPN and is the lead play-by-play announcer for the WNBA. He also handles periodic NFL play-by-play on ESPN Radio as well as college football and college basketball play-by-play on ESPN's television networks, and he co-hosted ESPN New York Radio's mid-day show.

Ruocco also currently co-hosts Uninterrupted's R2C2 podcast with Yankees' pitcher CC Sabathia.
Prior to joining YES, Ruocco handled basketball and football play-by-play at WFUV, Fordham University's radio station while he was a student there. He also hosted WFUV's One on One, New York's longest-running sports call-in show. In 2008, he received Fordham's prestigious Marty Glickman Award, named for the legendary play-by-play announcer.

Ruocco, who grew up in Fishkill, N.Y., graduated on the Dean's List from Fordham in 2008 with a B.S. in Communications.

\section*{John Sterling}

Yankees win! Theeeeeee Yankees win!"

If anything has become synonymous with the Yankees' run of success over recent years, it is John Sterling's memorable conclusion to so many Yankees victories. As the radio voice to 162 games a year, plus preseason and postseason, he has called 4,976 official games ( 4,791 regular season/185 postseason) over the last 30 seasons, without missing even one, making him one of the most recognized-and imitated voices-in all of New York sports.

Sterling joined the Yankees broadcast team in 1989 from Atlanta's TBS and WSB Radio, where he called Hawks basketball (1981-89) and Braves games (1982-87). It marked a return to the town where he first achieved fame, hosting a talk show on WMCA from 1971-78, and calling the Nets (1975-80, and as a fill-in, in 1997) and Islanders (1975-78) for WMCA, WVNJ, WWOR-TV and SportsChannel.
Sterling also previously called Morgan State Football (eight years) and Washington Bullets basketball in 1981. In addition to his seven years at WMCA and a year at WSB in Atlanta, he has also hosted talk shows on WFAN and WABC in New York. He has not missed a broadcast of any kind since the fall of 1981.

As the host of the YES Network's acclaimed Yankeeography series, Sterling has won 12 Emmy Awards since 2003. He has also been honored by the N.J. Sportswriters Association with its Radio-TV Excellence Award (1999), and was the winner of the 2001 Whitney Radio Jimmy Cannon Award. In addition, his call of a Jason Giambi home run on WCBS radio in 2002 was voted the "Best Baseball Call of the Year" in a poll conducted by MLB.com. In 2002, Sterling was also honored by the NY Air Awards for being a part of the best play-by-play team on radio.

When he's not in the booth, Sterling serves as a master of on-field ceremonies for major Yankees events, and is well known for his emcee work at City Hall (with his former radio partner Michael Kay) at "Key to the City" ceremonies following Yankees World Series victories.

Sterling enjoys attending Broadway shows and boasts an extensive knowledge of the lyrics to many American pop standards. In 2007, he embarked on his own Broadway venture in a cabaret show titled "Baseball and Broadway" in which he both served as emcee and sang alongside broadway talent.

In 2016, he was inducted, along with Suzyn Waldman, to the New York State Broadcasters Hall of Fame. For the past 25 years, he has been a spokesman for the Leukemia Society of America. He enjoys reading, movies and swimming. He is the proud father of four children: daughter Abigail and triplets, Veronica, Bradford and Derek.


\section*{Suzyn Waldman}

Award-winning journalist Suzyn Waldman begins her 33rd season either covering or broadcasting the New York Yankees and her 15 th season as the Yankees' radio color commentator, having become the first woman to hold a full-time position as a Major League broadcaster.

Waldman has spent more than three decades overcoming all the obstacles that go along with being a female sports broadcaster and has risen to the top of her profession. In 2006, she became a permanent part of the "Women in Baseball" exhibit at the Hall of Fame in Cooperstown, and in 2009, her World Series Game 6 scorecard was added to the Hall of Fame's collection, commemorating her being the first female broadcaster to call World Series game action. In 1987, Waldman became the first voice heard on WFAN-AM in New York, the first all-sports radio station in the country. She was a mainstay on that station for almost 15 years, creating the job of the radio beat reporter, covering both the New York Yankees and New York Knicks. Her news-breaking reports, exclusive interviews and always original and controversial opinions won her countless journalism awards. Her accolades include the "International Radio Award" for her live and emotional reporting from the upper deck of Candlestick Park during the 1989 San Francisco earthquake, the \(1996^{\prime N}\) N.Y. Sportscaster of the Year" Award from the National Sportscasters \& Sportswriters and the 1999"Star Award" for radio from the American Women in Radio and TV. Waldman became a popular talk show host at WFAN and co-hosted the coveted midday slot until leaving WFAN in 2002 to join the YES Network.

The word "first" invariably precedes the name of Suzyn Waldman in every facet of her television and radio career. The first woman to work on a nationally-televised baseball broadcast, Waldman added another first, being the first woman to provide play-by-play for a Major League team, when she started broadcasting New York Yankees games for WPIX, MSG Network and WNYW/FOX5 in the mid 1990s. The first woman ever to host an NBA pre-and post-game show, Suzyn worked in that capacity for the Knicks on WFAN, provided play-by-play for the WNBA on Lifetime TV and was an analyst on St. John's basketball games for MSG and WFAN.

She has been honored by countless organizations, including the Thurman Munson Foundation, the March of Dimes, B'nai B'rith, the Jimmy Fund of Boston and the U.S. Federal Women's Program. In 2006, she received the first Women's Global Health Award from the Albert Einstein College of Medicine at the United Nations. She is a tireless motivational speaker at schools and cancer centers around the country, encouraging young women to pursue their dreams despite any pitfalls they may encounter.

Waldman's life and accomplishments have been the subject of hundreds of magazine and newspaper articles, as well as chapters in children's and motivational books. She has been profiled on the Today Show, CBS Evening News with Dan Rather, ABC's 20/20 and NBC's Dateline. In 2013, 2014 and 2015, Waldman was named one of Radio Ink magazine's "Most Influential Women in Radio." In 2016, she was inducted, along with John Sterling, to the New York State Broadcasters Hall of Fame. She was also a recipient of the Gracie Award, which acknowledges outstanding team leadership and individual achievement, focusing on women who are making positive change and who further the discussion of what a fulfilling career in media looks like.

A native Bostonian with a degree in Economics from Boston's prestigious Simmons College, Suzyn spent 15 years on the Broadway musical stage and performed in countless night clubs around the world. She is proudest of her two years starring opposite Richard Kiley in Man of La Mancha. She lives in Westchester with her German shepherds, Gatsby and Margo.


\section*{Sweeny Murti}

Sweeny Murti begins his 19th season as the Yankees reporter on the team's flagship radio station WFAN and his sixth year as host of the post-game radio show. Murti provides information and analysis on all of the station's programs and is a featured columnist on WFAN.com. In the 30-plus year history of WFAN, Murti is just the station's second Yankees beat reporter, preceded only by current radio analyst Suzyn Waldman.

Murti has worked in various roles at WFAN since 1993. He has appeared on numerous TV outlets, earning two New York Emmy Awards. Since 2010 he has been a correspondent for MLB Network. Murti has also been seen on YES Network features like"Yankeeography" and Yankees On Demand.

In addition to covering six World Series for WFAN, Murti has worked two Summer Olympics (1996 and 2000) for Westwood One Radio. At the 2000 Sydney Games, Murti called play-by-play of Team USA's Gold Medal game in softball and covered Team USA's gold medal-winning efforts in baseball, as well as men's and women's basketball.

Murti has donated several items to the National Baseball Hall of Fame in Cooperstown, including his scorecard from Derek Jeter's final "walk off" home game in 2014.

Since 2008 Murti has assisted Yankees great Bernie Williams at his annual gala for the Hillside Food Outreach, which helps feed hungry families in the Hudson Valley.

In 2011, the New York Pro Baseball Scouts honored Murti with the Jim Quigley Memorial Award for Baseball Service.
As a fill-in analyst on the radio broadcasts since 2015, Murti is regarded as the first Indian-American to take part in a Major League Baseball broadcast.

Murti began his broadcasting career at age 12 for Middletown, Pa. Area School District's award-winning student radio station WMSS and graduated with a B.A. from Penn State University's School of Communications in 1992. He lives in New York's Hudson Valley with his wife Jessica, daughter, Caroline, and son, Ryan.

\section*{Rickie Ricardo}

Rickie Ricardo is in his sixth season as the New York Yankees＇Spanish language play－by－play announcer．Prior to joining the Yankees＇WADO broadcast team，Ricardo spent seven years in the same role for Philadelphia Phillies，broadcasting their World Series win in 2008 and postseason run in 2009.

Additionally，Ricardo has been the Spanish radio play－ by－play voice of the Philadelphia Eagles for the last seven NFL seasons．He also regularly appears on various programs on Philadelphia＇s 94WIP－FM Sports Radio and New York＇s WFAN Radio．

Ricardo has spent over 30 years in radio broadcasting，appearing on various stations in New York，Connecticut，Philadelphia，Washington D．C．and Miami．In 2005，he became the daily beat reporter covering the Florida Marlins for Clear Channel radio．His career also includes international radio broadcasting with the 2008 Caribbean Series in the Dominican Republic and the 2009 Caribbean Series in Mexicali，Mexico．

A 1980 graduate from the New York School of Broadcasting，Ricardo currently resides in West New York，N．J．and Orlando，Fla．


\section*{Francisco Rivera}

Since 1995，Francisco Rivera has been involved in baseball as a color commentator and play－by－play announcer， including 14 years in the Yankees＇broadcast booth．A native of Morovis，Puerto Rico，he covered the Philadelphia Phillies for ＂Radio Tropical＂from 1995 to 1998 and worked the American League Championship Series in 2003 and 2004 for WADO．

Rivera received his bachelor＇s degree in Spanish literature from Rutgers University and graduated from the Cambridge University－affiliated Miguel Angel Torres School of Communications in Manhattan in 1978．He began his communications career covering NBA basketball for WADO，and was later one of the pioneers of the talk show WADO Deportivo， where he worked until 2003．Francisco is married to Ivette Rodriguez and has two daughters，Melissa and Lorraine．

\section*{George M．Steinbrenner Field}

This year marks the 24th season the Yankees will play their spring training games at George M．Steinbrenner Field in Tampa，Fla．Since opening in 1996，the complex also serves as the home of the Single－A Tampa Tarpons of the Florida State League．The field＇s dimensions are an exact replica of Yankee Stadium in the Bronx，measuring 318 feet down the left line， 408 feet to center field and 314 feet down the right field line．

Fans will also notice another link to the Bronx with replicas of the Yankees＇retired numbers placards from Yankee Stadium greeting them as they enter the complex．

The facility originally opened in 1996 as Legends Field．However on February 14，2008，Hal and Hank Steinbrenner announced that it would be renamed George M．Steinbrenner Field．The name change followed two unanimous resolutions recommending and supporting the change from the Hillsborough County Commission and the Tampa City Council．In a pregame ceremony prior to the Yankees＇March 27，2008，spring training game against the Pittsburgh Pirates the complex was formally renamed in honor of the late Yankees＇Principal Owner and Chairman．

＂I am humbled and flattered to have this outstanding and totally unexpected honor conferred on me，＂said George M．Steinbrenner at the time the resolution was passed．＂I extend my thanks to the Tampa City Council and to the Hillsborough County Commissioners for passing resolutions suggesting and recommending the change．I also thank my family for supporting the renaming of the stadium and for everything they have done for so many years that helped bring about this great day．＂

The resolution passed by the Tampa City Council on February 7，2008，cited Mr．Steinbrenner＇s many charitable donations on behalf of youth activities，hospitals and the arts．The resolution passed by the Board of the Hillsborough County Commissioners on February 6，2008，recognizing Mr．Steinbrenner＇s numerous extraordinary contributions to the area．


The Yankees Pavilion at George M．Steinbrenner Field ［at L ］is a half－acre covered party area located next to the Yankees＇pregame workout field．It offers fans an exclusive spot to eat，drink and watch warm－ups right before the game．

During the winter of 2016-17, George M. Steinbrenner Field underwent significant ballpark enhancements. Some of the highlights include:

Multi-level Bullpen Clubs have been constructed on the first and third base lines. The upper level has a shaded private bar area and is exclusive to Loge Box holders, Club Seat members and private groups. The lower level contains a full-scale bar that is open to all patrons with valid tickets to that day's game.

A newly enhanced Right Field Pavilion allows fans to take in the game with the comfort and shade of a beachside bar. Those with tickets to the Pavilion will have access to a pregame buffet serving traditional ballpark fare and will be provided with two free drink tickets that can be used at the Right Field bar. The Pavilion can comfortably accommodate groups of 20-500 and is available for group purchases and individual game sales.

Loge boxes on the first and third base lines offer semi-private, open-aired, canopied seating for four and access to the exclusive premium lounge, located on the upper level of the first base and third base Bullpen Clubs. Food and beverage (water, soda, beer and wine) are all inclusive in the loge boxes, while premium alcohol is a la carte.

The Left Field Deck is an enclosed and shaded group party area. Those with tickets to the deck will have access to a pregame buffet serving traditional ballpark fare and will be provided with two free drink tickets. The Deck can comfortably accommodate groups of 20-100.

Newly built Cabanas are available for groups of 10-or-more on a full season, partial-season or gameday basis. This shaded private area is located in the right field alley in close proximity to the Right Field Pavilion. Food and beverage (water, soda, beer and wine) are all inclusive in the cabanas, while premium alcohol is a la carte.
