IN MEMORIAM - FORMER FIRE CHIEF ROBERT METZ

The Montebello community mourns the loss of one of its former fire chiefs, Science Advisory Board, the Montebel-Robert Eugene Metz, who passed away last month at the age of 90.

Born in Youngstown, Ohio, Metz, a World War II veteran, attended boot camp in San Diego and trained as an electrician. He was assigned to the USS Goshen, "Chief Metz hired me in 1978," said retired where he saw action at Okinawa and Iwo Jima.

Upon discharge from the Navy, Metz served as an apprentice machinist and, along with a friend, opened a used car lot in East Los Angeles. In 1950, he "Bob was a close friend and great neighbor,"



where he rose through the ranks, obtaining Nighswonger. "I will miss him." the position of fire chief in 1973.

According to one MFD retiree, it was Metz and two grandchildren. who first introduced the paramedic program to the Department.

"Robert Metz not only served this community's fire service for many years, but also proudly served our country in the military," said Montebello Fire Chief Dan Amador. "Following retirement, he did not stop providing service to this community and was actively involved in many projects that pertained to the betterment of Montebello. His dedication was the epitome of service over self."

Upon retirement from the fire service in 1979, Metz worked as a field representative for former State Assemblyman Jack Fenton. He also worked for the Montebello Beverly Towers Retirement Apartments' Living Opportunities Management Company before finally retiring in 2002.

Metz, and his late wife Mary, enjoyed travelling, golfing, boating and spending time with family.

Metz was involved with many organizations including the International Fire Chiefs Association, the East Los Angeles College Fire Io-Commerce YMCA and Boy Scout Troup #308.

Section 17.10.230 of the Montebello Municipal Code allows garages sales in residential zones four weekends per year. No permits or fees are required of residents wishing to have a garage sale on the permitted weekends.

March 4th, 5th & 6th

Garage sales are only allowed in the City of Montebello on the dates specified above, and are subject to the following regulations

-Sales may be conducted only during the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m. -All items for sale and all items utilized in conjunction with the sale must be kept on private property and not encroaching onto neighboring property or the public right-of-way.

-Not more than one sign may be displayed on the premises for the purposes of advertising the sale.

Placement of sign on public property (i.e. light poles, parkways, traffic medians) is prohibited.



The school's second wide receiver to be named to back-to-back First Team All-Conference honors (Mountain West), Brown was part of a 2007 team that won nine games including the school's first bowl game victory in 46 years.

Following college, Brown spent a few years in the NFL, in Seattle, Cincinnati, Chicago and St. Louis before retiring and beginning his career as a coach. He spent several years as a wide receivers coach and offensive coordinator, including a brief stop at CSHM before taking his first head coaching position at Duarte High School.


Brown is confident that his playing and coaching experience will help him guide the CSHM program to new heights.

TITLE: PROPER TERMINATION NOTICE(S)

It is important for the landlord and tenant to be informed of the different required Notices of Termination. In the event an eviction is needed, an invalid or improper Notice of Termination is not enforceable and may result in losing your case.

must correctly determine whether the property is issued. subject to a rent control ordinance:

If your property is subject to rent control, you must serve the notice with a copy of the current registration permit. Additionally, if the tenant is current with rent and the property is within Los Angeles City (subject to rent control), the landlord must pay tenant relocation fees in order to evict.

If your property is not under a rent control ordinance; is not under a fixed lease but on a month to month tenancy, and tenant is current with rent, (under CCP 1946) you have the following options:

To choose the proper termination notice, the landlord THIRTY (30) DAY notice of termination can be

(2) If tenancy has been over one (1) year, a SIXTY (60) DAY notice of termination must be issued. (3) If your tenant is under Section 8, a NINETY (90) DAY notice of termination must be issued.

If the tenant is delinquent with rent a THREE (3) DAY notice "To Pay Rent or Quit" may be issued regardless if tenant is in a rent control area, lease, or month to month tenancy (unless your rental agreement states otherwise).

NUTRITION MONTH

The Academy of Nutrition and Dietetics has dedicated March to National Nutrition Month. This year, Registered Dietitian Nutritionist Day will also take place on March 9th. Nutrition and a healthy lifestyle is essential to the functioning of the human body. It is important at every stage of life beginning at pregnancy, moving to infancy, through teenage years and puberty, during adulthood, and ending at older age.

When a woman is pregnant, the food she puts in her body not only affects her, but also her child. There are a few nutrients that deserve special attention during pregnancy: Folic Acid, Calcium, and Vitamin D. Folic Acid derives from Folate, which is a vitamin B that helps prevent neural tube defects and serious anomalies of the brain and spinal cord. Such anomalies include spina bifida, anencephaly, and many studies have shown a link between folic acid intake and cleft lips or cleft palates. A recommended dose is 400-800 micrograms of folic acid daily before conception and throughout pregnancy. It can be found in pill form as well as in leafy greens, beans, oranges, nuts, and whole grains. Calcium plays a key factor in forming strong bones, strong teeth, and running the circulatory, muscular, and nervous systems. A recommended dose is 1,000 milligrams of Calcium a day and for pregnant women 1,300 milligrams of Calcium a day. The best source of Calcium is in dairy products or Calcium-fortified foods such as cereals. Vitamin D also promotes bone strength for the baby and a recommended dose is 600 international units (IU) a day. This vitamin comes from fatty fish such as salmon, and also eggs and milk. The easiest and most efficient way for pregnant women to consume all the vitamins and minerals they needs for a healthy pregnancy is through Prenatal Vitamins. Make sure to speak to your primary care physician before starting any supplements regimen.

balanced diet and exercise during these stages of life helps to prevent chronic diseases such as obesity and diabetes. A typical plate should consist of 1/2 vegetables, 1/4 lean meats such as chicken, fish, or low fat steak, and 1/4 grains such as brown rice and whole wheat bread. Sugar is the biggest contributor to both diabetes and obesity and the best way to visualize how much sugar you are putting into your body is by looking at the back of a food product and dividing the grams of sugar by four. This is the amount of sugar in teaspoons in the product. For example, a 12 OZ can of Mountain Dew contains 47 grams of sugar. 47 grams divided by 4 results in approximately 12 teaspoons of sugar! It is best to drink 8 - 12 glasses of water a day to clean out your systems and hydrate your body.

During adulthood and old age, it is extremely important to watch food intake. At this stage, a body is less forgiving and the metabolism begins to slow down. That being said, drinking a full can of coke and eating ice cream often is dangerous to health. It is still best to stick to the same ratio of foods on a plate (1/2 vegetables, 1/4 lean meat, and 1/4 whole grains) and treat yourself once a week to a desert.

Nutrition can be very simple and here are some tips: First, when shopping in the grocery store, stay away from the tempting center aisles and focus on the outside perimeters. This is where you will get all the fresh foods you need for your body. Second, if you choose to shop in the center aisles, always read the food labels at the back of the package. Any words on the label you are unable to pronounce is a chemical. Also, if the ingredients list is vey long, stay away from it. Third, try not to be fooled by false advertising on the front of food labels and always read the ingredient list. Last, fast food is not a meal. It is thought that fast food is cheap to feed a whole family, but that is false. A study conducted by Oakton Community College has shown that when three meals per day per person were purchased from a fast-food restaurant, the total cost came out to be \$87.00 per week. In comparison, purchasing all whole ingredients from grocery stores for three meals a day per person came out to \$43.00. Eating healthy is not expensive, it is about making the right choices. Stay healthy, and stay wealthy.

QUINOA FOR GOOD HEALTH

Quinoa (pronounced Keen-wah) is often described as a super-grain. This super-grain was discovered by the Incas in the Andes Mountains thousands of years ago. It is packed with vitamins, minerals, protein and fiber and is naturally gluten-free. There are many species and varieties, but the three main types of Quinoa seeds are red, white and black. Other seed colors include purple, pink, green, orange, yellow and gray. Some have found the white variety to be more flavorful, but the red is said to contain more nutrients. Quinoa can be purchased in most health food stores and many supermarkets.

Rice, wheat and most other grains are missing one or more essential amino acids, but quinoa is an impressive plant-based complete protein, which means it provides all nine essential amino acids necessary for good health. These nine essential amino acids are required by the body as building blocks for muscles and must be obtained by food. To give you an idea of its nutritional density, the quinoa plant is in the same family as Swiss chard, spinach and beets.

Quinoa can be the perfect substitute for pasta, rice or couscous and is easy to digest. It is easy to prepare and can be ready to eat in less than 20 minutes. Here is a quick and simple recipe:

- 11/4 cups of water
- 1 cup uncooked organic quinoa, rinsed and drained
- Dash of Celtic sea salt
- · Dash of black pepper

• In a small saucepan, bring the water to a boil and then add the quinoa, salt and pepper. Cover, reduce heat, and simmer for 12 minutes. Let stand for 5 minutes before eating.

When cooked, Quinoa has a mild, nutty flavor and a slight crunch. Quinoa goes well with many foods and can be prepared in a variety of ways. For added flavor, try cooking your quinoa in a low-sodium vegetable or chicken broth instead of water. We can enjoy it year-round because it is so light and versatile. It can be used in warm winter soups or cool summer salads. Quinoa makes a great breakfast meal as well.



1/2 cup uncooked organic quinoa, rinsed 1 cup unsweetened almond milk Dash of Celtic sea salt 1 or 2 cinnamon sticks

Place all ingredients in a small saucepan. Bring to a high simmer, cover and reduce heat to a low simmer for 15 minutes. If it starts bubbling, turn off heat, stir and resume. After 15 minutes, remove from heat and let sit for about 5 minutes or until the milk is absorbed. Scoop the quinoa into a bowl and pour some warm almond milk over it. You can also add toppings such as seasonal or dried fruit, nuts, cinnamon, nutmeg and/or honey. Try blending cooked quinoa into your morning smoothie for added nutrition.



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CALIFORNIA JUDGE ORDERS DATA RELEASE OF STUDENT INFORMATION

A lawsuit entitled Morgan Hill Concerned Parents Association and the Concerned Parent Association v. California Department of Education (See case # 2:11-cv-03471-KJM-AC.) alleges that the State of California Department of Education (CDE) has violated the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act by failing to ensure that special education needs are not being provided to children violating their legal entitlement to those services. The CDE denies the allegations.

In order to perform a statistical analysis of the information, Morgan Hill, who was later joined by the California Concerned Parents Association as a Plaintiff, requested an order for the CDE to release student records that contain personal information which could include social security numbers, Individual Education Programs (IEPs) information on attendance, demographic information, disciplinary records, special education records, suspension and expulsion information, and mental services to qualifying students. The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act and the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act ("IDEA"), are federal laws that protect the privacy of student records. These laws permit the disclosure of these records to comply with a Court order.

The judge stated that she would accept opt out letters and forms until April 1, 2016, however it is unclear whether she will block the release of your child's individual data automatically if an opt out form is submitted. If you do not submit a waiver then it "will be deemed a waiver of your right to object to the disclosure of your or your child's protected personal information and records." DiPaola. "If the medical call isn't life threatening, we try and take the time to educate the resident who has not realized the chirping is the smoke detector."

Statistics show 60% of fire deaths occurred in homes without smoke detectors or with smoke detectors that were not working properly. Montebello firefighters have some tips that can help prevent a house fire from turning into a fatality fire:

1) Install smoke detectors in every bedroom, outside each sleeping area and on every level of your home.

2) Replace smoke detector batteries twice a year when you change your clocks.

3) Replace all smoke detectors in your home every 10 years.

"Given that smoke rises, a smoke detector should be on the ceiling or mounted high on a wall," said DiPaola. "Keeping smoke detectors away from the kitchen and at least 10 feet away from the stove will help reduce false alarms."
