
O. HARRIMAN, SR., INSANE.

Millionaire Septuagenarian Incompetent to Manage His Estate.

PORT CHESTER, N. Y., Dec. 17.—Oliver Harriman, Sr., who has a country seat here and is said to be worth at least \$5,000,000, was declared insane and incompetent to manage his estate by commission and a Sheriff's jury to-day. He is seventy years old. The petition was made by his eight children, including Oliver Harriman, Jr., and J. Borden Harriman.

Dr. Sands of Port Chester testified Mr. Harriman has senile dementia. He is very feeble and his mind is a blank. His wife is dead. His property is mostly in stocks and bonds.

CITY MILK SUPPLY SHORT.

**Trouble Caused by Railroad Wash-Outs
—More Difficulty Feared.**

The milk business in this city was in a state of chaos yesterday. Owing to the havoc which the recent floods caused to bridges and railroads, trains carrying New York's daily milk supply either did not get in at all, or arrived many hours late.

The average daily supply of milk for New York is about 1,080,000 quarts. It is estimated that only 680,000 quarts got in yesterday. This shortage hurt the wholesale dealer mostly, because the supply had not become so small as to warrant an increase from the retail price of 8 cents per quart. Dealers in milk bid against one another for enough milk to supply their customers, thus raising the wholesale price per can from \$2 to \$5 per forty-quart can. Hospitals, sanitariums, hotels, and the steady customers were given preference. Not only many persons in this city, but many residents of Jersey City drank their coffee black yesterday morning.

When it began to snow yesterday afternoon the dealers expressed fear of further difficulties this morning.

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
