JOHN SCHLUTER, 60 years old, a grocer in Greenwich Street, Manhattan, and for several years Secretary of St. Johannes Lodge, No. 301, I. O. O. F., died on Wednesday at his home, 552 Dean Street, Brooklyn.

Mrs. **GERTRUDE F. DUDLEY**, wife of John C. Dudley, a real estate operator, died at her home, 455 Sixth Street, Brooklyn, on Wednesday, aged 33 years.

Mrs. **MARY LOUISE JONES LOPEZ**, widow of Calixto Lopez, a tobacco merchant of New York and Havana, died on Wednesday at her home, 1,166 Pacific Street, Brooklyn. She was 68 years old and is survived by three daughters.

PHILO J. ROGERS, formerly a pressman for The New York Herald, died from heart disease on Wednesday at his home, 53 Elton Street, Brooklyn, aged 39 years.

WILLIAM J. SIMONSON, a note teller in the Sherman National Bank, Manhattan, died on Tuesday at his home, 39 Wolcott Street, Brooklyn, from pneumonia.

Mrs. **HARRIET E. HAY**, widow of James B. Hay, who, before his death, was head of the money order department of the Adams Express Company, died on Wednesday at her home, 933 President Street, Brooklyn. She was long active in the work of the Christ P. E. Church.

DAVID DIXON, for forty-seven years in the employ of R. Hoe & Co., died on Monday at his home, 936 Bushwick Avenue, Brooklyn, at the age of 81 years. Mr. Dixon was a native of Lancashire, England.

WALTER G. FREEMAN, formerly with the mailing department of The New York Sun and later with The Commercial, died on Tuesday at the home of his sister, 523 Rugby Road, Flatbush.

EUSTACE H. WHEELER, founder of The Nassau Recorder, a weekly newspaper, at Lynbrook, L. I., which he ran until three years ago, died at his home in Valley Stream, L. I., on Tuesday. He was 59 years old. Mr. Wheeler was a Justice of the Peace in the town of Hempstead for four years.

CHARLES PLATT ROGERS, who was for many years a manufacturer in this city, and one of the charter members of the old Fourteenth Street Bank, died on Monday at his home, 145 West Seventy-fifth Street. He was 88 years old.

OSCAR S. VEIT, manager of the New York office of Gans Brothers, died yesterday at his home, 201 West 107th Street. He was 57 years old.

HARRY BOGART, a salesman for Tiffany & Co., died yesterday at his home in Glen Ridge, N. J.

WILLIAM MAHER, a stationary engineer, for the last forty years in the employ of the Long Island Railroad, died yesterday at his home, 48 Madison Avenue, Flushing. He was 56 years old.

Barbee, a member of the aviation section of the Signal Corps; Alger Barbee, a member of the Naval Reserve, and Cecil R. Barbee of the Standard Aeroplane Corporation.

FREDERICK R. LITTELL, who was the oldest living native resident of Summit, N. J., where he was for many years in the retail grocery business, died there yesterday in the Overlook Hospital. He was 71 years old. Mr. Littell was a member of the Sons of the American Revolution and was a deacon of the Central Presbyterian Church.
