Dr. John R. Maxwell.

KEOKUK, Iowa, June 4.—Dr. John R. Maxwell, Iowa State golf champion in 1900 and trans-Mississippi champion in 1903, died last night.

### Obituary Notes.

Dr. J. WESLEY RICHARDS died on Sunday at his home, at 223 East Eighty-sixth Street, this city, of pneumonia. He was 37 years old, and was born in Baldmount, Penn. He leaves a widow and one son.

Major ROBERT B. GORSUCH, engineer, a native of Brooklyn, N. Y., and formerly representative of the late Collis P. Huntington, was buried on Sunday in the United States National Cemetery, Mexico City.

Mrs. J. ELIZABETH VAN CLEAF, wife of John C. Van Cleaf, proprietor of the Mansion House, Brooklyn Heights, died yesterday. She was born in Rumson, N. J., fifty years ago, and was a daughter of David I. Megill. A daughter and two sons survive.

Dr. JAMES G. LA ROE died last Wednesday of apoplexy at his home in Greenpoint, L. I. He was 59 years old, and the author of many works on medical subjects. Dr. La Roe was a Mason and a member of the Cleveland Club of the Seventeenth Ward. A widow survives.

JOHN W. CLARK of 222 West Seventeenth Street died on Sunday at the New York Hospital of blood poisoning. He was 62 years old, and was for fourteen years the sexton of the Church of the Holy Communion, at Sixth Avenue and Twentieth Street. A widow survives.

Miss ELIZABETH BURGESS, a sister of Bishop Frederick Burgess of the Diocese of Brooklyn and Long Island, died on Sunday in Burlington, N. J., of pneumonia. Miss Burgess was a native of Massachusetts, and made her home with her brother at the See House, Garden City. She was formerly engaged in educational work in Burlington.

The Rev. ALTO FUERBASS, a member of the Order of St. Benedict, connected with St. Mary's Catholic Church, Newark, died yesterday of tuberculosis, at St. Michael's Hospital in that city. He was formerly a professor at St. Anselm's College, Manchester, N. H., and was born in Bavaria in 1879. Coming to America while still a boy, he was educated in Newark and became a member of the Order of St. Benedict in 1899.

ELIZA AYRES CARPENTER, wife of the Rev. Frederick H. Carpenter, rector of the Twenty-fourth Street Methodist Church, died on Sunday of Bright's disease at her home, 360 West Twenty-first Street. She was 54 years old. Her husband, a son, and a daughter survive. The funeral will be held this afternoon from the church, and the burial will be at Kensico Cemetery.

JOHN CHARLES EDWIN STROUD, one of the oldest employes of the Metropolitan Street Railway Company, died on Saturday at his home, 2,331 Washington Avenue. He was born in Windsor, England, sixty-five years ago, took a position with the railway company thirty-five years ago, and rose until he became chief clerk in the Auditors' Department. A widow and two daughters survive.
