

DEATH OF A FRENCH PAINTER.

The death of Felix Emmanuel Henri Philippoteaux, the French historical painter, is announced from Paris. He was a native of Paris, born there April 3, 1815, and when still young entered the studio of Leon Cogniet, with whom, at a later period, he painted several battle pieces for the gallery at Versailles. It was at the Salon of 1833 that his first exhibited picture appeared. Many of his works exhibited in later years are now found in the principal modern museums of France, including those of the Luxembourg, Versailles, Rouen, Strasburg, and Marseilles. He obtained a second medal in 1837, a first medal in 1840, and the decoration of the Legion of Honor in July, 1846. Several noted pictures were painted upon commissions received after a journey by the artist to Algiers. Some of his works were shown at the Royal Academy exhibitions in London.
