Background Notes on The Roll of Distinguished Philatelists September 2011

The following pages include a background to the establishment of the Roll of Distinguished Philatelists, a verbatim note of the meeting held from May 3rd-6th 1921 at the Philatelic Congress of Great Britain in Harrogate, and a list of the "Fathers of Philately", all of the signatories to the Roll up until 2011, and the four additional names added in 1951 and 1956.

There are many Internet listings of the signatories to the Roll, and all are either wrong or incomplete.

The Beginning

At a meeting of the London Stamp Club on 30th October 1919, Percy C Bishop, editor of its journal, *Stamp Collecting*, proposed a scheme for rewarding and paying honour to those who had worked for the advancement of the hobby of stamp collecting. He accepted that some Societies awarded Medals and cited the Lindenberg Medal, but there should, he thought, be some world-wide recognition for those whose research had helped to place, and was keeping, philately on the high pedestal it presently occupied. To this end Bishop suggested a Philatelic Order of Merit - to be an award of no intrinsic value but marked by a suitably designed Diploma.

There was leeway to be made up and initially some thirty to fifty awards would be necessary after which a Jury would make further awards, probably half-yearly, according to nominations received. Derek Ingram, editor of *Stamp Collecting*, in supporting the idea, added that he thought that a visible form of appreciation would tend to bring forward new writers on philately. He also suggested that there might be a subsidiary award for those who were not so well known. In a summing-up, F H Vallancey, the Chairman of the Club, said that such a Philatelic Order of Merit should be made so that it would be highly valued all over the world, and instanced the names of prominent writers as examples of those who were deserving of the honour. He supported the proposal which would be backed up by his paper.

The following motion was then carried unanimously: "That this meeting of philatelists, members of the London Stamp Club, having heard the proposals for the institution of a philatelic 'Order of Merit' under the auspices of *Stamp Collecting*, recognises the desirability of proceeding with the plan forthwith, and pledges to give the undertaking every possible support."

In the issue of *Stamp Collecting* for 24th November 1919 the proposal was re-iterated with some amplification. The Order of Philatelic Merit was intended to be awarded to collector and dealer alike and there would be no expenses or fees attached. There would be no posthumous awards. It advised that a Council of distinguished philatelists had been formed and it was hoped that an announcement concerning its deliberations could be made in the near future.

On 13th December 1919 the magazine carried an illustration of the Diploma which had been designed and printed in two colours by Messrs Butler and Co of St Leonards-on-Sea.

There seems, however, to have been some reluctance on the part of the distinguished to judge upon the distinguished, and thereby forfeiting the right to be judged. Only F J Melville is named with Bishop, Ingram and Vallancey as making up the Jury although "probably other names will be added in the near future". Already one senses that the Jury made up entirely of members of the London Stamp Club was beginning to feel somewhat isolated. Nevertheless it was stated that the names of some fifty philatelists would be placed before the Jury at its next meeting, and that although future awards would be sparse in number, the first list would of necessity be long. A proof of the Diploma was shown at the London Stamp Club meeting held on 15th January 1920.

On 18th March 1920 Vallancey was able to report on the work of the Jury. The Constitution of the Order had been defined, and the first list of awards announced.

The Jury's First Awards

Ninety-one names nominated by members of the jury and various societies were considered and it was resolved, with absolute unanimity in every instance, to confer the Order of Merit upon the following twenty five philatelists, further awards being reserved for a future occasion.

An uncertain start

There had been unanimous acceptance of the bestowal of the Order by the ten philatelists in the United Kingdom, some by letter and others by telegram. Captain G L Tinker MC, Secretary of the London Stamp Club, was at pains to point out that these ten philatelists were immediately members of the Jury. To these would be added the overseas recipients as soon as they had been communicated with. But all was not well... The immediately following issues of *Stamp Collecting* carry no further mention of the Order of Philatelic Merit. There were no interviews with those to be honoured and no comment on the wisdom or otherwise of the Jury. Apart from *The Stamp Collectors Fortnightly* the contemporary philatelic press *The London Philatelist*, *The Philatelic Journal of Great Britain*, *The Postage Stamp*, *The Stamp Lover* and *The West End Philatelist* had solidly remained aloof of the proposal when it had first been put forward and continued to remain silent. Nevertheless it is obvious that philatelists in general and the Establishment in particular were concerned with the turn of events, and that there had been much discussion. Two months after the awards had been made *Stamp Collecting* reported without amplification that the Order of Philatelic Merit was to be an important item on the Agenda of the 7th Philatelic Congress of Great Britain to be held at Newcastle-upon-Tyne from 25th to 28th May 1920.

The Newcastle-upon-Tyne Congress

At the Congress Percy Bishop, on behalf of the London Stamp Club, outlined the scheme for honouring philatelists as has been described above. However, he introduced two important changes. First, an award entitled Order of Philatelic Merit had encountered much adverse criticism as it might appear to be imitating the various honourable Orders which were the prerogative of the Crown, and it was proposed to abandon this title - Bishop left it to others to find an alternative. Second, although the award to date had been solely the concern of the London Stamp Club, it had been made clear to the promoters that the undertaking was so far-reaching and fraught with responsibility that it ought to be administered and controlled by a body representative of collective philately in the United Kingdom. He therefore proposed "That the Congress approves of the principle of an award or diploma of Philatelic Merit and endorses the first list of twenty-five Philatelists upon whom the honour has been conferred and proceeds to appoint a Congress sub-committee to consider the whole question and to report fully thereon to the 8th Annual Philatelic Congress".

By making these changes much of the criticism which would have been levelled at the proposal had been forestalled and after lengthy Congress debate it was adopted with the amendment that the matter be referred directly to the Permanent Executive Committee of Congress rather than a sub-committee. In the event these niceties of administration were of little concern. All present realised that things had progressed too far to be abandoned. With twenty-five of the world's most distinguished philatelists already proclaimed in the philatelic press as recipients of the honour it could not, as suggested by one Congress delegate, "be referred to the Society for the Suppression of Superfluous Issues".

The Permanent Executive Committee of Congress met on 15th June 1920 and in connection with the Award of Philatelic Merit resolved "that the twenty-five names to whom the Award had already been made should be accepted as worthy recipients without question by this Committee". A sub-committee consisting of Capt. H R Oldfield, Messrs E R Woodward, W J Cochrane, B Goodfellow and A Wallace McGregor with power to add to their number was entrusted with the task of preparing a scheme to bring this objective to fruition and to report back to the full Committee.

Later F H Vallancey was co-opted to the sub-committee. Meanwhile, almost as soon as the Newcastle-upon-Tyne Congress concluded, Percy Bishop announced his departure for South Africa and took no further part in the

proceedings. Likewise Captain Tinker MC resigned as Secretary of the London Stamp Club (and of the original Jury) when at the same time he took up a professional post in Wales.

The Roll of Distinguished Philatelists

The sub-committee lost no time and at the 8th Philatelic Congress of Great Britain, held at Harrogate from 3rd until 6th May 1921, the Permanent Executive Committee was able to report the establishment of a "Roll of Distinguished Philatelists" and a scheme to govern the administration of such a Roll. Those who had made an outstanding contribution to the advancement of philately would be invited to sign the Roll and would be presented with a Letter of Thanks at Congress.

Not only was the Roll presented as a *fait accompli* but the Committee was able to announce "with feelings of pride and satisfaction" that His Most Gracious Majesty King George V had been pleased to permit his name to appear at the head of the Roll.

An intimation that they would be invited to sign the Roll had been sent to the philatelists named at the Newcastle-upon-Tyne Congress (with the exception of A B Creeke, who seems to have been disregarded) and the Committee recommended that the following additional philatelists should be similarly honoured without question or discussion:

The Committee obviously has fewer qualms in proclaiming the worthiness of home-grown philatelists than had the London Stamp Club Jury!

A telegram was sent to all the proposed signatories resident in the United Kingdom inviting them to the Congress to receive the honour and subsequently to be guests at the Congress Banquet. Those living overseas were advised of the proceedings.

Finally and importantly the Committee recommended that a rule be added to the Rules and Regulations governing Philatelic Congresses "that distinguished philatelists, whose names had been inscribed on the Congress Roll of Distinguished Philatelists, shall be entitled to attend, speak and vote at Congress".

The First 'Signing of the Roll' Ceremony

Members and delegates gathered together on 6th May, the final day of the Harrogate Congress, to witness the presentation of Letters of Thanks to the first Distinguished Philatelists. In the event it was something of an anti-climax since, of the thirty-nine nominees only seven: W D Beckton, R B Earée, H L Hayman, Hugo Griebert, F J Melville, H W Wescott and Anthony de Worms were present. E D (later Sir Edward Denny) Bacon had signed the Roll in advance at the same time as His Majesty King George V.

The citations, which were made by J H Chapman FRPSL (President of the Leeds Philatelic Society which had sponsored the Congress), the Chairman of Congress, were brief in the extreme, the assumption being that the credentials of the candidates were too well-known to require further rehearsal.

Nevertheless, it was a grand occasion. The Roll of Distinguished Philatelists was in being and had been established firmly as an essential part of the business of the Philatelic Congress. The Permanent Executive Committee of the day had made a triumph of what a year earlier might well have been a fiasco.

Meeting Places of the Board

Up to 1925 and during 1935-38 the Board met at the Chancery Lane offices of the auctioneers, Messrs Plumridge & C, at the invitation of the Directors, W Hadlow and J S Telfer - though on the odd occasion H R Oldfield's City office was the venue. When in 1925 The Royal Philatelic Society, London acquired its premises at 41, Devonshire Place, full advantage was taken of these rooms and between 1927 and 1976 the Board gathered there on thirty-five occasions, with two further meetings having been held there since.

Adrian Hopkins as Chairman during 1950-52 entertained the Board at various hotels in London and from 1977 George South as a courtesy to the now strong representation of overseas members of the Board, conducted the meetings at the Halls of some of the City Livery Companies, the Painters, the Stationers, the Watermen, and the Carpenters

Meeting places since 1989 include, the East India Club, the Arts Club, the Athenæum Club and from 2005 the Board has met at the Lansdowne Club. On two occasions, in 1979 and 1994 the Board met in the Stamp Room at Buckingham Palace.

Regardless of the place of meeting it is patent from the Minute Book that those elected to serve on the Board of Election have been conscious of the importance of the task entrusted to them and have dutifully attended the meetings. Apologies for absence are rare.

Members of the Board of Election 1921-2011

With the exception of the years 1941-1945 a Board of Election has met every year since the establishment of the Roll in 1921. Throughout this period the same Minute Book has been used and from this has been extracted the names of Board Members; the years during which they were active and the number of meetings each attended. Board Members have normally served for two or three years before coming up for re-election, so that service during 'years of activity' recorded in the table is not necessarily continuous.

In 1958 Dr Trincão of Portugal was invited to join the Board and from about 1964 half of the Board members have come from abroad. It is most praiseworthy that these important philatelists have been and are prepared to travel great distances at their own expense to take part in the deliberations of the Board, and it does much to emphasise the international nature of the institution

Other meetings of the Board bring the total to 100. During the early years, especially in the early 1920s, the format and procedure for electing signatories to the Roll, and the relationship between the Philatelic Congress of Great Britain and the Board of Election was a matter of some debate. Later special meetings have related to the formation of the RDP Trust, and to filling vacancies caused by the need to replace members of the Board.

The Honorary Secretary to the Board and Keeper of the Roll

The first Honorary Secretary to the sub-Committee for the administration of the Roll of Distinguished Philatelists and subsequently to the Board of Election was T Close, who served until 1925 when it was decided that the Honorary Secretary of the Permanent Executive Committee of Congress should also serve the Board. In this capacity followed.

J S Telfer died in 1938; conditions during 1939-45 were difficult due to World War II and it has not been possible to ascertain who acted as Secretary for the meetings of 1939-40, but H B R Clarke filled the rôle during 1946 and 1947. **Philatelic Congress of Great Britain
Harrogate, May 3rd to 6th, 1921**

Report on Signing The Roll of Distinguished Philatelists.

Presentation of Letters of Thanks and Recognition.

THE CHAIRMAN: Ladies and Gentlemen, I now come to the most important item - at least, I consider it is, and I think you will do the same - in our programme, not only of; his Congress, but of any other Congress. I refer to the 'Presentation of Letters of Thanks and Recognition to the Distinguished Philatelists whose names have been entered on the Roll.' This Congress, ladies and gentlemen, is one of epoch-making. I venture to say that never before has there been such an important Congress held. We have now a Charter, if I may so term it, for our Distinguished Philatelists, which has been headed by His Majesty the King, who has himself appended his signature to the Roll. ("Hear, hear," and loud applause.) I must confess that this is the proudest and the happiest day of my life. I have the distinguished privilege as your chairman of inaugurating this wonderful Roll of Distinguished Philatelists. The Leeds Philatelic Society, of which I have the honour to be the President, also feel that it is a very great honour to be associated with this matter, because for many years to come the Harrogate Congress of 1921 will be associated with the fact that at that Congress the Roll of Distinguished Philatelists commenced.

Unfortunately, many of those who have been approved as being entered upon the Roll are not with us to-day; illness, pressure of business, long distance, and other causes have prevented many from being here with us; but I am glad to say we have some of them present with us to-day, and we hope to have the pleasure of their company this evening. I will now commence to recite the various names.

The first is Peter John Anderson, M.A., LL.B., of the University, Aberdeen. This has been conferred upon him for Philatelic Bibliography. He has written a letter addressed to Mr. Telfer, the Hon. Secretary, dated April 29th, 1921, and he says: "I duly received your letter of the 22nd inst., and delayed answering in the hope that I might find it possible to give myself the pleasure of taking part in the Harrogate Congress. I regret, however, to have to report that it proves impossible for me to get away. The compliment which the Congress is desirous to pay me would be overwhelming, were it not that I am conscious that it is designed to do honour not so much to me personally as to a representative of the early pioneers of our fascinating science. It would have been a great pleasure to me to have an opportunity of meeting the younger and more vigorous members of your fraternity, and only the imperative duties of my official work prevent me. I would beg of you to convey to the Congress an expression of my high appreciation of the honour accorded to me and of my most grateful thanks." ("Hear, hear," and applause.)

The next one is Dr. Justus Andersen, of Kristiania, who has published Researches on Scandinavian Stamps. He writes, under date March 31st, 1921: "I beg to thank you for your kind invitation to be present at the Congress to be held at Harrogate, May 3rd to 6th, 1921. I regret very much that it is quite impossible for me to come to the meeting and shall be most obliged to you for the report of the proceedings, which you are going to send to me." (Applause.)

Now, ladies and gentlemen, we come to a name known throughout the world; a name I venture to say - shall we call him "The Premier Philatelist of the World?" - I refer to Mr. Edward Denny Bacon, M.V.O. - ("hear, hear," and loud applause) - and we are proud to think that this premier philatelist is a Britisher. I have permission to say that you will notice his name has already been appended to

the Roll when he signed the Roll in the presence of His Majesty the King. I think, ladies and gentlemen, that is a great honour, not only for us but for the recipient; it does honour to us as philatelists and also to Mr. Bacon. Our great regret is that he is not with us to-day. I am not going to recite to you what he has done because time would be too short. You all know better than I do what he has done for philately, and I repeat that he may be looked upon as the premier philatelist of the world.

The next is Mr. Arthur Thomas Bate, of New Zealand. Unfortunately we have not been able to get any reply from him yet, but, as you know, he has published the result of Research Work on New Zealand stamps.

Now we come to a name well known to all of us. I refer to Mr. Walter Dorning Beckton. ("Hear, hear," and loud applause.) He has, you are well aware, published and written articles on stamps of very many countries, many of which have been already published in philatelic journals. In addition to that he is President of that important Society, the Manchester Philatelic Society. ("Hear, hear.") I am informed that this is his twenty-fifth year as President - (applause) - a quarter of a century. I am told that it is so, although, looking at him, it is rather difficult to believe it. I will now ask Mr. Beckton if he will kindly come and sign the Roll.

Mr. Beckton signed the Roll amid loud applause and cries of "Bravo"

The next name is Dr. Carroll Chase, of New York, who has published Specialized Studies of the 1847-66 Issues of the United States, and he was President of the American Philatelic Society, 1920-21. He writes, under date of April 3rd: "I am in receipt of your kind letter of March 21st, in reference to the 'Award of Philatelic Merit,' which is intended to be given at the Philatelic Congress of Great Britain, at Harrogate, in May. It is quite impossible for me to be present in person, much as I should like to be there. Under the circumstances will you be good enough to express to the Committee my regrets for not being able to attend, and my sincere thanks for the honour to be bestowed" (Applause.)

We now come to another well known name, Dr. Emilio Diena, an author of important monographs on stamps of Italian States, and who is also noted for services rendered to international philately and expert work. He writes, under date March 26th, 1921: "I am in receipt of your favour of the 21st inst., from which I hear that the establishment of a 'Roll of Distinguished Philatelists' will be submitted to the forthcoming Philatelic Congress of Great Britain. In my opinion this proposal is quite acceptable, and I am under the impression that it will meet general consent. It is a matter for deep regret for me to be unable to be present at the said Congress, being thus prevented to renew old acquaintances and make new ones, and also to express directly my cordial appreciation for the great honour that has been conferred on me, which, I assure you, will act upon me as a stimulus for furthering the work of philatelic research. I take the liberty to ask you to be good enough to express on my behalf these feelings. Thanking you, I remain, yours faithfully, Dr. Emilio Diena." ("Hear, hear," and applause.)

Now, ladies and gentlemen, we come to another worldwide known name, the Rev. Robert Briscoe Earée. (Loud applause.) I think it is unnecessary for me to recite what he has done for philately. One thing alone, his "Album Weeds," suffices. ("Hear, hear.") Apart from that, I need not say what he has done, because it is well known to all of you. I am delighted he has done us, and myself personally, the honour of appearing at this Congress. (Applause.) At some personal inconvenience

he has come up from Cheltenham to Harrogate, and I am sure we have all been delighted to see him here. I will now ask him to come and append his signature to the Roll.

The Rev. R. B. Earée signed the Roll, amid loud applause.)

The next is also a well known name, Major Edward Benjamin Evans, R.A. (Applause.) I have made a few notes as to what these Distinguished Philatelists have done, but I really think it is unnecessary labour to read them to you. ("Hear, hear.") You all know better than I do what their work has been. ("Hear, hear.") Major Evans writes, on March 24th, 1921: "I am very much obliged for your letter of the 21st, on the subject of the 'Award of Philatelic Merit' and the proposed establishment of a 'Roll of Distinguished Philatelists.' I quite agree that anything of this kind should be dealt with by the Philatelic Congresses of Great Britain, and I shall be very proud to have my name entered on the Roll. I fear that it will not be possible for me to be present at the Harrogate Philatelic Congress, which I hope and believe will be a great success. I have not lost my interest in philately; indeed, I am now helping to revive a 'Norfolk and Norwich Stamp Club', which may perhaps develop into a philatelic society, and I am wondering whether I shall live to see a Philatelic Congress at Norwich." (Applause.)

The next name is one of our foreign friends, Monsieur Louis Hanciau, of Brussels, who has been a chronicler of stamps and the author of important monographs. He writes, under date March 27th, 1921, in reply to the letter sent to him, that the idea is quite new to him. He says: "I was unaware of the objects of this Philatelic Congress. I regard my name being placed on the Roll as some recompense for my philatelic research, but I fear that you exaggerate my merits." He also says: "As to coming over, I fear this is impossible. I am now eighty-six years of age, and one does not reach this age without having infirmities. However, if I could have come over I should have been delighted to have been with you." ("Hear, hear," and applause.)

Now, ladies and gentlemen, we have the pleasure of the company of the next Distinguished Philatelist. I refer to Mr. Harry Lewis Hayman. I know a few enthusiastic supporters of philately, but I must say I do not know a more enthusiastic one than Mr. Hayman: his enthusiasm simply exudes from him. You know he is a supporter of all philatelic enterprises; he is the President of the Herts Philatelic Society, and I think he is well worthy of being entered on the Roll of Distinguished Philatelists. ("Hear, hear.") I will therefore ask him to come and sign the Roll.

Mr. Hayman signed the Roll amid loud applause.

The next name is that of Mr. Arthur Francis Basset Hull. He is known for his studies in the stamps of Tasmania. Unfortunately, we have not yet been able to get any reply from him.

The next name is Mr. Clifton Armstrong-Howes, S.B., of Boston. He is the author of works on Canada and the stamps of Eastern Asia. We have as yet had no reply from him.

Then comes Mr. William Russell Lane-Joynt, of Dublin. He is the Curator of the Leinster Collection at the Science and Art Museum, Dublin. Unfortunately Mr. Lane-Joynt is too ill to attend.

Then we have our Eastern friend, Monsieur Umejiro Kimura, of Tokio. He is the author of works on the stamps of Japan, Editor of the "Yuraku," and President of the Yurakukai. I have got on very well up to now, but the pronunciation of some of these names recalls to my mind what the lady said

over the telephone: "I want you to send some of that liqueur. I cannot pronounce it, but I will spell it to you." (Laughter.)

The next name is Mr. John Nicholas Luff, of New York City. (Applause.) He is well known for his work in philately, especially for his U.S.A. book.

Now, ladies and gentlemen, we come to another well known name, Mr. Charles James Phillips. ("Hear, hear," and applause.) He writes, under date April 23rd, 1921: "I am extremely obliged to you and to the Committee of the Harrogate Congress for the great honour you propose to confer on me at the meeting at Harrogate, but I regret to say that it will be quite impossible for me to attend the Congress at all. During the last twelve months I have taken a very great interest in societies that have as their object the fostering of good relations between the two great Anglo-Saxon countries - Great Britain and the United States of America - and I am on several committees and a member of a couple of clubs in which this object is our chief plank. I am very busy, indeed, working the whole of May at plans for receiving a representative body of between 2,000 and 3,000 Americans in this country, and I cannot leave London for a single day during May. Please express this to your Committee and thank them for the proposed honour, but it is totally unmerited, and I have done so little for the Congresses, whilst others have done so much. With kindest regards to you all and wishing you every success, I am, yours very sincerely, Charles J. Phillips."

The next is Mr. Bertram William Henry Poole, of the United States. (Applause.) He has made numerous studies in stamps of many countries. This is what he writes, under date April 12th, 1921: "I am much obliged for your kind letter of March 21st inviting me to attend the Philatelic Congress in May next, and much as I would like to be present I fear the little trifle of 6,000 miles of land and water between us makes it impossible! I certainly hope that the Congress will be every bit as successful as its predecessors. Yours very truly, B. W. H. Poole."

The next name is Mr. Winter Charles Renouf, of India. We have as yet received no reply from him. As you know, he is the Editor of the Philatelic Journal of India, and has published many monographs on East Indian and British Indian stamps used abroad.

The next name is Baron Axel de Reuterskiold, of Switzerland. (Applause.) He has, of course, dealt principally with Swiss stamps, and has contributed many articles to the Press. He writes under date, 25th March, 1921: - "Many thanks for your letter of the 21st re the Roll of Distinguished Philatelists, and the invitation to attend the Harrogate Congress. I regret that it is impossible for me to go to England in May, as I have to go the week after your Congress to Mulhouse, where I have been named on the Jury for the Exhibition, that is to take place there on the 15th of May. Regretting my inability to attend the Congress this year, I remain, very truly yours, A. de Reuterskiold."

The next name is Mr. William Reynolds Ricketts, of the United States. We have received as yet no letter from him. His work, especially in connexion with the literature of our hobby, is well known to us.

The next name is Mr. Charles Esterley Severn, of Chicago, who has contributed to the American Philatelic Press many articles. He writes, under date 7th April, 1921: - "I wish to thank you, as Hon. Secretary of the Sub-Committee to Administer the Roll of Distinguished Philatelists, for your invitation to attend the Harrogate Philatelic Congress, to be held on May 3, 4, 5, and 6, 1921. I am

deeply sensible of the honour done me by including my name in a 'Roll of Distinguished Philatelists' and it is needless for me to say that I shall be proud of the distinction to be conferred on me. I realise that I shall be unable to be present on the occasion that will be of so much interest to me, but I shall dwell in thought on the proceedings. With appreciation of your goodness, I am,
Very truly yours, C. E. Severn."

The next name is Mr. Emil Tamsen, of the Transvaal, who has studied the South African stamps, and notably the printings of the Transvaal issues. We have not yet heard from him!

The next is a name well-known to all of us, Mr, Robert Blake Yardley. (Loud applause.) I need not repeat to you what he has done and is doing. Unfortunately, his business engagements prevent him from being here. He writes, under date 29th March, 1921: - "I thank you for your letter of the 21st, I had already heard from Mr. Telfer that I was to receive the honour of a letter and enrolment, which I accept with great pleasure. I am afraid it will not be possible for me to attend the Congress, much as I should have liked to do so, but my time is so fully occupied with important, and often urgent, business, that I do not think it will be possible for me to go so far away as Harrogate in the first week of May. I am, dear sir, Faithfully yours, R. B. Yardley."

The next one is an old friend, who has gone abroad. He was with us at the Newcastle Congress, and I think no one enjoyed more than I did his Paper on that occasion. I refer to Mr. Percy Cooke Bishop. (Loud applause.) I am sure, that although he is not here in body he is here to-day in spirit with us, and his organisation work in connexion with philately will bear fruit for many years to come.

The next name is Mr. Lionel William Fulcher - (applause) - who has done so much in research work on Norwegian stamps. He writes, on the 4th of this month: - "I beg to tender you my very hearty thanks for your telegram, conveying to me the notice of my election to the Roll of Distinguished Philatelists by the Congress. I am very sensible of the great honour the Congress has conferred on me, and have an uneasy feeling that the very little I have been able to do in philately scarcely merits such a high distinction. I still hope to do some further work in philately, and for the future it will be my endeavour to deserve the opinion which the philatelic world has expressed in so signal a manner. I regret very much that I am unable to come to Harrogate this week and accept your kind invitation to the banquet on Friday evening, but must ask you, if opportunity arises, kindly to convey to my fellow philatelists my high appreciation of their endorsement of my philatelic efforts and my grateful thanks for their generous recognition of them. - Yours faithfully, L. W. Fulcher."

The next is one who is known personally to all of us. I refer to Mr. Hugo Griebert. (Loud applause.) His work has been of the utmost importance. His works on "Uruguay" and "Spain" alone would entitle him to enrolment; in addition to which he has been awarded the Crawford Medal by the Royal Society for his work on Spain. I am very pleased he has been able to attend, and I will ask him to come and sign the Roll.

Mr. Hugo Griebert signed the Roll amid loud applause.

The next name is Mr. Thomas William Hall. I am sure you will all be sorry that Mr. Hall is unable to be with us to-day. His work in various branches has been very important. As you know, he is the Editor of "The London Philatelist," and also Vice-President of the Royal Society. He writes, in a letter dated the 4th of this month: - "I am indeed sorry I can't obey your telegram, because several urgent cases demand my attention before Mr. Justice Hill, and there is a case on Friday. It is sheer bad luck for me - but I suppose it can't be helped. Believe me my defection is not want of will, but

absolute inability. Wishing you all the success you deserve. - Yours sincerely, T. W. Hall.” (Hear, hear.)

The next name is Mr. David Howarth Hill, of Victoria, who has done so much for Australian philately. Unfortunately we have had no reply yet from him.

Now, ladies and gentlemen, we come to another well-known name, and one who is with us here to-day. I refer to Mr. Frederick Melville. (Loud applause.) I am not going to tell you what he has done and is doing, because you know him better than I do. You see him, I was going to say, almost daily, so I will content myself by asking him to come and sign the Roll.

Mr. Melville signed the Roll amid loud applause.

The next name is Mr. John Norris Marsden, of Lisbon - (applause) - who is noted for his research work on stamps of Portugal and the Colonies.

The next name is Mr. Charles Lathrop Pack - (applause) - which is a household word in philately. I have no letter from him. I am sorry to say he is in bad health.

Then we have one who, I am sorry to find, has been at the last moment unable to be with us, Mr. Percy Loines Pemberton. (Applause.) As you know, he has done considerable research work in the stamps of Greece. He writes, under date the 5th of this month: - “I am very sorry that a certain business matter, which made it impossible for me to leave town this week, has prevented me coming to the Congress, as I had fully intended. I delayed writing earlier, as I had hoped that matters might so shape themselves that I should be able to get away for the last day at least, but I could not manage even this. Please accept my apologies for being absent. Will you please hand the enclosed cheque for £5 (Five pounds) to Dr. Solly, as a donation towards the expenses of the Congress. - Yours sincerely. - P. L. Pemberton.” (Hear, hear, and applause.)

The next name is Commander Francis John Hamilton Scott Napier, R.N. (Applause.) This honour has been conferred upon him for the publication and also for collaboration with Mr. E. D. Bacon of innumerable articles on research work.

Now we give a turn to our Scotch friends. (Hear, hear.)

The next name is Mr. John Walker, of Edinburgh. He writes under date the third of this month: “I have received your wire and have to thank the Congress, through you, for the honour you have done me in selecting me for a place in the Roll of Honour of Distinguished Philatelists. This I regard as a great honour for my humble services and for what I have done in advancing our hobby. Commencing to collect in 1864, I have been at it more or less until now, not having the time now as formerly, I do not go so hard at it. Still my interests are all there. I thank you for your kind invitation to the Banquet on Friday, but regret I shall not be able to be there. Wishing you a very enjoyable evening and a very successful Congress. I remain, yours very sincerely, John Walker.”

The next name is Mr. Arthur John Warren - (Applause) - who has done so much for us in elucidating the stamps of Holland. Unfortunately he is not coming.

In the next we have a well known face here, Mr. Harry William Westcott - (Loud applause) - President of the City of London Society for twelve years, and who has done research work on

Gibraltar, Morocco Agencies, and others. I am very pleased he has been able to be with us during the whole of this Congress. I will ask him to come and sign the Roll.

Mr. Westcott signed the Roll amid loud applause.

I am sorry to say that we have not yet been able to get into communication with the next, Sir Charles Stewart-Wilson, K.C.I.E., who has done research work in stamps of India and Indian Native States. I have a letter here, dated 4th May, from his wife or daughter, I do not know which, but probably it is his wife: - "Your long very kind telegram was re-directed to me here. Sir Charles is in Bulgaria, working in the Reparation Commission. I shall forward your kind telegram to him. He will, I am sure, be very sorry not to avail himself of your kind invitation. Yours truly, Blanche Stewart-Wilson." (Hear, hear.)

The next name, Mr. Anthony de Worms, is well known to all of us, especially in connection with Ceylon. I remember a number of years ago he was good enough to show at the Leeds Society his collection of Ceylon, and it almost made me give up collecting. When I saw that collection, I thought, "If that is a collection, it is almost impossible for an ordinary mortal to achieve getting anything together like it." I think his work in connection with Ceylon alone would entitle him to be put on the Roll of Distinguished Philatelists, and I have very great pleasure in asking him to come and sign the Roll.

Mr. Anthony de Worms signed the Roll amid loud applause.

I may say that with regard to the absentees, their signatures will be obtained and then placed upon the Roll.

MR. BENJAMIN GOODFELLOW (The Manchester Philatelic Society): Transferred.

THE CHAIRMAN: Transferred.

MR. BENJAMIN GOODFELLOW (The Manchester Philatelic Society): Forged, in fact! (Laughter.)

THE CHAIRMAN: Ladies and gentlemen, the next item is a very interesting one, and that is the voting for the most interesting Paper that has been read at this Congress. I would like to have your opinion, ladies and gentlemen. There are two ways I would suggest, and I would like to have your views, and that quickly, how it should be dealt with. Will you vote that only those who have heard the whole of the seven Papers read shall vote, or will you have it that all those who have heard even only one or two shall vote?

MR. I. J. SIMONS (The Royal Philatelic Society, London): I should say that those who have heard the whole of the Papers alone ought to be allowed to vote. I do not think it is quite satisfactory for those to vote who have only heard one or two Papers.

MR. ADRIAN HOPKINS (The Bristol and Clifton Philatelic Society): Mr. Chairman, I should like to second that as one who has only been here two days, although I should like to have attended the whole Congress. I cannot judge of all the Papers.

MR. J. NEVIN (The Nottinghamshire Philatelic Society): Mr. Chairman, I have heard all of them, but I still think that those who have heard some of the Papers should be entitled to vote. It is rather

hard that a man who has given an excellent Paper should be precluded from having the vote of those who have heard it.

MR. I. J. SIMONS (The Royal Philatelic Society, London): Mr. Chairman, I do not want to put it too strongly, but I do not think it is fair- I wanted to keep off that word "fair" if possible - that members of the Congress should vote upon one or two Papers, when they have not been able to form an opinion upon the others, amongst which there might be one of infinitely more interest than the ones they have heard.

MRS. M. GREEVZ-FISHER (The Leeds Philatelic Society): I quite support the remarks of Mr. Simons.

MR. W. H. MILNES MARSDEN (The Derby Philatelic Society): Mr. Chairman, as one who has been present and heard only one or two of the Papers, I should not like to lose my democratic vote. Might I suggest something in fairness to all that they might adopt what is not the usual, but a customary practice, of referring this matter to the Executive Committee.

MR. BENJAMIN GOODFELLOW (The Manchester Philatelic Society): Mr. Chairman, it seems to me you must make up your mind one way or the other; you must either give the members the privilege of voting for the Telfer Cup, or you are going to leave it to a Committee, or leave it to Mr. Telfer. I think the answer to Mr. Simons is, if a delegate feels he has not been able to hear the Papers or to gather sufficient from his friends by general comment to give a vote, he would meet the question quite fairly by refraining from voting, and leaving it to those who have been more fortunate to record their full vote. (Hear, hear, and applause.)

I think if you are going to leave it to the delegates you must leave it to them at large, and leave it to their sense of fairness to abstain from voting if necessary.

THE CHAIRMAN: Does that meet your views, Mr. Nevin ?

MR. NEVIN (The Nottinghamshire Philatelic Society): Absolutely, sir.

THE CHAIRMAN: Then let the Papers be given out.

MR. BENJAMIN GOODFELLOW (The Manchester Philatelic Society): Are the Papers only to be given to members and delegates ?

THE CHAIRMAN: Yes, to members and delegates, and to Distinguished Philatelists. Will you kindly put one cross against the name of the author of the Paper that you vote for.

MR. I. J. SIMONS (The Royal Philatelic Society, London): Mr. Chairman, it might help those who have to record the votes if you say which side the cross is to be placed. .

THE CHAIRMAN: Please put the cross at the right-hand side.

MR. J. L. GREEN (The Royal Philatelic Society, London): Mr. Chairman, are we to vote for the most interesting or for the most scientific Paper?
