School Explicit Improvement Agenda

While schools are a hive of activity across a broad range of areas, it is critical that we identify key areas of focus across the school each year. This year our school improvement areas are:

Enrolment numbers

Each year, staffing allocations are made based on the number of students enrolled by the 8th day of school. 2020 was slightly different due to the effects of weather events and the Novel Coronavirus (now known as COVID-19), seeing numbers finalised on the 13th day of the school year. Our predicted numbers were relatively accurate, with 473 students currently enrolled across 20 classrooms.

Reminders

We are tremendously proud of our beautiful school grounds, and continue to work hard to ensure learning and play areas are as aesthetically pleasing and as safe as possible. Please keep in mind the following reminders throughout 2020, to assist us with maintaining a safe and supportive environment:

- Students are welcome to school from 8:15am onwards. If students arrive before this time, they are required to sit in the undercover area (please note that supervision is only provided from 8:00am onwards and student should not be arriving before this time). We ask that parents/carers of Prep students remain with them before school, until the 8:35am bell.
- Students and families are asked to remain off the oval and playgrounds before school.
- Please have children below school age accompanied by an adult at all times.
- Students are asked to leave the school grounds at the end of the school day without delay (when riding or walking home), unless accompanied by an adult.
- Supervision is only provided at the bus zone and pick-up area until 3:10pm if occasional circumstances prevent you from picking your child up before 3:10pm, please contact the school office.
- Students being picked up at the pickup zone are asked to move to this area without delay, to avoid any unnecessary delays in traffic. Equally, if your child is not waiting at the pickup zone when you arrive, please continue driving through this area and return soon after to allow traffic flow to continue. Please note that this is a 2 minute standing zone.
- All families are asked to leave the school grounds by approximately 3:10pm to ensure grounds maintenance and after school care operations can be undertaken (unless of course attending an arranged meeting with your child's teacher).

Parent-Teacher Interviews

Towards the end of this term, we will invite you to book a parent-teacher interview with your child's teacher. We are trialling the use of an online booking platform for the first time for these interviews, so please keep an eye on your emails over coming weeks for information on how to book an interview. This is another fantastic opportunity to engage with your child's classroom teacher about how their learning and behaviour is going in class, what their next steps in learning are, and how we can continue to work together to build success in 2020.

Positive Behaviour for Learning

PBL is a school-wide approach to recognise, teach and promote consistent positive behaviours that ensure a safer and more productive learning environment for students. As this is a school-wide approach, it provides consistency between classrooms, teachers, teacher aides, as well as other school staff and visitors to our school. PBL focuses on what school expectations looks like, how they are taught, rewarded, and how behavioural issues are managed. The PBL program is also supported regionally, through the allocation of a Regional Coach (Greg Cooper), who works with the school to ensure consistent and effective alignment of the PBL philosophy and processes.

I am very proud to say that we have had a great start to the school year. The students have been working very hard to achieve stamps on their Positive Possum Reward Chart and progress through the recognition levels: Possum Post Card, Brilliant Level, Awesome Level, EPIC Level.

Languages

Bienvenue

A warm welcome to all returning and new French students this term. Year 5 and 6 are now immersed in the French-only language learning classroom, using the Accelerated Integrated Methodology (AIM). Through this approach, students learn the target vocabulary, grammar and syntactical skills through contextualised plays, with a strong focus on developing communicative and fluency skills. They then extend this learning to spontaneous classroom interactions and creative tasks. Learning is kinaesthetic, visual and



auditory, thereby responding to a variety of learning styles. The classes are fast-paced with engagement in a variety of multimodal texts, songs, dances, puppets (les marionnettes) and drama. It is wonderful to work with engaged students really enjoying learning to see and feel the language. Students have also started to connect with exploring French as a global language, researching one of thirty-three francophone countries, developing cultural awareness while reflecting on their own intercultural experiences. Global schools through languages

A few weeks ago, I attended a workshop initiative of the Global Schools for Languages Hub (Education Queensland) for teachers working to align content and delivery within the national ACARA 2020 Languages Curriculum. One emphasis was on the importance of preparing students to be global citizens of the future. Inherent in this is the development of intercultural awareness, cultural sensitivity and the ability to communicate with global competence in a changing world, within and beyond multicultural Australia. Educators recognise a need to prepare students for a universal outlook in their futures, developing cultural interconnectedness skills for life and work in an age of increasing technological advance across cultures. Did you know that at least 50% of our world is bi-lingual or multi-lingual and nearly 75% of the world speaks little or no English? As part of the workshop, the presenters displayed the Global Schools for Languages Learning site for Queensland. I was delighted to see several slides featuring past Cooroy State School students, highly engaged with Mr Rugins and the play puppets, in the early days of our school first embracing the AIM teaching methodology. I felt immensely proud of Cooroy State School's reputation and achievement in language learning skills being showcased across Queensland in the State's 2020 languages curriculum roll out.

Religious Instruction

Under the Education (General Provisions) Act 2006, schools are to provide Religious Instruction (RI) if approached by a faith group seeking to provide RI and students of that faith that attend the school.

RI informs students about the beliefs and values of a particular religion. It is delivered by volunteers of a faith group using instructional materials approved by that faith group. RI is required to be consistent with legislation and Department of Education policies and procedures.

All RI instructors must hold a blue card and participate in compulsory Student Protection and Code of Conduct training. RI instructors are only entitled to deliver the RI program outlined below. A school staff member will be present during the delivery of RI.

Participation in RI is not compulsory. Students are allocated to RI (except in Prep) based on information provided by parents on the completed Application for student enrolment unless other written instructions have been provided to the school. If this information has changed, please email admin@cooroyss.eq.edu.au with further advice

Note: This consent remains in effect unless the parent informs the school otherwise in writing.

A description of the RI available is provided below:

Christian Religious Instruction (CRI) at Cooroy State School

Participating Faith Groups:

Local Christian Churches come together to offer Christian RI on a cooperative and non-denominational basis.

These local churches include Anglican, Baptist, Catholic, Gospel Hall, Seventh Day Adventist and Uniting Church (others may be added).

The local churches donate funds for the curriculum materials and student workbooks. Note: All religious instructors must have an Education Queensland Approval Form signed by their church leader and carry a current Blue Card.

Authorized Program:

The providers of Christian RI are committed to best-practice curriculum resources, approved for use in QLD schools.

The most popular Christian RI curriculum resources in QLD state schools are: Connect, Beginning with God and Big Questions (all published by Christian Education Publications) and GodSpace (published by Burst Christian Resources).

The CRI program at Cooroy State School uses Beginning with God, Connect, Big Questions and GodSpace curriculum.

Aims and Goals:

The aim of the program is to inform students about the basic beliefs of the Christian faith from a non-denominational perspective, which means focusing on the shared foundation that the Christian churches have in common.

Lesson structure:

A variety of teaching methods may be used including storytelling, music, drama, activity books, games, quizzes, video clips and puppet shows.

Allocated lesson time is usually 30 minutes per week for four terms.

Other Instruction

Students who are not participating in RI will be provided with other instruction in a separate supervised location. Other instruction must relate to part of a subject area already covered in class and may include:

- personal research and/or assignments
- revision of class work such as creative writing or literacy and/or numeracy activities which could include online programs currently accessed by the students of that school
- wider reading such as independent reading appropriate to the student

Parents will be advised of any changes to the RI and other instruction programs to ensure they are able to make an informed decision on their child's participation.

Noosa District School Sport Trials 2020

As usual, all students attending Noosa District School Sport Trials MUST be nominated through their school BY THE DUE DATE.

For District Swimming, Cross Country and Athletics Trials

Students are selected to attend these three District Trials by competing in our Cooroy School swimming, cross country and athletics (track and field) carnivals. Students qualify depending on their place in finals, their time, distance or height.

These District Trials are held AFTER school. Students qualify to attend these Trials based on age, experience and skill level. As schools are limited in the number of students they may nominate, Cooroy SS may organise a trial at school to determine which students may attend.

Nomination Process

1. To aid in timely communication, we ask parents and carers of 10, 11 and 12 yr old students to complete an expression of interest form.

Returning this form means that your son or daughter will be considered to attend the District Sport Selection Trials.

2. As soon as relevant information is forwarded to schools, Cooroy SS will send

trial information form, consent/medical form and code of conduct form home with students who are nominated to attend the trial.

Conditions for nominatons:

- 1. Only students turning 11yrs (Born 2009) or 12yrs (Born 2008) are eligible for the District Sport Trials listed below. Some sports include 10yrs (born 2010).
- 2. Students need to regularly participate in a sport at club level with a high skill level for their age. This is not a "come & try" session.
- 3. Students must have parental permission and be nominated by Cooroy SS by the due date to attend any District Trial.
- 4. There is a selection process at school to ensure that students have sufficient skills.
- 5. Parents or carers are responsible for transport to and from the Trials as well as supervision of their child whilst there.
