
# Kendall Square Walking Map








# The Most Innovative Square Mile on the Planet

A prime example of that symbiotic relationship is Kendall Square, the City's innovation district. MIT is fully engaged in the Kendall Square community, along with other research institutions, innovative companies, neighbors, and nonprofit organizations like the Kendall Square Association — all working to nurture and advance the most innovative square mile on the planet.

Since 2010, MIT has been working with the broader community to advance a proposal to bring new energy and diversity to Kendall Square. The Institute's Kendall Square Initiative aims to create a vibrant mixed-use district featuring six new buildings on MIT-owned parking lots in order to deliver a dynamic blend of activities in the square. Housing, active open space, retail, research and innovation space, and a new home for the MIT Museum will contribute significantly to the life and character of the community.

Strengthening vital collaborations within Kendall Square's innovation ecosystem will advance the pace of life-changing science, preparing MIT to take on the challenges of the next 100 years.

# A few highlights of MIT's first century in Cambridge:

# How it All Started

MIT founder William Barton Rogers always believed in the power of science to raise civilization. When he learned of interest in Boston for a new technical institute, he left his position on the University of Virginia faculty to pursue his dream up north. Bearing the slogan Mens et Manus (Mind and Hand), MIT's official seal is a perfect pictogram of Rogers's vision — a school dedicated to scholarship, yielding real-world progress

By 1909, MIT buildings dotted Boston's Back Bay, but the school lacked a cohesive campus. Resisting overtures from Harvard to merge, President Richard Cockburn Maclaurin secured land along the Charles River and hired alumnus William Welles Bosworth (Class of 1889) to design a revolutionary new campus. The largest single building in the nation at the time, it was the first of many architectural innovations that have become a metaphor for the invention going on inside.

# **Building for Invention**

Dubbed the "magical incubator," Building 20 was erected in 1943 to house the crucial war work of the MIT Radiation Laboratory. The temporary barracks blossomed into a legendary subculture and wasn't razed for half a century. Frank Gehry designed the Ray and Maria Stata Center on the site to engender the same spirit of interdisciplinary collaboration. Pulitzer Prizewinning critic Robert Campbell said his post-modernist creation "shouts the joy of invention."

# Town and Gown Collaboration

In 1973, advances in DNA research were generating widespread societal unease. Cambridge Mayor Alfred Vellucci convened a televised public forum about whether to permit rDNA experiments within City limits, bringing together citizens and MIT experts with the hope to demystify the subject. After a series of highprofile hearings, Cambridge passed the nation's first laws guiding rDNA research, paving the way for biotech to blossom in Cambridge.

# Entrepreneurship

MIT is renowned for cultivating invention, but it also has developed the art and science of moving it to market. The Institute has become an unparalleled entrepreneurship engine in every realm, from artificial intelligence to artificial limbs. Alumni have founded more than 30,000 active companies employing an estimated 4.6 million people and generating annual global revenues of nearly \$2 trillion. If they formed their own country, that nation would be the 10th largest economy in the world.

# **Global Responsibility**

Service — to the community, the nation, and the world — is the common denominator of Institute research. In MIT's earliest days, scientists and engineers dedicated their efforts to technological innovations. During the wars, focus shifted to defense work. For the last half century, researchers have been invested in projects that improve the human condition, from curing cancer to transforming the world's energy systems. Today, there's at least one group at MIT dedicated to most global dilemmas.
