PAUL DILLON - TALKING ALCOHOL AND DRUGS WITH OUR STUDENTS AND COMMUNITY

On 24 September 2019, we were thrilled to welcome Paul Dillon back to St Michael's College. Paul presented his alcohol and drug information sessions to our senior students again which was perfect timing with many students turning 18 and 'Schoolies' for some students being just around the corner. Each year, Paul presents the latest research data around alcohol and drug use, highlighting that the majority of young people are not engaging in these behaviours. Paul's sessions also have a strong safety focus, with many important messages which stay with our senior students. There was also a clear message about looking after each other when we go out.

Our Year 10, 11 and 12 students responded very well to Paul and his mix of tough reality and humour. The information he shared was potentially lifesaving for young people and will help to inform safe choices. Senior students were very engaged throughout the session and have reflected positively on Paul's sessions with teachers, and hopefully at home with their families.

This year, we were fortunate to secure Paul to present an evening session for parents and caregivers. Those in attendance received updated data as well as practical strategies on how to support their child and have open dialogue about these types of matters. Paul concluded his presentation with a key message for parents:

Three simple golden rules...

- Know where your child is
- Know who they're with
- Know when they'll be home

Paul's annual visit to the College is just one part of what we do across the curriculum and pastoral programs to educate our students in this particular area about being safe. Working collaboratively with families to support student wellbeing is critical, so we encourage all parents and caregivers to extend on student learning at home with supportive and informed conversations.

As always, we look forward to Paul visiting our College around this time next year.

WHAT IS ELLA?

ELLA is an exciting digital language-learning program for Reception students in RB and RM. It opens up a world of cultural possibilities for children early in life.

Children learn Italian using play-based apps called The Polyglots. (A polyglot is someone who is multilingual.) They use the apps on their iPad at school. The apps were designed with help from language, early childhood and technology experts.

The apps have a cast of colourful characters – the Polyglots – who introduce children to a new language through digital play. Experiences match young children's interests, like cooking, art, building, role-play and music. This means that the apps are as engaging as they are educational. It has been exciting hearing the students using the language while playing the interactive games. So far we have covered these topics, with app 7 and 8 available in Term 4.


We filled our days with activities such as: board games, sports, bubble fun, foil boat building challenge, monster name craft and mask making.

ATTENDANCE/PUNCTUALITY

All students in Years 7-12 are required to be at school by 8:40 am each day. All absences must be accounted for and parents are requested to contact the College via the Absentee Line 8150 2323 by 9:30 am if a student is going to be absent or late. Prolonged absences through illness should be accompanied by a Medical Certificate and the Year Level Director contacted so work can be forwarded if appropriate and in keeping with the successful recovery of the student.

Examples of acceptable reasons for student absences include:

- Sickness, including danger of being affected by an infectious or contagious disease.
- Unavoidable and sufficient cause, eg: bereavement within the family or of a close friend; family trauma; cultural reasons; or appointments that cannot be arranged out of school hours
- Participating in school-related events/activities, eg VET, excursion, camp, work experience, etc.

Examples of unacceptable reasons for student absences include:

- Truancy
- Helping at home or at parent/caregiver's place of work
- Part-time or casual work (including travel to and from such work)
- Appointments which could be made out of school hours (including driving lessons/tests, haircuts, etc).
- Excessive time for appointments which are avoidable and could be made at other times
- Catching up on assignments or studying during non-SWOT Vac periods
- Working from home or mental health days (where there are no Mental Health Plans in place)
- Holidays that could be booked during school holiday times.

Leaving During School Hours

Students are not permitted to leave the school grounds without signed permission from their parent/guardian, Pastoral Teacher and Year Level Director. Students must also sign out via the Administration Office.

If a student needs to leave early for an appointment etc please write a note in the diary. This note will be signed by their Pastoral Care Teacher and Year Level Director prior to leaving via the Administration Office. If students feel unwell at school, they must report to the First Aid Room in the Administration Office.

Students must not contact parents during school to pick them up. In emergency situations, students may request to make a phone call from the Year Level Director's Office.

CELEBRATING INDIGENOUS STUDENTS' SUCCESS

There are currently 46 Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people undergoing Year 12 in Catholic Education schools across the State. Last week, St Michael's was represented by Indigenous Year 12 student, Maiye Rigney in attending a celebration at the Catholic Education Office to acknowledge the achievements of Year 12 Indigenous students in Catholic Schools. At the event, Dr Neil McGoran, Director of Catholic Education South Australia, spoke of the wonderful achievements that were being made by the Year 12s present. He also took the opportunity to thank their families and their teachers for their ongoing support of the students. The students were involved in a smoking ceremony using a brazier constructed in the shape of the globe representing what power the students will have once they leave school and go out to make a difference in the world. Each student was also given an amazing, unique artwork painted by renowned Indigenous Artist, Bernadine Karama Johnson of the Arrernte Group from NT.

Maiye Rigney, (pictured) reflected on what the celebration meant to her, "As a young Indigenous person being able to experience a celebration like the Indigenous Catholic Education Year 12 ceremony was extremely important. This was an opportunity for all Year 12 Indigenous students in Catholic schools to come together to celebrate all of the hard work they have put in to achieve their SACE. It was also a chance for parents and other family members to be a part of the celebration and to be acknowledged for their efforts in helping us to be successful in our schooling".



UNPLUGGED - INTERNET GAMING ADDICTION WORKSHOP

Dear Parents / Caregivers,

The World Health Organization (WHO) has identified a new disease - gaming disorder. The WHO defines the disorder as "a pattern of gaming behaviour with increasing priority given to gaming over other activities ... and continuation or escalation of gaming despite the occurrence of negative consequences."

While playing internet games can be a safe and a healthy activity for children and young people, internet use and gaming can quickly become a problem.

To tackle this growing phenomenon, United Care Wesley Bowden (UCWB) offer workshops to schools that can help parents learn how to identify problematic gaming and develop practical strategies to support healthier gaming and internet use. The Unplugged workshop covers:

- Definitions of internet and gaming addiction.
- How to identify signs of problematic gaming.
- The mental and physical health implications of high levels of gaming.
- Why gamers play (emotional needs and the brain).
- How to communicate effectively with their children about gaming and technology.
- Practical tips and proven strategies to combat problem gaming (common mistakes to avoid).
- Current internet and gaming trends, latest scientific research.
- The other dangers of gaming (eg: micro-transactions, loot boxes, in-app purchases).
- How to manage associated problems (eg: school refusal).

Unplugged was co-developed with Dr Huu Kim Le at CGI Clinic and Cam Adair at GameQuitters.



TRANSITION TO 2020

University

Year 12 students considering applying for a University course in 2020 (or even considering deferment until 2021) must have submitted an online SATAC application by Monday 30 September.

Once students have submitted their application they will have an 8 digit SATAC Registration Number to confirm the first step and then students need to ensure they pay the \$45 application fee. There are a number of courses that cannot be added after the September 30 deadline (see inside front cover of SATAC Guide).

As long as there is an application lodged correctly by the due date, students can add, change the order or delete preferences all the way through to December 2. After this date there is still some flexibility, but courses flagged in red on the SATAC site, may not be treated with equal consideration after this date.

Students interested in applying interstate MUST check relevant deadlines and apply ASAP as there may be additional application requirements that need to be submitted by September 30 as well, such as the Questionnaire for Vet Bioscience at the University of Adelaide, and early dates for Music Audition applications for Music at Adelaide, Dance at Flinders etc.

Flinders University ACER UniTEST at Flinders Uni Campus

Flinders University offer yet another way to construct a Selection Rank ATAR for consideration for entry to all courses at Flinders University except for Medicine. They use the results from the ACER UniTEST and construct a "UniTest ATAR Selection Rank: 40% weighting to UniTEST and 60% weighting to Selection Rank ATAR. For further details and to register to sit for this free 2.5 hour test at Flinders University campus on Friday 8 or Saturday 9 November, click here

We would like to point out that it is not an easy test and over the last two years of the 150 Year 12 St Michael's students that sat for the UniTEST only one was offered a place in a Flinders course where they were more competitive as a result of their UniTEST Rank. If students do not do well in their UniTEST their result is ignored and reverts back to normal Selection Rank ATAR. For sample questions please click here

YEAR 11 STUDENTS CONDITIONAL OFFER **TO FLINDERS UNIVERSITY IN 2021**

Each year we have been invited to participate in a pilot program for an alternative pathway into specific courses at Flinders University. In reality we found few students ever needed to rely on this conditional offer. There will be one last opportunity to be considered for this pathway. Information has been sent to all Year 11 students. The Conditional Offer Assessment Centre program is aimed at providing students from lower socio economic backgrounds or those with a disadvantage, an alternative pathway. The types of disadvantage may include high stress levels, anxiety etc. which may hold back an otherwise highly capable student from achieving the ATAR Cut Off to secure entry to the course. Students who are approved to participate, will undertake a variety of Assessment activities during a day in the Assessment Centre at Flinders University on Thursday 8 November. The range of assessments include measuring aptitude in mindful agency, resilience, creativity, critical thinking and a range of other areas. In reality it will assess the skills required to be successful at university. And as such it is not a pathway for those who do not have skills and aptitude to be successful at University. Students who pass the program will simply have to meet requirements "Conditions" such as achieving SACE and maybe passes in pre requisite subjects etc. rather than focusing on the ATAR. The other aim of the Conditional Offer scheme is that students are encouraged to take on harder subjects which provide a better preparation for their path of study (rather than be focused on getting the high ATAR required by doing less relevant and sometimes easier subjects.)

We encourage families to look through the information that has been sent to students, and if interested complete the registration requirements at the end of the document and email to rose. coorey@smc.sa.edu.au by the deadline of Tuesday 15 October. Following that, Ms Coorey will email the 10 students we can put forward to participate in the program. Please note none of the high ATAR courses such as Physiotherapy, Occupational Therapy, Medicine, Speech Pathology and Paramedics are included in this scheme. Please email Ms Coorey over the holidays if you have any questions.

Supporting someone who is grieving

When a friend, relative or colleague is grieving it is natural to want to offer your support. Yet, we often feel very uncertain about what we can do to help. There is a lot of hesitancy and discomfort around loss and grief and this can leave many of us unsure how best to support someone who is grieving. This factsheet aims to offer some guidance.

What is grief?

Grief is the human response to change and loss in our lives, such as the death of someone we love. It is a natural and normal response, which has a physical impact on our bodies as well affecting our emotions and our thinking. Grief challenges the way we think about ourselves and the world, and influences our spirituality and relationships.

How do we express grief?

Each of us expresses grief in unique and personal ways. We respond differently to the physical impacts, the emotional turmoil and the challenges to our worldview. Some of us openly express our hurt, while others withdraw. It is important to remember that grief is a normal and natural response and that there is no right or wrong way to grieve. However, here are some (not an exhaustive list) of the reactions someone who is grieving may experience.

Emotions that people may feel ...

- · Anxiety, fretfulness and feeling emotionally overwhelmed
- Anger, frustration or disillusionment
- · Loneliness and isolation

Thoughts that people may have ...

- Disbelief
- Confusion
- Sense of presence
- Preoccupation

Behaviours that people may show ...

- Searching and calling out
- Restless over-activity
- Absentmindedness
- Visiting places and carrying objects
- Avoiding reminders

Physical Reactions that people may experience ...

- Sleep and appetite changes
- Tightness in chest and throat and breathlessness
- Lack of energy

The grief process

Grief is a challenging and complex time of hurt, but it is a normal part of life. It is important to remember that someone who is grieving is not 'unwell.' We can and do cope with grief, but we do best when we feel safe, supported and understand what is happening to us. In thinking about how best to support someone who is grieving it can be helpful to return to the definition of grief above – the idea that grief can be experienced for many people as a process or journey



At Good Grief we find J. William Worden's grief theory very helpful for making sense of this journey. Worden has identified that the grief process involves four key tasks. At Good Grief we have adapted these tasks slightly to take account of the wide range of losses we grieve for in life in addition to bereavement:

- 1. To accept the reality of the loss
- 2. To process the pain of grief
- 3. To adjust to a changed world after the loss
- 4. To find an enduring connection with what has been lost while embarking on a new life

It is important to understand that the four tasks are not steps or stages. Although time is an important healer, someone who is grieving will not move through the tasks automatically. Actively engaging with each task may help. The tasks can be approached in any order, and each of us will tackle them in our own time and own way. It is important not to put a time limit or pass judgement on someone else's grief journey.

How to support someone who is grieving

If we think of grief as a personal journey, our role in supporting someone who is grieving may differ depending upon our relationship with them. When supporting a partner, a close relative or close friend, it is likely we will walk side by side with them on their journey. For others we may offer support a little more from the sidelines. Yet, whatever our relationship to the person who is grieving, our role is to make ourselves available when they need to talk things over or reflect, and to encourage and support them when the going gets tough.

What support does someone who is grieving need?

They need:

- warm, open communication to talk through and make sense of what has happened and their reactions to it, repeatedly and without judgement.
- opportunities to come to understand the grief process and reflect on their own journey.
- space to express a wide range of emotions (such as sadness, anger, fear, guilt and humour).
- opportunities to take 'time out' from their responsibilities to focus on their grief or to refresh themselves.
- offers of support that fit with their circumstances this may include practical domestic support, such as preparing meals, cleaning, looking after pets, transporting children to school or after-school activities, or baby-sitting.
- someone who checks in with them regularly to see how they are coping over time.

It is important to take your lead from the person who is grieving. Some people will appreciate more help and more frequent opportunities to talk, while others may find it intrusive. Be guided by the person and where they are on their journey, bearing in mind that their needs may change over time. Understand they are hurting and try to remain open, warm and available for if or when they need you.



Additional Support

Grief is a normal and natural response to the hurt people feel when they lose something or someone they love. Sometimes people need a little extra support when they are grieving. Animated by faith in God, love for others, and an affinity for the Mission and spirit of St. John Baptist de La Salle, Lasallian Youth Ministers serve throughout the District of ANZPPNG (Australia, New Zealand, Pakistan and Papua New Guinea). Currently, there are 25 Youth Ministers placed within 18 schools in the four Sectors of our District.

Each Youth Minister spends his or her time building relationships with students and staff members - in the classroom and in the school grounds, on retreats and immersion trips, through one-on-one conversations and in gatherings with the whole community. They are part of the Young Lasallians Team, and together with other Lasallian Youth Ministers, they help bring the Gospel adventure to life across our District. The entire team work together and support one another, from a distance and in person.

Serving as a Lasallian Youth Minister provides young people with the opportunity to develop numerous skills, including public speaking, organisation, event planning, leadership and volunteer management. They take on the role of big brothers and sisters to the students entrusted to their care, as well as learning how to serve as a member of staff within a school Context.

As young professionals, Lasallian Youth Ministers are given on-site mentorship and support by school staff, including a supervisor who is assigned to them for the year. An intensive training session is offered by the Young Lasallians Team before the start of the school year, and a mid-year follow up session is provided during the July school holidays.

In addition, a member of the Young Lasallians Team is assigned to each Youth Minister as a mentor and supervisor who will check in on a regular basis with both the Youth Minister and their site supervisor. Most Lasallian Youth Ministers serve part-time (1 to 3 days per week) while studying at university, though some serve their school or Sector full-time.



WHY DID YOU BECOME A LASALLIAN YOUTH MINISTER?

After completing school at De La Salle Caringbah and Cronulla, I was blessed with the opportunity to return to my old high school working in Youth Ministry. Being a Lasallian has always been a part of my life, from playing Rugby League for De La Salle from the age of six, to having family members also attend Lasallian schools. My first experience of the greater Lasallian community began with a Lasallian Youth Leadership program, which I implemented in Year 10. This was a perfect chance to advance my Lasallian journey. I was honoured when I was elected by my classmates and teachers as College Vice Captain in Year 12. This enabled me to attend the Lasallian Student Leadership Seminar in 2015. The chance to give back to my college and the Lasallian charism, was an offer impossible to refuse.

HOW HAS THE ROLE CHALLENGED YOU AND WHAT HAVE YOU LEARNT?

The role has allowed me to grow as a Youth Minister and as a person. Not only has it challenged me mentally, but it has also helped me to step out of my comfort zone. I have grown in the role professionally and its certainly improved my public speaking. One of the biggest challenges would be having the increase of responsibilities and the transition from being a student. The life skills developed for future employment are extremely valuable.

WHAT DO YOU ENJOY MOST **ABOUT THE** ROLE?

One of the most enjoyable aspects of the role is helping to facilitate District events, such as the Lasallian Youth Gathering (LYG) and Lasallian Student Leadership Seminar (LSLS). Being involved in these events, makes you appreciate and cherish the job that you have. One enjoyable aspect of the role is that you never have the same day twice. The new experiences and the people you meet are endless.
