Dear Collegiate Community,

It is with great pleasure that I congratulate the Class of 2017. On June 2, Collegiate hosted its 101st Graduation at St. Matthews Baptist Church. Fifty-six graduates received their diplomas and became official members of the Collegiate Alumni Association, joining 1,600 women and men all around the globe.

We are so proud of all the members of the Class of 2017, a class that is comprised of writers, engineers, academic scholars, visual artists, performing artists, athletes, global travelers, community activists and entrepreneurs. Thirteen percent of the class was recognized by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation, including three National Merit Finalists who will attend Bradley University, Colorado College and Stanford University. A number of student athletes will play Division I, II and III intercollegiate sports at schools that include Claremont McKenna College, Bates College, Loyola University Chicago, University of Louisville, Oberlin College and Centre College to name a few. Additionally, one of our thespians will continue to perform on stage at the collegiate level at The Hartt School at the University of Hartford.



The Class of 2017 represents the first graduating class of Collegiate's second century which was celebrated with a steel beam signing by members of the Class of 2017 and their first-grade buddies following the 2016 Convocation. Their signatures cover a structural steel beam that now connects the visual arts floor with the performing arts floor in the newly constructed arts facilities, The Brown Arts Center.

This class experienced a few campus transformations during their time as Collegiate students, but nothing as significant as the Second Century Construction Project. The two new facilities that add 50,000 square feet are scheduled to open in August in time for the start of the 2017-18 school year. The Dan and Frances Street Learning Commons, The Thornton Family Dining Commons and the Owsley Brown Family Performing and Visual Arts Center will take teaching and learning to a new level in the arts, library, research, technology and design spaces.

Our Second Century Campaign has raised over \$15 million of its \$20 million dollar goal. I invite you to join us on this transformative journey and support Collegiate in its second century. Please take time to visit our campus this summer and see our newly unified campus--a campus that now connects all of our buildings from Lower School to Upper School.

While the construction is wrapping up this summer, faculty, staff and administration will be busy co-teaching at The School of St. Jude, our partner school in Tanzania, facilitating language and cultural immersion studies with our students in Cuba and France and participating in workshops and training to further their commitment to longlife learning. Collegiate's continued dedication to professional development is what makes our faculty and staff among the best in the country!

Once again, congratulations to the Class of 2017! We wish you much success in college and beyond.

Every year we get to work closely with students, help them craft their own unique stories and walk alongside them as they make their way through one of the first major transitions in their lives. For us in the College Counseling office, graduation always brings a series of mixed emotions because of the close-knit relationships that we have built with our students. We are excited to watch our graduates head off to new places and new adventures, but we are also sad to see them leave. This year is no different. For me personally, this year tugs on my heart a bit more,



because I began my time at Collegiate at the same time our 2017 graduates were entering the Upper School. We were freshmen together. We figured things out together. We began our time in the Upper School filled with questions and we worked through those as we moved through the grade levels. True, this class is a special one to me, but this class has also left a lasting and positive mark on all in our school community.

Over the past four years, this group of graduates grew into accomplished scholars, celebrated athletes, shining stars on stage, award winning artists and, above all else, the best of role models for our student body. They did all of this while keeping their relationships with each other at the center of their experience here at Collegiate. This group grew close to one another, loved one another and supported one another through all of the ups and downs that high school can bring. No matter the

topic of conversation or what was unfolding in their individual lives, the class of 2017 showed each other unconditional acceptance and love--two things our world could use more of these days. This created an atmosphere where they could be their true selves, voice their thoughts and opinions freely and not feel shamed or judged for their perspectives. The way they treated and supported one another transferred into the college process by allowing each person the freedom to explore and discover the perfect college match. They were admitted at an extremely high rate compared to their peers around the country (84% to early admissions programs and 77% overall). Ninety percent are headed outside the state of Kentucky. Three students will defer their enrollment for one year and take on inspiring and formative gap year experiences. While the South/Southeast continues to be an attractive geographical location for our graduates, the Midwest tied it for popularity, and the West, New England and Mid Atlantic were not far behind.

It is important to note that our graduates would not have these amazing opportunities if it were not for their own hard work and ownership, the love and encouragement of their families, the brilliant work of our faculty and, of course, the unconditional and unending support of their classmates. Class of 2017, it has been an amazing four years...you will be missed.

Student Success Stories: Academics and Arts 2016-17

If you are headed to New York City this summer, depending on your timing, you may be able to see **Sam Parker's** artwork on display. The Upper School sophomore earned a National Gold Key in the **National Scholastic Art Competition** and is headed there to proudly showcase her work in June. Students in every division had success in the arts and academic competitions this year. We welcomed our first Lower School Quick Recall Team and the Middle School qualified for the state Robotics Competition for the first time in the school's history. Our Upper School Mock Trial Team placed second in the state, and the number of students that were recognized as AP Scholars more than doubled since last year! Our fabulous students' successes are highlighted across each division below.

Lower School - Fourth and fifth-grade students participated in the **Math Olympiad Team**, which ended the season with one student finishing in the top 2%, seven students finishing in the top 10%, and seven students finishing in the top 20% of 150,000+ students internationally. Six students were selected to the **Kentucky All State Children's Chorus** and the Lower School had one student who advanced to the **National History Bee** in Atlanta this past June. This year was the inaugural year for the Lower School **Quick Recall Team**. Students competed at the District Level and look forward to expanding next year. One first-grade student earned second place in the statewide **KET Creative Writing Contest** and was honored by KET in his homeroom!

Middle School - The **Middle School Robotics Team** qualified for the state competition for the first time in the school's history and placed 11th in the state robot performance competition! A Middle School student represented Collegiate at the state **Spelling Bee** and finished in fourth place overall in Kentucky. Three students received first, second and third place honors in the French Language competition of the **Kentucky World Language Association's World Language Showcase**. The Middle School celebrated four students who advanced to the **National History Bee** in Atlanta and one of those students earned first place in the regional 8th grade competition. **The Scholastic Art Awards** is the oldest and most prestigious art competition in the country, and one Silver Key winner and three Honorable Mention award winners were recognized this year. The **Model United Nations Team** received Delegation of Excellence recognition and Outstanding Resolution Packet recognition. One student was recognized as Outstanding Speaker and one student was recognized as Outstanding Delegate. The Middle School launched the first **Kentucky Youth Assembly** team this year, received Delegation of Excellence honors and one student was recognized as Outstanding Delegate. **The Governor's Cup Team** earned first place for **Quick Recall** in the district competition and second place for **Future Problem Solvers** in the district competition. Two students received first place overall in the district for the individual mathematics and language arts written competition. Two students were selected for the **Kentucky All State Children's Chorus**.

Upper School - The **Mock Trial Team** advanced to the state championship round and ended the season as the state runner-up! One student earned *Witness of the Year* honors and one student earned *Attorney of the Year* honors. All three **National Merit Semi Finalists** were selected as **National Merit Finalists**. Forty-one students were recognized by the College Board as **AP Scholars**, ten were recognized as **AP Scholars with Honor**, 18 were recognized as **AP Scholars with Distinction**, and four were recognized as **National AP Scholars**. Honors ceremonies were held to celebrate and induct students into the **National Honor Society, Cum Laude Society, Mu Alpha Theta, National Art Honors Society, and National Honor Society for Spanish, Chinese and French World Languages**. The Upper School sent a delegation to the **Kentucky Youth Assembly** conference at the capitol chambers in Frankfort. Collegiate's delegation was awarded a certificate for *Delegation of Excellence* and

one student received the *Outstanding Delegate* award. The **Model United Nations Team** presented a proposal to the Model UN Conference and one student was chosen as Chief of Staff for KUNA. In the **Kentucky World Language Association's World Language Showcase**, three students received top 10% in the state honors and three students received top 15% in the state honors. One student received first place and one student received third place overall in the Spanish Language competition portion in addition to two students receiving recognition in the Chinese Language competition. For the fourth year in a row, the **Math Team** finished the season in second place out of nearly 30 public, private and parochial schools in the region (1st place overall private schools in Louisville). One student earned first place overall in the region and one student earned ninth place overall in the region. Eleven students earned recognition for finishing the season in the top ten in their grade level. Two teams from the **Young Entrepreneurs Club** advanced to the regional competition of the **Lieutenant Governor's Startup Pitch Competition** at WKU. One team earned third place overall in the pitch portion of the competition. **The Governor's Cup Team** earned a district championship in the **Future Problems Solvers** competition and a 1st individual finish in the individual mathematics competition. The **Science Olympiad Team** competed at the regional level and qualified for the state competition. Second place medals were earned by two students for the Chemistry Lab event at the regional level. Two students were selected for the **2016 Governor's School for the Arts** and four students were selected for the **Governor's Scholars Program**. One National Gold Key award was earned by a student in the **National Scholastic Arts Awards**. Three Gold Key awards, two Silver Key awards, and five Honorable Mention awards were earned by students in the **Regional Scholastic Art Awards competition**. Congratulations to all of our students for representing Collegiate at the district, regional, state and national levels!

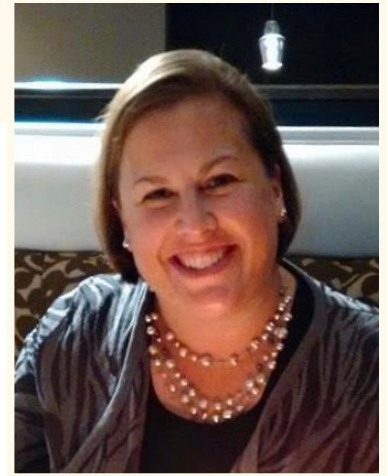

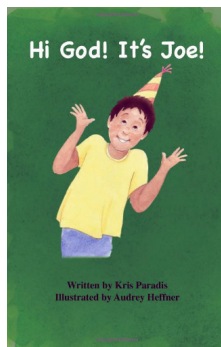

Alums Work Together to Better Education in Cambodia

For many alums, friendships made at Collegiate continue long past graduation. Not only do these relationships go on to blossom in Louisville but in many cases they also span the globe. This past April, **Kate Talamini '67** shared with us a story featuring two classmates, **Kris Paradis '67** and **Bessie Snyder Tyrrell '62**, who now collaborate to provide better education for children in Southeast Asia.

During her time at Collegiate, Kris Paradis began writing poetry as an eighth grader and many of her early poems were published in the Transcript. Her love of writing and literature continued through college and graduate school where she wrote a creative thesis for her Masters degree. She began writing children's books in 2015 with "If God Could See Me Now!".



For Kris, "My process is simple really. The poem comes first and then I develop a storyboard with an image concept for each stanza. Illustrator Audrey Heffner and I have worked together for many years and she has a wonderful, whimsical style that is perfect for these books... Each book is a lesson designed to help children have a more intimate relationship with our Creator. *'Hi God! It's Joe!'* is a conversation with God that continues through one entire day in the life of a six-year-old."

Though she started with books crafted for her grandchildren, Kris' stories soon caught the eye of friend Elsie Tyrrell Atherton '67, who passed along a copy to her brother Jamie Tyrrell and his wife Bessie.

James and Bessie then took Kris' book to Southeast Asia where, Bessie explained, "Each year Jamie and I go to Cambodia, Jamie teaches at a Bible college in a town called Kampong Chhnang, and we both teach English. Cambodia has a sad and tragic past, the country is one of the poorest on the planet and anyone there who can speak even a little English has a chance of a better life."

Bessie went on to share, "The school is remarkable; it is funded by a consortium of Christians from Korea doing God's work, God's way. In translation that means in one of the most corrupt countries in the world they have refused to pay bribes to anyone to further their school. They were sold the land for the school multiple times; they were denied services and have had many trials. The school is now a thriving Christian institution, serving children of all faiths in Kampong Chhnang. They add a new classroom each year and those same corrupted officials who expected bribes but didn't get them, send their children to this amazing school."

After introducing the book to students in Cambodia, Bessie saw that the stories were a huge hit. "The teachers, the principal, the head of the school curriculum, the students were all pleased with [the] book and saw in it a way to help children talk to God, as well as a way to strengthen their English language skills."

It is the strong friendships that begin at Collegiate that create a lasting bond over time. As you can see, this bond made a difference to students in Cambodia. Another reason why Collegiate is such a wonderful place!
