SPRING TRAINING FACTS

The Tigers have trained at Lakeland since 1934, first at Henley Field and since 1966 at Marchant Stadium, a mile north. The all-concrete grandstand at Marchant Stadium was built by the City of Lakeland at a cost of \$500,000, and in 1972 the first night game was played there under a new \$160,000 set of lights.

Adjacent to the 12-acre tract on which the stadium is situated is Tigertown, the Tigers' minor-league training site since 1953. A plush, three-story, fireproof dormitory featuring air-conditioning, carpeted rooms and lounges on each floor, was added to the Tigertown complex in 1971. It houses 200 minor league players and officials. The \$400,000 structure was financed by the Tigers and the City of Lakeland, with the city to be reimbursed for its contributions within 10 years.

The Marchant Stadium grandstand seats 4,075, including 450 box seats. The clubhouse accommodates up to 50 players in each club section with added quarters for umpires.

TIGER STADIUM FACTS

The capacity of Tiger Stadium is 54,220 seats. Official figures list 10,335 box seats; 21,172 reserved; 11,502 unreserved grandstand; and 11,211 bleacher seats. Baseball has been played at the site since 1900, a year before the American League was born with the Tigers as a charter member. Known as Bennett Park at the time, it became Navin Field in 1912, Briggs Stadium in 1938 and Tiger Stadium Jan. 1, 1961.

Fans acclaim Tiger Stadium as an ideal park for witnessing baseball action because of the close proximity of the stands to the playing field.

More than 10,000 square yards of sod are needed annually to repair the wear and tear of both baseball and football on the playing area. Sprinkling and drainage facilities are among the best and the latest-type field cover can be placed in less than a minute.

STADIUM INFORMATION

CAPACITY — 54,220 (Attendance records on Page 14).

AREA — Stadium grounds and parking lot cover 8½ acres. Playing field occupies approximately half of total area.

LIGHTING — Eight towers, 1,428 lamps of 1,500 watts each. Installed in 1948.

DUGOUTS — Connected with clubhouses by tunnels, visitors on first base side, home club on third base side. Depressed, dugout-type bullpens new in 1963.

John Hand is chief clubhouse attendant and equipment manager.

CONCESSIONS — Operated by Detroit Sportservice, Inc.

FENCES — Left field, 340 feet from plate; left-center, 365; center field, 440;

right-center, 370; right field, 325. All fences uniformly nine feet high.

HEIGHTS — From ground to facing of upper deck, 34 feet. Ground to first tier of third deck pressbox, 82 feet. Ground to roof of third deck pressbox level, 94 feet. Ground to top of light towers, 155 feet. Flag pole in center field is 125 feet.

GROUND RULES

Foul poles are outside of playing field.

Batted ball striking facing or any part of upper stands on fair territory and bouncing back on field: home run.

Fly ball striking lights underneath upper stands from right field to center field on fair territory and bounding back on field: home run.

Ball striking flag pole above base and bounding into stands: home run.

Ball striking base of flag pole and bounding into stands: two bases.

Fair bounding ball going onto roof of either bullpen dugout; two bases.

Ball going through or sticking in screen on fair ground: two bases.

Pitched ball sticking or remaining on backstop screen: one base. Thrown ball: two bases.

Fly ball going over wire fence of space covering canvas in center field: home run.

Fly ball striking protective fence which protrudes into stands in left and right field: home run.

TIGER BROADCAST TEAMS

As they have been since 1965, the Tigers' 1974 games will be aired by two separate broadcasting teams — selected games on television by George Kell and Larry Osterman; all games on radio with Ernie Harwell and Paul Caray.

Fourteen seasons as an American League infield star and 15 years behind a baseball microphone are Kell's credentials. He was American League batting champion in 1949 when he hit .343 for the Tigers and completed his career with a lifetime average of .306. He broke into TV broadcasting with a pre-game network show in 1958, moved into the Tiger TV booth in 1959 and has been there ever since except 1964.

Osterman, a letterman in baseball, basketball and track in high school, has been sports director of Station WKZO-TV, Kalamazoo, since 1959, following air experience in Nebraska. He joined the Tiger staff in 1967.

Harwell's broadcast background goes back to 1940 and he has been on the major league scene since 1948; describing the action for the Brooklyn Dodgers, New York Giants and Baltimore Orioles before coming to the Tigers in 1960.

Caray, new on the air for the Tigers in 1973, has been assistant sports director of Station WJR, Detroit, since 1958 but his air experience dates back to 1949.

HOW THEY BECAME TIGERS

Research reveals that the nickname "Tigers" first was applied to the Detroit baseball club in 1895 — a year earlier than previously reported.

Baseball historians initially credited Philip J. Reid, city editor of the Detroit Evening News, with first using the name in print in 1896. However, George Stallings, manager of the Detroit team which was then a member of the Western League, took credit for the move which resulted in the nickname when he put his players in black-and-brown striped stockings which, he said, reminded the fans of "tiger stripes."

New evidence makes it appear that an unidentified headline writer at the Detroit Free Press actually originated the Tiger nickname in 1895, a year before Stallings became manager and before the team was wearing striped stockings.

In its early years, the team was simply called "Detroit," "the Detroit," sometimes the "Wolverines" (a name more familiarly associated with the University of Michigan) and at times the "Creams."

The "Creams" broke into print in 1894, the year Detroit entered the Western League under the ownership of G. A. Van Derbeck, a transient from Los Angeles. A writer of the time derisively referred to his aggregation as "what is purported to be the cream of California baseball players" — which may account for the name.

Then on April 16, 1895, the Free Press printed a headline over a baseball story which read: "Strouthers' Tigers Showed Up Very Nicely." On the same page, a string of baseball notes was headed: "Notes of the Detroit Tigers of 1895." Curiously, not once in either story was the word "Tigers" used.

From then on, the Free Press fairly regularly called them the "Tigers" and in May, 1895, the Sporting Life began using "Tigers" in its dispatches from Detroit. However, up to July 1, 1895, careful search of the files discloses that neither the Detroit Evening News nor its Sunday paper, the News-Tribune, had used "Tigers."

Thus it seems that the Detroit Free Press must get credit for originating the Tiger nickname in 1895 — unless someone has other new evidence to the contrary.

FETZER 10th TO HEAD TIGERS

John E. Fetzer, sole owner of the Tigers since Nov. 14, 1961, is the 10th in line to hold the position of top executive. The nationally-prominent television-radio executive, with holdings in Michigan, Nebraska and Iowa, has taken an increasingly-active role in baseball administration since entering the game in 1956 as head of a syndicate purchasing the Tigers from the estate of the late W. O. Briggs. He currently is a member of the major league Executive Council and chairman of the American League planning committee.

Charter president of the Tigers when the American League won major status in 1901 was James D. Burns, also sheriff of Wayne County. In succeeding years, the post has been held by Samuel F. Angus (1902-1903), William H. Yawkey (1904-1906), Frank J. Navin (1907-1935), Walter O. Briggs (1936-1951), Walter O. Briggs, Jr. (1952-1956), Fred A. Knorr (1956), Harvey R. Hansen (1957-1959), William DeWitt (1960), and Fetzer since Oct. 11, 1960.

TIGERS IN WORLD SERIES

1907 — Chicago 4 games, Detroit 0 (Plus 12-inn. tie)
 Manager Frank Chance's National League champions by 17½-game margin were easy winners over Hughie Jennings' tired Tigers, who nosed out Philadelphia by six points in bitter finishing drive. Tiger morale suffered when Catcher Charlie Schmidt failed to hold 9th-inning third strike which would have ended first game on winning note. Darkness brought 3-3 tie in 12 innings and Cubs, who stole 18 bases during series, went on to well-deserved triumph.

1908 — Chicago 4 games, Detroit 1
 History repeated as Frank Chance's hard-hitting Cubs, one-game National League winners over New York, easily handled Hughie Jennings' Tigers, last-day victors over Chicago in American League. Tigers scored 15 runs in first three games, then were shut out twice. George Mullin won Detroit's only victory in third game with help of four hits by Ty Cobb.

1909 — Pittsburgh 4 games, Detroit 3
 First World Series going limit was taken by Fred Clarke's Pirates when Babe Adams, unheralded rookie, surprisingly won three decisions over Hughie Jennings' battling Tigers as two teams alternated in winning. Honus Wagner batted .333 for Pirates in duel with Ty Cobb, who hit .231 in his last World Series. Bill Abstein, Pirate first baseman, fanned 10 times and was fired as soon as series ended.

1934 — St. Louis 4 games, Detroit 3
 Tigers qualified with first American League pennant in 25 years under Mickey Cochrane's aggressive management but were nosed out by Frank Frisch's Cardinals in bitter series marked by final-game row in which Commissioner Landis removed Joe Medwick from game when Detroit fans showered field with garbage following Medwick's collision with Marv Owen, Tiger third baseman. Dean brothers, Dizzy and Paul, won two games each for Cards; Charlie Gehringer hit .379 for Tigers and Pepper Martin .355 for Cards.

1935 — Detroit 4 games, Chicago 2
 Tigers won first World Championship under Mickey Cochrane's direction, vanquishing Charlie Grimm's Cubs despite loss of Hank Greenberg with broken wrist in third game. Tommy Bridges scored two mound victories, Alvin Crowder and Schoolboy Rowe one each for Tigers. In final game, Cochrane scored winning run on Goose Goslin's single, throwing delirious Detroit fans into wild celebration lasting all night.

1940 — Cincinnati 4 games, Detroit 3
 Bill McKechnie's Reds, easy winners in regular season, gave National League its first World Series triumph since 1934 by edging out Del Baker's Tigers, next-to-last day pennant winners in American League. Bobo Newsom won twice for Tigers, despite father's death in Cincinnati hotel following first game, but lost finale while pitching with one day's rest. Tommy Bridges won other Detroit victory, Paul Derringer and Bucky Walters took two each for Reds.

1945 — Detroit 4 games, Chicago 3
 Steve O'Neill's Tiger's, last-game pennant winners on grand slam homer by Hank Greenberg, just back from army, continued World Series hex over Charlie Grimm's Cubs in wartime atmosphere. Hank Borowy pitched shutout and Claude Passeau had one-hitter for Cubs but Hal Newhouser fanned 22 in series and won twice for Tigers. Greenberg had two homers, three doubles among his seven hits in series.

1968 — Detroit 4 games, St. Louis 3
 After losing three of first four games, Mayo Smith's Tigers stormed back for three straight over Red Schoendienst's Cardinals as Mickey Lolich won three games. Al Kaline got chance in his first World Series after 16 years with Tigers when Smith broke up regular outfield by moving Mickey Stanley to shortstop to make room for Kaline. Denny McLain, Tigers' 31-game regular season winner, lost opening game when Bob Gibson fanned 17; split two later decisions.

TIGERS IN CHAMPIONSHIP SERIES

1972 — Oakland 3 games, Detroit 2
 Billy Martin's battling Tigers lost first two games to Dick Williams' A's at Oakland, won next two at Detroit but finally bowed by one run as American League got its first five-game championship. Tight pitching marked series with two shutouts and other three games decided by one run. Bert Campaneris, of A's, was fined and suspended at start of following season for throwing bat at Lerrin LaGrow when hit on ankle by Tiger pitcher in second game.

TIGERS IN NATIONAL LEAGUE

Detroit was member of National League from 1881 through 1886; dropped out of majors until 1901, to return as charter member of American League.

Tigers of 1887 won National League pennant by 3½ games, engaged St. Louis champions of American Association, in 15-game post-season series which was forerunner of World Series. Detroit won 10 of 15 games in cross-country tour.

SOME REGULATIONS

A player is considered a rookie unless, during a previous season or seasons, he has (a) exceeded 130 times at bat or 50 innings pitched in the major leagues or (b) accumulated more than 45 days on the active roster of a major league club or clubs during the period of the 25-player limit, excluding time in military service.

A batting champion must have 502 or more actual or projected appearances at the plate. A pitching champion (ERA) must pitch 162 or more innings. A fielding champion must appear in 108 games at his position, except a catcher, who must appear in 81 games.

Player limit is 40 men from Sept. 1 to opening day of following season; then 25 until Sept. 1.

To determine the "magic number" in pennant race, compute the number of games yet to be played, add one, then subtract the number of games ahead in the lost column of the standings from the closest opponent.

Hit 19 HR in 1973 to lead club 3rd straight year, 6th time in career. Advanced in three career batting categories, now among Tigers' Top Ten in eight departments (See tables Page 8).

Tabbed "must-get" prospect after homer into Tiger Stadium rightfield pavilion as 16-year-old. Catcher-first baseman, outfielder as prep; also played football, boxed. Briefly with Tigers 1963-64 but shot to stardom with "seven games in May" 1965 (.600 average, six homers, five doubles, 16 RBI vs. Senators-Red Sox May 11-16); starter in 1965 All-Star game, voted "Most Exciting Player" of Tiger Stadium that season by Detroit Baseball Writers Assn. Continued blasting 1966 with 27 homers, 100 RBI. Missed 43 games 1967 with Achilles tendon injuries leading to post-season operation, still hit .274 with 19 homers. Led 1968 Tigers returned May 20 to lead Tigers with 28 HR (including three grand slam to lead at .285 and HR at 36. Hitting .213 in 1969 when walked out of May 15 game, league), 91 RBI although missing 18 G June-July with pulled hamstring. Achieved pre-eminence despite series of serious injuries: broken cheek bone 1959, broken collar bone 1962, rib injury 1965; chronic foot malformation, resulting October 1965 operation; broken finger 1967; broken right arm 1968; rib cage injury 1973. Led Tigers in hitting (.288) and notched 2,000th hit of career in 1966. Repeated as club's top batter (.308) in 1967, when also led club in runs, 2B, HR and RBI, collecting 300th HR of career, 27th in majors to reach that total. Led 1970 regulars at plate (.278 in 131 G), in doubles (24). Honored Aug. 2 at 1st players' day at Tiger Stadium in two decades. Again led regulars in batting (.294) 1971, fielded 1,000 in 5 G at 1B, 129 in OF, tying club and major league marks for flyhaws. Became first \$100,000 player in Tiger history, signing Dec. 20, 1971. Tied AL record (Tris Speaker) by appearing in 100-or-more games for 19th straight year in 1972; reached highest ave. (.313) since 1961 with stretch drive of 22-for-44 in last 11 G.

Enters 1974 needing 139 hits for 3,000 — mark made by only 11 in ML history; Kaline's 2,861 now 2nd only to Ty Cobb among Tiger all-timers. Tigers' career HR leader, 2nd in six, 3rd twice, 4th and 6th in 10 all-time Tiger batting categories (See tables Page 8).

NEW SAVE RULE IN EFFECT

A more stringent save rule initiated in 1974 provides that a pitcher is to be credited with a save if he (1) enters a game with the potential tying run or winning run on base or at the plate and protects the lead or (2) pitches three effective innings to preserve a lead of any size. If more than one relief pitcher qualifies for a save as defined in this rule, the official scorer will credit a save to the pitcher he considers most effective. Only one save can be credited in a game and it is not mandatory to credit a save in a game.

Topped majors, set personal highs with 25 W, 376 IP (most in majors in 55 years, most in AL in 60). Led AL with 29 CG, most in AL since 1946. Second in Cy Young Award, 5th in MVP voting. Earned save in 1971 All-Star game. Led Tigers, 2nd in AL in SO, GS and CG in 1972. First eight wins complete games; 7-game winning streak April-May longest of year for Tigers. Pitched two scoreless inn. in 1972 All-Star game, posted 1.42 ERA in two championship starts vs. A's.

Led Tigers in 1973 in GS, CG, SO and shutouts; three shutouts good for 35 in career, most in Tiger history. Also 5th twice and 7th in other Tiger career pitching records. (See tables Page 9.)

Jim Bunning, Phil Regan and Paul Foytack each won two games on the mound.

ANOTHER TURNOVER FOR TIGERS

The Tigers effected a turnover of 38 per cent in manpower for their 1974 spring training, following a 35 percent change the year before. Of the 39 on their 1974 spring roster, 15 were new names.

Eight of the newcomers are products of the farm system, six were acquired in trades and one was purchased. With one vacancy on the off-season roster, the Tigers actually disposed of 16 players — four traded, one sold, two released and nine returned to the minor leagues.

The spring roster listed 13 rookies, one below the year before. They included: Fred Arroyo, Ron Cash, Raul Colon, Steve Grilli, Fred Holdsworth, Gary Ignasiak, John Knox, Mary Lane, Dave Lemanczyk, Reggie Sanders, Bob Strampe, Tom Veryzer and John Young.

CLEARING THE ROOF

Between 1938, when Tiger Stadium was rebuilt along its present lines, and 1956 only one home run was hit over the roof. That was delivered by Ted Williams in 1939, his rookie season in the American League.

Since 1956, the total has been pushed to 13, with 11 over the right field roof and two over the more-distant left field roof.

A number of other blows would have cleared the roof if the ball had not hit one of the light standards and bounced back to the playing field. Most notable in that category was hit by Reggie Jackson during the 1971 All-Star Game (July 13). It is estimated the ball would have travelled more than 600 feet if it had not hit the transformer housing on the light tower on the roof above the 370-foot mark.

The 1969 roof-clearing homer credited to Jim Northrup bounced back on the field — but only after clearing the top of the roof before striking an obstruction on the other side.

Fans recall a number of long home runs hit out of the stadium before it was remodelled into a complete double-decker. The most historic of these was the 700th home run of Babe Ruth's career on July 13, 1934. The ball cleared a wall in right field and rolled nearly two blocks down Plum Street, to be retrieved some 800-850 feet from home plate by a youngster who received a \$20 bill (borrowed from a teammate) for returning the ball to The Bambino.
