# **SMASH Hockey**

2018 has been a year of growth and learning for SMASH Hockey. A pilot programme conducted with outstanding support from our partners at Street Games



has given us the platform to create something exciting. SMASH Hockey is Hockey Wales' initiative for children and young people living in areas of deprivation.

Throughout 2018, we have delivered a range of sessions, workshops and orientations all designed to provide us with the insight and feedback required to create something that genuinely appeals to people within these communities.

The working relationship we have developed with Street Games throughout this

whole process has been pivotal to the success of it so far- and this is even before it's officially launched! Keep your eyes peeled over the Summer for information about SMASH Hockey, what it is and how your community group can get involved with this empowering, exciting initiative.



# Summer 7s

A year of resounding success for Hockey Wales Summer 7s with over 3360 minutes of hockey taking place in 5 sites across Wales from May to September, a period that would usually see a distinct decrease in hockey activity.



After the success of the solitary site at Eirias Park in 2017, the Hockey Wales team wanted to branch out and bring the participation focussed, festival feel to all 4 regions of Wales, which we managed with great success. We held the South West

Mixed Summer 7s in Swansea, Mid Wales Womens in Llandrindod Wells, South Wales Womens in Pontypridd, South Wales Mens in Cardiff and continued to run the North Wales Mens in Colwyn Bay.



From engaging 8 clubs in 2017, the new branding, extra venues and increased frequency of events meant that we had 25 clubs take part in the programme throughout the Summer, with the programme crucially supported by the Welsh Hockey Umpiring Association.

We are even more excited about what 2019 has to offer, with 7 sites and a brandnew event targeted at businesses this really could be our biggest and best Summer ever!



# Player Development Centres

Hockey Wales Development Centres have gone from strength to strength over the past 12 months. Initially, development centres were designed to increase hockey participation at Eirias Park during the week, we have now developed a programme of 8 Development centres nationwide. These centres provide young hockey players (aged 9-16) with the opportunity to play and train outside the club and school environment., as the sessions are timetabled to compliment club training sessions, so those who want to do extra can do so without conflicting any of their other commitments.



# Walking Hockey

Walking Hockey has been a year of learning and growth. A pilot programme conducted with several partners including Carmarthenshire County Council and Age Cymru Gwent has given us the platform to create something exciting. This low impact alternate of hockey ensures all ages and abilities can play the sport they love!

We have been collating insight to create a product that can be delivered by a variety of organisations. So far, participant feedback has shown that walking hockey is having a significant impact on participant health and wellbeing and is improving social inclusion, community cohesion, reducing loneliness and improving mobility in participants over the age of 50 years.



# Hockey Young Ambassador Programme

The Hockey Young Ambassador (HYA)
Programme commenced in 2012 as Hockey
Wales' flagship young volunteer programme.
The aim of the programme is to "inspire the next
generation of volunteers through hockey" and
develop them into rounded, confident, skilled,
work ready individuals. Now in its seventh year,
the programme continues to grow and develop
with new opportunities being presented to the



young people, including our new mentoring programme in partnership with USW and the use of Vol Hours which is a new platform for volunteers to log their hours and gain rewards.

# Hooked on Hoci

Hooked on Hoci commenced in September 2018 as Hockey Wales' new flagship primary school programme. The aim of the programme was "more active and physically literate young people through an affinity with field hockey". Running for an initial period, the following package was offered to schools across Wales in 2018/19:



- 6 weeks of coached sessions in school
- Entry to a local primary school Festival
- A 4689 qualification for a teacher
- Support from Hockey Wales to form a club link

# 4689

Hockey Wales are currently in the process of reviewing the 4689 programme in line with new developments from the sport and physical activity sector. Since 2012, the programme has been a key element for developing hockey in Wales encouraging small sided games and a focus on enjoyable sessions for young people.





The new 4689 programme, due to be launched in August 2019, will feature a refreshed version of what it will be like to play hockey in Wales for the benefit of players new and old in years to come. Changes comprise of the new Talent Development Framework devised in partnership with GB Hockey; inclusion of how physical literacy can be incorporated in sessions; focus on the 'Golden Thread' and 'CHANGE IT' models covering how to run effective and fun sessions. Promotion of the refreshed courses will start in August 2019 and we encourage the whole hockey family to get engage with the revised programme.

# Flyerz Hockey

2018 has seen the launch of Flyerz Hockey, an inclusive route into our wonderful sport, opening opportunities for individuals with learning and physical disabilities to become part of the Hockey Family.



After working closely with Access Sport, who strive to improve access to sport and its benefits for vulnerable children and young people, and taking a learning journey of 18 months, we launched our first Flyerz Hockey session at Penarth Ladies Hockey Club. Penarth Ladies embraced the opportunity to host the first ever Flyerz section and wanted to open its doors to this community.

With the support of Disability Sport Wales and Access Sport, we have welcomed 10 new Flyerz players into the Hockey Family, who have been supported fantastically by 11 club volunteers, ensuring they have the best possible hockey experience at the weekly sessions.

Following this success, we look to take Flyerz Hockey across Wales, and will offer our support to any other clubs who wish to open their doors to the Flyerz community throughout the 2019-20 season. Additionally, we will be working towards developing our first ever National ParaHockey squad to compete in future European competitions.

# 360 Performance Centres

The 360-performance pathway ensures our talented youth, develop in a performance environment and continue to achieve their potential.

Entering the 360° pathway is the first step within the performance system. Individuals playing at clubs and schools can enter the system via self-nomination. Once within 360° pathway players are developed holistically within the programme ensuring they are assisted with technical, tactical, physical and psychological development on a regular basis.

Over 300 players engaged with the programme over the course of the 2018/19 season. 5 thriving centres being delivered at, Colwyn Bay, Wrexham, Cwmbran, Treforest and Swansea being coordinated by over 25 coaches with Aspire centres running in Cardiff and Wrexham.



# National Age Group Programme

### April 2018

Easter weekend saw the Welsh NAGs in action against Scotland. Boys and Girls squads at U16 and U18 age groups took on their Scotlish counterparts in Glasgow.

### June 2018

The NAG boys travelled to play Belfast in Ulster, whilst Ulster girls travelled to Wrexham to play the U18 NAG girls.

### July 2018

U18 Girls squad headed to Rakovník, in the Czech Republic for the European U18 Championships II and faced Scotland, Russia and Lithuania in their group. The squad finished  $6^{th}$  after a win in the pool versus Lithuania and a win against Italy and a draw with Poland in the classification matches.

Cardiff hosted the U18 Boys Euro Hockey Championships II. The Welsh boys started the tournament with a thrilling 3-3 draw with Scotland, having been 3 nil down. Winning the other two pool matches versus Switzerland and the Czech Republic put Wales in the semifinals. Defeat to Russia in the semis and then Austria for the bronze gave Wales a creditable  $4^{\text{th}}$  place finish on home soil.

### August 2018

Futures Cup – Wales were represented as the Celtic Jaguars, at the EH futures cup event, in both the U15 and U17 girls and boys' categories.

Men's and Women's development squads took on Scotland at Wrexham. The men taking the series 1-0, after 3 very tight and competitive matches. Meanwhile the young Welsh ladies gained some valuable experience against a strong Scotland squad.

# Senior International Programme

**Senior Men** following the 2018 Commonwealth Games have been making significant progress towards their upcoming Europeans where they will be competing in the top Division for the first time in 20 years.

This preparation has included trips to Poland, where the men secured a series win, followed by a successful trip to Croatia for Open Series Round 1 where they got promoted to the next round and most recently Malaysia for the FIH Series Finals in which Wales ended the tournament in 5th. A tournament that started brightly with an emphatic win against Canada who are ranked 10<sup>th</sup> in the world to ending the tournament with arguably their best performance against China, earning themselves a 3-2 win. Combined with this were a few defeats in the middle, where Wales came out the wrong side of some tight matches, halted their chances of achieving a higher final position, but this tournament put the squad in good stead ahead of the Summer Europeans.







**Senior Women** Entered the 2018/19 season with an initial aim to create depth, due to several experienced athletes stepping away from the programme post Commonwealth Games. An exciting opportunity to engage our talented young athletes into the senior programme.

Within a few months after concluding a 9<sup>th</sup> place finish at the Commonwealth Games, the women headed into a test series against Poland with the named squad boasted young talent with five new players receiving their first senior international caps during the opening game. Following a series win, focus shifted towards Open Series Round 1 in Lithuania later that month which was the first international

tournament for this newly formed squad. The tournament saw wins against Turkey and Czech Republic and defeats to Ukraine and Lithuania, which meant the squad successfully secured 3<sup>rd</sup> place to progress to Series Finals in Valencia, June 2019.



# Gold Coast Commonwealth Games 2018



In an explosive opening game against hockey giants, India, Wales' women electrified the crowd with an astounding 3-2 win! An inspired Wales delivered the blow to the international heavyweights just three minutes from time, thanks to a well-placed backhanded goal from Natasha Marke-Jones. This win was only the third win from 16 games at the Commonwealth for the women and their first Pool match win since beating Malaysia 2-1 in Delhi 2010.



Wales were keen to round off their tournament on a high after winning admiration for their style of play and memorable victory against India, backed up by strong performances against England and Malaysia. Against a relentless Ghana side, Wales closed their tournament with a win and with that secured 9<sup>th</sup> position.

Wales' men came into the competition on a high after securing 2<sup>nd</sup> place in the 2017 Europeans and with that a place in the European top division in 2019. Clearly in the most competitive group of the games Wales were keen to make their mark and play their part for Team Wales by delivering inspirational performances, and they did just that.

They opened the week with a nail baiting draw against international heavyweights Pakistan. This was backed up by a thriller against home nation rivals England that saw Wales lead at the break by 2 goals to nil to the delight of the partisan crowd, however they were edged out 3-2 after some Sam Ward magic.



The group also saw a thriller against India, where Wales lost out by 4 goals to 3 with defender Gareth Furlong taking the plaudits and a hat trick.

Going into the classification games Wales were keen to make history and get a win over perennial tournament big guns South Africa and they did with a solid 3-2 win, James Carson slotting 2 penalty corners to the delight of the crowd and his team mates.

# **Great Britain Hockey**

The **GB Elite Development Programme** (EDP) was launched as part of a strategic objective during the Tokyo 2020 cycle with the aim of developing medal winning Olympians of the future, with the selected athletes having shown their potential to achieve that during a comprehensive selection process. Welsh internationals Eloise Laity, Izzie Howell, Beth Bingham, Jacob Draper, Ioan Wall and Rhys Bradshaw have been involved in the EDP programme.

The **FIH Pro League** is the ground-breaking, new, global hockey competition that started this year.

Two leagues, one men's and one women's, each comprising the greatest hockey nations, battle it out for glory. 128 matches are taking place around the world this season culminating in a Grand Final in June in the Netherlands. It's action-packed, international rivalries at their fiercest and hockey of the highest calibre.



Competing as part of Great Britain's women's squad, Wales' Sarah Jones has been a regular feature of the team, playing against Germany, Australia and other tops teams across the world.





# Coach Development

### May 2018

Cardiff hosted a GB Hockey Talent Development Framework workshop.

Hockey Wales coaches working within the Talent Pathway attended the GB Hockey Coaching Conference at Lilleshall. Taking part in workshop and discussions with likeminded coaches from across the UK.

Tutor training was held to orientate Hockey Wales tutors in the new GB Coaching offer for courses and workshops, so these courses could be delivered within Wales.

### June 2018

NAG coaches attended GB EDP training session at Lilleshall to watch the women's programme train and chat to coaches as part of their ongoing CPD.

# August 2018

Engaging Games for Children workshops were run across Wales. Over 70 coaches accessed these workshops, held in Colwyn Bay, Newtown and Carmarthen.

# September 2018

Sessional Coach course delivered at Sport Wales for our club Coaches and Cardiff Metropolitan for our University students

# September 2018 – March 2019

Bangor University, Rhondda Ladies, Bridgend, Pembroke and Penarth all received coach development support from Hockey Wales coach developers. This included visits to observe and support coaching sessions and remote support throughout the season.

### November 2018 – Feb 2019

The first GB Coaching 'What to Coach: Attacking' workshops ran in Wales,

where coaches were exposed to the principles of the game and how to bring these to life in their training sessions.

Three 'Integrating Goalkeepers' workshops were delivered to 19 coaches, who are now equipped with new and fun ideas to integrate GKs into their club sessions.

# Wales Masters -Women

The Welsh Women's Masters competed in two International tournaments and various games in 2018, teams were selected in February for the o40's o45's o50's and o55's.

The first International tournament was the Home Nations which Wales



hosted in Swansea 7th - 10th June all four nations England, Scotland, Ireland and Wales entered with age groups ranging from o40's to o65's.

The tournament was a great success and Lesley Bayne as Technical Delegate also did us proud with her organising and running of the tournament with some great Umpires and officials volunteering their time many compliments were received from the other Nations.

In August all four squads represented Wales at the Exin Masters 2018 World Cup in Barcelona with 143 teams entered across Womens and Mens it was the biggest tournament of its kind organised by the IMHA, Jackie Whiller represented Wales in her Board member capacity working alongside the TD to help ensure the smooth running of the tournament, which was held over five venues. This was the last tournament organised by the IMHA as the World Masters Hockey Association take over from 2019.



It was an excellent tournament, with tremendous support shown for each squad participating. The result of this tournament places several the age groups in mid world ranking position for the 2019/20 season.

2019 will see the introduction of an over 35s and over 60s squad. With tournaments held: Home Nations: Southgate, England, Europeans: Antwerp o60s, Europeans Rotterdam o35's, o40's and o45's and Europeans Krefeld o50's and o55'

# Wales Masters – Men

The Men's Masters now run 8 international age group teams from O35 to O70 and are aspiring to an O75 side in 2021 as well as attending several international tournaments as Dragons sides. 2018 was a World Cup year with all age groups playing in Barcelona.

**Grand Masters** – pride of place must go to the O65s who achieved an outstanding 3<sup>rd</sup> place in the World Cup.

• The O65s came 3<sup>rd</sup> out of 14 countries – their first World Cup medal as 60s or 65s since the O60s were first formed just over 10 years ago. The 65s have been knocking on the door of the top four for the last two World Cups with 6<sup>th</sup> places – this time, thanks to the tireless efforts of Captain Richard Chapman, Coach Andy Mitchell, Vice Captain Pete Martineau, Team Manager Richard Evans and all the players, the preparation was excellent, the build up through the tournament perfect and the performances in the critical play-off matches exactly met requirements. In the quarter finals, Wales beat the Netherlands 3-1 (a rare victory by a senior Welsh side over them). The semi-finals brought a desperately close 2-1 defeat by England (the eventual gold medallists) before a triumphant and emphatic 2-0 victory over Spain won Wales the bronze medal. Leading goal scorers were Ian Johnson and Steve Sparkes with 4 apiece.

The additional highlight for the 65s was victory in the Celtic Cup in Lille against France, Ireland and Scotland – a third consecutive victory since it became a 4 nation event. In the Four Nations in Ireland, Wales came a disappointing 3<sup>rd</sup>.

• The O70s came 5<sup>th</sup> out of 11 countries following their 3<sup>rd</sup> place out of 4 countries in their first World Cup in Australia 2 years ago. The 70s had a seriously difficult group with England and the Netherlands their first two opponents, although a very close 2-1 defeat to England (the eventual winners) held promise for subsequent games. Inspired by the leadership of Chris Hills'

and Andy Mitchell's coaching, they then went on a run of 4 successive victories culminating in a 1-0 victory over South Africa to claim a really excellent 5<sup>th</sup> place, especially given that a number of the squad are already qualified for the future first Wales O75 team! In the Four Nations in Ireland, Wales came second out of 3 nations.



• The O60s came 7<sup>th</sup> out of 18 countries. The 60s were badly hit by last minute injury and unavoidable withdrawals but a convincing 3-0 win over Japan saw them come into form at a crucial stage and reach the quarter finals. However,

England and then Australia awaited them but again they found excellent form at the end of a gruelling tournament to beat New Zealand 3-2 to reach 7<sup>th</sup> place. All credit to Captain Sean Sutton and Team Manager John O'Reilly for sterling work in this significant improvement for the 60s, and to Zahid Arain for again being leading scorer with 4 goals. In the Four Nations in Ireland, Wales came a disappointing 4<sup>th</sup>.

• The scratch O60s Dragons side, containing a significant number of O65s, came 9<sup>th</sup> out of 10 countries in the World Cup Tournament Trophy. In the pool matches the Dragons lost close matches to England LX and the Netherlands but beat South Africa 1-0. They were deprived of a place in the 5-8 play-off at the very last by an unlikely South Africa draw against LX. There followed 2 play-off matches against Germany, both ending 1-1, but 9<sup>th</sup> place went to Wales on pool results

### Masters

- The O55s came 3<sup>rd</sup> in the Four Nations with England, Ireland and Scotland in Lisnagarvey. The World Cup in Terrassa was a fantastic event but with the first two games against England and Australia resulting in losses they were always up against it with France and New Zealand also in the group. They played Ireland and South Africa in the play offs for 13<sup>th</sup> to 15<sup>th</sup> places and won both these matches to finish 13<sup>th</sup>.
- The O50s came 3<sup>rd</sup> in the Four Nations with England, Ireland and Scotland. At the World Cup, Wales lost to England and France but had an excellent 4-0 win over Argentina in their pool matches. In the 9<sup>th</sup> to 12<sup>th</sup> place playoffs they lost to South Africa and drew with USA and Scotland to end in 12<sup>th</sup> place.
- The O40s came 4<sup>th</sup> in the Four Nations with England, Ireland and Scotland. Two relatively small pools of players meant that the O40s combined with the O35s as an O35 side for the World Cup.

There were notable success stories for Dragons teams at other tournaments:

## 21st Tournoi Super Veterans Jacques Levy in Lille

Wales Men's Grandmasters 60+ Dragons won this event for the first time since 2011 with a squad including  $7 \times 060s$ ,  $5 \times 065s$ ,  $1 \times 070$  and  $1 \times 075$ ! They beat England LX 2-0 in the final and, remarkably, their 77-year-old goalkeeper Glyn Thomas, kept a clean sheet in all 6 matches!

Le Touquet – a 60+ Dragons side also won this event.

**Kath Cup, Lilleshall** – a 50+ Dragons side including players from all age groups from 050 to 075 won this event for the second year running.


