IT IS THE RESPONSIBILITY OF FISA AND THE ROWING COMMUNITY TO PROTECT ATHLETES, COACHES, OFFICIALS AND ENSURE FAIR COMPETITION. FISA WANTS TO RAISE AWARENESS ABOUT COMPETITION MANIPULATION IN ROWING.

Competition Manipulation is when an athlete, official or support personnel cheat to remove the unpredictability of a competition. FISA has active integrity policies with regards to <u>safeguarding</u> and <u>anti-doping</u> to protect our athletes and promote a level playing field for those who are competing. The manipulation of sports competitions is nothing new, but in recent years, it has become a more prominent concern. FISA and the International Olympic Committee (IOC) are committed to fighting this threat to the integrity of our sport.

Although rowing is currently at a low risk from the threats of competition manipulation, we must still take preventive measures. These measures include obligations and rules. They apply to athletes, coaches and officials and any other accredited persons like an athletes' entourage and support teams that have an accreditation at any FISA event.

AWARENESS RAISING AND CAPACITY BUILDING

The IOC launched the educational campaign "Be True, Be you, Believe in Sport". FISA has joined this campaign to promote preventing competition manipulation initiatives by sharing its educational measures with the rowing community and further collaborating with the IOC:



WHAT IS COMPETITION MANIPULATION?

Competition Manipulation is when an athlete, official, support personnel or any accredited person manipulate competition(s) to remove the unpredictability of a competition. Below is a non-exhaustive list of the main aspects:

- A betting prohibition. Any accredited person is not allowed to bet on World Rowing events, their own sports competition and/or any other multi-sports event(s) in which they are participating.
- Inside information. Inside information relating to any competition such as competition strategies, or medical information of athletes is non-public information a person knows due to his or her position in relation to a sport or competition. This information can be used for betting related competition manipulation. Sharing inside information through social media is also prohibited.
- Match-fixing. Competition manipulation is any intentional alteration
 of a competition, usually by underperforming. Reasons can be to win
 money through sports betting or to ensure that another person (who
 may have been offered a bribe) meets their goal. For example,
 underperforming in a C final so another crew finishes higher to
 secure funding or money.

FISA CODE ON THE PREVENTION OF MANIPULATION OF COMPETITIONS

The Official code of conduct is found in the <u>FISA Rulebook</u>. The FISA code of Ethics is described in article 59. Article 60 and appendix 9 deal specifically with the Manipulation of Competition and Betting. FISA follows the <u>IOC Code of Ethics</u> which includes the Olympic Movement Code on the Prevention of the Manipulation of Competitions.

WHAT YOU CAN NOT DO

Athletes, Coaches, Officials and/or any other accredited persons at FISA events:

- Must not bet on your own sport or on any other sport competitions.
- Must not to manipulate a competition.
- Must not prohibited to share inside information.
- Must always report any activity to manipulate the results or any suspicious activity.

REPORTING (INTEGRITY HOTLINE)

Article 61 describes the procedure for reporting:

Article 61 – Right of Complaint Any party claiming to have a valid complaint in relation to Art. 59 and

Art. 60 concerning a party mentioned in Art. 57 may submit it to the Executive Committee or, in a

case involving a member of the Executive Committee, to the IOC Ethics Commission. The Executive

Committee has the authority to make decisions on all cases except cases involving members of the

Executive Committee, in which case the IOC Ethics Commission has the authority to decide. The

relevant authority may make any decision it deems appropriate and the decision may be published.

INTELLIGENCE SYSTEM (IBIS)

IOC makes use of the Integrity Betting Intelligence System (IBIS). This system monitors bets at international events including rowing events. If an irregular pattern is detected, the information is shared with the IOC and FISA with the support of national and international police forces, including INTERPOL. FISA can decide if an irregular pattern should be further investigated. Consequently, disciplinary action can be taken by FISA. In addition, a case may be subject to criminal law as betting-related match-fixing is a crime in some countries. You can find more information about IBIS here.

INFORMATION SESSIONS

At some World Rowing Events, FISA will organise activities to raise awareness of competition manipulation among the athletes, coaches, umpires and other stakeholders.
