Yale Keeps Harvard From Carrying Ball Across Its Goal; Dropkicks Win.

PUT THREE OVER BARS OUT OF FIVE ATTEMPTS

New Haven, Nov. 20.—Ruptured in their attack at the Yale goal today, Harvard resorted to kicking, and with three field goals defeated the Pits, 9 to 0.

The Yale players battled so savagely that although the Cambridge clan several times drove the Ellis back to the shadow of their own goal posts, a touchdown was beyond the physical ability of the crimson eleven.

In this crisis, Harvard fell back upon the kick and three times out of five booted the ball between the uprights, while Yale left the field with the satisfaction of having partially checked its greatest rival in a triumph that was considered such a foregone conclusion that Harvard cohorts were cheering odds of 3 to 1 before the game.

Stiffen in Danger. Both teams showed a stronger defense than attack and this was particularly notable in the case of Yale.

Harvard Rushes Excel. While Harvard could not cross the Yale goal line, it could and did move when necessity required.

Nebraska Paves Way to Victory Over the Michigan Aggies With Strong Defense and Effective Aerial Attack.

Lincoln, Neb., Nov. 20.—The University of Nebraska Cornhuskers rang up their fifth victory of the season this afternoon when they humbled the Michigan Aggie eleven, 35 to 7.

A large crowd witnessed the Nebraska victory, 1,000 visiting Rotarians occupying a special section of the grandstand.

The superiority of the Scarlet and Cream was marked throughout the contest. During the second period the northern farmers gained only six yards from scrimmage, while the Huskers negotiated ninety-six yards.

Nebraska was not long in solving the Michigan shift and spread play. The Farmers introduced their formation early in the first quarter, and relied on it for a major part of the game.

The Huskers smashed through and harried the work of the backs, making most of the M. A. C. passes go wild.

The first quarter was a scoreless affair, with Nebraska holding the advantage. The Michigan crew rushed the ball down to the Nebraska fifty-yard line, where an Aggie flip was intercepted by Newman.
