Pennsylvania Presidential Election Survey

MID OCTOBER 2020

Key Findings:

- 1. As Election Day 2020 draws closer, the latest Muhlenberg College/*Morning Call* poll finds former Vice President Joe Biden holding a 7-point lead (51%-44%) over President Donald Trump among likely Pennsylvania voters.
- 2. As President Trump seeks to repeat his 2016 victory in Pennsylvania, he is struggling to overcome the belief among a majority (51%) of likely voters that he does not deserve reelection.
- 3. While Trump trails Biden in a head-to-head matchup among likely voters, the President's supporters are significantly more likely to say they are very enthusiastic about voting for the President (79%), compared to Pennsylvanians who plan to vote for the former Vice President (51%).
- 4. Democrats hold a 6% lead among likely Pennsylvania voters in terms of congressional elections in the state, with 47% planning to vote for the Democrat candidate in their district, compared to 41% backing Republican candidates.
- 5. Three issues appear to be the top tier concerns of Pennsylvanians as they cast their 2020 presidential votes, with the economy (27%), Coronavirus pandemic (20%), and health care (18%) most commonly identified as the most important issue of voters in the Keystone State.
- 6. Slightly less than 2 out of 3 likely voters (62%) in the Commonwealth expressed their intent to vote in-person this election, with a little over 1 in 3 (35%) stating that they will vote by mail.
- 7. Voter fraud (40%) and voter suppression (37%) are identified by likely Pennsylvania voters as the biggest threats to Pennsylvania having a safe, secure and accurate election in 2020.

Methodological Statement:

The following report contains the results of a telephone survey of (416) likely voters in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania between October 13 and 20, 2020. Respondents were interviewed in English on both landlines (104) and cell phones (312). With a randomly selected sample of respondents the margin of error for the surveys is +/- 5.5% at a 95% level of confidence. Margins of error for questions with smaller sample size will be larger. In addition to sampling error, one should consider that question wording and other fielding issues can introduce error or bias into survey results. Interviewing was conducted by Communication Concepts of Easton, Pennsylvania under protocols established by the MCIPO. The data has been weighted to gender, age, region, party, race and educational attainment to reflect voter population parameters. The calculation of sampling error takes into account design effects due to the weighting identified above. In order to reach a representative sample of registered voters both land lines and cell phones were called up to 3 times. The sampling frame for the study is from the registered voters files of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. To determine likely voters, only voters who have voted in 1 or more of the last 4 general elections (2016-2019), or who is a new registrant since November of 2016 were included in the sampling frame. In addition, only survey respondents from this frame who indicated that they were "definitely" or "very likely" to vote in the November election were included in the sample. Due to rounding the totals provided in the frequency report may not total 100%. The survey instrument (presented in its entirety below) was designed by Dr. Christopher P. Borick of the MCIPO is conjunction with the staff of the Morning Call. The survey was funded exclusively by the Morning Call and the MCIPO.
