

## ARCHBISHOP BOURDAGE DEAD.

Santa Fe Prelate Has Heart Attack While Under Treatment in Chicago.

CHICAGO, May 17.—Archbishop Peter Bourdage, 63 years old, of the Santa Fe Diocese, died at a hospital here to-day of heart disease.

The Archbishop came to Chicago on May 4 from Hot Springs, Ark. He was suffering from a slight physical collapse, but until yesterday he had not been confined to his bed. He took short drives on days when the weather permitted, and his condition was not regarded as critical. Yesterday, feeling more than usually indisposed, he remained in bed. He had a sinking spell early to-day, but appeared to rally. Then he was again stricken, and died this evening.

Archbishop Bourdage was born and educated in France. He went to Arizona as a missionary in 1869, was ordained at Santa Fe the same year, and began work at Yuma in 1870. He was consecrated in 1885 Vicar Apostolic of Arizona, with titular rank of Bishop of Taumaco, and resided at Tucson until made Archbishop in 1899.

### Dunham Jones Crain.

Dunham Jones Crain, who died suddenly in this city yesterday, was born at Cullenwood, Cullen, Herkimer County, N. Y., on Feb. 28, 1831. He was a son of the late Col. William C. Crain and Perses Narina Crain. His father, Col. Crain, was a prominent Democrat of Herkimer County, and at one time Speaker of the Assembly. Mr. Crain was the surviving member of a large family. He was graduated from Union College, studied law in the office of the late Richard Cooper at Coopers-town, N. Y., and later entered the office of Barney & Butler of this city. Later he formed a law partnership with Thomas E. Stewart and Frederick Stallknecht, under the firm name of Stewart, Stallknecht & Crain. In 1858 he was elected to the Legislature as a Democrat from the old Fourteenth District of this city. In 1859 he married Hannah Ann Crocker, daughter of the late David Crocker of this city. He lived for many years abroad, and in 1877 he was appointed United States Consul at Milan, Italy, where he served until 1884. He was a member of the Herkimer Historical Society and a life member of the New York Geographical Society. He leaves a widow, a married son, Judge Thomas C. T. Crain, and two daughters, Christobelle and Davida Crocker Crain.

### Percival S. Menken.

Percival S. Menken, aged 43 years, President of the Young Men's Hebrew Association for the last thirteen years, Vice

President of the West End Synagogue, and former Trustee of the Jewish Theological Seminary, died yesterday at his home in this city. Mr. Menken was born in Philadelphia on Aug. 10, 1865. He was educated in the New York public schools and the College of the City of New York, and received his LL. B. and Ph. D. at Columbia University. He was admitted to the bar in 1892. He leaves a widow and one son. The funeral service will be held at the West End Synagogue, 160 West Eighty-second Street, to-morrow morning at 9:30 o'clock.
