

## PROGRESSIVE LEADER DIES.

Ziba T. Moore of Philadelphia a Victim of Heart Disease.

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 20.—Ziba T. Moore, a leader of the Progressive Party in this city, was found dead in bed at his home today. Death was due to heart disease. Mr. Moore, who was a former Assistant District Attorney of Philadelphia, took an active part in the Progressive convention which nominated Col. Roosevelt for the Presidency.

Prior to joining the Progressives, Mr. Moore was a Republican leader in Philadelphia and was a member of the Legislature. He was 49 years old.

### John Bianchi.

John Bianchi, a retired broker and for almost forty years a member of the New York Stock Exchange, died on Wednesday at his home on Boothbay Harbor, Maine, aged 87 years. Mr. Bianchi was born in Stapleton, Staten Island, and entered the artificial flower business with his father under the name of F. Bianchi & Sons. In 1874 he became connected with the brokerage firm of Simon J. Drake, now known as Drake Brothers, 66 Broadway, where he remained until his retirement in 1907. Mr. Bianchi left a widow and three children, Francisco and B. F. Bianchi of this city, and Mrs. John S. Bronson of St. Louis.

### Mrs. Dunham Jones Crain.

Mrs. Dunham Jones Crain, the widow of Dunham Jones Crain, formerly United States Consul at Malta, died yesterday at Cullenwood, the home of the Crain family for nearly a century, in Herkimer County, N. Y. She was the daughter of David Crocker and the granddaughter of Thomas C. Taylor. Mrs. Crain was noted for her charities and was one of the managers of St. Luke's Home and attended St. Paul's Chapel in Trinity Parish. Years ago she and her husband built a memorial chapel at Cullen. She is survived by her son, Judge Thomas C. T. Crain of the Court of General Sessions, and two daughters, Christobelle and Davida Crocker Crain.
