

Elections in Forty-Two States Nov. 4

Full State Tickets Will Be Chosen In Twenty-One States, Minor Officers In Eleven Others—Congressmen to Be Elected In All—In Many, Constitutional Amendments Will Be Voted on—Legislatures Elected Will Name Twenty-Three United States Senators.

On Tuesday, Nov. 4, forty-two States will elect Representatives to the Fifty-eighth Congress, 378 in all, the total membership having been increased by the reapportionment under the twelfth census to 386. Eight members, all Republicans, have already been elected—four from Maine and two each from Oregon and Vermont.

On the same day full tickets of State executive officers and Legislatures will be elected in twenty-one States, minor executive officers in eleven, and Legislatures in five. Amendments to the Constitution will be submitted to the vote of the people in many States at the same time. The offices to be filled, the candidates of the several parties, and the previous votes of the States are given in the following article:

Pennsylvania will elect State officers, one-half of its Senate and its House of Representatives. The Legislature will choose a United States Senator to succeed Boies Pennington, Republican, whose term will expire March 3, 1903. For the State offices there are five tickets in nomination, including the Union Party, which has accepted the Democratic nominees for the first two tickets.
