Children's Message

Today, we are going to fix a tasty snack. Oh boy, that sounds like fun. The first thing we need is a recipe. You know what a recipe is, don't you? A recipe is a set of instructions, including a list of all the ingredients. I have a recipe to make a delicious and healthy trail mix.

And here are the trail mix ingredients we need and a bowl to mix it in. (Show the items.)

Can you help me make this trail mix? Let's read the recipe to know how to make it. First, we will add some Chex Mix and M&Ms. (Hand the bags to children to pour into the bowl.)

Let's see, next we add some pretzel sticks and then some yogurt-covered raisins. (Hand the bags to children to pour into the bowl.)

We're not done! We still have two more ingredients for our trail mix. Let's add the Cheez Its and the Honeycomb cereal. (Hand the bags to children to pour into the bowl.)

Well, the trail mix is all finished and I need someone to stir it. (Choose a child to gently stir the trail mix.)

So now we have a tasty snack we can enjoy later. (Set the trail mix aside.)

Did you know that Jesus gave us a recipe for living a happy life? In the book of Matthew, the Bible says, "Now when Jesus saw the crowds, He went up on a mountainside and sat down. His disciples came to Him, and He began to teach them." He taught them a lesson we call "The Beatitudes." Each one of the beatitudes starts with the words, "Blessed are they..." Some translations of the Bible use the word happy instead of blessed. So this is Jesus' recipe for us to be happy.

I like that the word "beatitudes" has two parts to it: be and attitude. The Beatitudes are ways that we can be and attitudes we can have. Let's look at a few of these be-attitudes.

Jesus said to... be merciful to people. To be kind when they are hurting.

Jesus said to...be peacemakers when people are fighting.

Jesus said to...have an attitude of pure thoughts.

Jesus said to..have an attitude of wanting to do right.

Jesus also said that when we are sad, God comforts us and then we are happy.

I like that Jesus gave us a recipe for how to be and what kind of attitudes to have. And Jesus says that we will be happy if we follow His recipe.

Dear God, thank You for the beatitudes. Please help us follow Your recipe for a happy and blessed life. In Jesus' name we pray, amen.

Message

Grace and peace to you from our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. Amen

Our gospel this morning is one that we have all heard many many times. It's a beautiful reminder of all the wonderful things that God has given us and how blessed we are. I decided, however, today to speak not on the gospel but rather on what day this day is in the church calendar. This Sunday is All Saints Sunday. Saints – dictionary. Com defines a saint as the following:

- 1. a person acknowledged as holy or virtuous and typically regarded as being in heaven after death.
- 2. a very virtuous, kind, or patient person. "she's a saint to go on living with that man"

As a kid I always thought that a Saint was someone that was better than others, someone who rose above the rest of us, those that had earned a special place but the reality is that they or we don't have to be perfect to be saintly. You and I can indeed be a saint. You and I are believers in God and therefore we can join in community with God and each other.

Let us take a moment this morning to look at these saints – those who have journeyed with in the past, those that we travel with today and those that we will join together with in the future. We first look at the saints of our past. People that made a difference in our lives, in our country, in our world. Those that have found their place in heaven already. I have a number of people in my past who were a very important part of who I am today and the giving and serving person that I try to be. People who had amazing values, amazing talents they shared, positive outlooks on life and reasoning and understanding that helped to form me into the Christian that I have become. It is these types of saints that our own heritage of faith is formed through.

I have mentioned before how I had a connection with Grace Lutheran Church in Ada, in that I visited there many times each year as I would attend with my grandmother and my extended family. I walk into the church even today and the stained glass windows and the hanging chandeliers of color and so much of the actual architecture of the church still warms my heart and makes me feel at home all these years later. Yes, the building is beautiful and all but it's not really the actual space that gives me such joy it is the feelings of God that I would feel when I was in that church, sitting in the pew next to my grandmother, singing the hymns and reading the passages. That place was where I felt my grandmother as a saint.

I'm certain that you have over the years of this church known and felt the presence of many saints in this space. Memories may flash through your mind of those who were leaders and givers and sharers in the congregation. Those that tended to the kitchen, or the altar, or sang their praises in the choir, or cared for the flowers or....... the list goes on and on. We all watched as they did what needed to be done to care for the church and for their brothers and sisters in Christ. They passed on their knowledge and their wisdom and we learned from them how and what to do.

It's wonderful to take time to remember those who are special to us and have gone before us. It's ok to take a moment to mourn their loss and cherish all the times we had with them. We remember them each and every time we recite the Apostles Creed. It's easy to gloss over as we recite those familiar words but we "believe in the communion of saints" – we believe that we continue to have relationship with those that are in heaven and that they are with us until the day that we reunite again.

There is a beautiful writing by a man named Frederick Buechner that says "when you remember me, it means that you have carried something of who I am with you, that I have left some mark of who I am on who you are. It means that you can summon me back to your mind, even though countless years and miles may stand between us. It means that if we meet again, you will know me. It means that even after I die, you can still see my face and hear my words and speak to me in your heart." WOW — isn't that so assuring?

The friendships and relationships that we have with our past saints surely lead us into relationships in the present. Our present moment is made up of fellow believers, those that accept Jesus Christ and share in the love and trust that God has promised. We gather together in a community of faith believers because it is from our mutual witness that our faith remains strong and alive. We can draw confidence and trust, courage and faith, strength and understanding from each other and the Lord to allow us to be His witnesses in this world of believers and non-believers. We need each other in this present community to give us strength and the assurance that our faith can be strong regardless of the many challenges that get thrown our way in this world.

The Beatitudes are a clear description of the faithful as they live in this world. These descriptions actually turn the ways of this world upside down – they are not the victors but rather the victims who despite everything they do indeed receive victory through Jesus Christ. Think about this passage "Blessed are those who mourn, for they shall be comforted". This passage has many different meanings or interpretations. One of them describes the love and the faithfulness of the community of believers. It's saying blessed, happy, blessed is the person who identifies – understands and accepts the sorrows of this world. Blessed are you who walk alongside another who is facing brokenness. Blessed are you who give support, strength, give encouragement and reassurance through the sharing of God's Word.

Do you feel it? Do you see that being in community with one another – being a witness to God working in and through us – being a saint for another saint – is what this whole Church is all about. Being the body of Christ is about the communion of saints. Being able to be and walk with one another down a path without believing that YOU know the directions. Being able to share another burdens without making it your own. In this All Saints Day I hope we can find time for each of us to turn to our brothers and sisters in Christ to give them strength and courage, comfort and confidence in their walk along-side you in your journey in faith.

Help us all to remember with each and every step we take, each and every breath we breathe – all of these lead us just a little closer to our end of time here. And that's ok because we all are headed to eternal life with God just has he promised for all who believe in Christ. Jesus said it "I am the Resurrection and the life, he who believes in me shall never die". We can hold on to that promise each and every day knowing that. Each and every day we can live in the joy and the hope of that promise. As saints – those who have been redeemed by the blood of the lamb, can live with conviction and assurance and hope that there is indeed life after this one. Each day we can live in Christ - and for Christ - so that some tomorrow we might be with Christ and resting in our heavenly home. Amen
