1. Course Synopsis

This course aims to analyze the transformation of Hong Kong from a trading port under British rule into a global financial and business centre in the 21st century from multidisciplinary perspectives. In particular, it will explore the political, social and economic forces that have shaped the development of Hong Kong at the local, national, regional and global levels. Special focus will be placed on the multi-faceted cross-boundary interactions between Hong Kong and the Pearl River Delta region since China embarked on reform and open door policy since 1978.

2. Course Intended Learning Outcomes (CILOs)

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

- CILO₁ Understand the competing theoretical perspectives that can be employed to interpret the transformation of contemporary Hong Kong;
