

Late reports and corrections will be carried quarterly. Maps of zones used in the Storm Data and Unusual Weather Phenomena will be published in all editions.

OUTSTANDING STORMS OF THE MONTH









1. FLASH FLOODING at YUMA, ARIZONA on August 9, 1989

In less than two weeks after receiving its worst storm of record on July 27, 1989 when 2.55 inches of rain resulted in flash flooding, Yuma, Arizona was again visited by a record rain-producing thunderstorm at 1830 MST on August 9th. This time 3.5 inches was recorded in just three hours at the airport, and a maximum storm total of 5.25 inches was reported from the Yuma Quartermaster Depot, exceeding this oldest Arizona recording station's all-time, 24-hour rainfall record of 4.10 inches set in 1909. This rainfall was nearly double the normal annual rainfall.

Damage to water mains, streets and private property due to the resulting flash flooding was widespread in Yuma, as between 500 and 1000 homes were inundated. Some homes had water 4 to 5 feet deep in them. Also, many vehicles were washed away or otherwise water damaged, but occupants managed to escape or were rescued so no deaths or injuries resulted.

2. HURRICANE CHANTAL, July 30 to August 3, 1989


CHANTAL formed over the Gulf of Mexico just off the shore of Yucatan near Progreso, Mexico on July 30th and began moving steadily north then northwest over the Gulf waters (see July Storm Data for path map). The system attained storm status by 0600 UTC on the 31st and, due to a rapid intensification, minimal hurricane status by 2200 UTC of the same day. By 1300 UTC of August 1st, CHANTAL's center crossed the U.S. coastline and entered southeast Texas near High Island, the hurricane bringing with it a tide of up to 7 feet MSL, sustained winds estimated at 70 knots and some very heavy rains.


CHANTAL's rains were perhaps the most significant feature of the hurricane as amounts of up to 12.1 inches officially and 20 inches unofficially were reported from locations in an east-west band about 20 miles south of downtown Houston and extending from Texas City to Rosenburg. The resultant flooding affected hundreds of homes across southeast Texas. In addition to the flooding, beach erosion occurred along the coast in the High Island area, and although wind damage was relatively weak, numerous trees, power lines, fences and signs were blown down and some roof damage was done to homes, mobile homes and carports. There were about 3000 homes in Texas that had either water or wind damage, and the total damage from CHANTAL is estimated to be near 100 million dollars.


There were only two weak tornadoes spawned by CHANTAL that could be confirmed, one on Crystal Beach of the Bolivar Peninsula in Texas and the other near Iota, Louisiana.


Of thirteen deaths attributed to CHANTAL, only two occurred inland — two teenage boys drowned while rafting in floodwaters in College Station, Texas. The other 11 deaths occurred in the Gulf of Mexico, one a 48 year old man who had drowned about 100 miles south of New Orleans as he attempted to leave an oil rig, the other 10 all males of which 7 are known to be drowned and 3 are missing but presumed to be drowned after an oil service vessel capsized about 20 nautical miles south of Morgan City, Louisiana. Four men were rescued from the vessel.



3. HEAVY RAIN and MUD SLIDES at YELLOWSTONE N.P. in WYOMING on August 10, 1989

On August 10th, late afternoon and evening thunderstorms produced very heavy rainfall over Yellowstone National Park in northwest Wyoming between 1600 and 1730 MST, which resulted in 15 mud slides. The slides occurred along a 4 to 5 mile stretch of road between Gibbon Falls and Gibbon Meadow in the west-central part of the park. About 30 vehicles were temporarily stranded, and heavy road equipment had to be used to clear the road. The worst slide, just north of Gibbon Falls, forced a camper/pickup into the adjacent river and nearly buried the vehicle. The occupants were rescued and uninjured. Park officials estimated that 4 inches of rain had fallen in the area during a 20 minute period.












Tropical Storm HENRIETTE centered near 134°W, 18°N in the Eastern Pacific at 2200 UTC on August 16th.


LEFT: Plots of estimated maximum wind speed and minimum surface pressure versus time for Tropical Storm HENRIETTE.




LEFT: Plots of estimated maximum wind speed and minimum surface pressure versus time for Hurricane ISMAEL.




LEFT: Plots of estimated maximum wind speed and minimum surface pressure versus time for Tropical Storm JULIETTE.




LEFT: Plots of estimated maximum wind speed and minimum surface pressure versus time for Hurricane KIKO.






Hurricane LORENA centered near 118.5°W, 21°N in the Eastern Pacific at 1630 UTC on September 1st.


LEFT: Plots of estimated maximum wind speed and minimum surface pressure versus time for Hurricane LORENA.






LEFT: Plots of estimated maximum wind speed and minimum surface pressure versus time for Tropical Storm MANUEL.


Plots of estimated maximum wind speed and minimum surface pressure versus time for Hurricane DEAN.



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
When reports are not received or are incomplete, the Storm Summary National Death and Injury totals may also be incomplete.


Definition of Fujita Tornado Scale (F scale)


- (FO) Gale tornado (40-72 mph): Light damage Some damage to chimneys; break branches off trees; push over shallow-rooted trees; damage sign boards.
- (F1) Moderate tornado (73-112 mph): Moderate damage The lower limit (73 mph) is the beginning of hurricane wind speed; peel surface off roofs; mobile homes pushed off foundations or overturned; moving autos pushed off the roads.
- (F2) Significant tornado (113-157 mph): Considerable damage Roofs torn off frame houses; mobile homes demolished; boxcars pushed over; large trees snapped or uprooted; light-object missiles generated.
- (F3) Severe tornado (158-206 mph): Severe damage Roofs and some walls torn off well-constructed houses; trains overturned; most trees in forest uprooted; heavy cars lifted off ground and thrown.
- (F4) Devastating tornado (207-260 mph): Devastating damage Well-constructed houses leveled; structure with weak foundation blown off some distance; cars thrown and large missiles generated.
- (F5) Incredible tornado (261-318 mph): Incredible damage Strong frame houses lifted off foundations and carried considerable distance to disintegrate; automobile-sized missiles fly through the air in excess of 100 m; trees debarked; incredible phenomena will occur.
- (F6-F12) (319 mph to Mach 1, the speed of sound): The maximum wind speeds of tornadoes are not expected to reach the F6 wind speeds.





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

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CHALLENGES AHEAD: FLOOD LOSS

This year's conference theme focuses on the challenges we face in the advent of the 21st century, and the strategies needed to further reduce flood hazards over the next decade. Papers are invited for, but not limited to, the following issues and subjects:

Mapping Issues: Delineation of floodplains in rapidly growing areas to account for the effects of future watershed development; new methods and techniques for assessing and evaluating flooding risks; dealing with floodplains not identified through the National Flood Insurance Program or where flood data does not exist

Managing Stormwater: Linking floodplain and stormwater management programs; designing stormwater management facilities to reduce future flood losses while providing other environmental and community benefits; effective funding and maintenance arrangements.

The Floodplain and Beyond: Approaches for balancing the need to protect wetlands while allowing for appropriate development of floodplains; special partnerships which further multi-objective management; innovative land use strategies for river corridor management; basinwide approaches to stormwater management.

Floodpiain Management for Tomorrow: Successful ways to encourage and promote flood preparedness and response; innovative floodplain management programs; effectiveness of Executive Order 11988 in the '90s.; new tools for floodplain managers; noteworthy local regulatory programs; key flood loss reduction issues for the decade ahead and alternatives for resolving them.

Flood Control: Designing flood control projects for multi-objective benefits; responding to the growing transfer of flood control project costs from federal to state and local governments.

Mitigation: Gaining greater support for state and local flood hazard mitigation activities; practical alternatives for mitigating flood losses to existing structures; exemplary mitigation projects.

Unique Flood Hazards: Defining the hazards; new mapping methodologies; effective management standards.

In addition to specific papers, the ASFPM also welcomes proposals for short course presentations at the conference and any special exhibits or demonstrations that may be of particular interest to conference attendees.

FLOOD LOSS REDUCTION STRATEGIES FOR THE '90s

Submission of Abstracts

Prospective authors must submit three copies of the following items to Tim Keptner, Program Chair, by October 31, 1989:

- A one page abstract including the paper's title, all authors' names and their affiliations and the kinds of visual aids which will be used in the presentation.
- Concise biographies of all authors not to exceed 100 words per individual including current titles and positions, other background information directly relevant to the paper and complete mailing addresses and telephone numbers.

Authors will receive timely notification of the status of their papers. All papers selected must be submitted by May 15, 1990 for inclusion in the conference proceedings. All attendees, including authors, are expected to pay the conference registration fee.

About the Conference

The conference program will run Tuesday, June 12 through Thursday, June 14, including technical field trips in the Asheville area. The ASFPM will conduct its committee and general membership meetings on Monday, June 11. All members and conference participants are encouraged to attend.
