As the cost of business has increased, fewer and fewer companies have been able to justify the expenses involved in the day-to-day operation and ex-

the '50s when Columbia, Mercury, Decca and RCA monopolized the charts. Then, rock 'n' roll appeared and the structure went through a transition, only to end up in a similar position today.

There will always be an opportunity for the aggressive individualist in the industry, because it is a creative business dependent upon creative people. New companies, new musical trends and other things will continue to keep the record industry offbalance.

So, now that we are in the age of the "supersellers," we have the superpowers to perpetuate this new era.





A&M Records Inks With RCA; Pressure Mounting On Indies

Indies Say Loss 'Bearable,' But Foresee Changes

LOS ANGELES — The loss of A&M Records as an independently-distributed record label, equated by one distributor to the departure of Warner Bros, Elektra and Atlantic in 1970, is serious, according to most of A&M's former distributors, but it's a loss they will be able to handle.

"I still think we can survive," said Eugene Silverman, president of Music Trend Distributors, reflecting the feeling of a majority of the indies. "Indie distributors have taken blows like this in the past and have survived very well. I have no intention of folding up lour tent."

More Resources Now Available For Artists, Says Moss

LOS ANGELES — A&M Records, the leading independent label owned by Herb Alpert and Jerry Moss, left the indie fold last week and announced a distribution agreement with RCA Records and the formation of RCA and A&M and Associated Labels.

The new distribution system, which will operate under the RCA Records banner, takes effect Feb. 15. RCA also will be the principal manufacturer of A&M records and tapes under the pact.

(At presstime, it was learned that A&M senior vice president Bob Fead has joined RCA as a divisional VP, sales and distribution.)

A&M chairman Jerry Moss, during a press conference Jan. 17 at the Beverly Hills Hotel, said the company will continue to act independently in all other areas except distribution. He said there was no exchange of stock under the agreement.

"On a creative basis, RCA and A&M will continue to be competitors," Moss said. "This (agreement) is just a way of getting records to market."

He added that the pact does not affect any of A&M's companies outside of the U.S., nor its existing overseas licenses.

Moss went on to stress that the move was purely a matter of economics. He said in no way was it a reflection on the performance of A&M's year-old west coast distribution facility, A&M Pacific, Inc.

"A&M Pacific was the best branch in the country, a model distribution outlet," said Moss. "But the expense was formidable, and the cost involved in gearing up

Caution Is Byword For Small IndieLabels As Trend Toward Branch Distribution Continues

(In today's increasingly big music business, it sometimes seems that the small, independent label is headed for obsolescence. Within the past few months alone, several indies either have been absorbed by the majors, have opted to become production companies, or have filed for reorganization under Chapter 11. In the first of a two-part series, Cash Box examines some of the difficulties that small labels encounter in trying to stay afloat.)

NEW YORK — As shown by a recent Cash

NEW YORK — As shown by a recent Cash Box survey of independent record manufacturers, the species as a whole is alive and well. But those that are surviving have all had to learn how to cope with a decreased share of a marketplace that is increasingly dominated by the majors.

To be sure, the chances of success declined greatly with the size of the label.

Monteiro Is VP Marketing, West Coast, For E/P/A

Jerry Osborne, who publishes *The Record Digest*, experienced failure with an independent label venture. Osborne collected a number of 45s that paid tribute to the memory of Elvis Presley, organized the best of them into an anthology album entitled "To Elvis, With Love Still Burning," and capped the concept by pressing the record as a picture-disc with a portrait of Presley on the album.

The concept, coupled with initial sales, resulted in a distribution deal with the powerful Pickwick corporation, and Osborne's success with the disc seemed insured. But it was only the beginning of his troubles. "We had 21 distributors, and Pickwick ordered like it was a monster," said Osborne, "but out of orders for 20,000, we could only deliver 1,500 copies. Pressing plants place a much higher priority on jobs they do for the majors, which involve the pressing of 50,000 records, as opposed to ours, which were just a few thousand. After an initial pressing, one plant told me directly, 'We don't want your business anymore.'

"Then, even if you can deliver your order," Osborne continued, "you have to wait 90 to 120 days for your distributor to pay you, so you in turn are unable to press more records. When distributors see that you aren't coming with any more records,

Music Group Of WCI Set Sales Record In 1978

NEW YORK — The Warner Communications Inc. Music and Record Group set new financial records in 1978, as revenues rose more than 16% and exceeded \$600 million.

WCI's Music and Record Group's outstanding fiscal performance was paced by a record 77 RIAA gold and platinum record certifications in 1978, including platinum certifications for the singles "Le Freak" by Chic and "We Are The Champions" by Queen.

The platinum album certifications were led by Foreigner's "Double Vision" by Foreigner; "Some Girls" by the Rolling Stones; "Running On Empty" by Jackson Browne; "Living In The USA" by Linda Ronstadt; "Blondes Have More Fun" by Rod Stewart; and "Let's Get Small" and "A

they have nothing to lose by making you an even lower priority. I have been waiting for over six months to be paid by some distributors, and a couple have even told me that they are not going to pay me at all. I'll never do this again."

Low Priority

Richard Foof, a co-owner of the Los Angeles-based Rhino Records, has also experienced the problems of being small and independent. "We're a low priority to whomever we do business with. During the pressing crunch in October and November, we couldn't get our records pressed. Then

Shelly Siegel, VP And GM Of Mushroom, Dies At Age 32

LOS ANGELES — Shelly Siegel, vice president and general manager of Mushroom Records, died Jan. 17 at L.A. New Hospital. Siegel was 32.

The cause of death was a rupture of a blood vessel in the brain, according to attending physician, Dr. Arthur Waltuch. The conditions for the rupture had been present since birth.

Memorial services for Siegel were held Jan. 21 at Mt. Sinai in Hollywood. Pall bearers were Rick Block, Bob Burch, Marc Gillitin, Lenny Beer, Liam Mullan and Mark Cope. Reportedly, a memorial fund will be established.

Members of Siegel's family are receiving friends wishing to express their condolences on Jan. 22-23 at 1930 S. Glendon, apt. 101, West L.A.

"The untimely passing of Shelly is a major loss to this industry and Mushroom Records," said label president Wink Vogel. "We have all lost a genius of a man and our best friend. He can never be replaced but his unique contributions to our company will stand as both a monument and our challenge to carry out all of his dreams and plans. We will have to strive all the harder to build this company to the highest brink of success. We dedicate ourselves to that purpose."

"My grief is total, all-consuming," said Susie Gershon, assistant to Siegel and director of artist relations. "Shelly significantly touched everyone he came in contact with. His loss is impossible to comprehend."





As vice president of Mushroom, Siegel was responsible for the signing and development of a number of successful

recording artists including Heart, Chilliwack, Paul Horn, Doucette and Ian Matthews

Siegel began his career nearly 11 years ago working in promotion at CBS Records in Toronto, Canada. Subsequently, he served in various capacities with the Kelly Retail Record Chain in Vancouver, B.C. He later returned to Toronto to become music director of a local radio station.

High Court Hears CBS vs Perf. Soc.

WASHINGTON, D.C. — The eight-year-old suit over blanket licensing for television networks by ASCAP and BMI culminated in 90 minutes of argument before the Supreme Court on Jan. 15. It will be several weeks before the high court issues a decision.

The case, which ultimately could affect the world's music performers and copyright owners who are accustomed to dealing under the traditionally accepted blanket licenses, has a long history.

In 1970, CBS sued the performing rights societies on grounds of price fixing; it lost the case in a 1975 New York Federal District Court decision. The district court held that blanket licensing is not *per se* a form of price fixing in violation of antitrust laws. The court also found that as long as composers and publishers are free to negotiate a peruse contract on their own there is no price fixing by ASCAP or BMI.

But in 1977, U.S. Appeals Court overturned the lower court's ruling, siding with CBS, saying the licensers had to offer the network optional per-use licenses along with blanket licenses.

Last fall the Supreme Court accepted ASCAP and BMI's petition for review and last week heard oral arguments from representatives of ASCAP, BMI, the Justice Department (emphasizing the benefits of blanket licenses) and CBS — a total of 45 minutes for each side.


street," he said. "Excitement is real important to me. I expect to generate it from the top and have it carry right on through. I think we have to turn on our distribution organization, let them know we're really serious about a record and get their attention so it gets out and it sells and makes all the moves a record has to make to be successful."

At the same time, Sherwood emphasized the fact that he is taking over a wellestablished company with a proven track record, "There are certain companies in this industry that are in some difficulty," he commented, "but this is a very healthy company. I have no preconceived notions about people who will not stay there, because the company's functioning. Whether it's as hot as the company would like it to be, I think, is open to some question. Certainly there could be more records on the charts. I can't tell you what the product flow is going to be over a period of time. But my first thought is that the whole company is going to be based on music. I want this to be the most musical company in the industry. And that's up to the people who are there and any we acquire along the way.

Sherwood added that he is not planning a personnel shakeup at Phonogram/Mercury. "As far as I'm concerned, the staff that's there and I are going to grow together. Any changes in that philosophy will probably take a while to hit the surface. But I'm not coming in with any feeling except. 'Here we are, and let's go farther.' "

Distribution Muscle

A very important factor in Phonogram's ability to attract both established acts and new, promising talent, Sherwood stressed, is the power of Polygram Distribution. As shown by the unprecedented sales of RSO's "Saturday Night Fever" and "Grease" albums, Polygram has proven that it can sell as many units of a given (continued on page 34)

He has also served as regional promotion marketing manager, northeast region, for CBS Records.

Hathaway's Death Termed Suicide

NEW YORK — Donny Hathaway, the 33-year-old Atco recording artist, died Saturday, Jan. 13 after he fell from the 15th floor of his Essex House hotel room on Central Park South. According to a police spokesman from Manhattan's Midtown North precinct, the death has been determined a suicide.

Hathaway's most recent hit was a 1978 duet recording of "The Closer I Get To You" with Roberta Flack, which has been nominated for a Grammy Award. In 1972, Hathaway received a Grammy for his collaboration with Flack on the album, "Roberta Flack And Donny Hathaway."

Hathaway recorded five albums for Atco, two of which, "Donny Hathaway Live" and "Roberta Flack And Donny Hathaway," were certified gold by the RIAA. Hathaway also scored, conducted and composed the soundtrack for the film, "Come Back Charleston Blue," and worked prolifically as a producer and arranger with such artists as Curtis Mayfield, Jerry Butler, Aretha Franklin and the Staple Singers.



CBS Organizes Havana Festival, Set For March

NEW YORK — A Cuban-American music festival will be held in Havana in early March. The three-day festival is the first undertaking of its kind in over 20 years. The festival will consist of three three-hour concerts, scheduled for March 2,3, and 4 at the 4800-seat Karl Marx Theatre. The concert will be headlined by American artists Billy Joel, Weather Report, the Fania All-Stars, and the CBS Jazz All-Stars. Cuban artists performing will be Irakere, which made its American debut at the last Newport Jazz Festival, the Orchestra Aragon, Los Papinos, Ballet Folklorica, and guitarist Leo Brower.

The concerts will be recorded by CBS Records, which arranged for Irakere to come to the U.S. to record and perform, and which initiated exploration of the Cuban music scene with several trips to Havana last year.



The Pointer Sisters, famous for reviving the nostalgic tunes of the '30s and '40s and for wearing funky, thrift store threads, have changed their old ways. The girls have a new label, Elektra/Asylum's Planet Records, a new album, "Energy," and a new hit single in Bruce Springsteen's "Fire."

The sisters grew up singing gospel in the choir of the West Oakland Church of God, Europe. The sisters released six albums for ABC between 1973 and 1977, two of which, "The Pointer Sisters" and "That's A Plenty" went gold. For "Fairy Tale," a country hit, the girls received a Grammy Award in 1975.

Anita, June and Ruth (Bonnie is now pursuing a solo career) have thrown over their Andrews Sisters style for the classics of contemporary rock. "Energy" features the trio singing songs by Steely Dan, Stephen Stills. Loggins and Messina and Sly Stone. The girls' intricate harmony work and smooth vocal style is, as always, evident, but as Anita Pointer says, "This is the first time we've really been able to express our musical tastes and feelings on an album."

Currently "Fire" is #10 bullet on the Cash Box Top 100 Singles chart, while "Energy" is #63 bullet on the album chart.

NEW FACES TO WATCH



Marshall Hain

"Dancing in the City," Marshall Hain's debut single on Capitol/Harvest is the kind of song - like "Kiss You All Over" and "I Love the Night Life" - which embodies the romance of rock and roll. The record's appeal is enhanced by the virtuosic yet economic style of keyboardist Julian Marshall and the elegant, soulful vocals of Kit Hain (who is reminiscent of Christine McVie.) Their forthcoming album, due out at the end of this month encompasses an appealingly broad range of stylistic elements.

This diversity is due in no small part to the complementary contributions of Hain and Marshall. Although they knew each other in school, by the time they started collaborating musically, Marshall was playing keyboards with jazz-rock groups while Hain was working as a waitress by day and singing in wine bars by night. Marshall needed someone to put lyrics to his growing collection of songs, and Hain fit the bill. After auditioning a demo tape, they signed with EMI Records in 1977 and have continued their ascent to stardom ever

"It's strange that the record is just beginning to take off now," says Hain. "The album is already nine months old, and the band has progressed way beyond

For Hain, musical progression has been a parallel to her entire life. The daughter of an opera singer, she learned piano as a child. As a pre-teenager she joined her first rock band, playing bass, and at 17 she began writing her own songs. She also fooled around with the guitar, but "I didn't really take it seriously until a few years ago." She spent several years studying psychology at the University of Durham and, after completing her studies, returned to London, where she worked at a series of odd jobs. "I thought to myself, 'I'm not going to get anywhere like this, it's now or never,' I started taking my songs to a publisher, who liked them. Then, when I met up with Julian, and we began to pool our resources, the publisher was impressed enough to have us go into the studio to record a demo. We took the demo around ourselves, and Mark Rye, who was A&R at EMI, liked it. We went back into the studio again and made the tape that got us a contract." Rye, incidentally, has since gone on to become the group's manager

Despite the success of "Dancing," life has not been the proverbial bowl of cherries for the band. After the group returned from their first tour at the end of 1978, Marshall left the band, "Franksays Hain, "Julian freaked out when 'Dancing' became a hit. He's really into a Keith Jarrett thing on the keyboards, and when he came back from our first tour, he decided being on the road with a band was not what he wanted to do. Fortunately, the group was able to find a replacement almost immediately. John Cook is an experienced keyboardist whose background includes stints with Stretch, Slack Alley, and Mungo Jerry.



Patrice Rushen

Patrice Rushen was 3 years-old when she knew what she wanted to be in life. Her parents had enrolled her in a "eurhythmics" class at USC, a class in which music is taught through emotions - instead of major and minor. there were happy and sad chords. The musician's emotions led her to play classical piano recitals at age six, study jazz improvisation at 15 and record her first solo album, "Prelusion," by the time she was 19.

Now, at the ripe old age of 24, she has released her fourth album on a new label, Elektra/Asylum. The album, simply entitled "Patrice," is an escape from her earlier jazz outings and has a more pop/commercial sound. The record, besides showcasing her singing talents, also features her arranging, producing and lyric writing skills.

Preferring to call herself a music person. Rushen is very quick to explain her change in style. "The new album allows people to see more of the total Patrice," she proclaims. The "Total Patrice" stands barely five feet tall, but her credits as a musician are towering. She is already recognized as one of the great ladies of jazz, having lent her keyboard talents to accompany the likes of Stanley Turrentine, Lee Ritenour, Jean-Luc Ponty, Sonny Rollins and Flora Purim.

Although her influences range from Debussy to Hancock, the new album combines elements of light jazz, funk and pop. "Patrice" now appears simultaneously on Cash Box Jazz and Black Contemporary charts.

Bored by the piano, after seven years of practice, the 12 year-old prodigy decided to take up the flute. She brought that instrument to the jazz lab band at Locke High School in Los Angeles. It was there that she met Reggie Andrews and got involved with his Msingi Workshop. (Msingi means "root" in Swahili.) Andrews, who put Rushen back in touch with the piano, has been a tremendous influence on her career, she says. Along with Charles Mims Jr., he helped produce the "Patrice" album.

According to Rushen, the new album is the first time she has had the time and the budget to express herself artistically, and at the same time be commercially successful. "On my earlier albums, I worried about my playing, but on this one I concentrated on the music as a whole concept," she says.

Rushen recently recorded with Hubert Laws and John McLaughlin. However, her greatest honor came this year when one of her biggest idols, Herbie Hancock, asked her to join his touring band. "I would have happily done it last year, but now I have to concentrate on my own direction," she says.

Concerned over her new musical direction and the public acceptance of it, Rushen adds, "Musicians are people too and the public should respect their ability to be creative in other areas of music. If people will accept this change, then you won't have frustrated artists and musical stagnation.

Bee Gees Favorites In Awards Show

LOS ANGELES — The Bee Gees were named best pop group and Donna Summer garnered the award for favorite female vocalist in the newly added "Disco" category, to highlight the sixth annual 'American Music Awards" show.

Barry Manilow and Linda Ronstadt repeated as favorite male and female vocalist in pop, as they did in 1978. The event was broadcast live Jan. 12 from the Santa Monica Civic Auditorium on national television.

The award winners were selected by a national sampling of 30,000 record purchasers, conducted by the Herbert Altman Communications Research firm. Nominees were compiled from the yearend sales charts of the music industry trade publications.

A distinguished merit award, voted by a select committee, was given to Perry Como, in recognition of his longstanding contributions to musical entertainment. Previous winners of this award include: Bing Crosby, Berry Gordy Jr., Irving Berlin, Johnny Cash and Ella Fitzgerald.





ASCAP Sues Over Non-Payment For Use Of Multi-Speakers

NEW YORK — ASCAP has brought separate lawsuits in three federal courts against locations suspected of using multiple speaker radio systems.

Infringement Suit

One of the suits, instituted under the new Copyright Act, was brought against two Gap Inc. clothing stores in Manhattan. The California-based chain, which operates 286 clothing stores in 34 states across the country, is charged with the infringement of six songs. Another suit was filed in Chicago against Cal's Inc., which operates three restaurants called Cal's Roast Beef and Cal's Corn Fed Beef in the Chicago suburbs of Alsip, Waukegan, and Wauconda. Cal's is charged with the infringement of 12 songs. A third suit was brought in the federal court for the district of Maine against Kevin Inc. and its president, Kevin Adams, for the alleged infringement of eight songs. The company operates a store called the Kittery Trading Post in Kittery, Maine.

ASCAP has asked that the defendants pay statutory damages of at least \$250 per infringement, in addition to costs and attorney's fees. Currently, locations are asked to pay \$90 for the first three speakers and \$18 for each additional speaker, up to a maximum of \$780 per year

E/A Pushes 'American Prayer' LP With Radio, Retail Promo

LOS ANGELES — With the release of Jim Morrison and the Doors' "An American Prayer" album last November, Elektra/Asylum has attempted to re-focus perceptions of Morrison as a premier rock poet of the 1960s. Supporting this campaign, Elektra utilized in-store posters and a unique series of radio-sponsored playback sessions in 11 major markets. As a result, the album which is stickered as a "collector's item" is now enjoying broad retail response.

E/A and WEA kicked off the campaign with a 10% discount on the entire Doors catalog in December. This program followed some initial internal promotion within WEA in which regional sales managers held playback sessions for branch personnel to acquaint them with the unique album prior to the LP's Nov. 21 release.

The birth of the poetry project was a labor of love undertaken by six close Morrison associates. Robby Kreiger, Ray Manzarek and John Densmore of the Doors were joined by film maker Frank Lisciandro, engineer John Haney and Corky Courson, who controlled the Morrison estate, to bring the project from its inception two and a half years ago to the LP's release.

In 1971, Morrison and the Doors were in the studio working on the "L.A. Woman" recording sessions. Intermittently, Morrison went in alone with engineer Haney and recorded his poetry. Months later in Paris, Morrison was dead at 27, the victim of an apparent heart attack. Knowing Morrison's desire to be recognized as a poet, the Doors worked with the tapes from the 1971 sessions and wrote new musical accompaniments. As a result, the project shed new light on the poet behind the rock and roll legend.

Frank Language Problem

Due to the frank language contained in the LP, Elektra/Asylum devised the playback sessions concept in which participating stations held ticket give-aways to attend listening parties in local recording studios. For its 100 seats, WNEW in New

York received 7,000 postcards in the first week of airing the ticket give-away. KMET in L.A. received 4,000 cards to attend the listening session at S.I.R. soundstage. Other participating stations were WCCC, WBCN, WIOQ, DC 101, WXRT, WBUF, WABX, KLOL and KSAN.

To circumvent the four letter word stigma, Elektra/Asylum edited the album for radio. Included on the commercial version are tracks of the Doors live in concert. "Roadhouse Blues," in particular, has received considerable radio attention. The track is expected to be released as a single Jan. 23. A gate-fold single will also be released shortly in England.

The press response to the album has become another important aspect of the E/A campaign. In addition to receiving favorable reviews, E/A ran a national print campaign and a blanket of national radio spots, concentrated in six breakout markets, to announce the arrival of the LP.

To bolster international appreciation of the project, the three members of the Doors went on a promotional tour of England in November. In addition, sensing the relevance of the LP to college radio, playbacks were held at three college radio conferences. Another avenue of exposure is planned for late February or early March when Jim Ladd conducts a four-part series on the Doors for his "Innerview" syndicated radio program. The efforts to promote "An American Prayer" are expected to benefit the entire Doors' catalog which already sells one million units a year, according to Stan Marshall, vice president of sales for the label. Despite the "collector" sticker, E/A is hoping to introduce Jim Morrison and the Doors to new pop buyers.

"We want to reach the guy who has never heard of the Doors before," says Bill Siddons of Siddons Assoc., who was retained by E/A to assist marketing efforts. Siddons was hired by the Doors in 1968 as their manager and he considers the project a coming together of old friends.

NEW YORK — RCA Corp. posted its best results in the company's six-decade history during 1978. Net income rose 13% to \$278.4 million from \$247 million in 1977, while sales increased 12% to \$6.65 billion from \$5.92 billion in the previous year.

Net income for the three months ended Dec. 31, 1978, rose to \$75.2 million from \$65.5 million in 1977. Sales for the fourth quarter reached \$1.85 billion, compared to \$1.66 billion the year before.

RCA Records played a major role in the good performance of the company's Consumer Electronics Products and Services division, which was also aided by RCA's SelectaVision home video cassette recorder.



POINTS WEST - THAT'S THE WAY IT WAS 20th Century-Fox for ABC-TV, is an outstanding capsulization of rock 'n' roll's colorful history. The nearly two-hour long film spans all the way from pre-rock figures who nonetheless influenced its development (such as the great footage of Hank Williams doing "Hey Good Lookin'") right up to the most current forces in popular music, both disco (represented with shots of Donna Summer), new wave (with an Elvis Costello segment) and straight rock 'n' roll as represented by the clip of Bruce Springsteen & the E Street Band from their summer 1978 tour. Considering many recordings of early television shows have been destroyed, it is remarkable that the producers were able to come up with as many performances of the early rockers as they did. The show, understandably, devotes generous space to The King of Rock 'N' Roll, Elvis Presley, from the familiar Ed Sullivan and "Jailhouse Rock" scenes, to rare footage of Presley in concert shortly after signing with RCA. Another moment that was a personal favorite was a segment showing Steve Allen, on his old show, reading the lyrics to Gene Vincent's "Be Bop A Lula," which segued neatly into a clip of Vincent and the Blue Caps performing the song. "Heroes of Rock 'n' Roll" also gives a comprehensive look at the parallel development of R&B, from Frankie Lyman & the Teenagers to Little Richard to James Brown to The Temptations to Otis Redding to Aretha Franklin to Donna Summer (although the abscence of Sam Cooke was felt). It's a show that absolutely should not be missed when it airs in February.

SPEAKING OF ROCK 'N' ROLL GREATS — Jerry Lee Lewis, who provides another highlight in "Heroes of Rock & Roll," has been in Los Angeles recently recording his first album for Elektra/Asylum since signing with the label last summer. This is the first in a long time that he's done outside of Nashville and he is also working with a new producer, Bones Howe. The session lasted only four days. Howe said, "We started at 11



The indies also said they harbor no ill feelings for A&M chairman Jerry Moss or vice chairman Herb Alpert, and that they understand their reasoning for joining RCA Records' branch distribution network.

"Jerry and Herb decided they wanted to be in the business of making records rather than in the business of distribution," commented one former independent distributor.

Predict Change

But while most said they will be able to handle the loss of A&M, some distributors feel a restructuring of the indie network and a change of attitude on the part of the remaining indie labels is the only way to ensure a secure future for independent distribution.

Many indies expressed the hope that labels such as Arista, Motown, Chrysalis, Fantasy and TK, among others, would choose to reduce the number of their independent distributors and give those they retain greater territory to handle.

This would most likely result in fewer indies overall, but the distributors said this would be the best way of strengthening the others enough to withstand any more losses. Even though many executives of the indie labels said they have no plans to change or go with one of the branch labels for distribution, rumors of departures of ABC. Motown and others have caused the indie distributors to feel the "superdistributor" is the wave of the future for

Dealing With G.M.?

"God help all of us if we only have to deal with General Motors, Ford and Chrysler," analogized one major retailer. "If it weren't for the indies, where would the Hearts and THP Orchestras, who started with indie labels and are now on majors, be?

"If there wasn't independent distribution, then young entrepreneurs like a promotion man and a trumpet player will have lost the best avenue to do their own thing. They'd have to go with the majors, and that's much more difficult." the retailer said

more difficult." the retailer said.

Since A&M had a branch operation on the west coast, the independent distributors hardest hit by the move are those in the south and midwest.

All-South

"It's a severe blow," says Warren Hildebrand, owner of All-South Distributing Corp. in New Orleans. "It's something that will take some adjusting and getting used to. But I don't know about it being a death blow. Things like this come in cycles, so I think 1979 is going to be a crucial year for us to see what happens."

Hildebrand said the exact percentage of business that A&M represented to All-South was not known, but the move to RCA would not hurt his firm as much as it might some other indie distributors because All-South handles every other independently distributed line.

"We don't plan any cutbacks in services or personnel, or anything like that," Hildebrand said. "I'm worried, not so much just about A&M, but about it snowballing to include other labels.

"It's frustrating," he said, "because it has nothing to do with efficiency or how we treated them. But a huge corporation like RCA has lots and lots of money to draw on and I guess it takes lots and lots of money to run an operation like A&M."

Even though he said other distributors will be hurt more than All-South by A&M's

departure from independent distribution, Hildebrand said, "Because of the independent network, what hurts somebody, hurts everybody."

'Devastating Blow'

Joe Simone, president of Progress Distributors, said, "It's a devastating blow because there are a lot of personal friends involved. It's like a death of somebody in the family.

"We've made the necessary adjustments to remain a profitable company, but we're obviously not going to be able to replace the volume that A&M represented to us," Simone said.

Simone added that A&M's joining RCA would affect only Progress' Cleveland branch. "Indies will have to regionalize their distributorship more in the future." Simone said. "because they won't have a choice." although the strength of such independently-distributed labels as Motown, Arista, Chrysalis and others will help ease the blow.

"I have no sour grapes about the move," Simone said. "We had seven outstanding years with the label,"

Pickwick 'Disappointed'

"We are obviously disappointed with their decision," said a spokesman for Pickwick International's distribution division. "Independent distributors, of course, work on a non-written basis, so labels are always free to do anything they want. But we would have preferred not to see them do it.

"We've had a 16-year relationship with A&M. They are good people and we think we are good people and I guess we'll all be in the industry together," the spokesman said.

Roshkind Reports 'State Of Motown' In Indie Address

LOS ANGELES — Following the defection of A&M Records from the ranks of the independently distributed major labels, Motown Records' Michael Roshkind, vice chairman and chief operating officer, has issued a statement strongly reaffirming the company's commitment to independent distribution and denying rumors that Motown is in financial trouble.

"We want to put to rest once and for all the repetitive but totally inaccurate rumors that we were either sold, on the verge of being sold, or that our product will henceforth be distributed by some other major corporation." Boshkind stated

corporation," Roshkind stated.

Roshkind reassured all Motown's independent distributors with a "State of Motown" message via telephone that also included a preview of the label's upcoming releases.

"While I'm certain A&M had good reasons for making the change," noted Roshkind, "Motown will remain steadfast and firmly dedicated to moving its records to the public through a group of the best independent distributors in the land.

"In Atlanta we were partners with A&M in distribution and with their withdrawal, we will announce our plans shortly."



Crocker Explains **New 'BLS Format**

NEW YORK — In the face of rumors that WBLS-FM will be switching to an all-disco format, new music director Frankie Crocker last week explained the format he will be implementing at the Inner City sta-

"I will be instituting the 'Frankie Crocker format'," said Crocker, "If I hear it and I like it, I'll play it on the air. I will, of course, be including some disco, because disco is what's happening, but I'll be playing other things as well."

Last week was Crocker's first week at WBLS in almost two years and he said he was very glad to be back. "I enjoy being on the air (Crocker is WBLS' new afternoon drive personality) and I don't find that it interferes with my programming duties.

Crocker also noted that he will be getting involved with the music programming on all of the stations owned by Inner City, and those currently being acquired. This includes WLIB/New York, WLBS/Detroit (formerly WBRB), KRE/Berkeley and KKTT-KUTE/Los Angeles, in addition to

CKLW Appeals Court Decision In ARB Case

DETROIT — CKLW/Windsor, Ont. has filed a notice of appeal in Federal District Court in Detroit appealing the Dec. 29 decision denying CKLW's request for a preliminary injunction that would have required Arbitron to continue to list CKLW as a "home" station in the Detroit market. CKLW has charged Arbitron with restraint of trade and with occupying a monopoly position in the radio audience measurement field, in violation of the Sherman Anti-Trust Act.

The Court held that CKLW had "failed in their burden of showing irreparable injury. Plaintiff's (CKLW's) main concern is the loss of advertising revenue. This is a type of injury that is adequately compensated by monetary damages.

The filing of the notice of appeal is the first step in the appeal process, which is expected to take months to resolve

"A&M was a significant part of our business in Michigan and northern Ohio, but we feel that we can afford the loss and stay in business," said Eugene Silverman.

He also said despite the loss of A&M's line, he is firmly committed to staying in the independent distribution business. "I've been in it for 16 years and hope to stay in it another 16 years," Silverman said.

"Indie distributors have taken blows like this in the past and have survived very well. At one time, Warner Bros., Elektra and Atlantic were indie labels and when they left they represented to indies probably what A&M represents today," he said. "Yet indie distributors were able to survive that.

Silverman said Music Trend has handled A&M since its inception, "starting when they only had about four or five records, so I kind of grew up with them. I have prospered very well through the product and efforts of A&M, Herb and Jerry, and when they leave here, I don't feel they owe me anything.

"I owe them the vote of gratitude for the opportunity that enabled me to distribute them for 16 years," Silverman commented. I understand why they had to make the decision they made. Historically, when a label reaches a certain size, the probability is that they will seek the shelter of branch distribution. Casablanca is a prime example. I wish A&M every success. It's not the end, but quite possibly the beginning of a rebuilding period for the independent distributor

"There are always new entrepreneur record producers who want the freedom and flexibility of indie distribution," Silverman said, "and those people could in fact become the Jerry Mosses of the future.

Two other major indie distributors, M.S. in Chicago and Alpha in New York, offered no comment on the move

Indie Reaction

Reaction to Roshkind's message from independent distributors was "vibrantly supportive," according to the label.

"Motown and Alpha are a good team and you don't break up a good team," said Harry Apostoleris of Alpha Distributors in New York. "We've been places in the past and we're going places in the future."

Chuck Smith, president of Pickwick International, said, "We'll stand shoulderto-shoulder and go ahead full steam. We're a great combo and I'm very, very happy we're going to stay that way.

Gordy's Involvement

Roshkind also denied reports that Motown founder and board chairman Berry Gordy is not involved in the company any longer

"Nothing could be further from the truth," indicated Roshkind. "He sets the tone, the philosophy of everything we do doesn't physically come to the office very often because that's his style. But wherever he is, that's where our headquarters are. To say Berry isn't working at Motown anymore simply because he isn't in the office is like saying President Carter isn't working when he's at Camp David.

Most of the remaining major independently-distributed labels surveyed said they were satisfied with the service they have from the indies and, for the most part, had no intention of changing in the near future.

"I don't see it having a major effect on us," said Elliot Goldman, executive vice president of Arista Records, "because the number of independent distributors we share with A&M is very small. I'd say it's only two or three that are involved.

"It doesn't effect our thinking about independent distribution because it's working very well for us. Our approach is basically the same as it's always been." Goldman said. "We have our own promotion staff and local marketing people and we work closely with our distributors."

He said in cases where distributors handled both A&M and Arista, it might be considered a "plus" because "they will have more time to work our product.

While he said "We are constantly reviewing our policy," he also said, "A&M's move has done nothing to make us want to change the way we are doing things."

Motown

Mike Lushka, senior vice president of marketing for Motown Records, said, "Independent distributors have been good to us (and) I think there will always be a need for them, especially for small labels who are just starting out."

He did suggest, however, that "indies may have to get into promotion and marketing, get more aggressive and return to breaking new artists like they used to" to help themselves compete with branch-

Fantasy

Fantasy Records won't feel any significant effect from A&M's move, according to Phil Jones, the label's vice president of marketing, "because A&M was only in three places we are in. Now it's up to indies to get off their butts and penetrate markets like they used to.

'The handwriting could be on the wall." Jones said. "It should be an interesting year. Fantasy hasn't talked to anybody about leaving independent distribution we'll stay where we are as long as it's profitable.

"We all get a little bit nervous when a company like A&M defects from the ranks. but there's still enough business left for them to make a go of it. It's scary," Jones said. "People stick with indies until someone offers them enough dollars to

"We are one of the few independentlydistributed labels with an extensive catalog so we're getting better treatment than we used to. But," he added. "it's clear that everything is moving away from the indies Only the indies themselves can turn things around.

NEW YORK - An audio-visual presentation entitled "Partnership Creates Opportunity" will be shown at the general business session of the 1979 NARM Convention. Major Chains Report Christmas Sales Gains

NEW YORK — The nation's major retailers posted strong sales gains for December, particularly the days closest to Christmas. K mart's volume rose 18% compared to the prior-year period; J.C. Penney's sales rose almost 12%; Montgomery Ward had an 8.8% gain; and Woolworth's sales rose 12% in the five-week December period. Sears, Roebuck & Co., the nation's largest retailer of general merchandise, posted a smaller decline than in recent months, 2.2%. The company said that December's sales were compared against exceptionally strong sales a year earlier, when volume rose 21% from that of the year-earlier period.

Other retailers reporting sales gains in December were: May Department Stores Co., 16%; Zayre Corp., 13%; Wal-Mart Stores, 26% (9% on a comparable-store basis); and City Products Corp., a unit of Household Finance Corp., 19%

At Portland Venue

NEW YORK -- Everybody's Record Co., the six-store record retail chain based in Portland, Oregon, has joined with Double Tee Promotions to promote a series of concerts at Portland's newly remodeled Euphoria Tavern. The series, titled "Everybody's Great Concerts," will begin with appearances by Columbia recording artists Jules and the Polar Bears, Tom Scott and Steve Kahn. It is the first such venture between a concert promoter and a retail chain in the Northwest market, according to Michael Reef, executive vice president of the chain.

"We're always looking for original ways to promote new artists," Reff said. He added that "offering the artists' albums at the concerts is the most direct way we know of enforcing our commitment to new music.

New Atlantic Product Shown In Eight Cities

NEW YORK — Atlantic Records launched its January release promotion campaign entitled "You've Never Been Hit So Hard, with a series of special product presentations in eight cities, including New York, Boston, Philadelphia, Atlanta, Cleveland, Chicago, Dallas, and Los Angeles January 8-12. The campaign was supported by heavy radio time buys and extensive print ads and a variety of merchandising material, with special artwork incorporating the "You've Never Been Hit So Hard" theme.

WAME Goes Contemporary Christian

NASHVILLE—Radio station WAME in Charlotte, N.C. switched to a contemporary Christian format Jan. 1, 1979. The former country radio station was purchased by the Jimmy Swaggart Evangelistic Association and Broadcasting Company, which owns eight radio stations across the country

Jeff Flanders, spokesman for the Swaggart Association, described the station's format as MOR Christian music. It will play no secular music, but neither will it play an overabundance of preaching programs. He said there will be no more than one 15-minute program in a given hour. The station will be geared primarily towards easy-listening Christian music. Flanders also said, rather than running an automated show, the station will have air personalities.

"People have noticed the change in the station." Flanders said. "Our phones have been ringing with people asking what's happened to the station and saying they

like it. Suprisingly we have held a lot of our audience."

Flanders added that the audience is not the only group favorably responding to the change. Businessmen are also commenting on it.

Overwhelming Response

"The response has been overwhelming," Flanders said. "Many of them say that they are going to be playing us in their businesses. I feel very optimistic that we can sell commercials like a secular station."

The radio station will be a non-profit organization. Any profits will go back into the Jimmy Swaggart Evangelistic Association.

Bob McGee of WPJS, Orangeburg, S.C. will be the station's new manager. He has 10 years of managing and sales experience.

DOTTIE RAMBO — Concert Of Love — Heartwarming R3533 — Producers: Jim Van Hook & Don Hart — List: 6.98

Dottie Rambo is becoming predictable. Every album she does has the same denominator — they are all great. Her boundless energy and enthusiasm for what she does is infectious. If the listener doesn't watch it, about halfway into the first cut on side one, "I Go To The Rock," Dottie will have those ears in the palm of her hand. Fans have come to expect excellence from Dottie, and if any gospel aficionados are out there who don't know Dottie's music. "Concert Of Love" will hook 'em.





LOUVIN BROTHERS — Songs That Tell A Story — Rounder 1030 — Producer: Charlie Louvin — List: 6.98

In 1954, the gospel act, the Louvin Brothers (Charlie & Ira), had a short-lived radio show. Of the 16 tapes, Charlie managed to salvage six. A quarter of a century later Rounder records shows its class by releasing "Songs That Tell A Story." This album explodes out of the past with an unadulterated, pervasive sensitivity and naturalness that has been crossed out by most modern recordings in the mad scramble to cross over. Louvin Brothers' music is experiencing a revival because of folks like Emmylou Harris (she recorded five Louvin Brothers songs), and this recording should greatly add to the ranks of their admirers.

VARIOUS ARTISTS — The Witness — Light LSX-5739 — Producers: Jimmy Owens & Bill Cole — List: 10.98

"The Witness" is the greatest story ever told, arranged in musical format by Jimmy Owens, who also co-authored and produced the two-record set with Carol Owens and Bill Cole, respectively. Barry McGuire is featured as Peter along with Anne Herring as the apostle's wife, and Jamie Owens-Collins as Mary. Other well known names in gospel music appear in substantial supporting roles. Among them are Steve and Tim Archer. Carol Owens & Matthew Ward who portray important Biblical characters. Contemporary gospel music grew out of a need to witness to a new generation and the Owens have fulfilled that need with dignity and reverence thereby creating a bridge instead of a gap.





ANDRUS, BLACKWOOD & CO. — Following You — Greentree 2R3515 — Producer: Phil Johnson — List: 10.98

"Following You" is a special two-record set featuring Sherman Andrus and Terry Blackwood & Co. (Karen Boegtlin, Bob Villareal — both vocalists — Rock Laughlin and Tim Marsh.) AB &C have succeeded where so many groups fail. They sound like they belong together. Producer Phil Johnson has capitalized on this asset and coupled their smooth harmonies with some of the best sidemen in Nashville and may have come up with the prototype (from a technical standpoint) album. When you have the kind of group that can make weak material strong (as in a few of the cuts) you're dealing with exceptional talent and "Following You" is an exceptional album.



instituted the changes. THE 12" CONTROVERSY — "The biggest issue for the disco retailer is the enormous problem of 12 inch singles that are not for sale and cannot be found on LPs," says Dale LaPedus of Music City in Atlanta, Ga., which reportedly stocks 3,000 12-inch titles and also features a dancefloor in the store. "I am considering approaching NARM (National Assn. of Recording Merchandisers) to investigate the possibility of suing labels for false advertising. People come into the store and want a record they heard at the disco. The charts say the record is out there and I have to say to the customer that the record he wants is not for sale. It's a total turn-off and if they buy the LP, they return it and want the disco version they heard." It is currently common practice by many record companies to release promo only 12 incher remixes of tracks on albums. In some cases, the single has been re-structured or altered to such extents that the LP version is pale by comparison. This has unsuspecting consumers angry with purchases and retailers upset at being trapped in the middle. "They have every right to be upset," says Craig Kostich, national promotion director of Warner/RFC. "That marketing tactic of spare the 12" and sell the album is misleading. We had a meeting about the problem and we're not going to be caught in that situation." Kostich cited Casablanca as a model example of how to handle a difficult situation. With the second pressing of the "Hunchback" album by Alec Constandinos, Casablanca included the special remixed 12" along with the regular record. Other albums have been updated to include the popular versions. However, disco retailers are boiling mad about the on-going

record as any organization in the business, said Sherwood.

An equally important factor in the bidding for superstar acts, of course, is the willingness to meet the offers of the competition. And here, Sherwood indicated, he is also counting on the backing of Polygram. "One thing I feel going into this job is that whatever it takes to do the job I'll have," he said. "And that obviously means money. I'm not going to be able to waltz into the door and say give me \$20 million for McCartney or \$20 million for Fleetwood Mac without having good reason for it and thought it out pretty carefully. But I do know that the company is going to pursue artists both major, already established superstars and just sounds that we're very enthusiastic about. Were I to try and sign six Fleetwood Macs in a row, it would probably be the banks that would be the first to hold up their hands. But I feel no discomfort in the fact that, if we're going to play like the big kids and have that kind of success, then we have to get in the arena and swing like

Not Just Money

Sherwood added that, although money is a crucial element in this game, it is not always the determining factor. "When you get up into the stratosphere. I don't know whether the millions start becoming meaningless. There are so many artists signed who say. 'It wasn't the money.' Well, I think that's true to a degree. If there's too much of a difference between offers, they're going to leave you for whoever's offering the most: but still I think every artist wants to know their music is appreciated and is being brought to the public the way they want it brought to the public. And if you come down to it, the three distribution networks (WEA. CBS and Polygram) will probably do the same, or very close to the

Asked how involved he will personally be in artist signings, Sherwood replied. "I don't know yet. I do think, however, that there are very few major signings that don't have some kind of involvement by the head of the label. So I'll get as involved as I have to in order to get the people we need... If I was dealing with somebody that I've had some success with before in a previous role, then obviously I'd get in there and try to close the deal. Because I just think that all artists — especially the major ones that are on the block — want to know from the head of the company that they're going to get a real

Last year's telethon raised \$8 million. A viewing audience of 50 to 55 million people is expected this year. The National Easter Seal Society for Crippled Children and Adults, now in its 60th year, has raised more than \$25 million since 1972 to help fund a nationwide network of rehabilitation centers, camps, transportation services, equipment loans, workshops and special education courses.

Executive producers of the telethon are Woody Fraser and Ken Greengrass.

During his 20-year career in the music industry, Don Kirshner has been involved in virtually every aspect of the business. He now heads his own record company in addition to his TV series, now in its seventh year. Klugman won two Emmy awards for "The Odd Couple" and now stars in NBC's "Quincy."

Traveling Executive

Part of this commitment on Sherwood's part will be maintaining contact with all the people who support each act on the label. And keeping in touch with them, as the new chief executive sees it, will involve almost constant travel. "You're going to find me away from the desk more than at the desk," he said. "I don't think a music company executive can be successful without traveling around and seeing artists, producers, managers, attorneys, promoters and all the key people."

While he wouldn't state that "Phonogram's artist roster is due for a trimming." Sherwood did point out that he will apply rigorous standards to his A&R decisions. "The biggest concern I have is growth, and growth takes on many guises. The simplest one is sales. If you picked up an act three years ago and they were selling 50.000 and they're at 300.000 now, that's good, positive growth. It's a reason to continue (with that act). I would think. If you picked up one that was (selling) 200,000, and it's gone to 150 or 100,000, then something's wrong."

At present, Phonogram is strong in black contemporary and country music, and Sherwood intends to build on those strengths. During his years as a promotion executive for Columbia Records, however, he was also heavily involved with rock 'n' roll, and he noted that Phonogram/Mercury will actively pursue rock acts if they believe they can be successful with them. One source of new rock talent for Phonogram, he indicated, might be the company's worldwide affiliates.

Sherwood is also keeping an open mind about disco, which, in his view, has been boosted by the increasing interest of the major labels in disco acts. "I don't know what the top is in disco," he remarked, "But it's certainly true that a company which is steeped in R&B has a greater chance of being successful with disco,"

In conclusion. Sherwood reaffirmed his interest in creating a powerful, yet personable organization. "I would love for Phonogram/Mercury to be seen as the embodiment of a company that has everything going for it in terms of distribution resources, and yet is personable enough and has enough music people so that it is the one place you would want to bring your music to, knowing that it will get the proper attention and care. If we could do that, it would be ideal."

Fan Fair Committee chairman Bud Wendell spoke about this year's 8th Annual Country Music Fan Fair, to be held June 4-10 in Nashville. It was decided that the \$30 registration fee that was charged participants last year would be maintained again this year. A Fan Fair softball committee was also formed to re-evaluate the rules and eligibility qualifications of the annual tournament. Schedules of record company shows, international shows and other events will continue with only minor changes for 1979.

International co-chairman Bruce Lundvall announced that there would be a meeting of CMA development committee chairmen on Jan, 20 in Cannes, France during MIDEM. The international committee also talked about plans for the International Show at Fan Fair. Announcements were made to the board regarding progress of country music in Australia and other coun-

Don Nelson reported on the activities of the promotion committee for chairman Joe Smith. The committee presented an idea for taking a country music show to New York, Detroit, Los Angeles and Chicago to promote country to advertisers and businesses. They also considered the possibility of a presentation at the NAB convention next year

Public Relations

Bob Austin reported on the public relations committee about various items, including the NAB convention and the possibility of a country act appearing there. Charlie Scully and Neil Rockoff of this committee will look into the idea.

A "blue ribbon" committee was appointed, made up of members from the public relations, promotion and radio committees, to study road shows and other areas.

Joe Talbot gave the convention study committee report, outlining some of the committee's ideas for the Country Music Convention in October.

The long-range committee, as reported by Joe Talbot, discussed CMA's participation in Musexpo, IMIC and other activities

CMA's budget for 1979 was approved. Plans were announced for other 1979 board meetings. The second quarterly board meeting will be held April 1-5 in Tucson at the Westward Look; the Four Seasons in Calgary, Alberta will be the site of the third quarterly board meeting, at which time the CMA's board members will be the guests of the Calgary Stampede. The fourth meeting is always held in Nashville during the convention.

a big sales month, our sales dropped because, according to our distributors, most stores were only interested in selling

super hits.

One of the problems that plague Foof, who is young, and whose records reflect an off-the-wall, rock & roll-inspired sensibility. is the lack of old-line distributors who are actually sympathetic to the music or who treat it as saleable. "Let's face it," says Foof, "distribution is not a young person's game. In an era where rock has been glamourized. distributing has not been the aspect of the music business that has attracted a lot of young blood."

Bruce Kaplan, who heads the Chicago-based Flying Fish Records, remarked, "It's not the most stable situation. Because the larger distributors carry dozens of labels, many of which are selling more records than you, you need at least one or two sympathetic people, and if the guy in sales who is sympathetic to you gets promoted out of the department, you're out of luck. Basically, to have any stature with a distributor who has dozens of other labels, you have to have the visibility of a steady release flow and a track record of albums that have sold, which makes the situation somewhat of a vicious cycle

New Generation

Bruce Iglauer, who owns the Chicagobased Alligator Records, and whose small catalog consists largely of urban blues artists is a bit more optimistic about the distribution situation. "There is a new generation of distributors, like Record People in New York and House Distributors in Kansas City, but there aren't enough of them. While they are an alternative to the old-line distributors who count on the volume of mega-hits, they themselves are stifled at the retail level by storeowners who are also looking for the super hits.

The problem of compensating for inadequate distribution is one that has been met in different ways. Flying Fish has enhanced its line by taking over the manufacturing of a local jazz label, Nessa. The operation of the Somerville, Mass.based Rounder Records is augmented by its own local distribution. Co-owner Marion. Leighton noted that "your own distribution is your best safeguard against certain pitfalls with other distributors. One is their fluctuating attitudes. They may only be interested because they lost UA last week, and if they pick up another line next week, their interest may fade. Another factor is their instability. A couple are in bad financial trouble, and in the past year a couple have folded. And finally, where we do our own distribution, we sell more records

band," said Iglauer, "and an American and European tour for him. But with tour support, we're admittedly spotty. We'll show up for a gig at New York's The Bottom Line, but we may not show at 'So's Your Mother' in Des Moines, Iowa.

"A lot of people who start small labels see them as extended hobbies," Iglauer added.
"They begin the labels as fans, then never make the appropriate transition to businessmen." Richard Foof concurs, "I have to take much of the blame for not breaking one of our records. ("Whole Lotta Love" by the Temple City Kazoo Orchestra). I wasn't prepared when it started to break in some areas. I couldn't afford promotion or advertising, and in a couple of instances, distributors worked out local campaigns on the record that I wasn't able to help coordinate.

Radio Tightening

While the relationship between small labels and distributors is not entirely bleak, many manufacturers regard radio as a lost "Since I began seven years ago," stated Iglauer, "radio has tightened up incredibly. Then there used to be four stations in Detroit that would play a Hound Dog Tayler album. Now there are none.' Foof noted, "It seems like even the college radio stations have tightened up. Half of the college DJs want to program either FM or AOR style, both of which excludes us.

Even when success comes, it can bring with it a whole new set of problems. For instance, Rounder Records has an artist, George Thorogood, whose latest album, "Move It On Over," is charting Top 100, a phenomenal achievement for a small, folkoriented label. "Our biggest problem," said Leighton, "is not getting caught up in the machinations of the music business. We're not about to undertake any massive publicity campaigns. We are being wary of distributors who only want to handle George's record and not the rest of the catalog, and we had to make sure that the promotion men we did take on were not regarded as hype-artists. Fortunately, we have a very good working relationship with George, who actually tells us to spend less on him. But there are independent labels who have a perennial problem with their biggest selling acts saying 'we need

Expanding Jazz Market

Irv Kratka, president of Music Minus One, has seen his jazz label, Inner City. grow along with the entire jazz market. When one of Kratka's distributors learned that Sun Ra, an Inner City recording artist, would be making an appearance on "Saturday Night Live." he proposed an advertising campaign and ordered a number of boxes of the record.

"As it turned out," said Kratka, "Sun Ra was put on for the last couple of minutes of the show, by which time most people had either tuned the show out or had fallen asleep. As a result, our campaign didn't do us much good.

Still, by the standards of many of the indies, an advertising campaign, even if unsuccessful, shows an unusual level of affluence. As Richard Foof pointed out, 'We're cautious. We won't make mistakes because we can't afford to. One promotional failure and we're broke

completely contemporary.

"I know of no other person that has enjoyed more consistency or is respected more by his peers. He has had many hits,

RAINCHECK — Louis Bellson Quintet — Concord 73 — Producer: Carl Jefferson — List: 7.98





Brookmeyer's playing is masterful and the album overall, despite its unwieldy length and unrefined nature, is a triumph

MISTRIAL — Randy Roos — Spoonfed — SFD 3304 Producers: John Manchester and Randy Roos — List: 7.98

If you're looking for some hot jazz guitar, pick up Randy Roos' first record, "Mistrial." Roos plays a range of guitars, six and 12string, electric and acoustic, guitorgan and fretless infinitesustain, and excels at each one. He leads his quintet through seven original numbers, including the restrained "Inward Stroke" and quite a few fiery instrumentals. As an added bonus, the LP is pressed on clear vinyl.

ANIMATION — Cedar Walton — Columbia JC 35572 Producers: George Butler and Cedar Walton — List: 7.98

Cedar Walton's new album is one of the brightest, most invigorating jazz LPs released recently. Walton is a top pianist, and his racehorse acoustic and electric piano is modified by outstanding tenor sax and percussion and punctuated by tasty trombones. Highlights include the title cut, a stirring jazz kaleidoscope, Stevie Wonder's "Another Star" and the "March Of The Fisherman.

Recently a Philadelphia citizens group opposed the sale on the grounds that the station was not initially offered to a potential black purchaser in the Philadelphia area. In its letter to the FCC, the NBMC supports the National Black Network as being a highly respected broadcast firm, which has no reason not to be responsive to the needs of the black population of Philadelphia.

The FCC recently conducted a field investigation of that station's activities, which may also serve as an obstacle in finalizing the sale, until complaints have been cleared.

He also said RCA will obviously have to expand its distribution and pressing facilities and hire additional personnel to handle A&M product. "We're hopeful that the people who are involved on the distribution side with us will go to new places in their organization," said Moss.

RCA was chosen, he said, because "they showed the most interest in us and I was impressed with (RCA president) Bob Summer." Moss estimated that together the two companies will account for billing in excess of \$300 million.

Moss said the independent distributors have assured him that the transition will be a smooth one. "In speaking with them, more than one said 'If it doesn't work out, we'll be here'," he said.

Founded In 1962

A&M was founded in 1962 by Moss, a former promotion man, and Alpert, who came to prominence in the early '60s as the leader of the Tijuana Brass. Early artists, in addition to Alpert and the Tijuana Brass, included Quincy Jones, Sergio Mendes, Burt Bacharach and The Carpenters

The label peaked in 1976 with the release of "Frampton Comes Alive," one of the biggest selling albums in the history of the record business. The A&M roster currently includes such artists as Chuck Mangione. Styx. Supertramp, LTD and The Brothers Johnson.

In addition to the A&M label, the company releases product on the Horizon label, whose roster includes the Mark-Almond Band, Dr. John, Neil Larson, David Grisman and Richard Evans.

A&M also has a publishing division. Almo/Irving Music, as well as foreign subsidiaries in Canada and England.

The A&M agreement is the second distribution deal firmed by RCA this month, and the sixth since Robert Summer assumed the presidency of the company last March. The labels, in addition to A&M, include 20th Century-Fox Records, Salsoul, Rocket, Roadshow and Hologram,

case's involved history before Chief Justice Warren Burger's court, noting that the total license fee for CBS represents well under 1% of the network's gross advertising receipts. (NBC and ABC pay roughly \$4 million a year, he said.)

The most unusual aspect of the case in district court, Topkis argued, was that 'CBS didn't claim the status of suffering victim, nor had it found that direct licensing wouldn't work." CBS' complaint, according to Topkis, was "all a product of conjecture.

The network has "unparalleled advantages in our society," Topkis said, in that CBS has the right to choose either perprogram or blanket licenses and to have court supervision in setting the rates. In a final statement, Topkis said, "it makes sense to negotiate rather than litigate we stand ready.

Amalya Kearse, representing BMI, addressed the question of whether a blanket license is per se a violation of antitrust laws. The Court of Appeals found that blanket licensing was per se illegal, but because of the advantages found it should not be enjoined. (The advantages, briefly, are price and convenience.) CBS is pressing its claim 'not on the basis of anything that's happened to CBS," she said, and indeed, artists "would line up at CBS' door if they were told direct licenses were available.

Kearse described the 3M incident in the mid-'60s, when 3M went directly to publishers and got licenses to use tapes of background music (27 out of 35 publishers okayed the contract.) And she outlined the Warner Bros. incident, in which broadcasters refused to deal directly with publishers and preferred to go through a licensing middleman. From these two incidents, Kearse concluded, "it's the user's choice.

From the Justice Department, Office of the Soliciter General, Frank Easterbrook outlined the government's view on per se rules and blanket licensing. The U.S. has not participated in the case up to this point, he noted, but has concern about price fix-

ing and monopoly.

The price ASCAP is charging is less than CBS would pay under direct licensing, Easterbrook noted. He defined ASCAP as a form of joint venture, not negative restraint of trade, and said ASCAP and BMI "have little in common with price fixing cartels. short, the blanket license offered to CBS produces economic benefits, in the view of the Justice Department.

CBS Charges

CBS counsel Alan Hruska characterized the current licensing methods as "an effective means of eliminating price competition," through what he called "a central instrumentality." He defended the Appeals Court ruling that found the system created

a disincentive to compete.

When Justice William Rehnquist asked, "What about two competitors who go into partnership?" Hruska responded that "in this instance we're talking about an entire industry . . . price fixing the most efficient

Justice John Paul Stevens pressed further on this point, asking, "Is it unlawful for two companies to use a common sales agent? Or only when an entire market is involved?" Hruska answered that in almost all circumstances it should be unlawful. without regard to the percentage of the market involved.

"Benefits (of a blanket license) like immediate access are not significant. Any cartel can create some benefits, but that doesn't justify price fixing," Hruska argued.

However, the justices disputed Hruska's analogy of the performing rights societies to an oil cartel.

If the blanket license ended, the licensers would be forced to create direct licensing mechanisms which would take "at least a year," Hruska noted. CBS has said in the past it envisions a total bypass of ASCAP and BMI and the creation of entirely new structures to handle the business





Juan Salazar debuts with this album for H&L Records, which is a throbbing mixture of Latin disco music. Most of the songs selected for this album are old standards. The orchestration is just right for disco dancers, and the musicians in this session are superb. The rhythm section is very tight. Best selections are: "Copacabana," "Hey Girl," "Come And Get It," "Love Is The Answer," "Feelings" and "Tico, Tico."

A SPEAR DE TODO — Vicente Fernandez — CBS-Mexico DCS-850 — Producer: Gilberto Parra

Multi-talented singer Vicente Fernandez scores again with another sparkling album that consists of a collection of rancheras and love songs. He has recently been acclaimed as the best ranchero singer in Mexico; and here, he demonstrates why, cut after cut. Likewise, the orchestra backing him in this album is superb. The songs are beautifully suited to his style, with excellent string arrangements. A masterpiece for Vicente.

A LA CARTE — Mongo Santamaria — Vaya JMVS-74 — Producers: Sheller & Allen

Last year's Latin Grammy winner Mongo Santamaria demonstrates his ability to excel in all phases of music. In this album Mongo is trying to make a crossover with "Hey, You Sexy Thing," and "It Feels So Good." The music in this LP is mostly jazz rock, the only Latin song is "Guajiro," a Marcellino Guerra composition. Arrangements by Marty Sheller and William Allen are excellent. The best songs are "Guajiro," "Teresa" and "Na

Those are among the earliest reactions to a new group, "La So," whose debut album is on MCA Records. The name LaSo is derived from La(tin) So(ul), but there are many diverse elements in their unique sound.

Joe Bataan, who produces the group and is also well known in Latin music as a vocalist, pianist, songwriter and leader of his own band, describes the LaSo mixture as "everything from early R&B from the Alan Freed days to the latest Latin dance rhythms.

One unlikely direction the band takes on several tracks is square dance music. LaSo has brought the hoe-down into the 20th century, making it totally up-to-date for today's dance audience.

Bataan, known as a "street singer," has been active on the music scene since he helped Fania Records "in the bugaloo days of the early '60s." His record "Gypsy Woman," sung in English, was one of the earliest Latin crossover hits, reaching into the pop and soul markets. Joe has performed everywhere from the Berkeley Jazz Festival to the 10th Youth World Festival in Moscow, which he attended with Angela Davis.

The LaSo album is the fulfillment of a concept Bataan had been developing for several years. He selected all the musicians and produced the album for Lorber-Sheer Productions. The LP was placed with MCA Records by Bob Schwid and Reggie Lavons. The music LaSo was arranged by Marty Scheller.

"When you're working on an album, it becomes a dream shared by many people, says Bataan. "The musicians and technicians and the executives who make the deals are all part of it. Then you reach the day when the album is released, and it's no longer just an idea shared by a few people. It belongs to the public. They can ignore it, or they can listen to it and enjoy it. I think they're going to enjoy the music of LaSo.'

Crusin/Rosen Productions, in collaboration with Arista Records, has just released the new solo debut LP by the talented Latina songstress **Angela Bongli** entitled, "Angie." Angela, a native New Yorker who has paid her dues on the N.Y. music scene for several years and who has shared the bill with such musical luminaries as Cannonball Adderley, Dizzy Gillespie and Stan Getz, most recently was the lead vocalist with the New York Dance Theatre of Harlem Chorus, for which she also composed and arranged. Many of you might remember her as the lead singer for Ricardo Marrero and The Group, and her hit single, "My Friend," which got her a Latin N.Y. nomination for best Latin Female Vocalist several years back. Her album cooks and such tunes as "Under The Moon and Over The Sky," "This Time I'll Be Sweeter," and "Rough Times" have already been met with enthusiastic response.

An ecstatically happy Jose Fajardo returned from Abidjan, Africa, where he did a week of personal appearances. Charanga has long been a big favorite. Survey Shows Opposition To Japanese Retail Price Maintenance System

TOKYO — The Fair Trade Committee of the Japanese government has disclosed the results of the survey it conducted regarding the effectiveness of the government's currently existing retail price maintenance system, which is a controversial problem facing the Japanese record industry. The committee surveyed a large number of record retailers and labels, asking members of these firms whether or not the retail price maintenance system is needed and to explain why

According to the survey, approximately 60% of industry figures polled indicated that the system was not benefitting the industry and therefore should be eliminated, but 40% reported that it was neces-

Lower Prices Seen

Record officials opposed to the system stated that if the system was abolished, record and tape prices would be lowered because the record retail market would become more competitive. In addition, better quality records in terms of technology and design would be available to consumers due to the free competition and greater profits which would exist if the system was

NAMA Files Brief **Opposing Vending Price Bargaining**

CHICAGO - The National Automatic Merchandising Association (NAMA) has filed a brief with the U.S. Supreme Court supporting an appeal by the Ford Motor Company in a dispute over whether labor unions have the right to bargain over prices charged in company cafeterias and vending machines.

The Supreme Court recently agreed to hear the appeal from a ruling in favor of the National Labor Relations Board and the United Automobile Workers Union Local 588, which had been issued previously by the U.S. Court of Appeals in the Seventh District (Chicago), said Richard W. Funk, NAMA counsel and director of government affairs.

In its "amicus curiae" (friend of the court) brief NAMA supports the Ford Motor Company position that prices charged to employees in vending machines and company cafeterias are not "a condition of employment" and therefore are not subject to mandatory collective bargaining. The NAMA brief cites the concern of its more than 2.300 members with the case under

Barry will be in London for the ATE show and, upon returning to the states, will plan for some service schools dealing with Playmatic's new microprocessor. The schedule is tentatively slated to begin in late February.

THE CLEVELAND COIN-COLUMBUS branch just wrapped up a pair of 2-day service schools on Automatic Products and Seeburg phonographs, respectively. In noting how well the new Seeburg "Disco 160" is selling, distrib's **Stanley Knoll** mentioned that Cleveland Coin is providing plenty of service back-up with frequent service schools, in the field, conducted by their own service technicians to help familiarize ops with Seeburg's sophisticated new system. As for pingames, two of the current biggies are "Phoenix" and "Pokerino" — both from Williams, the factory that's getting "hotter by the game," as Stan put it.

GAME PLAN's "Foxy Lady" is doing extremely well at Bilotta Dist., Newark. Pat Bilotta said it's a very high earning piece at three balls for a quarter in the posh bars and lounges. This cocktail table pingame is also making its mark in area Pizza Huts, he added, and in numerous video game locations which had not previously accepted pinball machines but welcomed the "Foxy Lady."

CALIFORNIA CLIPPINGS

With the annual ATE Show in London just around the corner, a number of west coast manufacturers were understandably nervous last week amid reports of crippling transit strikes in England. And Exidy marketing director **Lila Zinter** was doubly nervous because she has to catch a connecting flight in Chicago, whose O'Hare airport has been closed with alarming frequency lately due to heavy blizzard conditions in the Windy City. She was optimistic, however, and said that she expects overseas operators to respond well to "Star Fire" and "Ripcord." When asked if the harsh weather conditions in the midwest had had any adverse effect on business, she replied, "The areas hardest hit by the storms seem to be screaming loudest for games."

AT MEADOWS GAMES, president Paul Jacobs said the transit strike in England would take its toll on new games, as opposed to current production models which are already in the showrooms of many European distributors. "The strikes will definitely have an effect on how much new equipment is there," he said. "We may end up with sparse displays in some booths." Following ATE, Jacobs will be contacting customers in France and Italy before returning to the States.

MEANWHILE, AT CIRCLE INTERNATIONAL distribs in Los Angeles, general manager **John Scavarda** noted that business has been holding steady since the beginning of the new year. Among the hottest sellers, according to Scavarda, is Williams "Phoenix" pinball. He also said he is looking forward to receiving Williams "Flash," currently causing quite a stir among ops in prototype form. "The operators have been asking for 'Flash; because it has turned in fantastic results on test," he said, adding that the machine may be out sometime in the spring.

7th Annual AMOA-Notre Dame Seminar Set For March

BUSTIN' OUT OF L SEVEN — Rick James — Gordy/Motown G7-984R1 — Producers: Rick James and Art Stewart — List: 7-98

On the heels of his platinum-selling debut album last year, Rick James has returned with a rapid-fire, piercing R&B/disco effort on "Bustin' Out." James, who plays guitar, sings, composes and co-produces on this LP, has developed into a very assured, confident artist who unleashes a crunching, furiouspaced workout on the album's several dance numbers. However, James is not limited to performing raucous upbeat songs, as witnessed by his aching, synthesizer-laden ballad, "Spacey Love."

NATURAL ACT — Kris Kristofferson & Rita Coolidge — A&M SP-4690 — Producer: David Anderie — List: 7.98

The latest duet album by this husband & wife team is a varied, engaging package of tender ballads, pleasant medium-tempo tunes and brisk rock numbers. The twosome have become adept at harmonizing together, so most of the songs here work well and provide enjoyable pop/MOR listening. One of the keys to this LP's success is the good choice of material, featuring compositions by Billy Swan, Stephen Bruton, Kristofferson and others.

BREATHLESS — Camei — Arista AB 4206 — Producers: Camei and Mick Glossop — List: 7.98

"Breathless" is an album of such beauty and vision that it's almost aurally tangible when it cascades out of the speakers. Cut for cut, Camel offers an unflinchingly smooth musical majesty which is heads and shoulders above any number of other bands meandering around the nebulous world of progressive-rock. Hats off to the group members for delivering an uncompromisingly polished gem of an album which could emerge as an AOR fave for several months to come.

NOTHING IS SACRED — The Godz — Casablanca NBLP 7134 — Producer: Eric Moore — List: 7.98

On its second album, The Godz has concocted a potent collection of storm-trooping rock 'n' roll that should appeal not only to teenyboppers but to hard-rock fans in general. The Godz employs a typical assortment of guitar-rock licks, but what makes this LP special is that the quartet injects its own colorful personality into the material. Standout cuts include "Gotta Muv," "Rock Yer Sox Auf" and "He's A Fool." For AOR formats.

ALL MOD CONS — The Jam — Polydor PD-1-6188 — Producer: Vic Coppersmith-Heaven — List: 7.98

Although the Jam is one of the top selling and most respected rock bands in England, the trio has yet to break through in America. However, this should change with "All Mod Cons," the Jam's most innovative and compelling effort to date. The group has considerably refined its hard-rock formula on the album, adding sophisticated instrumental and vocal textures while still retaining its kinetic rock 'n' roll style. The LP's best song is "Down In The Tube Station At Midnight," a bonafide classic.

CATCH ONE — Tony Wilson — Bearsville BRK 6985 — Producers: Ron Albert and Howard Albert — List: 7.98

After a successful stint as a key member of Hot Chocolate, British-based artist Tony Wilson is launching a solo career on Bearsville. Already a hit album in Europe, "Catch One" invitingly blends together traces of American pop, disco and British-style rock for a delightful formula. Wilson possesses a catchy, distinctive voice, and he is backed here by several top studio musicians. Top cuts include the single "Try Love," plus "Africa" and "New Orleans Music."

BILLY BURNETTE — Polydor PD-1-6187 — Producer: Chips Moman — List: 7.98

The son of famed rockabilly artist Johnny Burnette, Billy Burnette on his debut album has emerged with a country-rock effort that displays his southern rock 'n' roll roots. Burnette, who wrote or co-wrote the material here, is clearly influenced by the country works of Eric Clapton and Bob Dylan, plus the pop-rock harmonies of Fleetwood Mac. Featuring the backup support of several top southern musicians, this LP includes the upbeat single. "Shoo-Be-Doo."

BALLROOM STREETS — Melanie — Tomato TOM-2-9003 — Producer: Peter Schekeryk — List: 9.98


This two-record set marks Melanie's debut on Tomato Records. "Ballroom Streets" is an elaborate, beautifully packaged album which not only introduces several new Melanie compositions, but contains new renditions of "Brand New Key" and "Candles In The Rain." The LP was recorded live in the studio, using very few overdubs, so the entire set has a very spontaneous, spirited feel to it. Includes the single, "Running After Love."

THE INSIDE STORY — Robben Ford — Elektra 6E-169 — Producer: Steve Cropper — List: 7.98

Ford has played guitar beside Joni Mitchell and Tom Scott in a number of successful ensemble projects and is a respected mainstay in the L.A. session scene. And everybody knows who Steve Cropper is. Their combined efforts make this second solo album a very enjoyable offering of unencumbered fusion, blues and pop styles. A great multi-format record, "The Inside Story" both typifies and ennobles the L.A. sound.

MADAM BUTTERFLY — Tavares — Capitol SW-11874 — Producer: Bobby Martin — List: 7.98

With its eighth album, the five Tavares brothers continue to exhibit the versatile lead and harmony vocals, the crisp arrangements and strong selection of material that has made the group among the top in its R&B/disco/pop field. "Madam Butterfly" is equally divided between infectious dance numbers and tender ballads, and spotlights such first-rate tracks as the single "Never Had A Love Like This Before," "Straight From Your Heart" and the title cut.

MOMENT BY MOMENT — Original Soundtrack — RSO RS-1-3040 — Producer: Various — List: 7.98

Lee Holdridge's lyrical main theme is one of the better recommendations of RSO's latest film offering. This soundtrack album offers five versions of that theme, the finest being Yvonne Elliman's vocal treatment on the LP's single release, and John Klemmer's several sax solos. The remainder of this album is mostly MOR and includes tunes by Michael Franks, Dan Hill, Stephen Bishop and 10cc.

NO MEAN CITY — Nazareth — A&M SP 4751 — Producer: Manny Charlton — List: 7.98

This could probably be the first Nazareth album that incorporates texture and subtlety into the musical proceedings. The addition of erstwhile sensational Alex Harvey Band lead guitarist Zal Cleminson might have something to do with why the total sound and feel of "No Mean City" is less heavy-duty industrial strength rock and roll and even less uni-leveled metallic drone. A natch for AOR acceptance, with at least three possible singles lurking around to boot.

INSTANT FUNK — Salsoul SA 8513 — Producer: Bunny Sigler — List: 7.98

Instant Fünk is an energetic new disco/R&B configuration which ably executes tight, pulsing dance tracks and sparkling soul ballads. An invigorating cross between Brothers Johnsonstyle R&B/disco and Philadelphia soul, this album showcases the arresting lead vocals of James Carmichael and the jumping rhythms of bassist Raymond Earl and drummer Scotty Miller. Best cuts here are "Crying," "Never Let It Go Away" and "I'll Be Doggone."

HE WHO IS WITHOUT FUNK CAST THE FIRST STONE — Joe Tex — Dial/TK 6100 — Producer: Buddy Killen — List: 7.98

Dancin', stompin' Joe Tex is back with his typically charismatic collection of funky dancefloor gems. Throughout most of the album, Tex audaciously shouts and wails his way through such riotous upbeat tunes as "Loose Caboose" and "How Do You Spell Relief." But the singer/composer also demonstrates that he has a more passionate, intimate side, delivering a subtly-powerful performance on "If You Don't Want The Man." A consistently entertaining outing.

BIGHORN — Columbia JC 35618 — Producer: Martin Shaer — List: 7.98

The Northwest's growing reputation as an important music market is further enhanced by this Seattle quintet's debut album. Good piano chops, a great rock and roll lead vocalist, and inspired, if a little too pretentious, writing mark this balanced pop sound rock collection as a sure winner with teens weaned on Elton John or Styx. If this act delivers in concert as well as it does on this record, watch out.

MEDUSA — Columbia JC 35357 — Producers: Skip Drinkwater, John Lee and Gerry Brown — List: 7.98

Medusa is a unique eight-piece outfit which combines an interesting vocal-based, R&B-flavored style with the flamboyant guitar pyrotechnics of a Boston. Cheryl Alexander and Eric Tagg competently handle the group's vocal duties, but the most exciting aspect of the band is Medusa's fiery guitar work and the keyboard passages of James Batton. Suited to AOR formats, with possible R&B potential.

A LA CARTE — Triumvirat — Capitol ST-11862 — Producer: Jurgen Fritz — List: 7.98

Germany's Triumvirat has apparently abandoned its ELP-tainted concept album stance which garnered the band a considerable cult following with its "Spartacus" LP four years ago. In place of its erstwhile keyboard/drum/guitar bombast we now find the band leaning heavily into a slick pop-rock format liberally laced with full-bodied brass overdubs; the end result being instantly more accessible to a potential mass audience.

INTRODUCING DANNY JOHNSON — First American FA 7717 — Producer: Archie Russell — List: 7.98

Formerly a vocalist with the Chi-Lites, Danny Johnson's solo debut effort provides plenty of evidence that this singer is an expert at producing romantic, neoclassical soul recordings. Johnson predominantly utilizes his falsetto voice on the LP, sweetly and stirringly singing such numbers as "Taking My Love For Granted," "Dreamin' Again" and "I Might As Well Forget Loving You." For R&B and possibly disco airplay.

THE WHISKY, LOS ANGELES The Babys were the embodiment of the New Year's Eve spirit at the Whisky this year. There is a mood about a Babys performance that is particularly appropriate to that night; youthful, but very sophisticated, romantic, yet seductive and optimistic without seeming naive. The Babys are also proficient musicians and professional entertainers, though those qualities are understated to enhance their performance without dominating the show

But beyond all that, the Babys generate an excitement in a manner one might have thought was lost. (Return with us now to the thrilling days of yesteryear when small roving bands of elegant yet outrageouslydressed long-haired young men inspired the fantasies of millions.) The Babys are

Lead singer John Waite has been disencumbered of his bass and is now much freer as a front man. Guitarist Wally Stocker seems more relaxed and Ricky Phillips on bass is a handsome addition to the front line. Though drummer Tony Brock is seldom seen, his presence is always felt. Jonathan Cain gives nice interpretations of keyboard work created by his predecessor

The music is there. Without it, this band would never have gained their hard-won credibility. From the opening number, "Broken Heart," through the well-known singles, "If You've Got the Time" and "Isn't It Time," to new songs including "Everytime | Think of You," "Head First," and "Run to Mexico," the drums and bass are powerful, even heavy, the guitar is enticing, the keyboards are lovely and above it all soars John Waite's distinctive vocals. The Babys sound has become well-defined, but there's already a hint of new sounds to come with Jonathan Cain's "Stick to Your Guns. janet bridgers

om Waits Leon Redbone

HUNTINGTON HARTFORD THEATRE, HOLLYWOOD — Two of pop music's most unusual characters ended their recent tour with a three-night stand at Hollywood's Huntington Hartford Theatre, a venue primarily used for legitimate theatre or at least one-man (one-woman?) shows. But the booking wasn't that much of a stretch, because Tom Waits and Leon Redbone are

both highly theatrical performers.
In fact, calling Waits theatrical is like calling Rodney Dangerfield self-effacing. From the moment the curtain went up for his set, showing Waits under a thin beam of light wearing a dark suit, head down, the soul of desolution dragging on a cigarette, his song-poems about life's underbelly painted vivid images of a range of skid row denizens. His gravel-voiced crooning remained cool and captivating, whether Waits wrenched his vocals out alone at center stage or from a piano stage right.

It's easy to fall under the spell of Wait's woozy demeanor and dismiss his music as secondary to his persona. But the music is deceptively clever, sometimes winding bits of familiar tunes into his songs and always fitting Waits' lyrics like a glove. There were several high points in the set, especially when jazzy shadings were introduced, but the image of Waits gurgling a song between drags on his cigarette in front of such props

as a set of gas pumps and half a convertible will probably remain longest in the minds of Waits' fans

Leon Redbone is another unique character, always sitting in his frock coat, wearing a straw hat and a red carnation in his lapel Somewhat like Waits, he sings in a friendly growl of a voice, but his material is mostly oldies from the '20s and '30s.

Redbone opened his set alone on stage and was later joined by a tuba and a clarinet. But with or without accompaniment, he was always in complete control, warbling delightful ditties and playing with the audience. At one point he reversed the age-old problem of fans popping flash bulbs at performers and took his own shots at the audience

"Shine On Harvest Moon," with a tasty whistling lead-in, was Redbone's strongest number in a consistently rewarding set. Combined with Waits' excellent performance the whole show was easy to sum-- weird but wonderful. joey berlin

SHRINE AUDITORIUM, L.A. - Seeing Richard Pryor in person brings alive the hilarious experiences chronicled on his best selling albums. Though he uses no props, Pryor is able to take the simplest incident and make it come alive, giving one the feeling that he is in fact reliving the incident. He has mastered the art of choosing an incident that each person in the audience is able to relate to at some point in their lives. Be this incident some childhood antic, or an every day occurence like a funeral, Pryor will take every minute detail and hold it up to ridicule, forcing the audience to laugh at itself.

Pryor still relies on extensive utilization of profanity in his show, though he does seem to have slightly toned down his racial jokes. Taking a more humble attitude to his show as a whole, he mainly told jokes surrounding his past year of problems, and at one point stated, "I'm glad to see that anybody came to see me, as much trouble as I have been in lately.

Opener Patti LaBelle was in very good voice, though that particular venue did not do her talents justice. Her label seems to be doing an excellent job of easing her into a new image, from her dress to the type of songs she is singing. The change is subtle but definitely apparent.

She began by singing some of her LaBelle hits, backed by guitar and bass players who seemed to slip into that situation well. Patti's dress was elegant, with an avant-garde flair, but not nearly anything like her former LaBelle attire

THE PALOMINO, NORTH HOLLYWOOD It was United Artists night at the Palomino when Bill Medley and Dottie West recently headlined a show hosted by the label's top male artist, Kenny Rogers. Rogers only sang during two duets with West, but the quality of the show was top-notch nonetheless

Medley employed a charming, modest stage presence along with his deep and rich voice to entertain not only the overflow crowd at the Palomino, but also many other country fans tuned to KLAC, which broadcast the concert live. By mixing Righteous Brothers classics like "You've Lost That Lovin' Feeling" and "Soul And Inspiration" with traditional country material and pop covers, Medley displayed an impressive range and kept his set fast-paced.

HURRAH'S, NEW YORK - Hurrah's strengthened its reputation as one of New York's best new rock clubs by hosting the seminal British rock and R&B group, the Pirates, who in turn proved that they are hot on the comeback trail. The group, whose roots trace to the early '60s as backup group for the late British rock star, Johnny Kidd, reunited recently for a one-shot revival, but their intense, brand of power trio music has been received so well that they've chosen to keep going.

At Hurrah's, the group, composed of guitarist Mick Green, bassist/vocalist Johnny Spence, and drummer Frank Frawley, played a torrid set that drew substantially from their two Warner Brothers LPs, "Skull Wars" and "Out of Their Skulls." The set began with Chico Holiday's "Please Don't Touch (I Shake Too Much)" and ended with their reinterpretation of their original "Shakin' All c. er." In between they sandwiched a numbe of tunes from the repertoire of the legendary rockabilly group, the Johnny Burnette Trio. Combining the jagged rhythms of the Burnette group (their predecessors) with the amplified interaction of the Jeff Beck group (their successor), the trio produced hardrocking synthesis that portended this

group's sustained success.

THE ROXY, L.A. — Say goodbye to country girl Tanya Tucker. At the tender age of 20, Tanya has blossomed into one of the most exciting rock 'n' rollers around.

Sure the C&W influences are still there, but in her Roxy debut Tanya lived up to her new-found image as a rocking blonde bombshell. Backed by a seven-piece band that's as powerful as its name, TNT, Tanya conveyed a physical, vocal and musical excitement that had the overflow crowd in a near frenzy. She relied mostly on songs from her bulleting "TNT" album, but rewarded old fans with a healthy dose of her old

Wearing a skin-tight black sequined body suit and beige scarf, Tanya came out sizzling with "Lover Goodbye" followed by her current single "Not Fade Away." all eyes were riveted on Tanya's polished sensuality, Jerry Swallow's lead guitar and John Hobbs' boogie-woogie piano were subtly superb.

Tanya's impeccable taste in material and arrangement are another key ingredient in the show's success. She has been likened to a female Elvis Presley of late and she gave credence to the comparison on such Presley tunes as "Big Hunk O' Love" and "Heartbreak Hotel," perhaps her strongest number. John Prine's "Angel From Montgomery" and Chuck Berry's "Brown-Eyed Handsome Man" were also perfectly suited to Tanya's animated performance. But despite her captivating stage presence, Tanya never stifled the rich, explosive sound of TNT.

After proving her rock 'n' roll skills, Tanya belted out a medley of her early hits ("the reason I'm here tonight") including her first record from her days as a teenage country prodigy, "Delta Dawn." And to show she hasn't forgotten her roots, she closed her too-brief set with "Texas (When I Die)," complete with three Texas flag-wavers.
