
## **Educational Attainment**

In 2002, 40.8% of the population of Galway City aged 15 years plus had completed third level education, which compares favourably with the national figure of 26.0%. Inevitably, the proximity of two major third level educational institutions will have contributed strongly to this figure for Galway City. Given the acknowledged relationship between income potential and educational attainment, it is noteworthy that 11.6% of the city's population (aged 15 years and over) ceased education prior to or at 15 years of age, though this figure is lower than the national figure of 21.9%. However, the proportion of the population that ended formal education at or greater than 20 years is 34.8%, which is more than fourteen percentage points higher than the national figure. Similarly, this figure is significantly higher than the corresponding statistics for the West (20.0%), the BMW region (17.0%), and the South and East Region (21.7%).

Electoral divisions exhibiting the highest incidence of educational cessation at primary level include Shantalla (34.3%), Newcastle (28.1%), Mervue (26.3%), Ballybaan (22.3%) and Wellpark (21.6%). The age profile of these areas is a factor requiring consideration when analysing the significance of these findings relative to the total figure for Galway City of 13.5%. As expected, a strong correlation exists between the areas with the greatest concentration of population in the professional, managerial/technical occupational categories and the percentage of population completing third level education. As depicted in map no.18, 57.7% of the population of Knocknacarragh is educated to third level. Mirroring the social class profile, Barna (56.3%), Rockbarton (49.2%) and Salthill (49.7 %) also record a high percentage of their respective populations completing third level education. In contrast, despite the close proximity of Galway Mayo Institute of Technology (GMIT), only 19.8% of the population of Ballybaan have completed third level education, which is significantly lower than the figure for the city of 40.8%.




## **Primary Schools**

Over the period 2002-2003, 6,364 students from the city attended 27 primary schools located in Galway City. Briarhill National School is situated in the County Area and serves the Ballybrit Electoral Division. The student population comprises 48% girls and 52% boys. The greatest number of primary school children attend schools situated in the centre of the city, with lower student numbers in evidence in the outlying suburbs of the city. In particular, it is noteworthy that only 419 primary school pupils attended school in the Barna electoral Division, which serves a population of 10,822 with 2,668 aged 14 years and under. Similarly, analysis of map no. 19 illustrates gaps in primary school infrastructure in the east of the city, particularly given the growth projected for the Ardaun Corridor with only 159 children currently attending primary school in the Ballybaan electoral division.

Analysis of age profile vis à vis electoral divisions indicates that increased demand for primary school places will be concentrated mostly in the more suburban areas of the city, which contrasts with the current concentration of primary schools in the city centre. However, in recognition of this need, Galway City Development Plan 2005-2011 highlights that Galway City Council has designated three sites for schools, two for Barna/Knocknacarragh, with a further school proposed for Doughiska, which is located in Ballybaan electoral division.

## **Second Level Schools**

In 2002, second level schools in the city served a student population of 5,919. Of this total figure, 46% boys and 54% girls attended second level schools, differing from the pattern evident at primary level. Second level schools are predominantly located in the west of the city, with clustering clear along the Nun's Island, Taylor's Hill, Claddagh axis. Map no. 20 clearly illustrates an absence of second level schools in the outlying suburbs, with this factor and the clustering from Nun's Island having obvious implications for traffic congestion in the city.
