Bank Robbed

At San Marcos

Police Seek to Track Down Band of Heavily- Armed Thugs

SAN MARCOS, May 23. (AP)—South Texas officers today were trying to track down a band of heavily-armed robbers who escaped with \$7,040 in a daylight holdup of the First National Bank here.

After hastily collecting all the cash they could get their hands on, the robbers forced two bank employes and a customer into their car and sped out of town along the Austin highway.

At the Blanco River bridge, miles from San Marcos, they released their hostages, Fred [unclear] bookkeeper; Walter [unclear]

county treasurer and employe of the bank; and Payton Taylor, a customer in the bank at the time of the holdup, staged yesterday afternoon.

Kellerman said the three robbers in the getaway car, which bore no license plates, turned into the Driftwood road after leaving the Blanco River. It was considered likely it was headed in the general direction of San Antonio. Beside pistols, the robbers had a sub-machine gun and a sawed-off shotgun.

A. L. Blair, president of the bank, expressed the belief that a woman, who possibly acted as a look-out, and another man, who escaped in a second car, were involved in the robbery.

Blair said one of the robbers threatened to "blow his head off" if he didn't open the safe. He finally convinced the man that the time lock prevented his doing so. The robbers tried to abduct all the employes in the bank but couldn't load them in the car.

Miss Dora Brack, an employe, stumbled and fell before the robbers could get her to the car. Blair was ordered to stand on the running board but tumbled off as the car lurched ahead.

The robbers in their haste looked several thousand dollars hidden in a drawer under

ONE OF WOMEN WITH BARROWS BELIEVED DEAD

ONLY THREE INSTEAD OF FOUR SEEN IN ARMED AUTO

Des Moines, Iowa, July 21 (INS).—Two bandits and two women who engaged in a machine guns battle with officers at Platte City, Mo., yesterday, were being sought in Iowa today.

The men are wanted for the murder of two Joplin, Mo., officers. They are Clyde Champion Barrow, 23, and Ivan Barrow, 31.

It was believed here today that one of the women may have died of wounds received in the Missouri gun battle. The remains of bloody clothing and bandages were found near Mount Ayr, Iowa, where they had been partially burned.

Frank Marsh of Caledonia, near Mount Ayr, reported seeing two men and a "red-headed woman," whom he believed to be the fugitives. They were speeding northward in a small automobile.

The bandits were armed with a submachine gun, a repeating rifle and two revolvers when officers attempted to arrest them yesterday at a Platte City tourist camp. Three of the thirteen raiding officers suffered minor wounds in the gun battle in which the bandits and their women companions shot their way to freedom.

SUSPECT RELEASED TO FEDERAL OFFICERS

Fort Smith, Ark., Aug. 11 (AP).—Hubert Blythe, who has been held at Van Buren, Ark., since July 22 as a suspect in the slaying of Marshal Henry Humphrey of Alma, Ark., was released to federal authorities on a warrant charging robbery of an interstate railroad shipment near Muskogee, Okla.

Sheriff Albert Maxey of Van Buren, abandoned his attempt to link Blythe with the Barrow brothers, Clyde and Marvin, in the Arkansas case. He failed to obtain positive identification of Blythe as the man with Marvin Barrow when Humphrey was fatally wounded.

U. S. Marshal Cooper Hudspeth said he was informed that more than \$500 in clothing was removed from a Missouri-Kansas-Texas train near Muskogee by Blythe.

Blythe was first arrested near Seminole, Okla., soon after Marvin Barrow was wounded fatally in an Iowa gun fight.

One Believed Badly Wounded in Fight at Missouri Tourist Cabin.

PLATTE CITY, Mo., July 20 (UP).—deputies jammed and operated prop-

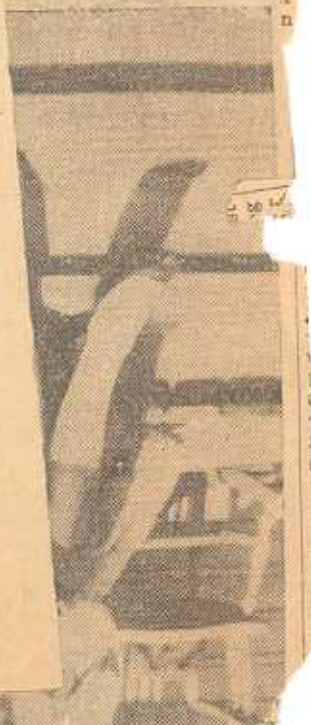

Buck and Wife Captured.
Dexter, Ia., July 24 (AP).—Marvin Ivy (Buck) Barrow and his wife, bandit suspects, were captured here today in a battle with state and county officers.

Barrow was critically wounded. He is not expected to live, a physician who treated him said.

Two men and a woman, believed to be Clyde Barrow, Bonnie Parker and Jack Shorman, escaped in a car stolen from Valley Fellers, a farmer.

Three squads of state and county officers surrounded the woods where the five suspects were hidden early this morning. As they closed in, the suspects began to fire with machine guns. The officers returned the fire, wounding Buck Barrow. "Rags" Riley, Polk county deputy sheriff, was wounded in the encounter.

Find Machine Guns.

Near Barrow and his wife, the officers found two machine guns and five revolvers.

The three who escaped abandoned their car at Park City, held up an oil station attendant and proceeded towards Des Moines, in the attendant's car. Somewhere en route they are believed to have left the woman.

The five had been hidden in the woods for five days. Suspicion was aroused when Ed Penn, farmer, found blood-stained bandages in the woods while he was hunting blackberries.

Workers in a restaurant became suspicious after one of the men for several days had purchased five dinners to take with him.

Officers were notified and the search which led to the shooting today was started.

WORLD PARLEY ACTIVITIES TO BE PROLONGED

STEERING COMMITTEE TO REMAIN IN PERMANENT SESSION

London, July 24 (AP).—Far from dead, the world economic conference may live many years as a result of today's decision by the steering committee to remain in permanent session here although the conference will recess Thursday.

Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald insisted that this action be taken. Behind him was the full support of Secretary of State Cordell Hull.

Mr. Hull looks upon the conference not as having failed but as a series of conferences of which the London Parley is only the first.

Today's decision calls for the original members of the steering committee to attend meetings, and Governor James M. Cox will be able to represent the United States as he will stay here several weeks after the recess starts.

The nations whose delegates on the steering committee will not be in London will be represented by their ambassadors here.

Barrow Wounded.

Officers were certain that Clyde Barrow and the woman also were wounded seriously. They believed the name, Jack Sherman, given for the third man, by Marvin Barrow, was an alias.

Identification of the Barrow brothers were established by broadcast descriptions and questioning of Dexter residents, who had seen them.

Marvin Barrow said they had purchased their supply of guns from a soldier at Fort Sill, Okla., for \$150. Barrow, who was taken to a Perry hospital, was released from Huntsville penitentiary in March.

Mrs. Barrow also was taken to the Perry hospital for treatment. Shattered pieces of glass penetrated her eyes in the battle.

The Barrows are wanted at Mount Ayr for robbery, officers said here.

Clyde Barrow, Sherman and the woman with them escaped by wading a stream running through the woods. They dashed northward, stole Fellers' car and last were reported seen between Panora and Guthrie Center.

Wanted in Four Murders.

Kansas City, July 24 (AP).—Four murders and the wounding of three officers are charged against the Barrow brothers, Marvin Ivy (Buck) and Clyde, desperadoes Dallas, Tex., killers, one of whom was wounded and captured in a gunfight today with Iowa officers near Dexter.

The search for the Texas gunman was intensified after their spectacular escape from Platte county jail.

June 19, following a gunfight in which three officers were wounded.

The two men, with two women, were surrounded in a Platte county tourist camp by a dozen officers armed with machine guns and protected by shields. Instead of complying with an order to surrender, the beleaguered fugitives poured a stream of fire on the officers, emerged from their cabins and dashed away in their automobile.

Woman Believed Shot.

Officers believe one of the women was severely wounded and that one of the brothers probably was struck by the officers' bullets. The finding of bloody clothing in the neighborhood shortly after the gunfight confirmed the officers' belief.

Wes Harryman, Newton county, Missouri constable, and Harry McGinnis, Joplin detective, were shot to death April 13 when they went to a house in Joplin to search it for liquor. Later a pardon to one of the Barrow brothers, issued by Governor Ferguson of Texas, was found in the house.

Hillsboro, Tex., officers seek the desperadoes for the murder of J. W. Bucher, a filling station operator, and they have been identified as the gunmen who fatally wounded H. D. Humphrey, Alma, Ark., officer in a gunfight in June, 1933.

The Texas gunmen are charged with numerous bank robberies and the kidnaping of several officers.

PRESIDENT TO SPEED DRIVE FOR RECOVERY

RADIO SPEECH TONIGHT VITAL ENDEAVOR IN EMPLOYMENT PROGRAM

Washington, July 24 (AP).—President Roosevelt primed himself today for the supreme endeavor on behalf of his recovery program scheduled in the address to the nation this evening.

Those in touch with him were impressed by the importance he attached to the occasion, coming as it does upon inauguration of the intense national campaign to put more money into pockets of the needy so they can buy.

As to exactly what he planned to say, however, there was no assuredly accurate telling. Some persons in close contact with him spoke as freely of their not knowing his intentions as they did of their knowledge that he deems the speech of dominant nature.

Oil Hearing Opened.

The postoffice department, meanwhile, hurried arrangements for dispatching to 5,000,000 employers the "partnership" agreement with the government designed for them to raise wages and restrict working hours, thereby helping buying power and employment.

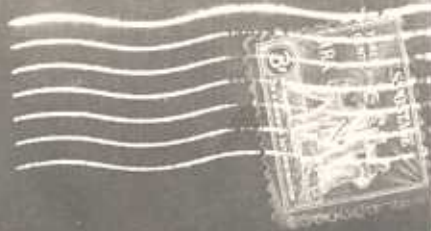

SEARCH REDOUBLED NEAR WINSLOW, ARK., WHEN OFFICER DIES

Fort Smith, Ark., June 26 (AP).—
H. D. Humphrey, Alma town marshal, shot down by two machine gun desperadoes identified as the notorious Barrow brothers of Texas, died in a hospital here today and search for the killers immediately was redoubled in the Ozark mountains near Winslow, where they were last reported.

The Barrow brothers—Clyde and Melvin of Dallas—already were sought for the slaying of two officers at Joplin, Mo., and a long list of crimes in the Southwest before they appeared in Northwest Arkansas to leave a trail of violence during the week-end.

Marshal Humphrey and half a dozen other persons who saw the gunmen identified them through pictures yesterday. The marshal said Clyde fired the machine gun that sent three bullets into his body in a gun battle near Alma when Humphrey and a deputy came upon the scene a few minutes after the gunmen's car had collided with another machine as they were fleeing from a store holdup at Fayetteville.

Trailed to Near Winslow.

The gunmen were trailed to near Winslow Saturday, and later to the farm home of Mrs. John Rogers, where they beat her with a heavy chain when she refused to give them the keys to her car. Mrs. Rogers told Sheriff A. D. Maxey they attempted to assault her, then fled into the hills on foot. They were carrying a machine gun and two automatic pistols.

Police said they learned the Barrows, with another man and three women, had been staying at a tourist camp here for a week. Two of the men left Friday morning, and the other man and the women departed hurriedly a few hours after the marshal was shot Friday night. It was believed the Barrows fled into Kansas after tying up a sheriff and a deputy at Wellington, Tex., June 11, stole a car at Hutchinson June 14, then came here. The Hutchinson car was abandoned by the gunmen in the shooting.

Humphrey, 52 years old, had been an officer since May 1. Two nights before he was shot he was tied up by men who robbed the Commercial bank at Alma of \$3,600. Police are investigating a theory the Barrows were connected with this robbery.

TULSA KIDNAPED PAIR BELIEVES FLOYD ABDUCTOR

Muskogee, Okla., June 23 (AP).—
Mr. and Mrs. H. D. Myers of Tulsa reported to Muskogee police today that they were kidnaped last night between Tulsa and Claremore by four men, one of whom resembled pictures of Charles (Pretty Boy) Floyd, much-sought outlaw, and held prisoners all night.

They were released, they said, on a detour between Warner and Webbers Falls about 5 a. m., the outlaws stealing the Myers' automobile.

Myers said he was positive one of the men was Floyd. Another was an Italian and was addressed by his companions as "Dago." These two talked, Myers said, about the kidnaping last week of Sheriff Jack Killingsworth at Bollivar, Mo.

(Killingsworth was kidnaped by Floyd and Adam Ricchetti when the sheriff appeared at a Bollivar garage, where repairs were being made on Floyd's car. Killingsworth was released unharmed near Kansas City, Mo.)

Women Bandits Spray Crowd With Bullets in Holdup

Lucerne, Ind., May 12 (INS).—

Two women bank robbers, one of them a blonde armed with an automatic rifle, sprayed a crowd with bullets during a spectacular but unsuccessful attempt by a bandit gang to hold up the Lucerne State bank here today.

Bullets fired by the young bandit queen wounded slightly Miss Ethel Witters, 20, and Mrs. Doris Minor, 24.

The gang, consisting of two women and two men, all between the ages of 20 and 25 years, and all heavily armed, escaped without loot in a sedan.

Two Are Held As Gunwomen In Bank Robbery

Logansport, Ind., June 9 (INS).—
Two pretty Chicago women were indignant in the Cass county jail here today when they were accused of operating an automatic rifle like veteran gangsters.

They were Mrs. Josephine Gray and Miss Olga Bernaka.

Despite the fact that at least three persons allegedly identified them as steely nerved women who fired shots from an automatic rifle into a crowd during the unsuccessful attempted robbery of the Lucerne State bank at Lucerne near here on May 12, they continued to maintain their innocence.

Bullets from the gun struck and slightly wounded Miss Ethel Witters, 20, and Mrs. Doris Minor, 24, of Lucerne.

"We didn't do it; they can't hang the job on us," the women protested.

They denied emphatically that one of them after firing a volley into the crowd, screamed: "This'll learn you!"

Mrs. Gray is a petite blonde and the wife of Jack Gray, who was captured after robbing the State Exchange bank of Culver, and Miss Bernaka is Gray's sister. Olga is a brunette, slightly taller than her sister-in-law.

CLYDE BARROW RECOGNIZED ON TERRELL VISIT

HIDEOUTS WATCHED BUT GUN- MAN AND GIRL SLIP THROUGH NET

Clyde Barrow, notorious West Dallas desperado, with a woman believed to be Bonnie Parker and three men companions, were seen at Terrell, Tex., Monday evening about dark, it was revealed at the sheriff's office Wednesday.

All known places in Dallas county where Clyde or Bonnie might visit were watched all Monday night, all day Tuesday and all Tuesday night.

A filling station operator at Terrell reported Clyde drove an Auburn sedan bearing a North Carolina license into his place shortly before dark Monday. A complete change of oil, check of tires and filling of the gasoline tank was ordered.

At first the station attendant was not suspicious. He reported one of the men helped the woman from the car. She walked to the rest room with the aid of one of the men. The woman was apparently seen by the station attendant.

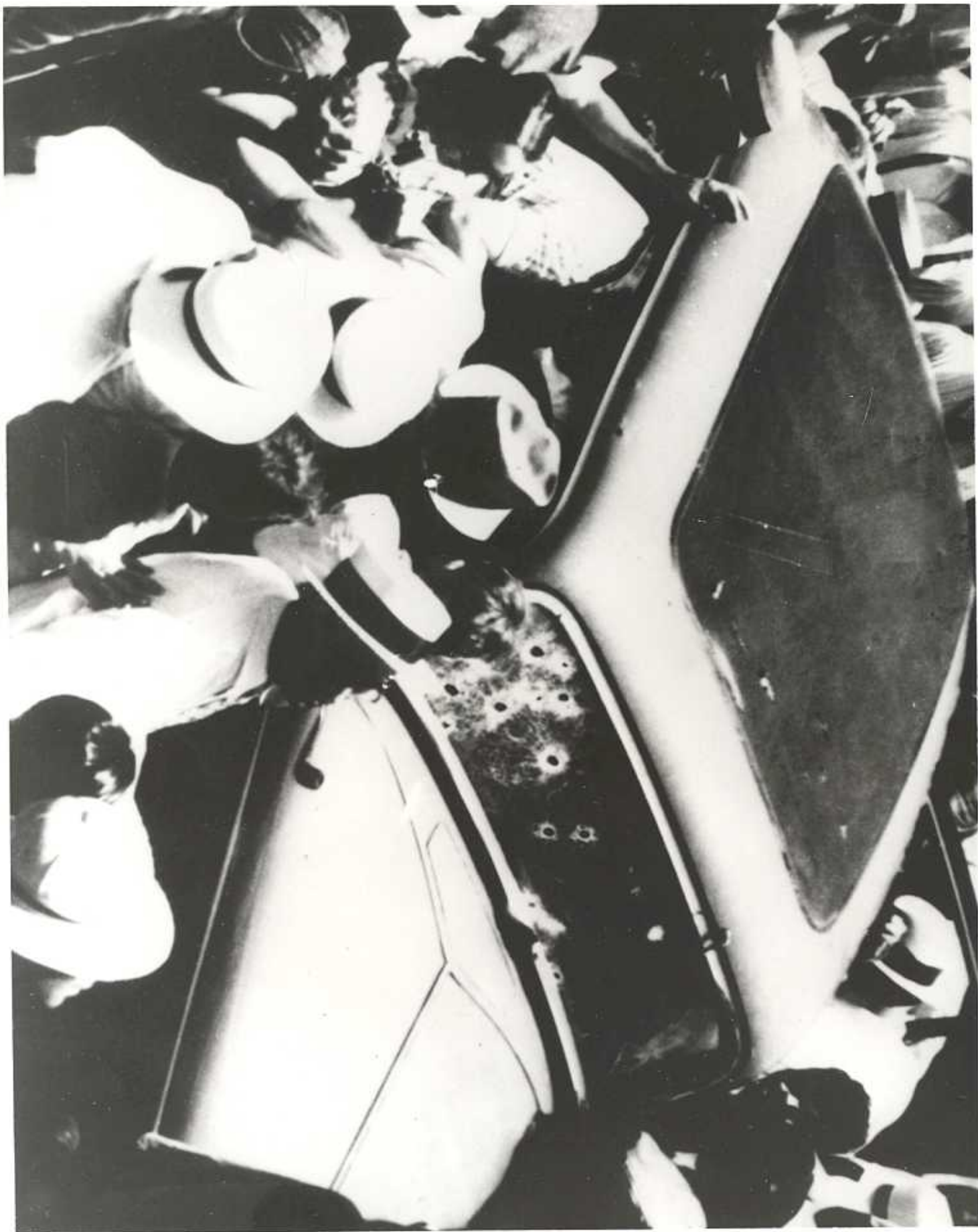


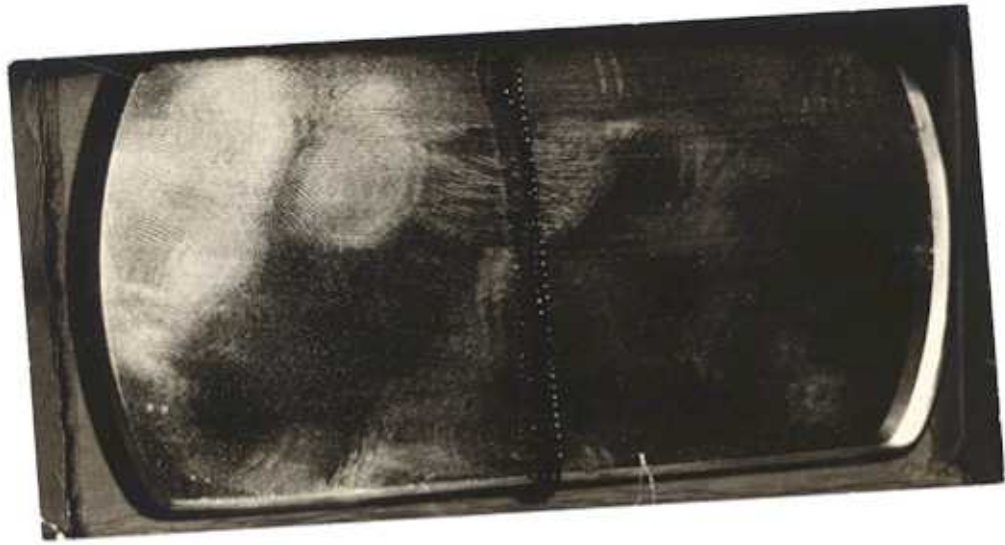

VOLUNTARY STATEMENT- Under Arrest. B-71

THE STATE OF TEXAS)
COUNTY OF DALLAS)

Date November 18th, 1933.

TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN:

After I have been duly warned by Winter R. King, Assistant District Attorney of Dallas County, Texas that I do not have to make any statement at all, and that any statement I make may be used in evidence against me on the trial for the offense concerning which this statement is herein made, I wise to make the following voluntary statement to the aforesaid person:

My name is W. D. Jones

My address is.....

I am 17 years old. I was born May 12th, 1916 in some little town in east Texas, but do not know the name of the town, nor the name of the County where the same is located.

I know Clyde Barrow and have known him for about 11 years. I had met Bonnie Parker two or three times before the occasion when I left Dallas with Clyde Barrow and Bonnie Parker a day or two before Christmas, 1932, and went to Temple, Texas, where Clyde killed a man who tried to interfere with us when we were stealing a Ford car off the street there. We hid out in East Texas for awhile, returning to Dallas on the night of Friday, January 6th, 1933, when some officers tried to arrest us at Lillie McBride's house on County Avenue in West Dallas, and Clyde Barrow killed one of the officers with a shot-gun and Bonnie Parker also fired two or three times at the officers with a pistol.

We escaped from Texas then, and rambled through Oklahoma and Missouri, and hid away for some weeks at Joplin, Mo., where we staid, until we had a pitched gun battle with some officers who tried to arrest us there. I was shot and unconscious, but the others shot their way out and carried me with them, and we escaped in a Ford car. We hid out for a time, visiting various states including Texas, Oklahoma, Kansas, Indiana and Louisiana.

While we were in Louisiana, and before Clyde and Buck kidnapped the man and woman there, they put me out of the car to steal a Chevrolet automobile for them. I saw this was my chance to escape and I jumped in this car and made my get away and came back to Dallas, Texas.

I got back to Dallas about a month or a month and a half after the gun battle at Joplin, Mo. I cannot be any more definite as to the time. I staid around Dallas several weeks. I staid at my mother's at 2410 Henry Street in West Dallas. I saw and talked to Clyde Barrow's mother during this time. But I didn't tell any of the Barrows anything about what all had happened.

Late one afternoon--or rather about two o'clock in the afternoon I was out at Bachman's Dam. I was walking along the road intending to go down to the lake and to go to a dance at the Five Point Dancehall that night. Bonnie Parker and Clyde Barrow drove up from behind me and stopped. They were in a V8 Coupe.

I hadn't heard from them since I saw them last in Louisiana and did not know they were back in town until this time.

They spoke to me and told me to get in the car and I got in. They asked me if I wanted to go with them, and I told them I did not, and Clyde said I was going any way, and I did.

We drove on in the direction of Wichita Falls, going mostly on country roads. We staid that night at the first little tourist camp on this side of Vernon, Texas. We left there early the next morning. He hadn't told me where we were going or anything-- just said we were going "up the country".

We drove on all day and into the night, I went to sleep and while I was asleep we had a wreck. A bridge was out and Clyde drove off into the river. I was knocked out. Bonnie was burned on her right leg from the thigh on down. A pretty bad burn.

Bonnie told me afterward that the next thing she remembered was that she came to and we were all in a farmhouse and she didn't know how we got there, and that I brought a rifle in the house, and she told me to take it to Clyde and I went out of the house with it. Bonnie told me I fired a shot-gun there which wounded a woman in the hand. I don't know about anything that happened at this farmhouse, because if I did any of these things I was still out of my head from the injuries I had received in the wreck and knew nothing about them.

Bonnie also told me two officers came to the house in a car and we captured them and took their car and the officers with us and started for Oklahoma. I still don't remember this. But I came to while we were in this car. Clyde Barrow was driving and Bonnie Parker and myself and the two captured officers were in the car.

A few minutes after I came to we met Buck Barrow, in the edge of Oklahoma on a bridge. He was driving a Ford V8 convertible coupe. Blanche Barrow his wife was with him. Clyde drove up on one end of the long bridge and blew his horn and stopped, and we sat there a few minutes and we heard another horn at the far end of the bridge. Buck stopped his car there and came running up towards us. Clyde got out of the car with the two officers, and told me to drive the Chevrolet down towards Buck's car and put Bonnie in it. I did that, and staid there until Buck and Clyde came back and I got in the Coupe with Buck and Blanche and Bonnie Parker, and Clyde got in the Chevrolet we had taken from the officers.

We headed on North into Oklahoma. On this trip I learned from their conversation that they had held up a bank somewhere and had lots of money. We went on into Arkansas from there.

STEAL AUTO AND ABDUCT PURSUERS NEAR TEXAS LINE

Dallas police Friday guarded all roads into the city for mud-covered sedan bearing the two notorious Barrow brothers and their two women.

It was learned that in the auto were two machine guns, three rifles and several pistols, squad officers were prepared to stop the car and ask questions.

It was slightly incredulous to report "Pretty Boy" Floyd was riding with them.

The leader of the gang was Charles ("Pretty Boy") Floyd, Oklahoma bank bandit. He said they carried two machine guns, three rifles and several pistols.

The kidnaping occurred yesterday after a fifth bandit had stolen Darby's car off the streets. Darby and Miss Stone gave chase in Miss Stone's automobile. When they approached Hico, La., they were halted by the two men and two women and forced to accompany them into Arkansas.

In telephone conversation with the sheriff of Ruston, police were told that the Barrow brothers "were the ones" who abducted B. Darby, Miss Stone, after midnight after drive.

The victims had identified the Barrow brothers from photographs which had been sent to police departments in all parts of the country by Dallas police.

Three Men, Two Women.

According to advices from Ruston, the kidnaping party consisted of three men and two women. Dallas police suspected the women were Bonnie Parker, Dallas sweetheart of Clyde Barrow, and Buck's wife. Identity of the third man was not known.

Darby, Ruston undertaker, and Miss Stone, 27, home demonstration agent, were abducted when they gave chase to a man who had stolen Darby's car. The abduction occurred near Hico, 18 miles northwest of Ruston, and the couple was released six miles south of Waldo, Ark.

Identification of the Barrow brothers as the Louisiana kidnapers was the first word of the much-sought bandits since the killing of two peace officers in Joplin, Mo., two weeks ago. Joplin police, raiding a combination garage and house, were met by gun fire that took the lives of a Joplin detective and a deputy constable. Searching the house, police found photographs of the Barrow brothers, Bonnie Parker and Buck's wife, as well as a pardon paper issued by Gov. Ferguson to Buck Barrow.

The Missouri murders brought the number for which Clyde Barrow is sought to six.

Dallas police were given a description of a 1933 model Ford sedan bearing the Louisiana license No. 233-521, in which the Barrows were said to be travelling. The car, according to the Ruston sheriff, was covered with white mud.

Says Floyd Third Man in Car

Ruston, La., April 28.—Two men and two women sought by Louisiana officials today after they had identified Miss Sophie Stone, home demonstration agent, and F. Darby, Ruston undertaker, as being with them on a 125-mile trip from Hico, Ark., where they were kidnaped unharmed.

Darby told Sheriff of Ruston he
