OF SIGNIFICANCE

Of significance this season to England's Trainer/Coach and European League non-playing captain, Peter Simpson, is that with the exception of John Hilton, all his squad players have signed contracts to play in the Federal German Bundesliga whereas, last season, only Douglas was so contracted, for PSV Borussia Dusseldorf.

Such are the lucrative terms being offered by the Federal German clubs to attract top players from other countries that Paul Day, the reigning English closed champion, has abandoned his studies at Cambridge University after only one year.

His ambition, from being a junior, has been to reach the top as a world class player and should he blossom to the same extent as did Douglas last season then Eintracht Frankfurt will have made a sound investment. Douglas is now placed equal No. 7, with Milan Orlowski of Czechoslovakia in the world ratings, and at No. 4 in Europe, his previous positions being No. 25 and No. 8 respectively.

Nicky Jarvis has signed for T.T.C. Grun-Weiss Bad Hamm but the drain to the continent is not confined to the male fraternity. England's top three women have also contracted to Federal German clubs, Jill Hammersley with TSV Kronshagen, Carole Knight with VSC Donauworth and Linda Howard with Post SV Dusseldorf.

Although havoc may be caused on the home tournament circuit — Bundesliga matches are played at weekends — the benefit to the players, both monetarily competitively can be highly regarded. More's the pity that such incentives are not available in this country. But all credit to the players to insist, like Keegan in football, that England's needs come first, such a clause having been written into the contracts.



DESMOND UP TO JOINT WORLD No. 7



Desmond Douglas elevated to joint No. 7, with Milan Orlowski of Czechoslovakia in the revised I.T.T.F. rankings.



In a revised classification list issued by the International Table Tennis Federation on July 3rd, 1978, England's Desmond Douglas, following his remarkable exploits in the 11th European Championships last season in Duisburg, has been elevated from his previous 25th position to joint No. 7 with Milan Orlowski of Czechoslovakia.

Paul Day, the reigning English closed champion, has also been uplifted, from No. 40 and last to No. 30 but, from being No. 32 in the previous list Denis Neale has been omitted. So too have Kjell Johansson of Sweden (13), Anton Stipancic of Yugoslavia (=15), Tokio Tasaka of Japan (=17), Stanislav Gomozkov of the Soviet Union (20), Tetsuo Inoue of Japan (28) and Li Yu-hsiang

Tibor Kreisz of Hungary heads the newcomers, at No. 13, followed by S. Ono of Japan, Lu Yuansheng and Lu Chi-wei of China, Engelbert Huging of Federal Germany, Zoran Kalinic of Yugoslavia and Uchida of Japan.

Another English player to receive an uplift is Jill Hammersley, the beaten finalist in Duisburg, who comes up to No. 8 having previously occupied the joint tenth position with Ann-Christin Hellman, Kayoko Kawahigashi and Lee Ailesa. Carole



Knight, from being No. 28 in the previous list, is omitted but Linda Howard, not previously listed, comes in at No. 39.



China's Yang Ying has leapt from No. 33 to No. 5 and Judit Magos becomes the top European woman in succession to her compatriot Beatrix Kishazi. Similarly in the men's list Gabor Gergely who won his spurs at Duisburg takes over as the top European man from Yugoslavia's Dragutin Surbek.

E.T.T.U. RANKINGS

A revised classification list was issued by the European Table Tennis Union on June 24th, 1978 in which Desmond Douglas of England was promoted to No. 4 having previously figured at No. 8 but, following the Top 12 tournament in Prague in January — Douglas was a non-starter due to a neck strain — he figured in the 9/16 seeding bracket at Duisburg.

Paul Day also figured in an elevation from No. 20 to No. 19 as did Linda Howard in the women's list from No. 23 to No. 19. Jill Hammersley was relieved of her No. 1 position by the new European champion, Judit Magos of Hungary, to whom she lost in the Duisburg final. Carole Knight dropped five places in being demoted from No. 20 to the last No. 25 position.





HAPPY BIRTHDAY

It was on the occasion of the European Fair Cities' Cup final in Szolnok that Dr. Gyorgy Lakatos, President of the Hungarian Table Tennis Association and a Management Committee member of the European Table Tennis Union celebrated his 60th birthday.

Dr. Lakatos began his playing career in 1934 and, on the administrative front, was elected Hon. General Secretary of the Hungarian Association in 1945 — a position he held until 1951. During the years 1946-1950 he was the non-playing captain of the Hungarian national team and served in this capacity in Stockholm in 1949 when the Hungarians won the Swaythling Cup. The team comprised Sido, Soos, Koczian and Varkonyi.

From 1951 to 1957 Dr. Lakatos served on the Executive Committee of the Hungarian Association, Vice-President from 1957 to 1976 and President since that year. View of the 24 tables in action at Maiden Castle Sports Centre.



The evening seminars, which included talks on physical conditioning, winning, special sessions on how to play . . . (a chopper, looper, counter-hitter) the night before the practical demonstrations, table tennis in China and international matches on video, were held this year in one of the University lecture rooms at New Elvet.

Of particular interest to any serious player were the evening seminars on many different aspects of the game, including fitness, equipment, China, and how to play against people using various different styles of play. Next time I play Dragutin Surbek I shall know that a useful tactic will be a quick ball wide to his forehand!

The fitness programme, organised by Donald Parker and Bob Wiley, at first awoke muscles which we didn't know existed, but which we soon realized would come in handy at twenty-all in the third game. I can remember how tired most of us were after running around the Maiden Castle track six times, whereas Don and Nicky Jarvis galloped merrily around twelve times without hardly seeming to break into a sweat.

On certain evenings discos were held in the Undercroft. Although the lack of girls on my course seemed to be a problem, some players took great delight in practicing their backhand loops on the dance floor to the strains of "Saturday Night Fever".

A friendly atmosphere was evident all week as we all had one thing in common and the coaches were always ready to discuss any aspect of the game "after hours".

An innovation this year was the table tennis quiz which everyone enjoyed, although Carole Knight was most annoyed when none of us knew who was the last English player to win a singles title at the English Open!

The varied food and excellent accommodation at the Castle made the holiday complete and I shall be one of the first to book for next year.



The programme also included periods of personal tuition and the physical training aspects of table tennis. The course provided very interesting evening lectures on Physical Training for Table Tennis, Equipment, Table Tennis in China and How to win at Table Tennis.

The very full programme ensured that the five passed very quickly and the course closed with individual tournaments for each group with good equipment prizes being presented during the final evening party.

In retrospect, I feel that the course was most suited for improving table tennis players of all ages with some ability or knowledge of modern table tennis techniques and a reasonable standard of fitness was essential to obtain full benefit from the course. I certainly thought the holiday good value for money and my young companions look forward to the opportunity of a return visit.



CARBON FIBRE RACKETS

It appears that there is some misunderstanding among Associations about the status of racket blades that include reinforcement in the adhesive

At Birmingham such a racket, in which the reinforcement was carbon fibre, was submitted for examination by the Equipment and Rules Committees, and it was agreed that this racket was acceptable within the existing Laws. It is important to note that no "I.T.T.F. approval" was given, as the I.T.T.F. does not yet approve rackets.

Having thus interpreted the Law it is necessary to establish a suitable specification, and the Equipment Committee is already working on this task. In the meantime, a racket blade that meets the following requirements will be regarded as being of wood, as required by Law 3.4.2:

a) At least 85% of the blade by thickness must be of natural wood.

b) An adhesive layer may include reinforcement with fibrous material such as carbon fibre, glass fibre or compressed paper.

c) No adhesive layer, including reinforcement, may be thicker than 7.5% of the total blade thickness or 0.35mm, whichever is the smaller.

SCOTLAND TO HOST 5TH COMMONWEALTH TABLE TENNIS CHAMPIONSHIPS

The Scottish Table Tennis Association, in conjunction with General Accident, Fire and Life Assurance Corporation Limited, the main sponsors, announce that the 5th Commonwealth Table Tennis Championships will be held in the Meadowbank Indoor Sports Centre, Edinburgh, from 12th-18th April, 1979.

Already 14 countries — Hong Kong, England, India, Ghana, Guernsey, Canada, Northern Ireland,

Jersey, Malta, Trinidad, The Gambia, Nigeria, Kenya, Uganda and, of course, Scotland, have intimated that they intend to participate. It is confidently expected that Australia and Wales will also compete.

The Commonwealth Table Tennis Championships were inaugurated in 1971 and are held every two years immediately prior to the World Table Tennis Championships. All associations affiliated to the International Table Tennis Federation whose territories are, or formerly were, within the British Commonwealth are eligible to compete. The first championships in 1971 were held in Singapore; the second in 1973 in Cardiff; the third in 1975 in Melbourne and the fourth in 1977 in Guernsey.

The Championships are organised on the same lines as the World and European Championships. The first three days will be concerned with the team competitions; men will play in teams of three (nine singles matches) and the women in teams of two (four singles matches and one doubles). After a rest-day, the five individual events — Men's Singles, Women's Singles, Men's Doubles, Women's Doubles and Mixed Doubles — will be played over the last three days.

England swept the board in the first three championships, winning all seven titles each time, with Trevor Taylor and Jill Hammersley each winning the singles titles three times in succession. The strongest challenge to their supremacy came from India, Australia, and Canada. However, in 1977, in Guernsey, Hong Kong, strengthened by the inclusion of several immigrants from the People's Republic of China, took over as Commonwealth Champions, winning six of the seven titles, leaving only the Women's Doubles title in English hands.

Scotland participated in the 1973 Championships in Cardiff when our No. 1 man — Richard Yule (Aberdeen) reached the Men's Singles semi-final and our No. 1 woman — Elaine Smith (Forfar) — the quarter-finals of the Women's Singles. Last year in Guernsey, Scotland's team were placed

seventh in each team event and our top players Richard Yule and Grace McKay (Edinburgh) attained Commonwealth ranking at No. 12 in the men's and women's lists.

In addition to the support of the main sponsor General Accident, Stiga AB will supply the tables, balls and other playing equipment. Generous assistance will also be provided by:-

The Scottish Sports Council Lothian Regional Council and other local authorities in Scotland Thistle Hotels

All players and officials will be accommodated in King James Hotel, St. James Centre, Edinburgh.

General Accident's community involvement to date has been concerned mainly with welfare, medical research and education — including the endowment of the Chair of General Practice at Glasgow University — music and the arts. However, General Accident have also been involved to a limited extent in sponsoring international badminton and cycling, and also in golf coaching in Scotland.

JUNIOR IMPROVEMENT

September has seen a stepping up of the search for new talent in Wales despite the much improved performances of our juniors and cadets during the

At Bradford, in the English Schools International Tournament we finished third, next to the two English sides, and above France, Scotland and Ireland. This was followed by the trip to the European Youth Championships in Barcelona, where our juniors improved to 20th place, and our cadets reached 13th place, a truly fine performance.

But although our cadet team of Mark Thomas and Andrew Jones remains intact, we are losing Jeff Morgan and Nigel Thomas to the Senior ranks, and our reserve store of juniors looks a bit thin at the moment.

In an attempt to find youngsters to bring into our squads, two Assessment Courses are being held, one at Lilleshall for the North, and the other at the National Sports Centre in Cardiff. Leagues have been invited to nominate youngsters likely to

be trainable to international levels, and in the Round Robin tournaments which will be held at each venue, note will be taken of the best talent available.

A check up on our seniors is also taking place, and the top senior men and women, together with the top juniors will play in a round robin event so that present form can be assessed.

There is an immediate object in view in this last exercise because at the end of October we go to Finland for a friendly visit to help them celebrate their 40th Anniversary, and although we beat the Fins in the European Championships in Prague in 1976, we shall need a strong side to repeat that result.

We also need strong men and to find at least one strong woman player for the European League Third Division Matches which are to take place prior to the Stiga Welsh Open in February. This will be the biggest ever gathering in this event. Denmark, making a return to the European League, have to start at the bottom, whilst Rumania, Portugal and Iceland will all be playing for the fort the European League. for the first time. To these have to be added Norway, Switzerland, Malta, Guernsey, Jersey and Wales, so that there will be three days of sustained endeavour. All will then stay to play in the Stiga Welsh Open, which, being the last in the Norwich Union Grand Prix Circuit, has already attracted promises of participation by Sweden, Hungary, Czechoslovakia, Federal Germany, and Luxembourg, and the North Koreans have said they are coming again!

The Welsh Junior Open provided further proof of our improving standard, with several of our players reaching later rounds — Cathryn Jones, finalist in the Junior Girls', and Mark Thomas, semi-finalist in the cadet boys.

The event attracted an enormous entry from 25 countries, 161 in the boys' singles, 51 in the girls' singles and 76 in the cadet boys'. Over 500 matches were played, and so popular has the event become that is it intended to hold it over two days next

season, with the group system offering more matches to the weaker players.



In the summer heat of Spain, Jindrich Pansky of Czechoslovakia and Rumania's Eva Ferenczi became Junior Champions of Europe. The 21st European Youth Championships held in Barcelona during the last ten days of July proved a triumph for these two individuals who twelve months before in Vichy had been losing semi-finalists.

The defending girls' champion, Bettine Vriese-koop of Holland, one of four current world-ranked women taking part in Barcelona, had her title taken away in the semi-final by Ferenczi, herself a former world-ranked player.

Pansky justified his top seeded position but few would have forecast the 21-6, 21-12 blasting he gave the No. 2 seed, experienced Russian defender lgor Solopov in the final. Ferenczi's final victory over Gordana Perkucin of Yugoslavia was a much closer affair with the advantage frequently changing hands before the Rumanian's more aggressive forehand took command for a fifteen in the third win.

Only the Swedish Cadet boys prevented a clean only the Swedish Cadet boys prevented a clean sweep of the Gold Medals by Eastern European countries. Eric Lindh took the Cadet Boys singles title and with Niklas Persson won the team event. The Russian strength provided them with Gold Medals in the Boys' Team and Girls' Team junior events, the Cadet Girls' Singles Champion in the form of Inna Kourlenko, with a Hamperslevikke form of Inna Kovalenko with a Hammersley-like chop defence, backhand hit game.

There were no medals for England. With a comparatively young or inexperienced team ('old' Kenny Jackson is inexperienced) the boys' team did well to hold a place in the top eight junior teams in Europe. The Junior Girls' team improved their position from 13th to 9th, suffering from a system where having lost only one match, and that to the strong Rumanian side, the highest possible place was ninth. The Cadet Girls finished in the highest position for England, in ninth place. The Cadet Boys stayed in eleventh place.

CLOSEST

The closest England came to a medal in the individual events was Karen Witt's quarter-final place, the second occasion she has reached this stage of the European Youth Championships. To get there she had to beat Yugoslavian Ruzica Pavlov who had destroyed Karen in Vichy 11 and 8! On this occasion however she removed the seeded Yugoslav from the championships with a 17 in the third victory.

In the quarter-finals Karen faced Ferenczi. In the team event matches Karen had led Ferenczi 18-17 in the third with service to come, before losing. The quarter-final match again saw Karen "bottle" from leads in both games to lose two deuces to the girl later to be crowned Champion.

English players to reach the third round were

Mandy Smith, Graham Sandley, Colin Wilson and John Souter. Mandy had a fine win over English Junior Open Champion, Monika Stork from Federal Germany before going out to the all action Czech No. 1 Dana Hermanova. Graham lost to the eventual Silver Medalist Solopov whilst Colin went out to the powerful Hans Christian Kubitschka from Austria.

In the Cadet Boys' singles John played as well as he had throughout the Championships to lose only -19 in the third to the seeded Czech Zbynek Stepanek.

Karen and Mandy also got to the quarter-finals of the Girls' Doubles where they lost to Ferenczi (again) and Vriesekoop. The Mixed and Boys' Doubles were a disaster with only Sandley and Alison Gordon in the Mixed getting as far as the third round. the third round.

RELIABLE No. 1

After a fine performance in the team event much was hoped for from Kenny Jackson. However he went out second round to the Swede Jonas Berner. Alison lost also in the second round to the No. 1 seed Vriesekoop whilst Helen Williams lost her second round Cadet Girls' match to the seeded Torkel Grefberg from Finland.

These three however had more than satisfactory team performances for England. Kenny proved a reliable No. 1 and had two especially fine wins; over the Russian No. 2 Mikhail Ovcharov and the highly rated Italian Giovanni Bisi. Alison, although not included in the match against Rumania had a 100% record whilst Helen impressed many observers with her attacking flair whilst winning more than half her games.

Of the other three members of the English party, Tony Bottomley was a good team member but lost the three times he played whilst the youngsters Gina Pritchard and Mark Oakley will have learned much from the experience of playing in a level of competition where positive thinking is essential.



TROUBLED TIMES

With Nicky Jarvis and Carole Knight joining Jimmy Walker in the West German Bundesliga, the 1978/79 season looks on paper to be the most difficult in the county's short history. Matters are made worse by the unreasonable attitude of the German Association who apparently are making it a condition of playing in the Bundesliga that the players cannot represent their own club in English competitions or in Europe although this has no direct effect on Germany or the Bundesliga itself. If the Germans continue with this line of action then it will mean that entry into the European Club Cup will be almost worthless and the value of winning the National Club competitions next year greatly reduced and far more difficult to achieve.

It does not stop there. The dates of Bundesliga matches which are spread over many weekends throughout the season, clash with the country's leading prize money open tournament, the Cleveland 3-Star in January and with not just the local stars in Germany but also most of the remaining members of the England squad, our sponsors, Cleveland County Council, have hardly anything worthwhile to promote or gain prestige and publicity from.

What's more, the English counties, despite a recommendation from the E.T.T.A. Management Committee, failed to recognise the problem and continue to hold the senior premier division of the County Championships on Saturday nights

throughout the season, so debarring all the best players who will be playing in Germany from playing in this competition. This attitude will mean that the County Championships, Premier Division this season will be the lowest standard ever with only a handful of the ranked players competing. The County Championships, if it is to remain a significant competition for top class players, must move with the times and play several matches over the weekend and by so doing attract sponsorship from which the leading players will be able to gain some financial reward from competing

In the first "Cleveland View" of last season with Douglas and Walker playing in Germany I anticipated the problems that were just around the corner. I take no pride in being proved right. The E.T.T.A. have done plenty of talking about a National League and have gone so far as altering the rules so that at last players can be paid for playing in competitive team matches. The whole situation is now extremely serious and it doesn't take a great deal of imagination to work out the continuing repercussions. However, the E.T.T.A. has the matter in its own hands. If the right steps are taken, I am sure that the membership at large will support the Association in its efforts to overcome this new and very dangerous threat. In fact, several clubs have already gone a long way to back the E.T.T.A. by indicating a willingness to enter a very costly National Club league that the E.T.T.A. have yet to bring to reality.

ABILITY UNQUESTIONABLE

While other counties took their summer holidays, Avon had an active 'close season'. First, chronologically, was an exhibition match on July 8th with that great crowd puller Chester Barnes. Playing against Avon's Chris Sewell, who stepped in for the injured Les Eadie, Chester entertained the crowd with his repertoire of wise-cracks and 'mini' bat to frying pan.

The event, which included some coaching for local youngsters was promoted by Avon Schools' Association and finished with an exhibition match of some excellent open table tennis from both players. Both teams will be looking to make their mark in Div. 2 this season. Hinckley showed that they are not short of decent players for their "B" team by finishing top of Div. 4, and Bromsgrove took second place to be promoted to Div. 3 with them.

On the Junior front Wolverhampton "A" proved that their success in winning the Div. 2 title the previous season (76-77) was no flash in the pan, by taking top honours in Div. 1 for the first time in their history. A pre-season event is the showing of two films in collaboration with the Civil Service Sports Council for the Worcester area. These are "Battle of the Bats" and a film on the Montreal 1976 Olympics and Winter Games.

The Association again has 4 teams entered in

the County Championships -- 2 Senior, a Junior and Veterans' team. Derek Baddeley again takes on the role of Team Manager. Trials for senior players are arranged to take place at the Abbey Stadium, Redditch on Oct. 8th. A newcomer will be Ray Williams, who had such an excellent season in Dudley last season. It is understood that Trevor Washington (Dudley) will be returning to the scene and Bob Brown, who opted out of County play last year, will again be competing. The other side of the coin is the news that Cliff Benson (Kidderminster), a regular team member for the past 2 seasons, will not be playing in 1978/79.

The County League has been a disappointment over the past few seasons, with difficulty in getting fixtures completed. This year Terry Round has made arrangements which provide for matches to be played on specific dates and the venues are also included in the Fixture List. This obviates making arrangements within prescribed periods as in the past — which did not prove to be satisfactory. It has led to a somewhat lower entry but it will be heartening if the new arrangements are successful.

Arrangements are in hand for the County Closed Championships. The Junior events will again be held separately — at Perdiswell School, Worcester, in December. The Senior events will continue at the excellent Abbey Stadium, Redditch on either Feb. 11th or 18th, 1979.

The County Team K.O. competitions are always popular, the handicap event being particularly well supported. Peter Bird keeps the competitions running smoothly each season with firm control of the timetable for each Round. There were some remarkably close finishes last season, which speaks well for the handicapping. The Final saw Ledbury beat Stourport Wesleyans by only 6 points.

The Association is keenly interested in the new Youth Training Scheme, particularly as 13-year-old Jeremy Duffield (Kidderminster) is included. Financial assistance has been given by the County Association and Kidderminster League towards the £60 cost for the 4 sessions and towards expenses in taking part in National Tournaments, it being recognised that this is essential in order to progress. Jeremy has already had success this season in winning the Cadet Doubles, partnered by A. Dixon (Staffs) in the Essex Championships.

Doug Young, a prominent member of the County and Worcester City Committees has been invited to serve on the National Tournaments Committee. The Association is very pleased and to learn he is appointed Asst. Referee for the English Junior Championships in December and as Referee of the Norwich Union English Championships in February. The Worcestershire Association is also represented at national level with "yours truly" being a member of the County Championships Committee.

The success of the Social Event to celebrate the 25th Anniversary of the Association has led to suggestions for a similar function. It is the inten-tion to arrange such a Social in May next year and consideration will be given to the possibility of presenting the Trophies for the County Closed Championships on this occasion.

WELL DONE JUNIORS!

It's over a decade since Staffordshire last had a team in a premier division of the County Championships, but the success of our juniors in recent years finally had its reward. Staffs. Juniors will be playing in the Junior Premier Division thanks to the splendid efforts of Andrew Belling-ham, Andrew Dixon, Stuart Richards, Jill Harris and Shirley Cain in the five-cornered play-off against Cheshire, Herts., Sussex and Warwickshire. Congratulations to all of them and to Andrew Rich and the other juniors who helped them top their division.

The play-off was staged at Featherstone Prison, near Wolverhampton, by kind permission of the Governor, Mr. Sandy. Ray Dixon and Wilf Hadley of the Staffs. Association organised the event with their usual thoroughness and were well supported by several of the County umpires.

Now to the story of how we won through. The two-day play-off had more than its share of nerves, excitement and frustration as it soon became apparent that the two to go through would be from Sussex, Cheshire and Staffs. In the first matches Staffs. easily beat Warwickshire but Sussex recovered from 3-5 down to earn a draw with Cheshire. With Cheshire beating Herts. 7-3 in the second session, it was obvious that the Staffs. v Sussex match would be crucial. And so it was. Sussex had the best junior in Graham Gillett and neither Bellingham nor Dixon could really extend him, but with our girls, despite their dreadful nerves (and ours!), managing to win against the weaker opposition, the match result hinged on the boys' doubles. As it turned out, the result of the play-off probably depended on this one set, and Bellingham and Dixon showed excellent teamwork to win through, perhaps against the odds, 15, 19. Staffs. went on to win 6-4, so were virtually assured of one of the top places.

On the second day, most of the matches went as expected, Staffs, beat Herts, 8-2. Bellingham dropping both his singles to put us all on edge for the final and deciding match against Cheshire. At this stage, Staffs, were assured of second place, but who would accompany them to the Premier Division had still to be decided. Under such circumstances, it should have been Cheshire who would suffer from nerves, but although Bellingham recovered his form to win the first set, disaster struck and we slumped to 1-5 down with the girls losing all their sets and even the boys' doubles partnership losing against the Cheshire pair who had earlier lost to the Sussex pair. Bellingham, Dixon and Richards salvaged some honour by winning their second singles, but the end result was a 6-4 victory to Cheshire which earned them top spot in the play-off and committed Sussex to a further year in the 2nd Division.

The summary of results showed that all the players contributed equally to the success. Bellingham, Dixon and Richards each won 5 out of their 8 singles and Jill Harris and Shirley Cain each won three out of their 4 singles. The main disappointment came in the girls' doubles where Shirley and Jill were either a complete mis-match or were terribly out of form and overcome by nerves. Sponsorship has been the success story of the summer, with the Trustee Savings Bank again coming up trumps, for in widening the scope of its sponsorship, a far sighted TSB has brought many more areas under its umbrella of generosity with the latest venture to benefit being the County League, which should now become a more worthwhile competition. Attendances of 30 to 35, the winning of numerous Bronze Awards, and the attendance of national coaches augur well for the future of table tennis in a town which has just seen the demise of its main club after several traumatic seasons.

The final stages of last season were overshadowed by the tragic death of Tina Coleman, one of the County's most popular players since she first wom the Northants Girls' Singles title in 1954. Her first Women's Singles success came in 1958, and she went on to win this premier award four times, while also winning the Women's Doubles on nine occasions and the Mixed once. In the Kettering Championships she was even more successful with a tally of 24 titles, including ten successive wins in the Women's Doubles.

She will be greatly missed, but it is fitting that trophies donated by her family and friends will be played for annually in both County and Kettering circles, to leave a permanent reminder of her very special contribution to the game.

JEAN F. REAY

The summer of 1978 in the county of Durham, was marred by the death of Mrs. Jean F. Reay who, together with her husband, Edgar, was the Joint Secretary of the Durham County T.T. Association.

For close on 50 years Jean Reay had been a behind-the-scenes worker, arranging coach trips to tournaments, transport for county teams and hospitality. She had washed every County shirt for each team after each match and provided a service par excellence for her various charges throughout the years.

Scathing in her condemnation of the lack of hospitality in parts far removed from her native Co. Durham in general, and Sunderland in particular, Jean Reay saw to it that no-one visiting her territory departed with a grouse on that score.

A recipient of the Torch Trophy for dedicated service to the game, and of the Queen's Jubilee Medal last year, Jean Reay was a Vice-President of the English Table Tennis Association and a Vice-President of the Sunderland League. It was at Birmingham, on the occasion of the 34th World Championships that Mrs. Reay was presented with her Vice-Presidents badge. Our condolences are extended to Edgar who has given 57 years to the game having first played in 1921.

CHARLES WILLIAM FORBES ALLWRIGHT

Mr. C. W. F. Allwright, who died at Ramsgate on August 10th, 1978 represented England in international competitions in the 1920's, not long after the reforming of the English Table Tennis Association. He was a member of the first two season's Swaythling Cup teams, in 1926/27 and 1927/28; was runner-up to T.N. Nanda in the English Open Championships in 1924/25; he played in international matches against Wales for the four years 1924/25 to 1927/28 inclusive and also represented England against Hungary in 1925/26.

Mr. Allwright was also on the Executive Committee of the E.T.T.A. in the mid 1920's for several years. It might be helpful to quote from the programme in my possession of the London Table Tennis Congress held in December, 1926, when the Swaythling Cup was first competed for. "C. W. Allwright was born in 1902. He is an all-round sportsman having last year played centre forward for the London Railways against Paris Railways. and kept wicket for the London and Southern Counties Cricket Conference against the M.C.C. In 1922/23 he won the London League Championship. In 1924/25 he was runner-up to Nanda in the English Championships.

"In 1925/26 he won the newly instituted London Business Houses Championship. He played for England against Wales in 1924/25 and 1925/26 (as you see he continued to play against Wales in later years) he is an all-round player who uses his head; he is patient and his position playing is exceptionally good. He plays in spectacles and uses the rubber racket".

Although he retired from competitive Table Tennis at the end of the 1920's Mr. Allwright continued to play Cricket and Football for the Great Western Railway for many subsequent years. Mr. Allwright was a contemporary with people like Percival Bromfield; Ivor Montagu, Adrian Haydon and Fred Perry.



England's first venture in the biennial World Schools Games in Izmir, Turkey from July 18-24th proved very successful with every member of the team returning home with a medal and the crowning glory being on the last day of the Games when Sally Midgley (West Yorkshire) and Malcolm Green (Salop) won the gold medal with a scintillating performance in the Mixed Doubles event.

Highlights of the week's table tennis for the English players was undoubtedly their first taste of competition against the Chinese. The oriental players proved far too strong in the team events, winning both with ease, but it was a different story in the Individual Championships.

The Girls Team were first on the medal trail when a close 3-0 verdict over France put them in the Final against the Chinese. Although outplayed the team of Mandy Reeves (Berkshire), Sally Midgley (West Yorkshire) and Jill Purslow (Berkshire) never gave up and Jill and Mandy even took a game off their opponents in the doubles before England went down 3-0 with the consolation of silver medals.

Having emerged from their preliminary group — where they were undefeated, including a 5-0 victory over Turkey 'A' — the Boys Team met France, Turkey 'B' and China in the top group to decide places 1 - 4.

Although the team of Malcolm Green (Salop), Andrew Bellingham (West Midlands) and David Barr (Berkshire) trailed 0-2 to France they fought back to lead 3-2 and eventually won 5-3 with Barr scoring maximum wins.

Paul Whiting (Devon) replaced Bellingham for the tough match against China but the England team was thrashed 5-0.

Then came the party's first bad luck when only minutes before we were due to play Turkey 'B' for

the silver medal David Barr was ruled out with food poisoning — an illness that was also to force his withdrawal from the individual events at the end of the week.

The match, however, was very closely fought. Much to the delight of a crowd of over 600 consisting mostly of noisy, fiercely partisan students who applauded every point, Turkey 'B' took a 3-0 lead which could easily have been 3-0 to England (with two of the three deciding games going to "deuce") and then made sure of victory winning the next two sets to win 5-0.

Sally Midgley was England's most successful player in the Individual events in which she collected three medals to add to her silver medal in the team event.


Paired with Memeyati of Indonesia she went out in the semi-final of the Girls' Doubles to Shia Li-ming and Ni Shia Lien of China, -13, -16, whilst the Berkshire pair of Mandy Reeves and Jill Purslow also collected bronze medals in this event losing -14, 11, -18 to the French duo of Lavacherie and Rouel. This was disappointing as the French had been beaten in the team event.

The Boys' pair of Bellingham and Green were not as successful losing in straight games to Ingraffia and Mariani of Italy in the second round.

There was mixed results for the Girls in the Singles event. Jill Purslow lost narrowly to local girl Mustecaplioglu, Mandy Reeves went out in the quarter-final to Ni Hsia Lien of China who went on to beat Sally Midgley in the semi-final.

It was a similar story in the Boys' Singles. Only Green reached the quarter-finals losing -8, -8, to eventual winner Yang Liu of China with three other Chinese joining him in the semi-finals!

But the final day proved to be England's most successful. In the Mixed Doubles quarter-finals Bellingham and Mandy Reeves defeated the Chinese pair of Liu Ping and Chen Li-Li 19, 17, Green and Midgley put out the Turkish pair of Yildiz and Mustecaploglu, 21-13, 21-1 and the scratch pair of Vergnet (France) and Jill Purslow defeated Yang Liu and Ni Li Lien (China) 17,

Paul Whiting is the absentee — he was suffering from "Turkey Tum" at the time the picture was taken.

The Chinese again fell in the semi-final — to Vergnet and Purslow, whilst Green and Midgley didn't have things entirely their own way in beating Bellingham and Reeves 17, -15, 10.

So the Final involved Green and Midgley and Vergnet and Purslow. Green and Midgley went on to win the gold medals decisively, 21-8, 21-17.

Thus the English Schools team returned with eight medals and some unenviable experience of very humid and unusual conditions. It was the first time that the Gymnasiade had included table tennis. The other sports were athletics (no English entry) swimming and gymnastics.

Non-playing Captain was Eddie Mitchell (St. Bede's School, Redditch), chaperone Mrs. Dolly Harmer (Waluads Infants School, Luton) and Team Manager was David Lomas (Shirley High School,

The party was sponsored by Mileta Sports and the E.S.T.T.A. readily acknowledges this support and that of the Sports Council without which the Turkey visit would have been merely a dream.

STIGA SCHOOLS INTERNATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS



England players dominated the fourth Stiga Schools International Championships held at the new Richard Dunn Sports Centre, Bradford on July 14th, 15th and 16th.


This year's Championships involved a record number of players (150) and included continental opposition for the first time with the entry of a team from Northern France — and Scotland made a welcome return to the event.

Although there were some close results amongst the other competing countries England's 'A' and 'B' teams were rarely troubled in the team competitions

David McIlroy collected Scotland's only medal in coming joint third in the Intermediate Boys event which was won by Colin Wilson (Hart). Wilson (Herts) over David Barr (Berkshire).



ON THE COACHING FRONT

Although working full time as National Coach for the North I am carrying out post-graduate research within the Sports Science Dept. at Loughborough University towards a Master of Philosophy degree on a part-time basis. The purpose of this article, which I hope to contribute monthly, is to provide an insight into the area of my work.

The most important factor affecting performance in the vast majority of sports, especially ball games, is skill. There is no substitute for this factor and the table tennis player acquires his skill on the table.

All performers when they compete at any one time have a given level, no matter what their status, about which they fluctuate. They may 'feel good' and perform well or they may 'feel bad' and perform poorly.

Looking back at the 1977 World Table Tennis Championships at Birmingham there were at least a dozen players who 'on their day' could have won the title. Although one individual has a higher skill level he may lose to an individual with a lower skill level if he is playing only average and his opponent is 'peaking'.

If a player is 'peaking' then he can be considered to be realising his full potential, playing at his

optimum level. Therefore skill at the highest level, international standard, is not as decisive a factor as is often considered. It is not always the best player that wins but the best prepared player. The Olympic Games of Munich showed that it was not always the best man who won, but the one best prepared at the right moment (1).

For many years this has been the major problem of British Coaches (2), how to get their performers to peak at the right time. On a long term basis nobody is really that interested in who wins a domestic 2-Star tournament. However people are interested in the European or World Championships yet a lot of our players always seem for one reason or another to do poorly in the 'big one'.

An increasingly popular approach to peaking, innovated by a Russian psychologist, Professor L. P. Matveyev, is periodisation. The most clear and comprehensive definition of periodisation is provided by Harre (3); 'a division of the training year that is made with the idea of an optimal improvement in performance and the preparation of an athlete for a decisive climax, and for the competitions connected with it'.

Matveyev's main work was published in Moscow in 1965 and was translated immediately by most other Eastern European nations. The first western translation was made by Peter Tschiene in 1968 for the West German Sports Federation, but this version only had a limited circulation.

Basically Matveyev took the athletic performance of several thousand top class athletes of the world in events where one can objectify the results i.e. track and field, swimming, weight lifting and drew the curves of their results of several seasons. He compared these curves with those of volume and intensity of training of the same athletes, as far as he could get hold of this data.

From this comparison, he came up with a set of theories as to how one can reach the peak performance at the proper time.

i) A training cycle should contain a preparatory, a competitive and a recuperatory period.

- ii) There should be no more than two cycles per year.
 - iii) Three cycles with one, two or more peaks.
- iv) In endurance events with a high technical component (jumps, throws) there may be several peaks, in explosive events with a low technical component there may be as many as three, in endurance events preferably only two.

Using Matveyev's work as a guide I would like at the conclusion of the research to be in a position, whereby I could plan a player's training programme, technically, physically, psychologically and in some cases tactically so that he can achieve optimal improvement in performance, play well in the 'big ones' and indeed play well enough to get picked for the big ones!

DARTMOOR NEXT STOP?

If I were a parent of a junior player involved in the County Championships play-off matches at the end of last season, I would certainly want to know how it came to pass that the venue was one of H.M. Prisons, near Stafford.

With the greatest respect to the establishment concerned and the people who run it, I just do not believe that playing this sort of event in a prison is the right thing to do, either for the residents or the visitors.

Only a two-table venue was needed. There must a number of table tennis clubs around who could have coped with this event without resorting to a venue that is most certainly unsuitable for young girls.

I have personally spoken with officials who were there. They agree that playing conditions were excellent but the atmosphere was entirely excellent unsuitable.

I can recall that not long ago the senior play-off week-end was held at Shenley Hospital, a mental institution of great renown but not for this type of event. There were a number of complaints at that

Something ought to be done to ensure now that suitable venues are found in good time, otherwise I am thinking of running a competition in this column to see who can forecast this season's venue from this list - Dartmoor, Parkhurst, Wormwood Scrubs, Holloway or Broadmoor!

The N.C. report mentioned "excellent coverage in the quality papers". The finals of the national team events are of course, also held out of the normal season and there is no way that the "Telegraph" will accept more than the results even if Desmond Douglas is playing; that brings me to the final point, the powers in Fleet Street are impressed if Desmond is playing against world-class players anywhere and especially if he is doing well. They are not so interested when he is involved in the domestic scene — with the greatest respect to Alan Shepherd's Middlesex teams!

NORWICH UNION **Grand Prix - Trophy - Masters**

Norwich Union Insurance, the major sponsors of English table tennis for the past seven years, have finalised plans to extend their sponsorship into Europe with a cash prize pool in the region of £10,000.

Following discussions with both the International Federation and the European Union, and with the English Association, plans have now been crystalised to promote a Grand Prix circuit which will comprise six open tournaments together with two extra prestige events.

These latter will be the Norwich Union Trophy, at Bletchley on Nov. 28th and the Norwich Union Masters at Milton Keynes in May of next year.

The six Grand Prix tournaments will be the French Open (Nov. 10-12th), Yugoslavian (Nov. 15/18th), Scandinavian (Nov. 23/26th), Czechoslovakian (Jan. 27/29th), Welsh (Feb. 9/11th) and the English Open (Jan. 11/13th) at Brighton. At the conclusion fourteen men with the most points, together with the new world champion and the European champion, Gabor Gergely of Hungary, will meet at Milton Keynes where the ultimate winner will collect £1,000 and the runner-up £600.

Prior to, at Bletchley, the eight men leading the table after the French, Grand Prix points Yugoslavian and Scandinavian championships will qualify to play for a top prize of £600 and an overall spread of £1,450 together with modified points.

For the six Open Championships, points will be awarded to the last 32 players in the men's singles event as follows:-

Winner — 1,000 points Runner-up — 800 points

Losing semi-finalists — 600 points
Losing quarter-finalists — 400 points

Losing eighths — 200 points Losing sixteenths — 150 points

And for the Trophy Competition points will be awarded to all eight contestants as follows:-

Winner — 500 points
Runner-up — 400 points
Losing semi-finalists — 300 points
5th and 6th places — 200 points
7th and 8th places — 100 points

Overall prize money for the Masters at Milton Keynes (May 29/31st) will be £3,075 and £150 will go to the winner of the six open championships which means, in effect, should one player win all he would net himself £2,500 plus a further £500 for having accumulated most points in the Grand Prix tournaments.

ENGLISH 'GOLD CUP' **Under-14 Singles**

The Finals of the E.T.T.A. U-14 Singles were played at Meadway Sports Centre, Reading on 27th May. The sponsor this year was Actif Sports the U.K. Agents for Chinese Gold Cup equipment and the Finals were staged for the E.T.T.A. by I.M.P.A.C.T. (Institute of Match Play and Coaching Techniques).



RANKING POLICY 1978

by PETER CHARTERS Chairman, National Selection Committee

The new Selection Committee met recently and discussed in detail its intended ranking policy for the 1978/79 season. It is very important for both ranked players and those aspiring to a ranking to take note of the following points. For the guidance of Tournament organisers the Selection Committee intends to produce three seeding (or ranking) lists covering Seniors, Juniors and Cadets.

In order that ranking should become more factual, certain results only will be used for ranking purposes. The players will then know when they have to get good results to obtain or improve their ranking and the Selection Committee will not have a profusion of results (in many cases contradictory results) on which to form a list. Some will feel that all results should count towards ranking and this may come about when computer analysis becomes viable.

It must be understood that ranking and selection will be considered separately with ranking used as a guide to selection. Players will be selected for England on the basis of who, in the opinion of the Selection Committee, will do the best job for their country. Events that will be used for ranking purposes this season will be as follows:-

Seniors:

-Star Tournaments Norwich Union English Championships Norwich Union International Championships International Open events European League matches European Top 12 World Championships

Juniors:

Junior Select Tournaments English Junior Closed Championships English Junior Open Championships Junior Ranking Tournaments
Junior International Tournaments
International Friendly matches
European Youth Championships

Cadets:

Cadet events in Select Tournaments English Cadet Closed Championships International Cadet Open events European Youth Championships -- Cadet events

Results for ranking will be in separate categories i.e. Senior, Junior and Cadet. Two factors will be used in cases of equality of results in nominated - ranking position already held and the results of players concerned in 2-Star Tournaments.

All results in National Competitions (County matches, National League and Club, other open tournaments etc.) will be collated and noted by the Selection Committee for use in selection. Rankings will be issued as follows:-

Seniors:

- By the end of December 1978
 By the end of February 1979
 By middle of May 1979

- By the end of December 1978
- By middle of March 1979
 By middle of May 1979

Approximately the same times as for Juniors.
