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## Editorial

# **Bowled Over at The Open**

MUCH HAS been written and reported over the last few weeks in promoting the 1990 Leeds English Open. When one has been bombarded with literature from Head Office, as I and surely most of the subscribers to this magazine have, the event quite often fails to live up to all the hype that has preceded it. Not so this Open — it was a great success. The innovative scheduling which left the Team events to the Sunday, after the individual events, was certainly an experiment that worked and the overall programme allowed journalists to meet the much-needed copy deadlines, giving us national coverage on a scale much larger than table tennis is usually afforded. To improve the playing conditions a 19mm chipboard floor covered the floor of Bowlers beneath the Leeds floors, as was the case in the World Championships in Dortmund and it was even suggested to the BBC Grandstand producer that it could be wise to record the semi finals of the mens singles as often the semis provide better table tennis than the actual final — this suggestion was taken up, thankfully so after Chen's unfortunate injury, so the cameras were able to record the drama as it unfolded.

#### **Congratulations Manchester**

To sum up — an event that surpassed in quality of entrant and organisational excellence perhaps all that had preceded it — the standard has been set, it must be maintained, surely a fitting climax to our three-year liaison with our sponsors Leeds Permanent Building Society. Before finishing I would like to thank on behalf of the Association the Manchester Olympic Bid Committee for their help in making this Open the huge success that it turned out to be. On arrival at the venue my heart went out to the car park stewards who went about their job on the sort of wet Saturday morning that Manchester seems to have exclusive rights to in such a cheerful manner. We as an Association sincerely hope that Manchester is successful in its bid to stage the 1996 Olympics.

# A Wonderful Start to the Year

The LEEDS English Open (Jan 4 - 7) gave us the most fantastic start to 1990. My warmest thanks to all who made this possible. It was a privilege to be a small part of such a great sporting occasion. The main arenas looked marvellous. Gates were substantially up on two years ago and THEN they were well up on two years earlier. National newspaper space was unrecognisably greater. BBC Grandstand gave us well over an hour, another record. One remembers the days when we were squeezed into 10 minute spells between horse racing. Editor John Philips expressed special words of praise for the attractive play in the Ladies Final. And all that happened despite Chen Xinhua's injury which robbed us of the Men's Final!

#### A wealth of super table tennis...

The Schedule was quite revolutionary. I cannot recall any OPEN Tournament at which so much of the best could be seen. Whilst others clung to easy-toadminister, pre-historic "convenience" schedules, WE made history. No longer were all 8 matches of, say, the last 16 played at the same time, so that the fans could see only one and perhaps bits of another. We staggered the schedules, so that they could see more, far more of the great players of the world. We cannot believe that the world will not follow us in time. The interest of the spectators must be put before administrative comfort.

#### Team Event Experiment another total success

For four marvellous days we moved the sport forward. We gave our supporters four days of the most outstanding play. I regard the experiment of playing the TEAM Event on the last day as a total success.

Top Class Table Tennis had never been played at Bowlers (Old Trafford) before. Yet we were able to put on a superb show.

The Manchester Olympic Bid Committee deserve the highest praise. They shared our vision. They proved that

Indeed Manchester deserves that honour. I think Table Tennis contributed to that aim. It was, sadly, the last major international event of the LEEDS/E.T.T.A. partnership. It provided the best-ever exposure for a sponsor of our sport. We hope the occasion amply repaid the LEEDS for their remarkable support.

#### The State of the Game ....

remains healthy and is getting better all the time. The drop of over 3% in Local League Affiliations remains a disappointment, but almost every other activity is showing increases in popularity, some quite startling! County Championships are engaging over one thousand players. This is only part of a remarkable revival in week-end play, since increases in British League, Veterans, Tournaments, and particularly for Juniors can be recorded.

John Blackband, the Chairman of the English Schools TTA, tells me that their Under 11 scene is a real growth area. Our own National Under 11 Championships have attracted larger entries every year.

Journalists tell me that they are getting far more space, because so much more is going on.

Retailers and Distributors report increased sales.

The financial situation of the Association has never been stronger.

Soon we hope to announce a Development Scheme, which will help our members make the sport grow at the grass roots and grow faster.

We have left behind an era of low public image and morale and financial crisis. An exciting future is ours for the asking.

#### An addiction...

I see, to be frank, only one danger and that is in our minority addiction to shooting ourselves in the foot, particularly in press statements which have no remote relationship with honesty or trust. These present me with no personal problems, but they are no good at all for the sport, for our image and reputation with media, sponsors and the wider public. A leading player's illconsidered remark will be reported over and over again if it is good copy or is perceived as such. The sport suffers, no one else. If any of you see rubbish in the press, don't be shy to let both journalists and those quoted know what you think.

#### No question of resignation...

As I told you previously, I shall stand again for re-election. If successful, I shall serve for another year. I did remind journalists recently that I am up for re-election every year and it is then that my members express their view of my stewardship. This is in no way affected by illconsidered and untrue remarks attributed to a leading player. My door is always open and I spend many hours dealing with members' problems. No request



has been left unanswered. No one has been ignored. I would hope therefore that, before anyone rushes into print, they might ascertain the truth or otherwise of what they are saying. Our members know what is true and what is not. Sponsors do not know the sport and therefore they may give a wide berth to a sport in which a few are so addicted to adverse publicity,

Table Tennis is now very much in the public eye. Three years ago it was almost forgotten. We all have increased responsibilities to our great sport. It remains bigger than any of us.

# English Schools Table Tennis Association

ONLY ONE of the eight holders of Dunlop National School Team titles fell by the wayside when the county qualifying competitions were completed in the Autumn Term.

Ifield Community College, Crawley, ended a sequence of 15 consecutive seasons in which they have had a team in the Area Finals when a raw Boys' Under-16 quartet lost 7-1 to newcomers Oathall School, Haywards Heath in the West Sussex play-off. Ifield's Boys' Under-19 crown is up for grabs, having been winners for the past two seasons and prefixed in 1987 by their first national title when a side including Scott Greenbrook and Alan Cole lifted the Boys' Under-16 "Leech/Carrington Trophy".

Ifield's mentor, genial science master Andy Meads — no mean player himself — when asked if it was a case of rebuilding a new squad told me: "Just a mere hiccup on the production line".

But in Cumbria it's a case of "business as usual". Parkview School, Barrow-in-Furness have four teams through to the Area Finals at Chorley, spearheaded by the rapidly-improving Kevin Hodgson in the Boys' Under-16 event. Neighbours Yarlside Primary School are also seeking national glory and yet another Barrow team, Barrow Sixth Form College, have teams in both Under-19 categories.

Kesteven & Grantham Girls' will be hoping to retain their Under-19 title but they could well come unstuck if they encounter Thomas Peacocke School, Rye (East Sussex) in the national 3-way Finals which are due to take place at Lea Green, Matlock, on Saturday, March 17th. The Thomas Peacocke girls finished in third place last year in the Under-16 event but step up to the Under 19's with the same line-up that uniquely includes the three Wilson Lian, Natasha and sisters Claudine in their quartet; they will be keen to fare better this time.

Ian Marshall, teacher i/c at The Grove School, Market Drayton, says it will take a good team to oust his Girls' Under-16 team who successfully defended their crown last year. With established juniors such as Elizabeth Creasey, Claire Marshall, Sarah Creasey and Tracey Garratt making up the Shropshire team I can but agree.

Peniel Academy, Brentwood, won their first national schools honour last year. They have SEVEN teams through from the Essex County competition, gaining representation in the Under-11 events for the first time. With only 72 pupils on the roll this is a considerable achievement and already teams in the South-East are bracing themselves for determined challenges from Peniel.

Cumnor House School, Croydon, have sped to five national titles in the last four years. They have seen off opposition in the Surrey Metropolitan stage but their Boys' Under-13 team will probably find themselves "stumped" by a school cricket tour to Australia which — if Cumnor qualify — will rob them of three players. Only England Cadet No 4, Darren Blake, has opted to stay at home.

Competition Secretary Geoff Gardiner was chasing last-minute entries when I spoke to him shortly before Christmas, but he hopes that entries will be up on last year's total — even if only marginally so.

# A Chinese Puzzle to be Unravelled

(The following is based on an article that appeared in The Times on December 12th, 1989 and is reproduced by kind permission)

CHEN XINHUA, perhaps the greatest defensive table tennis player of all time, an acrobatic extrovert who once won the World Cup and who was twice a member of world title-winning sides, has quit China for good and in December in Huddersfield married a local girl, Jeanette Wood.

They met at a party in Manchester in 1988 when, according to both of them, it was "love at first sight." But this most startling of romances, could lead to a sporting controversy because Chen may find it more difficult to gain selection for an England team than to win a wife and raise a family here.

The cultural hurdles have been difficult enough. Xinhua spoke hardly any English when he met Jeanette; now he manages with pidgin, resourcefully supplemented by a lexicon of gestures.

Next season Chen will have satisfied the ITTF two-year residential rule. And though he is 29 and practises little, he is arguably still too good for any one in this country. But at the moment some players and officials, too, seem sceptical of his suitability or value for England.

In a match for his Ormesby club this season, Chen beat in quick succession both Alan Cooke, the national champion, and Desmond Douglas, Britain's best player of modern times. "He did them both, then called me over and showed me how," said Matthew Syed, another England international who is probably Chen's biggest supporter here.

"He keeps a book on all the players. He's fantastic. He knows so much about everything — tactics, preparation, technique and life. I love him"

Chen certainly has more than a hint of charisma. Throughout an interview lasting an hour and a half, he was rarely without a smile. Beneath the halting progress of his words one senses an engine room of personality. He does not dwell on his homesickness or his alienation, though for a year after coming here he lost nearly all motivation for table tennis.

Chen acknowledges that his wife and their child have given him sufficient happiness and confidence to consider trying to restart an international career that he thought was over as far back as 1983, when the ITTF changed the rules regarding the rubber surface of the bat, making it harder for defensive players to survive.

However, Xu Shaofa, coach to the Chinese team, pulled a master stroke of selection. He told Chen there and then he would play in the 1985 world final, asked him to practise to this end alone, and told him to play outside of China only occasionally. Chen's rare style was kept as a secret weapon. He duly won both his matches in the final and China retained the title.

That was the same year in which Chen formulated his plan to come to England. "I like everything here," he says, perhaps not intending to be bland. His standard of living, even from the relatively modest sums he gets from coaching, from exhibitions and from playing in the British League, is far better than it was back in Fukien, the coastal province opposite Taiwan.

Such financial incentives may help Chen to preserve the exhilarating style in which he chops and floats balls back from the most amazing distances, occasionally from outside the barriers, and always with the most marvellous pitter-patter of footwork and speed of hand and wrist. He performs a remarkable exhibition trick in which he blows the ball up and gets it to perch above his nose.

It is this strong sense of humour that may have helped him shrug off the disappointment of being ordered to throw his world semifinal two years ago in New Delhi against Jiang Jialiang. Chen can now reveal another of the game's great mysteries — how the Chinese organize their match fixing, for which they have long been noted.

"It is decided before the tournament who is the No.1 and he is the one who must win," Chen said. The man who has been giving the orders is apparently Xu Shaofa.

Chen's value to England as a coach could be considerable, and he is puzzled about not being used in this capacity more often. He is also keen to play for England now his motivation is returning. But to avoid disappointment he may need further to improve his English and convince the doubters that his cultural integration will become complete.

The dilemma has been seen elsewhere — between 180 and 300 Chinese players are now estimated to be coaching or playing in foreign clubs, according to the Beijing magazine, *China Sports*. Three of them, Geng Lijuan in Canada, Wang Xiaoming in France, and Ding Yi in Austria, are playing for their adopted countries.

Chen reckons he could be a force for England until after he is 35 and that he will be here for the rest of his life. But though love may stand the test of time, ambition could have a rougher ride.

# Alan and Alison share £900

ENGLAND's top-rated pair Alan Cooke and Alison Gordon were both clearly delighted to be able to confirm their number one rankings by winning the Stiga-sponsored tournament with a generous prize fund of £3,000. Both survived without being defeated all day, although Alison was a matchpoint down against Joanne Shaw early on.

Group 1 in the men's event was dominated by Cooke. Both his opponents who might have given him lots of trouble got into trouble themselves - Sky provided the media with their early edition stories as he badly gashed his thumb as he was losing 11 - 16 in the third game to Matthew Syed.

"I must be the unluckiest player around" said the Essex player as he got in the ambulance bound for Clacton Hospital where he received six stitches. That was the end of the day for Skylet and it was also "curtains" for Syed who reached the semi-finals but was forced to retire with severe pains in the right leg and shoulder. At the time it was thought to be cramp, but now the Reading defender is having a thorough medical checkover to get to the bottom of the problem.

#### Poor Start

Michael O'Driscoll, my choice in the Daily Telegraph as hopefully, the young man to watch in 1990, had a bad start at Clacton. He was defeated 8, 16 by Syed and 13, 15 by Skylet Andrew. Later the young star from Mirfield managed to scrape through against John Souter -13, 22, 20 and went one better in his last match to beat Sean Gibson.

Meanwhile in Group 2, Desmond Douglas lost the middle game to Glenn Baker, but tightened his grip by allowing the Surrey man only six points in the decider. In the same group Bradley Billington started off like an express train stopping Chris Oldfield 19, 11 and Baker 13, 12. But then Billington lost to Nicky Mason. But the England No.3 had earlier fallen to Oldfield, a result that effectively put Billington into the semi-finals and saw Mason finish the day in seventh place. Steve Dorking is the man always likely to cause an upset. On this occasion he took the first game from Desmond, and landed 19 points in the third game. In the last round Douglas again dropped the middle game to Mason and came through at 17 in the third. So, Douglas and Billington went through from Group 2, but Douglas received a walk-over against Syed, whilst Cooke reached the final after a spectacular win over Billington 21, 17.

Cooke was gaining confidence all day. Revenge was on his mind to try and reverse a heavy defeat by Desmond ten days previously at Brentwood. The conditions at the two Essex venues were certainly different. At Brentwood, the much smaller playing area and the 300

fans created a heated atmosphere. especially in terms of temperature. Cooke was not happy in the heat, but he was happier in the cooler conditions at Clacton. It was an exciting final with the Derbyshire man only just managing to contain some devastating blocking and backhand counter-hitting from Douglas. Cooke had some difficulty maintaining the pressure against the wily Walsall professional, but finally triumphed 18, 20 to win the £500 first prize.

#### Slimline Alison

Having shed 10 pounds in weight after an attack of 'flu Alison Gordon came down to remote Clacton determined to win some money and she reached her goal.

Julie Billington might have been the giant-killer in Group 1 of the women's tournament, but she also lost her first two games to Ali Gordon and Jill Harris. Andrea Holt's career continues to flourish. On the way to the semis she brought down Shaw, Debbie Toole, Harris (12, 12) only losing to Julie Billington 20, 17.

The surprise in the group was three defeats for gallant Jill Harris who although newly promoted to England No.5 finished at Clacton at No.10 with only Debbie Toole and reserve Sally Marling under her.

#### Absent

In Group 2, Fiona Elliot, the holder of the title was absent with liver trouble, so Lisa Lomas made hay whilst the sun shone with five wins in a row against Bardwell, Houghton, Giles, Lower and Marling. The question then arose who would go through to the semis with Lisa? The answer came from Kent, where Juliet Houghton must have made further progress up the England ratings when she defeated Marling, Bardwell, Giles and Helen Lower -20, 19, 17.

Into the womens semi-finals where Andrea Holt found few problems in stopping Juliet Houghton, but Lisa Lomas found that her defensive web was not quite strong enough to cope with the fighting Ali at her best. Miss Gordon asked for an hour's rest before the final but was given only 45 minutes... Lisa took the first game 19, but she too seemed to run out of steam and the national champion pleased her bank manager by winning 13, 15 and the women's top prize of £400.

#### The Venue

Clacton is a pleasant venue, the only real problem is that it is right at the end of the line, so far from everywhere; it is what I call the Clive Oakman Benefit Venue, so close to home for the Essex stalwart that it is all a doddle compared with the thousands of miles that Clive has to transport his equipment nearly every week-end of the season.

#### **Cooke Speaks Out**

At the traditional informal press conference Alan Cooke said he was pleased to be back in the "winner's enclosure" but he also made it plain that he, like a number of the players were unhappy with the decision of the ETTA Management Committee to allow Carl Prean to opt out of the national ranking list. "I would like to know the reasons for the decision" said the national and Commonwealth champion.

# Regional News

WHILST THE Regional Women's Training Seminar planned for the beginning of the season was postponed because we did not feel that we were yet getting to sufficient regional organisers, activity has continued in most regions, and particularly at the local league/club level if not on a regional basis. It will now be held on March 17th at Burton, Staffs. Anyone wishing to attend please contact myself on 0642 322223.

In several regions table tennis was included in the Sports Council's "What's on for Women" day on September 27th. Mike Lewis of the **South West Region** particularly used this as promotion for the Women's International which would follow in Cirencester on 5th October. The South West have also held an information day for the Women's Institutes and this will be regularly followed up during the season.

Ian Marshall reports from the West Midlands that their Regional Girls Club League attracted 10 teams to Market Drayton in the first half of the season. The Women's event, won by Worcester, attracted only three teams. An attempt will be made to encourage more Regional activity from the Birmingham area in the next few months. Liz Wilson and Jenny Heaton are the women's reps in the West Midlands Region.

No co-ordinated regional women's activity so far this season in the South East Region, however, Jane Barella hopes to get a couple of events going before the end of the season and particularly will try to recruit some local league womens representatives to help with the organisation.

Terry Gadsby advises that the Ladies Club in Burton has been in operation for over twelve months now. They have entered a team in the local league and held their first annual dinner. The club meets at the Meadowside Leisure Centre on Friday nights. Terry has also been running a table tennis appreciation course for leisure workers at the Technical College and hopes this will swell interest on the leisure side for women in the East Midlands Region. Jackie Billington will be the women's representative for this region which is good news on the coaching side.

In the Northern Region we have already held a Women's Action Day in Sunderland. The Northern Region Women & Girls League attracted 21 teams for the first rounds held at Mill House Leisure Centre in Hartlepool on 26th November, whilst Seaburn Leisure Centre was the venue for a women's coaches day on 10th December. This proved to be extremely interesting for the eighteen coaches/leading regional players who attended as Jill Parker gave her presentation on the Technical and Tactical Differences between men and women players as well as working with the women on their own techniques. Ian Elvin from the National Coaching Foundation in Newcastle also gave them plenty of food for thought with his presentation on the support available from the N.C.F.

A further session of the Regional League is planned for March, plus two Regional training days for top players with the German coach, Regina Stevens who is currently lecturing at Newcastle Polytechnic. Several sessions for young and beginner players throughout the Region should help to firm up the development which was started last season. Caron Guthrie is the Regional Women's representative, but we are also fortunate in having many enthusiastic women coaches and organisers in the area.

Doreen Schofield is enthusiastic about future developments in the North West Region and is, of course, a top VETS player herself. A member of her local Sports Council, Doreen conducts a junior beginners course in Stockport on Sunday mornings plus an advanced session on Tuesday evenings. Lancashire and Cheshire are also fortunate still to be running their strong Women's Inter-League competition with two divisions.

In the Southern Region, Vera Hutchinson is the Regional Women's representative. Their regional league now has five teams, including O.L.A.P. and Kingfisher of Reading, Cippenham, Aldershot and the Isle of Wight. With the top ladies team from last season having moved into the men's league, this is a creditable increase of three teams.

Mike Hanley, the Regional Chairman for Yorkshire and Humberside has promised to get moving on regional women's development there, but meanwhile the Yorkshire Women's inter-league is still functioning well. These interleagues are great for established league players... playing opportunities for new women and girls coming into the sport is what the regional programme is about.



### JAPAN TOUR

WHILE THE Chinese men's team played matches against England following the Leeds English Open, the Japanese Mitsui Bank women's team played two matches against English club sides, Grove of Market Drayton and World of Sport at Chesterfield. This provided valuable competition for the English women players and we would be interested to hear from any other women's teams who may be planning trips to the U.K. in future as similar matches would be welcomed by several of our women's teams.

Held over two days, the Cadet events on the Saturday and Juniors on the Sunday, the enthusiastic youngsters produced table tennis at its best.


#### Cadets

# Mid-Season Round-up



# Semi Final drama at Bowlers

THE dramatic semi-final meeting between Chen Xinhua and the German champion Jorg Rosskopf was for some journalists the most memorable battle since John Hilton won the European Crown at Berne in 1980.

At the start, it seemed as though Rosskopf, one of the most improved players in Europe had little chance. He lost to 10 in the first game, frequently netting the fierce backspin returns. In the second Chen seemed to be heading for a 2 - 0 lead and a place in the final, when catastrophe struck. At 16 - 11 ahead he went to pick up a ball and was suddenly in severe pain at the base of his back, the sort of sharp, stabbing pain that most people have experienced.

How he managed to take the second game almost immobilised is a mystery. The drama heightened as before the next game commenced attempts were made to strap on an ice-pack as the umpire and the referee became agitated that timerules should not be broken. Picking up the ball became extremely painful as Rosskopf seeing his chance of victory looming, patiently piled on his brilliant top-spin attack to take the next two games 16, 16, to level the score at two games all.

By that time Chen had donned a weightlifting belt some six inches wide, made of leather that looked far too cumbersome to be effective. The tension increased — "pure theatre" said Alan Ransome later, as the fifth game showdown arrived.

How could Chen hope to survive? Steadily, Rosskopf piled on the topspin pressure to lead 15 - 10 and 17 -14. Chen's brave efforts seemed destined to end in defeat, but he was still smiling through the pain.

Incredibly the Chinese player fought back, chopping and hiting winners to reach 20 - 20. By that time, some of the crowd were on their feet urging Chen to victory, which still seemed unlikely. But, it happened like a fairy tale, Chen won the last points to come through 23 - 21 as Rosskopf pushed the last return, laced with deadly backspin into the net.

Bowlers erupted — most of the 1,500 crowd stood in sheer admiration of the bravery of a man who wants to play for England. He won the hearts of English table tennis fans, who now want him in an England shirt, because he is immensely talented and possesses the best personality since the days of Chester Barnes!

Sadly, Chen was unable to appear in the final and Yu Shentong received a walk-over, leaving the question that can never be answered — would Chen have beaten Yu?

#### The Cause of Chen's Pains...

THERE can be little doubt that his re-appearance on the world-class

scene after a gap of three years was the bottom of the problem. Since he left China to live in England the best match-practice he has had has been in the Leeds British League, useful exercise but not the best preparation to meet China's best men and players of Rosskopf's calibre.

The night before the now famous Rosskopf semi-final, Chen got little sleep. His wife Jeanette had a restless night with seven-months-old Tamar, resulting in Chen spending most of the night on the sofa getting about two hours sleep and waking up with a stiff back!

What could have happened is that the family should have stayed in hotel accommodation that was on offer near the venue, so that Chen could have been certain of a night's rest.

### England Women Shine at Bowlers

ALISON GORDON played splendidly throughout the tournament. She was at her best on the second day when she reached the quarter-finals of the womens singles bringing down the South Korean Kim Youn Soon at 18 in the fifth game. Alison went on to trouble Marie Hrachova, but went down in the fourth at 15, whilst Hrachova reached the final by the same 15 in the fourth against Paris-based Xiao Ming Wang.

In the women's singles final Mika Hoshino (Japan) proved beyond doubt that she really is a world topten player, lashing Hrachova 12, 15, 19 in a superbly entertaining match captured live for BBC Grandstand and later repeated on the same programme — such was the quality.

Earlier, Fiona Elliot was highly delighted with her performance taking the former European champion Valentina Popova to 22 in the fifth, after beating Korean Lee Jung Ae in Round 2. Lisa Lomas's defences were

Lisa Lomas's defences were causing some havoc in the women's events but she failed to reach the quarters losing to Moon Jung Im.

Andrea Holt seemed to be heading for a good run in the singles when she beat Kerri Tepper, Miss Tepper defeated Lisa Lomas in the Cleveland team event, so that was no mean performance by the young lady from Ramsbottom, but the pride of Lancashire then lost 9, 16, 13 to Irina Palina from the USSR, a disappointing defeat for Andrea but she is still making progress and holds the England No.4 ranking virtually unchallenged and is always looking for a way forward up the list.

## The International Team Competition

IN DAYS gone by the Asian teams would have swept through the rest of the opposition like a typhoon in the South China Sea. Happily, those days seem to be over. China had to fight for their lives to win the men's final 3 - 2 against West Germany and South Korea were fully stretched to beat France 3 - 2 in the women's final.

Was the move to play the team event at the end a success? The answer is probably in the affirmative. There were certainly large crowds.present on the Sunday, but nowhere near as large as on the previous day. Overall the gate receipts for the whole tournament were about 40 per cent up on the Brighton Centre in January 1988.

Jorg Rosskopf, now firmly entrenched as the West German No.1 will not forget Manchester. He followed his unforgettable defeat by Chen Xinhua by almost winning the men's team event singlehanded over-powering the two top Chinese players Chen Longcan and Yu Shentong in the final, but Steffen Fetzner, although improving, was not quite up to the task of winning singles matches against the top Chinese neither did the world mens doubles champions Rosskopf and Fetzner prove strong enough to beat Longcan and Shentong.

France reached the final of the women's team event with a 3-1 victory over England (Alison Gordon beat Coubat) and two wins by Wang Xiaoming, who also landed two fine wins over South Korea in the final, but Coubat (like Fetzner) was not in the business of overcoming Asian opposition.

#### **Explosive** Cabrera

Returning to the men's event — Belgium, without Jean-Michel Saive were brought down 3 - 0 by England I, as Thierry Cabrera again displayed his explosive temperament. Sitting six rows back two English four-letter words were audible but not apparently to the umpire, although his behaviour was reported to the referee.

England men came through their quarter-final tie with a tidy 3 - 1 win over Japan with Carl Prean dismissing both Saito and Koh. Bear in mind that this tournament was played in Corbillon Cup format — maximum of five games with three players, Alan Cooke played only in the doubles. Des Douglas lost 19 in the third game to Saito. In the semi-final England came under the full blast of Chinese power — Longcan beat Cooke, Shentong stopped Prean-16, 16, 17 with Chen and Wei stopping Cooke and Douglas in the doubles, 18, 18.

#### Best Ever?

England's interest in the women's team event was terminated when after a walk-over against Austria, our girls made Czechoslovakia battle hard before the ladies from Prague went through 3 - 2.

Prague went through 3 - 2. Lisa Lomas and Andrea Holt chalked up possibly their best ever women's doubles win 7, -11, 17 over the highly rated Kasalova and Hrachova. Lisa followed by beating the evergreen Hrachova 11, 21 but Andrea although playing impressively could not get into the final giant-killing act losing the decider to Kasalova.

So the team event ended the highly successful four-day event at Bowlers, still plenty of excitement, although the drama of the previous day in the men's singles semi-finals was still fresh in peoples minds, it was as they say on stage, a difficult act to follow.



## **Ripples in a Pond by RICHARD EATON**

THE RIPPLES from Chen Xinhua's magnificent performances in reaching the final of the English Open will certainly continue for months. They may be seen and felt a lot longer than that if it all leads to his being selected for England after be becomes available in May.

This is more than possible. A substantial shift of opinion came about at Manchester just within two or three days. Several leading figures in English table tennis expressed different points of view after Chen had played his heroic, televised match against Jorg Rosskopf in the semi-finals. No person, not even one fluent in English, could have made his case for inclusion much more eloquently than this.

Among those who admitted to a significant shift of attitude was Johnny Leach, the popular President of the English Table Tennis Association, "If it came to a vote now I would have to be in favour of Chen," he said. "But I wasn't really in favour before," added Leach, a man who has been twice a world champion, has travelled dozens of countries, who played alongside two successful immigrants in England teams, and who is unlikely to be prejudiced.

Leach had shared doubts with a number of others. Was the ITTF two-year domicile rule really right? Was Chen going to fit in? Would people accept him? Would they like him? The answer, on the evidence of the reaction of hundreds of spectators who stood to acclaim him as he left the court, seems to be that they will love him.

The earlier doubts about Chen also surrounded his motivation. For a year and a half since his semiretirement three years ago, table tennis had carried a muted appeal. By his own admission Chen had not trained or practised hard. But that may be behind him.

Nobody who fought through a back injury, to lose a long lead, save a match point, and then win the way Chen did, is lacking motivation. grimacing and gesticulating for help, Chen could easily have quit. From 16-11 in the second game onwards he was in difficulty and discomfort.

It was a pity that the television coverage, which was in some respects good, failed to capture much of this drama. Ice-packs, belts, towels and massages were all tried at the courtside between games, and Chen must have come close to being disqualified, judging from the gestures of officials during the delays. It was a great story. More to the point now is that it is wonderful to see the rebirth of desire, perhaps the rebirth of a world class player.

What was also instructive was Chen's match the day before against Kiyoshi Saito. This fascinating contrast in styles nearly ended with the left-handed pengrip player from Japan wearing Chen down. The Huddersfield man was

two games up, and then struggling at 16-16 in the fourth. His brain and his great skill with spin serves got him out of trouble. But his physical fitness didn't. This is something that may need some rebuilding.

Chen's survival actually gave Carl Prean an excellent chance of winning the tournament. He had beaten Chen on their previous two meetings. But the Germany-based Englishman narrowly failed to get past the German number one, Rosskopf, in the quarter-finals, losing 21-9, 12-21, 21-16, 18-21, 13-21.

From early in the fourth game there was a pattern developing that Prean could not change. Rosskopf was getting powerful forehands in early and Prean was going back. Prean tried to play backhands down the line to keep out of difficulty but could not do so quite accurately enough.

No denigration intended, Prean had produced one of the finest performances of his career earlier in the day when he beat Chen Longcan, China's top player, a former World Cup winner, and the number three seed, by 21-11, 21-12, 20-22, 21-12. The pengrip player's backhand side could not handle Prean's back-

hand hit with the pimples out, and when Longcan tried to take chances and jump in with the forehand he often missed. Prean made sure that he felt obliged to keep taking the chances and that his error ratio remained abnormally high. It was the first time that the Isle of Wight player had reached the quarter-finals of the English Open.

There were other bright moments for England. Desmond Douglas bravely saved three match points in a row against Calin Creanga, a teen-aged Rumanian living in Greece, and then fell to Chen Xinhua. But the legendary lefthander showed that he looks good for the forseeable future, even at 34.

The women showed signs of good form too. Alison Gordon fought very hard, both while beating South Korea's Kim Youn Soon to reach the quarter-finals and whilst losing in four games to Marie Hrachova, the former European number one. Lisa Lomas actually beat Hrachova - a tremendous result - in the team event. And Fiona Elliot was within one point of beating Valentina Popova, the former European champion.

But spare a thought for poor Nicky Mason, another who had match points to win. The England number 3 also led by two games against Patrick Chila of France before losing 22-20 in the final game. Chila went on to bring down the seeded Steffen Fetzner. And Mason is one of those likely to be

**Don Parker's Captain's Report** 

# 1989 Scandinavian Open Championships

THE 1989 SOC took place in Jonkoping and were organised by the KFUM (YMCA) Table Tennis Club. Jonkoping is situated in the centre of Sweden on the lake Vattern and is Sweden's ninth largest municipality, with a population of 110,000. Fortunately, Jonkoping also has its own airport and we were therefore able to fly direct, some of the team from Manchester via Copenhagen and the remainder from London via Copenhagen. The Manchester contingency consisted of Alan Cooke, Andrea Holt and myself, while the London group consisted of Nicky Mason, Alison Gordon, Skylet Andrew, Carl Prean, Lisa Lomas and Matthew Syed.

The arrangements in Jonkoping were excellent - a very good hotel situated 200 metres from the hall; excellent conditions in the Tipshall. It was interesting that they laid a special wooden floor and used our 'Leeds' blue for enhancing television presentation. However, in my opinion the major disappointment was the schedule in that they attempted far too much on the first day, three rounds of the team event and two of singles. Not only did this mean that 80% of the players present had no more singles matches after the first day, it meant an early start and late finish and matches running late. Of our five men, four played over one hour later than scheduled (Nicky Mason three hours!), while our women were still playing at 22.30, having risen at 6.30 for 09.00 team matches.

After excellent results in Hungary and good performances in Austria and Detroit, the team were unable to maintain the momentum. The women started with a good win against Sweden II but unfortunately found the North Korean team too strong. The men despatched the Finnish team quite comfortably but could not produce their best form against Germany, losing 3-1. Alan Cooke won the one match, beating the highly ranked Georg Bohm, producing some of his best form this season. Carl Prean, who has had a quite magnificent start to the season, semi-final of Austrian, final of Hungarian and six out of eight in the European League campaign (although two of these wins were against, according to Mr Greenberg, second rate Swedes, Eric Lindh - No.7 in the World and Peter Karlsson, the then leader of the Stiga World Grand Prix!), could not produce his best form. In fact, if anything he looked slightly jaded, losing two straight to both Rosskopf and Bohm.

For the men the draw was most unkind, producing some very tough first round encounters. Alan Cooke drew the Japanese defensive player Hiroshi Shibutani and lost 3-1, while Matthew Syed drew the second Japanese defensive player Kohji Matsushita and played extremely well, losing a closely contested match in the fifth game. Playing virtually straight after the Germany match, Carl was unable to regain his composure, losing 3-1 to the young Czech player Vimy. Nicky Mason played reasonably well against Thomas von Scheele, only to lose three games by the narrow margin of 21-19. Skylet Andrew beat one of the young Australian players to find himself against Eric Lindh. Skylet played extremely well and in fact had a match point with service in the fourth game, before losing 19 in the fifth.

In the women's singles Andrea Holt progressed to the second round with a win against Cristina Semenza of Italy and was joined by Lisa Lomas who had a very convincing win against Ilka Bohning of West Germany. Unfortunately Alison, who has so far not been able to reproduce last season's form (a fact that our 'Dutch'? observer in Sheffield fails to take into account with his suggestions of English philanthropy), lost 3-1 to Germany's Katja Nolten. In the second round Andrea performed very well against the very strong North Korean Yu Sun Bok, despite losing 3-0. Lisa produced her best form so far of the season and in fact

led 2-0 against Europe's No.3, Csilla Batorfi. Unfortunately for Lisa, Batorfi clawed her way back into the game and ran out a comfortable winner in the deciding game.

### The London Junior **Table Tennis Scheme** by DICCON GRAY and ALAN HARWOOD (Tournament Referee)

FUNDED JOINTLY by the Sports Council and the London Boroughs Grant Scheme, the LJTTS strives to create a support structure for all young Londoners to have the opportunity to play and enjoy table tennis.

For the purpose of organisation, London is split into five areas with each area having two cycles consisting of:

1) A demonstration

2) A Coaching Day

3) A tournament

Players are graded according to age, playing experience and ability (advanced, intermediate and novice categories which leaves scope for total beginners).

Results from each area are then computerised on a ranking list, sent out to every participant and the local media. Winners in each age group and category go forward to the 'All London' final which in November was played at the Jubilee Sports Centre, Westminster.

#### LJTTS ALL LONDON FINALS

Just under 100 children competed in Westminster on 26th November and each player had on average 5 games with group systems employed throughout. It was encouraging to note that over one third of competitors were novices (never having played in any league

or competition). However a major problem is finding suitable clubs for them to receive coaching so that they improve and eventually start to play in ETTA leagues and other competitions.

Despite lists of "Clubs in the London area able to accommodate new members" being distributed on the day, there must be scores of other clubs which could and should appear on this list. If your club is one of these, give Diccon Grav (National Development Officer) a ring at the ETTA on 0424 722525.

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## **Massive Entry for Essex Junior** Select by ALAN SHEPHERD

DESPITE an even more massive entry than usual (376) the tournament ran smoothly, and the experiment of scheduling Junior day so that the Singles Finals were played in mid-afternoon was thought by most people to have been a great success. Maybe 300 spectators on the benches produced a terrific atmosphere and the players responded to it. The Junior Boys Final was contested sensationally by the 11th and 16th seeds Howard Whewell (Lancs) and Colin Bowler (Beds) resulting in a hard fought victory for Howard 16, -11, 19. It was another example of coach Lloyd Lewis's magic.

One of the earlier shocks had been the defeat of Grant Solder, the No.1 seed and holder, not quite over a bout of flu, by Alan Cole (Sussex), in a splendid run to the semi-final which had also taken out No.5 seed Brian Mileham (Kent). Another had been the arrival in the semi-final of the unseeded cadet Alex Perry, who started in Group 52, profited by the absence of James Ovekunle and climbed en route over Steven Meddings (Warwicks), Gavin Yates (Oxon), Gareth Jones (Yorks) and Neil Bevan (Cornwall) the No.3 seed - all in straight sets. The last shock was reserved for Andrew Eden (Lancs) the No.2 seed, who was put out by Marc Priddle (Berks) also unseeded, and having started in Group 11.

The Junior Girls Final was more predictably fought out between Sally Marling (Yorks) seeded at No.3 and Sara Williams (Middx) seeded No.5. This was another tremendous match, which was won by Sara -19, 19, 16. She certainly did it the hard way, battling past Cathy Sibbald (Essex) 12, 17, Dawn Barnett (Oxon) 17, -12, 11, Alison Gower (Essex) 25, -20, 17 and Ellen Meddings (Yorks) -16, 17, 7. Sally had a tough Round 2 match with Nicola Cracknell (Berks), saw off the other Meddings (the Warwicks one), then had a great semi-final win over No.1 seed Joanna Roberts (Yorks) -18, 17, 16.

The Boys Doubles event was an amazing, but well deserved triumph for the No.5 seeded pair, Jason Bamford (Derbys) and Darren Howarth (Lancs). They survived all sorts of crises and match points in their semi-final against that tenacious pairing of Paul Carter (Surrey) and Alan Cole (Sussex), before winning 18, -17, 22. The other semi-final was equally exciting. Alex Perry (again!) was there, partnered by Spencer Thompson (Kent). They had reached there with close, straight sets wins over but Ian Black/Howard Whewell and Marc Greenwood/Martin Adams, while their opponents Andrew Eden/Brian Mileham arrived via a series of easy wins. However, it was the No.12 seeds (Perry/Thompson) which got through to the Final by -17, 20, 19, where at last they met

their match, with victory going to Jason and Darren by 14, -15, 7.

The Junior Girls Doubles again saw the top seeded pair depart without getting to their allotted position, although it was only after a long drawn out semi-final that Ellen Meddings and Alison Gower were beaten by Nicola Deaton and Sara Williams. No.2 seeds, Joanna Roberts/Caroline Buckley had their work cut out to beat Claire Marshall/Nicola Meddings by 19, -19, 17 and the two Marling sisters by 12, -16, 15, but won the Final comparatively comfortably (17, 17) against the No.3 seeded pair.

Cadet day was highlighted by an Alex Perry and Clare Pengelly bonanza for Devonshire, as they carried off three of the four major titles. He was only prevented from doing so by a magnificent performance against him in the semi-final by Neil Bevan (Cornwall). This was disappointing if you were from Essex but great table tennis for the neutral or Cornishman !!

Notable wins for two of our girls, though, when Sarah Gardner and Nadine Barthee both overcame deficits of 12/18 in the decider and beat Hayley Beaumont and Samantha Marling respectively.

In the latest published Junior Computer Ranking Lists, Grant is down to No.2, and then we have Keith Buers, Cris Sladden, Matthew Reid and Gary Tendler at 41, 44, 52 and 56. In the girls list, Alison Gower and Linda Radford are at 3 and 5 while Nadine Barthee and Ruth Cleminson have progressed to 24 and 28. Sarah Gardner is now at 34 whereas previously she was unranked. In the Cadet Boys Ryan Savill has leapt dramatically to No.7, chasing Cris Sladden, who has dropped one place to No.4. Vincent Avery has climbed to No.25, just behind Paul Hudson at No.20. In the Cadet Girls Jenny Coleman has achieved her highest position yet, at No.6, our next best being Claire Rowlands and Cathie Sibbald at Nos 32 and 35.

Our Senior Second team has played two more matches and I am delighted to note that they have won both of them, one against Cornwall (9-1) and the other against rivals Middlesex II (6-4). As a result we have moved up to third in the League. John Dennison, Richard Darnell, Ian Attridge, Julie Askem and Kate Gower have played in all matches so far.

When Brian Theil started to collect names of players he considered good enough to represent the league in the Essex inter league he ended up with a list of 72 names. Great Holland "A" have a very strong squad of players and look set to retain their title, their only serious challengers are Leisure Centre "A", who have John Leith leading them. If John could play as well in normal League matches as he does when he plays for the Essex Veterans' team. he would be very dangerous, as he hasn't lost an Essex game for a number of years.

Earlier the winning partnership had accounted for former county players Caroline Perkins and Joanne Abbott in the semi-final, after trailing midway through the decider but once again it was a day when the true spirit of table tennis was seen at its best.

In the local leagues, Well Connected, with all six of their talented squad occupying places in the top eight of the Pennine/NCTTA Computer Ranking List, carry all before them at Northampton, Kettering and Wellingborough, but it is former county star Keith Nicoll, languishing at No.20 who takes the individual honours for the final months of the 1980's, just as he had taken them at the start of the decade, when he monopolised both the Northants County and the Kettering League Closed Tournaments.

In successive matches, Nicholl, playing for his very first club Rothborough, and without the benefit of practice, produced two scintillating performances. First he destroyed his three Kettering Town A opponents in less than twenty-five minutes for the loss of fifty points, and then followed up with an unique hattrick against Well Connected, with both recent County Closed finalists Andy Edmonds and Andy Trott, together with Richard Elliott, making up a distinguished trio of victims.

IT HAS become rather a tradition at the end of a season to reflect on the previous year in the form of a review, therefore I have decided not to do one. Instead I thought it might be interesting to report on some of the achievements that occurred ten years ago in 1980.

The Ranking List 10 years ago bared little resemblance to that of today's. Top spin tornado Joe Pyle had secured the No.1 spot for two consecutive seasons. One thing that has not changed over the last decade is the success of the county team, even in 1980 the team were in battle for the coveted bottom place in section 3D of the County Championships. There were nearly 600 entries for the 1980 County Tournament, a slight drop on previous seasons. However, the action was as good if not better. Pre-Tournament favourites were the in-form Barry Yates and Gilbert Roberts. However, none could keep their nerve and surprisingly both lost in the early stages. Well known on the Vetts circuit, Cleve has spent many hours collecting and editing material, and hopes to have done much to ease the communication problem with an invaluable compendium of information directed not only at those players prominent in County events, but at all the enthusiasts throughout the 21 affiliated Leagues.

A feature which is likely to have the greatest influence in stimulating player interest is the re-introduction of the once very popular, but n w long-dead Yorkshire Grading Scheme in a new and computerised format.

Following the success of Neil Bevan in the Cleveland Open, Neil is now officially ranked at No. 1 as a Junior, which is certainly the highest known ranking achieved by anyone in recent years in the South West Region.

Cornwall is staging the Western Counties Championships at the end of the season — date to be confirmed later, and venue — also to be confirmed, but probably at Launceston College.

News from Val Clack the South West Region & Southern Coaching Officer — the following were successful in passing on to higher status as Assistant Coaches, Sarah Devine (Swindon), Ron Chapman (Amesbury), Pat Baldwin (Ringwood), Jim Sampson (Swindon), John Archer (Bath), Matt Ruck (Bath), and finally Lesley Dewick (Gloucester).

Thanks to sponsorship from an anonymous source, the Swindon League were able to launch a new competition comprising of two players per team versus each other — plus a doubles, response to this new venture was great from all sides and the organisers were able to form 3 Divisions ie: A Premier Division, a Junior Division and a Youth Club Division, all under the auspices of the Swindon League.

Just before Christmas, 1 had a very pleasant surprise — there was a knock on my door which my wife Gladys answered and someone asking to see me. I have to admit upon coming face to face that I could not place this visitor, you see we had not met for at least 34 years. The person in question was Bournemouth's Chairman David Woodcock. David of course started his table tennis career in the Gloucester League some 40 or so years ago and will be well remembered by many of us old un's.

Don't make it another 34 years Dave before you call again because I most certainly will not be around.

And finally, I heard from Tom Honey, who for many decades did sterling work for Cornwall, Tom now is a resident of Girvan — North of the border, tells me that the nearest he is to organised table tennis is some 30 miles away. With my very limited knowledge of Scotland perhaps skis and snow shoes are the order of the day and night for getting around.

Come back Tom, all is forgiven for leaving the South West Region.

# Southern Region

THE TWO top of the table clashes between Kingfisher and Cippenham ended all square with the result that Cippenham enter the new year as leaders of the Mens Premier division whilst Kingfisher lead the Ladies.

In the mens' match Steve Joel, home from University, was the architect of Cippenham's victory with three wins as his team raced into a 5 sets to love lead before Kingfisher fought back to give some respectability to the final score at 6-3

The ladies' match stood at 2 sets all and with Chris Basden well down in the third game against unbeaten Jacquie Lovell it looked odds on a Cippenham double, but Chris fought back to take the game at 21-19 and the match 3-2.

THERE WAS a strong oriental entry for the Finland Open, held in Helsinki from 1st to 3rd December

In the men's team event, China showe<sup>34</sup>t at they are determined to put themselves back on top of orld Table Tennis, as they swept aside a strong Korean team 3-0 in the final.

An out of form Yoo Nam Kyu (KOR) was overwhele 'by Chen Zhibin (CHN) who at one stage led 18-4 in the second set, after winning the first.

A young England team of Bradley Billington and Michael O'Driscoll were defeated 3-1 by Italy with only the demolition of Nannoni by Bradley to cheer about. The 21-8, 21-14 looked even better when Nannoni took the first set against Yoo Nam Kyu in the next round before going down. The other highlight of the men's team was the complete destruction of Matsushita (JPN) by Ma Wenge (CHN) 10-21, 3-21.

In the men's singles, O'Driscoll lost in the second round to Park Chang Ik (KOR) after playing very well to push his opponent to a fourth set. The withdrawal of Kim Taek Soo (KOR) gave Billington a second round win over Nasseir (EGY) despite being forced to a fifth set. In the third round Billington lost 3-1 to Miyazaki (JPN) after going very close to a 2-1 lead.

With no European in the last eight, Chen Zhibin (CHN) took the title, out of four Chinese semi-finalists.

# Comfortable Cruise for Chen by MIKE LOVEDER

LAST year's Middlesex 3-Star Open suffered from a clash with the French Open as leading players were competing abroad. In an effort to avoid a repeat of the experience this year's 33rd Middlesex Open was arranged for a week later in the season — only to clash with the Swedish Open, the Tameside Junior 2-star and the Norfolk County Closed !

Three of the seeds scratched from the Mens Singles including Nigel Tyler who was away in Switzerland finalising arrangements for his marriage, on 23 December, to Inga Schmitz. The absence of Michael O'Driscoll opened up the way for New Zealand's Peter Jackson who had come over from Belgium. However the name of the game had to be "No problems — only opportunities".

With over 300 entries there were some tough draws. Scotland's top 4 players all entered and the Welsh entry was spearheaded by their new No.1 Steve Ward He won his group with a 16 & 18 victory over Scotland's No.4 Dave McIlroy, and then had to play a qualifying round against Ian McLean who he beat -14, 19, 15 only to be beaten in the first round by Paul Whiting, the first player to competently handle his serves. In his group the Devon star had overcome opposition from Craig Bakewell, Adrian Moore and Phil Bradbury

Another first round victim was John Souter, beaten by the improving Jonathan Taylor who went on to beat Nigel Eckersley and Mark Oakley before crashing out to Peter Jackson. Avon's Paul Lewis lost in his group to Dave Solman which allowed Steve Slater to qualify only to lose to Andrew Eden at deuce in the third and who subsequently took a game from Kevin Satchell before losing to him. John Broe went out in round 2 to Eddie Smith -16, -20, but he in turn lost -9, -6 to Chen Xinhua. Dipak Topiwala had a second round walkover and then beat Glenn Baker 24 & 13. Bradley Billington survived a close 3rd round encounter with Chris Oldfield, scraping through 18, -22, 19 in a fast and furious game.

Matthew Syed flew in from Sweden to despatch Dave Hannah in the 3rd round 16 & 22. Prior to this the Berkshire defender had hit off veteran Matt Sheader 3 & 15. Talking of veterans I might mention that group 13 contained four of them! After about a couple of hours the group winner was quickly decided with Brian Allison beating Babs Adedayo 6 & 3.

What can one say about Chen Xinhua? Playing just two days before his wedding did not put him off. He drew the biggest crowds as in the whole of the Mens Singles event he conceded an average of less than 11 points a game. (Incidentally it was his entry form that read Chen. Sin Wa!)

The veterans singles title changed hands in the absence of holder John Hilton.

In the top half Peter Radford came through with a -22, 14, 14 win over Dave Harvey and then beat Andy Meads 15, -16, 13. In the bottom half Malcolm Corking hit through John Taylor 14 & 15 and then beat Keith Horton 22 & 15. In the previous round Keith had accounted for Henry Buist by scores of 6 & 9. Corking eventually beat Radford in the closest of the finals.

In the Women's Singles 15 year old Sara Williams put out Jane Barella in the first round and then went out to Helen Lower. Josie Bongers achieved a useful 10 & 17 victory over Helen Bardwell but then lost to No 2 seed Jill Harris -13, -22. Sue Collier had a tough time. She despatched Joanne Shaw 21, -15, 16 and then lost narrowly to Nigeria's Kuburat Owolabi -12, 20, -20. With Andrea Holt withdrawn for Sweden it was the unseeded Julie Billington who took advantage and she beat Helen Lower 7 & 19 for a place in the semi-finals. Scotland's No 2 Janet Smith came through 12 & 16 against Carol Giles only to fall to Jill Harris. The Women's Doubles left little to comment on as the event went as seeded until the final.

With Chen Xinhua and Matthew Syed scratched from the Men's Doubles the event was left wide open. It was the unseeded John Souter and Colin Wilson who worked their way to the final. In the bottom half John Broe and Dave Hannah came through as expected but they did not meet the opponents they expected in the semi-final. Veterans Malcolm Corking and Stuart Gibbs came through the qualifying rounds and in the second round proper posed serious problems for Bradley Billington and Sean Gibson. The seeds survived the threat -19, 18, 22. However in the quarter-finals they did not survive at all against the Essex pairing of Des Charlery and Dave Newman. In fact they lost -13, 19, -6.

I cannot finish without acknowledging the Lee Valley Regional Park Authority, Butterfly UK Ltd, Ray Perrin Music Management, Maintenance Man and Ricketts Decorating. Without their input the tournament would not have been possible. Thanks too must of course go to Iris Moss, Len Pilditch, John Jermyn and the rest of the organising team — including, let's not forget, the small army of 20 umpires.

## Personality Piece — Guergeltcheva

JOHN WOODFORD talks to the European No.1.

# DANIELA GUERGELTCHEVA

THIS delightful young lady from Sofia is the one name I have great trouble spelling and pronouncing. I usually mumble something like "Gurgle-chaver" but I am told that is a long way from correct! Getting the name right is a problem but once again she came out on top of the European ranking list issued on December 5 and it will be a surprise to many if she does not finish on top of the leader board in Hanover on January 21, at the European Top-12 tournament.

She is now 25, and her native town in Bulgaria is Momcilgrad. She started playing table tennis at the age of seven. The road to the top in Europe took 18 years. "I fell in love with this dynamic sport when I was only seven when my first coach Hristo Hadzsijski took me to a sports hall. After winning my first junior championship I was picked for the Bulgarian national team where I continued preparations to reach the top in Europe under coach Isak Koen who has been my coach since then.

My successes are the results of his work" she continued modestly, "I finished second in the cadet girl's singles in Italy in 1979. I have won the Bulgarian singles title nine times besides many European titles and Open tournaments.

European women are finely balanced at the top of the list but 1 regard Olga Nemes, Csilla Batorfi and Fliura Bulatova as my greatest rivals."

#### **Training Vital**

Asking the usual question on the secret of success she said "I do not think there is any great secret in getting to the top. Enduring training is the most important. The goal is to acquire a diverse technical and tactical background, with a good physical condition, which is definitely necessary.

"My most important task with my coach is improving my service and receiving service. These two points are now receiving special attention from my coach, also I want to improve my backhand shots.

This may come as a surprise to my rivals but my favourite attack is the fast forehand spin."

Questioned on looking outside Europe she said "Asia is the continent that holds many secrets both in sport and in other areas of life. The power relations in the men's field seems to be better balanced now, however European women are still well in arrears.



Daniela Guergeltcheva is Bulgaria's best player. She helped her country move into the Super Division but as many nations have found to their cost, one star player is not enough.

#### The Asians

It is difficult for us to take up the competition with the Asians in respect of speed, endurance and the strength of service. I think that their build makes them very suited for table tennis, but they do not seem to be scoring as many victories over European players as in the past.

If we want to tip the scales our way we should place greater emphasis on developing the finishing hits and counter-attacks."

She concluded "I have a very full season of competition, there are many strong rivals in the field. My most important goal is to hold onto my first place in Europe, for although the road leading to success is not easy, it is far more difficult to stay on top."

Daniela is 26 next July. It will be interesting to see if she can continue to hold back her younger rivals

### **Black & White Photography — helpful hints**

# Get the Picture


BLACK & WHITE action photographs of table tennis (without the use of flash) are particularly difficult and challenging given the level of light usually available at domestic events.

Being an enthusiast in both Table Tennis and photography, I am sometimes asked how to get good results! Whilst I am not exactly a leading expert on the subject a few comments may be helpful, particularly for those of you who wish to submit pictures for the Counties Columns, Leeds British League match programmes etc. What to use: I think the majority of today's SLR cameras would be suitable for use. To date I have used an Olympus and a Nikon. It is important to try to fill the frame/viewfinder with the subject so the choice of lens is quite crucial. Normally a standard lens is out of the question. At the same time you must consider how much it is worth spending on a lens. Some good lenses can be bought second-hand from reputable dealers. At the economic end I would suggest a 135mm lens. My preference is a 180mm lens and, if you have the funds, a 200mm lens is useful! The aperture range of the lens is crucial. Normally you will need one that goes to F2.8.although I should point out that using this aperture will make focussing very difficult. What film? You will need the fastest film you can get hold of. The faster the film, the greater the grain, but we have to live with this problem. I strongly recommend

the Kodak TMAX p3200 and this can be pushed to even greater speeds.

You may have observed that the majority of table tennis photographs are of the player serving because this is when there is least movement. If you cannot get a fast shutter speed you are stuck with players serving unless you want a blurred picture! At the majority of venues I have visited, the lighting will provide for a 3200 film to be used at F2.8 with a shutter speed of 1/125 sec or 1/250 sec — this is too slow for a good action shot.

Therefore it becomes necessary to use the camera in Manual mode. A shutter speed of 1/500 sec is probably the most practical to aim for. To achieve this, compensation can be made when developing the film. If your meter reading is 1/125 and you use 1/500 the film will need to be push-processed by two stops. This means a 3200 film will need to be processed at a 12500 rating. If your meter reads 1/250 you have a choice. Firstly you can use a shutter speed of 1/1000 sec at F2.8 and push process to 12500. Secondly 1/500 at F4 and push process to 12500 to increase your chances of sharp focussing. See what you think of the accompanying picture of Sean Gibson

#### "SPOOF"

IN 1978, Terry Curran (Sheffield) produced a table tennis rubber which he called "SPOOF" and began playing with it in local leagues. Due to the rubber's control quality it enabled Terry to improve his game and turn him from an average local league player into one of the top players in the area.

In May 1987 Terry submitted the rubber to the I.T.T.F. for approval. Since then much correspondence has transpired in which the I.T.T.F. had constantly stated that the rubber was perfectly legal but they would not approve it and talked about a change in the rules. Even though the E.T.T.A. could see no reason why the rubber should not be approved, the I.T.T.F. persisted in refusing to do so. At the World Congress in 1989 the subject of a change to rule was raised, discussed and dropped.

As a result the I.T.T.F. equipment committee tackled the problem by altering the definition of "ordinary pimpled rubber" ie Pimples out was changed from "to be at least 0.5mm long" to "at least 1mm long", and from "to be at least separated by 0.5mm" to "be separated by 1-2mm". This change of definition effectively prevented "SPOOF" from being used outside of local leagues, inter-city and I star tournament play. The I.T.T.F. had previously warned us that there may be a change of definition "Ouote - this modification - not to rule but to a clarification of a rule. is currently the subject of a vote in council (I.T.T.F. 9th May 1989).

Regardless of this change in definition we intend to supply the rubber without the logo for use by local league players.

Considering the length of time (nearly 3 years) that it has taken the I.T.T.F. to resolve this problem one wonders how many of the rubbers already on the market have slipped the net, and why, when you hear so many players and officials crying out for standardisation of racket coverings. "SPOOF' is a long lasting and good quality covering and in no way can be classed as a funny rubber.

I would ask that you publish this letter in the E.T.T.A. magazine in order that the numerous players who are interested in the outcome of the I.T.T.F. deliberation be made aware of the current situation.

#### Cotswold Junior Select 3/4 February 1990 8.30am start

AS IS our custom, the closing date for entries for the 'Cotswold' was agreed as the 23rd December 89. and, in mid-October, 500 entry forms were circulated bearing this date. But, for some reason, of which we are unaware, the Diary listed the closing date as 7th January 1990, which resulted in a December stampede by players anxious to submit their entry. This was further exacerbated by the fact that 100 entry forms sent for distribution at both the 'Cleveland' and the 'Junior Nationals', never appeared 'on the table'. Why? READERS MAY have seen in sections of the Press that a leading player is reported as having alleged 'favouritism' on my part towards my son, Carl. The 'action' quoted was Carl's request to be omitted from the English Ranking Lists, which was granted by the ETTA's Management Committee. I left the room and took no part in the discussions or decision.

To correct any misunderstanding, Carl asks me to point out that at the time of writing he had more computer points than anyone else and would have been at the top of the list, had be remained on it.

No criticism is intended of Stan Lenton, whose generosity has made the Scheme possible over the years.

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
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
