he ninth annual Maui Matsuri, celebrating the life and culture of Hawaii's Japanese- and Okinawan-Americans, attracted thousands of patrons - locals and visitors, old-timers and first-timers alike - to the Maui Community College campus last month. Many of our members performed Okinawan music, dance, and martial art (see page 3) for large audiences.

The MOKK sold its signature sata andagi (Okinawan donut). Our cooking volunteers, spearheaded by June Konno, worked long and hard to cook the estimated 4,500 and agi and separate them into 900 bags of five andagi each.

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MOKK President Joe Toma, who chaired the event for us, organized the operation and sales of our scrumptious treats at the Matsuri. Our pastry's reputation preceded us, and we quickly sold out by 7:00 pm. Even though some of the bags were given to donors and volunteers, we sold well over 800 bags, making over \$4,000! After all expenses were accounted for, this fundraiser netted around \$3,400 for the MOKK.

2009 Maui Okinawa Kenjin Kai Scholarship Recipients

The Maui Okinawa Kenjin Kai has named three Maui high school graduates as its 2009 scholarship winners. Each received a \$1,000 scholarship.

Carli Kubo-Chinen is the daughter of Terry Chinen and Iris Kubo of Pukalani. She graduated from King Kekaulike High School and plans to pursue a bachelor's degree in nursing



at the University of Hawaii at Manoa. Carli writes, "I am half-Okinawan, as my father is full Okinawan. My great-

grandparents Shigeo and Usa Chinen sailed over to Hawaii in the early 1900s from Okinawa. My grandmother has half-siblings currently residing in Okinawa and she visited them a few years ago."

Darin Pasion is the son of Prisciliano Jr. and Dale Pasion of Wailuku. Darin graduated from Baldwin High



School and will study Japanese at the University of Oregon. Darin says, "My recent travels to Japan and Europe has influenced

me to learn about different cultures

and traditions. The Okinawan culture is a small but integral part of my cultural background. As there are many cultural and social stigmas associated with being Okinawan, I have learned to be proud of my Okinawan heritage. Each year during the Japanese Obon Season, I honor my Okinawan ancestors by taking part in the Okinawan Bon Dance. I also listen to Okinawan music occasionally as a way for me to feel connected to my culture. Representing Okinawan heritage has helped me to connect with the culture through their songs and dance." Darin's great grandfather on his dad's side of the family was Okinawan.



Hannah Shimabukuro is the daughter of Gary and Nancy Shimabukuro. Hannah is a graduate of



King Kekaulike High School and will attend Yale University in the fall. She comments: "I plan to study

linguistics

and sociology. Ultimately I would like to work with the Peace Corps or the United Nations, helping establish and protect rights for women. In particular I want to found schools that focus on therapy and healing through an education. I have also been interested in printmaking since the summer of 2007, when I started interning at Hui Press, a local print studio in Makawao. As an individual who believes in education and inalienable rights I feel obligated to help others with the opportunities I have been graciously given by others.

"My great-grandmother, Mitsu Shimabukuro, came to Hawaii in 1919 from Okinawa as a picturebride. In both Okinawa and Hawaii she worked as a teacher. This was rare considering the poverty her family lived in; in fact she was the only member of her family besides her aunt that pursued an education. Her dedication to pursuing a better life through learning has carried on to my family. My great-grandmother's history has contributed to my interest in languages, especially smaller languages like Okinawan that have been subject to many changes. I plan to learn Okinawan and in doing so help preserve the Okinawan culture."



Scholarships were presented at each school's awards assemblies. The recipients will also be honored at MOKK's annual picnic held July 26 at the Velma McWayne Santos Community Center in Wailuku. Since 1977, the Maui Okinawa Kenjin Kai has awarded annual scholarships to outstanding Maui residents who are Kenjin Kai members or of Okinawan ancestry for a total of over \$55,000.

Living National Treasure of Japan Visits New Maui Sanshin Group



iving National Treasure of Japan, Choichi Terukina Sensei, Master of classical Okinawan sanshin in the Afuso style of music, paid a visit to his newest students on Maui on March 28, 2009. The Maui students were excited and a little anxious about their master sensei's visit. However, they were pleasantly surprised to find Terukina Sensei to be a humble, affectionate gentleman with a sense of humor. Sensei had also picked up a little bit of English, too!

Living National Treasure, or Ningen. Kokuhō, is a title awarded in Japan to certain masters of arts or crafts and performance traditions with the goal of preserving skills and techniques in danger of being lost. The Living National Treasure is held in deep reverence in Japan and these individuals are considered "Bearers of Important Intangible Cultural Assets." While staying in Wailea, Terukina Sensei also enjoyed a round of golf, one of his favorite pasttimes. Prior to visiting Maui, he met with friends and students on Oahu and was honored with a Proclamation from Mayor Mufi Hannemann, who designated March 27, 2009, as "Choichi Terukina Day."

The sanshin, literally "three strings," is an Okinawan musical instrument, also known as the shamisen. The Maui class meets in Wailuku and now has an enrollment of 13.
