Recently I was watching a documentary about St Helena called 'St Helena: Án Island in Exile.' For me, it was a mind-blowing video.

The video was taken in 1984, 34 years ago, and was produced by Graham Creelman. People might remember Governor John Massingham was in office that year, the same year Prince Andrew made his historic visit to the island.

34 years ago, islanders could earn approximately £30 a week of which £23 or more would have to be spent for food, so there wasn't much left for anything else. Therefore, back then it was a good thing for most families to have a little vegetable or families to have a little vegetable or kitchen garden to help out. In the video, a box of cereal was

just £1.55 whereas now you will never see a box of cereal under £2 (unless it was nearing being unfit for

human consumption) Today, most people earn

approximately £100 a week and still times are hard. With the increased cost of living on the island it's hard for anyone to save a pound or two for amenities beyond the basic food requirements.

Last week saw the MV Helena deliver the island's stock, (especially the valuable potatoes, which were selling for £13 a bag in some outlets), but it was good to see the frozen goods in the Star had a bit of a decrease in

I bet most shops haven't really unpacked any other items just yet but it would be good to see what the cost of our bitta' daily's and essentials will be.

We do moan about the increase in prices but we can't do without the essentials. It is even a struggle for us who work full-time jobs, so it must be harder for those who are unemployed or on benefits to try to maintain their lives on such slim pickings.

And to be perfectly honest it won't get any easier on oúr little island unless we unite to get our situations, voices and ideas recognised in a way that will benefit ALL. If we don't speak up, the rich will get richer and the poor will get poorer.

AROUND THE WORLD YACHT JOURNEY BY THE HERNE FAMILY

We attended the opening of an exhibition at the museum on Saturday 10 March. This shows the epic voyage of James and Hannah Herne with their children, Joshua, Sadie and Jacob, circumnavigating the globe in their own sailing yacht. It has been an amazing journey for this family.

There are other Islanders who have taken part in yachting; those who crewed in the annual Governor's Cup races from Capetown to St Helena, to those who have crewed chartered yachts globally. But James Herne is the first Islander to have circumnavigated the globe with his wife, Hannah, and their family in his

'Radio St Helena Turns Me On'

John Ekwall returns to the island he helped get on the map

 $oldsymbol{\mathsf{U}}$ ne of St Helena's radio pioneers, John Ekwall (from Sweden), recently returned for a visit to St Helena.

In 1990, John was responsible for the first international shortwave broadcast from St Helena, and the first Radio St Helena Day, alongside fellow shortwave radio enthusiast Jan Tunér.

John and Jan were involved in a competition with other Swedish radio enthusiasts who were trying to contact the most far-flung places on earth; the pair reached out to St Helena.

Radio St Helena Day became an annual event until 2009. Each year Radio St Helena would do an open shortwave radio broadcast from St Helena, and attempt to connect to as

many nations as possible. John first visited St Helena in 1992, and he visited again in 1997.

John was not just a radio enthusiast. In 1996 the Internet was still unavailable on St Helena, and so John created the first website about the island (www.sthelena.se).

New Marine Project Manager

- **Andrew Turner**, SAMS

The Blue Marine Foundation (BLUE) has funded a new marinefocused role within the National Trust.

Beth Taylor, originally from the UK, arrived on St Helena for the first time in February to take up the newly created role of Marine Project Manager for the National Trust.

Beth will be in the role for one year. The role was established in order to boost the National Trust's ability to help with marine issues and marine projects on the island. Beth's focus will be on getting the National Trust involved in marine conservation on St Helena, and collaborating with other organisations who are helping to protect St Helena's marine environment.

"The goal is never to tread on any toes or re-invent the wheel," Beth said. "We want to collaborate with SHG. Annalea Beard has a great team in EMD [Enviromental Management Directorate], and we have been collaborating a lot so far."

Part of Beth's work will involve the

Blue Belt Programme, which aims to protect the marine environments of UK Overseas Territories. St Helena is one of 14 Overseas Territories protected under the programme.

St Helena is designated as a Category 6 Marine Protected Area (MPA), which makes it a "sustainable use" area. This category permits activities like fishing, but ensures the activities are environmentally friendly.

Marine Education will also form a part of Beth's role. Beth aims to work alongside schools and the Education Directorate to develop an "all-encompassing" educational programme. Part of the programme will be to develop an international internship arrangement, students from other countries would come out to St Helena to study the island, and local students would be sent overseas with relevant projects in order to gain a wider understanding of marine issues.

And yet another aspect of Beth's work will involve whale sharks, which are an integral part of marine conservation on the island. Despite having never seen one until arriving on the island, Beth has a particular fascination with whale sharks and their presence around St Helena.

"I'm hoping they will be factoring in both work and play," Beth said.



"I'd never seen a whale shark before I came to St Helena[...] I think St Helena is so fortunate to have them on its doorstep. I'm hoping I can collaborate again with SHG to really push the eco-tourism side of it and also learn more about them."

Beth said a lot of the international interest in St Helena's whale shark population comes from the fact that St Helena's waters house a population that is approximately 50 percent male and 50 percent female; a unique statistic in the world. This means St Helena could be the only, or one of the only, locations on earth where mature whale sharks go to

Marine plastics are becoming a serious issue for St Helena's marine conservation efforts (This was even highlighted by Prince Andrew School students during the Diverse Island Environments Conference in February), and Beth will also focus efforts on this issue.

Beth said the impact of marine plastics can be combated by creating a better understanding of plastic waste within the community, and by seeing this as a worldwide issue rather than just a local one (as a lot of the plastic waste that ends up on St Helena's shores comes from overseas). The National Trust is currently working to re-form the beach cleanup groups that help dispose of the plastic waste that washes up on local shores. Pending funding, the National Trust is planning to pair the cleanups with a new recycling scheme.

Beth worked previously in a number of overseas placements during her career, and most recently was Project Manager for the Manta Trust in the Maldives, where she worked on projects involving the local manta

ray population.

a good spot.'


Sandie also plans to increase the product range in 'Cutting Edge' based on her customers' preferences.

Tasty Bites

After a two-week temporary closure at the end of January/beginning of February, Tasty Bites has reopened in the ESH Business Park.

The restaurant now has an updated menu and new staff/management.

Business is picking up, said the venue's new chef Andre Ferreira, and

he is glad to see that the customer base is mostly Saints.

The ribs (£7) and the mixed grill (£8.50) have been the most popular menu items so far.

Tasty Bites is open 10am-2pm and 6pm-9pm daily, but closed Sundays.

Andre, originally from South Africa and previously employed at the Consulate Hotel, is the new chef. Jo Anne Smith and Ragel Von Wyk, both from Namibia, are the only other two employees.

This month, Ragel will leave and Andre and Jo Anne will oversee the restaurant alone.

But in May, the restaurant plans another temporary closure; the kitchen and interior will be extended, and the patio will be extended and enclosed.

Further menu updates are also planned, as is rental of the restaurant for private events.

Is St Helena Still an Enforced Dependence?

38 years after the Conservative MP Bernard Braine's report, St Helena, A Case of Enforced Dependence, the island is still described by many as an "enforced dependence."

In 1980 the St Helena Legislative Council (LegCo) invited the rightwing MP "to visit the colony for the purpose of studying its problems and recommending possible courses of action to HMG." Braine, who visited St Helena and Ascension Aug. 6-13, 1980, made detailed enquires and came to the conclusions set out in his report.

"The gap between the present situation worrying for Government and people of the colony and the achievement of a more secured and prosperous future can be bridged; the problems are not

insuperable," he said.

Helena has developed significantly since 1980 and some of the problems Braine encountered

have disappeared (to an extent); but new ones have emerged, causing LegCo in May 2017 to overwhelmingly approve a motion agreeing that "a delegation from the St Helena All Party Group should be invited to visit St Helena on a fact-finding mission as soon as is practicable and that funding for this visit should be sought through the Commonwealth Parliamentary Association."

Many are concerned that British aid historically has "barely kept heads above water," determining the slow rate of development and economic

growth.

A prime example of enforced dependence is building a new wharf in Rupert's without stabilising rocks above and then rendering the wharf uncertified, requiring containers from MV Helena to be barged round to Jamestown at additional costs.

The economy needs to grow substantially for St Helena to become wealthier. In her speech Commonwealth Day 2018, Nicole **Economist** Government

Shamier said, "When it comes to being Altogether Wealthier, the problem St Helena is facing is this. £40m of money leaves St Helena every year, the majority of which is spent on the goods we import. And £16m of money is brought into St Helena each year, as a result of international pension payments, investment from overseas and tourism."

£40m going out and £16m coming in means that if it wasn't for Grant in Aid funding from the UK, St Helena would get £24m poorer every year.

It seems likely the budget this year will be a roll-over rather than the preferred three-year's submission for allowing the government more

freedom to plan ahead.

"It would be unrealistic to expect that the problems of this small, remote colony are considered of much importance in Whitehall, but past experience has shown that small problems neglected have an embarrassing habit of blowing themselves up out of all proportion!8 Bernard Braine said.


EMD put on displays at the Mule Yard throughout the week that included videos and magnetic fishing games for the groups of school kids that were visiting the displays each day.

The exhibition at the Museum, Jamestown documents the four-year voyage the Hernes undertook. During their trip, the family of four visited places like Bora Bora, Haiti and the British Virgin Islands.

The three Herne children were young when they left St Helena on Carpe Diem over four years ago; Josh was 7, Sadie was 2 and Jacob was 1.

The kids all spent their early years on the yacht, stopping off at different locations during their travels.

"One day you could wake up in a sea of trees all around you and a lovely beach, and then the next day you're somewhere completely different," Josh said. "I think that's really cool, and that is what I liked the most."

The exhibition at the Museum shows the unique childhood the Herne kids have experienced

Herne kids have experienced.
For the exhibition, the Herne family put together documentation of each place they visited. Writeups, photographs (placed on boards around the main exhibition room) and videos of life onboard Carpe Diem (on looped display on a wallmounted television) are featured within the Museum.

The exhibition shows the unique and adventurous situations James, Hannah and the kids landed themselves in while travelling.

For instance, while visiting Fiji the Hernes contributed to the local community in the aftermath of Cyclone Winston. For over three months, they helped build schools; and they also spent time convincing

passing sailors to come and help in the efforts. Eventually, over 120 people aided with the construction. Photographs show the family at the construction site.

In an attempt to avoid the cyclones and hurricanes, the family made sure to stop off at Hannah's home of New Zealand, where they remained for six months.

"It was really nice to go and see old family and friends," Hannah said. "The children went to school and really enjoyed themselves there. They got into the culture and life and learned a bit of Maori."

Though they've now travelled the globe, the Herne family said they still held St Helena close.

"We had to go round (the globe) to realise this, but we've come back to the most awesome place on earth," James said.

Now, the Hernes are looking forward to their life on the island. They set up a business offering charter services for their yacht. As a further project, they also are aiming to revitalize the St Helena Yacht Club.

The exhibition at the Museum will be open for approximately a month.



Carpe Diem is a 41ft yacht with a single hull. She can house eight people amongst her three double cabins and double birth. She houses two showers and two toilets (heads). After travelling for four years, she now sits back home in James Bay.

Liza Fowler Receives International Recognition

St Helenian Liza Fowler has been featured on the International National Trust Organisation (INTO) website as part of the International Woman's Day event of the UK National Trust.

Liza has been with the St Helena National Trust for five years, and works for the Darwin Invertebrate Survey Project. Below is the Q&A with Liza that is featured on the international website.

What is your job?

My name is Liza Fowler and I am the Invertebrate Education and Project Officer working on the Darwin funded "Securing the future for St Helena's endemic invertebrates" or "The Survey" Project for short on St Helena Island.

How long have you been working for your organisation?

This is my fifth year with the St Helena National Trust, I began my career through the Darwin Apprentice scheme with the "Increasing local capacity to conserve St Helena's threatened biodiversity project", then went on to work as the Invertebrate Education Officer on the "Laying the Foundation for Invertebrate Conservation on St Helena project" ("Bugs on the Brink" for short), and now I am currently working on my third project, the Darwin project "Securing the future for St Helena's endemic invertebrates".

What inspires you most about what you do?

One of the most inspiring areas of my job is delivering my invertebrate knowledge to others. I have delivered invertebrate awareness and education into our primary schools, secondary school, Forest School and public events. I have created an Invertebrate Education Pack for our teachers to continue invertebrate awareness in the curriculum. The bug science team at the Trust has managed to intrigue non-bug lovers as well as those already interested in creepy crawlies, and hopefully this will inspire others to continue the good conservation work relating to invertebrates through future generations.



Why do you think your work is so

important?

I believe that creepy crawlies are much overlooked, they may be very small but they are undertaking great jobs in our environment. Without the decomposers we would be knees deep in poo, without pollinates we wouldn't have food, and in general they tell us how healthy our environments is, and many haven't even been studied yet.

What's it like working as a woman in your organisation?

Overall the Trust is a mixture of females and males and it is a great working environment to be in. The bug team currently consist of all women and we all have a great sense of humour, so it's never a dull moment because someone is always cracking a joke. It is also well balanced as we are never in the office for long periods of time, and we are always working externally with others, whether it is with visiting experts, education in our schools and events or just giving advice to other organisation.

Do you think the industry you work in has changed over the last 100 years for women?

Yes it has changed, as female entomologists used to be overlooked or not given their full recognition. Today if there are women involved

in entomology expeditions or new discovery their names will live on in history.

What question would you like to ask another inspiration woman from one of our international organisations?

I would like to ask the ladies of other international organisations, what inspires you to save our planet from species depletion and is it working for you?

I would also like to say to everyone out there no matter how big or how small our conservation work is we are all making a difference.

Commonwealth Day Celebrations

Prince Andrew School Budget Challenge

One of the last presentations of the day showed younger generations getting involved with, and gaining better understanding of, the key issues and budget on St Helena.

The Commonwealth Day Working Group was comprised of Councillors Derek Thomas (Chairperson), Christine Scipio-O'Dean, Cryuff Buckley, Lawson Henry and Brian Isaac, Government Economist Nicole Shamier, Rob Midwinter (of ESH) and Cheryl Bedwell (of PAS). The group said this year's theme "Towards a Common Future" naturally lent itself toward a focus on St Helena's 10-Year Plan and the Draft Sustainable Economic Development Plan. The group therefore decided that

students from Prince Andrew School (PAS) would be given the challenge of role-playing the Financial Secretary and elected members in discussing and assigning budgets within groups of five eight students. of five-eight students.

Each student group was given 26 real projects St Helena is exploring, amounting in excess of £2 million: The groups had to prioritise the projects, and use an allocated sum of

projects, and use an allocated sum of only £1 million.

The students prepared for the challenge in the weeks leading up to Commonwealth Day, but with dedication and effort while also upkeeping normal daily studies, the student groups managed to have their proposals ready for the Commonwealth Day presentations.

For some of the students, this was their first time public speaking.

their first time public speaking. The challenge was a "Citizenship

Education" activity, which promotes civic education in schools. It was an activity to encourage young people to think about their futures – where they live, their families and their health. The budget challenge gave students an opportunity to express what they feel is important for their futures, to consider how money should be spent and to learn the importance of democracy.

Students experienced how working together can be challenging, but is

together can be challenging, but is necessary to build a better future for themselves and others. Hence, the activity supported the theme for Commonwealth Day – 'Towards a

Common Future.
"It is reall "It is really pleasing and encouraging seeing the students thinking like politicians, as some of the projects are high on the St Helena Government list of priorities for St Helena," said Councillor Derek Thomas after the Budget Challenge

presentations.

Presentation Extracts:

Yr 7 /8 - £440,000 to roads
"The roads on St Helena are our priority because they are in serious need of repair. If they are left in this condition, more and more accidents

are just going to occur.

The roads are always being closed because they are being filled, but that isn't good enough. The roads need to be redone properly so that they won't need maintenance as often. People are spending so much money replacing shocks and tyres on their cars – it's just not fair!"

<u> Yr9/11 - £500,000 to elderly</u>

"Because of the ageing population there will be higher demand for residential care, therefore money can be spent on more and better-equipped housing to suit needs of the residents. E.g. wheelchair access, safety features, etc..

Health carers and home carers need proper training in order to provide a better standard of care."

Yr12/13 - £500,000 to local teaching education

"Additional staff must be fully trained to become qualified teachers capable for teaching a wide range of students, to increase the range of subjects offered with varied qualified subjects offered with varied qualified teachers. Heighten the standards of education across all schools on the island, including the St Helena Community College, to further the development in areas that would benefit the island in the future."

Yr10 - £65,000 to agronomy
"An agronomist would help with
the following - clearing invasive
species from land as this will
provide more room for much-needed government housing and it will allow new endemic plants to be planted on the cleared land.

This would also provide land for a bee farm and flowering plants, bee hives would be kept to ensure the bees safety and allowing them to not

travel too far to pollinate.

This cleared land can also provide the island with different types of fruit and vegetables which would help people to have a better diet and therefore might decrease medical issues.'

Episode 20

Hello for the last time for a while. I have decided that what I was asked to do I have done and that was to give the St. Helena Bee Keepers Association some promotion. All is not rosy and there is a lot of work still to be done that will bring forth sweetness. Everyone must work together and the Association is there for everyone who keeps bees or is just interested in knowing about the hobby and trying to learn more.

The Association is eagerly awaiting the result of the Bees of St. Helena analysis from the UK, hopefully that knowledge will come to the island in a short while. I have been writing my thoughts on the subject of bees for the past nineteen weeks; I am by no means an expert on the subject. Stedson Stroud MBE and Donny Stroud certainly know a lot more than I do and what I have learnt about bee management over the years came from them and they are worth talking to when you need to know something about bees or just interested in a conversation on the topic.

We are all looking for honey and hopefully that will come soon because of the current eucalyptus honey flow. In Southern Africa bee keepers rely on eucalyptus flowers for a honey harvest and it is the same here on St. Helena. What other flowering trees have you seen in abundance like the eucalyptus? What is needed are many flowering trees that follow each other in the flowering stage, that way we would have more honey. There is a lot more to it than an abundance of flowers. There are a few things that need to be in place in order to have a fast and efficient honey flow that will keep the Island satisfied with honey and bottles of honey on the shop shelves where you can take from the shelf at leisure without having to ask someone who has honey for sale. Here is why we cannot have honey when we want it like now with the flu virus. We need to have

(a) Flowering shrubs all year round that produce good nectar and pollen.

(b) Know where to place the

hives so that the bees can forage and not have to travel so far.

(c) Start manufacturing wax foundations locally. The Association now has a machine to do this and it will shortly become available to members. Using wax foundations will speed up the harvest when the honey flow is in abundance which will give you the opportunity of two or three harvests per season.

(d) Know about the correct management of a hive and visit every six weeks.

All of the above are the most important points to consider if you want to produce honey for the family and maybe have a business. It will take many years for the island to be self-sufficient in honey all the year round and have a surplus for export.....Again, everyone needs to come together and talk. There are many by-products that can derive from a beehive. There could be one person just concentrating on the business of processing honey and the by-products. All honey producers would sell to one person. That way all honey for sale would have to meet all of the correct hygiene standards in every respect. And. above all, the honey would be a top quality product carrying the label of choice honey. There are three standards of honey – choice, standard and under grade. Then there is also a requirement for chunk honey in the comb and not strained. I feel sure everyone who

produces honey would want none other than choice honey on the market and this can be achieved by having just one outlet for the product that would have to meet a certain criteria. IF honey is sold by individuals, there is also a requirement of a printed label with weight, area of harvest, when harvested and the name of the owner. Learn how to get the highest standard of the product; no one wants an inferior quality product. They want to taste the true flavour of a blended island honey. St. Helena should have a good product and there is no reason why this cannot be so. There is also a business in the by-products from the hive or the manufacturing of foundation wax sheets. Beeswax from the hive can be sold or exchanged for foundation wax, but the person managing this product can regulate the processed and raw wax material in his small business. There is much work to be done to make the honey production on St. Helena profitable, affordable and manageable and maybe within the next ten years there might be some surplus to market overseas. I have enjoyed writing these articles and I hope to be letting members know of other informative issues that are going to take place. 





Doctor in Disguise: Part 2

Last week, 'Doctor in Disguise: Part 1' covered Doctor Barry's early years, and the beginning of his time on St Helena. 'Part 2' picks up where 'Part 1' left off, at Doctor Barry's experiences with the only hospital on St Helena, which at the time had just been handed over (1834) from the East India Company to the British Government and was not to the standards Dr Barry wanted to see.

Barry reported: "On my arrival I found a want of arrangement in the civil department, particularly the disgusting circumstances of male attendants on female patients, and of course the greatest irregularities. I immediately hired a respectable woman of colour as matron. I have also got a civilian hospital set up in the old brewery — one portion for female, the other for maniacs, who are in awful neglected state."

Then, there was a row; the commissary responsible for supplying food to the hospital, was refusing to supply to civilians. Barry appealed directly – over everyone's heads – to the Secretary of State for War in London. This was unheard of. Barry should have gone through the proper channels, which would have taken years! She was courtmartialled, but so great was her popularity that she was acquitted, winning her point.

The next quarrel was with the chaplain to whom she issued orders, which he refused to obey. Barry then also tried to control the abuse of drugs while on St Helena. This landed her in a row with everybody.

But one row was for a less worthy

A certain Captain Cloete reported that he had said to Barry on one occasion: "A buxom lady called to see the governor on business, and they were closeted together for some time."

"Oh I say Cloete," Barry sneered in reply, "that's a nice Dutch filly the governor has got hold off, what?"
"Retract that vile expression, you

"'Retract that vile expression, you infernal idiot,' said I [Captain Cloete] advancing and pulling his long ugly

A challenge was made and a dual fought with pistols, fortunately without effect.

Being the first woman doctor to practice on St Helena was just one of several firsts in Barry's distinguished career. Some very informative reading about Dr Barry can be found in the Archives at the Castle, Jamestown, and include a 1974 newspaper article relating to a court martial, some signed and hand-written notes, and an interesting transcription prepared by the Reverend Angus Mac Intyre for a Radio St Helena talk in April 1979.

Like all reformers, Barry soon got across the establishment and was finally summoned to appear in court. Barry tore up the summons and threw it in the messenger's hat, threatening to cut the Magistrate's ears off with her sword.

Unsurprisingly, she ended up getting the sack. A final quarrel with the equally quarrelsome Governor General Middlemore ended her days on St Helena. Barry was arrested for this "behaviour" in 1838, and sent to England under arrest. Demoted to Staff Surgeon, the matter was soon forgotten.

Later life

Dr Barry was transferred to the West Indies in 1838, where she dealt with a yellow fever epidemic by cutting the rum rations. More rows ensued, but she was nevertheless promoted to Principal Medical Officer.

Barry was posted to Malta in November 1846. Within a month she took a seat in the local church that was reserved for the clergy, and was severely reprimanded. During her stay she had to deal with the threat of

a Cholera epidemic, which eventually broke out in 1850.

In 1851, she went to Corfu with the rank of Deputy Inspector General of Hospitals, caring for 500 wounded.

Dr Barry was promoted to Inspector General of Hospitals in 1857 and transferred to Canada. In that position she fought for better food, sanitation and proper medical care for prisoners and lepers, as well as soldiers and their families. She made unheard-of demands for ovens in cook-houses, so that soldiers might have an occasional roast instead of everlasting boiled meat; for the separation of drinking water from drainage; for mattresses and pillows instead of straw palisade; and of course she caused many arguments.

James Barry retired in 1864 – reputedly against her wishes. She did not receive the customary knighthood that a person of such reputation would have been granted. Years of service in many parts of the Empire were peppered with arrests, demotion, insubordination, unannounced leave overshadowing the doctor's medical achievements.

After Death

Dr Barry died from dysentery on July 25, 1865. It wasn't until the remains of Barry lay in Kensal Green Cemetery did Sophia Bishop, a maid at his lodgings who prepared the body for burial, make the startling claim Dr Barry was in fact a "she."

Sophia said later there were stretch marks, which indicated a baby had been born. But as there was no postmortem, there was no conclusive evidence.

No obituary was ever published. Furthermore, the embarrassed British Military placed an embargo on Barry's military records for 100 years. They included documents relating to Dr Barry's reports.

Sophia did not disclose the information until after the funeral, and the story immediately grabbed the headlines. With only the maid's word to go on and no post-mortem, the story caused endless speculation, with some contemporaries "claiming to have known all along," and others arguing Dr Barry was hermaphrodite.

One man claimed to have known Barry as a student, and to have tried to teach her boxing 'but all she wanted to do was defend her chest.' Another said he had shared a cabin with the high-ranking officer and had been told it was against regulations for a junior to be present while a senior officer undressed. He was ordered to leave the cabin.

There are many stories, all seemingly adding something but keeping to the core. Pieces of contemporary evidence come from the *Memoirs of Les Capes*, published in 1823. On his return from attending Napoleon in St Helena, Les Capes had met Dr Barry in Cape Town. He described Dr Barry "as a boy of 18 with the form, manners and voice of a woman."

Apparently, Dr Barry once signed her name as James Miranda Stuart Barry. This was in 1810 when she wrote to a Latin American soldier who had taken an interest in her.

In the 1950s historian Isobel Rae gained access to army records and concluded Dr Barry was a niece of James Barry, the celebrated Irish artist and professor painting at

artist and professor painting at London's Royal Academy.

Margaret Ann Bulkley, "Dr Barry," still lies buried in Kensal Green Cemetery in London. Her gravestone is marked: "Dr James Barry Inspector General of Hospitals, died 26 July 1865, aged 70 years. She was an extraordinary doctor, the first female graduate from a medical school in Britain who fooled the British Army and the rest of the world for 50 years".

What a woman. Dr Barry fought tirelessly and against all odds for better food, sanitation and proper medical care for local inhabitants, prisoners and lepers, as well as soldiers and their families. The story of this remarkable person illustrates the lengths one determined woman would go to achieve her dreams. The British Army Surgeon eventually achieved the rank of Inspector General of Military Hospitals; the highest that could be accorded.

Reading some of the many stories told about the eminent physician in an article in *The Argus* newspaper of 11 November 1974 sums up in one paragraph her greatness: "In my book, the most eminent women's libber was a Cape Surgeon by the name of Dr James Barry who beat distinguished men at their own game by posing as one of them and, best of all, shut up about it."

Celebrating the Importance of Mothers

Sunday, March 11 was Mothering Sunday and various churches on the island held services to celebrate mothers.

At St James' Sung Eucharist and Parade, the attendance of mothers, fathers and children occupied nearly all the congregation seats. Noticeably, there were more adults than children; prompting Fr Dale Bowers to comment "Today we have to be children."

The first hymn chosen was Bind us Together Lord Bind us Together, with appropriate other hymns to follow. A large table at the front of the church was laden with posies donated for children to present to mothers as a thank you "for all that mothers do for us as children," said Fr Dale. At one point, all mothers and grandmothers were asked to stand so they could be identified.

Fr Dale talked about the importance of mothers and why we should be thankful for them. To illustrate that mothers can identify their child through touch, two (mothers) were called to the front and blindfolded. Their children accompanied them and were mixed secretly with three others. The mothers were then tasked with touching the head of each child to identify their own. Both were successful first time. One of the children asserted, "They must be able to see under the blindfold," to great amusement.

Representatives from Guides, Brownies and Rainbows contingents then read inspiring messages to all mothers. Next, the posies were blessed and children, both young and adult, collected the flowers and presented them to their mothers, grandmothers and godmothers. During the Eucharist, parents with infant children took them to the altar



to receive blessings. Blessings were also bestowed on two people who had birthdays recently, and happy birthday was sung to them.

During the service, Fr Dale on behalf of Bishop Richard Fenwick announced that Lay Minister Robert (Bobby) Crowie of Longwood would be ordained as a Deacon at St Marks Church, Longwood on March 18 at 5pm. Bobby has been ministering in St Matthews and St Marks for a number of years and has responded to his call to be a Deacon.

The traditional celebration event, which took the form of scripture readings, prayers, a psalm and hymns (some of which had people clapping), took longer than normal because of the Mothering Sunday activities. The service concluded with the hymn *All Things Bright and Beautiful*.

The Equality and Human Rights Commission, are aware of reports concerning conditions at the Her Majesty's Prison Jamestown going back over many years. The Commission has decided to conduct an inquiry into the accommodation at the prison.
