

# MILLIONAIRE LEFT TWO WILLS.

## Arioch Wentworth's Daughter Will Contest Later Testament—It Gives Her \$12,000 Annuity.

SALEM, Mass., March 23.—Two wills, disposing of the estate of the late millionaire real estate man, Arioch Wentworth of Boston, were offered for probate here to-day, indicating that Mrs. Susan M. Stuart, his daughter, who was the principal beneficiary under a will made in 1887, will contest a will made in the present year cutting her off with \$12,000. The estate is estimated at \$7,000,000. Mrs. Stuart is the wife of the British ex-Vice Consul at New York and Boston.

P. B. Watson of Boston, acting for the executors named in the 1903 will, to-day filed that document, with the usual formal petition that it should be admitted for probate. R. M. Morse of Boston, representing Mrs. Stuart, offered the 1887 will. The earlier will made only two important public bequests, that of \$150,000 to the Museum of Fine Arts, Boston, and of \$100,000 to the town of Somersworth, N. H., for a public library. The 1903 will gives all of the estate save a few thousand dollars to establish an industrial school to bear the name of the founder.

It is understood that the change in the plans for disposing of his property was due to family trouble growing out of the alleged transactions of Mr. Wentworth's son-in-law, Willoughby Herbert Stuart, as the result of which Mr. Stuart was sent to the McLean Asylum for treatment for mental trouble.
