

Moving Day in Brooklyn,

The only noticeable feature about May Day in Brooklyn, yesterday, was the comparatively small amount of furniture on the road, and the inclination of the trucks and movers to the Twenty-first Ward, where rents have come down about twenty per cent. within the last month or two. Landlords who demanded \$800 and more for their houses were glad to find tenants at the eleventh hour for \$600. Numberless rows of houses had been erected in the Twenty-first Ward during the year, and in many of them the gas was lighted for the first time last night. Business at the ferries was dull beyond all precedent, and from the general aspect of the city it was evident that the people of Brooklyn preferred remaining quietly in their homes, and bearing whatever ills they had than flying to others unknown.
